Okaloosa's first avionics shop

Company shifting operations to Crestview

Capital Avionics aircraft services operation is already working out of rented hangar space next door to Emerald Coast Aviation. By Nov. 1, the airport's newest tenant expects to have its component repair division moved to Crestview Bob Sikes Airport from Tallahassee Regional Airport, the company's manager of business operations Peter Mohylsky said.

“It is going to be a great opportunity,” acting airport manager Mike Stenson said. “For the first time, we’re going to have an avionics shop in Okaloosa County. It’s a very desirable service that eventually all airplanes need and we’re very happy

we’re going to offer it out of our airport. It’s a very specialized industry.”

Founded in Tallahassee in 1978, Capital Avionics became increasingly frustrated with the business environment at Tallahassee Regional. Company owners began talking with Okaloosa County officials about

Crestview teen crowned Miss Florida Teen USA

Crestview resident Gracie Simmons brought home the title of Miss Florida Teen USA Oct. 1. The blonde haired, blue-eyed 16-year-old girl was chosen out of 58 contestants in Hollywood, Fla.

Wearing a bright fuchsia one-shoulder dress with fabric rosette corsage, she beamed from her family's dining room table as she talked about the pageant and her new tiara.

“I like challenges,” she said as she flashed a bright smile and wrinkled her nose. “I

thought this would be a great challenge so I set out to win.”

The Miss Florida Teen USA competition is the pageant that selects the representative for the state of Florida in the Miss Teen USA pageant. Scheduled for the summer of 2012, pageant owner Donald Trump has not announced the location for the nationally televised event.

In Gracie's first pageant, the crown did not come home with her.

“I was first runner up in Junior Miss Crestview,” she said. “I was Miss Spanish Trail and Miss Sweetheart. Then I went out for Miss Pensacola

Teen USA.”

After winning the Miss Pensacola Teen USA title, Gracie advanced to the national pageant, where she was among the top 15 contestants.

In January she won the first Miss Fort Walton Beach Teen USA pageant, giving her another opportunity to compete for the state title.

Gracie credits Gowns and Crowns owner, Cy Frakes, in Columbia, S.C., with her win.

Locations for defects may include roof downspouts, uncapped cleanouts, driveway drains, stairwell drains, yard or area drains, window well drains, foundation-perimeter drains and defective service pipes.



have to commit to do to prepare for that time with the judges and on that stage," Gracie said. "Cy is great with interview skills, and stage fright, and all the things only she thinks about."

Gracie's father, Vernon Simmons, said he is not surprised at his daughter's success in the pageant and that he and his wife, Dresden Simmons, "saw something" in their daughter years ago.

"She has an amazing drive to obtain her goals," Simmons said. "We have no doubt she will be successful in whatever she does."

"I spoke with the judges after she was crowned and I just asked them, 'Why Gracie?' They told me she made them laugh in the first moments of her interview and was on their radar after that."

Gracie is a straight-A student home schooled by her mother and will graduate next May.

She is a typical girly-girl who enjoys the beach, tanning, getting mani-pedicures, and shopping. Math is her favorite subject. She loves movie nights, and Auburn University home football games.

She believes Facebook should be for communicating with friends and not cyber-bullying. She describes herself as "quirky, spontaneous and caring" and has been a volunteer for several nonprofit organizations.

Gracie and her twin brother, Boomer, work part-time for their father, who owns Passport America in Crestview. However, she is quick to tell you that she is not allowed to answer phones because her brother is much better at that than she is.

And she loves beauty pageants.

"Did I tell you they are going to make a Barbie Doll that looks just like me as one of the pageant prizes?" she asked. "When I played with Barbies as a little girl I could only have wished for that!"

Gutierruz was attending his first festival, but it didn't take long for him to catch the spirit of the event from his booth that included pieces of cut cedar, a variety of trinkets and some watermelons.

"It is very invigorating and exciting," he said. "It is nice to meet the people."

Gutierruz said the cedar pieces have a variety of uses from paper weights, to napkin holders or even drink coasters.

Directly across from Gutierrez both the Laurel Hill School junior class had its annual booth where people pay to rub a whip cream pie in the face of a class member.

