## Baker Block Museum names curator

Visitors at the Baker Block Museum are seeing a new face on the block. The North Okaloosa Historical Association board of directors appointed Baker resident Peggy Hardy as the museum's new curator.

Hardy is replacing Jeanette Henderson, who served as the mu-

seum's curator since its opening in 1996 and was also a founding member of the historical association's board of directors.

"I'm excited to work with the museum; I just love genealogy and historical research," Hardy said. "I didn't realize the amount of history in north Okaloosa County until I started volunteering at the museum."

Hardy is a native of Andalusia

Ala., but has resided most of her life in Baker. She is a graduate of Baker High School and has remained in the community, where she and her husband, Pete Hardy, raised their three daughters.

Peggy Hardy retired from the state of Florida Department of Revenue after 35 years of service.

## Deputy's home burns

The state fire marshal's office and Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office are investigating a suspicious fire that took place at the rural home of a deputy in the Auburn community about 3 a.m. Saturday morning.

Investigators have not released the address at which the fire took place.

The Okaloosa sheriff's deputy said he was awakened by his dog, a 4-year-old boxer. When the deputy looked out of the window, he saw flames, according to a sheriff's press release.

He then ran back, grabbed his 4-year-old daughter and got her out of the burning home. He went back in to get his dog, and they escaped through a window. No one was injured.

Another deputy who had arrived at the home had attempted to use his fire extinguisher and water hoses to contain the blaze. The North Okaloosa Fire Department arrived to put out the fire.

The home is a total loss, but the deputy, who has been with the agency four and a half years, was able to salvage clothes and some personal items, according to the press release.

He does have insurance and also has living arrangements at this time. He thanks fellow law enforcement officers at the sheriff's office and Crestview Police Department, along with family and friends, for their assistance and concerns but asks that his name not be released to the public at this time to protect his family's privacy while the investigation is under way, the press release states.

No other details are being released at this time.

tinue to grow and to continue discovering and preserving local history for our future generations," she said.

"I'm very pleased and happy that Peggy is taking over as manager of the museum and heritage park," Henderson said. "She is very capable and has an interest in local history and preservation, and that says an awful lot."

Henderson and her husband, Charles, will continue as consultants at the museum. The Hendersons were both founding members of the North Okaloosa Historical Association board of directors and were instrumental in helping to obtain state grant money to purchase and renovate the historic block of buildings that houses the museum.

"Our goal was to establish a place where people could come back to find information about their family and history. It has certainly developed beyond our expectations," Jeanette Henderson said. "Charles and I are certainly appreciative of the

## ABOUT THE BAKER BLOCK MUSEUM

The Baker Block Museum is at 1307 Georgia Ave., which is at the intersection of state roads 4 and 189, at the traffic light in Baker.

The museum is open to the public Tuesday through Friday and the third Saturday of each month from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Admission is free.

The museum, which is housed in a historic block of buildings constructed between 1908 and 1910, is a repository of local historical artifacts and documents, including a genealogy/local history research library and heritage park.

Exhibits in the museum include an early 1900s general store, turpentine and timber industry, Native American, military and many aspects of early pioneer life in north Okaloosa County.

The genealogy/local history library has a microfilm collection of early county newspapers and census records, many local family genealogy manuscripts, old photographs, maps, cemetery records and abundant genealogical research material. Researchers can access programs, such as Ancestry.com, and Family Tree Maker on computers available in the library or order microfilm from the National Archives or the Church of Jesus of Latter Day Saints collection in Salt Lake City.

Visitors can stroll through pioneer structures in the museum's heritage park, including a single pen log cabin with a fireplace and cooking hearth, a two-room dogtrot log cabin, blacksmith shop, log corn crib, chicken house, outhouse and the turn-of-the-century Otahtie Post Office.

The annual Folk Life and Heritage Festival is held in the museum's heritage park on the first Saturday of November, with this year's event set for Nov. 6. The festival will feature a variety of heritage demonstrators and crafters, as well as bluegrass and gospel music, food and fun for the entire family.

The museum is available for field trips for school, church or civic organizations and offers educational services, which meet the Sunshine State Standards, including a book complete with lesson plans titled "A History of Florida & Okaloosa County."

Woodruff hastens to point out that she doesn't produce the popular meals alone.

"It takes an excellent staff," she said. "I couldn't do it without my staff. Over the years, we've been blessed with wonderful people. We're just a family back there in the kitchen."

She heaps particular praise on Fred Stevens, whom she called her "right-hand man."

"Mr. Fred, he cooks the eggs," Woodruff said. "He's the best egg-cooker in the city."

Preparations for the chamber breakfasts, held the first Thursday of each month, began on Monday, when Woodruff usually did her grocery shopping.

"We prep on Wednesday," she said. "On chamber day, we start at 3 a.m."

By the start of the 7 a.m. breakfast, the ROC is filled with the welcoming aroma of a tempting bounty of good, southern country breakfast cuisine that awaits Crestview's business and civic community: bacon, sausage, scrambled eggs, grits (regular and cheese), biscuits with sausage gravy and yogurt.

"We've had the very best food and the very best people preparing our food," praised Chamber President Dino Sinopoli.

"They've become our family," Woodruff said. "We love them all."

She still vividly recalls the first breakfasts she and her team prepared back in 2002.

"We used china," she said. "We had real silverware and glasses. We had to quit that in six months. We couldn't keep up with that."

As she spoke, Chamber Executive Director Wayne Harris ducked into the kitchen to nab a Diet Coke from the refrigerator.

"This is our mother,"

Harris said. "She looks after us."

"A mother always sees that her children have what they need," Woodruff said, laughing, as Harris popped open his Coke and scurried out again.

However, all good things must come to an end, and even the most loved children eventually leave the nest. At the Aug. 5 breakfast, Sinopoli announced the event's venue will change to the Crestview Community Center with September's breakfast. Uncle Bill's Restaurant will take over the breakfast-cooking responsibilities.

Central Baptist Church is undertaking a new weekly program for upwards of 250 underprivileged youth, and the ROC is the only facility that meets occupancy code requirements for the program, explained the church's pastor, the Rev. Scott Dennis.

"God has blessed us," Dennis said. "We have a kid care program that is going to use this building."

Dennis said Central Baptist has been honored to host the chamber breakfasts and was heartbroken to have to end the relationship.

"This decision was very, very difficult," Dennis said.

"We are very appreciative of Pastor Scott Dennis and all the folks here," Sinopoli said.

To a standing ovation, Harris and Sinopoli welcomed Woodruff and her crew to the front of the room, where the woman who's overseen the feeding of the chamber was made an honorary lifetime member of the organization.

That means for the first time in eight years, Woodruff at last can sleep in, sit down and enjoy having someone else prepare the Chamber of Commerce's breakfast.

"It's still under investigation, and I'm working it as an arson investigation at this time," Miller said.

The structure was reported to have smoke and flames showing when local fire departments were dispatched to the scene at 10 p.m.

Crestview residents Karen and Kerry Goettl were leaving a friend's house on Monterrey Road when they spotted the fire and called 911.

