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Council president to propose firing Wing

After defending his employees' performance and his leadership of the Administrative Services department, Mike Wing survived an April 25, 2011, no-confidence vote by the city council.

Included in the agenda for the Crestview City Council's Monday evening meeting is a request by council President Charles Baugh Jr. to consider the termination of Administrative Services Director Mike Wing's employment with the city.

No background information on Baugh's request is included in the meeting agenda packet and calls to Baugh were not returned.

Wing said he does not know why Baugh wants him fired. "He hasn't spoken with me and

I don't know what his reasoning is," Wing said. "All I know is what I can assume."

Wing wrote a letter to council members after the agenda was published Wednesday afternoon.

"It appears that no matter how hard I try to do my job, it is not enough,"

Wing stated in the letter: "I must once again ask myself why. I have endured an unreasonably lengthy period of time during which there has been an organized effort to discredit me and the people who work with me."

It is not the first time Baugh has attempted to oust Wing.

Baugh asked for Wing's resignation at the April 25, 2011, council meeting, claiming Wing mismanaged the city's Parks and Recreation Department and had recommended the purchase of land for a downtown lot at thousands of dollars over its appraised value, to be funded by grant money.

Time to move forward

City leaders and citizens eager to put issues behind them

City leaders who were recently rocked by allegations of official impropriety say it's time to learn from past mistakes and move forward.

City council members have had their day in court on Sunshine Law violations and as the focus shifts back to investigations of top Crestview Police Department leaders, a common theme has become "moving forward."

"We have temporarily suspended the Street Crimes division while we reassess their efforts, but we still keep a close watch on any criminal or drug activity through other methods for the time being."

"I believe this council has taken heed of the state attorney's recommendations," Council President Charles Baugh Jr. said before First Circuit Court Judge Jim Ward. "This council still has much work to do for the great city of Crestview and we are anxious to get this matter behind us."

Council supports P.J. Adams signal to address residents' traffic woes

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There's not much the Crestview City Council can do about traffic issues on county or state roads such as State Road 85, P.J. Adams Parkway or Antioch Road, but that doesn't stop area residents from voicing their frustrations and concerns and expecting their elected representatives to do something about them.

At its March 12 meeting, the council unanimously passed a resolution of support for a traffic signal to be erected at the intersection of P.J. Adams Parkway and Villacrest Drive. The resolution will be forwarded to the Board of Okaloosa County Commissioners for their consideration.

Like other side streets on the stretch of P.J. Adams from State Road 85 west to Wildhorse Drive, which has a traffic light, residential traffic at both ends of Villacrest often backs up when driv-

ers are unable to enter the flow of heavy rush hour traffic.

"I think this is a good step to take and this will be a great benefit to our citizens who live in that area," Mayor David Cadle said during discussion of the resolution.

However, not all area residents are as supportive of the traffic light as Bill Cox, who had brought the matter to the council's attention at its Feb. 27 meeting.

"I don't think any great harm has been done," said Ward, who withheld adjudication on the infractions. "I don't see any real malice and intent to do anything other than their business. There was no intent to circumvent the meaning of the Sunshine Law."

City leaders hastened to implement procedures to assure there would be no repeat of the incident.

"We're working in accordance with a recommendation from State Attorney Bill Eddins," Crestview Mayor David Cadle said. "He encouraged the city to adopt a practice of education whenever we have newly elected officials. The seminar we held last year with Barbara Peterson (of the First Amendment Foundation) was a good first step, but he wants to see a practice put in place to have an intensive training in the Sunshine Law as new elections take place."

"What we are anticipating is, after every election there would be intensive training for all newly elected officials and we would encourage currently serving officials to take training every couple of years as well."

Cadle said because newly elected officials generally prepare to begin their duties as soon as they are confirmed, "That training needs to take place immediately, before they get into office."

"We're moving forward," council member Ben Iannucci said. "We'll keep doing the business of the city and keep moving forward."

"I'm glad it's behind us," council member Robyn Helt said.

With the council's Sunshine Law issue laid to rest, focus has returned to the state attorney's racketeering allegations against suspended Crestview police operations director Maj. Joseph Floyd. Also suspended was Floyd's supervisor, Police Chief Brian Mitchell.

A grand jury's findings

regarding the Crestview Police Department were expected to be released Wednesday, but an objection to the release by an unnamed party has delayed it, according to a press release issued by the State Attorney's Office.

