Taylor Nelson passes away Crestview High School grad was 'so inspirational'

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Taylor Nelson, a 2012 graduate of Crestview High School, passed away around 5:30 p.m. Wednesday evening of complications from several debilitating illnesses.

Taylor was an inspiration to his classmates, teachers and friends for his determination to finish school, despite spending

much of his last semester at the University of Alabama at Birmingham Hospital, where he passed away.

Though tethered to an oxygen tank and confined to a wheelchair, Taylor

made it home to attend his senior prom at the beginning of May, and returned again in time to enjoy his church's senior dinner and to accept his diploma at the school's graduation.

However, in recent weeks, his health began to deteriorate and his need for a double lung and liver transplant to combat his cystic fibrosis, diabetes, asthma and more recently, cirrhosis of the liver, became more imperative.

Friends and family members received a text from Taylor's parents, James and Jennifer Nelson, informing them that his kidneys had failed

Something's bugging Crestview

Flying ant swarms stirred up after rains

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When Ken Phelps, a sales consultant at Lee Chrysler Dodge Jeep, stepped out of his south Crestview home Tuesday morning, an unpleasant surprise awaited him: a swarm of flying ants had settled into his neighborhood overnight. "They're all over my house and my white car," Phelps said.

Then when he got to work, even more were waiting, covering many of the vehicles on the dealership's used car lot. "I don't know what they are," dealership manager Howell Larry said. "I've never seen anything like that: Kind of a cross between an ant and a termite. It makes it hard to sell a car. They're all in the cracks in the doors. If we open the door to show a customer, they're going to get inside the car."

While the staff at the Chrysler dealership pondered what to do, workers arriving at Williams Communications off P.J. Adams Parkway found swarms of the critters all over their front door. Neighboring companies in the same commercial complex also found infestations had settled in overnight.

"They're a breed of flying ant," Jason Howard, a technician with Spears Pest Control, said. "We didn't have a winter. We didn't have any consecutive

City considers plastic

Water customers could pay with credit cards

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LAUREL HILL — Residents of Laurel Hill on the city's water system could soon pay their monthly bill with plastic.

While most utility systems offer customers the option to pay by credit or debit card, the city of Laurel Hill does not.

The city's 559 water customers only have two options — pay with cash or by check. That's a problem on the final day of payment before their water is cut off, city Water Clerk Cindy O'oughlin said.

"We have a lot of people who call and say, 'I'm not going to make it. Can I pay over the phone?'" O'oughlin said.

The Laurel Hill City Council could vote on a recommendation to allow the use of credit or debit cards at its July meeting.

"I think it is a good idea," Laurel Hill resident Barbara Goldsmith said. "There are a lot of times when you don't feel like going there and you could just do it by phone."

It will cost the city \$189 for a card reader and computer software needed to allow residents to pay by credit or debit card, along with an annual service charge of \$195 and a \$2 fee for each transaction.

"If we had 10 people who utilized that (the credit card service) and we charged a \$3.50 fee, it would cover those expenses," O'oughlin said at a recent council meeting. "We probably wouldn't have that many for the first couple of months because it is going to take time to get the word out we are able to take credit cards or debit cards."

The \$3.50 transaction fee would only be charged to customers who paid by credit or debit card and could be reduced as more people utilized the service.

"One of the options would be (for the city) to just absorb that fee," Mayor Joan Smith said.

Another option presented to council members was to allow residents to sign up to have their monthly water bill automatically withdrawn from their bank account.

"We have had a lot of people asking for that," O'oughlin said.

There is an initial cost of \$1,000 to set up automatic withdrawals.

The council could approve both the use of credit cards and automatic bank withdrawals, deny both options, or approve one and vote down the other.

Council member Robbie Adams wanted to know which option residents are most likely to use.

"I would think debit (or credit) cards," O'oughlin said.

Iannucci proposes council dress code

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A proposal by Crestview City Council President Ben Iannucci III to institute a "dress code matrix" for his fellow council members didn't exactly meet with an enthusiastic reception. None of Iannucci's colleagues moved to support it.

"It has been brought to my

attention that some council members want to know what to wear for an event," Iannucci said as he brought the matter up for discussion. "It also addresses our attire up here on the bench."

