Milton takes steps to limit truck driving downtown

No-thru-trucks sign goes up at Berryhill and Willing Street

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MILTON — All commercial trucks driving in Milton better be on the lookout if they do not want to face a hefty fine. The city has placed a “no-thru-truck-zone” sign on the corner of Berryhill Road and Willing Street. According to Milton Chief of Police Tony Tindell, violators will be given warnings until

September when the fines begin. The specific amount of the fine has not been determined yet, according to Tindell.

"I agree with the council's decision regarding placing no-thru-truck signs on Berryhill and North Willing Street," Tindell said. "There have been numerous incidents, creating dangerous situations where large trucks leave the street at the right turn from West Bound Highway 90 onto North Willing and take out the electric cross walk sign. Anytime a vehicle leaves the road onto

pedestrian sidewalks is a dangerous situation and it needs to stop."

Councilwoman Peggi Smith said it was about time for the sign and she was in full support of the sign being put up. According city ordinance, a no-thru-truck zone refers to a street or road on which trucks are prohibited.

United Way offers help to displaced residents

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MILTON — A broken septic tank at Westgate Mobile Home Park has led to a judicial order to turn off the water to all of its residents forcing them to move. Santa Rosa County United Way has offered to help displaced residents cover moving costs.

Several residents filed an emergency motion against the water shut off proposing they pool their money and buy individual septic tanks for each trailer.

First Circuit Judge David Rimmer denied the motion because the residents need the owner's permission to make any changes to the property.

However, the owner of the property, has failed to make repairs or respond to a civil complaint filed by the Florida Department of Health. Because of the septic system failure, the park cannot be permitted as a mobile home park.

United Way grants and major gifts manager Kyle Holley estimates it will take \$10,000 to \$15,000 to move all the families that are still living at the mobile home park.

Westgate mobile home park timeline

Sept. 2017: The Westgate Mobile Home Park's broken septic system lets raw sewage out onto the ground creating a public health hazard. The Santa Rosa County Department of Health initiates proceedings to have Lear correct the problem.

May 2018: The Florida Department of Health files a civil complaint against Lear in the First Circuit Court of the First Judicial Circuit for Santa Rosa County for the broken septic tank system.

June 2018: A judicial order to turn off the water is issued after a June hearing.

July 2018: That order becomes final July 10. Residents are notified by mail of the order and the park's water is turned off July 13.

The money will come from their disaster funds. "Poverty is a daily disaster," Holley said. "We have to help them because no one else will."

Bikers and skaters to share Milton skate park

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MILTON — Bikers can use the Steve Morgan Skate Park at the Guy Thompson Community Center at 5629 Byrom St. in Milton for the time being thanks to city council. The council had been in discussion about whether to allow BMX bikers access to the skate park at previous council meetings. Up until this July 19 vote only skate boarders have had access to the skate park. In a 7 to 1 vote, council has allowed bikers a set time to use the park

on a trial basis. Councilman Alan Lowery said a trial basis allows rules to be adjusted as needed. Councilman Jeff Snow thanked the council for researching the matter and making this decision. "This is a great thing for Milton," Snow said. Milton City Police Chief Tony Tindell said that there would be an officer on patrol around the park during specific hours to make sure bikers are abiding by the designated times. He said that while there are cameras installed at the park, vandalism perpetrated by skateboarders, he said, has rendered them inoperable. The

MPD is searching for whoever is responsible, he said. Tindell asked for everyone to be respectful of the park and the rules. "If you see anything happening at the park, please contact us," he said. The council said that if the vandalism continues it may be necessary to close the park until the perpetrators are caught.

More details about the times and rules for the BMX use of the skate park will come soon, according to city officials. The next city council meeting will be at 5:30 p.m. on Aug. 6. The meetings are open to the public.



