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United Way reports possible irregularities

MILTON — The United Way of Santa Rosa County has placed Executive Director Guy Thompson and two other employees on paid administrative leave following the discovery of possible "accounting irregularities."

The agency sent out a press release late Wednesday afternoon stating the agency had recently received information

about the irregularities. In response, the board of directors retained an independent auditor to review financial records as well as policies and procedures, the release said.

Thompson and the two other employees were placed

on paid administrative leave pending the investigation and review.

No details were provided about the irregularities or the time period under scrutiny. But according to the IRS Form 990 filed for 2016 by the United Way of Santa Rosa County — available through the GuideStar non-profit reporting service at www.guidestar.org — the agency reported \$299,182

in contributions, grants and other revenue for that calendar year against \$486,390 in total expenses.

Among those expenses, according to the Form 990, were \$199,188 in salaries, other compensation and employee benefits; \$165,939 in "other expenses;" and \$121,263 in "grants and similar amounts paid."

Overall, the United Way of

Santa Rosa County finished the 2016 calendar year with total assets of slightly more than \$1.85 million and total liabilities of a little more than \$1.4 million, according to the 2016 Form 990.

The Santa Rosa County branch of the United Way is operated separately from other area United Way agencies, including the United Way of Okaloosa and Walton Counties.

Animal advocacy is alive and well in Santa Rosa County

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MILTON — Santa Rosa County has multiple animal advocacy groups trying to better the welfare of animals in the county. Three people in the county working towards the common goal of making things better for pets and animals. One is a career county employee, one a driven and dedicated champion of stray animals and one is a 12-year-old sixth grader from King Middle School.

Brad Baker, director of public safety, has oversight of the county's animal services department. Baker identified changes that would improve animal services and set about enacting them. He met with animal advocacy groups on Sept. 6, to find out which issues were most important to them.

"The biggest concern was breed discrimination," Baker said. The animal services department had a policy of not adopting dogs labeled as dangerous or aggressive breeds such as chows, pit-bulls and rottweilers. These breeds, per policy would be euthanized without ever being considered for adoption. The public never saw these dogs. An internal policy, Baker was able to change it.

In addition, Baker and county staff are going to review animal ordinances and go about the process of changing them if it helps the animals.

The change requires animal control personnel to base the adopt-ability of a dog on the animal's temperament and history. If a surrendered pit bull has a bite history, it will not be adopted regardless of the lifting of breed discrimination.

"We need to adopt more pets," Baker said. "We have to fix things here."

One way to speed adoptions is to hire a part-time veterinarian that can provide health checkups on intake animals and give shots as required, according to Baker. He's seeking one now and will present his results at the Oct. 8 commission meeting.

Baker also wants to create a volunteer and foster program. Once in place, the animal would get a physical then sent to a foster care home for the required 5-day waiting period before adoption. Baker said that would reduce the stress on the animal and free up space in the shelter.

Then there is the partnership Baker wants to develop with shelters across the country. Some areas of the country need animals for adoption.

School district adopts new safety procedures

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MILTON — Schools in Santa Rosa County have new policies in place for extracurricular activities.

A statement from the school district says the aim to make experiences at extracurricular events as safe and enjoyable as possible.

The district has enacted the following rules for all extracurricular events:

- Bags will not be permitted except for diaper bags, medically necessary bags, and any bag that is 12-by-6-by-12 or smaller. Bags meeting this criteria will be searched prior to entry.
- No loitering or standing along fences, parking lots, or any other places on school grounds will be allowed.
- No outside food or drinks, skateboards, pets, vape or tobacco products, sports balls, or weapons are

allowed either.

• No ticket sales will happen after 3rd quarter (for sporting events with quarters)

Attendees will not be able to reenter either.

Daniel Hahn, director for school safety for the county, said this will be a good thing for the county.

"We are implementing a standardized procedure which schools were already beginning on their own," Hahn said. "This procedure is designed after the same one as Florida State University and Pensacola Bay Center."

The district said to provide needed safety, each school can add security measures as needed and parents should contact their children's principals for more information.