According to a draft of the code distributed prior to the June 11 city council meeting, the proposal was created "for the purpose of

Antioch Road closure announced

Okaloosa County has announced that old Antioch Road in Crestview, from Wilks Street to just west of Brodie Lane, will be closed to through traffic beginning Monday, June 18, from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily (Monday through Thursday). The road will be open each night and all day long on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

P.J. Adams Parkway will serve as a detour during working hours.

Weather permitting, the work is anticipated to take three weeks to complete, while crews clear right of way for upcoming storm water improvements and rebuild the road segment. Access will be available up to each side of the closure, but no through traffic will be permitted.

Cotton Bridge closed to commercial traffic

Cotton Bridge on State Road 4 over the Blackwater River is closed to commercial truck traffic for repairs. The truck restriction will remain in effect until Saturday, June 30.

The bridge is located west of Baker and east of Munson.

Westbound traffic on S.R. 4 will be detoured west on U.S. Highway 90, north on State Road 87 to west S.R. 4. Eastbound traffic will be detoured south on S.R. 87, east on U.S. 90 then east on S.R. 4. The total detour length is approximately 50 miles.

Motorists are reminded to obey the posted speed limit when traveling through the work zone.

days with a freeze for anything to go into a dormant stage. We're seeing them all over. Without a winter in Florida, this is what happens."

After photos and specimens of the bugs were examined at Spears' office, they were identified as male Florida carpenter ants.

"We typically see the females, but these are male swarmers," Howard said.

Other area pest control services also saw a spike in calls from residents and businesses after the torrential rains of the past weekend let up.

"Ants will burrow during a drought situation, but whenever there's a huge amount of rain, the ants come to the surface because there's more moisture on the surface," Michael Cadenhead of Cadenhead Services Pest Control said. "When they swarm they're trying to start a new colony."

"They're the swarmers," Howard confirmed.

"They go out to find new places to establish new colonies."

Cadenhead said the start of summer is generally also the swarming season for termites and ants. A large swarm, attracted by floodlights, recently settled on Durell Lee Park's ballfield during a game, he said. Fortunately, he said the ants seen around Crestview are more of a bother than a hazard.

"If anything they're a nuisance," he said. "They're attracted to lights. Typically, if people are trying to avoid having a bad case of them around their home, the best thing to do is to turn their lights off and pull the blinds."

While a nuisance to area residents and businesses, there was one constituency that welcomed the post-storm plague of ants.

"The birds are eating them out back," Howard said. "They're having a feast."

continuity and for the purpose of informative dress and appearance."

Each of the styles of dress was described by a name, a parenthetical code letter and a description.

"When a notice or reminder goes out to council about a meeting, an event or function, then a capital letter surrounded by parenthesis would indicate the dress that would be recommended," the code states. "This will help the council in dressing more uniformly."

The code ranged from "business" (code letter A)

and "business casual" (code B) to "formal" (code F). The draft dress code also stated that standard attire would be A or B during meetings from Sept. 1 through April 30, with a slight relaxation to A, B or C ("city casual") during spring and summer.

"I appreciate it, being the new guy," council member Thomas Gordon, sporting a gray suit, said, adding to laughter, "I notice you don't have a 'G' for shorts."

Council member Tim Grandberry was noncommittal.

CRESTVIEW DRESS CODE MATRIX

Council President Ben Iannucci III proposed this dress code for members of the city council. Letters in parenthesis would be used to designate the appropriate style of dress on announcements of events.

Business (A): Men-Suit/tie; Women-Dress, blouse with skirt or dressy slacks

Business Casual (B): Men-Sport coat/tie; Women-Skirt/slacks with blouse or shirt

City Casual (C): City logo polo shirt with slacks/jeans, open collar

Casual (D): Men-Slacks/jeans with polo or open collar shirt; Women-Skirt/slacks/jeans with shirt/polo/knit top

Semi-Formal (E): Men-suit/tie; Women-Cocktail

Formal (F): Men-Tux; Women-Long or short cocktail dress/formal pant suit

"At least we would have something to go by," Grandberry said.