"While the investigations continue, we've done some

restructuring of the police department with the interim chief, Kenneth Bundrick, and temporary reassignments of some of the lieutenants to avoid any interruption in our service during the investigations into allegations against Maj. Floyd," Cadle said.

"We've reviewed the

grand jury testimony and the recommendations that they've made, and we're going to continue our own investigation in cooperation with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the State Attorney's Office."

Bundrick, a Crestview native and 25-year veteran of the city's police department, said morale remains high among police officers.

"We're out there doing our job," Bundrick said. "We're protecting the people of Crestview."

"We're moving beyond this," police spokesman Lt. Andrew Schneider said. "We've got a job to do and that's what we're concentrating on." Allegations of excessive force by the police department's Street Crimes unit, which Floyd had organized and headed, raised questions about the unit's integrity, Cadle said, despite its effectiveness in suppressing the city's narcotics trade.

"We have temporarily suspended the Street Crimes division while we reassess their efforts, but we still keep a close watch on any criminal or drug activity through other methods for the time being," Cadle said.

Some citizens, too, want to see the issues laid to rest lest they overshadow the city's positive attributes.

"How can we pull somebody into Crestview when we're acting crazy? I feel bad because we're hurting each other," community activist Mae Retha Coleman said. "If you can't lift me up, don't tear me down. We're going to start as of now pulling together, pulling this town together."

At the meeting, Baugh showed a video he said showed misuse of a city vehicle for personal business. The video turned out to be footage of Parks and Recreation manager Chuck Powell dropping off his grandson at a daycare while on his way to work.

"I have lost confidence in Mr. Wing's ability to lead his department ... and most important, to do what is in the best interest of the citizens of Crestview," Baugh said during the April meeting.

"I have nothing to be ashamed of," Wing said after those allegations were made. "I deal with an imperfect system. I deal with an outdated ordinance and an imperfect charter. I spend a quarter of my time defending my people against unfounded allegations."

When none of the other council members offered a motion to ask for Wing's resignation, Baugh passed the gavel to council Vice President Tim Grandberry and made the mo-

tion himself. The motion failed on a 2-3 vote, with Baugh and Councilman Ben Iannucci casting the assenting votes.

Wing is hopeful for a similar outcome at Monday evening's meeting.

"I do not wish to end my employment with the city at this time and ask

that you consider my performance and years of service as you assess this issue," Wing requested of the council in his letter.

Mayor David Cadle said he was surprised by Baugh's request.

"I'm just as stunned as anyone else," Cadle said.

"My concern is if you put a traffic light there, there's already a backup at 85, a light could cause more of a traffic jam than you already have," Fox Valley Homeowners Association member Dave Olman said. "I would hope that they would do a traffic study or some kind of analysis before they put in a traffic light."

"The county isn't just going to throw a light up there because we signed a resolution," Council President Charles Baugh Jr. said.

"But hopefully the resolution will perk up their (county officials) ears a little bit," council member Robyn Helt added.

Longtime Crestview resident Landrum Edwards, who had addressed the need for a bypass around Crestview at the Feb. 27 meeting, expressed concern that officials are focusing on small issues instead of overall traffic woes.

"I called around (to various regional officials), and redirecting the lights is what everyone wants," Landrum said. "I found nothing about a bypass."

During a previous ap-

pearance, the council explained to Landrum that the city is not in charge of the county roads Landrum suggested be incorporated in east and west bypasses. Helt advised Landrum to attend the public meetings of the regional Okaloosa/Walton Transportation Planning Organization and let officials know his concerns.

In other matters, the council:

- Approved a request by Relay for Life organizers to "paint the town purple" by placing purple cancer survivor ribbons on downtown light posts.

- Repealed the city's animal control ordinance to avoid duplicating the county ordinance, which will now cover Crestview.

- Scheduled public workshops for March 26 (rezoning two properties) and April 2 (bed tax and impact fees).

- Received a report from Cadle saying the Lake Erie School of Osteopathic Medicine's interest in opening a satellite campus for its dental school is what everyone wants, and "Some other medical arts schools are interested in Crestview now, too."

OFFICIALS: Released inmate attempts car burglaries

A Crestview man released from the Okaloosa County Jail on a domestic violence battery charge Wednesday failed to make it out of the parking lot before committing additional crimes that placed him back in the jail, according to an Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office report.

