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Budget process going smoothly

Public hearings
to begin Sept. 14

With one more budget workshop tonight before it begins public hearings, the Crestview City Council has less than a month to go before it must pass the city's 2011-12 fiscal year budget. In comparison with last

year's often-contentious meetings and workshops, this year's process has proved relatively smooth and painless, city officials said.

During budget workshops, Council President Charles Baugh Jr. frequently praised department heads for their lean budgets.

On Aug. 24, the council reviewed the budgets for the offices of the mayor and city clerk, as well as its own budget. Personnel and capital outlay budgets were dis-

cussed at the Aug. 31 meeting.

"I have good news, and I have bad news," Finance Director Patti Beebe announced before the Aug. 31 workshop. "Our revenue sharing has dropped approximately 5 percent."

The reduction means city revenues will be decreased by about \$75,000, Beebe said. However, the good news was that the city's employee

Hair feathers the new

Aerosmith rock legend Steven Tyler sported feathers dangling in his hair as he judged the last season of "American Idol." Others say it's a vintage 1970s look returning to the fashion forefront. Whatever its origin, feathers in hair are the hottest new look.

"They're usually rooster or emu feathers," said Laura Wolfe, a stylist at Hello Beautiful Salon in Crestview. "Rooster feathers have been used for making fly fishing lures for years. And we've heard that fishing shops have seen an increase in sales from women and hair salons seeking feathers for hair."

Internet reports indicate that the adage of supply and demand driving prices is alive and well as fly fishing outfitters and rigging shops are scrambling to get feathers for their sport from regular suppliers. Hair salons orders are coming in often and in large quantities. A search on Bass Pro Shops' website showed many fly fishing feathers out of stock or low in stock.

Yes, thousands of girls all over are prancing around with rooster feathers in their hair that were once primarily used as fishing lures. The featherlocks trend seems to have begun in Colorado, where fly fishing is a huge sport, and spread to California and Arizona — and the rest is history.

"Feathers are so hot in the hair right now," April Linton, owner of Hello Beautiful,

Where careers take off

Airports help young
professionals'
futures take flight

Members of the Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce PILOT young professionals committee learned about the importance of both Crestview's airport and the county's commercial airport in the region's economic future. And, they learned, our regional airports are integral to their own professional growth as well.

Okalosa County Airports Director Greg Donovan spoke to the group at its August meeting, sharing updates on airport infrastructure projects and offering a business profile of Vision Airlines, the newest tenant at Northwest Florida Regional Airport, which made VPS its hub.

"From a career standpoint, you are the future of our community," Donovan told the group. "What we are building at our airport system is something you'll inherit."

The ongoing \$22 million in infrastructure improvements that began several years ago at Bob Sikes Airport is preparing the airport, which boasts the region's longest runway, for future growth. Current projects include a new, enhanced storm water drainage system, a tenant hangar, wider taxiways and turns to handle the world's largest aircraft.

A recently announced project to acquire land for a U.S. Highway 90 front entrance for the airport is also picking up momentum, Donovan said. It will facilitate getting large trucks to and from airport tenants and will eliminate airport traffic having to go through residential

By the time this column will be sent to print, I shall be back in France. I flew back to Paris last Tuesday and brought back with me a bunch of tacky souvenirs, a bag of white beach sand and lots of great memories.

The citizens of Crestview opened their arms, their hearts and even their homes to me. I will ever be thankful for that. Throughout my stay, I got to meet wonderful people, thanks to whom I didn't feel too much homesickness.

When you read this

column, I'll probably be having lunch in Paris, enjoying a piece of the French bread I missed so much. But there are good chances I'll also be looking forward to returning to Florida.

health insurance plan will save taxpayers approximately \$150,000.

“Good and bad offset each other,” Council President Charles Baugh Jr. said. “I like that kind of thing.”

Also discussed:

- Increasing the mayor’s travel budget. The unexpected opportunity for Mayor David Cadle to represent Crestview at a defense community conference in Washington, D.C., earlier this year caused his budget to go into the red.

- Training on the HTE system, a recommendation of recent audits of the Utilities Billing department, to facilitate integration of more data into the system from multiple departments, including Public Works.