OAKLAND LEE ARD

Oakland Lee Ard was born September 17, 1925, in Geneva County near Samson, AL. He passed away on July 20, 2018. The second of four children of William Lee Ard and Pinkey Elender Aplin Ard, he attended Reese School, Hacoda School, and Samson High School in Geneva County, and Gaskin School in Walton County, FL. While still in school, he was drafted into the United States Army, along with his older brother Dalton, in December 1943. He joined the 2nd Armored Infantry Division, 41st Armored Infantry Regiment on August 30, 1944, and engaged in combat in France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany until Thanksgiving Day 1944 when severe frostbite removed him from the battlefield. His military service at Ft. Knox, KY with an honorable discharge on May 10, 1946.

Afterward, Oakland resumed school, spent two years farming, then found employment in the paper industry, where he would remain until his retirement. That career began at St. Joe Paper Company, in Port St. Joe, FL, where he met and married Marian Elizabeth Watts in May 1952. In January 1953, he was employed by St. Regis Paper Company, which took the couple to Jacksonville, FL. In September 1957, the couple moved to Jay, FL when Oakland was accepted for a job at Container Corporation of America's newly-opened Brewton Paper Mill. He retired from Jefferson-Smurfit in 1996 at the age of 71. After the death of Marian in 2005, Oakland and Jackie Stewart were married in March 2007.

Oakland contributed to his community through his involvement in a variety of civic organizations, business associations, and his church, Jay First Baptist Church. Those include Board of Directors of Jay Hospital, State Housing Initiative Program (SHIP) Board Member, Santa Rosa County Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, Jay Chamber of Commerce, Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Department Interview Committee, ARC Santa Rosa Board of Directors, and as a Take Stock In Children mentor. He served as a Councilman for the Town of Jay. Throughout his career in the paper industry, he served his co-workers as president of two union locals, one of which he was a founding member, and as founding member and officer of two credit unions. An



avid gardener, he enjoyed fishing, raising cattle, and hay farming throughout his retirement years.

Several honors were bestowed on Oakland in 2004, in recognition of his volunteer efforts, including: Northwest Florida Area Agency on Aging 2004 Older American's Month Award, Santa Rosa County Chamber of Commerce 2004 Volunteer of the Year, American Legion Post #121 Service to America Certificate of Recognition, Town of Jay Proclamation recognizing Santa Rosa County Volunteer of the Year, Santa Rosa County Commission resolution declaring May 13, 2004, as "Oakland Ard Day", and by Extensions of Remarks by Hon. Jeff Miller, HONORING OAKLAND ARD in the CONGRESSIONAL RECORD. He received the Santa Rosa Chamber's Presidents Award in 1993 and the Hall of Fame Award in 2007.

He is preceded in death by his parents, his wife of 53 years, Marian, his older brother Henry Dalton Ard, and younger brother Herman Ray Ard. Oakland is survived by his wife Jackie, sister Versie Ard, sons Freddy (Vesta) and Ronnie (Bonnie), Jackie's daughters Marian Stewart-Griffin (Glenn) and Julie Stewart, grandchildren Taylor Ard (Amanda), Brandon Ard, Dalton Ard (Kelly), Jeffrey Ard, Jacob Gilliam, Lee Gilliam, Twig Griffin, and Stone Griffin; great-grandchildren Hailey Ann, Caleb, Easley, and Aplin Ard.

Visitation will be held on Sunday, July 22, 2018, at Jay First Baptist Church from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Service will be 10:00 a.m., Monday, July 23, 2018, also at the church. There will be a viewing also on Monday at 4:00 p.m., with a graveside burial to follow at 5:00 p.m. at Eight Mile Cemetery in Samson, Alabama.

Civil War on Santa Rosa Island

GULF BREEZE — Gulf Islands National Seashore announced a special day of programming exploring the lives of soldiers stationed at Fort Pickens during the Civil War. Special programs will be available from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Aug. 4 at historic Fort Pickens.

