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Education goes on the road

Pensacola State College to bring Commercial Trucking School to East Milton

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MILTON — Pensacola State College is starting a commercial truck driver training program for the fall and Santa Rosa County is going to help. At the July 12 commission meeting, the county began the process of creating an agreement with the college to lease a parcel in the Northwest Florida Industrial Park at Interstate I10. At

the July 9 commission meeting, PSC President Dr. Edward Meadows approached the county commissioners about a long-term lease for 5 acres of land in the industrial park for \$1. In a letter to the commissioners, Meadows said the plan includes adding a lineman training program later.

With both programs in place, Meadows said, trucking students could receive the commercial driver's license training necessary to operate a lineman's bucket truck. "The class size is limited to 12 per semester," Meadows said. "So the max we could handle in one

year without a flex schedule would be 36." In return for leasing the land for a nominal fee, according to Meadows, the college would guarantee five slots for Santa Rosa County students and waive the tuition for three. He said that he would also be willing to accept the less desirable portion of the industrial park. The college already has funding and a design for the building for the trucking school. PSC could begin construction and advertise for instructors, according to Meadows, almost immediately should the college

'It's very eye-opening'

Santa Rosa County students, teachers attend cyber security camp

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MILTON — Students of Santa Rosa and Escambia County took part in a summer camp this week hosted by the University of West Florida to prepare students for careers in cybersecurity.

Cybersecurity, otherwise known as IT security, is the protection of computer systems from theft of or damage to their hardware, software or electronic data. The camp, entitled GenCyber, allowed students a chance to learn about cybersecurity fundamentals and do hands-on activities

to put what they learned to the test. Anthony Pinto, a faculty member with the UWF Computer Science Department and the lead instructor for the camp,

said the activities were an important part of the camp. "No one wants to come into a classroom and listen to a teacher drone on and on," he said. As part of

the camp, students took on a "cryptography escape-room challenge."

"We put clues on the board in black light ink," UWF senior Thomas Tibaut, who ran the challenge, said. "They have to use an alphabet code to solve a puzzle and they have to enter a secret password. It's tough. They are doing great." Identity theft and internet scams have contributed to the increased cyber security demand, Pinto said, making it a rewarding career. Currently there are 13,000 openings in Florida alone for cybersecurity, Pinto said. UWF research predicts by the year 2020 there will be 2 million cyber security jobs open in the United States. "We had a student graduate [who] is making

University of Florida researchers find way to produce 'green' bioherbicide

GAINESVILLE — Here's some good news for conventional and organic farmers alike: Researchers at the University of Florida College of Pharmacy have discovered a way to cost-effectively produce the bioherbicide thaxtomins. This means organic farmers can use the natural chemicals to ward off weeds and conventional farmers can use them on weeds that grow resistant to traditional, synthetic herbicides.

Thaxtomins are phytotoxins that are potent in small quantities, but they are no new discovery. Rosemary Loria, Ph.D., a professor and chair of plant pathology in UF's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, has studied them throughout her career. More recently, she collaborated with Yousong Ding, Ph.D., an assistant professor of medicinal chemistry in the UF College of Pharmacy, part of UF Health, to discover a way to harvest thaxtomins more efficiently.

"We have known for some time that thaxtomins have the potential to be a

'green' herbicide with wide applicability in agriculture. Unfortunately, low production in the native species created an economic barrier to commercialization," Loria said. "Ding's research has demonstrated that thaxtomin production can be increased by optimizing the biosynthetic pathway in another non-native strain."

The phytotoxin is found in nature in the form of potato scabs, a common disease that forms circular lesions on a potato's surface. The disease causes a 4 percent loss in the potato industry's value. It's potato farmers' bane, but it's key to producing environmentally friendly weed killer for rice, wheat and cotton farmers.

The thaxtomins found in potato scabs are produced by a pathogenic, or disease-causing, strain of Streptomyces. In the lab, this strain does not produce a sufficient amount of thaxtomins to be cost-effective.

Ding successfully transferred the cluster of genes responsible for biosynthesis of thaxtomins into a

nonpathogenic-Streptomyces strain, which allows greater control over production as well as a greater yield. Ding's lab has succeeded in producing 20 times the amount of thaxtomins than the previous model: .2 grams per liter of Streptomyces culture versus .01 grams per liter.