Gabriel Allen Kirkpatrick, 38, of 3478 Grady Lane, Crestview, is charged with four counts of burglary at 1200 East James Lee Blvd., the parking lot of the Okaloosa County Jail.

Just after 9 p.m. Kirkpatrick was released from the jail. In the parking lot, Kirkpatrick attempted to break into four cars, the report states, and in one attempt unscrewed a radio antenna off a car and used it to try to gain entry.

Kirkpatrick's original charge was a March 12 family disturbance where he was accused of battery, domestic violence.

Teen faces battery, assault charges

The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office has arrested a Crestview teen on charges of battery and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without

intent to kill.

The teen is accused of punching, shoving, and pulling the hair of a woman with under hospice care.

According to an Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office report, deputies also learned that he threatened to kill family members with a knife and to burn down their house. When arrested, the teen had a hunting knife in a sheath on his belt.

One witness also told deputies that the teenager had been abusing synthetic drugs including spice and bath salts.

Man accused of holding baby by neck

A Crestview man is charged with aggravated child abuse.

Ryan Demetri James, 23, of 6232 Old River Road is accused of holding a 6-month-old baby by the neck with both hands, according to an Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office report.

James also faces a charge of domestic battery by strangulation.

Deputies arrested James March 5 after his girlfriend said she awoke to the sounds of a baby crying the previous morning when the crying suddenly stopped.

The woman told deputies she saw James holding the child by its neck with both hands, and that after she got the child out of his grasp, James began to choke her.

No clues in stabbing

Victims and neighbors remain silent

A double stabbing the evening of March 16 has left the Crestview Police Department in a quandary and residents of the apartment complex where the incident occurred talking in hushed voices about the event. But no one, including the victims, is talking out loud about who did the stabbing, and that, police said, leaves them with little information to pursue.

At about 6:30 p.m. that evening two people were stabbed at Oakdale Gardens Inn complex. One victim was flown by helicopter to Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola for treatment of a stab wound to the abdomen. A second victim was treated and released from North Okaloosa Medical Center in Crestview.

Two white men were seen leaving the area in an older pickup truck.

Police spokesman Lt. Andrew Schneider said although occupants of the truck were the "possible

suspects," police have not been able to identify them "because the victims are not cooperating with law enforcement."

On Monday evening, things were back to normal at the apartments in downtown Crestview. Residents visited in and out of each other's units or sat on their front balconies and porches chatting and enjoying the spring evening.

In the compact, balconied complex behind the YMCA on Wilson Street, colorful children's toys were piled near one porch. Cigarette butts littered the dusty courtyard. A sign reading, "butterfly sanctuary" hung near a flowering bush.

"Everybody knows everybody else," a resident who did not give her name said. "It's like a big family, you know? But when something like this (the stabbing) happens, we just hang to ourselves, you know what I mean? It's better not to get involved in stuff that isn't your business."

Inn is familiar to law enforcement, Crestview police Lt. Eddie Lehneis said, with narcotics-related incidents being a frequent cause for periodic calls to the complex.

"Stuff goes on here but nobody gets in other people's business," another resident, who also didn't give his name, said.

The Oakdale Gardens Inn manager, who gave

his name only as Mike, said the complex is normally quiet. The stabbing victims, he said, were outsiders who didn't live on the site. He knew nothing about them, he said, including their identities. The incident shook up some of the residents, he said.

"It was a night to remember, that's for sure," the woman resident said.

The run will begin at 9 a.m. at the Publix on State Road 85 and end at the Okaloosa County Veterans Memorial in downtown Crestview.

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The price of salvation, the blood of Christ

Hebrews 9:15-28 teaches us that salvation comes by the blood. Further we are told that it is by the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus Christ and the shedding of His blood, that He pays the ultimate price for our salvation. And of course, the greatest offense of all to the liberals is that they will have to give an account of their lives before God. No one can advocate a violation of scriptural principle and have a joyful acceptance of facing God at the judgment.

While we may differ from the liberals, let us remember that we too will face God one day and the price of our acceptance will be the blood sacrifice of Jesus Christ applied to our hearts and lives.

In verses 15-18, the principle is the law concerning one's last will and testament. These principles still prevail in our lands. Verse 15 opens with "And for this cause," then we are given several facts pertaining to that cause.

The purpose is expressed in verse 15a, but the background is verses 12-14. The blood of bulls and goats cannot suffice as the needed sacrifice, but the blood of Jesus Christ does. Now for this cause He is the mediator of the New Testament.