Tyler Grezlik didn't mind doing his part and then some. By 11 a.m. he had taken an estimated 30 or 40 pies in the face.

"It's just fun to have people put pie in my face and raise money for the junior class." He said. "It

gives me something to do on a Saturday."

Class sponsor Neisha Williams said a student came up with the idea about three years ago and they've been doing it ever since.

"The first year we did it we raised \$125," she said. "As for the things we do, this is one of the better ways to raise money."

The Rev. Mike McVay, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Laurel Hill, has embraced the hobo role and has dressed the part at school athletic events and community activities for the last five or six years.

McVay pointed out that the first hoboes were known as homeless men who traveled from town to town helping others.

"By definition, Jesus was the first hobo," McVay said. "He was homeless and he went about helping folks and doing good and that's

what a hobo is all about.

"I guess my motive (for getting in costume) is to try and teach people what a hobo really is. They are not bums; they are hoboes. I'm proud to be a hobo because I know what a hobo is."

And it is in that true hobo spirit that people return each year to the Hobo Festival.

"For Laurel Hill it's probably one of the biggest times for people to come together and see one another and those that they haven't seen for awhile," McVay said. "They visit and have a great time while they are doing it. It's an opportunity for a lot of people to further their cause (raise money)."

"We've got a lot of school functions going on today trying to raise money for their particular department or whatever. It's a good time."

moving to Crestview after meeting at the Maintenance, Rehabilitation and Overhaul trade show in 2010.

After the Tallahassee airport was privatized, a small group of businessmen forced out most private companies except his, President Al Ingle explained to the Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce Airport Committee. Ingle said he has been impressed by the hospitable reception his company has received locally.

"This is such a different environment than Tallahassee," said Ingle, who founded the company at age 24. "It is so nice to be wanted."

"Tallahassee is not an aviation town," Capital Avionics comptroller Donna Ingel said. "It's a government town."

For the component repair operation moving to Crestview, the company hired a local technician, Dan Smith, who is currently training at the Tallahassee location. Mohylsky said 14 employees of the division will move to Crestview, and a further six to 10 will be hired once the division is operational.

Before Capital Avionics' third phase, test equipment manufacturing, can move to Crestview, additional space will

be needed, Donna Ingel said. Currently that division is in a 10,000 square-foot hangar, and no comparably sized facility is available near the airport.

Stenson, who is also county airports business development manager, said the test equipment manufacturing facility might be located off of the airport. Capital Avionics has been looking at property in the nearby Okaloosa County Industrial Air Park as well as in Crestview itself, he said.

"That component will stay in Tallahassee for now; then we will build a building big enough so we can be all under one roof again," Donna Ingel said. "For now, all the techie stuff is what's moving over there to Crestview."

Meanwhile, Okaloosa County Airports staff members, airport supporters from the Crestview chamber of commerce, and Emerald Coast Aviation staff are preparing to represent the county's airports at the upcoming National Business Aviation Association conference. After attracting Qwest Air Parts and Capital Avionics during previous trade shows, they hope to hit another home run.

"Hopefully we'll be three-for-three and we'll bring back another company this year," Stenson said.

FESTIVAL HIGHLIGHTS SOUTHERN HERITAGE

The clang of a hammer on anvil rang out deep in Blackwater River State Forest Saturday morning as the smell of kettle corn wafted over Krul Recreation Area.

A loud boom from a Civil War-era cannon startled many and signaled the beginning of the Munson Community Heritage Festival, a two-day annual event that ran through Sunday celebrating life in the Deep South prior to the Industrial Revolution.

Located in northern Santa Rosa County off of State Road 4, the festival draws people from throughout Northwest Florida and lower Alabama.

"It is a way to show people a lot of stuff from the past and how life used to be in the old days," festival volunteer Jimmie Ates said.

Booths and displays ringed the spring-fed lake at Krul Recreation Area, with demonstrations in shoe cobbling, wood-fire cooking and hide tanning, to name a few.

At one booth, men and women in period-correct uniforms weaved baskets. Nearby, a man stirred clothes in a cast-iron pot over an open fire, dropping lye soap in the steaming hot water.

