Incubator RFP to be revised, reissued

Twin Hills Park bridge replacement also authorized

The Main Street Crestview Association committee tasked by the Community Redevelopment Agency to evaluate applications to the new business incubator

program recommended rejecting the three applications it had received and rethinking the criteria before accepting more applicants. The program will offer a start-up company subsidized office space and business development assistance for one year in exchange for the new company's promise to

locate to the CRA district after the year-long incubation period. Committee chairman Mike Roy reported the committee met Dec. 21, reviewed the three applicants and could not recommend any of them to be the first incubator company. 'The applicants were disappointing,' Roy said. 'None had a business plan, one did not meet zoning requirements, one wanted to redo plumbing in the incubator building and one did not give a thorough explanation of what their product was.'

FIXING AN ICON

Coney Island hopes Baker School welder can repair burger grill

When cracks appeared in the 40-year-old hamburger griddle at Crestview's landmark Coney Island hotdog restaurant, finding a replacement proved problematic. Owner Julia Phillips has hinged her hopes on Baker School's welding instructor, hoping he can save the unit — and her burgers' signature flavor.

The secret behind those renowned Coney Island burgers, Phillips said, is the "seasoning" in the grill they're cooked on. Ever since the establishment's second owners, Mabel and Phillip Edge, installed the grill in 1970, the weighty Vulkan-Hart slab of cast iron has hosted countless sizzling burgers. Somewhere along the way, a couple cracks developed in the surface. They were repaired, but not too tidily. Last week the cracks grew worse, leaving Phillips, who bought Coney Island from the Edges in 1989, in a quandary.

"We had to shut down half the burners. That slowed down everybody's

Council explores 'opt out' option for trash service

After a citizen complained that he was automatically billed for trash pick-up service that he didn't need — and even received a garbage bin after he complained — the Crestview City Council has directed Administrative Services Director Mike Wing to research ways residents can "opt out" of paying for services they don't want.

"I'd like to make a motion to direct staff to rewrite the ordinance for a citizen to come and request an exemption if they don't want their garbage picked up," council member Phillip Berezo said, initiating discussion on the topic.

At the advice of city attorney Ben Holley, the three council members attending the Jan. 23 meeting voted down Berezo's motion in order to replace it with another motion directing Wing to research ways the ordinance can be revised to permit an "opt out" mechanism.

That motion passed unanimously. City Clerk Betsy Roy had researched what other regional cities do in similar circumstances, and found it is common for municipalities to force their residents to pay for all utilities offered by the city, whether they use them or not.

"What we found is 90 percent have exactly the same rules we do," Roy reported. "The exemptions are very rare and very detailed. They have to come in every year and renew it."

Roy said a potential conflict is an ordinance that prohibits carrying garbage through the city unless the carrier is a licensed garbage collector. The Crestview resident who brought the matter before the council said once a week, he takes one

Council mulls offer to upgrade sign at 85 and 90

The Crestview City Council is considering an offer by a local businessman to upgrade the city's three-sided informational sign pylon that stands on the northeast corner of State Road 85 and U.S. Highway 90. The proposal by Michael Rutledge of Signs Galore, a Crestview sign company, would provide a \$59,000 digital sign at no cost to the city.

In fact, Rutledge said, the city stands to make upwards of

\$40,000 in revenue under an advertising program he included in his proposal. And that, said city attorney Ben Holley, could be a sticking point.

"I'm concerned about the city going into business," Holley said. "Cities don't usually go into business. They supply services to citizens. I'm really concerned about liability and the image of the city."

Under Rutledge's proposal, his company would handle the administration of the signs' messages. Rutledge also offered to

allow the city to approve the ads and announcements that would be shown.

"A city censor could review the ads if there are concerns about content," Rutledge suggested during his presentation at the council's Jan. 23 meeting.

The Crestview Kiwanis Club, Crestview High School and other donors had the sign pylon constructed, Public Works Director Wayne Steele explained. Before the widening of the city's busiest intersection, it stood on an island across S.R. 85. It was sub-

sequently moved to a small plot of city-owned land in front of the CVS pharmacy.

Each of the sign's three sides has two changeable message boards. The top panels promote Crestview High School events, while the lower sections are used to advertise community activities and programs.

Under the Signs Galore proposal, the top panels would each be replaced with a 9.45 by 7.38 foot full-color LED screen. The high

Crestview police officer cleared in shooting

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the State Attorney's Office determined that Crestview Police Department Sgt. Matthew Purvines was justified in the Oct. 20, 2011 shooting of Jason M. Chesser, according to a police report. On the night of the incident, Purvines attempted to stop a stolen car driven by Chesser, who fled, according to police.

When the vehicle was later stopped on Lonnie Jack Drive in Crestview, Chesser "intentionally aimed his vehicle at Sgt.

Purvines in what was believed to be an attempt to strike him with the vehicle," the report states.

"Officer Purvines discharged his firearm and struck and injured Jason M. Chesser," the report states. "It has been determined by the State Attorney's Office and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement that Sergeant Matthew Purvines was acting in defense of his own life when the shooting occurred."