"I am not a member of one side or the other," she said. "I am a listener and a team-builder. I want to bridge the gap and bring our community together."

Rice said her desire is to do the best for Milton and she believes she is qualified to be on the city council.

We retained old customs

When I was growing up, my mother and Mama, fraternal grandmother, and her sister Aunt Lizzie, who lived next door to us, all of whom had a profound influence on my life, prepared a hearty breakfast each day.

My dad never went to work, no matter how early, nor did we children go to school without having eaten one of those breakfasts. Breakfast included, each day, a pan of freshly baked biscuits and, in the summers, freshly sliced, homegrown tomatoes.

Many years later I learned that the practice of having tomatoes at breakfast was a custom still observed in much of England, especially in the rural areas. I also learned another custom observed by Mama and Aunt Lizzie that was still practiced by the bed-and-breakfast landlady in Cambridge, England, where I lived one summer. That custom brought back precious memories to me. It was that each new week, a clean, cloth napkin was placed at the table setting, and it had pinned to it a small tag with the person's name on it. The person used the same napkin all week. To my delight, the landlady always served tomatoes at breakfast as well as lots of other good food, but never grits.

The landlady had a washing machine, but Mama and Aunt Lizzie did not as they didn't even have running water. They did the "washing" weekly, hence the use of the same napkin for a week.

As I grew older, I also learned that many of the ditties my mama sang to me were old Scottish and English ballads. Some of the words we used also were derived from those traditions. I have often wondered if, because West Florida, for so many years, was somewhat isolated, and remained rural that we retained many of the very old traditions. Living even more isolated, near Yellow River, especially my dad's family had retained so many "backwoods-isms."

In fact, when my youngest son went away to college, he called me once to ask why we said we changed our "bed-clothes," rather than bed linens. His "roomies" had questioned him about that. At that time I had not considered that was an outdated, or mostly unknown, expression. That incident caused me to start reflecting on how our speech really may sound to others. Then, also in Cambridge, I learned that the landlady, indeed, used that same expression.

With all that might have been considered somewhat "backwards," I am so thankful to have had the wonderful, rich experiences with and times spent with Mother, Daddy, Mama and Aunt Lizzie, especially with their sometimes peculiar ways and speech and their wonderful breakfasts.

Doris Melvin Kingry, retired English and Journalism teacher, was first woman elected to public office in Santa Rosa County where she served eight years. She is a native Santa Rosan, living where her family has lived for several generations.



Public servants and the public good

General George C. Marshall is what people used to call a dedicated public servant. As Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army, he did essential work to get a dangerously unprepared America at least partially ready for World War II, and then led the mammoth organizational effort required for victory.

Later, he served as Secretary of State and Secretary of Defense during the trying post-war years, as the Cold War began. The Marshall Plan, the comprehensive aid and reconstruction program for Europe, began implementation in 1948 — 70 years ago. That year governments created the Organization for European Economic Cooperation to distribute aid, succeeded in 1960 by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, a global organization.

Marshall wanted to lead the Allied invasion of Europe at Normandy, but that mission went to protégé Dwight Eisenhower. President Franklin Roosevelt considered Marshall indispensable, and said he could not sleep at night if the general were not in Washington.

Along with remarkable executive ability, Marshall had great diplomatic and political skill. Soon after the attack on Pearl

Harbor, Japanese land forces trapped U.S. troops in the Philippines under the command of General Douglas MacArthur. President Roosevelt was emphatic that MacArthur should not become a Japanese prisoner of war, and ordered an evacuation to Australia.

Despite personal dislike and mistrust of MacArthur, a view widely shared, Marshall followed up thoroughly to ensure MacArthur's escape, that media and public knew this was not MacArthur's decision, and the government of Australia welcomed him. Marshall also decided MacArthur should receive the Medal of Honor.

We do not discuss Marshall much today. He put little personal information in the public record, and never wrote memoirs. He feared inadvertently revealing details best kept private.

Also — incredibly from a contemporary perspective — he felt strongly that patriotic citizens should not benefit financially from government office. For him, public service was literally just that. Fortunately, Forrest Pogue authored a masterful comprehensive biography of this great leader.