- Increasing the council’s travel budget from \$5,000 to \$7,500 to cover attendance at the Florida League of Cities and other municipal conferences.

- The need for additional administrative staff in the police department, fire department, Crestview Public Library and Public Works.

- The city’s need for a human resources professional.

“I think the city has grown to a point where we are really lacking in HR expertise,” Beebe said. “I think we need an HR representative more than we need a purchasing person,” another position under consideration.

- Capitol outlay discussions ran the gamut from police cars, library books and improvements to the acoustics in Warriors Hall to lawn mowers and man-hole refurbishment in the sewer system.

During discussion about extending a temporary clerk’s position in the Utility Billing department, possibly making it a full-time position, Council Member Robyn Helt expressed some concern.

“It’s very difficult to remove a position once you have approved it,” Robyn Helt said. “What I’m seeing is once you reach that point, it’s very difficult from a council position to eliminate that position.”

Though departments are operating on “bare-bones” budgets, the council expressed its pleasure that department heads managed to keep within their budgets.

“We’re actually operating 22 percent less next year,” Baugh said.

The first public hearing on the 2011-12 budget will be Sept. 14 in the city council chamber at City Hall.

neighborhoods.

“It was kind of a speed-bump to our development,” Donovan said of the current access, adding that an \$11 million access road project “opens all kinds of doors.”

“We’re putting in the infrastructure to accommodate massive companies to come here,” Donovan said.

Some PILOT members were surprised to learn that their taxes don’t fund the airport improvements he described.

“All of it is money that is generated in the airport system,” Donovan said. “If you’ve not been to the airport, you’re not paying one dime toward what’s happening at the airport.”

Improvements at the county’s commercial airport include four new terminal gates due to open in October, Donovan said. The University of West Florida Haas Center for Business Research and Economic Development recently reported the airport has a half-billion-dollar impact on the region, he said.

Vision Airlines’ arrival in the county has been one of the most significant developments at Northwest Florida Regional, Donovan said.

“They’re willing to take a risk in our community, and what happened with their decision to make us a hub is extraordinary,” he said.

Vision’s cancellation of several of the 23 original destinations it had been serving was a business decision based on demand, Donovan said. If the airline can’t recoup the \$15,000 cost of flying an aircraft to a destination, it made little business sense to keep flying the route.

“It’s kind of like throwing a

party: you hope people will come,” Donovan said. “From a business standpoint, it’s a very, very short fuse when you don’t have a lot of capital.”

Donovan said some of the routes are seasonal, and area passengers need to support their local airport.

“You’re going to see the fleet shift over here again,” he said. “But we need to fill seats. A lot of people say, ‘I was planning a trip.’ But thinking about a trip doesn’t fill seats. Buying a ticket will.”

Crestview’s airport, like its sister facility in Valparaiso, will continue to be a regional economic

generator, Donovan said, and his audience will be part of the region’s growth.

“We’re going to get through these tough times. There’s prosperity ahead of us,” Donovan said. “We need to have more opportunity for career development, and this airport is part of the answer.”

said as she turned to the side to show her own hair. “We can’t keep them in the shop. We have reordered multiple times, and they are so in demand that they are hard to get.”

Customers are straying from their basic haircuts and color services and adding at least one feather to their hairdos.

Hello Beautiful started offering the trendy new look earlier last month. Linton wore two in her chic coiffed hair to the first Thursday Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce breakfast and said she was bombarded with questions.

“People think from a distance that it is a color streak added to your hair,” she continued. “But it is a way to add color and pop to your look without spending a lot of money or damaging your hair.”

The bright, vibrant streaks can be positioned anywhere in a hairstyle. Some customers opt for the nape of the neck, while others have the feathers placed in the front of the hairline like Linton and fellow stylist Amanda Lindsey.

Lindsey applies the feathers one at a time or in multiple selections with varying lengths.

“They can stay in your hair as long as you want; it will just grow out with your hair. You can shampoo your hair with it in place, blow dry it, flat iron it, swim in it — you just have to be careful when you comb or brush it.”

Feathers are crimped in the hair with a special silicone bead. The process is quick, painless and inexpensive.