With help from longtime living history partner, The Walton Guard, the National Park Service will present musket and artillery demonstrations, civil war music, camp life displays, and other ranger programs specifically geared toward the soldiers experience during the Civil War.

A pop-up junior ranger tent will be open from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. just outside the fort. Children can learn about Civil War uniforms and equipment, try on different uniform pieces, and participate in a scavenger

hunt. Older children can join the Awkward Brigade, learning how to drill like a Civil War soldier and then write a letter home describing their experience.

All programs are free and open to the public. Programs can change or be cancelled without warning, particularly due to weather. There is an entrance fee for the Fort Pickens Area; the historic fort is open daily from 8:30 a.m. to

sunset.

Built between 1828 and 1833, Fort Pickens was originally intended to defend the newly formed state of Florida from foreign invasion. Ultimately, it would only see combat during the Civil War though the fort and surrounding batteries, added over the years, remained active until 1947. In 1971, the fort was incorporated into Gulf Islands National Seashore.


Norris and Smith have been practicing yoga for a combined 11 years and both have hundreds of hours of training and self study in the practice



'We will bury you'

Some old-timers will remember the quotation, "We will bury you," spoken by Nikita Khrushchev in a speech delivered in Poland in November 1956. He went on to say, "We can say with assurance that your grandchildren will live under Socialism." As American writer, Mark Twain, said to a reporter in response to a report Twain had died, "The reports of my death have been greatly exaggerated." The United States of America can say the same.

Considering the recent meeting of President Vladimir Putin of Russia and President Donald Trump of the U.S., it is good to point out there was a time when we had a really good reason to fear the Soviet Union. Alas, for them, that time has passed. Their threat to us on the world stage is largely in our minds. The Soviet Union that we feared has been gone since the Reagan years, more than 30 years ago. The old Soviet Union broke apart and left Russia standing alone. Yes, they have atomic capacity. However, the threat that was so real in the 1980s just isn't the same today.

Can I justify the statement

of Russia not being a threat to the U.S.? I can. Consider the following.

I was reminded of the reality of war with a speech by Rhet Butler, famous blockade runner of the South, in the academy award winning film, "Gone with the Wind." He said, "Wars are won not with bravery or words. Wars are won with cannons and ships, cannons that can deliver explosives great distances and ships that can blockade ports. There isn't a ship building or cannon factory in the entire south. The north is full of them."

Using that borrowed quotation as a base, let's take a look at the GDP (Gross Domestic Product) comparison between the U.S. and Russia. In short, let's compare the capacity for making war between the two countries.

Today, the U.S. still ranks first in the world in GDP, followed by the European Common Market and China. No, Russia doesn't rank fourth. Russia, is no. 12, not even in the top 10. Even Italy has a greater GDP than Russia. Lest you think the numbers are close, the U.S. has more than 14 times the GDP capacity of Russia. If we add the capacity of NATO to that of the U.S. we have 27 times the economic capacity of Russia.

Despite all the rhetoric and the current state of our national psyche, Russia doesn't want a war with us. So, what do they

want? President Putin is intent on recouping the economic power of the old Soviet Union. That is what the incursion into Crimea four years ago was all about. He needed to insure that Russia had a port on the Black Sea that would give him easy access to the Mediterranean and the many potential trading partners in Southern Europe, Africa, and the mid-east. Russia's involvement in the four-year war in Syria is about access to cheap oil to fuel his ships and factories.

What else does Russia want? They want the same thing that North Korea wants. They want status in the court of world opinion.

One could say with assurance that North Korea's venture into developing an atomic capacity and the intercontinental capability to deliver it to the U.S. was not about wanting a war with the U.S. Instead, it was about that same international spotlight Putin seeks. Proof? North Korea's GDP ranks in the second hundred, less than \$28 billion, of all the countries of the world. They don't want war with the U.S. They want the world to acknowledge their existence.