Another such public servant is Charles Bowers, who 10 years ago this month, visited Carthage College in Wisconsin. For 16 years starting in 1981, he was Comptroller General of the United States, a low-profile but enormously important post that oversees budget management on behalf of the Congress.

Earlier, Bowers spent a total of a quarter century with

top accounting firm Arthur Andersen. In public remarks, he provided a detailed tour of the government horizon. He gave high marks to Presidents George H.W. Bush and Bill Clinton for impressive budgetary discipline, even in the face of harsh criticism, which probably cost the former leader reelection.

In comments echoing Eisenhower, he emphasized that wars are easy to begin but often hard to end, using Iraq as an example. His presentation was an informative, inspiring history lesson on the vital role of government in averting as well as handling crises, from the economy to war, and the great difficulty of instituting change in the public sector at any time.

Carthage this month hosts former Governor John Baldacci of Maine, a leader who emphasizes bipartisan collaboration. Currently, he chairs the Northeast-Midwest institute, a nonprofit working to improve environment and infrastructure among the eighteen states in the Midwest and Northeast of the U.S.

Today, the intense political partisanship that characterizes Washington, and expressed public hostility to our national government, underscores the importance of state and regional cooperation.

Thanks to Marshall and associates, we can focus on peaceful pursuits.


Navarre Beach Bash is a rain or shine event.

Seashore eliminates park specific waterfowl hunting permits

GULF BREEZE — Gulf Islands National Seashore will no longer issue park specific Waterfowl Hunting Permits. However, hunting within the national seashore during the state designated waterfowl hunting seasons is still authorized. Hunters must still follow all rules and regulations and may not hunt in certain closed areas. Unless exempt, hunters must carry a valid State of Florida hunting license, Florida Waterfowl Permit, Migratory Bird Permit and a signed federal "Duck Stamp."

In accordance with the Superintendent's Compendium and through an interagency partnership with Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, waterfowl hunting is permitted in the national seashore during the corresponding state hunting season, with the exception of marine areas adjacent to high visitor use areas in Florida. National seashore rules, regulations, and

hunting closure maps are available on the park's website at www.nps.gov/planyourvisit/waterfowl-hunting-regulations.htm. The enabling legislation establishing Gulf Islands National Seashore specifically allows for waterfowl hunting within the boundaries of the national seashore in coordination with the state of Florida. No other hunting is permitted within the boundary of the national seashore.

"The seashore provides numerous recreational opportunities for visitors, including waterfowl hunting. By eliminating the park specific permit requirement, we are reducing the added administrative requirement and burden for hunters while still providing the same protective measures for resources," said Superintendent Dan Brown.

State hunting licenses and permits, along with Federal Duck Stamp, may be obtained at county tax collector's offices and license agents, or online at, www.MyFWC.com/License.

adoption. This collaboration would allow Santa Rosa to send animals to other parts of the country reducing overcrowding, euthanasia rates, and freeing up space at the facility.

Baker said he has good working relationships with animal advocacy groups in the area and plans on meeting with them regularly.

Baker is also looking for a local veterinarian to perform low-cost spaying and neutering. "The solution is spay and neutering," Baker said. However, he stops short of supporting the Trap Neuter Release (TNR) program. Just reviewing the ordinance to allow TNR with county staff could take as much as six months, Baker said.

Brandi Winkleman with the nonprofit A HOPE for Santa Rosa County is a TNR advocate. Winkleman, president of the group, wants all cat lovers to email their commissioners and ask them to change the ordinance and allow TNR throughout the county.

Winkleman has started the "thousand-cat campaign." Her goal is to get one thousand cats spayed or neutered at the cost of \$25 per cat. Winkleman works with the low-cost Spay Bay clinic in Panama City to perform the surgeries, and her group was one of 25 that received a \$25,000 grant to use solely for TNR. The \$25 pays for vaccinations, ear tipping, microchip, and the surgery.

Winkleman has arranged a shelter review of the Milton facility by Team Shelter USA, a \$30,000 value at no cost to the county. The review is on

the schedule for the end of the month.