“They can stay in your hair as long as you want; it will just grow out with your hair,” Lindsey said as she placed a pink and purple feather selection in a customer’s short streaked hair. “You can shampoo your hair with it in place, blow dry it, flat iron it, swim in it — you just have to be careful when you comb or brush it.”

Kaylee Evers, 16, goes to Baker School. “I saw them in my hairdresser’s (Linton) hair and fell in love!” she said. “I love how you can straighten, curl and wash them just like the rest of your hair. They are more practical

compared to streaks in your hair and never fade.

“Recently I have seen a couple friends of mine have them and love them too. This is my first time having them, and it won’t be my last.”

Victoria Grace Hudson, 14, was on vacation in the Panhandle and was spotted with a long azure blue feather on one side of her summer-streaked hair and a long, light yellow feather on the other side. “I love them,” Victoria said, running her hand down one side. “I had a dress in the spring with peacock feathers on it, and I loved it, so when the feathers started for the hair — I had to have one. My mom has a chocolate brown and turquoise one in hers.”

Aubrey Nichols is a varsity cheerleader at Baker and got her hair feathers just in time for back to school. “My mom came home the other day with some, and I had to have them,” she said. “I can’t believe she got them first, but they are cool.”

Linton is ordering local high school colors and collegiate colors for the recently begun football season.

“We will even donate a dollar of every feather sold back to the school of our customer’s choice if they tell us they would like to wear their feather in support of a local high school,” Linton said. “We’re planning a big run on pink feathers during October for Breast Cancer Awareness Month and proceeds will go to that cause as well.”

Linton also said she has seen white feathers in bridal hair updos in place of flowers or a veil and said the look is “amazing.”

Linton said customers are welcome to call ahead for appointments to get the feathers crimped in their hair, or walk-ins are welcome. The salon is located at 650 James Lee Blvd. in Crestview and is open Monday through Saturday.

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VPS upgrades to larger aircraft

July was another strong month for the Northwest Florida Regional Airport as a total of 102,707 passengers flew through the facility. This is a 49 percent increase over July of 2010, and while it did not break the airport's 54-year history as the months of April, May, and June did, it still represented exceptional performance and a continued uptrend for the airport, a press release states.

Delta Airlines recent upgraded two flights from the 50-seat Canadair Regional Jet to 149-seat McDonnell Douglas MD-88 aircraft. The new, larger aircraft offers coach and first class seating, and arrives from Atlanta at 11:22 a.m. and 4:51 p.m. daily, except Saturdays. It departs for Atlanta at 12:02 p.m. and 5:31 p.m. daily except

Saturdays.

A total of 747,625 passengers have utilized VPS since the beginning of the fiscal year last October. The fiscal year-to-date total is 23 percent higher – or 138,889 more passengers – than the same 10-month period for 2010.

“Even though seasonality is always a factor, going into the fall we continue to see high demand for air travel to and from Northwest Florida,” Airport Director Greg Donovan said. “Fares are a tremendous value when compared to driving and we are seeing more and more customers opting for the convenience of using our five airlines to 10 non-stop cities. Now is the time to start planning travel for the holidays as there are some great deals.”

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State updates license process

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) announced on Wednesday, Aug. 23 that an upgrade had been made to its license application process. The majority of applications for food service and lodging establishments can now be completed online.

The upgrade will have a significant impact on the length of time needed to process applications, allowing online applicants to

bypass several components of the paper application system.

“Making the application process easier for licensees and potential licensees will help us keep Florida businesses strong,” said DBPR Secretary Ken Lawson. “The industry asked us to improve this procedure, and I'm pleased our technological upgrades have made this new system possible.”

Applicants for a number of license types will now be able to complete the entire transaction, including docu-

ment submission and payments, online. DBPR staff will be able to receive the entire application immediately, and applicants will receive instant email verification of their application once the transaction has been successfully completed.

“On behalf of the Florida Restaurant and Lodging Association, I want to congratulate Secretary Ken Lawson and the Department of Business and Professional Regulation for their tireless efforts in making the online application process a reality

for our restaurateurs and hoteliers,” FRLA President/CEO Carol Dover said.

