

Airport fly-in supports March of Dimes

Folks dropped in — some of them literally — from throughout the region and beyond last Saturday for Emerald Coast Aviation's second annual Open House Fly-In at Bob Sikes Airport in Crestview. Organizers for the airport's fixed-base operator estimated the turnout at 500 people, including local business and community leaders, along with aviators and aviation fans.

"I am ecstatic with the turnout," Emerald Coast Aviation Vice President Brad Hall said.

In between feasting on a Creole buffet that included gumbo, etouffee and jumbo peel-and-eat shrimp, guests admired aircraft, climbed aboard a Civil Air Patrol plane, browsed tables of information offered by local businesses and community groups, tried out Emerald Coast's Redbird flight simulator and took air tours of the Crestview area.

Next door to Emerald Coast's offices and hangar, the North Okaloosa Fire District displayed equipment, including their mighty airport crash tenders, which periodically rumbled along the taxiway to the delight of guests.

Donations, including fees for the simulator experience and air tour flights, generated more than \$850 for the March of Dimes, a charity embraced by Emerald Coast

Dressed in denim, supporters of Covenant Hospice's fifth annual Blue Jean Ball enjoyed the Saturday evening event at the Crestview Community Center.


The nearly sold-out crowd raised more than \$25,000 for Covenant Hospice, exceeding the goal for 2011.

City lowers millage rate to the lowest it's been in 15 years

The city of Crestview has lowered its millage rate for the first time since 1996.

The millage rate was adopted at a public budget hearing where the Crestview City Council also approved its 2011-12 budget, which is about 1 percent higher than the 2010-11 budget.

Resolutions for the millage rate and budget passed

is reduced from the previous year's 5.8466.

"This is the lowest it's been since 1996," council member Phillip Berezo said of the millage rate.

A final budget of \$34,575,809 was adopted, up from the previous year's budget of \$34,154,606, an increase of \$421,203.

Council President Charles Baugh Jr. brought to the council's attention the outstanding matter of whether some Parks and Recreation department

employees should remain full-time or be reclassified as part-time workers.

Administrative Services Director Mike Wing said the positions in question are a Laborer III and Recreation Aide I who divide their time between the Crestview Community Center, Warriors Hall and the Senior Center, and they also help maintain Spanish Trail Park and Twin Hills Park gymnasium.

Also under question was the status of a Recreation

Specialist who provides on-site staffing for evening and Saturday sports competitions and opens the Twin Hills gym on Fridays.

Wing said demand continues to increase in youth and adult sports programs.

"I need these three positions. I did not ask for any additional positions despite the fact that we have experienced the same growth that everybody else has experienced," Wing said. "I

would be hard-pressed to lose one-third of my work force. I would lose skilled labor.

"I would lose those people, I'm sure. I would not get the same skilled personnel and would have to work them pretty near full-time hours."

Wing said that if it became evident that there was not sufficient work for them to do, the positions could be eliminated as necessary. However, use of the Community Center continues to increase and sometimes work has stacked up.

Council Member Tim Grandberry suggested "we keep an eye on them," and was assured by Wing that recreation manager Chuck Powell has already been instructed to monitor the employees' workload. Wing said he and Powell have had "very frank discussions" about the positions.

"We can discuss it at a later date," Baugh agreed.

"I want (city) employees to feel secure in their work environment, but by the same token, that there is only as much security as

is justified by their performance and their output," council member Robyn Helt said.

"If the activity levels decrease and the staffing levels are not warranted, you have an obligation, and the council has an obligation, to make cuts as needed," she said. "This is the citizens' money."

After the budget was adopted unanimously, the council praised city department heads for their diligence in preparing their budgets.

"You are all to be commended for your work," Baugh said, noting department heads on average turned in budgets only 1 percent above last year's budget, prompting a standing ovation for the department heads.

"I want to echo what Mr. Baugh said to the department heads and thank you for making this budget process go as smoothly as possible," Helt added. "I have seen a spirit of teamwork and camaraderie that is not often publicized in this city."

Coney Island burglarized

The landmark Coney Island Restaurant in downtown Crestview was broken into Wednesday night or Thursday morning.

Crestview city workers discovered multiple packages of hot dog buns, unopened, strewn on the corner of Main Street near Coney Island Restaurant early Thursday morning and called the Crestview Police Department.

Officers arrived and discovered the sliding front pick-up window's glass was broken from the outside.

A burglar had broken the glass, reached in and used a tool the owner

uses to clean the grill to break the remainder of the glass out of the window casing.

"I keep them in this plastic bin to clean the grill and they used them to pry the glass pieces away to crawl in," said Coney Island's Owner/Manager, Julia Phillips.

The burglar cut himself entering the small window and left a blood smear on a baby high chair and the restaurant's back door.

The only thing taken was a coffee pot, which police found near Strickland Tires.