TNR works, according to Winkleman and said it has been proven throughout the country. TNR works by trapping feral, stray and community cats then getting them spayed and neutered and returning the cats to the original territory they were trapped. Eventually, the population decreases because the cats in the colony cannot reproduce. That reduces intake to the shelter, which reduces euthanasia.

In 2017, Santa Rosa County led the state in euthanasia at 66.57 percent. Winkleman has been vocal about implementing a TNR program to lower that number. County commissioners have been cautious in response. Allowing TNR would require a change in county ordinance, a lengthy process requiring public forums, reviewing a new ordinance and voting. Commissioners have opted to study the results of Milton's TNR program, the only area in the county that has adopted this program.

As it happens, both Baker and Winkleman inspired a King Middle School 12-year-old to pursue educating people on stopping animal

abuse. Becca Shaw started the Animal Protection Program, known as APP.

Shaw said she and her friend Leah Hatfield were talking about the breed discrimination lift implemented by Baker. The more they talked the more Shaw wanted to get involved. Shaw ended up taking control of the group.

"I was excited that she wanted to start the club," said Katherine Shaw, Becca's mother. "I wanted her to do the leg work, to see if she really wanted it."

The only suggestion her mother made after her daughter created the group, found a sponsor, and created a PowerPoint presentation for the first meeting was to invite a guest speaker. That speaker turned out to be Winkleman. The meeting was beneficial for both Shaw and Winkleman.

"Meeting such an awesome little girl like Becca will allow us to educate young people in animal advocacy through her group and the schools," Winkleman said. As for Shaw, she gets a mentor. The two have already started planning fundraisers and volunteer work with other animal rescue organizations.

At the next APP meeting, Shaw and her group will paint portraits of adoptable animals. The portraits will be sold at the Barktoberfest event on Oct. 27, at Maritime Park in Pensacola.

Shaw held her first APP meeting Sept. 26, at King Middle School after class with 15 students in attendance along with teacher and sponsor Joni Edmunson. APP's goal is to help prevent animal abuse, and to encourage people to report it when they see it. Shaw's definition of abuse includes physical beating to not feeding them.

Main Street Milton taking applications for Business Improvement Program

MILTON – The application cycle is now open for the 2018-2019 Main Street Milton Business Improvement Program (BIP) for downtown businesses. This program provides commercial property and companies an opportunity to apply for grants or loans for façade improvements, signage, landscaping, infrastructure and business start-up/expansion expenses.

The program provides funding to upgrade the appearance of properties, increase property values, and stimulate economic activity within the Main Street Milton service area and Milton's Community Redevelopment Area. BIP is available to property owners or business tenants only.

Funds are awarded in three categories:

Sign grant

Up to \$500 can be used exclusively for new or replacement business exterior signage. No match is required.

Commercial façade grant

Up to \$2,500 can be used for improvements to the exterior façade of a building. A 100 percent match is required.

Business micro-loan

Up to \$5,000 can be used for items like commercial façade improvements, equipment and signage. A 100 percent match is required and 20 percent of the loan is forgiven annually.

Examples of eligible items include:







Stars of Bradley Cooper and Lady Gaga keep rising in 'A Star Is Born' remake


There shouldn't be any questions about the story in "A Star Is Born." That part of it is tried and true, with Hollywood returning to it every couple of decades for a freshened-up remake. Actually, it's been four decades since the most recent one, with Kris Kristofferson and Barbra Streisand as the established star on his way down and the newcomer on her way up. The story has always been about the relationship between the two characters and an examination of their careers.

Now those roles have been handed to Bradley Cooper as a hugely successful country-rocker, and Lady Gaga as a waitress who only wants to sing.

The questions for this new one are: Can she act? Can he sing? And even more important, seeing as this is the first time Cooper has called the shots, can he direct?

The three questions get three big affirmatives. This is a splashy and spectacular modern-day romantic drama with music.

Sure, it can be accused of depending on a string of coincidences to get the story spinning: After a big show, Jackson (Cooper),

exhausted and in need of a drink, tells his driver to stop at a bar, any bar.

