New recreation fields proposed

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MILTON — Santa Rosa County could be seeing an improvement in recreational field space on Avalon Boulevard if it approves plans for the construction of new athletic fields. The Local Option Sales Tax committee voted to have staff pursue options for a centrally located area for additional athletic fields. At the June 19 LOST meeting, Santa Rosa County Administrator

Dan Schebler presented the board with a proposal to create a series of 10 fields on 115 acres of land at the now defunct Moors Golf Course. The fields would serve as multipurpose fields for soccer and football. "This would be a facility that would be directed toward tournaments and tourism," Schebler said. "This is one option that would address I think field and also open up recreation tourism as an option just north of I-10." Schebler said that buying the

'He was a mighty fine man'

Remembering Lloyd Hinote

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MILTON — First in private then in public, he often held leadership positions serving customers, business people, Milton citizens and Santa Rosa County Creek Indian Tribe members. However, his most important role may have been "dad."

Lloyd Hinote was a life long resident of Santa Rosa County and a long-time resident of Milton. He was born on January 22, 1938 in Alflora, just northeast of Milton. He served more than 15 years on the Milton City Council, representing Ward IV. Former city mayor Guy Thompson once praised him for being serious about his role to the city, always being quick to respond to a problem. This month the Milton city council dedicated a boat launch in Hinote's memory. Councilwoman Pat Lunsford said he was a man who stood for what he believed in

and didn't mind speaking up when necessary. "He was a mighty fine man," she said. "His heart was dedicated to making Milton a better place. No one would have anything negative to say against him." Lunsford said Hinote worked for his entire city and not just his ward. As a councilman, he was known for making a daily appearance at city hall and maintaining a good relationship with the city's employees. During his service, council

voted to build a new city hall, a new fire station, along with a new wastewater treatment facility and recreation facilities. He served as chairperson over the city's parks and recreation committee.

Before his time on the city council, Hinote had a background in finance and business. For 24 years he served as a vice president for a bank. Following this, for 18 years, he ran his own private business and then for nearly 10 years was the executive director for the Pace Area Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to his work and his service to the city, Hinote also served on Rosa County Creek Indian Tribe Inc. as the vice chief. Dan Helms, who took over as vice chief when Hinote passed away, said he was a wealth of knowledge on Native American history and culture.

"If you would stand still long enough, he would teach you something about the heritage and culture of Native Americans," Helms said. "Lloyd's memory and

MILTON — The animal advocacy group, A Hope for Santa Rosa County, has more to be hopeful for.

Starting next month, the nonprofit will have a home address in Milton at 5755 Washington St.

A HOPE for Santa Rosa County has been existence since October 2017. With a handful of volunteers, the organization works to reduce the population at the crowded Santa Rosa County shelter — and shelters in surrounding areas — by advocating for responsible pet ownership.

A Hope for Santa Rosa County is currently raising money for a transport van for their biweekly trips to Operation Spay Bay. You can donate through the GoFundMe page at gofundme.com/vanimals or on Facebook at facebook.com/ahope4src.

"Based on last year's numbers the county shelter had taken in approximately 6,000 animals and 4,058 were euthanized," said A HOPE for Santa Rosa County volunteer Paige Cary. "That's unacceptable.

DALE PATRICK HALL


It is with great sadness that the family of Dale Patrick Hall announces his passing on Friday, June 15, 2018, at the age of 87 years old.

Drainage improvement project begins in Pace

PACE — Santa Rosa County contractor Chavers Construction has started a drainage improvement project to help alleviate flooding around Maranatha Way and Chipper Lane in Pace. The construction is expected to be completed by the end of June 2019. The drainage improvement project includes the installation of drainage inlets, construction of a regional stormwater retention facility, modifications to the existing stormwater pond, and construction of associated pipe network and surface ditches allowing for additional storage. Following mobilization, the contractor will clear the pond area and begin excavation, which will take

approximately six months. The \$1,149,046 contract is funded with a combination of Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funding, and local option sales tax. "This is a

much needed project that will greatly improve the quality of life for residents in this area," BOCC Vice Chairman Sam Parker, District 1 said. "The citizen's continued support of the half-cent infrastructure surtax will allow us to implement even more drainage improvement projects in the future." Following the historic flooding of April 2014, the county applied for federal funding to improve the drainage in this area. This project is the tenth large-scale drainage project to be implemented with HMGP funding in the past eight years to improve drainage countywide. In combination with the HMGP grant, Santa Rosa County has completed nearly \$11 million in drainage improvements.