There was no one home at the time of the blaze, and neighbors stated that the residents were in the process of moving.

Miller asked that anyone with information related to the fire call 877-NO-ARSON.

# Police look for hit-and-run driver

Police are looking for a motorist who fled the scene of an accident that left a man seriously injured.

Daniel Dugger, 42, of Crestview, suffered three fractured vertebrae and other injuries in the crash at the intersection of State Road 85 and John King Road on Aug. 4, according to police. He was taken to North Okaloosa Medical Center and then transferred to Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola, police spokesman Lt. Andrew Schneider said.

Dugger was driving a 1989 Isuzu Trooper through the intersection about 8:15 p.m. when an unknown vehicle struck it and caused it to overturn, according to police.

Dugger was making deliveries for Domino's Pizza when the accident occurred, his wife, Stacey

Dugger, said Friday in a phone interview from Sacred Heart.

"Someone ran a red light and hit my husband on the tail end of his vehicle," she said.

She said the crash fractured three vertebrae, two ribs, his nose and a bone in his neck. Her husband is expected to make a full recovery, which doctors told her would take 8 weeks.

"If he had not had that seat belt on, there is no way he would have survived this accident," Stacey Dugger said.

She said her heart "sank to her feet" when she learned of the wreck. Now she wants to find the other driver and see justice served.

The hit-and-run vehicle is a black or dark blue GMC or Chevrolet sport utility vehicle — a Yukon, Tahoe or Suburban, according to a news release from the Police Department. The vehicle sustained front-end damage and was last seen heading east on John King Road. Police recovered pieces of the vehicle from the scene.

Stacey Dugger wondered whether surveillance tapes from businesses at the intersection would show the suspect vehicle.

Schneider said an officer was assigned to the case and the investigation was ongoing.

"We're seeking the driver, but we don't have a lot of information," he said.

# Local school districts rank among best on FCAT

For the fifth consecutive year, Northwest Florida school districts rank among the best in the state.

Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton County schools each received an A grade overall for the performance of their elementary and middle schools on the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test.

"I'm very proud of our schools," said Okaloosa

County Superintendent Alexis Tibbetts. "I don't think people realize the true gem that we have in this school district."

School grades were developed in 1999 to help keep the public informed about their performance. The grades are based on the results of the FCAT.

Of the 29 elementary and middle schools in Okaloosa County, 24 received A's and five received B's. In Walton County, eight schools received A's and the remaining two earned a B and a

C. Santa Rosa schools received 15 A's, four B's and one C.

"We revel in the success of our staff and our children, and I just applaud our principals because they do such a good job," said Walton County Superintendent Carlene Anderson.

The Florida Department of Education released the school grades Friday afternoon. That was about a month later than expected because of several hiccups with the FCAT, including a database error with the

company that was scoring the tests.

After the database was corrected and FCAT scores were ready to be released, several superintendents from across the state asked the DOE in mid-July to hold off after school officials noticed anomalies in fourth- and fifth-grade reading scores.

One red flag was students who scored a 4 or 5 on the written portion of the test received a 2 or 3 in reading.

Corrections were made,

and Education Commissioner Eric Smith said earlier this week that he was confident the scores were accurate.

Some superintendents remain skeptical after 33 percent of all elementary schools in Florida dropped a letter grade or two compared to last year.

In Walton County, Anderson said she and her staff were surprised to see that Freeport Elementary School received a grade of C.

"When we ran the

figures with our schools, that's not (the grade) we got," Anderson said.

Tibbetts said she was suspicious after discovering that one out of every three schools in the county went down a letter grade.

"That is a huge anomaly that has never happened before," she said.

High school grades will be released in November. State education officials will use factors such as graduation rates to calculate each school's overall grade.

# Taxing situation

## Many local non-profits may lose tax-exempt status

Changes in Internal Revenue Service reporting procedures mean more than two dozen area non-profit organizations may lose their tax-exempt status, said a recent Better Business Bureau report. Of the 14,773 charities, religious organizations and other non-profits at risk in Florida alone, 26 are in the north end of Okaloosa County, and most of them are registered in Crestview.

From Access Unlimited Ministries to the Western Rovers, the organizations on the list could lose their tax-exempt status with the IRS unless they file tax returns by Oct. 15, said the BBB in a media release.

"I suspect that many of the charities on this list are

those that were not required to file a return prior to a change in the law in 2007," said Norman Wright, president and CEO of the BBB of Northwest Florida. "However, the IRS has been sending multiple notices to these organizations because this is such a big threat to the smallest charities in our service area."

The loss of tax-exempt status would affect more than the charity itself, however. People who donate to the organizations that are at risk would not be allowed to claim their donations as deductions on their taxes next year if the groups don't file their returns.

The BBB release said the IRS is offering a "one-time filing relief" for those charities at risk of losing their tax-exempt status for failure to file a notice or return.

"Tax-exempt organizations that fail to satisfy annual filing requirements for three consecutive years automatically lose their tax-exempt status," explained the IRS on its website. "The IRS is providing one-time relief that will allow small exempt organizations to come back into compliance and retain their tax-exempt status even though they failed to file for three consecutive years. If

an organization loses its exemption, it will have to reapply to regain its tax-exempt status. Any income received between the revocation date and renewed exemption may be taxable."

"This one-time relief benefits Form 990-N (e-Postcard) and Form 990-EZ filers only," the IRS site said. "Organizations required to file Form 990 or Form 990-PF are not eligible and are automatically revoked if they fail to file for three consecutive years."

Organizations on the list include religious groups, such as the R.W. White Ministries; community groups, including Macedonia Community Development; educational groups like the Florida A&M University National Alumni Association's local chapter; labor organizations including the International Association of Firefighters' local chapter; and at least one arts organization, the local chapter of the National Society of Tole and Decorative Painters.

A couple of unusual-sounding groups that made the list are the American Brugmansia and Datura Society, a group of amateur and professional gardeners, and the Timbuktu Research Consortium of Laurel Hill, a medical research

organization.

Another organization listed is the Robert L.F. Sikes Library Association, apparently a predecessor to today's Friends of the Crestview Library organization, said library officials.

"That's an old name of an organization that existed back before our Friends of the Library was established," said reference librarian Sandra Dreaden.

Friends of the Library treasurer Nancy Moxie said she was unfamiliar with the older group, adding that the Friends of the Library have already filed their return for this year.

"I got something in the mail saying we didn't do it the year before. I stayed on hold with them forever, but I got some nice guy on the line" who cleared up the mystery, Moxie said.

"So we're not in danger of losing our exemption," Moxie said. "The only paperwork I ever found was that we were Friends of the Library, Incorporated. I've never found anything about (the library association)."

# 'Taking Flight, Taking Root'

CHS art educator to hold one-woman show in FWB

Crestview High School art students have always enjoyed their instructor Laurel Siwicki's firm but gentle guidance as they plunge into the creative world of visual and dimensional art. Sometimes, maybe not at the time it's happening, they even come to appreciate her masterful way of extracting extra effort from students whose talents she has recognized, though they may not yet recognize it in themselves.