Purvines, who has been on administrative leave since the incident, has been cleared to return to work.

burgers," Phillips, a native of England, said in her warm County Cornwall accent. "I've been on a journey to find a master welder, as well as a temporary griddle to cook on."

Harnessing the power of the Internet, Phillips sent out an appeal on Coney Island's Facebook page. Many of her 1,891 online "friends" as well as real life friends, family members and customers, responded. Local contractor and Coney Island regular Kenny Siler stepped up and facilitated delivery of a new grill from a Pensacola restaurant supply company.

"He didn't do that for the glory," Phillips said. "He did it because he knows this is a local institution and many people count on having their Coney Island hamburgers."

Finding a master welder to undertake repairs to cast iron was also difficult, Phillips said. But Coney Island's real and virtual friends led her to Bill Nester, the CHOICE welding instructor at Baker School. He was pleased to tackle the project, but cautioned that he can't guarantee success.

"I don't know if I can fix it. The

people who did the welds before may have ruined it to the point it's unfixable," Nester said. "We're going to do our best to fix it. Cast iron is very tricky."

"The guys who got a hold of this thing, they probably thought it was steel," family friend Ted Doris said, tracing his finger over the iron griddle's spotty welds.

Thursday morning, Doris and Phillips' son, Aubrey Phillips, hauled out the massive cast iron grill and the burner unit beneath it, replacing them — temporarily, Julia Phillips hopes — with the grill from Pensacola. But the temporary unit's stainless steel griddle top just won't impart the same flavor to her hamburgers as the damaged grill, Phillips lamented.

"It's seasoned and it cannot be duplicated," Phillips said.

Buying a replacement grill top is impossible. Louisville, Ky.-based Vulkan-Hart stopped manufacturing cast iron cooking surfaces many years ago, said Rob Martin of the company's cook tops and griddles division. Unless Phillips found a used unit from a source such as Craigslist, a replacement griddle top is a rare

find, he said.

"We don't make them with a cast iron top anymore," Martin said. "I'm pleased hers lasted as long as it did."

Nester, a master welder with 46 years of experience, said he might have some of his welding students observe the repair procedure. It would be a good example of a real-world application of the skills they are learning in class, he said.

"I told Ms. Phillips, we're not going to charge her anything for it," Nester said. "I might just bring it up here to the school and we'll look at it and work on it. I can't promise I'll be able to fix it, but I've welded a lot of cast iron."

"He knows it needs to be back in here because that's what makes our Coney Island burgers taste good," Phillips said.

Meanwhile, with the loan of a propane burner from her sister and brother-in-law, Jane and Haywood Chapman, to cook Mabel Edge's secret-recipe chili, the temporary griddle, and supportive Facebook friends, Phillips assured local hotdog and hamburger connoisseurs her restaurant is open for business.

"You can't keep Coney Island down," Phillips said.

Roy said they had hoped more applications would have been received by the mid-December deadline, but felt the rush to have an incubator business in place by the start of the new year compromised the marketing of the program, as well as the thoroughness of preparing the application packet that was distributed.

"We were expecting 15 or 20 applicants," Roy said. "I feel like the committee could do a better job. We were rushing. We were in the middle of the holidays and it was bad timing all the way around."

Board member Robyn Helt agreed, calling the application "very generic."

"The application that went out ... did not have a requirement for a business plan," she said. "If I was an applicant, it would not appear to me that you were requesting a lot of in-

formation. It's almost like a little check box."

"There is no other thing to do but go back out, and maybe market it better," board member Phillip Berezoz said.

Roy said scoring the applications was also difficult because the businesses interested in the program were very diverse.

"We had three completely different businesses," he said. "It was like comparing apples to oranges trying to score these. Just to throw this out there, I don't think it's fair to the people who are applying."

Roy said the CRA wants to attract businesses such as retail stores or professional offices to the program, and should tailor the applications to make those expectations clear.

"I think Mr. Roy is correct," said Administrative Services Director Mike

Wing, whose office is helping coordinate the program. "We need to more specifically target what we are after. The location somewhat dictates that. We need to target what kind of applicant we're looking for."

Wing called narrowing the field of businesses "a double-edged sword," in that it limits the number of applicants but also could help attract more qualified applicants.

"Let's give this thing another go," encouraged Nathan Boyles, who first brought the program to the city council's attention. "We've got to focus on marketing. You do have to get creative when you market this program to the public."

"I'm not in favor of scrapping the program," Helt said. "I'm in favor of scrapping the methodology that we put into it."

kitchen trash can bag to a trash container he rents at his business.

In other matters, the council:

- Unanimously approved blocking Main Street and providing city services, including electrical hook-ups, police security and portable toilets, for the 12th annual Spanish Trail Cruisers Club car show on April 21.

- Clarified Berezoz's request for city department heads to begin providing regular reports, including "just some metrics to show the public" of the departments' activities. "Don't fudge," Berezoz said. "If it's ugly, put it on there and we'll try to improve ... Put yourself as a citizen and what they'd like to see."