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

Virus found in Florida resident may be widespread throughout the Southeast

GAINESVILLE — A virus first found in Tampa Bay-area mosquitoes that can cause a rash and mild fever has been identified in humans for the first time, according to University of Florida researchers.

The findings are yet another indicator of the range of diseases that can be caused by mosquito bites in Florida, in keeping with a recent study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that highlighted the almost doubling of vector-borne disease cases in the United States since the early 2000s.

"Although the virus has never previously been found in humans, the infection may actually be fairly common in North Florida," said J. Glenn Morris, M.D., M.P.H., director of the UF Emerging Pathogens Institute and corresponding author of the report on the virus published June 9 in the journal *Clinical Infectious Diseases*.

"It's one of these instances where if you don't know to look for something, you don't find it," he said.

The virus, called "Keystone virus" after the location in the Tampa Bay area where it was initially identified in 1964, has been found in animal populations along coastal regions stretching from Texas to the Chesapeake Bay.

While there were no reports of human infection until now, human infection has long been suspected. A 1972 article in the *American Journal of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene* reported Keystone virus antibodies in 19 to 21 percent of the people tested in the Tampa Bay region.

The new report, titled "Keystone Virus Isolated from a Florida Teenager with Rash and Subjective Fever: Another Endemic Arbovirus in the Southeastern United States?," says a teenage boy went

into an urgent care clinic in North Central Florida with a rash and fever symptoms in August 2016, during the Zika virus epidemic in Florida and the Caribbean. Because of concerns about Zika, laboratory samples were collected from the patient. However, all studies were negative for Zika or related viruses.

Unexpectedly, UF researchers did find Keystone virus when they did viral cultures from the patient samples. Although the patient did not report symptoms of encephalitis, researchers report that the virus grew well in Neuro-2A cell cultures. Neuro-2A cells are mouse brain cells, and the ability of the virus to grow in these cells suggests that Keystone virus can infect brain cells, and may pose a risk for brain infections.

"This virus is part of a group commonly known as the California serogroup of viruses," said John Lednicky, Ph.D., a research professor in the UF College of Public Health and Health Professions' department of environmental and global health and a member of the Emerging Pathogens Institute. Lednicky is the first author of the report.

"These viruses are known to cause encephalitis in several species, including humans," he said.

Jamestown Canyon virus and La Crosse encephalitis virus are two of the most commonly known viruses

in the California serogroup.

Due to the likelihood that Keystone virus is a common though previously unidentified pathogen among people in the region, Morris emphasized the need for additional research into the prevalence of vector-borne diseases in the United States.

"All sorts of viruses are being transmitted by mosquitoes, yet we don't fully understand the rate of disease transmission," he said. "Additional research into the spread of vector-borne diseases will help us shine a light on the pathogens that are of greatest concern to both human and animal health."

Morris also stressed the importance of minimizing the risk of mosquito bites by using mosquito repellent at times and places where mosquitoes are present.

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Program helps transition justice-involved students to school life

MILTON — During the 2017-2018 school year, 43 youth in Santa Rosa County have transitioned from a Department of Juvenile Justice facility back into our school district. Additionally, as of May 2018, there are 143 youth who have been justice-involved currently attending a school in the Santa Rosa County School District. There are 55 youth who are currently committed in a DJJ facility serving time who will be released at some point during the 2018-19 school year.

The National Technical Assistance Center for the Education of Neglected and Delinquent Children and Youth (2016) identified practices that lead to successful transition from facility to community for justice-involved youth. These practices include: inter-collaboration of agencies at transition team meetings, efficient records transfer, transition plan, research-based programming, regular monitoring and tracking, and adequate funding.