So, what did the recent meetings do for North Korea and Russia? It accomplished exactly what their leaders wanted it to. What did it do for the U.S.? I'll leave that judgement to history. My opinion? Not much.

Main Street Milton awards business improvement grants and loans

Main Street Milton awards business improvement grants and loans

MILTON – Main Street Milton announced the Business Improvement Program in June. The program provides grants and/or loans for façade improvements, signage, landscaping, infrastructure and business start-up/expansion expenses. The goals of the program are to assist businesses with starting-up, expanding or relocating, upgrade the appearance of properties, increase property values, and stimulate economic activity within the Main Street Milton service area and the City of Milton's Community Redevelopment Area. Funds were awarded in three categories:

- Sign Grant Up to \$500 to be used exclusively for new or replacement business exterior signage. No match is required.
- Commercial Façade Grant Up to \$2,500 to be used for

improvements to the exterior façade of a building. A 100 percent match is required.

- Business Micro-Loan Up to \$5,000 to be used for commercial façade improvements, equipment, signage, etc. A 100 percent match is required and 20 percent of the loan is forgiven annually.

Applications were accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. Projects were reviewed based on the criteria identified in the program guidelines: first-time applicants; applicants with projects along Caroline and Willing Streets; projects in

historically significant structures; and/or projects creating a minimum of five full-time positions within the first year. Eight applications totaling \$26,000 in requests were received. The City of Milton's Downtown

CRA allocated \$20,000 to MSM for the program. Seven of the eight applicants were approved for funding. Lil Pax's Mini Boats at 5148 Willing Street, will receive up to \$500 Grant for signage.

- Visible Changes Barber Shop at 5154 Santa Rosa Street, will receive up to \$2,500 Grant for signage, painting, plumbing and ventilation.

- Beardless Brewing Co. at 6820 Caroline Street, will receive up to \$5,000 Forgivable Loan for roll-up garage doors on front façade.

- Boomerang Pizza at 5227 Willing Street, will receive up to \$5,000 Forgivable Loan for exterior painting and lighting.

- The Man Cave Barber at 5176 Stewart Street, will receive up to \$500 Grant for signage Bagdad.


- Land & Lumber Co. at 6835 Caroline Street will receive up to \$3,250 Forgivable Loan for exterior awning and signage.



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


Single ingredient brews making a SMASH in beer world

You may have noticed something called a “SMASH” beer on the shelf at your local beer store. While the name sounds aggressive, this type of beer tends to be more subdued than your average brew. The term is actually an acronym—S.M.A.S.H.—referring to beers containing a “single malt and single hop.” Unlike most beers, which feature carefully-balanced and closely-guarded mixtures of various malted grain and hop types, SMASH beers highlight the unique qualities of an individual grain and hop paired, ideally, in simple harmony.

Achieving this balance is more difficult than one might suspect. Much like a plain omelet reveals the skill of a chef, since it contains only a few ingredients prepared simply, SMASH beers offer little cover for off-flavors or poor technique. For a SMASH beer to achieve its aim, the choice of grain and hop variety

must be made carefully and executed adeptly to showcase the qualities of each ingredient, both individually and in combination. Alongside the growing trend toward clean and unadorned craft lagers, the SMASH beer seems to be a vehicle for some brewers to demonstrate mastery through simplicity.

Even the most basic pale ales and lagers typically employ a few different grain and hop types to produce an array of style-appropriate flavors and aromas. Stouts and brown ales will use blends of malted and toasted grains to achieve complex colors and aromas, while others employ wheat and oats to boost flavor and body. And until the relatively recent development of potent, multi-purpose hop strains, examples of commercial beers employing a single hop were incredibly rare. The use of different hops for bittering and aroma has been standard practice for years. The SMASH beer pushes against these foundational

assumptions of brewing, trading an entire chorus of ingredients for an unaccompanied duet between barley and hops.