Ah. What a price — that by means of death. The death of course is His atoning death on Calvary.

The plan in verse 15c was for the redemption of the transgressions. Jesus came into this world with a purpose. In verse 15d, the promise is eternal inheritance. That's another way of saying eternal salvation. If a question arises surrounding the statement, "they which are called might," and one wonders who can be saved, then remember Matthew 9:13, which is stated negatively. The positive is Jesus saying, I am come to call sinners to repentance. So if you, or the person you know, is a sinner, you can rest assured that the promise

of Hebrews 9:15 is for you and them.

Verses 16 and 17 teach the same thing: Any will and testament, no matter how carefully it may be drawn up and no matter what the amount may involve, is of no value so long as the testator is yet alive. Is that not the reason some testators are murdered? After the death of the testator the will becomes law. This of course is referring to Jesus, who made us a promise (a will, if we like) that we could have eternal life by believing on His name.

Now we proceed to a further explanation concerning the law of the priesthood and ritualism. Now to further open our minds to the "blood sacrifice" of Calvary, in verse 18 we are reminded that the first testament was dedicated with blood — go back to the book of Leviticus 1 and see the animal sacrifice and the sprinkling of the blood.

Taking phrases "a" and "b" out of verse 19 breaks it into a thought, but these two phrases do make a point. In phrase "a" He first presented every precept of the law in word. That would be a

very necessary exercise so that the people would understand. After they understood fully, then the blood was taken. The people were to understand the meaning of the blood.

Note of course, blood was first taken in phrase "b." That we understand that blood is to be the essential ingredient of sacrifice for salvation. Then there were other things that were to be connected.

The blood represents the innocent sacrifice (in the Old Testament it was innocent animals, in the New Testament it was Jesus Christ, who was sinless), dying for the guilty. The water represents the cleansing. The scarlet wool was usually symbolic of sin, and the hyssop represents humility. It was the lowliest of plants, growing out of the rock walls. It was used to dip and sprinkle.

In verse 19f and 19g, sin had caused separation from God, but the sprinkled blood restored the blessing of identity with God.

In verses 20 and 21, the writer of Hebrews wants us to recall the

acts of dedication and separation. This is the blood of the testament, which was used, and with it the tabernacle and all the vessels were sprinkled.

In verses 22-28, the foundation has been laid. Here we have presented to us the work of Jesus in the redemption of our souls.

The Statement Of Scripture - v.22

Note that in verse 22 ("Almost all things") there were some meal offerings that could be made so the law did not demand blood on every occasion, but now without the shedding of blood there is no remission. That is a requirement of the Lord for those who desire forgiveness of sins.

The writer says the Old Testament was a pattern only of the heavenly. This, which was only a symbol, was purified with blood. The blood of bulls and goats could never satisfy the demands of that Most Holy place in heaven. This required a perfect sacrifice and only Jesus Christ could qualify.

Verses 25-26 show the supremacy of the sacrifice. It was not to

be a repeated thing as the offerings of the first testament were. The Aaronic priest had to go in to offer blood every year — but now Jesus came, and once and for all put away sin by the sacrifice of Himself.

Now let us look at three last things:

1. The truth exalted — verse 27. Ah, how many sermons have been preached from this verse. It states two unalterable facts: We are going to die, and we will then face God.

2. The treasure examined — verse 28a. Christ was offered to bear our sins — Isaiah 53:6. The treasure is He paid my debt.

3. The triumph exalted — verse 28b. He will appear another time, not as the lamb to die once again, but as the lion of the tribe of Judah. Then we will be saved from the very presence of sin.






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

Know where to draw your lines

What would you say if you went to a doctor with a report that went something like, "Doctor, I woke up this morning sweating and with chest pains. Do you think I should come in?" And having the doctor

respond, "Do you realize that only 1 in 10 people who have chest pains actually have some kind of heart

event going on? Unless you have really good health insurance, if the chest pains have gone away, I wouldn't worry about it."

Fortunately, I don't know much about heart events, but I do know that I'm getting another opinion. I may want this guy with me in Biloxi, but I want another doctor.

People ask me, and they ask Realtors constantly, whether or not they need a survey when they buy property. The answer could never be "no" for anyone who understands the consequences of the wrong answer.

I know a survey slows the process down, and it may be expensive. I also know a survey may reveal boundary line issues that make closing difficult or impossible. But if a survey makes closing impossible because of what it discloses, think of the expense and trouble if a problem that would have been easily disclosed is only discovered after closing.