Applicants may apply online for all food service, hotel, motel, apartment and rooming house licenses. The department is also offering a complete option for online plan review submission, including the application, fees and all supporting documents.

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Veterans encouraged to apply for disability review

The Physical Disability Board of Review, introduced in 2009, was created to ensure accuracy and fairness to veterans who received a disability rating of 20 percent or less. The board serves veterans who were medically separated from the U.S. military between Sept. 11, 2001 and Dec. 31, 2009.

Since the PDBR began reviewing cases in June 2009, in more than 50 percent of cases, veterans have had their original disability determination upgraded, resulting in a disability retirement for the veteran. More than 77,000 veterans are eligible for the review, but only 2,500 have applied so far.

Veterans who have been medically separated with a combined disability rating of

20 percent or less and have not been found eligible for retirement are encouraged to apply. Former Reserve members with greater than 20 years of total active federal military service yet with fewer than 20 years of active duty and who meet the criteria listed above are also eligible.

Although no guarantee of this re-characterization rate can be made going forward, it is a good indicator of the degree of success applicants have had with the board up until now. If a veteran is awarded a disability retirement as a result of the review process, it might not result in any immediate monetary gain by the veteran (previously awarded payments from the VA and Department of Defense as related to the original disability must be recouped by the

government, prior to new payments being made; but this recoupment is made from the new monthly disability annuity payments going forward). Regardless, from the time of disability retirement award, the veteran becomes eligible for all retirement benefits normally awarded military department retirees (health care, exchange, commissary, travel, etc.).

Upon receipt of a veteran's application, the PDBR will request copies of all applicable VA medical and rating documents, as well as all Military Service Department Physical Evaluation Board related records, including the veteran's Service Treatment Record. The veteran may submit any additional information pertinent to the request with his/her application. The review

is records based only and no provision is made for a personal appearance by the veteran or his/her representative.

How the PDBR operates

The PDBR evaluates and reviews cases for all services (Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, and Coast Guard) and their reserve components. Located in Arlington, Va., the PDBR is a true joint service board (and the only existing joint service disability evaluation and review board). Each case is jointly reviewed by representatives from three separate services (to include the service of the applicant).

The PDBR examines each applicant's medical separation, compares DoD and Veteran's Administration (VA)

ratings, and makes a recommendation to the respective Service Secretary (or their designee) as to whether or not the secretary concerned should change a disability rating (which reflects a more accurate rating at the original time of separation) resulting in the veteran's transfer to the disability retirement rolls.

By law, the PDBR might not recommend a lower disability rating for any rating reviewed. All changes to disability ratings that are approved by the Service Secretary concerned will be backdated and effective the date of the original Physical Evaluation Board.

The PDBR exclusively uses the Veterans Administration Schedule for Rating Disabilities as its adjudication guidance in reviewing unfitting conditions considered by

the Disability Evaluation System — Medical Evaluation Board (MEB) and Physical Evaluation Board (PEB).

If a particular condition was recognized and documented by the Service Department Disability Evaluation System, the PDBR will review it to ensure the veteran was properly credited for physical ailments, which might have caused the eventual medical separation of the veteran.

If a veteran has a condition he/she feels should have been considered by his/her MEB or PEB, but it was not a part of his/her MEB or PEB, the avenue of redress is not through the PDBR, but instead through the Veteran's Board for Correction of Military/Naval Records. Children's book focuses on wounded vets

A special forces soldier, whose buddy came back from a deployment paralyzed from the neck down is writing a children's book about the challenges facing wounded warriors and their families.

The book, focusing on the life story of Chief Warrant Officer Romulo Camargo, an Army Ranger who was shot in an ambush near Kandahar, will be the second in a series by Army Lt. Col. Scott Mann.

Mann, who is stationed at U.S. Special Operations Command in Tampa, was recently on temporary duty to the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) cantonment at Eglin Air Force Base and will be returning to the base in September.

In the military, his job is village stability — teaching rural Afghanis to stand up for themselves against insurgents.

As an author, he focuses on home life of a different sort, helping military children understand what their parents do for a living,

and why.