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Comment period streamlined

Council supports home rule, receives water supply report

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To streamline and bring order to the process by which citizens can express their concerns during Crestview City Council meetings, Council President Ben Iannucci III has begun enforcing the use of the yellow comment request cards. Cards are available in the rack outside of the chamber doors.

Until the council's June 11 meeting, few citizens bothered to turn in a card to request to speak at the meetings. Former council member Phillip Berezo was one of the citizens who submitted a card Monday evening. He suggested limiting individual comments to three minutes instead of the five-minute maximum to which it was expanded.

Berezo also took issue with the council president assuming the sole authority to approve who is allowed to speak. Currently only Iannucci reviews the cards after they are submitted to City Clerk Betsy Roy.

"That doesn't give the other members of the council the opportunity to know what the topic is" and whether they would like to hear the citizen's comment in the event the president decides against allowing the person to address the council, Berezo contended.

Under the rules, citizens may submit a request by the Wednesday before the regular Monday council meetings to address the body during the "Citizens' Business" segment near the beginning of the agenda. On the day of the meeting, citizens may submit a yellow card requesting to speak during the "Business From the Floor" segment

at the meeting's end. "Business from the Floor is for yellow card submissions that were submitted prior to the beginning of the meeting and approved by the president of the council for discussion," the guideline states.


"Impromptu discussion is for anything that may have come up as a result of the meeting discussions and submitted on yellow cards during the meeting. Impromptu yellow card discussions are at the ap-

proval of the president of the council."

Iannucci stated it is not his intention to deny anyone the right to address the council. However, citizens are reminded the public comment period "is not for campaigning, or for controversy; this is for citizen business related to the city."

In other matters, the council:

- Approved paying a \$1,125 invoice to Okaloosa County for contracted building inspections. Ad-



ministrative Services Director Mike Wing reported the county has proposed a new agreement at a rate of \$75. "I don't like paying \$100 an hour when I believe we can do it for less," Iannucci said.

Upon interim city attorney Jerome Miller's advice, the council unanimously agreed to renegotiate the city's arrangement with the county. Council member Robyn Helt said, "I still feel this city needs a building official that this city has direct oversight over."

- Unanimously approved raising the maximum purchase amount from \$500 to \$750 that department heads can make without seeking

three bids. Clerk Betsy Roy noted that more than \$500 could be lost while work on a project is idled in order to obtain three quotes for needed materials to complete the job.

- Unanimously approved a resolution supporting restoration of local governments' ability to pass smoke-free air regulations. "We have no jurisdiction to say you cannot smoke around our kids or on our ball fields," Iannucci said. "The core of this is not to control smoking but it's an issue of home rule."

- Received a Water Source Report from Public Works Director Wayne Steele following comments

by citizen Landrum Edwards at a previous meeting. Edwards had felt that the city's aquifer was being depleted and saltwater intrusion from the south was a concern. Steele assured the council the aquifer recharges at a robust rate and fluctuates very little, even during drought conditions. Because the aquifer does not extend south of the city, saltwater intrusion is not an issue, he said.

- Heard from Edwards during the citizen comment period as he expressed concern that students and staff attending the new Florida A&M University pharmacy school will overburden downtown parking spaces and the parking lot being built just south of the railroad tracks will pose a danger for people who try to dodge trains while crossing the tracks to and from the lot.

- Citizen Earline Wilks expressed concern about "increased drug activity and shooting in the public housing community. There are shootings there nightly. I know there's not a Street Crimes Unit but why is there not a police presence?"

"We're going to have walking (police) units in that area and a presence there at all times," Mayor David Cadle responded. "We're very much aware of the situation and we're dealing with that with the Housing Authority."

- Community activist Mae R. Coleman expressed dismay about the disbanding of the Crestview Police Department's Street Crimes Unit. Former Police "Chief (Brian) Mitchell, he started cleaning these things up," Coleman said of the problems expressed by Wilks. "That was a good crime unit that we had and they cleared that place out. They were getting guns off the streets. It has shocked me that we don't have that unit."

"We are reorganizing that unit but it may be called by a different name," Cadle said. "That's been a change that's coming. We're working on it."



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Unserved arrest warrants discovered in Crestview

CRESTVIEW — Investigators for the state attorney's office have determined that 14 of 15 recently discovered unserved police arrest warrants are no longer valid.

