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SRSO: crime drop 'unprecedented'

Crime decreased by 21 percent in Santa Rosa County

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
MILTON — Santa Rosa County residents can rest easy knowing the county is safer thanks to the efforts of its law enforcement officers. During a July 3 press conference, Sheriff Bob Johnson said he was pleased with the overall decline in crime so far this year. "For the first six months this year, crime in Santa Rosa County as a whole went down over 20 percent," he said. Johnson said that after doing research the closest

Santa Rosa has ever come to a decrease in crime like this was back in 2011 when crime went down by 11 percent. "This is pretty much unprecedented," he said. Johnson said there were several reasons for the decrease. One big reason was the increase in the budget the sheriff's office received last year resulting in 19 positions filled and a 10 percent pay increase he said. "Prior to that 10 percent increase, we were losing officers to other agencies." Johnson said. "It was pretty consistent." Johnson said that since he has been sheriff, the department has hired 31 officers. Since the beginning of this year alone, 16 officers have joined. "I believe

for the first time since probably 1995 we are going to have a waiting list to get hired by the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office," he said. Johnson said crime in Pace is down by 21 percent and crime in Jay is down by 19 percent. However, crime in Milton, he said, rose by 8 percent, the only district in Santa Rosa County to show an increase. The county has also had a drop in homicides by 75 percent and car burglaries by 35 percent. Connecting with youth at earlier ages is another way to reduce crime, according to Johnson. He plans to do so by placing a resource officer in every school. During summer breaks, they would operate as normal deputies.

Wildlife refuge tries to capture injured heron

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NAVARRE — The Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge is trying to capture an injured great blue heron on Lost Bottoms Lane, but hasn't had any luck so far.

Allyssa Sandretto wrote in the Concerned Citizens of Navarre Facebook page Monday evening that a heron had been shot with "what sounded like a BB gun or an airsoft gun."

According to Sandretto, the bird's wing appeared to be damaged and hadn't flown away. The bird was still there Tuesday, and someone contacted the wildlife refuge to check on it.

"We had a team of volunteers that are very specially trained in Navarre to go out and look at it, and it is evading human capture," refuge wildlife technician Shelby Proie said. "It can fly short distances, but the more we tried to approach it the more it was going into the water source, and we didn't want to scare it into where it wouldn't be able to get out."

The wildlife refuge is monitoring the heron, but doesn't have any visual evidence that it was shot.

"It doesn't look like a wing was drooping. It doesn't look like there was any blood ... from what we saw," Proie said. "It definitely isn't acting 100 percent normal, so it's on our radar."

Proie said it's a delicate situation because when herons get stressed they get capture myopathy — a wild animal's reaction to abnormal states including fear or stress — and can drown themselves.

"Hopefully, once he feels calmer and exits the water, we'll be able to nab him," Proie said. "Unfortunately, he doesn't know we're trying to help him."

Sandretto said she's not sure who injured the bird, but she wants people to be aware of the seriousness of hurting animals.

"If anyone had/has kids out running around with any of those guns, take a minute and talk to your kids," she said. "No one should hurt innocent animals."

Skate or bike?

Milton skate park could see changes

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MILTON — Skaters who frequent the skate park in Milton, be aware of possible changes to park rules. Currently, park rules forbid riding bikes in the park, but council is considering changing this rule. At the July 2 city council meeting Councilman Jeff Snow suggested an ordinance to have a set time for bicycles to be allowed access to the park. "If you check most skateboard parks throughout the county, bicycles are allowed," Snow said. "I think there can be appropriate times posted and that is what this ordinance would be doing to allow [people with bicycles] there at certain times and tweaking the rules as needed." Lunsford, who was responsible for the creation of the skate park, spoke against the ordinance change, citing her fear for the skaters and the skate park in general. Team Pain, the leading skate park builder at that time, Lunsford said, warned bike and scooter handles would lose their rubber and the exposed metal would dig into the concrete and cost a lot to fix.

"That's why we said no bicycles," Lunsford said

Donald was born in Abilene, Texas, to William and Mittie Cowart. Don loved to dance and was known as "The Jitter Bug Champion" of Texas for many years.



DANNY HAROLD GOODEN


It is with great sadness we announce the death of Danny Harold Gooden.

4 little-known facts about skin cancer

Yet, skin cancer continues to be the most common cancer in the United States—more than all other cancers combined.