Synthetic herbicides affect more than just weeds. Irrigation can send the chemicals downstream, where they are toxic to aquatic plant and animal life. They also can get into the body and affect human development.

"Through this study, we really wanted to produce a cost-effective, environmentally friendly herbicide that can be used not only by organic farmers, but that everyone can use," Ding said.

Thaxtomins as a bioherbicide are preferable over synthetic chemicals because they're highly potent in small amounts and nature already has a way of disposing them, Ding said.

UF researchers are in the process of licensing the new production method so it can be used commercially.



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

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SCOTUS Interruptus

Another Supreme Court Justice, slightly right-of-center swing vote Anthony Kennedy, has decided to retire. In a contentious and closely watched Supreme Court vote, the justices decided 5 to 4 to get him an ice cream cake for his retirement party.

PACE — County crews broke ground on a construction project to improve Floridatown Park this week. Located at 3900 Floridatown Road in Pace, the park's upgrades will include a playground compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act for children ages two through 12, a walking trail, two basketball half courts, renovations to the existing restroom, pier repairs, historical signage and ADA-accessible upgrades.

The project's estimated cost is \$200,000, funded with a combination of local option sales tax, Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program grant funds and District 1 recreation

funds.

"We are excited to offer a renovated, ADA-compliant recreational facility for our residents and their families to enjoy this beautiful waterfront park," District 1 Commissioner Sam Parker said. As Floridatown Park is a historically significant park, all improvements are being monitored by a professional archeologist. The anticipated project completion date is spring 2019. The park will remain open during improvements. However, certain areas may be inaccessible during construction.

Information on judicial candidates available on Florida bar's website

TALLAHASSEE — Want to know more about the local judicial candidates who will appear on the ballot in August? Wondering what Florida's lawyers think about the appeals court judges facing a merit retention vote?

Online and in print, The Florida Bar provides information as part of its initiative to educate Florida's voters about judicial elections.

Detailed information on more than 100 county and circuit court judicial candidates is available now on The Florida Bar's website. The opportunity to submit a judicial candidate voluntary self-disclosure statement was offered to all candidates for contested county and circuit seats. The 10-page statements give voters basic biographical information, legal experience and community work as well as a short essay on why candidates feel they would be good judges. Completed statements are available at www.floridabar.org/judicialcandidates.

The Bar also has printed 100,000 copies of the "Guide for Florida Voters," which is available at supervisor of elections offices throughout the state and at many public libraries. It also is available to civic groups upon request. Email votersguide@floridabar.org.

The Bar's "The Vote's in Your Court" web page at www.floridabar.org/thevotesinyourcourt is a go-to source for information on judicial merit retention. There, voters will find the "Guide for Florida Voters," soon to be posted in Spanish as well, which answers many questions voters might have about merit retention. There also are links to the Code of Judicial Conduct and biographies of the appeals court judges and one Supreme Court justice up for merit retention votes. A merit retention poll of Bar members will be completed in early September.

Election dates this year are Aug. 28 and Nov. 6. All county and circuit judicial races appear on the primary ballot, with runoffs in November. The merit retention vote is in November.

Newly renovated, all-inclusive Optimist Park to reopen

MILTON — Optimist Park is Santa Rosa County's most recent recreation area to receive an all-inclusive renovation. The playground now features a "lumber mill town" theme with equipment that's Americans with Disabilities Act-friendly depicting elements of the area's history of river and rail transportation.

The 17.8-acre park, located off Old Bagdad Highway at the corner of Parkmore Plaza in Milton, reopens with a public ribbon-cutting ceremony at 4 p.m. July 16.

New pour-in-place rubberized surfacing makes the play area accessible for those of all abilities. ADA-friendly play structures are designed for two age groups: two through five and five through 12. Two shade structures and four benches offer a comfortable area for rest. An ADA-compliant sidewalk system


provides interconnectivity throughout the facility, which also features two baseball fields, a pavilion and a dog park.

"We are excited to open another new all-accessible facility for our citizens and their families," Santa Rosa County Commission Chairman Bob Cole said. "We invite

the public to join us in the ribbon-cutting celebration on Monday to see this beautiful new park for themselves."