There have been some recent local versions of this style, both relying on a simple pale barley malt as a base. Southern Tier makes its 2XSMASH beer with Mosaic hops while Genesee Brewing Company released a SMASH beer featuring Simcoe hops under its Genesee Brew House Pilot Batch label. But perhaps the most celebrated SMASH beer doesn’t even bear this acronym on the label. Founders’ Mosaic Promise combines Mosaic hops and Golden Promise malt from Scotland, producing a beer of considerable depth considering its simple recipe.

This week’s recommendation: Mosaic Promise, a seasonal SMASH beer appearing on shelves by late July. Founders Brewing Company. 5.5 percent ABV. Grand Rapids, Michigan.

“Holley interviewed each family and while they all appeared to have income to meet their monthly bills they do not have the extra money required to make an unexpected move. Deposits for rent, utilities and moving furniture can run well over \$1,000, according to Holley. The disaster funds are available now. But Holley wants to replace that money in case a natural disaster strikes our area. Some donations from private donors have already started coming in to augment the disaster fund. In this particular case, donations from trailer moving companies are welcome. Two of the families own their mobile homes and the cost to move them is significantly higher. Besides financial assistance for the

move, United Way is also helping the families find affordable housing. “We review where they want to go live, to make sure they don’t get involved with predatory lending,” Holley said.

Of the 12 families that are still at the park, one has the financial means to move. During Holley’s interviews he found

neighbors consistently looked out for each other. Younger families asked that Holley take care of the older residents first and those with disabilities get aid before themselves. “My initial perception is these are very humble people. It’s working-class people helping working-class people,” Holley said.









Consider adding vines and climbers to your garden

Looking for a new twist to your garden? How about adding a plant or two that climbs, rambles or descends? Vines will add a new twist and using them in different ways could be fun. A climber can cover a wall, will soften or hide a chain-link fence, or decorate a tree. It can provide shade when over a pergola or privacy to a screen porch. Ramblers add a wonderful vertical element to any garden.

You can choose an annual, a perennial or an evergreen vine. Growing vertically will give you more growing space since they take up very little ground area, something that is precious in many yards. They can give you a spectacular show of flowers that will delight any visitor to your garden with the clever ways to get these plants to grow.

Annual vines grow quickly and cover an area rapidly if planted properly and given some fertilizer. You can have a climber scurry up any vertical object you want as long as you provide some support. Some climbers have tendrils the plant uses to self attach and some vines you will have to attach to the support. You can also have an annual vine scamper over top of shrubs in a perennial border.

Black-eyed Susan (Thunbergia) is a fast

growing vine that will twine around the support that is provided. It has charming, dainty daisy-like flowers that are about an inch and a half in size and they come in shades of white, yellow and orange. The dark centers make them resemble the garden perennial black-eyed Susan, hence the name. They can be grown in the ground or in a container. They are touted as doing better in a container because they like to be pot-bound, which encourages more flowers.

Morning glories are an easy vine to grow and an old favorite of mine. The clear blue color of the ones that decorated a mailbox down the street where I grew up, reminds me of my childhood. Morning glories need little care and come in various colors. I would recommend growing them on a structure where the dead vines can be easily removed in the fall. I grew them on a chain-linked fence for several years and they were great.

Passion flowers (Passiflora incarnata), another vine from my childhood have the more delicate, tantalizing bloom. I used to go on walks to find them growing wild in the open areas around our pond. Moonflower, which is usually grown from seed, is another great climber that has a lovely fragrance at night.

Mandevilla, a popular vine that most garden

centers sell, come in a lovely shade of pink or white. I grow mine in a pot, which I keep in the garage over the winter, but it is an annual in most areas.

Then there are perennial vines like clematis, which are long lived and have beautiful flowers. There are many different kinds of clematis that will fit about any situation. Some clematis bloom in spring, while others flower at different times during the summer months. Sweet Autumn clematis is the last clematis to bloom in our garden and grows up a tree by our patio. Most

clematis are deciduous, but there is one evergreen variety. Clematis take a year or two to get established and are worth the wait.