To be an effective art educator, one also must be an accomplished artist, and local art students, their parents and art lovers will soon have the opportunity to experience the popular art teacher's sculptural works when Siwicki presents a solo show called "Taking Flight, Taking Root" at the Full Circle Gallery in Fort Walton Beach. The exhibition opens Sept. 3.

Siwicki, an accomplished, award-winning artist as well as a dedicated teacher, has been energetically working on the exhibit for more than a year.

"She feels her own life journey has been preparing her for it all of her life," the gallery said in a media release. "While the works are derived from the artist's personal experiences, they are open to individual interpretation, providing spectators with an opportunity to explore their own thoughts on taking flight and taking root. As such, symbolism plays an integral role in Siwicki's series and heavily helps her tell her story."

Heady stuff for folks who search for extra meaning in their art appreciation. But fortunately, for the many who just like to admire a fine piece of artistry, Siwicki's sculptures speak to viewers on many levels, none more important or more cerebral than the other, which is the real joy of good art. You can enjoy it however you choose. The pieces are beautiful, colorful, whimsical as well as thought-provoking.

"Since the beginning of time, artists have been using symbols in their art to allow the viewer to infer their own meaning," Siwicki explains. "I use old and new symbols, all of which incorporate my Northwest Florida roots."

These symbols include cypress trees, dilapidated

# The new kid in town

## Sculpture enhances library as well as community

There's a new face at the Crestview Public Library: a young, inquisitive boy with oversized glasses, wearing a mortarboard while devouring a fascinating book through a magnifying glass. Called "The Whiz Kid," it's the new sculpture mounted near the library entrance.

"Our Friends of the Library bought it for us," said Audrey Milcarek, a familiar face herself behind the circulation desk. "They do so much for us. They raised the money for it."

For a city with a dearth of public art, the Whiz Kid is a welcome newcomer to Crestview. The sculpture's placement outside the library, which serves as both a focus of community enlightenment and the city's impromptu arts center, is particularly fitting.

The multi-patina sculpture was cast in bronze by The Bronzeman, a studio in Westlake Village, Calif. Including its brick enclosure and plinth, the beautiful installation cost more than \$5,300.

Library Director Jean Lewis said the sculpture will be dedicated in a ceremony at 11:30 a.m. Sept. 16, after the Friends of the Crestview Library's 10:30 meeting. The Whiz Kid will be dedicated in memory of the late longtime library friend Ted Lembeck and in appreciation to his wife, Flo Lembeck, founding president of the Friends of

the Crestview Library.

Sandra Dreaden, reference librarian, said the library has received advice from Sheila Dunning, with the Okaloosa County Extension office,

for landscaping around the sculpture. A landscape plan provided by Dunning recommends phlox, dwarf shrub crape myrtle and mulch grass around the sculpture's brick plinth.

"The plants will bloom in spring, summer and fall," Dreaden said.

Dunning also instructed the library to assure all brick mortar and dust be cleaned up so lime in

the mortar doesn't leech into the soil. "It will gradually change the pH and the shrubs will gradually decline," Dunning warned.

"We love our Whiz Kid," Lewis said.

# Fold-n-fly at Library Time

Guinness record-holder to reveal mystery of flight

The Japanese may have origami, but as precious as the little folded paper hories or swans may be, they'll never stir quite the adrenaline the way a good paper airplane does when it is thrown into the air and borne on the breeze. The folder's spirit seems to soar with the aircraft launched in an open field. Launched in a classroom, it's a great source of hilarity.

It's not quite a classroom — or an open field — but the Crestview Public Library is a great place to allow the study of paper airplane manufacture to dress in the respectability of academia, and at the Aug. 17 Family Library Time program, that's just what will happen.

Ken Blackburn, who holds the Guinness World Record for the longest paper airplane flight, will show just how to fold a plane like his record-breaker, which stayed aloft for nearly half a minute (as opposed to the one John Westphal threw in Mrs. Brady's trigonometry class, which stayed aloft just long enough to get all

of us after-school detention when John wouldn't fess up).

Part science lesson but all fun, Blackburn's presentation will include a bit of background on aeronautical engineering so every one in your family gets a better understanding of just what makes some objects soar like birds while others drop like rocks. The author of "The World Record Paper Airplane Book" and "Pocket Flyers," Blackburn is an aero-

nautics engineer at Eglin Air Force Base, where he helps research and design unmanned air vehicles.

Armed with an understanding of the basics of flight, participants at the library's event will then get to fold and, weather permitting, head outside to fly their own versions of Blackburn's record-breaking paper airplane, trying to break his 27.6-second record.

Now try that with a silly paper swan!

skiffs and native birds. Siwicki's works also often include parts that look rusted or worn, which help create a sense of the passing of time, highlighting the artist's belief that journeys take time and that one ought to enjoy them, the release noted.

"Too often we focus on the being-there, when, if we take a moment, we will realize that the getting-there is sometimes the best part," Siwicki said.

Because Siwicki's works represent natural elements, or how nature affects man-made elements, clay is her favorite medium. Using it to create visual art rather than the functional objects, such as ashtrays or pots, with which it is closely associated, is important to the artist and is an attribute she consistently shares with her CHS students, whose annual art shows feature clay sculptures.

"I find my students to be artistically bold and inspiring," Siwicki said. "I, too, seek to inspire them to find their own life journeys."

The opening reception for "Taking Flight, Taking Root," featuring a talk with Siwicki, will take place Sept. 3 at Full Circle Gallery in Fort Walton Beach from 6-8 p.m. For more information, call the gallery at 362-8041 or visit [www.FullCircleFWB.com](http://www.FullCircleFWB.com).

## Tibbetts: Okaloosa schools earn A+ rating

Okaloosa County School District is proud to announce that we are once again an A+ school district and ranked high performing in Florida with no C, D or F schools. Grades were released Friday, Aug. 6, by the Florida Department of Education for the 2009-10 school year for all elementary (grades 3-5) and middle schools (grades 6-8) based on FCAT scores released in July.

The calculation of school grades is based not only on the proficiency level of students, but also on learning gains from the previous year, matched to each student individually. A major factor in school grades is the ability of the schools to show progress in reading and math of the lowest quartile of the school population. Twenty-two out of 27 elementary and middle schools were ranked an A, which is 81 percent. Special congratulations go to the staff and students at Wright Elementary School that moved from a B rating last year to an A rating this year.

All Okaloosa School District middle schools received an A due to the hard work of the students, teachers and staff and a district initiative to increase rigor and college/career readiness. Subject-specific professional development district-wide for all middle school teachers began three years ago, and the positive effect of that training is being realized. In an effort to help high school students meet the new standards for graduation, middle schools began preparing several years ago for the increased demands of end-of-course exams in algebra, geometry and biology required to graduate from high school. High schools and combination (K-12) schools will not receive school grades until November due to a new calculation formula based on graduation rate, AP/IB/AICE scores and industry certifications earned.