- Sun and ultraviolet light exposure can raise skin cancer risk even without causing sunburn. If

you work outdoors or live in a high-altitude climate, your exposure to UV rays is much higher and puts you at greater risk for skin cancer.

- There are many different types of skin cancer. The three most common are: basal cell skin cancers, squamous cell skin cancers, and melanomas. It's important for doctors to tell the types of skin cancer apart, because they

are treated differently. It's also important for you to know what skin cancers look like. This can help you find them at the earliest possible stage, when they are easier to treat and most

- Apply sunscreen daily, regardless of clouds or cooler temperatures. Unprotected skin can be damaged by the sun's UV rays in as little as 15

minutes. Even if it's cool and cloudy, you still need protection. UV rays, not the temperature, do the damage.

- Skin cancer can affect anyone, regardless of skin

color. Even if you have a darker complexion, are Latino or African-American, you're still at risk for skin cancer. People with darker colored skin are prone to skin cancer in areas that aren't commonly exposed to the sun — like the palms of the hands, soles of the feet, the groin, under their nails, and inside of their mouth — and it's often diagnosed in later stages when it's more difficult to treat.

You are your best advocate for skin cancer prevention. Remember to protect yourself daily from UV rays and conduct regular skin self-exams. If you spot anything irregular — including changes in size, shape or color of mole or other skin lesion, make an appointment with a dermatologist.

Florida Healthy Kids Corporation wants more children on insurance who qualify

TALLAHASSEE — To help Florida families interested in applying for Florida KidCare, the Florida Healthy Kids Corporation has recently debuted a free online eligibility calculator.

This new tool utilizes two key pieces of information — family size and annual household income — to estimate a family's monthly premium payment for Florida KidCare coverage.


Florida KidCare offers quality, affordable health and dental insurance to kids from birth through the end of age 18 and encompasses the following four insurance programs: Medicaid, MediKids, Florida Healthy Kids and

the Children's Medical Services Managed Care Plan.

FHKC estimates more than 257,000 Florida children are without insurance coverage, and nearly half of those children qualify for free or low-cost coverage — \$15 or \$20/month — through Florida KidCare. Enrollment is open year-round, and the application process is completely free for Florida families. An estimated 62 percent of children in Florida are covered through Florida KidCare.

FL-AL TPO Pedestrian/Bicycle Master Plan call for projects

PENSACOLA — The Florida-Alabama Transportation Planning Organization initiated an effort to incorporate facility improvements and Complete Streets policies into an updated Pedestrian/Bicycle Master Plan in February, 2017. The ultimate goal of this plan is to develop a non-motorized system that addresses the needs of all users and encourages the use of alternate modes of transportation.

As part of the update process, TPO staff has

re-opened a call for projects. Municipalities within the Florida-Alabama TPO planning boundary are invited to prioritize and submit up to 10 projects. A project form must be submitted for each pedestrian/bicycle facility project suggested. Completed forms should be submitted to Kristen Barre. If a municipality has a project that is of interest, and it was already included in the 2010 Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, staff is asking that the project be re-submitted to ensure that it is

included in the updated plan.

The deadline to submit projects is close of business August 10. However, applications submitted during the first call for projects, originally initiated January 4, 2018, do not need to re-submitted.

TPO staff will rank eligible projects based on the prioritization

methodology. The preliminary scores will then be presented to the Pedestrian Bicycle Advocacy Working Group for review of rankings and feedback. Final rankings will be included in the updated Florida-Alabama TPO Pedestrian/Bicycle Master Plan.

The mixed bag of summits, past and present

Summits are happening a lot right now, thanks primarily to the interest — at least for the moment — of United States President Donald Trump in meeting and mingling. Critical commentary along with other media attention pursue him, which means summitry is at a pinnacle these days.

North Korea leader Kim Jong Un also deserves credit for the current vogue. His country went through a century of harsh occupation and dictatorship. Imperial Japan occupied all of Korea from early in the 20th century until defeat in war in 1945, and then the Soviet Union installed the current brutal Kim regime.

Trump left a Group of Seven economic summit in Canada to meet with Kim in Singapore on June 12. A summit with Russian leader Vladimir Putin is coming up.

Allied leaders during World War II met regularly. The talks among U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain, and Premier Joseph Stalin of the Soviet Union redrew borders in Europe and elsewhere while fighting the Axis powers.

Churchill used the term “summit” to refer to such talks at the top. According to Cambridge University historian David Reynolds, in his 2009 book “Summits: Six Meetings that Shaped the Twentieth Century,” the great British leader employed the word this way in a speech in Edinburgh Scotland in February 1950, probably because of the global media attention focused on efforts by climbers to scale Mount Everest in the Himalayas.