Munson resident Malcolm Reed, 65, was boiling sugarcane juice in an 80-gallon kettle.

Slow-cooked, the two truckloads of sugarcane Reed started out with would produce about 5 gallons of cane syrup by day's end.

Reed's family has been making cane syrup for as long as he can remember, and up until last year, he used to do it pretty regularly himself.

Now Reed only makes cane syrup for special events, mainly to share his knowledge with children.

"That's the only reason I do it," Reed said. "Sugarcane was used in so many ways. As a sweetener and for baking; for breakfast, we used to have biscuits, syrup and a piece of meat."

A recurring theme amongst the demonstrators was how hard people once had to work to provide basic necessities.

Crestview resident Peyton Knight, 6, found that out first hand when he partnered up with Ates on a two-man crosscut saw, grimacing as they ripped through a 9-inch log.

"That's a lot harder than I thought it would be," Peyton said.

Raymon Melvin displayed hand-made tools and drinking cups, each of which required time and effort to make. There were iron axes, fashioned on a forge with fire and a hammer, homemade knives and hand-carved wooden bowls.


"It's my way of showing people how hard people had to work back then," Melvin said.

When life gives you plums... have 50 friends over to crush them!

A Sept. 19 semi-trailer wreck on Interstate 10 near the Holt exit was bad news for the driver, but turned into a bounty for Okaloosa County's only licensed winery.

"I got a call from a friend who tipped me off about a bunch of fruit that had been hauled in to the salvage yard in a totaled out semi," vintner Nathan Boyles said. "I looked in on it and was able to acquire 2,000 pounds of Angelo plums at a heck of a price, though the boxes were a bit dented."

Boyles and his wife, Crystal, are proud that the fruit wines produced at their Yellow River Vineyards at Wilkerson Bluff are made from fruit grown by local Northwest Florida and Southern Alabama farmers. However, a truckload of plums, even from California, was too good of a find to overlook.

"We'd like to make it as a special edition, seeing as how the fruit is not local," Nathan Boyles said.

On Sept. 23, the Boyles invited friends and family to an evening "plum crush," and wound up with more than 50 people of all ages helping pit the plums and feed them into the hand-cranked crusher and fruit press.

"We hope to have the plum wine in the sweet Japanese style ready by early March," Nathan Boyles said. "Our strawberry and peach wines are bottle-ready and we hope to release them for sale in early November, just in time for the holiday season."

Boyles said he and his wife also have a blueberry vintage fermenting in one of their giant vats next to a vat of plum juice that will soon be turned into wine, a positive outcome for an unfortunate accident.

"When life gives you plums... make wine," Boyles said with a grin.



Contest focuses on school robotics and food contamination

First Lego League introduces younger students to real-world engineering challenges by building Lego-based robots to complete tasks on a thematic playing surface. FLL teams, guided by their imaginations and adult coaches, discover exciting career possibilities and through the process, learn to make positive contributions to society, according to a press release.



Special Forces to host open house

EGLIN AFB — Residents will get a peek into the world of the Army 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) on Oct. 14 when it opens its gates to the public.

"This is going to be a rare opportunity for the community to come out," said Maj. James Brownlee, a spokesman for the Special Forces Group.

He said the group will

have security in place but give non-military access to most of the 350-acre cantonment.

Activities begin with an invitation-only ribbon-cutting ceremony at 9 a.m., when bands from Niceville and Crestview high schools will perform.

Gates will open for the general public at 10 a.m.

The troops will offer tours, demonstrations and displays. Officials suggested bringing sunscreen and strollers for

the all-day outdoor event.

Dining facilities will be open. Brownlee said the menu would include everything from barbecue to seafood for \$4.25.

The event marks the completion of the BRAC-initiated move from Fort Bragg, N.C., to the group's new home at Eglin Air Force Base. The Army made its Sept. 15 deadline to relocate most of the 1,800 personnel associated with the unit.

More than 4,000 people

(1,650 military personnel and 2,370 dependents) are now Northwest Florida residents. That includes nearly 1,000 Army families.