"He crawled in, rummaged through cabinets and the food cooler and left with just the coffee maker and

maybe a single soda," Phillips said. "I have had Coney Island since 1990 and we are a piece of downtown Crestview. This is sad but I am so thankful that we are all right."

No money was taken. Phillips makes deposits daily and said she leaves no cash, checks or paperwork in her cash register, which is in plain sight of the front window.

"I intentionally leave the cash drawer empty and open so that anyone can look in a window and see there is no money locked up in here for them to take," she said. "Last night was no exception."

Coney Island has been open in Crestview since 1947.

For those wondering what all the activity with emergency crews was about in the Garden City community north of Crestview Thursday morning, it was a false alarm.


Sheriff's deputies, fire crews, ambulances and even a helicopter were mobilized Thursday morning in response to a possible shooting that turned out to be nothing.

Crestview house a 'total loss'

An elderly woman escaped unharmed from a Tuesday morning fire that destroyed a Crestview home.

A girl walking by saw smoke and helped the woman out of the burning home located at 227 S. Lincoln Street near the Wilson Street intersection, neighbor Russell McLaughlin said.

"I stuck my head inside to make sure there was no one else inside and saw flames coming from the wall," said McLaughlin, who called the fire department.

The elderly woman, who was not identified, rents the small single-story home and was the only occupant, Crestview Fire Department Assistant Chief

Ralph Everage said.

The Crestview Fire Department was dispatched to the fire at 7:33 a.m. and arrived at 7:35 a.m. The wood-frame house was fully ablaze by the time firefighters arrived.

A downed power line and a 20-pound propane tank engulfed in flames hampered firefighting efforts, Everage said.

Although the fire was knocked down fairly quickly, the small home was a "total loss," Everage said. The damage was estimated at \$65,000.

The cause of the fire is unknown and the State Fire Marshal's Office is investigating, Everage said.

Everage said members of the American Red Cross were called to the scene to assist the woman who lived at the home with immediate needs.

Deputies shutdown Crestview meth lab

Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office deputies responded Sunday to complaints of smoke and strange odors coming from a suspected methamphetamine lab located at 957 B St. in Crestview.

When they arrived at the house, Robert McDonald, 39, tried to run out the back door, but was confronted by law enforcement and went back inside, according to a press release.

Other occupants of the house allowed deputies to enter; however, McDonald could not be found, deputies reported. The occupants told deputies about a trap door in the bathroom, through which McDonald had climbed, that allowed access to underneath the home.

McDonald was seen by deputies under the house, but refused to come out. A sheriff's special response team arrested McDonald after spraying a "chemical irritant" under the house to force him to come out, according to the press release.

While inside the house, deputies saw items used in the manufacturing of methamphetamine in plain view, the press release states. Okaloosa Drug Task Force investigators were called to the scene and obtained a search warrant for the methamphetamine lab.

McDonald is charged with trafficking in methamphetamine, possession of drug paraphernalia and resisting an officer without violence.

Another occupant at the house, Kenneth Ben Williams, 21, of Crestview, is charged with possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) and drug paraphernalia.

Crestview police: Meth lab causes fire

A meth lab at a Crestview apartment complex caused a fire Monday night and led to an arrest.

Eric Wayne Davis, 32, was charged with possession of chemicals used for the manufacture of methamphetamine and possession of narcotic equipment or paraphernalia.

"After the fire had been extinguished by fire crews, it was determined that the occupants of the apartment were in the process of manufacturing methamphetamine," according to a Crestview

Police Department report. "It was also determined that the apartment had caught fire as a result of the volatile chemical process involved in the manufacture of methamphetamine." The State Fire Marshal's Office and members of the Okaloosa Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force also responded to the scene and assisted with dismantling the

meth lab, according to the report. Additional arrests and charges are possible, police said.

Believe in God first and the rest will follow

There is an age old question, "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?" It's kind of a silly debate. If one says the egg came first, the rebuttal is, "Then where did it come from since there were no chickens?" If one says the chicken came first, the rebuttal then is, "Where did the chicken come from?"

Which came first? I don't think it really matters, does it? Will a definitive answer make any difference in the grand scheme of life? I don't think so.

Missouri is known as the "Show Me" state. It is said that people there won't believe anything unless they see it first. In other words, prove it! Let me see it with my own eyes! So another brain twister is, "Which comes first: Seeing then believing, or believing then seeing?" This one is a little trickier. Some things have to be seen in order to be believed. But, the opposite is just as valid: In order to see some things, you have

to believe first.

Most adults want proof. We are taught to explore and examine, to question everything before believing anything. So we do. And as we do, we learn to trust only ourselves and what we can determine on our own. And in so

doing, many desire to make a name for themselves through new discoveries or great accomplishments.