Churchill returned to the imagery in a House of Commons speech in May 1953. At this time, British explorer Sir Edmund Hillary and Sherpa mountaineer Tenzing Norgay were striving to scale Everest. They reached the top at the end of the month. Credit Ben Zimmer for providing this fascinating history in a column last month in The Wall Street Journal.

Summits have a mixed history, as do efforts to surmount mountain peaks. President Barack Obama experienced both success and failure. Showing initiative, the new U.S. chief executive met with Russia’s President Dmitry Medvedev in July 2009. The leaders agreed on a framework to reduce nuclear weapons and permit U.S. forces to cross Russian territory to support military operations in Afghanistan.

Later, Obama blundered badly in an ill-conceived much-touted Arab summit at the White House and Camp David during May 13-14, 2015. Only two of the six countries invited, Kuwait and Qatar, ultimately sent

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

Fishing in protected area

Officer Ramos was conducting patrol in a designated shorebird nesting site in Navarre where a colony of black skimmers were nesting.

Black skimmers are a species of special concern and one of several imperiled shorebird species in the area. He saw the birds become visibly disturbed and flushed from their hatchlings when a subject ducked under the ropes and entered the closed area.

Although the area was roped off and posted with multiple signs, the subject ignored the barricades and went down to the seawall where she began to fish. She was issued a notice to appear citation for the violation.

Improper waste disposal

FWC's dispatch received a Wildlife Alert complaint that various waste materials were disposed of in the Yellow River Wildlife Management Area.

The complaint included the license plate of the vehicle and trailer involved.

Ramos and Environmental Investigator Hughes located a pile of waste debris on the south side of the management area. Using the tag number in the complaint, they located the suspect.

During an interview, the suspect admitted to disposing of the waste materials. Investigator Hughes issued the defendant a criminal citation for disposing of solid waste at a non-permitted location.

their top leaders. Bahrain, Oman, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates sent lower level government representatives.

This showed lack of respect for Obama, along with remarkably inept U.S. political calculation. White House spokesperson Josh Ernest compounded the error by naively emphasizing that those attending were in fact the most appropriate government representatives. The primary lesson is that good intentions and focus on speeches rather than the hard work of detailed policy ultimately means failure.

President Richard Nixon and associates did exactly the sort of difficult labor required,

then moved on to summits as conclusion to their work. The SALT I treaties with the Soviet Union in 1972 stabilized the nuclear arms race, which by then had become intense. Simultaneously, U.S. dialogue with China, culminating in Nixon's historic visit to Beijing, paid continuing dividends.

Leverage with both Beijing and Moscow was important to the 1973 accord ending U.S. direct military involvement in Vietnam. Improving relations with China mitigated the effects of the strategic reversal resulting from Hanoi's victory in that war.

Rhetoric is not enough.



she knows that bicycles are being used in the park regardless of the rule and she believes it is dangerous for little children there. However, there are several professional BMX bikers in the area that are not able to currently utilize the park, according to Snow, and this ordinance would be a good change. Councilman Alan Lowery said he has an issue with the ordinance change for two reasons. He's already seen bicycles in the skating park, he said, and has not seen skaters or bicyclists using helmets. "If they

won't go by the simple rule of wearing a helmet for their protection," Lowery said, "I don't know that if we lax anything that they are going to get better." Snow said he understands the concerns but said it's time to get up to date with other parks. "There should be some type of monitoring going on," Snow said. "If there is some type of problem going on, it can be addressed." Current and new city attorneys Heather Lindsay and Alex Andrade advised the council to allow the legal team to look at the issue before a final decision is made. The topic will return during the next city council meeting at 5:30 p.m. July 10.

Old friend, new job

Longtime volunteer Stormy Andersen is the new executive director of the Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge

OKALOOSA ISLAND — The Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge has a new executive director, and the name might sound familiar.

Carol (otherwise known as Stormy) Andersen has been a volunteer with the organization for years alongside her husband, Bill who is the president of the board of directors. In April 2017 the Andersens donated a 2.238-acre parcel on Cloptons Circle in Navarre, which will be the new home for the refuge.

When the last executive director abruptly left last month, Andersen stepped in as an interim executive director. A week later the board asked her to take the position.

“This organization needs someone that’s going to be around for a long time,” she said. “That’s me.”