Five elementary schools in Okaloosa County were rated a B by Florida DOE. The reasons for this varied from school to school, but the main factor was that these schools did not demonstrate learning gains by 50 percent of the lowest quartile of their students. In elementary schools rated as a B, the gains of the lowest quartile ranged from 42 percent to 49 percent but did not meet the 50 percent criteria. Northwood Elementary and Riverside Elementary showed growth in math in

only 44 percent and 45 percent of their lowest quartile. Walker Elementary and Kenwood Elementary showed growth in only 44 percent and 42 percent of the lowest quartile in reading. Longwood Elementary

met the criteria for lower quartile gains, but proficiency overall was weak in science, and learning gains were not sufficiently evident in math schoolwide. Schools rated as a B are working with their literacy coaches, principals, teachers and district staff to improve, and we recommit to strategies and interventions necessary to assist all schools in our district being rated an A.

Congratulations go to all Okaloosa County teachers, students, parents, administrators and support staff. As budget constraints continue and less funding is available for reading programs, classroom assistants and technology to assist individualized



As the decline in the economy continues, our district has a growing number of students in poverty, and there is a significant shift in demographics in south Okaloosa with more students with special education and English language learner needs.

imagine the excitement when we saw provision for an electric light rail system linking a Crestview park-and-ride with Eglin Air Force Base then continuing to connect in Fort Walton Beach to a Gulf-front train serving Pensacola to Panama City and communities in between.

Imagine it! Ditching the car for a stress-free ride to work at Eglin, or a shopping day at Destin Commons and Silver Sands, or a family trip to the beach and the Gulfarium.

I jest. What the plan really calls for is just a handful of new sidewalks for Crestview, another spotlight to further stymie traffic on U.S. Highway 90, and lots and lots of concrete to be poured at the south end of the county.

Sadly, while our cousins in Europe have been perfecting the art of transportation planning, our planners stalwartly and stubbornly stick to the outmoded private-vehicle-on-ever-expanding-highways model. While Europeans have been weaned from their cars, rather than our road planners helping us kick the habit, they keep enabling us.

Worse still, although they eagerly flatten more land and pour more concrete over it, little is done to make using our roads any more efficient.

While driving in Sweden with Curt, I encountered a miraculous system called the "green way." We entered a town about Crestview's size on a four-lane road like S.R. 85. Along the way, digital speed limit signs told us how fast we had to go (never exceeding the speed limit) to maintain green lights through town. Not once did we have to stop. That was 1980.

Two months ago, while participating in our exchange with Crestview's sister city, I rode through many comparably sized communities in France. On the main roads, again many the size of S.R. 85, we rarely encountered a single traffic signal. Traffic in major intersections flowed smoothly in all four directions thanks to sensible roundabouts.

European traffic planners have found that by removing signals and pavement markings and installing roundabouts, traffic in major intersections actually slows down,

flows smoother and has fewer accidents.

"The trouble with traffic engineers is that when there's a problem with a road, they always try to add something," said Dutch traffic engineer Hans Monderman in an interview in the December 2004 issue of *Wired*. "To my mind, it's much better to remove things."

Think that'll never work here? Think again. When West Palm Beach removed traffic signals, eliminated turn lanes and narrowed the roadbed on several major thoroughfares, traffic flow improved, accidents decreased and trip times were shortened.

If we can't have better and more convenient public transport, which is what our goal should be, then innovations proven here and abroad at least can improve traffic flow. But, OWTPO officials said, their office's improvements take 20 years to plan, seek funding for and implement.

Twenty years ago, gas was \$1.16 a gallon, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration. In 1990, Crestview was a small, rural town. Who knew gas prices would more than double or that

Crestview would become the biggest, fastest-growing community in the county or that 6,000-plus new residents would be moving here next year?

A lot changes in 20 years, but sadly, OWTPO's plans seem to lack the flexibility to keep up with technology; societal changes; or the need for a responsible, economic, energy-efficient way to move simultaneously bunches of people around the county.

Eventually, roadways reach a saturation level where it is just foolish, wasteful and frivolous to keep pouring concrete. We've about reached that time. That money should be used to lay rails and get cars off the roads.

To their credit, OWTPO did, at last, recommend synchronizing traffic signals for county thoroughfares. It's about time. The technology has been around only 35 years.


"It just pushes me further to show what I can do."

on the defensive line have a chance to hear their name called when making a tackle or knocking down a pass. No, defensive linemen might not have the number of opportunities to make big plays that the linebackers

or defensive backs have, but they still get recognition from the guys in the press box for doing something well.

But especially in high school ball, the guys who do the dirty work on the offensive line are the

forgotten heroes of the game.

That's not to say their teammates, coaches and fans don't appreciate offensive linemen. And as many of you know, the left offensive tackle is now usually the second

highest-paid player on the typical National Football League team, as it is his job to protect the quarterback's blind side.

The fact is most high school football players don't play college ball, and even fewer make it to the

NFL, so those brief years in pads are limited to a few high school seasons.

Most of the seniors who put on the pads Thursday will be enjoying their first day in pads for the last time.

Let the hitting begin.

# Florida's Special Forces soldiers deploy

**STARKE** — Soldiers from the Florida National Guard's 3rd Battalion, 20th Special Forces Group deployed again to support ongoing combat operations in Southwest Asia. The unit was the first Florida National Guard unit to deploy after the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks and has deployed several times since then, conducting operations around the world alongside its active-duty counterparts.

The 3rd Battalion, 20th Special Forces represents the Florida National Guard as its premier fighting force of highly trained special operators and special operations support soldiers, capable of conducting unconventional warfare whenever and wherever they are required. The 20th Special Forces Group is one of two Special Forces Groups in the National Guard.

Before this deployment, the battalion spent three months training at Camp Blanding Joint Training Center in Starke, Fla. This localized training provided many of the soldiers the opportunity to stay close to their families in the months before the deployment.

"Camp Blanding is right in our backyard," said Lt. Col. Don Lovelace, the battalion commander. "It offered us the ability

to obtain the maximum training value to prepare for combat operations."

"The training has been more detailed, more time-focused, and more equipment, emphasis and money has been focused on this training," said Maj. Scott, a company commander. "Myself and my soldiers are more prepared for this mission we're going to be doing downrange than any other deployment I've been on."

In addition to their grueling training requirements for the National Guard, the soldiers of the 3rd Battalion hold a variety of civilian jobs in roles such as paramedics, policemen, firefighters, doctors, teachers, a banker, students and contractors, according to Lovelace. These civilian skill sets provide a benefit to the unconventional missions they will conduct overseas.

"You've trained well, you've honed your skills, you've met new tactics, techniques and procedures, and you're ready," said Col. Perry Hagaman, commander of the 83rd Troop Command. "Your leadership is confident. They've looked ahead, and they've seen what's come before them."

Many of the soldiers have one or multiple deployments already under their belts. This experience, coupled with the rigorous training requirements of U.S. Army Special Forces, ensures that the soldiers are prepared as much as possible to perform the difficult

missions required of them.