- Unanimously approved a settlement of \$5,340 for Dawn Sledge, closing the matter of a disputed concessionaire contract for city ballpark snack stands. Sledge accepted

the city's offer.

- Unanimously appointed resident Alton Jones to the Planning and Zoning Board and firefighter Jim Poirrier to the Police Officer and Firefighter Retirement Board.

- Received a report from Mayor David Cadle stressing the importance of regular city representation on the Economic Development Council. County Commissioner Don Amunds had told Cadle the city's representative, council member Tim Grandberry, sometimes could not attend the meetings due to work schedule conflicts.

- Received a report from council member Robyn Helt about a citizen suggestion to man the ballpark concession stands with Crestview High School students who need community service hours to submit with college applications. "It is a way for providing services to our citizens," Helt said.

school's messages would switch to the lower panels. Rutledge said his company would assume the entire cost of installing the \$59,000 system, insuring it, selling advertising and programming the messages.

The city would continue to provide electrical service to the pylon, but would receive 15 percent of advertising revenues. According to the Signs Galore proposal, each of the three panels would display 20 spots every two minutes, including 12 paid advertisements and eight community announcements.

"I have what I think is a fairly unique idea," Rutledge said. "I'm proposing something that will generate some revenue for the city and also provide a public service. We would sell advertising to generate revenue to allow the city to do some revenue

sharing, and Signs Galore to make a little money and give nonprofits a chance to advertise."

Steele told the council that because the sign pylon is owned by the city, Rutledge's idea would have to do by competitive bid.

"He understands that," Steele said. "We would have to determine that we needed a service provided for us. We would need to come out with a service contract and advertise it that way."

"I appreciate you as a citizen of Crestview coming to us and presenting this," council member Robyn Helt told Rutledge. "I appreciate some thinking outside the box."

The council then asked Holley to research the matter further.

"The answer is not no," Council President Charles Baugh Jr. told Rutledge.

Okaloosa County pageant revived

For many years the Okaloosa County Junior Miss program was alive and well. The scholarship pageant gave young women a chance to win thousands of dollars in college scholarship money. But for eight years the pageant has been dormant.

That changed, however, when Carole Lee Byrd from Birmingham, Ala., had a casual conversation in an elevator.

"My daughter and I were in the elevator with some of the national program judges after a pageant," Byrd said. "One thing led to another and before I knew it we were past the 'Okaloosa County, Florida does not have a Junior Miss program' and on to the 'Well, of course I will lead a new group.'"

Byrd formed a board of directors for the resurrection

of the pageant under a new name — The Distinguished Young Women of Okaloosa County, Inc. However, she says that the basics of the former Junior Miss program are still in place.

Girls who wish to enter must be a graduating senior in 2013 (high school or home school), must live in Okaloosa County and must be ready to compete in the pageant.

Five judges will score the contestants in five categories: academics, interview, talent, fitness and self-expression. The highest scores win significant scholarship money for college and category winners do the same. The overall winner advances to the state competition to vie for that title and possibly from there to the national competition.

"The categories the contestants will be scored in are: Grades — their cur-

rent grade point average is used. Interview — the girls have ten minutes alone with the judging panel to answer questions. Fitness — an aerobics and dance routine that everyone participates in as a group. Talent, which is a 90-second solo on stage to show an area the girl excels in. And lastly, self-expression, which is a 30-second opportunity for each girl to talk about a passion that she embraces.

"We have had girls talk about texting and driving, or autism, or why they feel they should win the pageant. It also gives the judges a feel for how poised a speaker the contestant is in front of a crowd," Byrd explained.

The pageant is set for Aug. 11 at the Niceville High School auditorium. Byrd explained that Niceville was available and that the annual pageant will either rotate among the high schools


in years to come or be held at Northwest Florida State College.

"We set the location for Niceville this year but want to remind girls that this is a county-wide title," Byrd said.

Distinguished Young Women of Okaloosa County is a 501(c)(3) non-profit agency and is still accepting donations for the academic scholarship programs.

"We realize that we will have to grow the pageant back to what it once was," Byrd said. "In one county in Alabama the winner recently received upward of \$75,000 in scholarship money and a paid four-year academic scholarship on top of that. I would love for Okaloosa County to have that size prize available to the contestants."

Byrd has spent most of her life as an accomplished pianist and has judged many

Junior Miss programs over the years.

"I have seen the extraordinary young women who vie for this title and I know that there are dynamic girls in Okaloosa County who would enjoy the competition," she said. "This is much more than a traditional beauty pageant and I hope that Okaloosa County will have

a winner that shows how amazingly well-rounded a young woman can be."

Educated jobseekers join networking program

Looking for a job? Have a college degree and many years in the workforce? You are not alone.

Okaloosa County has a 7.1 percent unemployment rate, which is below the nation's 8.5 percent unemployment rate. However, economists are quick to say that the number of applicants for any one job is rapidly rising.