Dr. Karen Barber, Director of Federal Programs, secured a Title IV federal grant for school enrichment to target this

population of students attending schools within the Santa Rosa County School District. The program is called SOS, Supporting Our Students.

"Our goal is to keep students in schools to graduate and eventually move on to a career or post-secondary education program," Barber said.

Spearheading much of the work with these students is Student Intervention Specialist, Cindy Peaden. Peaden, who was previously a classroom teacher, and most recently a high school counselor in Santa Rosa County, said when she read the job description, it had her name on it.

"I have a heart for students who need a little

extra encouragement and attention." Peaden said.

SOS has a personal, one-on-one component, including mentoring, school visits to meet with the students, additional help and support through after-school tutoring, counseling services, assistance with difficult tasks such as filling out FAFSA forms and college applications to attempting to meet basic needs as they arise throughout the school year.

"It's a village approach to providing resources and services to assist these students. We would love to have individuals and organizations within our community partner with us to help this population of students in need." Peaden said. "This can be done in a variety of ways such as mentors, opportunities for part-time jobs, internships, opportunities to complete community service hours, donations to meet needs not covered under the grant."

FWC Commission announces updates to trap fisheries

SARASOTA — At the June 20 meeting in Sarasota, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) approved several draft changes to recreational and commercial trap fisheries rules and directed staff to come back to the September meeting for a final public hearing. Approved

draft changes include:

- Creating a mandatory, no-cost annual recreational blue crab and stone crab trap registration for trap fishers age 16 and older and requiring trap identification numbers to be placed on recreational traps
- Increasing the time allowed for commercial lobster fishers to remove spiny lobster traps from the water after the season

ends from five days to 10 days

- Starting the commercial spiny lobster trap soak period the Saturday following the recreational mini-season (which occurs the last consecutive Wednesday and Thursday of July)

period will go into effect prior to the 2018 season via executive order.

The FWC held eight public workshops across the state in May to gather input on these proposed changes and gathered input online via the MyFWC.com/SaltwaterComments page. The FWC will be continuing to work with commercial trap fishing industry to improve management of these fisheries.

Incorrectly sized flotation device among FWC incidents

Ride the waves with care

With the arrival of summer weather also comes recreational water activities like boating, jet skiing, tubing and kayaking. While these activities can be fun for the whole family, the National Safe Boating Council urges caution to those recreating on the water.

Boat operator inattention is a serious concern. In 2016, the NSBC reports there were 4,463 boating accidents which resulted in more than 700 unnecessary deaths. Four of the top five primary contributing factors have to do with a lack of attention or knowledge/skill of the boat operator:

1. Operator inattention
2. Operator inexperience
3. Improper lookout
4. Excessive speeds

“The July 4th holiday is a great time to celebrate our freedom with family and friends,” said Yvonne Pentz, communications director of the National Safe Boating Council and lead organization for the Safe Boating Campaign. “If you are fishing, boating or just enjoying the day on the water, it’s important to boat responsibly.”

The Safe Boating Campaign shares these important boating safety reminders:

- Always wear a life jacket. Drowning is the reported cause of death in 76 percent of all boating fatalities – and 84.5 percent of drowning victims in recreational boating accidents were not wearing a life jacket

in 2017. Boaters should wear a properly fitted life jacket in good condition at all times while boating.

- Use an engine cut-off device. An engine cut-off device is a proven safety device to stop the boat’s engine should the operator unexpectedly fall overboard. In 2017, the U.S. Coast Guard reported 172 accidents in which at least one person was struck by a propeller. These accidents resulted in 31 deaths and 162 injuries, all of which could be prevented if the boat operator was wearing an engine cutoff device.

- Never boat under the influence. Boating under the influence, or BUI, is the leading contributing factor in recreational boater deaths. The side effects of alcohol or drug use, such as impaired judgment, reduced balance and poor coordination, are magnified while boating. The National Association of State Boating Law Administrators, a partner of the Safe Boating Campaign, is coordinating the 10th annual Operation Dry Water from June 30-July 2 in every U.S. state and territory to raise awareness about BUI dangers.

It's not the shelter's fault. They're just doing the job at hand. Things have got to change; people have to know those numbers."