"My first kids' book, 'Daddy Keeps Us Free,' was based on what my wife calls our shared sense of mission, that this is a family mission we are on," Mann explains. "She took a really neat approach to this with our own three sons, and it really seemed to help them cope."

"Daddy Keeps Us Free," illustrated by Nick Punnell, is available on Amazon.com or Mann's own website, PatriotFamilies.com, for about \$20. Proceeds benefit a nonprofit corporation called Patriot Families that serves military personnel.

"Military deployments are often filled with anxiety, long separation and fear of the unknown," Mann says in a blog on his website. "'Daddy Keeps Us Free' was written to help families cope with the challenges of deployment separation."

After the publication of "Daddy Keeps Us Free," Mann gave a copy to Camargo, who is married and has a 4-year-old son and a teenage daughter.

"Romy was pretty emotional about it," Mann says. "He was touched by

it. He held a fundraiser for us, raffled off a Harley Davidson, and ... donated \$2,000 to us."

He also agreed to be a character in Mann's next book, which will focus on helping military kids with wounded parents. There could not be a better subject, says Mann, who calls Camargo "just a profile in courage."

"I'm not wanting to make any money off the books," Mann says. "We're just trying to pay it forward, using our nonprofit to do good works, helping local wounded guys, providing advocacy and support, and getting as many copies as possible into the hands of deployed families."

"Daddy Keeps Us Free" is geared to children from ages about 4 to 8 and is meant to be read aloud and shared.

"The response we've gotten from other military members has been really favorable," Mann says. "I've had grown men get emotional. So many people can relate to it. We've all been deployed so many times."

"We've seen what our wives and our kids go through. It just strikes a chord."

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An Eagle by the book

Troop 773 produces its latest Eagle Scout

When Richbourg ESE School opened its doors at the start of the new school year, thanks to the work of Crestview's newest Eagle Scout and his team, its teachers were able to draw on a new library of 24 educational books targeted toward their intellectually challenged students.

Kody Lusk, a 2011 Crestview High School graduate, became aware of the need for the educational materials through his mother, Karen Lusk, who is a teacher at the school. Earlier this year Kody was among several CHS chorus members who helped organize a prom for Richbourg seniors.

"The project will benefit Richbourg School because there is currently no library at this newly created facility," Kody wrote in

his project proposal. "The school has no budget for books and high-interest, low-reading-level books are hard to obtain. There is a shortage of appropriate books for use at the school."

For materials, Kody turned to the Tar Heel Reader, a Web-based collection of free books on a wide range of topics for beginning readers. The program is a collaboration between the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill Center for Literacy and Disability Studies and the university's department of computer science.

Six Richbourg teachers chose four books each. The content was dependent on the grade and skill levels of their respective students. Topics included books on the weather, alphabet books, numbers and counting books, as well as directional and life skills books.

"They're low reading level," Karen Lusk said. "In some of the classes, the kids can actually read them. One of the books is on hand washing, so it's direction on how to wash your hands. One of the books I had them do for me was on repetitive lines. It was a book about bubbles."

In addition to hard copies of the books, Kody also presented the school with a flash drive containing digital PowerPoint versions of the books. Teachers can project the books on a touch screen so students can "turn" the pages by touching the screen.

Part of an Eagle Scout candidate's requirements is to demonstrate his leadership skills. While he can plan the project, organize materials, and direct a team of fellow Boy Scouts to execute it, he's not permitted to take part in pro-

ducing the project.

With two computers, three printers and two laminators going at once, Kody supervised two assembly lines as each book's pages were printed, laminated in heavy-weight, washable plastic, and bound with sturdy rings.

"These books are easily handled by the students and easy to maintain for the teachers," Kody said.

"It was really amazing how quickly they got it done," Karen Lusk said. "We weren't sure they were going to be able to do them all."

Kody, whose dad, Kevin Lusk, is an assistant scout master at Troop 773, attained Scouting's highest rank at his Aug. 6 Court of Honor, joining just 2 percent of all Boy Scouts nationwide who attain the rank. Among them is Kody's older brother Kyle. The brothers attend Florida State University.

Guardians ad Litem needed

Many children have been abused and neglected, and there is a shortage of volunteers to protect them.