About 200 years ago, there were two Scottish brothers named John and David Livingstone. John had set his mind on making a great deal of money and becoming wealthy. He attained his goal. But under his name in an old edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica, John Livingstone is listed simply as "the brother of David Livingstone."

And who was David Livingstone? While John had dedicated himself to making money, David had knelt and prayed. Surrendering himself to our Lord, he resolved, "I will place no value on

anything I have or possess unless it is in relationship to the Kingdom of God." He dedicated his life to spreading the good news of Jesus Christ in the far reaches of Africa as a medical missionary.

On his 59th birthday, David Livingstone wrote, "My Jesus, my King, my Life, my All; I again dedicate my whole self to Thee." The inscription over his burial place in Westminster Abbey reads, "For thirty years his life was spent in an unwearied effort to evangelize."

We are to look for God in every circumstance, to follow his teachings in every circumstance, to have him be our first thought in the morning and our last thought at night. We are to praise him for who he is, even in times of disappointment, and be genuine with him in times of frustration or anger. We are to worship him for who he is and not simply for what he gives us.

The Shorter Catechism asks a most profound question – and many of you know what it is. "What is

the chief end of man?" The answer? "To glorify God and enjoy him forever."

How do you glorify God in your life? Or do you? Do you give God your heartfelt thanksgiving and gratitude? Do you praise him for the beauty of each and every day, even when the clouds are overhead or rain is falling, or it's hot or cold? Each day is a beautiful day. Each one simply looks and feels different. But the beauty of each day is unmistakable.

Do you approach God for what he can give you? Or for what you can give him? Do your prayers sound only like, "God I want..." or "God let me have..." or "God please heal..."? If so, how do you think your life might change if you were to pray something like, "God you are awesome!" Or "God, I love you," or "God, open my heart so I will be used by you in any way you see fit." Or, "God, I give you my heart and my life."

Do you look at a sunset and say, "Wow! Mother Nature painted a great picture!" Or do you whisper a prayer of awe, "God, thank

you for this beautiful sky?" Do you look at a flower in your garden and say, "Look what I was able to produce." Or do you say, "God, you have created a work of beauty."

When you seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, everything else falls into proper perspective. Your life becomes centered on God. And then you are able to do as God desires. And what does the Lord desire from us? As the prophet Micah said, "to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God."

When you believe God exists, when you believe he is your creator, when you believe God has laid claim to who you are, when you believe that God is intimately involved in your life, it is then you will recognize his handiwork in the world, in other people, and in your life.

I believe we have to simplify our approach to God. We need to get back to basics. We need to put away any and all efforts to impress others — or ourselves — and

stand before God with the openness and simplicity of a child.

Will you let yourself believe in God wholeheartedly? Will you look at the wonders of this world and recognize God made them? Will you look at other persons and realize they, too, were wonderfully made?

Which came first, the chicken or the egg? Doesn't matter. Which first causes a life to radically change for the better: God proving himself, or you believing in him?

Believing in God. This is what comes first and foremost.

LAUREL HILL CITY COUNCIL

Council re-elects chairman, vice chairman

At a Tuesday night meeting, the Laurel Hill City Council voted to re-elect Larry Hendren as the council chairman.

Betty Williamson was re-elected as vice chairman for another term. Both votes were unanimous.

In other matters, the city's water improvement grant deadline of November 2011 was extended through January 2012. The new deadline will allow Auburn Water Systems Inc. to continue installing 568 new water meters. As of the Tuesday meeting, 306 meters had been installed.

Additional discussions included the cost of crossing Millside Road Bridge with water lines. The council will seek three bids.

"In budget planning, we discussed financial planning and preparing for the EAR due in June of 2018," Hendren said. "I recommend that we set aside \$4,000 per year in a money market certificate of deposit to pay the \$28,000 when it comes due. We will put the 2018 council in a better financial shape than we started in."

Hendren's motion carried unanimously after a motion by council mem-

ber Robby Adams, with Williamson seconding.

In other city council matters:

- Monthly internal audits continued with zero discrepancies in the general fund or the water fund reviews.

- Employees are now working a regular 40-hour workweek with the exception of the two clerks who opted to stay on a 36-hour workweek. They were given a 3 percent pay increase, with an increase in their vacation and sick leave accrual.

- The council voted to adopt wording for a draft copy of a personal code of conduct/ethics for city employees and council council member Willie Mae Toles voted against the motion, but the majority carried.

- Two delinquent water billing accounts are left from the 12 discussed at a previous meeting.

- The council discussed drafting a standard operating procedure for returned checks on water accounts.

- Joe Jones' contract to conduct the end-of-the-year audit was extended.

- Gulf Power is installing streetlights on New Ebenezer Road on every other pole in the existing curve near the recreation park.

- The council meets again Tuesday, Nov. 1, at 6 p.m.

set.


With Woodward in