The project cost of \$300,000 was funded through the local option sales tax and District 2 recreational dollars.

County crews completed the demolition and construction projects while contractors installed equipment and paved the parking lot. ADA upgrades to the walking track and restroom improvements are on schedule for future enhancements.

in the \$80,000 range," he said. Pinto said he hoped every student left with a better understanding of cybersecurity and a greater interest in the field.

According to Tom St. Meyer, UWF's Center for Cybersecurity communications director, the college hosted the only GenCyber camp in the state and the Santa Rosa County students were a

big part of the camp. Three students from Gulf Breeze High School: sophomore Kenah Williams, freshman Caleb Tamberella, and senior Katie Schneider said they enjoyed the camp more than they thought they would. "It's very eye-opening," Scheider said. "There's a lot more to it than you would think."

"It requires you to think outside the box," Tamberella said of the cryptography challenge. "They give you a lot of [false clues] to throw you off and you have to have a lot of knowledge on

computers. It was pretty fun." Williams, who attended the event last year, said she enjoyed the camp more than she did before and is considering pursuing cybersecurity as a career. "I am not sure what exactly I would do if I did," Williams said. "I'm still debating between this and another career field." This camp, which ran from July 9-13 was the second of the summer. The first took place in June. In addition to students attending, select teachers from the counties learned ways to teach cybersecurity.

started, to \$75,000," Commissioner Bob Cole said. "It's going to go a long way to helping elevate some of the silt that we're getting in our estuaries.

Public Works Director

Stephen Furman said there is a timeframe to complete the paving of the roads that the county will work toward.

"I believe it is 12 months from when it's all signed and sealed," Furman said. "We are hoping to do it before the end of this summer."

The Avalon Beach area along Indian Bayou and

Escambia Bay contains several miles of dirt roads, including these streets, that are county-maintained.

According to a report from Northwest Florida Water Management District, starting in 2016 increased sedimentation into the bayou was reported. The District reported unpaved roads were a contributing factor.

Division of Elections announces vote-by-mail ballot deadlines for primary election

TALLAHASSEE — The Division of Elections announces the following vote-by-mail ballot deadlines for Florida's upcoming Primary Election to be held on Aug. 28:

- For absent stateside and overseas uniformed service members and overseas civilians (also known as UOCAVA voters), the deadline for Supervisors of Elections to mail ballots for requests already made is Saturday, July 14, 2018.

- For all non-UOCAVA voters, the initial window for Supervisors of Elections to mail ballots is from July 24 to July 31, 2018.

- A request for a vote-by-mail ballot to be mailed to any

voter must be received by the Supervisor of Elections before 5 p.m. on Wednesday, August 22, 2018.

- The last day for Supervisors of Elections to mail vote-by-mail ballots requested for the Primary Election received after the initial deadlines listed above is August 24, 2018.

"Vote-by-Mail offers Florida voters the convenience of voting from the comfort of their home," said Secretary of State Ken Detzner. "Voters also have the option of early voting and voting on election day at the polls. I encourage Florida voters to select the method of voting in the Primary Election that best works for them."

Voters who would like to request a vote-by-mail ballot

should contact their county Supervisor of Elections office. The United States Postal Service encourages voters to mail back their voted ballots early to ensure timely receipt by Election Day. A voter may pick up a vote-by-mail ballot from the office of their Supervisor of Elections up to the day before the election or, if an emergency exists, on the day of the election.

and county reach an agreement. "The good thing about being on a 320-hour clock program is we don't have to start it on a specific date when all the other students start," Meadows said. "We can start it at any time during the semester that we are ready to go."

Commissioner Don Salter asked Meadows how long PSC would like to lease the property. Meadows said he has not spoken with the college's attorney yet but would like a 5-year lease at least with an option for renewal. Commissioner Bob Cole said he was excited for the prospect of this agreement and thanked Meadows for adding the incentive of the slots for county students. "I think it would be great, to be an incentive to our employees

as we bring them on board, as we see the need for a CDL," Cole said. "To me, that adds a lot to the value of this program." One county resident, Jerry Couey, spoke against the proposal, citing the fear that since taxpayers' money offsets the cost of the industrial park, the college's use of it would not help them recoup their money as the college is a government—not industrial—entity. An industrial entity would allow for taxpayers to see a return on the investment, he said. "This property is also a certified industrial park which we [the taxpayers] paid extra money for," Couey said. "As a taxpayer who had to chip in to pay for that, I think we should be looking for opportunities for future taxpaying residents of this industrial park." Couey said he would like to see industry move into the park that would pay taxes and eventually allow Santa Rosa County citizens to get their money back.