Beginning this month, the Florida Guardian ad Litem program launches a new approach for its volunteer base of case workers as the program actively recruits volunteers who wish to work as partners.

"Sometimes we have volunteers a little uncomfortable to go into a home by themselves, and if they go into a home with someone, they feel more comfortable," said Gerry Bagley, Guardian ad Litem case coordinator II. Bagley serves the south end of Okaloosa County as part of the 1st Judicial Circuit. The 1st Judicial Circuit covers Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa and Walton counties.

The concept of putting two volunteers on a case isn't completely new in the 1st Judicial Circuit Guardian ad Litem, which has already seen spouses work together.

Because of the success of this, the Guardian ad Litem program will be able to pair other working partners.

Carita Smith, volunteer recruiter for the north section of Okaloosa County, said she sees a benefit to having two people work one case.

"Two sets of eyes are always good on any situation," she said. "Where one may miss one thing that's happening, the other might see it."

Smith not only works to recruit volunteers but also volunteers herself.

The extra time she puts into the program is because of the lack of volunteers. The north end of the county needs 75 volunteers but has only 13.

"We have 200 kids who need a voice who don't have a volunteer to speak

for them," she said.

The Guardian ad Litem program grew out of the need to find stable adult voices for children who have been abused, abandoned or neglected.

In Santa Rosa, Okaloosa and Walton counties, more than 1,371 children are listed in the court system as needing a Guardian ad Litem, but only 765 have an actual volunteer to take the case.

As with any volunteer program, training is required, which is about 30 hours total, spread over a period of time. Training includes two daylong training sessions, about 13 hours of online training and two hours of courtroom observation.

The local offices also pair new volunteers with experienced volunteers through a mentoring program.

Once training is complete, Smith said, the actual time put into a case might come to about six hours a month.

"You are only required to visit your child that you're Guardian ad Litem for once a month," she said. "You can visit more."

Volunteers must be at least 21 years old, pass a background check and be free of felonies.

Smith said potential volunteers are "anyone who has the compassion and the time and who's willing to give that time."

Bagley said the opportunities for volunteers in the Guardian ad Litem program aren't limited to case management. The program needs pro bono attorneys, and volunteers are also needed as office workers or for occasional event planning and promotions.

Planning ahead for college costs

Many parents (and grandparents) are planning for their children to go to college. Making that dream a reality involves financial decisions. The good news is there are several options available. However, the variety of options can also be confusing and raise many questions.

How do you save enough money? What other resources are available? Are there tax consequences to my choices?

Before getting started, remember, financial experts recommend that saving for retirement should be the first priority. Then, if your budget allows, put additional savings into a college fund.

Parents and grandparents can save in many ways for a college education. Some of the options available are 529 plans (including prepaid tuition plans), a Coverdell Education Savings Account, investment accounts, traditional savings and savings bonds.

When selecting a savings option, consider the following: eligibility, contribution minimums/maximums, tax implications, how the money can be used, who controls the money invested and how eligibility for financial aid will be affected.

Two issues to consider are the impact on financial aid and taxes. Students applying for financial aid complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) to determine their eligibility for aid. This considers both parental and child assets. Assets in your child's name will more adversely affect financial aid opportunities

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
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Letter to FAMU riles city council president

Main Street, Historic Preservation letter addresses AlateX plans

Apart from a length of construction fencing blowing down, the AlateX Building sustained no damage from a summer thunderstorm that blasted through Crestview the afternoon of Aug. 22. However, another storm blew up that evening at a meeting of the city council.

Earlier that day, representatives of Florida A&M University had visited the city to inspect the progress of refurbishments that will transform the historic former sewing factory, city hall and police headquarters into the university's Rural Diversity Healthcare Center.

"I had the opportunity to speak with Dr. Marlon Honeywell," acting dean of the center, Council President Charles Baugh Jr. reported. "He was very pleased with the progress on the renovation of the AlateX Building."

Baugh also reported that the community enthusiastically welcomed the visiting educators.

"While they were in Desi's having lunch, word went out that there were FAMU professors in the house, and a big round of applause went up," Baugh said.

Baugh, however, expressed his concern that civic groups were contacting FAMU officials without coordinating their communications through city officials. With construction at

last under way, "I don't want anything to cause a hiccup in this project," Baugh said.