The one he enters — not knowing it's a drag bar, which provides some early humor — just happens to be the one where Ally (Gaga) sings at night, hoping to forget her day job and keep her musical dreams alive.

And there are plenty of clichés to deal with: He's a hard drinker and a pill popper, but even in his stupor, the moment he hears her launch into a gorgeous rendition of "La Vie en Rose," he's smitten, captivated, both by her voice

and by her. Later on, their harmonizing, whether it's the vocalizing kind or the romantic kind, is perfect.

Even later, after he convinces her to go for it and she begins to attain it, someone else enters the scene, your standard record producer who's looking for the next big thing, trying to make her his own. Yes, all Hollywood clichés, but somehow, none of them get in the way of where this film is going.

There are a few points where you start to wonder about who this story is really about — Jackson or

Ally. Truth is, it's kind of a tie. He falls for her, she falls for him, their careers meld for a while. But then his hard-living begins to take its toll, and her ambition sparks her rise. They're a happy couple, for a while, and Cooper does a nice job establishing that in close-ups of them together, but he also excels at showing them and their differences in separate close-ups of them.

He also displays a confidence in directing actors, getting a couple of the best performances from — no surprise — Sam Elliott as

Jackson's older brother Bobby, who's back story discloses that he's taken care of Jackson since childhood, and continues to as his manager, and from the fellow who plays Ally's Sinatra-loving and show-biz-savvy dad Lorenzo.

It wasn't till the credits ran at the end that I realized it was Andrew Dice Clay, in a role that he'll want to keep right at the top of his résumé.

There's a great deal of energy in the film, even when the drama of it starts to bring the mood down via jealousy, drug- and drinking problems, and the clashing of career paths.

If you've seen any of the previous versions, you know what course this one will take, and how you'll feel at the end. If this is all new to you, you might want to bring along a couple of tissues, for purposes of eye dabbing.



A glutton for mutton, making a case – and a recipe – for gamy meats

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They say hunger is the best sauce, but imagination, at the very least, is a pretty good seasoning.

The famous sex therapist Dr. Ruth Westheimer used to claim that the brain is the largest sex organ in the body; I'd suggest that the mind is similarly the biggest taste bud. Studies have shown that knowing the value of a bottle of wine will influence how people think it tastes. Children, meanwhile, will fight over certain colors of M&M.

We are wired to appreciate food, in part, based on the story attached to it. Whether it's an egg from a happy hen, or some words on the back of a chocolate bar about the farmers who grew the cacao. Even a name, like Klari Baby Cheese, will make a pepper more interesting.

And then there is my friend Steve, a farmer who can fill himself with literal and existential hunger with a single word: Mutton.

Steve makes a point of saying the word at full volume, because it's more than just a statement. It's a one-word manifesto.

"Nobody wants to say 'mutton' anymore," Steve complained to me once. "As a society we've shunned the eating of grown-up sheep in favor of young lambs to the point where even saying the word 'mutton' is like talking filth in some circles, and that's a shame."

Mutton, otherwise known as old sheep, or overgrown lamb, is not what most people would call a delicacy. Sheep is a strong-tasting animal, and this flavor gets stronger

with age. A lamb is not only mellower of flavor, but a lot more tender than a full-grown sheep, which can be as tough as an old rooster. Certain measures must be taken so that the flavor is tamed. These steps – and the soft, delicious meat that results – are well-worth the trouble.

Steve and his family enjoy a mutton salad in which the mutton-y flavors are not denied or neutralized, but put to work alongside romaine, onions, cucumbers, dill and shelled peas, with a creamy dressing called "creamy."

Mutton can be hard to find in stores, and if you can't find it, lamb shoulder or shank would be an acceptable, if expensive, substitute. But I would recommend turkey, or beef shank – which are more affordable – or wild game if you can get it. Any meat that's tough and flavorful can work here.

Meaty salads are a balancing act. It's common in restaurants to witness someone sit down to a salad laden with meat, cheese, egg, croutons and other non-leafy materials. At the end of the meal, the remaining leaves are returned to the kitchen, untouched, while the eater walks out feeling like a health hero for having ordered a salad.