"... When you add in the 4th Battalion, we're going to gear up 2,200 (personnel)," Brownlee said.

The arrival of the new battalion and regional support detachment are not related to BRAC, but was initiated by the Army Special Forces Command. Barracks for the 4th Bat-

talion are still under construction.

Brownlee said unmarried soldiers who are E-5 (sergeant) or below are required to live in the barracks. About 100 soldiers occupy the three completed barracks.

In addition to the barracks, a new shoppette, medical center, convenience store, gas station and barbershop are still under construction. Workers also recently broke ground for the chapel.

Brownlee said construction of the cantonment cost \$500 million.

Soldiers are still settling in to the area and finding their way around. Brownlee found his waterfront home in Cinco Bayou and said it was an enjoyable move.

"The majority of people are not only glad we're down here but they love it," he said. "We've had a lot of help because everybody has bent over backwards to help."

Crestview veterans parade: 'This event will probably be cancelled'

A lack of interest in Crestview's annual Veterans Day Parade has prompted organizers to consider cancelling this year's event.

"Normally, at this time, we have standing room only," said Fletcher Williams, chairman of the Crestview Veterans Affairs Committee.

The parade is scheduled for 2 p.m. Nov. 12 on Main Street. It has drawn only five participants - the Baker and Crestview high school bands, Okaloosa

County Commissioner Wayne Harris, Okaloosa County Veterans Services Director Beatrice Love-Moore and a local cleaning company.

"I'm kind of disappointed," Williams said. "As of the 30th of October, if we don't have enough participation or interest, this event will probably be cancelled. It will be a pity."

Applications have been available to community groups for a few weeks, but Williams isn't getting the usual response.

"This may not be one of their top priorities," he said.

Williams, who retired from the Air Force in 1988, said the Crestview community owes it to local veterans to keep the parade going.

"Without (veterans) these types of events probably wouldn't be able to happen," he said. "We need (people) to come out and participate. If you want to come out and distribute candy to kids; if you want to come out and put a magnetic sticker on your car ... that's fine."

The point is to honor the "brave men and women died for our freedom," he added.

"Freedom is not free, you know," Williams said. "These men and women sacrificed their lives, and those in Iraq and Afghanistan are still sacrificing today."

Mary Esther officials hold an annual Veterans Day parade and say this year's interest is on track. The parade, which usually features about 30 participants, will be held Nov. 11.

"Ours is small. We go around the circumference of the mall," said City Clerk Tammy King. "There's no cost and we welcome anyone."

school perfectly fits the service organization's motto of "Serving the Children of the World."







Vikings' backup quarterback Blake James hit Marquese Davenport on a quick screen that the sophomore wide out quickly turned into a 12-yard pickup. Two plays later, James found running back T.C. Carter along the Viking sideline for a juggling 22-yard catch as he fell out of bounds.

Two straight incomplete passes followed before James, who completed 11 of 23 passes for 189 yards, went to Carter again, but this time the Viking running back couldn't come down with the ball in the Fort

On Friday, the Gators (4-2) hope to end a two-game drought on the road when they travel to Sneads to take on the Pirates in a 7 p.m. game.

Baker is coming off a heartbreaking 17-14 overtime loss to Freeport in its District 1-1A opener, but the Gators are still in the playoff hunt as they step out of district play against a 4-2 Sneads team.

Gator coach Matt Brunson tried to take the loss to Freeport in stride as the Gators prepare for the Pirates.

"I am proud of the way our guys played (against Freeport)," he said. "We battled to the end. It was a very close, hard fought game, but the bottom line is we turned it over (with two costly fumbles).

"Every time we got in the red zone we needed to get points, but we didn't, and that was probably the difference in the game. We lost on the road at Bonifay (Holmes County) and on the road at Freeport, so our goal this week is to win a road

game."

Brunson was very pleased with how the Gator special teams played, with kicker Malcolm Griffith and punter Cody Nixon both having big games.

"We got our extra points down and our punter averaged 50-something yards a kick," he said. "Our coverage was awesome. Our kicking game was as good as any game I've ever been a part of."