I have seen some wonderful rambling roses growing up in trees and making the tree look like they had flowers. The English are an old hand at putting climbing roses near a fruit tree and letting the rose climb up through the tree, coming out the limbs, making the tree look like it is a big rose bush.

If you are looking for an evergreen vine, there are several that will work if you live in a warmer area.

Clematis armandii, Carolina jasmine, Confederate jasmine and smilax are choices to consider. These evergreen vines do well in zones 7, but I'm not sure they will go farther north without a very protected place to grow. I do not recommend ivy because it is invasive where I live.

These are things you need to know before you go shopping for the right vine for your location. What is the purpose? You also must decide if you want an annual, perennial or evergreen vine. Is the vine going to get full sun or a good bit of shade. Do you want something

that will grow fast or are you willing to plant for the long term. Do you want the plant to support itself? Some climbers like passion flowers, use tendrils to wrap themselves around a nearby support, some are self-clingers like a climbing hydrangea that adhere unaided to walls or trees and there are ramblers like roses, that need some support to continue climbing.

One more thing to keep in mind is that the annual vine has a possible drawback depending on where it is growing. An annual vine will weave itself in and out. If you let an annual vine like morning glories attach to a chain-linked fence, when they die, it will take some time to get the dead vine out of the fence. Removing them from a pole or letting them climb in a bush would make less work after they have faded away.

You can see that there are lots of options. Figure out where you want a vine to grow and have fun at your local garden shop choosing just the right one. Vines will be a great addition to any spot and add a wonderful vertical element to any garden.

Multiple partners collaborate to return endangered snake to Northwest Florida

TALLAHASSEE – Twenty federally threatened eastern indigo snakes have just been released in northern Florida at The Nature Conservancy's Apalachicola Bluffs and Ravines Preserve (ABRP) as part of a collaborative endeavor to return the native, nonvenomous apex predator to the region. The release of the snakes marks the second year in a row of the reintroduction effort, and furthers the long-term joint plan of multiple nonprofit, agency, and academia partners to restore this important species to the region.

The Nature Conservancy, Central Florida Zoo's Orianna Center for Indigo Conservation, Auburn University, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Orianna Society, Joseph W. Jones Ecological Research Center, Gulf Power, Southern Company through the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, and the Fish & Wildlife Foundation of Florida are dedicated to supporting the recovery of this species. The eastern indigo snake is the longest snake native to North America and an iconic and essential component of the now rare southern longleaf pine forest. The partners have worked together for decades to restore and manage the habitat required by the snake, and many other species, to make the release possible.

The eastern indigo serves a critical function to balance the wildlife community – it consumes a variety of small animals including both venomous and nonvenomous snakes. At over 8 feet long, this impressive snake often relies upon gopher tortoise burrows for shelter. The snakes were historically found throughout southern Georgia, Alabama, eastern Mississippi, and throughout Florida, though their range is now far more restricted.

Largely eliminated from northern Florida due to habitat loss and fragmentation, the indigo was last observed at ABRP in 1982, until 2017 when 12 snakes were released to the preserve. This year's annual release is part of a 10-year commitment to the species' recovery and continues a focus on establishment of healthy ecosystems through collaborative land, water and wildlife conservation efforts.

"We continue our dedication to creating a healthy, balanced, and restored longleaf pine ecosystem at the Conservancy's Apalachicola Bluffs and Ravines Preserve and throughout the region, to encourage the recovery of the eastern indigo snake and support many other important plants and wildlife," said Temperince Morgan, Executive Director of The Nature Conservancy in Florida. "This second annual release results from the teamwork of an incredible group of partners."