The Realtor, lawyer, or

anyone else who is paid to know, will have his own neck on the block if he gave the advice not to bother with a survey.

Understand please what a survey is intended to do. I reviewed a closing last week in which a very expensive acre of property had been bought in a city, supposedly at a highway intersection. Someone permitted closing to occur before a survey was ordered.

After the survey was obtained, it became clear that someone else owned all of the property that surrounded this one-acre tract. Not one side of the property touched on a legal right of way. Everyone wants to get into the title insurance business, and some company wrote a policy insuring this acre.

The closing agent and Realtor both got their commissions and the closing happened timely. Now someone has to deal with the mess. It is not unrealistic to believe that the title company, the real estate broker, the mortgage company, and all of the parties, will pay a lot more money in lawsuits to straighten this out than they made on the deal. Being sloppy is not worth the cost.

There are two kinds of information shown on an ALTA (American Land Title Association) survey. The first is anything contained in the public records. The boundary lines, surely. But also anything else documented, even if never built or used.

A gas or power line easement, or access way dedeed but not built, must

be shown. That's the only way you will know it exists. Contiguity with streets and other lots will be shown. In addition, any improvement or use that is not recorded but is apparent from a view of the property must be shown on a survey.

If the neighbor has been using the property as his access, for example, or for his tin shed or fence, this will all be shown on a proper survey, even if the use was never documented.

I have suggested that there are two rules for ordering a survey. The first is to never tell someone they don't need a survey. That is a decision a buyer should make after knowing the risks.

For instance, if there is an existing survey, and if the property is a residential lot on which no changes have been made since the date of a prior survey, and if someone having that survey in hand goes to the lot to verify its information, a survey can be waived, but only if the mortgage or banking regulations of the mortgagee permit that.

Normally banking regulations will not permit that exception to apply to commercial property.

The second rule when you order a survey is don't call the surveyor. Call the title company first. Tell the title company to do a search of all public records that have anything to do with this property. Then have the title company send its title work to the surveyor to plot everything shown on the public records before he ever visits the property.

Only then do you get

the full benefit of your survey and only by doing that will you have an ALTA qualified survey. The title work available to the surveyor will be identified on the face of an ALTA survey.

Be the experienced, careful professional in the deal. Make sure a complete copy of the title work is given to the surveyor before he begins work. The title commitment must be identified on the face of an ATLA survey.

An old guy (about my age) walked in during the rain, and put his Cadillac

keys in his pocket. He sat down in the booth across from me and announced that his dog was a service dog and he had a right to bring his dog (wet) into the restaurant, and sit him down in the aisle beside me while I ate fried mullet. I said nothing, but when the owner said "no," the dog owner called the sheriff.

The deputy was very polite, but visibly confused. He also didn't understand why this guy would drive up and insist that he had a right to bring his dog (or presumably some other



animal) in for lunch.

Applications for scholarships in the Humanities, Fine and Performing Arts Division at Northwest Florida State College are now being accepted for dance, drama, instrument, technical theater, visual arts and voice students.

Scholarship recipients must re-apply each spring semester.

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

Senzel and Chase Chambers, who reached on an error; also scored in the Farragut fourth as the Admirals took a 3-1 lead.

The Admirals struck for three more runs in the fifth inning to push the lead to 6-1.

Donofro was lifted after the fifth, but not without earning praise from his coach.

"Roman did a great job and kept us in the game," Gillis said. "We had a couple of innings where things got a little sideways, but give those guys credit; they barreled some balls up. They hit the ball hard."

"But Roman has good stuff and I thought he was excellent. He kept a good team off balance and he gave us a chance to win every time out, and that's what we are looking for."


Donofro finished the night with five strikeouts while giving up seven hits and five earned runs.

Davis Champion replaced Donofro and worked a scoreless sixth inning.


The Bulldogs kept fighting until the very end.

Armstrong led off the Crestview sixth inning with a base hit and again Rebholz came in as the courtesy runner and scored on a Dakota Dean single.


Seth Thomason took the mound for the Bulldogs in the seventh inning and struck out two Farragut batters without giving up a score, but the Bulldogs were unable to score

Jimmy Croussore didn't get a hit, but he reached base three times and scored twice. Croussore was hit by pitches his first two at-plate appearances and walked his final time up.




Henderson wasted no time in getting things going as he drilled the second