The warrants were obtained by the Crestview Police Department's Street Crimes Unit in 2007-08.

"All dealt with drug-type offenses," said Bill Bishop, chief assistant state attorney for Okaloosa County.

The statute of limita-

tions, typically two to three years, had expired for all but one of the offenses on the warrants obtained, Bishop said. Crestview police have been directed to follow up on the one valid warrant, he said.

Police Department spokesman Lt. Andrew Schneider could offer few details about where or how the warrants were discovered.

It was not clear if the warrants were purposely held of if there was some other reason they were not

served.

"We sent them to the state attorney's office to clarify their status," Schneider said.

Schneider could also not say whether there was a reason the warrants in question were not served.

"I don't know if they were confidential sources or what," he said.

Schneider, who referred most questions to the state attorney's office, did say the warrants were obtained during the time Maj. Joseph Floyd headed the

Street Crimes Unit.

Floyd was hired in January 2007. He was fired in April after he was indicted on a charge of racketeering.

Police Chief Brian Mitchell, who hired Floyd, also has been fired from the department.

The indictment against Floyd stated he made false statements about his education, background or employment history when he applied for the job.

Mitchell was accused by the grand jury that indicted

Floyd of helping Floyd cover up his tarnished employment history so his hiring would not be questioned.

The racketeering indictment also alleged Floyd falsified or caused others to falsify records or documents and/or altered official police reports.

It states he intimidated or misled other officers, and forced them to withhold testimony, records or documents from official investigations or proceedings.

Bishop said the unserved warrants were "for-

warded to me to determine their legal sufficiency."

The judges who signed the warrants will be required now to recall their orders, Bishop said.

"Any inquiries about how they (the unserved warrants) came about have to be directed to the Crestview Police Department," he said.

Bishop also said it will fall on the Police Department to determine whether agency deficiencies caused the warrants to be misplaced, lost or withheld.

Gaetz will then speak to

the Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce Education Committee beginning at 8:30 a.m.

From 9:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. and again from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., Gaetz will bring his Senate office to the Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce at 1447 Commerce Drive. There, he will meet individually with the citizens of Crestview.

As he has done during similar "Neighborhood Days" over the past six years, Gaetz wants to listen to whatever is on citizens' minds, according to a press release.

"Individuals having problems with state agencies are also invited to stop by," the press release states. "Constituents don't

need an appointment, but can drop in at the chamber and have a cup of coffee. However, if a specific time is desired, call 1-866-450-4DON toll free from anywhere in Florida."

At noon Gaetz will speak at the ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Northwest Florida Blood Services Center, which is located at 2400 Ferdon Boulevard, Suite B. Gaetz will then visit with the Crestview News Bulletin Editorial Board at 12:45 p.m.

Directly following his afternoon office hours at 3:30 p.m., Gaetz will meet with board members of the Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce.

Afterwards, he will travel to the Crestview

Fire Department to chat with firefighters about their issues and concerns starting at 4:45 p.m. Then, at 5:30 p.m., he will talk one-on-one with former State Rep. Jerry Melvin on Crestview Community Television.

In the late afternoon, Gaetz will hit the streets of Crestview, walking door-to-door to meet with residents in their own homes.

"The best ideas don't come from Washington or Tallahassee," Gaetz said. "All too often that's where the problems are. I learn so much from talking with people on their own doorsteps and sitting at their kitchen tables."

Gaetz's senate district includes Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton

and Bay counties. However, based on redistricting plans approved by the Florida Legislature and authorized by the Florida Supreme Court, Gaetz' newly drawn district will encompass the counties of Jackson, Washington, Holmes, Okaloosa, Walton and Bay after the November 2012 election.

Gaetz was elected to the Senate in 2006 following six years as superintendent of schools in Okaloosa County. Previously, he served on the Okaloosa County school board and was the first town chairman of Seaside in Walton County.

As a member of the senate, Gaetz currently serves on several committees including the Senate Committee on Reappor-

tionment, of which he is chairman. In addition, he serves on Transportation, Tourism and Economic Development Appropriations, Health Regulation, Banking and Insurance, Budget, Health and Human Services Appropriations, Rules, Rules Committee on Ethics and Elections and the Joint Legislative Budget Commission. He has been designated by his colleagues to be the next president of the senate beginning in November 2012.