In particular, Baugh was displeased that the presidents of the Main Street Crestview Association and the Historic Preservation Board, former city councilman Ellis Conner and former mayor Jerry Milligan respectively, had co-signed a letter to FAMU President Dr. James Ammons and Director of Governmental Affairs Tola Thompson.

Cal Zethmayr, a member of both organizations, was at the meeting and said the letter merely thanked the school for maintaining the building's historic integrity and requested an existing plaque remain near the entrance. The boards also offered to present FAMU with the gift of a plaque relating the history of the building.

"It's all adding to the great heritage and history of what this town had," Zethmayr said. "It was to-

tally positive in its intent."

Zethmayr's explanation, however, was insufficient for Baugh, who expressed his desire to summon Main Street manager Ryan Arvey before the council to explain the letter more thoroughly. Arvey said he was surprised by the flap, especially given the positive and supportive content of the letter.

"The letter was a thank you letter, a congratulatory letter, expressing our delight with the project and how it is historically sensitive to the building because it is such a significant building to the history of Crestview," Arvey said.

Both Zethmayr and Arvey said the decision to write the letter was "unanimously approved by both the Historic Preservation Board and the Main Street Crestview Association," Zethmayr said.

Both bodies had previously expressed concerns that ex-

terior light fixtures depicted in an early project rendering were historically incompatible with the building. A letter from Arvey requesting the project architect to reconsider the fixtures had also annoyed Baugh.

"I don't want any organization or small group of people sending out letters," Baugh declared. "I don't want anything happening to this project, and I don't think 20,000 citizens (of Crestview) do either."

Council members Robyn Helt and Ben Iannucci said they felt the city council should have been consulted before the recent letter was sent.

"I would think there would be some interaction between the Main Street director and the council," Helt said. "It's a partially city-funded position. We're talking how to work together as a city and be more proactive and efficient and all that."

"They're speaking on behalf of the city, so they should keep the council in on it," Iannucci added.

"One thing Main Street tries to do is reach out and extend the hand of fellowship," Arvey said. "We're all about making partnerships. We anticipate a long-lasting partnership with FAMU. We as an organization are excited that they're coming to Crestview."

The letter

Main Street Crestview Association President Ellis Conner and Historic Preservation Board President Jerry Milligan recently sent a letter to FAMU officials supporting the refurbishment of the AlateX Building. Extracts include:

"Members of both our Boards have reviewed the construction plans submitted to the City of Crestview and we want to sincerely thank you for honoring our community's desire to maintain the property in the physical condition required to continue the building's listing in the National Register of Historic Places as established by the United States Department of the Interior.

"We are very pleased that the appearance of the exterior facades will remain almost exclusively as they are, without the addition of unnecessary ornamentation, such as the light sconces depicted in early renderings. We are also very appreciative of the efforts to save all the original windows, and retain the original arched opening around the front entrance; one of the few distinguishing characteristics of the building. All these efforts will help to preserve the physical integrity of this building and its long standing heritage in the community. This comes as a great relief to many of us who worked long and hard to preserve the building, and we are very grateful..."

"Regarding the historic marker currently mounted adjacent to the main entrance, we respectfully ask that it remain there, rather than relocating it, as depicted in the construction plans. We feel that in its current location it will be seen by everyone that enters the building and may prompt visitors to inquire further as to the history of the building. In light of this, we propose that a separate marker with more detailed historical information be placed at the east end of the building, presented as a gift to FAMU and paid for by our two boards..."

"Over the years this building has provided jobs for thousands of men and women. There are descendants of those people, and even some former employees, who still get together each year for a reunion. We have businesses in our city that would not exist had not someone in the family moved here for a job at the factory.

"Now, as the AlateX Building approaches its 75th birthday, it is truly significant that with the leadership of Senator (Durell) Peaden, hundreds of local supporters, and the vision of FAMU, once again this historic building is going to contribute in so many ways to the prosperity of this area."

Gators dominate South Walton

BAKER — The Matt Brunson era at Baker got off to an impressive start Friday night as the Gators played host to South Walton.