Every two weeks, volunteers with HOPE coordinate transportation for 30 animals to be taken to Operation Spay Bay in Panama City for low-cost spay and neuter services. The 600-square-foot commercial building will serve as an overnight boarding facility for animals awaiting transport to Operation Spay Bay.

Cary said the goal for HOPE and its president Brandi Winkleman, is to one day have a low-cost spay and neuter facility similar to the Barbara Grice Memorial clinic in Pensacola. The Milton facility is "a step in the right direction," Cary said. The facility will also serve as a pet food pantry where people can drop off food for dogs and cats in foster care or for feral cat communities.

The City of Milton has agreed to loan the space rent-free. A Hope for Santa Rosa County will

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




Brighten with *Baptisia*

This plant requires little, but it gives a lot

Gardeners are always looking for plants that require little and yet give a lot; ones that are disease resistant, have pretty flowers and ones that deer find distasteful. Well, I have just rediscovered Baptisia, which falls into this category. This shrub-like perennial is long-lived, striking and easy to grow. It makes an impact when peppered throughout a perennial border or just used as a single specimen.

Baptisia is commonly known as blue wild indigo or blue false indigo. Pea-like flowers appear on long stems that are architectural gems in the garden. These spiky forms add a different dimension, as well as an interesting texture to the perennial border. The blue-green foliage is also a plus since it stays pretty in the flower border all summer long.

These native plants are found in the woodlands and grassland of eastern and southern North America. The species most commonly found in cultivation is baptisia australis. However, there are some newer hybrids

that are being developed that are outstanding. Breeders are working to have plants with a more compact habit, stronger stems, colors that are more intense and various blooming times. Some of the bright yellows and clear blue ones are my personal favorites.

I also love Baptisia for other reasons. They make great cut flowers, they are a dramatic statement in the garden, and because of the time they bloom in our area is great for my garden. We have azaleas and other flowering trees and shrubs that bloom at the same time as the azaleas are in flower. Baptisia begin to bloom as the azaleas are waning and before summer annuals and perennials take center stage. This helps insure that there will be continuous color in the garden, making it a great transitional plant.

Baptisia species come in three flower colors: blue, white and yellow. Blue species are most well known in gardens, but they are actually the rarest color in the genus. Today, some of the hybridizers that are working with Baptisia are trying to get more intense, clear colors as well as adding red or pink flowers to the palette.

Baptisia take some time to get

established, so be patient. The roots need to work their way deep into the ground and this might take a season. However, this deep root system will take the plant through drought and helps require less water. Baptisia like sun and will grow in sandy or rocky soil and will also tolerate clay.

If there is a drawback to this plant, it would be their ability to grow 3 to 4 feet tall with a similar spread. Breeders are working to make more compact plants, which will make it usable in smaller spaces.

I have been asked about pruning and, yes, you can prune your plants. You can tidy up your garden, removing the seed heads after they flower. If you want to clean up the plant in fall, do so when the leaves start to drop. This indicates that the plant has gone into dormancy. In colder climates it is good to mulch your bed to protect the root zone.

However, if you want to have more plants, let them go to seed and fall naturally to the ground.

Reader comment: We lost out on buying our dream home when we didn't understand the significance of what you recently wrote that there are "no standardized rules in the industry" and that "the nature of the real estate transaction and how the sales develop is very fluid." We had first made a written offer on the house we wanted for less than the asking price, which was rejected by the seller.

We had our agent verbally communicate increasing offers, a practice he said was standard in the city.

Meanwhile, another potential buyer wrote an offer and also started negotiating. We didn't find out until too late that the listing agent was presenting only our competitor's verbal increments to the sellers, and didn't tell them we were willing to pay more. Needless to say, the seller sold to the other party.

It turns out we were the unwitting victims of a boycott against our agent because he was from an Internet real estate "disruptor" company that had been robbing clients from brick-and-mortar companies in the city.

When we cried foul, our attorney confirmed that while agents are required to present written contracts to sellers, they are not legally obligated to follow up with the verbal give-and-take that's needed to firm up a deal.

Please share our sad story to help educate buyers and sellers.