"Many of these soldiers have trained their entire career to conduct military operations when called upon," Lovelace said.

Like any other unit, the soldiers of the 3rd Battalion, 20th Special Forces Group will leave behind their loved ones while they are overseas. The deployment of National Guardsmen affects not only the families, but also the employers and communities where they come from. The Florida National Guard makes every effort to address concerns and make sure families are taken care of through a network of family support groups.

Brig. Gen. Michael Fleming, the assistant adjutant general for the Army, encouraged all families, community members, employers and civic leaders present to continue to show their support for the soldiers throughout their deployment.

"Pray for their safety; pray for their families; pray for wisdom," Fleming said. "Support them and let them know you're there for them."

Already this year, the Florida National Guard has mobilized 13 groups of soldiers for deployments in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom. The Florida National Guard has deployed more than 10,000 soldiers since Sept. 11 while continuing to prepare at home to respond to emergencies.

# Republican field heads to primary

Republican candidates hoping to replace Okaloosa County interim Sheriff Ed Spooner met last Thursday in a candidate forum at Warrior's Hall in Crestview.

Each of the candidates promised to restore integrity and honesty to the department rocked by the 2009 conviction of former Sheriff Charlie Morris on federal charges stemming from an employee bonus kickback scheme.

The field of candidates includes the deputy who turned Morris in to the FBI, a former Okaloosa sheriff's spokesman, a Florida Highway Patrol supervisor, a retired federal officer, a former Fort Walton Beach City Council member and a recently retired Fort Walton Beach Police department captain.

**Larry Ashley**

Okaloosa County Chief Deputy Larry Ashley has worked for the sheriff's office for more than 20 years. He earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a master's degree in public administration.

Ashley first started out in the patrol division, worked

as a K-9 officer and was later promoted to the street crimes division.

Some candidates questioned Ashley's ties to the Morris administration and asked how long he knew about Morris' kick-back scheme before going to the FBI.

Ashley said he informed federal authorities three days after learning Morris was handing out large bonuses to some employees and then asking some of the money be returned.

Sheriff's candidate Ron Livingston asked Ashley how he can assert the institutional leadership of the sheriff's office was not tainted by the Morris scandal.

"The whole reason we are having a special election tonight is because the people inside the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office discovered what happened, investigated what happened and took it to the FBI, the

IRS, the U.S. Attorney's Office, the FDLE and the State Attorney's Office," Ashley said. "Those independent agencies decided who was complicit and non-complicit. But it was the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office employees who brought that to you, the people."

**Rick Hord**

Sheriff's office Sgt. Rick Hord is a former spokesman for the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office who has worked the past couple of years as a patrol division supervisor.

He has a master's degree in public administration. Although much of his career was spent working in the private sector side of law enforcement, Hord said he has more than 21 years experience in the field.

Hord said he volunteered for five years with the Marine Patrol Auxiliary, where he worked his way up

to a rank of major, served as the Okaloosa sheriff's spokesman and was a law enforcement instructor for the state of Florida.

"Every recruit at every academy in Florida studies from the textbook I had a hand in writing," Hord said.

Hord promised to bring a new, refreshing attitude to the sheriff's office.

"The number one reason that sheriff is a great job is because you, the citizens, get to select a role model for every deputy that serves the taxpayers of Okaloosa County," Hord said.

**Ron Livingston**

Ron Livingston is a fourth generation law enforcement officer.

He has worked with the Florida Highway Patrol for 19 years. For the last seven of those 10 years, Livingston has worked as a district supervisor out of the Crestview office, overseeing both

Okaloosa and Walton counties.

Livingston called deputies "the backbone" of the sheriff's office and said he would like to see the administration reduced to put more deputies out in the community.

He said the sheriff's office budget needs to be looked at closely to determine if taxpayers' burden can be relieved.

"The main thing we are going to have to do is to go in and go through the budget line item by line item," Livingston said. "We need to see what can be cut and what is being duplicated."

Livingston said his work as a district supervisor has required him to work with multiple agencies and that he will work to restore the department's image.

"I want to bring some ethical leadership into the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office."

**Steven Menchel**

Steven Menchel is a retired federal agent of 38 years.

He served in the U.S. Army and later worked with the Secret Service at the White House under President Nixon.

He spent 33 years with

the U.S. Customs Department.

"Twenty four of those 38 years, I was a senior executive manager with the government," Menchel said of his time as a federal agent.

"I have been a law enforcement officer longer than anyone on stage and have also been a senior manager for longer than anyone on stage," Menchel said at the forum.

Menchel promised to make the sheriff's office "transparent" and to post the agency's budget online if elected.

When questioned by Hord, Menchel said he does not, however, favor having the Okaloosa Clerk of Courts office serve as the sheriff's finance and payroll officer.

"As a senior manager of over 24 years, I personally feel it is a bad idea," Menchel said. "I have the budget knowledge and the skill to manage my own money."

**Bill Patterson**

Bill Patterson is a former Seat 6 Fort Walton Beach City Council member who resigned June 14 to concentrate his efforts on the

## From trash to water quality

Candidates for the District 4 county commission seat, incumbent Don Amunds and Danny Bennett, faced off at a Thursday night candidate forum in Warrior's Hall in Crestview. They were joined onstage by District 2 county commission hopefuls Elaine Tucker and Dave Parisot.

The candidates began by each addressing the issue of federal nutrient water quality regulations that would be imposed only on Florida and no other state. Troy University educator Dennis Mitchell, who asked the question, noted the regulations would cost the state \$51 billion, including \$300 million in Okaloosa County alone.

All four candidates agreed the issue was one of home-rule and fairness.

"We have to go to battle for our citizens," Amunds said, adding the regulations would make the brand new waste-water treatment plant in the south end of the county obsolete. "Don't pick on Florida," he cautioned federal regulators.

Because Florida is a "receiving state," with many of its rivers being fed by Georgia and Alabama, "If this is imposed on Florida, we get the task of cleaning up water from other states," Parisot said.

While Bennett urged citizens to start calling their state and federal representatives, Tucker, a former county commissioner, reminded voters their water bills could increase eight-fold. "They're going to use Florida as an example," she warned. "What

happens here is going to happen across the nation."

In answer to individual questions:

- Amunds said "absolutely not" when asked if Tallahassee should set growth management regulations for communities. "Property owners need property rights," he said.

- Amunds also defended the new county contract with Waste Management. The county will obtain ownership of a major waste dump from the company as a result, he said. Waste Management also offered the county single-stream recycling, making it easier for county residents to recycle.

- "Waste Management was willing to step up and let us get there on their dollars, and not on tax dollars," Amunds said.

- Addressing the issue of having a family member employed by the county if she was a commissioner, Tucker said it might be a "slight conflict" if the family member were a department head. But overall, the situation could be "a positive thing for the county," particularly if it was her son or daughter, "because I'm a tough mom."

- Asked if she had ever voted for a tax increase while she was a commissioner, Tucker reminded voters, "It takes three votes to get anything done. No single person gets anything done."