Enter Emerald Coast Professionals, a new regional program of JobsPlus One-stop Career Center of Okaloosa and Walton Counties. The group offers the opportunity to network, find out about new career opportunities, learn about training opportunities and meet in-

Our membership roll includes attorneys, engineers, sales professionals, medical fields, human resources, aviation maintenance personnel, pilots and

professionals from other specialized fields."

Holloway said the highest number of job seekers in the area comes from those separating from the military.

On a recent Thursday evening participants in Holloway's group ranged from an environmental engineer; to a meteorologist, a safety specialist, and an electronic systems specialist. Several were in the process of separating from the military. Two had recently applied for the same job opening, along with 150 other applicants.

All had bachelor's degrees. Many had master's degrees. Most wanted to focus on job openings from defense industry contrac-

tors, utility companies and specialized teaching positions. Another had put in an application with a lawn service because he needs a job.

"We're dealing with transition," Holloway said. "I want to stress the importance of rewriting your resume to every position you apply for. Your resume has to get you through the cut to the actual interview where you can sell yourself for the opening. Your resume has to stand in for you until you get there and it has to be flawless and it has to speak to the specific job description that you are applying for. A blanket resume will not get you in the door today."

Patty Cook, who is with

JobsPlus, helps Holloway facilitate the group.

"This week I rediscovered the importance of business cards as a contact device," Cook said. "I suggest that a personal calling card type business card is a great way to market yourself as you meet people. You never know when that network of people that you know or meet will hear about a job that fits your strengths."

Holloway reminded the group that 70 percent of jobs come from networking.

Aside from the networking opportunities, group members also have access to computers and the Internet, resume writing, placement referral service, employer recruitments, general employment leads, career

counseling, peer based support system, assistance in obtaining new or alternative career options and access to support staff at JobsPlus that can help with other programs.

Planned topics for upcoming Emerald Coast Professionals bimonthly meetings include: Resumes, Federal Applications, Dress For Success, Interviewing and Behavioral Questions, Panel of Professionals and Social Networking.

The group meets from 4-6 p.m. on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at the JobsPlus One-Stop Career Center at 212 N. Wilson St. in Crestview.

Bond 50th anniversary poster shakes and stirs discussion



A poster released at the Jan. 10-13 Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas has left some staunch James Bond film enthusiasts shaken and stirred. The poster, created for this year's 50th anniversary of the 007 film series, evokes the classic art from the third Bond film, 1964's "Goldfinger."

Created by American graphic designer Robert Brownjohn, the iconic British "quad" poster features a "golden girl" with a superimposed projection of the film's stars Sean Connery and Honor Blackman. Brownjohn also directed the film's title sequence.

The anniversary poster promotes the October releases of a Blu-ray set of the 22 current Bond films and "Skyfall," the 007 film currently in the works. It features a digitally created "golden girl" of its own with the titles of all 23 Eon Productions James Bond films, including "Skyfall," projected on her body.

The apparent appropri-

tion of Brownjohn's design ruffled the feathers of Bond enthusiast James McMahon, who offered his observations in a series of email posts on a list-serve shared by a coterie of Cmdr. Bond's staunchest defenders.

"I like some things about the poster, just as a stand-alone," McMahon wrote. "But it's not a stand-alone work. It is meant to represent 23 movies, so it fails, since it evokes only one film; 'Goldfinger'...It's just a re-hash. It should be something new. Or at least it should be a blend of several past posters, not just one."

"When you remember the great classic 007 movie posters there have been, this poster becomes even more inadequate, since it also fails to do justice to that tradition, much less to represent the James Bond films themselves."

Gary Firuta, considered one of the nation's foremost Bond book and film authorities, has been critical of the direction the two recent Bond films has taken, including the Daniel Craig movies "Casino Royale" (2006) and "Quantum of Solace" (2008).

"Well, if they are going retro (read non-creative),

then just hire (early Bond film poster artist Robert) McGinness, or one of the others, and commission an original piece of art that can be used for the 50th," Firuta opined. "The art could incorporate all that preceded it, or some new classy style that would be an original (though 'original' and 'classy' are difficult words to attach to this new world of '007')."

"Dunno, Gary. It's only a poster," responded fellow Bond film buff Tom Zielinski. "I think it's fine as is, 'classy' being in the eye of the beholder, certainly. Nothing is gonna please everyone."

Referencing the Bond films' current producers Barbara Broccoli, daughter of Albert R. Broccoli, one of the originators of the series, and his stepson, Michael G. Wilson, Firuta responded.

"Actually, it is more than a poster," Firuta posted. "It represents a legacy for billions of fans, and the ones that paid to see the films that paid for Babs and Mikey's houses, and even their undergarments."

"This is certainly the first time in my 50 years of following the series that I even saw an event that capped off to show a poster. Therefore,

it should look like something worth showcasing."

"In terms of representing a legacy for billions of fans, I think that is expecting a bit much from a simple poster," Zielinski replied. "As for Barbara Broccoli's undergarments, if I paid for them I demand to see them!"

Returning to the matter of the new poster's graphic design, McMahon summarized, "Even with the successful example to go by, the 50th Anniversary poster fails. Lacking any kind of character, it fails to contribute anything. Basically, it's just the 'Goldfinger' poster done not nearly as well."