6 ways to improve your bathroom layout

Is your bathroom just not working for you? Do you want more storage, more space, more convenience? If so, you may be scratching your head over how to improve your bathroom layout fast and easily. But there is no single winning formula — or legally required prototype — for bathroom layout. Just two principles apply: 1) you must follow local building code, and 2) you'll save money if you don't change the placement of plumbing fixtures (usually hooked up to your water pipe's on a single "wet wall").

That being said, here are six simple suggestions to improve your bathroom layout, without the hassle and the expense of moving your plumbing.

- 1. Replace the existing bathroom door.** Install a pocket door or bifold in its place. Because your new bathroom layout will not have to allow for the inward swing of a conventional door, you'll be gaining up to 9 square feet of usable space. Not too shabby for a room that averages only about 90 sq. ft. in total.

- 2. Resize your vanity.** Unlike plumbing fixtures, which come

in a range of standard measurements, there's almost no limit to vanity size. Whether your goal is to go smaller and save space or to add a larger counter and create more storage, replacing a vanity with a model that fits your needs is an easy tweak that will make a big difference.

- 3. Float your fixtures.** A wall-mounted toilet, pedestal sink, or floating vanity will save you big time on floor space ... perfect for making the most of a tiny (or any) bathroom layout. **BONUS:** your floor tiles will be a lot easier to keep clean. A corner-mounted pedestal sink or a deep, narrow trough sink may be the best space-saver of them all.

- 4. Divide the space.** Make your basic bathroom layout so much more functional and streamline the morning rush. Install a partition to separate your sink from the toilet and/or shower area. That way, someone can comfortably brush teeth, shave, etc., while the toilet or shower is in use.

- 5. Switch the tub for a shower.** A shower stall requires about 40 percent less floor space than a bathtub does, adding approximately 6 sq. ft. to your updated bathroom layout. **NOTE:** Real estate experts advise, however, keeping the tub in at least one of your home's bathrooms for resale value.

- 6. Keep the tub AND add a luxurious accessible shower.** A thoroughly modern upgrade for a largish bathroom is installing a large curbless enclosure that includes open floor space for showering plus a tub. You will not have to change the location of your plumbing to achieve this.

Bathroom layout tips

- Add as much storage as you possibly can. Clever storage solutions will optimize your bathroom layout. In addition to these bathroom storage ideas, try dividing that enormous mirror with a narrow wall-mounted cabinet or build in niches for shampoo, conditioner, shaving cream, and so on if you have your shower retiled.

- Make sure you have enough space for changing clothes (and hanging them up while you bathe or shower).

- Change to cabinetry with rounded edges if you're renovating. The lack of sharp corners will improve the traffic flow and make your bathroom safer for the whole household — from toddlers to seniors.

- If you do decide to go ahead and hire a plumber to move fixtures around, keep one fact in mind: The most expensive item to relocate is your toilet, because this fixture needs a connection not only to the water supply but also to the waste pipe.

DEAR MONTY

Buy an existing home vs. build from scratch

Reader question: We bought a lot several years ago to build a home, and we are now ready to go forward. I have gathered some general information, but we'd like to have more of a general idea before we decide between building on our lot and just buying in a subdivision somewhere. Where can I find information and advice on the building process?

Monty's answer: There are significant differences between your choices. You will find people that

swear by both methods, but the fundamental decision has much to do with your circumstances and how you plan and make decisions. If two people have agreed on a budget and have similar philosophies and taste, building the house will likely move quickly. If consensus is difficult or indecisive, the process can slow down and become more expensive with time and change orders.