The question arose again during the period when candidates could ask questions of each other. Parisot asked Tucker how she could claim not to vote for a higher millage when

Okaloosa County School Board

After a voter meet-and-greet period, last Thursday night's school board candidates' forum began with a brief description by Deputy Superintendent Rodney Nobles of the county's school infrastructure needs that would be addressed by the successful passage of the half-cent sales tax on the August ballot. Critical areas include both technology and physical infrastructure.

"Kids today, when they come to school, we don't need to power them down," Nobles said. "We need to power them up."

Priorities include widening bandwidth and providing more peripherals, Nobles said, as well as addressing aging structures and mechanical systems.

"We have 30 schools that are 40 years old or older," Nobles said. "As schools age, we have to maintain these schools."

Nobles assured voters there is nothing in the

planned sales tax increase dedicated to personnel or salaries. Michelle Styron, a Crestview mother and leader of the WAVE parents' organization, also spoke in favor of the sales tax initiative.

"This really only costs each individual in Okaloosa County \$50 a year," she said. "What we are looking at is mainly taxing tourists. This is a one-time tax."

The alternative, Styron said, could be raising property taxes.

School board candidates were incumbents Rodney Walker (District 3) and Howard Hill (District 5), and Paul Brock and Melissa Thrush. They first explained how they would each fund the needs covered by the half-cent sales

tax increase in the event voters do not approve it.

Each agreed that repairs, maintenance and infrastructure projects would have to be prioritized should the sales tax increase not pass.

"We are working on a contingency plan," said Hill.

"If you don't create a more efficient infrastructure, you will be paying more in the long run," Brock said. "We'll still be limping along and our kids will go to sub-standard schools."

Thrush, an engineer by profession, warned, "A couple more emergency incidents like (the recent failure of the Edge Elementary School air conditioning system) and our funds are depleted."

Addressing individual

questions submitted by residents:

- Walker warned that fewer than 200 student "stations" remain in the north end of the county, while more than 1,200 have opened up in the south end. "We're going to have to close some schools in the south end and build new schools in the north end," Walker said.

- He also denounced the FCAT. "I opposed it when it started, and I still oppose it," Walker said. "Unfortunately, the FCAT became the most important thing in the Florida school system, and I oppose that." The statewide test is also gobbling up too much money, he said. Its price tag since inception has been more than \$5 billion statewide.

- Brock said, "I feel we're in a battle for our culture," citing changes such as renaming Christmas vacation "winter break." "My intention is to place the family, church

## Debate over half-cent tax for schools heats up

With a little more than two weeks until the Aug. 24 primary, debate about the proposed half-cent sales tax to benefit Okaloosa County schools is heating up.

The school board voted 4-1 in late April to put the sales tax question on the primary ballot. If passed, the tax would generate an estimated \$131 million for the district over its 10-year lifespan.

Business leaders' reactions have been mixed. All four chambers of commerce in the county support the measure, while some individual business owners are adamantly

against it.

"There's nothing right now in this market that makes sense about raising a sales tax ... to pay for anything," said Craig Barrett, who is the CEO and a broker of NBI Properties, which manages over 700 commercial properties in Florida. "Don't go and raise taxes on people that are struggling."

Barrett, an Okaloosa County native and graduate of Choctawhatchee High School, said he is all for supporting education, but thinks the school district must trim its budget further to generate the revenue it needs.

"Make the hard choices. You may have to lay some people off, but you've

got to do what you've got to do," he said. "The money's already there to meet all these needs. They've just got to make the necessary cuts."

Local business owners have made difficult decisions because of this economy, he said.

"The county, in my opinion, it's like a child that has never grown up. They keep coming back and asking the parents for more money," Barrett said. "They need to live within their means."

Chad Hamilton, chairman of the board for the Greater Fort Walton Beach Chamber of Commerce, sees the sales tax differently.

"Unquestionably the

need is there, and based on the sources and uses of tax revenues and funding for our schools, this is the only way we're going to be able to make the necessary investments to maintain our facilities and to gain the technology," said Hamilton, a certified public accountant for O'Sullivan Creel, LLP. "I do a lot of recruiting, and one of the things that we make a claim on is we have a fantastic school system ... our school system and maintaining it at a high level is incredibly important for business retention."

The Fort Walton Beach chamber, like others

# Early voting runs through Aug. 21

Early voters can cast ballots at the University of Florida Research and Engineering Education Facility in Shalimar, the Robert L.F. Sikes Library in Crestview and the supervisor of elections office in Crestview.

Eligible photo identification includes:

- a) Florida driver license
- b) Florida identification

card issued by the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles

- c) United States passport
- d) Debit or credit card
- e) Military identification
- f) Student identification
- g) Retirement center identification
- h) Neighborhood association identification
- i) Public Assistance identification

If the photo identification does not include a signature, additional identification with signature is required.

### Florida Election Facts

Florida is a closed primary state. When voters get their ballot for the primary, the ballot will contain only candidates in the party that

they are registered with, in addition to the nonpartisan races. Unlike some other states that have open primaries, Florida voters cannot choose their party on Election Day. Voters registered with no party affiliation will only have nonpartisan candidates on their primary ballot.

Voter Registration for the primary closed on July 26, however, voters can still update their address even at the polling place. The voter must vote in the precinct of their current address.

Voters can now check their voter registration, absentee ballot status and polling place location online. The website address is <http://registration.election.myflorida.com>. in a three-year period she voted "for a tax millage higher than the roll-back rate."

"I never raised the millage rate," Tucker responded. "The millage rate never increased while I was a commissioner," she said, turning the conversation to her aims for improving property values in the wake of the gulf oil spill.

To help alleviate traffic congestion, Parisot spoke in favor of making State Road 85 six lanes wide from State Road 123 to Crestview, four-laning P.J. Adams Parkway and building an interchange at Interstate 10 and Antioch Road.

He also said if any county department was to offer merit bonuses to its employees, it should be done under a written policy and would be a matter of public record.

Spending can be decreased, he said, by consolidating departments, cutting management staff,

reducing the size of the county vehicle fleet, and sharing equipment with local municipalities.

While Bennett agreed consolidating emergency 9-1-1 dispatch service throughout the county might save money, it will

be a matter of gaining the cooperation of the various emergency services agencies. Right now, he said, "local firemen don't agree" with the proposal. "We'll need to get with the fire and police."

Discussing trimming

the budget, Bennett said that "coming from the outside looking in, you can see things that need to be cut, and from a less emotional position." Selling off some of the county's vehicle fleet would be one area he would address.

and schools working together," he said. "I think it's time to push back a little bit" against what he termed "political correctness in our schools."

Brock also supported the half-cent sales tax. "I'm a fiscal conservative," Brock said. "The half-cent sales tax is democratic because it is levied on everybody. Even illegal aliens will pay it."

Thrush, responding to a voter's question, said she, as a mother, approved of teaching sex education in schools, as long as instruction was "age appropriate" and "based on the science of sex education."

She also advocated streamlining school bus routes to reduce unnecessary travel, noting that transportation costs take up a substantial part of the district's budget.