14-year-old charged with attempted murder

CRESTVIEW — A teenager has been charged with attempted murder after he shot someone in the back after a failed attempted robbery, according to police.

James Jamone Thomas Jackson, 14, of 211 Bowers Ave. in Crestview, was arrested June 4 at the Okaloosa County Jail. He was charged with attempted

murder, aggravated assault with intent to commit a felony, firing into a vehicle and robbery with a firearm.

Jackson, who also is known by the name "Perm," is scheduled to appear in juvenile circuit court July 18.

According to an incident report from the Crestview Police Department, Jackson approached a 2003 Nissan Altima on Washington Street with three people inside May 31. Jackson approached the driver's side

window, pointed a semiautomatic pistol at the driver and demanded all the money that was in her purse, the report said.

The driver told Jackson she didn't think he would shoot and began to drive away. As she did, Jackson fired a single shot that hit the vehicle's license plate, went through the vehicle and struck one of the passengers in his lower left back.

Crestview police have not released the name of

the shooting victim or those in the Nissan.

After the shooting, they drove to North Okaloosa Medical Center, where the victim was treated and later flown to Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola for further treatment. The bullet wound was slightly more than 1 inch away from the victim's spine, according to the report.

Witnesses later said they heard two shots fired, and two shell casings were found.

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Welcome Veterans and Active Duty Military Families of Northwest Florida to Another issue of the Veteran's Voice of Northwest Florida.

Since the 2012 Regular Legislative Session ended in Tallahassee in March, there were numerous bills passed that affect veterans in regards to education, business, and intervention programs. Some of the highlights include:

Priority Course Registration

The bill requires institutions within the Florida College System (FCS) and the State University System (SUS) that offer priority course registration for a segment of the student population to provide priority course registration to veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces who are receiving GI Bill educational benefits. Spouses or dependent children to whom the GI Bill educational benefits have been transferred would also be granted priority course registration. Qualified GI Bill users will be eligible for priority registration until the expiration of the GI Bill educational benefits. The bill will enable veterans who are utilizing GI Bill educational benefits to have greater access to available courses, thereby decreasing the number of excess hours taken by veterans and reducing the time to graduate.

College Credit for Military Training

The bill enables eligible members of the United States Armed Forces to earn academic college credit at public postsecondary educational institutions for college-level training and education acquired in the military. The bill requires that the regulations and rules include procedures for credential evaluation and the award of academic college credit, including but not limited to, equivalency and alignment of military course work with appropriate college courses, course descriptions, type and amount of college credit that may be awarded, and transfer of credit.

Business and Professional Regulation

The bill requires the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to waive the initial licensing fees, initial application fees and initial unlicensed activity fees for many state board licenses for veterans returning from service, provided the veteran applies for licensure within 24 months of being honorably discharged. The law will apply to more than 20 professions including construction, real estate, certified public accountants and cosmetologists, as well as businesses under DBPR's Drugs, Devices and Cosmetics Division. The military fee waivers will go into effect October 1, 2012.

Property Tax Exemption for Deployed Service Members

This bill provides an exemption for service members who are deployed outside the continental United States, Alaska, or Hawaii in support of certain named military operations.

T. Patt Maney Veterans' Treatment Intervention Act

The bill authorizes the chief judge of each judicial circuit to establish a Military Veterans and Service Members Court Program for veterans and service members who are convicted of a criminal offense and who suffer from a mental illness, traumatic brain injury (TBI), substance abuse disorder, or psychological problem as a result of their military service. Under the Program, a judge may sentence such veterans and service members in a way that addresses the severity of the condition through services targeted to the individual's needs.

The bill also authorizes a court to impose a condition of supervision requiring probationers or community controlees whose crime was committed on or after July 1, 2012, and who is a veteran or service member who suffers from a military-related mental illness, TBI, substance abuse disorder, or psychological problem, to participate in a treatment program capable of treating the offender. Finally, the bill adds both felony and misdemeanor pre-trial intervention programs as eligible treatment programs for veterans and service members.