While Andersen and her husband talk constantly about the refuge at home, she said she wanted there to be “no conflict of interest” with her new title. Instead of answering directly to her husband, she answers to board Vice President Mitch Robbins.

“Bill and I don’t sign checks together. I go directly to Mitch for everything,” she said.

Andersen comes to the refuge with more business expertise than animal expertise. She is an Air Force retiree with a master’s degree in public administration from Troy State University. She is also a Realtor.

It has been difficult for the refuge to hold on to an executive director. Amanda Wilkerson, who served as director for more than a decade, resigned in April 2016. She was replaced by longtime employee Susan Leveille, who resigned in October 2017. She is still an active volunteer, Andersen said. Two more directors have since come and gone.

The reality of working for a nonprofit that it doesn’t come with a lot of money or benefits. Andersen’s salary at the refuge is \$35,000 a year with no benefits. But her passion for the work isn’t driven by a paycheck.

Andersen admits to having a “healthy fear” of most critters. Her focus at the refuge right now is on outreach and fundraising for the new facility. The refuge has raised about half of its \$605,000 goal for the Navarre site, which includes a medical rehabilitation center and educational facility.

Anderson said it is an “exciting” time for the refuge. She said she is working on a transition plan to move animals and her staff of two from their home on Okaloosa Island to Navarre.

“I know what I have to do to move a team from one place to another,” Andersen said. “The same basic skills from the military apply. We’re going to grow at this new facility.”


One of her favorite parts of the job has been listening. When Andersen officially took the job June 13,

she sent an email to donors and volunteers letting supporters know that she has an “open door policy.”

“I’m very grateful for all of the thoughts and great input,” she said. “I like finding solutions to problems.”

Milton native is scallop-sitting to bring more succulent mollusks to plates in the future

PANAMA CITY — When it comes to investing in the future of the great outdoors of Northwest Florida, Gulf Power's Environmental Stewardship Coordinator Jeff Cole is always willing to step up, even if it means babysitting.

Cole is among 179 citizens who have signed up to be sitters of 4,005 baby scallops for a Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission program aimed at engaging citizens in conservation efforts.

"I remember when scallops were plentiful in the area, and it sounded like a good program to get scallop numbers back up," said Cole, a Santa Rosa County native who works in Gulf Power's Panama City office. "We use these bays to recreate and to fish, so it should be our responsibility to help keep them healthy and teeming with marine life for generations to come."

The scallop-sitting program is part of an ambitious 10-year restoration project FWC launched in 2016 to restore the once-thriving scallop population all along the Florida Panhandle — from Pensacola to Apalachicola — that once supported a commercial fishing industry until the 1950s.

This year, FWC began enlisting the public in the Panama City area to focus efforts on seeding St. Joseph Bay and St. Andrew Bay with the tasty mollusks. The program kicked off in April with an educational workshop and runs through January 2019.

Biologist Austin Heil said the citizens' program is about increasing scallop production and raising public awareness. "We put 4,000 scallops in St. Joseph Bay last year. This year, the citizens' program has helped us double our efforts," he said. "The idea is to get people to care."

Sitters were provided wild and hatchery-raised baby scallops and cages to protect the tiny mollusks from predators to improve their survival rate as they grow. Volunteers also received a T-shirt emblazoned with a baby scallop in a crib. Sitters deployed the cages in the water off of their private docks or used boats to drop them into the bays and check on them and report their progress on regular basis.

Cole dropped one cage of 29 scallops into North Bay and deployed another cage of 27 scallops into St. Andrew Bay near the Cove Park area. Both sets of scallops were doing well until heavy rains hit in late May and early June flooded North Bay with fresh water.

"The North Bay scallops died when the salinity of the bay dropped too much from all of the rain," Cole said. "But this year's failures and successes will provide important information for FWC to know where to focus scallop seeding next year."

Cole's St. Andrew Bay scallops are thriving and growing and will be released from the

cage after they reach adult breeding size in the fall. "The hope is they'll spawn in the cages to improve chances of reproduction because outside of the cages the scallops would spread out far and wide in the bay, and the eggs might not get fertilized," he said.

Bay scallops live in the shallow grasses of nearshore waters along Florida's Gulf Coast, from Pensacola to the Florida Keys, and are easily recognizable from other sea-grass critters by their 200 electric blue eyes scanning their surroundings and their ability to jet away by snapping their bi-valve shells.