Lamenting the loss of art and music teachers and media specialists, especially in elementary and middle schools, Thrush

promised voters "I am here for the long haul. I will be walking this walk with you."

Hill reminded voters of the "right-size amendment" on the November ballot that will add badly needed flexibility to the class size amendment. The state has so far spent \$16 billion implementing the class size amendment, and "It hasn't really improved students' education."

Hill also reminded the audience that he had voted against putting the half-cent sales tax increase on the ballot because he felt its 12-year duration "is too long." He was in favor of a 5-year tax period.

During the past three years, the school board has made \$304 million in budget cuts, Hill said. Many were based on 44 recommendations made by a citizens' committee, but "each one has a trade off," he said. "You have to weigh each one to see what the trade off is."

in the county, passed a resolution earlier this summer supporting the sales tax after studying the school district's plan for use of the money.

Hamilton said he knows firsthand the importance of the projects. About a week before classes were set to start, the chiller went out at Edge Elementary School, where Hamilton's child is a student.

The district intended to repair the chiller, but the damage was too extensive. Bill Smith, the district's facilities director, said at a workshop Thursday that the district

had to lease a chiller because a replacement will take about three months to make and install. By the time the new chiller is installed at the school, Smith anticipated the total costs at \$600,000 and \$700,000.

During that same discussion, Smith also said that the chiller systems at Elliot Point and Mary Esther elementary schools are on their last legs.

It's situations like those that have pushed parents like Yvonne Freeman and Jessica Jarosz to support the sales tax.

In addition to paying for renovations to buildings,

the tax revenue also will help Okaloosa students keep up with their peers across the county.

"It provides our kids with the opportunity to compete," said Jarosz, who oversees the Fort Walton Beach chapter of WAVE (We All Value Education), which is promoting the sales tax.

The revenue would be used only for capital projects, such as updating technology and infrastructure in the schools, said Freeman, who is WAVE's chairwoman. None of the money could be moved in the district's operating fund.

"I think everyone's concerned about every tax ... but we have to approach it as we have to do something," Freeman said. "If you look at the condition of our schools and look at the ages of our schools, you have to select some sort of option to keep our school district healthy, and this is the best option that we as a community recommend."

Voters approved a 1-cent sales tax for the school district in 1995. The tax generated about \$71.6 million over four years to build Antioch Elementary, David Middle and Destin Middle schools.

Aug. 24 primary.

Patterson, who served 28 years in the U.S. Air Force, moved to Okaloosa County 37 years ago while assigned to Hurlburt Field, and made the area his home.

Among other things, Patterson said he handled special investigations while assigned to the Air Force security police.

He has earned degrees in industrial management, maintenance management, logistics and criminal justice.

"There is no other candidate up here that is going to bring that to you. I am bringing you a very wide, diversified level of experience."

When asked why, when he was recently elected as a council member, he would turn around and run for sheriff, Patterson said serving in the post has been "a lifelong dream."

Patterson, who made an unsuccessful run for sheriff against Morris in 2008, said many questions of impropriety that ultimately led to Morris' arrest were first brought up by him during the 2008 campaign.

"The hardest thing to do at that time was to convince the people of Okaloosa County that Charlie Morris was taking them for a ride," Patterson said.

### Tony Taylor

Tony Taylor retired from the Fort Walton Beach Police Department at the end of July with more than 33 years on the force.

He worked under nine different police chiefs during that time and saw "good and bad administrations."

He worked his way up through the department and held "every rank in the agency."

He retired as a captain, the highest rank in the department short of the chief of police.

As a captain, he worked nine years in the patrol division and two years in support services.

He also served as the accreditation manager for the department.

"I am bringing these 33 years of management experience to you, the citizens of Okaloosa County," Taylor said.

When asked if he would have spent the \$500,000 it cost to get the sheriff's office accredited, Taylor called the amount "an incredible figure."

Without knowing more specifics of how the money was spent, however, Taylor said he could not speak to whether or not the amount was too high.

Taylor called accreditation "a good deal" in general though because it proves a law enforcement agency has set itself to a higher standard.

### DEBATE

At one point during the forum, Ashley was asked

if he would go on record promising that deputies who supported other candidates would not lose their jobs if he is elected.

"No ma'am, I will not go on record promising that," Ashley replied to a panel member posing the questions. "I will go on record promising that those folks that are productive in the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office and uphold the image that I believe the sheriff's office should have (won't lose their jobs)."

Patterson said if he knew about problems with Morris in 2008, others must have known as well.

"If I knew it, then the staff of the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office should know it and they should have done something about it sooner."

Menchel said there is still a problem as the sheriff's office.

"I have been leading the charge to discuss the current corruption in the sheriff's office," Menchel said. "Not the corruption of Charlie Morris but the corruption under the current administration."

Ashley said, however, the sheriff's office is not the same today as it was under Morris.

"I am in the enviable position of telling you all the good things the sheriff's office has done," Ashley said at they start of the forum. "And my opponents are going to try and tell you all the bad things the sheriff's office has done. Remember, this is the new Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office."

Menchel and Livingston both said there are too few deputies patrolling north Okaloosa County and that they would fix the problem.

"The south end of the county has a pretty adequate amount of coverage," Livingston said. "The north end has not. It hasn't for a while."

Ashley said that is not true. He said 55,000 people live north of Shoal River in Okaloosa County and that 135,000 residents reside south of Shoal River.

"We have 23 percent of your sheriff's office workforce, assigned — 55 deputies — to the north end, with 77 percent of the workforce assigned to south end."

Some 37,200 calls were serviced in the north end and 198,000, or 84 percent, in the south end, Ashley said.

"You are privileged to live in a low crime area," he said.

If one candidate earns 51 percent or better of the votes in the primary, that person will move on to the November general election. If not, the two candidates with the most votes will face off in a runoff election.

The winner will face Democratic challenger Brian Sparling, and two candidates with no party affiliation, Cesar Morales and Robert Thacker Jr.

# Well capping brings relief but fear of abandonment

**T**he gusher has finally been beaten back, and from 400 miles up government satellites assure that the oil in the Gulf of Mexico is disappearing. But Dave Marino only wishes he could put that kind of distance between himself and the Deepwater Horizon spill.

As northern breezes drove tides lower in the last few days, temperatures well into the 90s seemed to reliquify the sludge lodged in marshes near Marino's home of Myrtle Grove, La., releasing a steady, black drip from the high grasses. Walking on the beach at Isle Grand Terre, Marino looked back to see oil oozing from his footprints in the sand.

"There's still oil out here," says Marino, a firefighter who runs a charter fishing boat on the side. "It's all over the place. Not much has changed."

But with BP cautiously declaring its "static kill" a success in plugging the once-runaway well, and the Obama administration's claims that crews and nature had taken care of all but a quarter of the estimated 207 million gallons of crude that have poured from the blowout, Marino and others can already feel the nation's gaze turning away.

President Barack Obama and BP have pledged to stay the course until all the oil is cleaned up, all "legitimate claims" are paid and those hurt are made whole.