Making A Seamless Transition From Military To Civilian Life

VA Resources

The VA has benefits and services for Veterans who are unemployed, looking for work, or in need of training or education to qualify for a suitable job. Service mem-

bers with severe injuries or illnesses may automatically qualify for VA Vocational Rehabilitation benefits.

If you have been referred to a Physical Evaluation Board or are going through the joint VA/Department of Defense Disability Evaluation System, you may qualify for services to begin planning your transition to civilian life.

- VA can pay for college or other training while you are still on active duty
- If all you need is help finding a civilian job, the VA and the Veterans' Services staff at JobsPlus can help with that, too .
- If you are unable to return to work yet, the VA can help you be more independent in your community

There are several ways to apply or get more information about whether you qualify:

- Speak to your Physical Evaluation Board Liaison Officer (PEBLO)
- Attend a Transition Assistance Program (TAP) conducted by Veteran Staff from the JobsPlus One Stop Centers or Disabled Transition Assistance Program (DTAP) briefing at your military facility
- Call the VA at 1-800-827-1000 and ask to speak with Vocational Rehabilitation Division or Point of Contact
- Visit www.va.gov and fill out an online application (VONAPP) for Vocational Rehabilitation
- Apply by completing VA Form 28-1900, Disabled Veterans Application for Vocational Rehabilitation, and submitting it to the nearest VA Regional Office

Transition Assistance Program (TAP)

In the future and as a result of the VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011, service members participating in the Transition Assistance Program (TAP) may get a personalized evaluation of how their military training and experience qualifies them for jobs in the civilian sector.

The Department of Labor has been commissioned to conduct a study of how military experience transfers to civilian jobs. Then, sometime in 2013, the Department of Defense may begin using that information to give transitioning service members a personalized document showing what civilian careers they may be most prepared to pursue.

Because the law did not provide funding or a timetable for implementing this provision, there is no specific schedule for when service members may begin receiving these evaluations. Ask your TAP coordinator for an update on any progress with this initiative.

When they are available, the VA will be able to use these evaluations to develop employment or education plans that can help transitioning service members reach their career goals.

Department of Labor Resources

Veterans Reemployment Portal on CareerOneStop. gov is designed to assist veterans with employment, training, career planning, financial and emotional help after military service. The site links veterans to local resources as well as provides a military-to-civilian job search based on military job title or military occupation code.

My Next Move for Veterans is designed for U.S. veterans making the transition to civilian careers and provides tasks, skills, salary information, job listings, and more for over 900 different careers. Veterans can find careers through keyword search; by browsing industries that employ different types of workers; or by entering their military occupation code or title.

The Transition Assistance Program Employment Workshop gives employment and training information to armed forces members within 180 days of separation or retirement.

Veterans' Employment and Training Services are available in every state and provide assistance to transitioning service members or veterans transitioning to rewarding careers.

Ask a Vet Rep

Each week, the Veteran's Service Team at JobsPlus asks a Veteran Employment Representative/Military Spouse Advocate to give advice on an employment related issue. Liz Westby, a Veteran Employment Representative from the JobsPlus office in Crestview, gives the following advice on how to write a resume:

So you're thinking about transitioning into the civilian world. There are lots of things you'll need to take care of, but here's one important question - how's your resume?

One of the most critical parts of your job search is your resume. This must be closely targeted toward the description of the position for which you are applying. You may want to create several resumes roughly targeted toward the types of positions you are interested in and tweak them each time to match the open position. A good way to do this is to break down the job and turn each of the requirements into a question. Can you do the task? What is an example of when you did this task? What were the results? You will likely need to leave out things from your work history that don't apply to the new position, since if it doesn't matter to the new employer it doesn't need to be there. This may be difficult, but let the job posting be your guide on what to include.

It's a great idea to use a professional summary as a way to get crucial information to the top of your resume. This captures the employer's attention right away and makes them want to know more. Once again, it must apply to the job description!

All employers are different, but many don't require an objective statement. Don't write one that rambles on and on about yourself! If you plan to use an objective statement, make it short and targeted to the job.

There are also some don'ts when writing a resume. Don't use an unprofessional e-mail address, as it sends the wrong message. Don't include reasons for leaving your last job, save that discussion for the interview and remember to present it favorably, to the interviewer. Don't include any protected information (race, religion, marital status). And don't forget to proofread! Use a spell check, but let someone read it as well to check context. Remember, this document will stand in your place until you can be there yourself - make it perfect!