This mutton salad is not like that. The braised meat is teased apart like pulled pork and tossed in, where its greasy, flavorful richness adds delicious contrast to the crunchy romaine and sharp onions.

Pea Mutton Salad

- 1 pound of MUTTON, or other tough, gamy meat

- 2 heads romaine, washed and chopped
- 1 sweet onion, sliced thinly
- 1 large or two medium cucumbers, sliced thinly
- ½ cup of fresh dill, chopped
- 1 cup shelled peas, fresh or frozen (optional. I know it's in the name of the salad, but optional nonetheless)

For the Creamy Dressing, combine:

- 2/3 cup mayo or Veganaise (which is better, though I'm obviously not vegan)
- 1/3 cup yogurt
- 3-6 cloves shredded garlic
- 1 tablespoon horseradish
- 1 teaspoon curry powder
- ½ cup grated cheddar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon black pepper

Braise the meat. First, brown it under the broiler without any oil, then transfer it to a covered baking dish half-filled with water, with a cup or two of wine, a few bay leaves, and salt and garlic powder to taste: Just a few pinches, enough so the meat will absorb a little flavor, but don't overdo it. You can always add more later, but it's difficult to remove if you add too much.

Braise at 300 for a few hours – however long it takes for the meat to soften completely (it could take four or more hours). Replace fluids as necessary so it mostly, but not totally, covers the meat. When the meat is soft, remove it from the oven and allow it to cool.

Meanwhile, make the salad and dressing. Toss them together, along with braised, pulled meat.

Optional but recommended: Before eating, climb to the closest hilltop and yell "MUTTON!!!" Then, go eat some greasy, gamy, creamy leaves.

Pumpkins stuffed with hearty autumn fare



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OK, so the pumpkin spice thing started, as usual, in August, about five seconds after the kids went back to school. And it was as crazy as ever, with every food on Earth suddenly available in pumpkin spice form. A car repair place in my town put up a sign that read "Pumpkin Spice Oil Change \$19.99."

The perennial backlash was sluggish with resignation (it might have been the 90-degree heat), while the other 75 percent of the world rushed out to get their pumpkin spice lattes from Starbucks before the school buses finished their first routes.

But that's all over now. It's officially acceptable to indulge in pumpkin season. The mums are blooming in earnest, the nights have cooled, the tree leaves are turning colors and lovers of Halloween are putting the finishing touches on their ghoulish outdoor displays. Go nuts with the scarecrows, stretch the fake cobwebs across the dining room, pile up the gourds, and dig into some hearty autumn fare.

This dish more than qualifies as festive. And creative. The hardest part is digging the guts out of the pie pumpkins, but you need the practice anyway, for jack-o'-lantern season, which is right around the corner. Once that part is done, it's just a matter of cooking the filling, stuffing the pumpkins and baking



the lot.

And waiting for them to bake. That part is hard, too.

- Sausage & Rice Stuffed Pumpkins
- 3 small pie pumpkins (about 2 pounds each)
- ½ pound bulk sweet Italian sausage
- 1 pound fresh mushrooms, chopped
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 1 medium green pepper, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 4 cups cooked long-grain rice
- 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided
- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- ¼ cup minced fresh parsley
- teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme

Preheat oven to 450 F. Cut a 3-inch circle around each pumpkin stem. Remove tops and set aside. Remove strings and seeds from pumpkins; discard seeds or save for toasting.

In a large skillet, cook sausage, vegetables and garlic over medium heat 6 to 8 minutes or until sausage is no longer pink, breaking up sausage into crumbles; drain. Remove from heat; stir in rice, ¾ cup cheese, eggs, parsley, salt and thyme.

Place pumpkins in a baking pan to catch any moisture; fill with rice mixture. Replace pumpkin tops. Bake 30 minutes.

Reduce oven setting to 350 F. Bake 25 to 35 minutes longer or until pumpkin is tender when pierced with a knife and a thermometer inserted in filling reads 160 F. Sprinkle remaining cheese over filling.

To serve, remove rice mixture. Scoop out pumpkin and serve with rice.

Allagash among America's best

There are only a handful of breweries that I can say I have never had a bad beer from – Allagash Brewing Company being one of them.