Since populations have been declining, scallop harvesting is illegal west of the Gulf and Bay counties and harvesting is only allowed in certain bays during scallop harvesting season, which runs from Aug. 17-Sept. 30 in St. Joseph Bay and Gulf County.

FWC only offers the scallop-sitting program in the Panama City area and St. Joseph Bay for now. Heil said it has enough volunteers for this year but is compiling a list of volunteers for next season. Interest is so high, he already has 50 people on a waiting list.

Rick O'Connor, Sea Grant Extension agent for Escambia County, said he is looking forward to FWC offering the citizens' program in Santa Rosa Sound and Big Lagoon — prime spots for scallops — in the future but, currently, there are too few scallops for the program to be successful.

"We generally find scallop shells but few live ones around here," he said. Sometimes, piles of scallop shells are found near public water access points, indicating scallops are being illegally harvested, which impacts the chances for the species recovery, he pointed out.

To get a better handle on the population, O'Connor said Sea Grant is recruiting volunteers to help with a scallop-survey program this summer in Santa Rosa and Escambia counties as an important step in restoring populations.

ASK THE DOCTORS

STUDIES SUGGEST KNEE LIGAMENT DAMAGE MAY LEAD TO OSTEOARTHRITIS

Dear Doctor: I tore my knee ligament playing soccer a month ago and my cousin, who had the same injury but from snowboarding, says that means I'll get arthritis in the next few years. Is he right, even though I'm only 23?

Dear Reader: We're sorry to learn of your injury and wish we were about to give you better news. While things aren't quite as inevitable as your cousin has outlined, the truth is that he's in the ballpark. Research suggests that about half of all individuals who suffer an injury to the ligaments of the knee, no matter their age, go on to develop osteoarthritis within the next 10 years. It's one of the reasons why, when parents focus on concussion in discussions about their kids playing sports, we always make sure to broach the subject of knee injuries as well.

The knee is the largest joint in the body. It's basically a hinge at the point where the thigh bone, or femur, meets the tibia, which is the larger bone in your shin. The kneecap, or patella, protects the front of the joint. Keeping all of these moving parts connected, yet stable and flexible, is a joint capsule interlaced with a series of ligaments. The ligaments provide stability, limit rotation and sideways motion of the knee, and allow it to flex and extend within a set range of motion. Injuries occur when falls, jumps, shifts of weight or pressure from an outside source, like a tackle, stress the joint beyond what the ligaments can bear.

The anterior cruciate ligament, or ACL, is the workhorse of knee stability. As a result, ACL injuries are common in sports like soccer, football, basketball, snowboarding or skiing, where participants are constantly leaping, whirling or shifting their weight, often at high speed. Physical therapy and surgery can restore stability and get individuals with knee ligament injuries back on their feet.

However, studies that followed these patients over the course of a decade found that about half went on to develop arthritis. The reasons for this aren't fully understood. Some research has identified the ongoing presence within the knee of tiny proteins associated with inflammation, which persist long after the joint has been repaired. This suggests that the subsequent osteoarthritis has a biochemical component. Another school of thought is that, despite repair and rehabilitation, the knee joint just isn't the same and new stresses lead to deterioration over time.

If at any point you begin to experience the following symptoms, it's important that you check in with your doctor. These include:

- Stiffness in the joint, particularly in the morning, or after a period of inactivity
- A decrease in knee mobility that interferes with daily activity
- Knee pain associated with activity that abates when you rest
- Swelling or a feeling of warmth in the joint
- Sounds when the knee moves, like creaking or crackling

We hope you sought medical care for your injury. Whether you consider surgery, physical therapy or a combination of the two, please be vigilant about following your medical team's instructions.



Paint By Numbers

Most paint has at least three basic components. The "pigment" is the material that supplies the color. The "binder" is a substance that holds the pigment together. When dry, the binder and pigment form a tough, durable film. The "solvent" is a liquid that thins out the pigment and binder so they can be applied easily. The solvent is designed to evaporate, leaving behind a thin film of dry paint.

Humans first began using paint more than 100,000 years ago.

Many of the pigments used long ago were very toxic. The pigments used to make green and white were some of the most dangerous.

Besides adding beauty, the other main function of paint is to provide a protective layer for an object.

Lapis lazuli is used to make a beautiful blue pigment that has been around for thousands of years. Up until medieval times, it was considered more valuable than gold.

Oil paints became popular during the 1400s after Flemish artist Jan van Eyck began using linseed oil to create his paints.

Most of the paint produced in the world is used on buildings and structures.