The Department of Economic Opportunity and Workforce Florida Honor Military Appreciation Month

In honor of Military Appreciation Month the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) and Workforce Florida, Inc. (WFL) are highlighting the Hiring Florida's Heroes campaign and the specialized employment services offered throughout the state to support Florida's veterans and the family members of active duty and reserve service men and women. Since "January of 2012" or "the beginning of the year" and the kick-off of the Hiring Florida's Heroes campaign, Florida's workforce partners have served 27,000 veterans statewide and placed 10,000 in jobs.

Florida is home to nearly 100,000 active duty and reserve military personnel, 11,000 National Guard soldiers and airmen, 230,000 military family members and more than 1.6 million veterans. Priority service, hands-on case management, specialized employment assistance and training resources are provided to all veterans and military personnel through more than a dozen different programs facilitated by the state's 24 Regional Workforce Boards and nearly 100 One-Stop Career Centers. In addition, seven regions with large military populations offer specialized employment services to military family members including the JobsPlus One Stop Career Centers in Crestview and in Fort Walton Beach.

With funding from the U.S. Department of Labor's Veterans Employment and Training Service, DEO administers the Jobs for Veterans State Grant in conjunction with various workforce development programs to promote and maximize the employment of Florida's veteran population, especially those with barriers to employment. All 174 of DEO's Veterans Employment Program staff are veterans themselves, allowing them to directly relate to those they are serving. Just over half of these staff focus specifically on veterans with barriers to employment, such as disabled veterans. More than 5,500 disabled veterans have been served so far in 2012, with 1,800 securing jobs.

Services and programs include:

■ Employ Florida Vets Portal

Part of the Employ Florida Marketplace website, the Employ Florida Vets Portal is tailored specifically to the needs and interests of veterans. A veteran registers and sets up a profile with his or her skills and abilities, résumé and work history that is then shared with One-Stop Career Center staff and employers. Veteran job seekers can also receive automatic notifications of job announcements matching their profile. In addition, the portal has a specialized feature to translate Military Specialty Codes (represents military employment classification) into equivalent civilian job titles.

■ VA Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment Program

The VA Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment Program (VR&E) is focused on training and employment services to assist disabled veterans who are being trained or retrained and rehabilitated for new careers by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. DEO Veterans program staff provides workforce services to disabled veterans participating in the VR&E Program such as on-the-job training development, non-paid work experience, selective job placement, case management, counseling, follow-up services, provision of job-seeking skills training, job analysis, labor market information and more.

■ Military Family Employment Advocacy Program

The Military Family Employment Advocacy Program offers employment assistance services, including interviewing, assessment, counseling, job search and placement assistance, labor market information, résumé assistance and more. Eight full-time staff, known as Military Family Employment Advocates, are co-located within seven One-Stop Career Centers in areas of the state with large military populations to provide these services to spouses and dependents of active-duty military personnel, Florida National Guard members and military reservists.

■ Transition Assistance Program (TAP)

Operational at eleven military sites, the Transition Assistance Program (TAP) provides important employability skills training to military members and their spouses as they transition from military to civilian life. Participation in TAP helps provide a path to a quality career. DEO's Veterans program staff facilitates approximately twenty-five TAP classes throughout Florida on a monthly basis.

■ Incarcerated Veterans Transition Program

The Incarcerated Veterans Transition Program provides assistance to incarcerated veterans who will be transitioning back into the workforce with funding from the U.S. Department of Labor. Program services vary and are offered by DEO Veterans program staff located in One-Stop Centers throughout the state.

The VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011

The Veterans Opportunity to Work (VOW) to Hire Heroes Act of 2011 was passed by Congress and the President signed into law in November of 2011. The purpose of the VOW to Hire Heroes Act is to provide seamless transition for military members to civilian life, expand education and training opportunities for Veterans, and to provide tax credits for employers who hire Veterans with service-connected disabilities. Jobs Plus Veterans Service Representatives feel the importance of this Act and are working daily to help veterans and employers understand the benefits they can derive from the Act.