5 EASY TIPS TO SAVE : Lowering grocery bills can actually be healthier, too.

People can do without all sorts of things, but nearly everyone I know needs to eat. That's why we want to know how to get the most for our money on groceries. I'm not going to tell you to shop at a cheaper store, because I'm assuming you have already found a store that works for you.

But here are ways to save money at every store, and they aren't even hard to do. Not a bit. Really. Take a look.



FOLLOW THE "U." All the fresh items that are healthy – and cheaper, too, than most processed food – are located in a horseshoe pattern around the perimeter of the store. At my store, you usually see the bakery when you first walk in, then the produce, then you hang a sharp left to the meat counter at the very rear, next to the dairy, cheeses and sauces. If you don't want to be tempted by prepared and packaged foods, head first in a horseshoe around the store. Then, see what else you need – or just hurry and get out of there!

SEARCH THE UPPER AND LOWER SHELVES. Believe it or not, food companies pay grocery stores for their shelf positions, knowing that most of the time, your eye is going directly to the middle shelves. That's why you can save some money by scanning high and low, looking for brands that don't pay those kinds of fees and hence might cost a bit less. Case in point: cheaper bagged cereals on

the breakfast aisle.

CHECK THE BARGAIN BINS. In the back corner of every store, there's a bin where dented and soon-to-be expired products are placed. Take a look at what's there; you might find something you can use for half price or less! My friend Sam always looks for the marked-down items at the store where she shops, which she says she finds in the late afternoon or early evening.

MAKE A LIST AND STICK TO IT! I know it's an old chestnut, but it really works. Every Wednesday morning, I read every single major supermarket ad. Then, armed with that information, I make a list and do quick surgical strikes at the markets. I buy what's on sale, fast, and then I get out of there. Strolling around encourages impulse purchases, as does bringing your kids along! This is especially true at warehouse stores like Costco and Sam's Club, which know how to lure

you into buying things you don't need.

BUY MORE IN A SINGLE TRIP. Every visit to the supermarket presents more opportunities for impulse purchases that drive up your bill. The authors of "America's Cheapest Family" say they only go to the grocery store once a month to avoid this costly move. They freeze their milk and buy produce in bulk, using up items first that don't last, like strawberries, and saving fresh items like apples and carrots with a longer shelf life, that can be eaten later in the month. I can't really see myself only shopping once a month, but I've adopted some of their habits, like buying more apples and root vegetables when they're on sale and stashing them in the bottom of the fridge for later, since they last a long time. An extra freezer might help you save money, but you really have to think about whether the utility bills will outweigh the savings.

From those interested in the pricey commercials that sponsor the event or Madonna's half-time show, the late afternoon game is a great time for a living room tailgate spread. These recipes are sure to make viewing a family affair because food and gridiron action go together.

Sans the Bone Chicken Wing Dip

Ingredients
2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened
1/2 cup pepper sauce (I use Texas Pete)
1/4 cup chicken wing sauce (as hot or as mild as you wish, I use Texas Pete brand)
1 cup ranch-style salad dressing
2 cups diced cooked chicken
1 cup sharp shredded cheddar cheese

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.
In a medium bowl, stir together the cream cheese and hot pepper sauce until well blended. Mix in the Ranch dressing, chicken and cheddar cheese. Spread into a 9x13 inch-baking dish that has been sprayed with cooking spray.
Bake for 30 minutes in the preheated oven. If oil

collects on the top, dab it off using a paper towel. Serve with tortilla chips or Frito scoops.

Seven Layer Dip

Ingredients
1 (1 ounce) package taco seasoning mix
1 (16 ounce) can refried beans
1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
1 (16 ounce) container sour cream
1 (16 ounce) jar salsa (mild or hot)
1 large tomato, chopped and drained on a paper towel
1 bunch chopped green onions
1/2 cup diced jalapeno peppers, drained on a paper towel (if you wish these can be served separate)
1 small head iceberg lettuce, shredded
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
1 (6 ounce) can sliced black olives, drained

Directions

In a medium bowl, blend the taco seasoning mix and refried beans. Spread the mixture onto a large serving platter.
Mix the sour cream and cream cheese in a medium bowl. Spread over the refried beans.
Top these layers with salsa. Place a layer of tomato, green onions, peppers, and lettuce over the salsa, and top with the shredded Cheddar cheese. Garnish with black olives. Serve with corn chips.

Chocolate Chip Cheesecake

Ingredients
1 package (8 ounce) cream cheese, softened
1/2 cup butter, softened (do not use margarine)
3/4 cup confectioners' sugar
2 Tbsp brown sugar
1/2 tsp vanilla extract
1 cup miniature chocolate chips
3/4 cup pecans, chopped


Directions

In mixer, beat cream cheese and butter until creamy. Add sugars and vanilla and mix until well combined. Stir in miniature chocolate chips with a spatula. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours. Gather cold mixture into a ball and cover with plastic wrap. Chill another hour. Roll ball in pecans just before serving.
I have skipped the ball stage of the recipe and served this as a spread without the pecans. It's great on chocolate, cinnamon and honey graham crackers, vanilla wafers, shortbread or butter cookies.