It was a take-no-prisoners performance by the home team as the Gators rolled up 479 yards in total offense on their way to a 38-0.

"Our guys played hard," Brunson said. "We took care of the ball a little better than we did last week (in the Kick-off Classic). We played hard-nosed defense, and it was a big win for us."

Eleven Baker players had at least one carry in a night that saw the offense gain 368 yards

on the ground on 45 carries.

On its first possession of the second half, Davidson moved the ball to the Mustang 1-yard line but was unable to put points on the scoreboard.

Bulldogs drop heartbreaker to Milton

MILTON — In a heavyweight slugfest like Milton and Crestview have become on the gridiron, it usually comes down to who wants it more.

Friday night, it was the Panthers who took the bit between their teeth and fought their way to a 20-14 win over the visiting Bulldogs in two overtimes.





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Want to stock largemouth bass? Learn the rules

Last year, the FWC passed a rule making it illegal to possess or release any kind of largemouth bass in peninsular Florida except pure Florida-strain largemouth.

People often call the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission because they want to stock their private ponds or lakes with largemouth bass. Typically, they want to know where they can get them and what kind of largemouth bass they can legally stock.

The kind of bass depends upon where the stocking will take place. Last year, the FWC passed a rule making it illegal to possess or release any kind of largemouth bass in peninsular Florida except pure Florida-strain largemouth.

The reason for the rule is to protect the genetically pure Florida-strain largemouth bass, also called Florida largemouth bass. This subspecies of largemouth bass is native only to peninsular Florida — south and east of the Suwannee River — and is the cornerstone of the state's billion-dollar black bass fishing industry.

Florida residents who live south and east of the Suwannee River, therefore, should purchase largemouth bass only from aquaculturists, or fish farmers, whose fish have been genetically tested and authenticated by the FWC as pure Florida largemouth bass. So far, only two such fish farms in Florida possess authenticated largemouth bass. To date, no out-of-state farms meet the FWC requirements. The two farms in Florida are Florida Fish Farms Inc. (352-793-4224) and Shongaloo Fisheries (352-468-1251). Both fish farms are registered with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services

and sell authenticated, pure Florida largemouth bass.

Nobody may possess northern largemouth bass or their hybrids south and east of the Suwannee River, so Florida residents should not purchase largemouth bass from the Florida Panhandle or an out-of-state fish farm for transport into peninsular Florida. Panhandle residents (north and west of the Suwannee River) may possess intergrade or hybrid largemouth bass.

The release of nonnative northern largemouth bass and intergrades occurs through stocking private ponds and lakes, but sometimes these fish end up in Florida's rivers and lakes. The problem is that the two subspecies — northern largemouth bass and Florida largemouth bass — will readily interbreed. That's why scientists say that stocking the northern largemouth is a real threat to the pure Florida largemouth.

"Florida largemouth bass are adapted to Florida's subtropical climate and typically spawn earlier in the year than northern largemouth bass. If the northern subspecies or intergrade (hybrid) bass spawn with Florida largemouth, their offspring may inherit genes that reduce growth or survival, and other, less obvious genetic problems," said Brandon Barthel, FWC black bass geneticist. "If enough bass with northern genes

spawn with Florida bass, the unique characteristics of the Florida subspecies will be lost forever."

Anglers come to our state from all over the world to catch trophy Florida largemouth bass, so the FWC is doing everything possible to protect the genetic purity of this ecologically and economically important subspecies of fish.

To help do this, the FWC passed a rule (Florida Administrative Code 68-5.002[r]), which went into effect July 1, 2010, making northern largemouth bass and intergrades (hybrids) of northern largemouth bass "conditional species" south and east of the Suwannee River and banning possession or release in those peninsular areas.

The northern-Florida intergrade cross of largemouth bass can still be stocked in private waters north and west of the Suwannee River, but pure northern largemouth bass cannot be stocked anywhere in Florida. Both "gorilla bass" and "tiger bass" are intergrade crosses of the largemouth bass and cannot be stocked south and east of the Suwannee River.

Violation of this rule is a criminal offense and also may result in federal prosecution under the Lacey Act if fish are transported interstate. Civil penalties may be up to \$5,000 per fish.