Although the Gators have lost their last two road games, they do have one road win to their credit.

Bulldogs, Indians renew rivalry

Crestview and Choctawhatchee renew their football rivalry Friday night at Jack Foster Stadium after a two-year hiatus, with more than county bragging rights on the line.

Friday's game, which kicks off at 7 p.m., shapes up to be another do-or-die battle in the tough District 2-6A.

In their last meeting in 2008, the Indians beat the Bulldogs 31-28, and Friday's game should be another classic.

Both the Bulldogs (3-3, 1-0) and Indians (3-2, 1-1) are coming off exciting district wins last week. Crestview edged Fort Walton Beach 13-9, and Choctaw outlasted Navarre to take a 50-47 district win.

Crestview coach Kevin Pettis believes the Bulldogs will have their hands full with a strong Indian squad.

"They are a good football team," he said. "Coach (Greg) Thomas does a fantastic job.

"I like that quarterback (Luke Clark). He does a good job. The fullback and tailback, they both do a great job too."

Choctaw runs a multiple pro-style offense that incorporates everything from a Power-I formation to the spread.

Defensively, the Indians will line up in a stack four, using four linemen, four linebackers and three defensive backs.

Pettis said a four-man front can present unique challenges for his offense.

"The problem with the stack four is it covers our center and our guards," he said. "It takes the pull (plays where the offensive linemen pull to block) out for us because we like to pull our guards, but now it takes it out of our repertoire."

"Because they are in a four-four they can adjust to any offense. That's the beauty of the 4-4 is the offense can't formation you to death."

Crestview's defense runs a 3-4 using three down linemen so the Bulldogs don't get to work against the even front much. Fortunately for them, Fort Walton Beach ran a four-man front, and the Crestview players have a better understanding on how to attack the defense.

Telling fish tales

Charter fisherman visits outdoor education class

If students in Crestview High School teacher and coach Ernie Martin's outdoor education class have a better grasp on the differences between a Kahle hook and a standard J-hook, they have Capt. Phil Rooks, a Destin charter fisherman, to thank. He was the guest instructor in Martin's class on a recent morning.

The popular course covers a variety of outdoors topics, including fishing techniques. Rooks, whose 20-foot center console boat "Fish Finder" prowls the coast's inshore waters, shared tips and exhibited equipment for catching the big ones that frequent the shallows around Fort Walton Beach and Destin.

Rooks' and Martin's enthusiasm for the sport was contagious, making for a lively period. Both men bounced commentary off one another as each dove into a selection of tackle boxes to display favorite lures while holding aloft fishing rods and extolling the virtues of different reels and line.

Holding up a drink koozee, Rooks asked the class, "Know what this is?"

Before they could answer, he'd flipped it on its side so students could see a spool of fishing line nestled snugly inside the stretchable material.

"This way you don't have line all over the boat," Rooks explained. "And you can pull out just the amount that you need."

"Write that down for me," Martin commanded his students. "That is a great tip."

"Anytime you're trying to contain line, this works," Rooks said.

Rooks, a professional fisherman and fishing guide for nine years, said fishing runs in his family. Rooks Bluff on the Yellow River is named for his kin, he said. He got into the sport around the tender age of 4.

"My daddy used to tie a rope around my waist and tie the other end to the seat," Rooks recalled, "so if I fell overboard, he could just pull me in."

Of the 17 students in the class, nearly half were girls, and when it came to peppering Rooks with questions, they were no less inquisitive than the boys. One asked if, considering her smaller stature, would she be better off using a shorter rod.

"For pure leverage, a shorter rod is better than a longer rod," Rooks advised. "But longer rods give you distance in casting."

A boy asked if a Bimini twist knot was good for tying on lures for local fishing.

"I don't use it," Rooks said, but added it's a popular knot with a TV fishing personality. "Mark Sosin uses it because it's 100 percent knot, but it has a double loop, and fish around here can see so good, they can even see a single loop."

Catching the fish is just part of Martin's class. Soon his students will learn to

clean, fillet and cook them, for which Martin will turn to his colleague Paula Knight, instructor of the CHS culinary arts program, who will share her skills with the kids.

