# FDOT: Avalon Blvd complete early '19

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MILTON — Drivers have long awaited the completion of the roadwork to Avalon Boulevard and Interstate-10. The project began in June 2015.

The purpose of this project is to widen the travel lanes on Interstate 10 from four to six lanes, according to Florida Department of Transportation spokesperson Tanya Branton.

**THE QUESTION**

"I do not want to appear to be nuisance, but I would simply appreciate any efforts you may be able take to expedite the subject project (41306235201).

The website still is showing a completion date of Fall, 2018, which clearly is not the case. I made three round trips over this section of construction yesterday and I did not observe a single worker.

As I have indicated

earlier, this project negatively impacts thousands of travelers daily. Please provide an updated and realistic completion date. Thank you for your consideration." — John Wiley, Milton

**THE ANSWER**

Branton said in an email that beginning Sept. 16, crews will shift northbound traffic on Avalon Boulevard at I-10 and begin constructing new median traffic separators,

anticipated to be complete the first part of October. Branton said once this is complete, traffic will be placed into its final configuration.

"To help decrease traffic congestion and minimize delays, the majority of work on the project takes place at night between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.," Branton said.

Branton said the project was granted additional time due to weather impacts, holidays, and added work items needed.

"At this time, contract time

will expire in the fall," Branton said. "However, the Department is looking at an early 2019 completion."

She said that if the contractor, Prince Contracting, LLC, does not complete the work within the scheduled contract time frame, the state has the right to collect liquidated damages for each calendar day until the work is completed. She said the FDOT continues to encourage the contractor to make best use of time and resources.

**\$38,500 comes to Jay in two state grants**

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JAY — The town of Jay will receive two grants from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity. Those are a \$16,000 Community Planning Technical Assistance grant for the town's water infrastructure system as well as a \$22,500 Competitive Florida Partnership grant.

According to FDEO Director of Community Development Julie Dennis, the department received 115 requests for assistance totaling close to \$4 million.

With the grant for the infrastructure, Governor Rick Scott said that this will provide future job opportunities for the town.

"Providing resources to support job creation in our rural communities plays a vital role in our state's continued growth," he said.

Eric Seid, Jay operations manager, said the town was excited to work with the DEO's Competitive Florida Partnership team.

"The DEO team will assist the town leadership and current business owners, working as a team, to present economic development ideas that will create additional jobs in our small town," Seid said in an email. "We are humbled to be selected by the state and anxious to tap into their expertise to plan for future growth." Municipalities in addition to Jay awarded with grants included Apalachicola, Chattachoochee, Citrus County, Cocoa, DeFuniak Springs, Indian River County, Suwannee County, Taylor County, Volusia County and Washington County.

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MILTON — Pace resident Lewis Loveless has had difficulty getting a fire hydrant fixed near his home. Loveless said it took almost a year and a half to resolve the issue because Pace Water System and Pace Fire and Rescue each said the other was responsible for fixing the hydrants.

The discussion at the Sept. 10 commission meeting continued to how many hydrants did not work, why and who was responsible for repairs.

According to Brad Baker, emergency management director for the county, the water purveyor for that area is responsible for addition of new lines, maintenance and repair. Baker said there

are 15 water purveyors in the county. The only area Santa Rosa County is responsible for is Navarre Beach.

Pace Fire and Rescue Chief Robbie Whitfield agreed with Baker. Both said they have personnel that regularly inspect and do minor maintenance on hydrants but anything major goes to the water purveyor.

Mark Murray, assistant county administrator, worked with GIS and Emergency Management to identify how many hydrants were out. Murray said the county has 6,276 fire hydrants. As of Sept. 13, 28 were out of service, a less than 0.45 percent out of service rate.

It was decided that the water purveyor was

# Area farmers, ranchers honored

JAY — Three Santa Rosa-based farmers and ranchers were honored for their environmental stewardship with a County Alliance for Responsible Environmental Stewardship (CARES) award on Sept. 6 at the Jay Civic Center.

Recipients honored were Alan Edwards of Alan Edwards Farms, Tyler Brown of Brown Farms and Trent Mathews of Sweet Season Farms.

Edwards is a fifth-generation farmer who farms cotton, soybeans, peanuts, wheat, hay and raises beef cattle. Brown is a first-generation cotton and peanut farmer. Mathews raises cattle and grows row crops and owns an agri-tourism operation, Sweet Season Farms.

The CARES program was established by Florida Farm Bureau and the Suwannee River Partnership in 2001 to recognize superior natural resource conservation by agricultural producers. The program relies on action by farmers and ranchers to implement state-of-the-art natural resource management systems, or best management practices, on their properties.

"Florida's farmers and ranchers answer the call to protect our environment while also producing our food supply," said Florida Farm Bureau CARES Coordinator Cacee Hilliard. "Demonstrating outstanding efforts to implement practices that reduce water


# Pyrates learn boating safety

## Nationwide alert test coming

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), will conduct a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) Sept. 20.