More than likely, if you love beer, you know Allagash and their reputation for brewing exceptional Belgian-style beers ... maybe the best outside of Belgium. Founded by the craft beer legend Rob Todd in 1995, they have been producing "Belgian-inspired" beers for some time now. Their flagship "White" Ale is commonly found on tap up and down the East Coast, and if you like the Belgian Witbier, one taste explains its prominence. "White" is one of the beers, among a few other classics, that really opened my eyes to great beer.

While I am almost embarrassed to admit that I have been to their hometown of Portland, Maine, a couple of times now without stopping by the brewery, word is they offer an outstanding tour, and that it sells out fast most days. On a recent brief but unparalleled tour down Maine's coastal Route 1 in August, I had time for a couple of other stops in Portland: "The Thirsty Pig" for a few sips from local breweries new to the scene (paired with a taco-style sausage plate ... whatever that means); "Holy Donut" for a potato donut for my dessert-oriented traveling companion followed by a mini lobster roll being sold by a street vendor on the corner in a pindrop (shamelessly declaring our tourist nature); and lastly,

my first visit to the legendary beer bar, The Great Lost Bear, which has an entire beer tower dedicated to Allagash called "Allagash Alley."

Sitting down at this meandering bar, and enjoying my proximity to this "Alley," I had to go for a flight followed by a glass of Allagash's much lauded sour "Farm to Face." Poured into a 13-ounce tulip, this juicy, tart peach sour is one special brew. Initially brewed as a pale ale, it is fermented for 10 months in stainless tanks with house yeast followed by a secondary fermentation where strains of Pediococcus, and Lactobacillus are added, and of course fresh peaches.

Many fruited beers taste artificial, or cloying, but this beer is the product of master brewers – a tart yet balanced experience with pleasant acidity, and a dry peachy finish. If you have the chance to try this or any other Allagash beer, ready your sampling shoes and thank me later.

FATHER'S PERSONALITY CHANGES AFTER STROKE

DEAR HARRIETTE: My father just suffered a stroke and is in a terrible state. He has started yelling and cursing at the doctors and nurses in the hospital. He has been incredibly rude and disrespectful in ways that are downright shocking to the family. He has said racist things to doctors from other countries. It's awful. He never behaved like this before. My siblings and I went back and apologized to the people he offended, but we are beside ourselves. He isn't listening. How can we get him to stop this ranting? -- *Stroke Effect, Seattle*

DEAR STROKE EFFECT: After reading a range of materials on the side effects of stroke, what I have learned is that emotional outbursts can happen in stroke victims, especially in the early days. Dementia can be exacerbated as well. For many patients, medical professionals suggest that over time there are improvements and some sense of normalcy may return. This depends, of course, on the severity of the stroke. For now, you and your siblings should continue to offer love and support to your father, making sure he knows that you are there for him and that he is not alone. If he continues to exhibit rude behavior toward others, you will have to continue to follow up and neutralize the situation until, God willing, he calms down. DEAR HARRIETTE: There is a lot of construction just above me in my building. It has been going on for months. Recently, my neighbor and I have noticed mouse droppings in our apartments. Well, it could even be from a rat. The excrement was kind of big, and every trap that I have bought has not worked. I am so upset. I have two small children and am worried for their health and safety. Something has to be done about this.

When I mentioned this to the landlord, he didn't seem to care. I need the building to take this seriously. It is not healthy to have a mouse or rat in my apartment. Should I report the building to 311? -- *Rat-Free Life, Bronx, New York*

DEAR RAT-FREE LIFE: Before going to 311, contact your landlord again both by phone and in writing. Request extermination services based on the rodent problem you are experiencing. Take pictures to prove what you have seen. Explain in writing all that you have done to get rid of the problem, to no avail. Ask for the landlord to get the exterminator in immediately to rectify the problem.

If you still get no satisfactory response, then call 311 and explain the situation. Describe the supporting materials you have to prove your concern. Ask the city to help you. The 311 number exists to help citizens deal with non-emergency municipal issues. This certainly should qualify as that.



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