ABRP is the only site in

Florida currently designated for indigo reintroduction. The 6,295-acre nature preserve in northern Florida's Liberty County protects a large longleaf pine landscape carved by numerous seepage streams. Located in the Apalachicola Bay region along the Apalachicola River, the preserve lies in the center of one of five biological hotspots in North America. This treasure trove of species diversity is unique to Florida and home to a disproportionate number of imperiled species. The preserve is a living laboratory for the development of novel restoration techniques and land management excellence, dedicated to natural community restoration, preservation of biodiversity, and education and training.

The longleaf pine ecosystem is one of the most diverse ecosystems globally, yet only 5 percent of this precious landscape remains. Over the past 30 years, The Nature Conservancy has employed science and technical expertise to develop the state-of-the-art

groundcover restoration process that is now used by state, federal and private partners across the southeast to restore longleaf pine habitat. This restoration, combined with the Conservancy's robust prescribed fire program, has resulted in improved longleaf habitat on over 100,000 public and private north Florida acres in recent years.

Longleaf pine restoration is also a top priority at places like the Apalachicola National Forest and Torreya State Park – both neighbors to ABRP and supported by the U.S. Forest Service and Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

Bred and raised by the Orianna Center for Indigo Conservation, the world's foremost comprehensive-based conservation organization dedicated to reptiles and amphibians, the 20 young snakes – 12 males and eight females – have most recently been living in outdoor enclosures that allowed them to be exposed to a more natural

environment in preparation for their release. The snakes have been implanted with radio transmitters by the Central Florida Zoo's vet staff to allow for tracking and monitoring. Data is still being transmitted and collected from the snakes that were released last year to help inform recovery efforts.

"The Central Florida Zoo's Orianna Center for Indigo Conservation is proud to aid in the recovery of the eastern indigo snake in Florida," said Michelle Hoffman, Deputy Director of the Orianna Center for Indigo Conservation. "This second annual release of 20 animals puts us one step closer to achieving our goal of reestablishing this species in the Florida Panhandle."

The Orianna Society was integral in the creation of the indigo snake reintroduction team and continues to play a role in reintroducing eastern indigo snakes into places they no longer occur. The Society works to conserve critical ecosystems for imperiled reptiles and amphibians, using science, applied conservation, and education.

Auburn University's Alabama Natural Heritage Program continues to bring knowledge to planning reintroduction efforts and expertise in onsite monitoring of the reintroduced snakes. Using radio telemetry, researchers can track the animals' movements, habitat selection and behavior. One of the eastern indigo snakes that was released in 2017 traveled over a mile from where it was initially released. The monitoring program is supported in part by The Joseph W. Jones Ecological Research Center, whose mission is to understand, demonstrate and promote excellence in natural resource management and landscape conservation in the southeastern coastal plains.

The indigo reintroduction efforts are supported by grants and other funding, including a Conserve Wildlife Tag Grant from the Fish & Wildlife Foundation of Florida, funded through purchase of Conserve Wildlife Florida license plates and designated for conservation of non-game species and the habitats that support them.

"The release of 20 eastern indigo snakes is another step forward toward our goal of reestablishing this iconic imperiled species back into the habitats of northwest Florida," said Kipp Frohlich, the FWC's Director of Habitat and Species Conservation. "It's a testament to what can be accomplished working together with many committed conservation partners."

Additional funding to support the reintroduction has been provided by Gulf Power, and Southern Company through the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

"All of the pieces have come together – the protection and management of the landscape, the advancement of the animal husbandry expertise to raise young snakes for release, and the development of the science necessary to make good decisions and monitor project success. This project is an exceptional example of a strong partnership dedicated to success," said David Printiss, North Florida Program Manager of The Nature Conservancy in Florida. "The restoration is complete, the snakes are flourishing, and the monitoring program is well equipped and ready – all systems are go!"

Throughout the state, the Conservancy continues to pursue conservation projects and support policy that protects natural systems for people and wildlife. Next year's snake release will be scheduled for summer 2019 – stay tuned.

—Brother's in a Financial Pickle, Los Angeles