Directions

Preheat oven to 325 degrees.
Mix cream cheese and butter together. Stir in flour. Chill dough for 1 hour. Shape dough into 24 balls and place in 24 muffin tins. Press dough into muffin tins, working it up the sides and into the bottom. (Note: Mini muffin tins can be used but you may need to reduce the cooking time.)
Sprinkle 1/2 of the pecans into the bottom of the dough lined muffin cups.
Beat together egg, 1 tablespoon of butter, brown sugar, salt and vanilla until smooth and spoon filling over the pecans in the muffin cups. Top with remaining pecans.
Bake at 325 degrees for 25 minutes or until set. Cool completely before removing from muffin tins. Makes about 24 tiny pecan pies.

Ingredients
3 oz cream cheese, room temperature
1/2 c butter, softened
1 c flour, sifted
1 egg

1 tsp vanilla extract

We continue to integrate the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) and other Base Realignment and Closure related growth into our Crestview family and we are here to help manage that change.

City should consider offer to install new sign

On Monday, Jan. 23, I was attending the (Crestview) City Council meeting and heard Mr. Mike Rutledge of Signs Galore present a suggestion to modernize the three-way sign at the State Road 85 and U.S. 90 intersection. Rutledge is estimating about \$60,000 in initial expense to provide the city with a new sign and is proposing to use it to communicate public announcements and sell

advertising spots.

If I understood correctly, he is offering to pay all the upfront costs, maintain the sign, and then pay Crestview an estimated \$40,000 from the profit sharing that would go back into the coffers of the city. Three issues came up with (A) if the city could alter a sign that was donated, (B) appropriate advertising, and (C) the city being "for profit."

(A) The sign was donated and placed at a different location later to be moved where it currently sits. If there is a concern of the people or organization donating it, let's ask permission. Not really sure how much of an issue this really would be since Mr. Rutledge doesn't want to replace the sign, just modernize it.

(B) The second issue was appropriate advertising and with that, I understand. However, it's easy enough to do with guidelines clearly written out.

(C) The last issue caught my attention with the comment that the city can't make a profit. Let's be clear that there's only a profit if there is money left over after all expenses have been paid. There are many expenses in running a city and funds are needed to give the citizens various levels of service. This is why there is a surcharge on the Gulf Power bill and trash pickup.

This is why we pay property taxes. At the end of the day the city of Crestview needs a certain amount of money to operate. I would suggest taking the \$40,000 that Signs Galore is offering the city and offset our taxes. No, it won't be much off our taxes but a few "outside the box" thinkers like Mr. Rutledge is proposing could help lower the citizens' tax burden without adversely affecting the services the

city provides.

Plus, we'd get a modernized sign in the middle of Crestview to help communicate city events. This sounds like a win-win situation if I've ever heard one.

To me, this has been a very positive city council and I encourage them to keep considering ideas that are outside the norm.

The great life of turtles

Turtles are one of the oldest reptiles in Florida and have changed very little throughout history.

They are typically recognized by the presence of shells and can be terrestrial, marine or freshwater turtles. In the USA and Britain, terrestrial forms are referred to as "tortoises" and the aquatic forms as "turtles."

In Florida there are 25 species of turtles and they live on every continent in the world, except for Antarctica.

Florida's only true tortoise is the gopher tortoise. This species digs long burrows around upland pine, oak or scrub areas.

These burrows provide habitat for many other types of animals, which is why this tortoise is considered a keystone species and is protected by law.

Some of the freshwater turtles include the snapping

turtle, basking and box turtles, mud and musk turtles, and the soft shell turtle.

Marine turtle species are called sea turtles and are identified by their shells and modified limbs, which are non-retractable flippers. Sea turtles spend their entire lives at sea, except for nesting season when the females return for a short period of time to lay eggs.

During sea turtle nesting season — April through October — it is important to keep beaches turtle friendly. Ways to do this include keeping lights off, or using lights with low wavelengths so the artificial

lights do not disorient the turtle hatchlings. Keep your distance if you encounter a sea turtle and keep beaches clear of holes and leftover recreation equipment.

Hatchlings will imprint on their beach of birth and return in 20 to 30 years to lay their eggs.

Sea turtles make up two of the seven families of turtles in Florida. Each species of turtle has a specific habitat and adaptation allowing for their survival. As one of our oldest reptiles, turtles have great stories to tell.



On rare occasions, one or two of those players might surprise people and go to a smaller, less prestigious school for reasons involving family ties or their faith. But most of the time young men with visions of football grandeur rushing through their mind go with the big schools in power conferences.

Today will be a red letter signing day at Crestview. Six Bulldogs are ready to sign their national letter of intent so they can continue to play the game they love.

Crestview standouts Earl Reed, Javarius Seastrunk, Matt Hutchison, Geo Hillsman, Will Boler and Alex Campagne will officially go from being commitments to signees in an 11:15 a.m. ceremony in the Crestview gym.