Still, as Gulf Coast residents pause to think about what they've been through and try to look forward, they can't help but glance over their shoulders.

After Hurricane Katrina in 2005, the country's attention was focused on the region like a laser beam. For the first time in

decades, it seemed that the rest of America finally understood that the slow death of the nation's largest network of coastal wetlands — a death blamed, in large part, on ditches and canals dug by the oil and gas industry — was a threat to them and therefore, something they should care about.

"We all said that that was a game-changer — that things were going to be done differently," says Casey DeMoss Roberts, assistant director of water resources for the Gulf Restoration Network, an environmental advocacy group. "All the disparate interests were going to get together, work together and come up with a single plan."

But the zeal for restoration ran headlong into the great recession. And as the death tolls mounted in Iraq and Afghanistan, banks collapsed and the auto industry teetered on the brink of disaster, people's attention and efforts turned elsewhere, she says.

"And THEN we have the BP disaster," says Roberts. "And again people are saying, 'OK. Now THIS is the game-changer. We're going to get it right with the coast this time.'"

And yet doubts and uncertainties are everywhere.

So much has happened since April 20, when 11 men died in the explosion that sank the Deepwater Horizon 50 miles offshore. All along the coast, residents still reeling from closed fisheries, empty restaurant seats and vacant hotel rooms wonder what, if anything, we've learned from it all. And they worry — that the nation will forget them, that the depths of the gulf may hide far greater damage than BP admits, that a region long admired for its resilience may this time have been pushed beyond repair.

"Katrina wiped out half the parish I grew up in," says Kerry St. Pe', director of the Barataria-



Terrebonne National Estuary Program, whose family has lived along south Louisiana's bayous since 1760. "You can't keep hammering the way people make their livings and how people live and still maintain this culture because people will eventually just give up."

Many have called the spill "Obama's Katrina," and it is unclear what impact the disaster will have on his prospects for a second term. Pundits debate what will happen to oil-industry reform efforts if the spill contributes to a change of guard on Capitol Hill and in the White House.

For those who live day to day, season to season, along the Gulf Coast, though, thoughts are not about an election cycle down the road but on the precariousness of livelihoods and a way of life down here.

And there's another worry that you hear often throughout the region: Will we be forgotten now that the oil's no longer spewing?

"We're happy that it's capped. We're excited to be part of the cleanup efforts to get our lives back to normal. Those are the things we do know," says Kevin Buckle, a 47-year-old Gulf Coast native who works in sales and marketing at Ship Island Excursions in Gulfport, Miss.

"What we don't know is how long oil on the bottom of the gulf

will be washing up and what the long term effects of the dispersant will be ... The other thing we don't know is what BP is going to do..."

Folks don't want BP to go — and yet they are totally fed up with the spill, the cleanup, the disruption of everything familiar. In ways the axed BP CEO failed to articulate, they want their lives back.

"I had a run-in with one of the Coast Guard. He said, 'This is my water out here.' I said, 'No, you're wrong. This is my water. You're just a visitor ... We've been here all our lives,'" says Wayne Eldridge, whose construction company in Bayou La Batre, Ala., has been working on oil spill response.

Mary Scarcliff's thinking kind of goes the other way. The owner of Lighthouse Bakery at Dauphin Island, Ala., who has a BP contract to feed National Guard members working on the coast, trusts BP to do the right thing since the company already is making claims payments. But she is worried about the federal government and general public forgetting what happened once news coverage of the spill decreases.

"If you're not living with it you forget. To the north of us, once the media takes it out of people's faces, they tend to forget," she said. In fact, the evening of the spill story on the evening newscasts of ABC, CBS and NBC dropped after the

oil stopped spewing — from a combined 83 minutes for the week ending July 16 to just 49 minutes two weeks later. Even so, "the cameras aren't going away from this disaster," anchor Brian Williams says in one of the promos NBC "Nightly News" has run pledging not to forget the people of the Gulf Coast.

When the White House oil spill commission solicited public comment, Lafayette, La., crawfisherman and Cajun musician Drew Landry decided to put his in verse. His song "The BP Blues" captures how it feels to be dependent on an industry that threatens to kill the very culture it supports:

"Kickin mud up off a crawfish hole  
"Barefooted with a fishin' pole  
"Goin' back into the oil fields  
"That's the only way to pay our bills."

Landry plans to donate half the proceeds of his recording to organizations working to restore the gulf. He'd like to see locals with cameras and monitoring equipment out there checking on things because he just doesn't trust the government or BP.

"This is just going to be something everybody forgets about. But I'm telling you. People down here ain't gonna let them forget about it. And they're not going to let them just walk on this. It's not going to happen."

## Florida public libraries provide \$8.32 return on investment for every \$1 in tax support

A study recently released by the Haas Center for Business Research and Economic Development, University of West Florida, reveals public libraries return \$8.32 in value for every tax dollar received.

Santa Rosa County sees a return on investment (ROI) estimated at \$17.02. In Okaloosa County, the ROI is \$10.03, according to the study. The ROI figures demonstrate how even a small investment yields an extremely high value for our community. Residents can find Santa Rosa County-specific report information and measure their own personal economic ROI when visiting a county library by using the online calculator at [http://haas.uwf.edu/library/county\\_data/santarosa.htm](http://haas.uwf.edu/library/county_data/santarosa.htm).

Key findings of the study, titled "Taxpayer Return on Investment in Florida Public Libraries (2010)," document that Florida libraries contribute significantly to the Florida economy. Economic benefits extend to job creation, generation of Gross Regional Product, and

personal income. Specifically:

- For every \$3,491 spent on public libraries from public funding sources in Florida, one job (in the economy, not just in libraries) is created.

- For every dollar of public support spent on public libraries in Florida, Gross Regional Product (the value of all goods and services produced in the state) increases by \$10.57.

- For every dollar of public support spent on public libraries in Florida, wages increase by \$22.97.

When visiting their libraries, public library users generate "halo" spending. This is the result of combining trips to libraries with other activities such as shopping, eating at restaurants, visiting a coffee shop, etc. Spending by library users visiting other places during their trips averages \$47.90. Public library users agree the local public library is an essential service to the community. In fact, Florida library users most desire a public library for their street, as compared to a police station, park, job center or elementary school.

The study, conducted for the

Florida Department of State's Division of Library and Information Services, provides an analysis of return on investment at the state level, as well as estimates for individual Florida counties and shows Florida's public libraries ROI increased from \$6.54 in 2004 to \$8.32 in 2008. The report shows both an estimated ROI for each county's libraries, as well as economic impact results for their spending in each Florida county.

The ROI figures range from a rough estimate of \$2.58 for each dollar invested in Lee County to \$30.35 for each dollar in Holmes County. It should be noted that these ROI figures do not necessarily reflect upon the efficiency of library operations in that a lower number is "bad" and a higher number "good." Instead, they demonstrate that even a small investment that keeps a library in existence within a community, no matter that community's size, yields an extremely high value to that community.