Change orders are written amendments to the building contract that usually creates additional cost. Some homebuyers would love to build from scratch, but their careers or the timing prevent them from making that decision. Others have busy schedules but still will take on the build from scratch method and find a way to make it work. Many people

who have contracted with a builder believe it is not a complicated process. Your choice of a builder can make a difference.

Significant steps in the home-building process

The home site — setting grade elevations, excavating for utilities and footings for the foundation and basement walls.

Construct the shell — assemble the floor deck, frame the exterior and interior walls, install roof trusses and plywood sheeting.

Rough-in mechanical components — plumbing, electrical, plus heating, ventilating, air conditioning ducts and cable or sound system wiring.

Install insulation — deck sill, exterior walls, ceilings, garage and other sections, such as basement walls, interior rooms, etcetera.

Install sheetrock — finish interior walls with dry wall or plaster textures. Paint or paper walls, install windows and apply exterior finishes.

Install cabinetry and interior trim — install exterior driveways, steps, and walkways.

Install hard-surface flooring — wood, ceramic, and vinyl, plus countertops, and slope the soil grade away.

Finish mechanical work — electric breaker box, furnace, air conditioning and condenser and registers, sinks, toilets and faucets, and light fixtures, outlets and switches are all installed or completed.

Install shower doors, mirrors, and finish flooring (carpeting), and finish exterior landscaping like grass or sod, trees, and shrubs.

Walk-through with the builder — the tour results in the creation of a "punch list" where you observe nicks, scratches, chips and other minor issues.

ASK THE DOCTORS

ADVICE ON RFID-BLOCKING PRODUCTS AND NOISE-CANCELING HEADPHONES

Hello, dear readers!

We're on the cusp of summer and that means it's our duty as doctors (and mothers) to remind you to please protect yourselves and your family against the sun as you spend more time outdoors, and against the ticks and mosquitos the season always brings. We've written about this before, but if you have any new questions or need clarifications, please drop us a line.

A column in which we addressed the topic of hackers interfering with the proper workings of wireless medical devices, such as pacemakers, got a lot of response. Many readers found it extremely unsettling, and honestly, we're right there with you. The good news, as we said in the column, is that despite how easy television dramas and films make this type of hacking appear, it's actually quite difficult. But if you're worried enough to want to take preventative measures, a letter from a physician in Spokane, Washington, offers an interesting option. His inspiration comes from the range of RFID-blocking products now available to fend off electronic snoops and pickpockets. In this case, the answer is a special vest.

"The vest is lined with metallic mesh to block potential 'pinging' and the theft of personal information," he wrote of a garment he saw in a travel store. "It occurs to me that these would also block 'Bluetooth' and other RF signals being used to hack an internal medical device. It would be simple for a cardiologist to verify this. Simply obtain a vest, have it in the office and when patients come in for modification of settings on an implanted defibrillator or pacemaker, have them wear the vest first, and see if it blocks the modification."

In response to a column about how noise pollution adversely affects health, a reader from Oklahoma asked us to recommend a set of noise-canceling headphones. Because everyone's needs are so different, we suggest scanning the selections from online retailers, like Best Buy, Amazon, Costco and the like. What we find to be helpful about shopping online for items like these are the many reviews posted by fellow shoppers. They can give you a good sense of what each product can (and can't) do, and often answer detailed questions from fellow shoppers, all of which can help you to find the right device for your specific needs.

We'll wrap up with a question stemming from our column about the measles vaccine. A couple who are headed to Paris this fall (lucky you!) ask whether they should get vaccinated for measles. Because you indicate that you both had measles as children, the answer is no. According to guidelines set by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, you are considered to be protected from measles if you have either already had the disease or have already received the appropriate doses of the vaccine. Boosters of the measles vaccine are not needed. If you're not sure whether you're protected, you can find out with a simple blood test.



TIMING IS EVERYTHING

Throughout history, humans have used different ways to navigate while traveling. Long ago, navigators used the sun, moon and stars. Later, the astrolabe, sextant and compass helped travelers better determine their location. Today, we are able to very accurately determine our position anywhere on the planet using a network of satellites known as the Global Positioning System (GPS).

Each GPS satellite continuously transmits a unique signal that indicates the satellite's location and the exact time the signal is sent.

Each GPS satellite contains several atomic clocks in order to keep the extremely precise time measurements needed for the system to work.