Reed is expected to sign with the University of Memphis. Seastrunk is leaning toward Elon University in North Carolina, but Bulldog coach Kevin Pettis said he also has an offer from Minnesota. Elon is a member of the Southern Conference and a Division 1-AA school.

Hillsman and Hutchison are both expected to sign with Gardner-Webb. Gardner-Webb, like Elon, is a 1-AA school, but is a member of the Big South Conference.

Boler and Campagne will sign with Cumberland University in Tennessee. Cumberland is a member of the National Association of Interscholastic Athletics.

It is believed that Crestview has never had six football players from the same class sign scholarships. The Bulldogs definitely have never had six football players sign in the same day.


"I'm not putting any pressure on them (to win)," he said. "It's all up to me. I'm going to give them the easy way out."

USDA unveils school meal improvements

First Lady Michelle Obama and Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack have unveiled new standards for school meals that will result in healthier meals for kids across the nation for the first time in more than 15 years for the 32 million kids that participate in school meal programs every school day, according to a press release.

The healthier meal requirements are a key component of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act, which was championed by the First Lady as part of her Let's Move! campaign and signed into law by President Obama.

The final standards make the same kinds of practical changes that many parents are already encouraging at home, including:

- Ensuring students are offered both fruits and vegetables every day of the

week

- Substantially increasing offerings of whole grain-rich foods
- Offering only fat-free or low-fat milk varieties

- Limiting calories based on the age of children being served
- Increasing the focus on reducing the amounts of saturated fat, trans fats and sodium

The final nutrition standards also provide more time for schools to implement key changes, which will be largely phased in over a three-year period, starting in school year 2012-2013.

For example, schools will be permitted to focus on changes in the lunches in the first year, with most changes in breakfast phased in during future years.

NWFSC trustees meet in new center

The governing Board of Trustees of Northwest Florida State College's Jan. 17 business meeting was the first in the college's new Student Services Center, a 75,000-square-foot facility just constructed on the Niceville campus.

Trustees approved various items related to the college's fundraising arm, the NWFSC Foundation, including approval for the establishment of endowments funded by donors to support the Leadership Institute programs housed at the new Student Services Center. Facilities naming based on the gifts will be formally unveiled at a Feb. 2 grand opening and ribbon cutting. Other foundation items approved included a slate of officers and directors for consideration at the foundation's annual meeting Feb. 10, and approval of updates to foundation governing documents and the policy and procedures manual.

In other action, the trustees approved:

- The selection, pending final contract negotiations, of the legal firm Conerly, Bowman and Dykes to provide legal services for the college and serve as attorney for the board. The board's Personnel, Finance and Audit Committee recommended the selection following a request for proposals and interviews with four applicants.

- A retirement resolution honoring the 11 years of service of Bob Coache of Crestview, who served as a senior systems programmer in the college's Information Technology area.

- Deletion of \$24,310 in tangible property from the college's inventory.

The board also commended the staff of the NWFSC Collegiate High School for the charter school's recent top ranking among 410 high schools in Florida as reported by the Florida Department of Education's school grade report.

The next trustees meeting will be held Feb. 21 at 4:30 p.m. at the college's South Walton Center in Santa Rosa Beach. Trustee meetings are open to the public.



Legends of the crow

It's not a typical winter morning in Florida. Most of the state is 70 degrees, and it's February. Everything outside is brown, bare and dull. The only noise is the rustling of leaves and the coo of mourning doves. Then, loud and clear in the distance, I hear the caw of a crow.

As the morning continues, other crows join, and the lone call becomes chatter. Are they telling each other about a nearby predator or laughing about something funny? These all-jet-black birds (from beak to feet) are crafty, intelligent, social creatures that live in family groups.

Crows, ravens and other black-plumaged birds are often seen as dark, scary or mysterious. However, there are many positive legends about these clever birds that people don't know. In many Native American legends, crows are messengers to the gods and carry prayers. Ravens, a species similar to the American crow but much larger in body and beak, are important legends of the English Crown. They are as famous as the Tower of London. Legends say if the ravens ever leave the Tower, it and the monarchy will fall.

Despite the legends, good or bad, American crows are extremely social birds and congregate in flocks, sometimes by the hundreds. They say there is power in numbers, and this is true for these birds. Often when a predator such as an owl or hawk appears, crows will attack and harass the offending animal until it leaves the area.

Once at a local lake, I witnessed these actions firsthand. The day was

sunny and quiet when suddenly the loud, distinctive caw of crows interrupted the silence. It was borderline annoying, but then I saw the reason for their ranting. A beautiful



Cooper's hawk glided through the air and into a nearby tree. The noise was almost deafening as the crows took on the hawk.

This often misrepresented bird is a good problem-solver and has been known to make tools from twigs and other objects to forage for edible treats such as worms, grain, seeds, nuts and berries. Crows are omnivores and also enjoy small mammals, eggs, clams and mussels from oceans or lakes.

Crows are found in Florida year-round, and the best place to see them is an open space that offers a few trees to perch in and a reliable source of food. This is almost anywhere: fields, parks, lakes, backyards and near bodies of water.