Monty's response: Note to readers — I have redacted the city and the name of the real estate company where our reader's agent is affiliated. I did so because this same sad story is happening today in many cities, with many real estate agents, in many sections of the country. I am sad to hear your

dream home was not to be. It is likely that you will go on and find another dream home you may like even more.

On the agent's explanation, the company he is with has been in your local market for over 10 years. Like every other type of business, real estate companies have been pilfering talent and clients for over a hundred years.

The agent's company is just one of many disruptors using new techniques and technologies fighting to expand their brand.

Most real estate agents would be more interested in seeing their listing sold than they are about which real estate company brings the buyer.





ASK THE DOCTORS

KILAUEA ERUPTION PRODUCING HEAVY SULFUR DIOXIDE EMISSIONS

Dear Doctor: Our 68-year-old father moved to Hilo on the Big Island of Hawaii two years ago. He's not that great about using sunscreen, so my siblings and I always figured skin cancer would be the biggest health threat. But now with the Kilauea volcano, we're way more worried about the toxic fumes. What are they, and are they really as dangerous as the news stories say?

Dear Reader: When your father relocated to the Big Island, he moved to the youngest of the chain of Hawaiian Islands. It's home to Kilauea, which, despite its outwardly quiet demeanor over recent decades, is considered to be one of the most active volcanoes in the world. In fact, according to the U.S. Geological Survey, Kilauea has been in the process of erupting since 1983. This occurs when magma, the mixture of molten or semimolten rock found beneath the earth's crust, makes its way to the surface.

As this happens, ash, steam and various gases dissolved in the magma are released. Among the emissions is sulfur dioxide, or SO₂. It's a noxious gas that in certain concentrations is toxic and potentially deadly. Scientists monitoring the current stage of Kilauea's eruption, which as we've seen from news reports is extremely active, report that significant amounts of the gas are emerging from the volcano's various vents and fissures.

Sulfur dioxide is a colorless, nonflammable gas with the acrid odor of a just-struck match. It's a byproduct of the burning of coal and oil at power plants, of smelting copper and, as Kilauea now reminds us, of volcanic eruptions. In small quantities, SO₂ is used as a food preservative, as in dried fruit. It's also used to sanitize food containers and fermentation equipment, and as a moisture control agent.

People exposed to the gas near the volcano may experience eye irritation that can become severe, sneezing, coughing and choking, and a burning sensation or even a rash on the skin. Prolonged exposure to SO₂ can cause bronchitis and swelling of the upper airways to the point that breathing becomes difficult or impossible. That's because the gas is highly soluble in water and is easily absorbed by the moist environment of the respiratory tract. SO₂ gas is bad news for anyone, but the young, elderly and those with breathing issues are at greater risk of serious side effects. This is why residents have been evacuated from the immediate area and have been allowed to return to fetch pets and valuables only when it has been determined that SO₂ is at acceptable levels.

Living in Hilo, a safe distance away from the volcanic activity, your father isn't at direct risk from SO₂ gas. However, falling ash, as well as a mixture of SO₂ and water vapor from fog or rain, known as "vog," can affect air quality across a wide radius. If your dad has any breathing issues, it's possible that they may flare up as the present eruption continues to affect air quality in a wider area. Staying indoors and avoiding exertion can help protect him from the worst of it.





What did the tortoise say to the cone snail? Slow down!

Cone snails locate their prey using a tubelike organ called a "siphon" that allows them to smell and taste their environment.

The harpoonlike barb that the cone snail uses to inject venom into its prey is actually a modified tooth called a "radula." The snail keeps one radula loaded in its proboscis and several more stored in a special sac for later use.

Cone snails are divided into three groups according to their main prey: "Vermivores" prey on worms. "Molluscivores" prey on other snails (mollusks), and "piscivores" prey on fish.

Once a cone snail locates prey, it extends a tube called a "proboscis" that rapidly shoots out the radula, which stabs its victim and injects the venom.

What do you get when you cross a cone snail with the North Pole? An ice cream cone.

The sting from most cone snails is similar to a bee sting, but the sting from some larger species can be very painful and possibly deadly.