Outdoor education also includes a segment on orienteering — using a map and compass to navigate — as well as a "smart boating" segment that teaches vessel safety. Martin proudly said that 300 of his former students have been registered with the Power Squadron safe boating program thanks to the class.

"We're the only school that has that class offered," Martin said. "That's really shameful because Florida has the highest percentage of boating accidents in the country. We thank (school district superintendent) Dr. (Alexis) Tibbetts and the administration for allowing us to do this. It can save these kids' lives."

There's a new trophy on display at Foxwood Country Club.


A shiny silver bowl in the clubhouse commemorates Foxwood's victory over DeFuniak Springs Country Club in the inaugural Challenge Cup last month.

Make your voices heard on redistricting

Floridians have been turning out in droves at recent public meetings across the state. Surprisingly, the topic that's attracting heated comments and widespread media coverage is one that some might see as boring: redrawing voting-district lines, or redistricting.

Once every 10 years, Florida lawmakers must redraw congressional and state legislative districts using new census data. Voting district lines are important. Draw them fairly, and no political incumbent or political party gains an unfair advantage. Draw them unfairly, and politicians get to choose their voters. Bizarrely shaped districts can skew elections long before any candidate qualifies for office.

In November 2010, Floridians voted 63 percent to 37 percent for two new constitutional amendments intended to make Florida's legislative and Congressional voting districts fairer and more representative of Florida

communities.

Amendments 5 and 6 — approved by voters by nearly 2-1 last November — are intended to ensure that districts will not be drawn to favor or disfavor one candidate or party, and to ensure minorities an equal opportunity to participate in the political process.

But enacting the amendments was only the first stage of a two-year process in redrawing voting districts.

Next, lawmakers have to draw the district maps. Over the past few months, as part of Florida's redistricting process, lawmakers held a series of hearings across the state to gain input from its residents.

AARP members and representatives of other groups are voicing a big concern at the hearings: Legislators have not provided draft maps for the public to comment on. Without maps, AARP volunteers and members say, it can be difficult for residents to understand what districts might be created.

Meanwhile, legislators

also set an initial timetable that left the drawing of maps for late in the 2012 legislative session — too late for would-be candidates to understand the districts they might be running in.

Pointed criticism seems to be having an impact. Legislative leaders are now talking about providing maps at an earlier point in 2012, so members of the public can see what's in the works.

Meanwhile, AARP urges you to take an active role in choosing your elected officials. For more information, please go to www.aarp.org/fl or visit www.floridaredistricting.org. You also should call your local state representative or senator to urge them to adopt voting districts that allow voters to choose their elected representatives — not the other way around.

Sludge-area residents should be concerned

Residents of Baker are fully justified to be

concerned about sludge being dumped in their neighborhood.

The Federal Clean Water Act defines sludge as a pollutant. The National Academy of Sciences warned that the U.S. rules governing the land application of this contaminated waste is based on flawed risk assessment models, out-dated science, or no science at all.

Major food processing companies like DelMonte, Heinz, and Western Growers do not accept produce grown on land that has been treated with bio-solids. Evidence is mounting that this controversial practice does not protect human health, livestock or the environment. Every month, every Florida business, institution, hospital, metal plating shop, and superfund site, is permitted to discharge 33 pounds of liquid hazardous waste into sewage treatment plants.

Here, these and thousands of other pollutants are removed from the wastewater and concentrate in the resulting bio-solids. Treating sludge does not remove most of these pollutants. Odor from sludge is not just a

nuisance or vector problem; it can signal the presence of endotoxins and airborne pollutants that have caused serious respiratory illnesses of sludge-exposed neighbors in 24 states.

For several decades the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Rufus Chaney of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and state agencies have worked with the bio-solids industry to cover up the many reported adverse incidents linked to sludge spreading. Instead of tightening the U.S. regulations to make the practice safer, federal bio-solids managers are using

tax dollars to persuade farmers and the public that the practice is safe.


Last month Lake County commissioners voted five to zero not to grant a conditional use permit to a company that wanted to build a sludge facility in a rural neighborhood. Okaloosa County commissioners might want to follow suit.