The WEA portion of the test commences at 1:18 p.m. and the EAS portion follows at 1:20 p.m. The test will assess the operational readiness of the infrastructure for distribution of a national message and determine whether technological improvements are needed. This is the first national WEA test message sent to WEA-compatible cell phones and the fourth EAS nationwide test sent via broadcast media.

The WEA test will be sent through IPAWS at 1:18 p.m. Cell towers will broadcast the WEA test for approximately 30 minutes. During this time, cell phones that are switched on and within range of an active cell tower should be capable of receiving the test message. FEMA will send one WEA message to mobile devices and because the WEA message is a presidential alert, users will not be able to opt out of receiving the message, even if they have deactivated alert notifications in their mobile devices. The WEA message will display on mobile devices as a presidential alert and

will read:

"This is a test of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed."

- The WEA system is used to warn the public about dangerous weather, missing children, and other critical situations through alerts on cell phones. It allows customers whose wireless provider participates in WEA and who own a WEA compatible wireless phone to receive geo-targeted alerts of imminent threats to safety in their area through unique tones and vibration.

- WEAs can be sent by state and local public safety officials, the National Weather Service, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, and the president of the United States.

- WEAs can be issued for three alert categories — imminent threat, AMBER, and presidential.

- WEAs look like text messages, but are designed to get your attention and alert you with a unique sound and vibration, both repeated twice.

- WEAs are no more than 90 characters, and will include the type and time of the alert, any action you should take, as well as the agency issuing the alert.

- WEAs are not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts, calls or data sessions that are in progress.

- Mobile users are not charged for receiving WEAs and there is no need to subscribe.

The EAS test at 1:20 p.m. is scheduled to last approximately one minute and is made available to EAS participants including radio and television broadcasters, cable systems, satellite radio and television providers, and wireline video providers. The test message will be similar to regular monthly EAS test messages with which the public is familiar:

"This is a test of the National Emergency Alert System. This system was developed by broadcast and cable operators in voluntary cooperation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the Federal Communications Commission, and local authorities to keep you informed in the event of an emergency. If this had been an actual emergency an official message would have followed the tone alert you heard at the start of this message. A similar wireless emergency alert test message has been sent to all cell phones nationwide. Some cell phones will receive the message; others will not. No action is required."

Receiving preparedness tips and timely information about weather conditions or other emergency events can make all the difference in knowing when to take action to be safe. 

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## Learning through repetition

**I**t's always helpful to learn lessons from hurricanes that might be useful to those of us who are threatened by them six months of every year. Unfortunately, some of the lessons many will learn the hard way from Hurricane Florence are repeats from past storms. Here are two of them:

1. Only 3 percent of North Carolina homeowners have flood insurance.

The figure is 9 percent in South Carolina and 2 percent in Georgia. I haven't seen the figures for some of the other states. Florence threatens to inundate, but I would be surprised if they are much higher.

I wrote about these figures in July because the next time a hurricane hits Terrebonne and Lafourche parishes here in Louisiana, the residents here will find themselves in the same predicament that is about to play out along the East Coast.

Thousands of homeowners in Florence's path are going to face the brutal reality that their homes — for many, their greatest investment — have been destroyed and that they will get little or no

financial help to rebuild. Homeowners' insurance does not pay for flood damage. The National Flood Insurance Program is the only institution that does that — but only for people who buy policies.

Americans are about to hear the tearful pleas of Florence victims who lack the financial means to rebuild their lives. The trauma will play out in Congress, where lawmakers from flood-stricken communities will work to introduce taxpayer-financed bailout packages, but those that manage to pass won't come close to making people whole.

The same misery resulted after the 2016 floods that inundated much of Louisiana, causing an estimated \$10 billion to \$15 billion in property damage. The most money each uninsured homeowner could expect from federal aid was \$33,000, while the average payout was closer to \$10,000.

And, unless something changes drastically, the same sad scenario will occur here the next time a major storm hits. In Terrebonne and Lafourche, only about 30 percent of homeowners have flood insurance. Maybe they will listen and learn from unfortunate Florence victims who will reflect on their losses and, in many cases, question how it could happen in place that never flooded before.

2. The U.S. flood insurance program remains broken.

More than 400,000

homeowners in the Carolinas, Georgia and Virginia have flood insurance, with \$106 billion in combined coverage. R.J. Lehmann, a flood insurance specialist with the R Street Institute, a Washington-based think tank, told the McClatchy news agency that if 10 percent of those homeowners suffer flood damage, the program could face at least \$10 billion in claims.

Anybody who has followed this issue knows Congress has delayed reforms for years, and one of the results is that the National Flood Insurance Program is more than \$25 billion in debt. Lawmakers tried in 2012 with the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act, which sought to align policies' cost with the actual risk of flooding. Congress scuttled the law, however, after some homeowners in south Louisiana and other flood-prone areas saw costs rise from a few hundred dollars a year to \$20,000 or more.

The House passed a measure in November that includes some reforms, though Louisiana lawmakers expressed concerns about potential price increases.