More than a third of the 2011 deaths of Florida panthers were caused by collisions with vehicles.

32 births, 24 deaths in 2011 for panthers

Florida panthers are off to a rough start in 2012, with three deaths documented by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Last year, 24 panther deaths were recorded, but FWC biologists also observed 11 radio-collared females giving birth to 32 kittens. Overall, the known number of newborn panthers in 2011 appears to have offset the known number of panther deaths.

Today, an estimated 100 to 160 adults of this federally endangered species live in Florida. Panthers almost disappeared from the wild in this state when their numbers fell to fewer than 30 in the 1970s. Since then, their population has been increasing.

Collisions with vehicles continues to be the greatest source of human-caused mortality to this long-tailed cat that can weigh up to 160 pounds and grow to 6 feet or longer.

Already, in just the first week of 2012, there were two documented deaths of panthers hit by vehicles on highways in Collier County, where the greatest concentration of panthers in the state is found. The third fatality was caused by a fight with another panther. Among the 24 documented panther deaths in 2011,

nine deaths, or more than a third, were because of collisions with vehicles.

"Florida panther deaths are most often the result of one of two things: collisions with vehicles or aggression from other panthers," said Kipp Frohlich, head of the Imperiled Species Management Section at the FWC. "We can't control panthers fighting when they are defending their territory; that is a part of nature. But we can do something about human-caused panther mortalities."

"It is especially important to slow down and keep a careful look-out at dawn or dusk, when panthers are most likely to be on the move," Frohlich said.

The FWC continues to work with many partners to conserve and increase habitat available to panthers on both public and private lands.

FWC ups red drum bag limit

Recreational anglers targeting red drum in northern Florida can now take home more of the popular fish, thanks to a change approved Nov. 16 by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

The decision came during the first day of the two-day November commission meeting in Key Largo.

The changes take effect today, Feb. 1, and include the following:

- Create three management areas for red drum (the northwest, the northeast and the south) instead of one statewide management area.
- Increase the number of red drum a recreational fisherman can take per day in the northeast and northwest regions of the state from one to two red drum.
- Establish a statewide vessel limit of eight red drum.
- Limit the number of red drum that can be transported on land to six red drum per person.

These rule changes are the result of a successful management strategy that began in 1989, when the species was considered severely overfished.

"This is our version of having a listed protected species and being able to take it off that list. This is a success story," said Commissioner Brian Yablonski about the increased recreational fishing opportunity. "If ever there was a moment to give back, this is it."

A 2009-10 red drum stock assessment completed by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Research Institute showed that red drum escapement rates (the proportion of fish surviving through age 4 relative to the number that would have survived to that age if there were no fishery) have been consistently above the FWC's 40-percent management goal in the northern regions of the state.

Other recreational red drum rules will remain the same, including a slot limit of 18 to 27 inches and a one red drum bag limit in the southern part of the state.

FWC adds texting to Wildlife Alert program

The Wildlife Alert Reward Program has helped the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission catch thousands of violators through phone calls and online submissions from the public. Now, it is employing an additional method: text messaging.

Members of the public can call the Wildlife Alert Hotline or go to MyFWC.com/WildlifeAlert to report known or suspected violations. Now, they can also text Tip@MyFWC.com. Most cellphones now allow users to send text messages directly to an email address; standard usage fees apply.

When submitting information via text message, the FWC encourages including as much information as possible, such as the specific violation and the location. Once a report is initiated, FWC dispatch has the ability to respond via text message to the reporting party to gather additional details.

"The text messaging option makes it more convenient for the public," said Col. Jim Brown, director of the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement. "We also hope it will make Wildlife Alert even more effective in catching poachers and other violators." The nonprofit, reward-based program was created 30 years ago to encourage citizens to report fish and wildlife law violations and offers rewards in exchange for information leading to arrests.

The FWC encourages people to report any known or suspected illegal activity, such as illegal hunting, taking saltwater game fish out of season, taking protected wildlife species, boating under the influence and more.

Balloon releases take toll on wildlife

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission reminds event organizers and other Floridians about a law prohibiting the release of more than nine lighter-than-air balloons within a 24-hour period.

Though releasing balloons is often an idea of groups that wish to honor an event or lost loved one, the FWC encourages the public to choose more environmentally responsible actions for their events.

Balloons released in Florida almost inevitably end up in the Gulf of Mexico or Atlantic Ocean. Wildlife, especially sea turtles, mistake balloons for food, and strings attached to balloons can entangle birds and other animals. The release into the atmosphere of large numbers of balloons inflated with lighter-than-air gases poses a danger and nuisance to the environment, particularly to wildlife and marine animals. Violators could incur \$250 in fines, according to Florida law.

There are exceptions for scientific or meteorological balloons released by a government agency or under government contract, hot air balloons that are recovered after launching and balloons released indoors. The law also allows for the release of balloons that are biodegradable or photodegradable under FWC rules. Since 1989, the FWC has received only one such balloon design for review, and that balloon was not approved.