# Blackwater River State Forest expands by 800 acres

TALLAHASSEE — Thanks to funding from the U.S. Forest Service and the U.S. Navy, Commissioner of Agriculture Adam H. Putnam announced Sept. 14 that the Blackwater River State Forest will expand by 800 acres due to the acquisition of the Florida Forever Project Area Wolfe Creek Forest. The Florida Forest Service partnered with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Santa Rosa County, the Naval Air Station Whiting Field and the Trust for Public Land to secure the acquisition through the Forest Legacy Program.

"Florida's state forests are vital ecological and economic resources for our state, and we must continue to prioritize the protection of Florida's unique natural spaces," said Commissioner of Agriculture Adam H. Putnam. "This addition to Blackwater River State Forest will enhance natural resources and provide more recreational activities for Floridians."

The land acquisition is home to a number of rare and endangered species and serves as a major wildlife corridor with frontage on Big Coldwater Creek. The land will also act as a buffer for the Naval Air Station Whiting Field, the busiest aviation complex in the world, and is crucial for protecting military training missions.

The Florida Forest Service will manage the tract as part of the Blackwater River State Forest, Florida's largest State Forest with over 211,000 acres, by applying sound forest management practices.

"This land acquisition adds invaluable natural resources and recreational opportunities to Florida's robust state

forest system, covering more than 1 million acres," said Florida Forest Service Director Jim Karels. "I thank Santa Rosa County Commissioner Don Salter and our other partners for their support to enhance Florida's green spaces and military safety."

The U.S. Forest Service's Forest Legacy Program, administered by the Florida Forest Service on the state level, encourages the conservation and protection of privately owned forest lands. Since 1990, the Florida Legacy Program has protected over 2.6 million acres of forest land throughout the United States.



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
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

**DAUGHTER HEADING TO HIGH SCHOOL MUST BE CAUTIOUS**

**DEAR HARRIETTE:** I am worried about my daughter. She is headed to high school – a large school compared to the one she attended for the last eight years. She has largely been sheltered, even though we do talk about what goes on in the world and how she should take care of herself.

My daughter just told me that a friend of hers from camp was at a party hosted by a close friend of my daughter's, and she was given a spiked drink. She had asked for seltzer and thought that's what she was given (it was a clear drink). She didn't identify a strange taste, but she ended up being rushed to the hospital and having her stomach pumped. She had consumed something that made her sick. I often tell my daughter not to take drinks from strange people, but this happened at her good friend's home. Can you provide better precautions that I can suggest to my daughter? I know I have to let her become a bit independent, but I want to keep her safe.

— No Alcohol Zone, Jackson, Mississippi

**DEAR NO ALCOHOL ZONE:** As a parent, you must remember that every challenging moment can become a teaching moment. Sadly, your daughter's friend's experience presents as one of those moments. What I teach my 14-year-old daughter is that when she is at a party – even when it's at a friend's home -- she should not drink anything that she did not pour. She should open her own cans. When she puts a drink down on a counter and walks away, that drink is no longer hers. Vigilance is required for safety now, even among friends.

You should also tell your daughter that it is not worth it to experiment with alcohol – or drugs. Too many of her peers have been harmed as a result of what started as an innocent exploration.

**DEAR HARRIETTE:** I have a new colleague who started off being friendly but has ended up being overbearing. She lives in my neighborhood, so before I figured out that she was too much for me to manage as a friend, I took exercise walks with her. We sometimes went to the gym together. We talk on the phone, and it's always interesting, but she is pretty negative. She dreams about projects she wants to pursue, but right after discussing that, she complains about everything else in her life. I am a peaceful person and realize that I don't want to hear all of the complaints, especially first thing in the morning. I don't want to cut her out of my life altogether, but I do need to limit our interaction. How can I do that without hurting her feelings? — Limited Engagement, Boston

**DEAR LIMITED ENGAGEMENT:** Without feeling guilty, you can curb your morning fitness routines with this woman. Just tell her that now that fall has arrived, you want to go back to your core routine, which is solo and contemplative, so you want to go alone.

Choose specific time periods that work for you to spend time with this woman. This doesn't have to be weekly. It can be as you feel comfortable. You can also stop her when she starts going down a negative path. You can literally ask her to refrain from going to that dark place. Tell her you enjoy her company, but when she goes negative, it makes you uncomfortable.

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





Since then, at different times, large groups of people have come to North America from Europe, Asia, Africa, and Central and South America.

In fact, even if you and your parents were born in the United States, your family may be able to trace its roots to another country.

### Why immigrate?

Immigrants have come to the United States for many reasons. Some were looking for land to farm or better jobs. Others wanted to freely practice their religion, or they were unhappy with the government in their homeland.

Today, immigrants may be trying to escape harsh governments or military organizations in their home countries. In some parts of the world, people are persecuted, or treated in a harmful way, because of their religion or race.

### Immigration's effects

Immigration adds a lot to the culture of a nation. People from other countries bring new ideas, customs, foods and languages to our communities.

But immigration also puts pressure on a country. Sometimes it's difficult for people of different backgrounds to get along. Added people can strain a nation's resources, such as energy, water and food supplies, housing, jobs, health care and education.