There are four programs that we can highlight here that support the VOW to Hire Heroes Act including:

- VRAP—Veterans Retraining Assistance Program
- Vocational Rehabilitation
- SEI—Special Employer Incentives
- WOTC—Work Opportunity Tax Credit

Veterans Retraining Assistance Program (VRAP)

VRAP offers up to 12 months of training assistance to unemployed Veterans. The Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) and the Department of Labor (DOL) are working together to roll out this new program on July 1, 2012.

The VRAP offers 12 months of training assistance to Veterans who:

- Are at least 35 but no more than 60 years old
- Are unemployed
- Received an other than dishonorable discharge
- Are not eligible for any other VA education benefit program (e.g.: the Post-9/11 GI Bill, Montgomery GI Bill, Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment Assistance)
- Are not in receipt of VA compensation due to unemployability
- Are not enrolled in a federal or state job training program

The program is limited to 45,000 participants from July 1, 2012, through September 30, 2012, and 54,000 participants from October 1, 2012, through March 31, 2014. Participants may receive up to 12 months of assistance equal to the monthly full-time payment rate under the Montgomery GI Bill-Active Duty program (currently \$1,473 per month). DOL will offer employment assistance to every Veteran who participates upon completion of the program.

Participants must be enrolled in a VA approved program of education offered by a community college or technical school. The program must lead to an Associate Degree, Non-College Degree, or a Certificate, and train the Veteran for a high demand occupation.

VRAP will provide training for programs of education that lead to a high demand occupation, as determined by the Department of Labor. Applications are currently being accepted. If interested, please visit eBenefits to apply. Remember, to complete the application, you will need to know your direct deposit information (bank routing number and account number), the name and location of your school, the program you wish to pursue, and the applicable high demand occupation.

Vocational Rehabilitation Benefits for Unemployed Veterans

Veterans with a service-connected disability who previously completed a VA vocational rehabilitation program and have exhausted their initial claim for unemployment benefits may qualify for another 12 months of VA vocational rehabilitation benefits.

To qualify for an additional 12 months of VA vocational rehabilitation you:

- Must have previously completed a VA Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment program and been considered "rehabilitated."
- Must apply within six months of using up your initial claim for unemployment benefits. You can still collect extended or emergency unemployment if you qualify for those benefits.
- Can apply now, but cannot start education or training until June 1, 2012.
- Must apply to VA by March 31, 2014.

There are several ways to apply or get more information about whether you qualify:

- Call VA at 1-800-827-1000 and ask to speak with Vocational Rehabilitation
- Visit www.va.gov and fill out an online application (VONAPP) for Vocational Rehabilitation
- Apply by completing VA Form 28-1900, Disabled Veterans Application for Vocational Rehabilitation, and submitting it to the nearest VA Regional Office

Other Vocational Rehabilitation Resources

There are other Vocational Rehabilitation Agencies to assist individuals with disabilities who are pursuing meaningful careers. VR assists those individuals to secure gainful employment commensurate with their abilities and capabilities through local job searches and awareness of self-employment and telecommuting opportunities. In addition to VR, some states have separate agencies serving individuals who are blind and visually impaired. The Job Accommodation Network lists agencies which can provide employment options for people with disabilities.

America's Service Locator connects people to local offices providing employment and training services. It provides maps and driving directions to the nearest One-Stop Career Center (in this region, it's JobsPlus). America's Service Locator has information on more than 20,000 offices (i.e. Disabled Veterans Outreach Programs and Disabled Veterans Employment Representatives).

Special Employer Incentives

The Special Employer Incentives (SEI) program is for eligible Veterans who face barriers to obtain-

ing employment. Veterans are hired by participating employers at the onset of the SEI program and employment is expected to continue following successful completion of the SEI program. As a result, the SEI program is beneficial for both employers and Veterans.

Veterans receive:

- Immediate income and benefits as an employee
- Incentives to help overcome barriers to employment
- Valuable skills which are learned in a practical setting that meet the employers specifications
- Permanent employment following successful completion
- One-on-one support from a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor or Employment Coordinator to assist with training or work related needs

Employers receive:

- Reimbursement up to 50% of Veteran's Salary during the SEI program to cover:
 - Additional expenses incurred for cost of instruction
 - Loss of production
 - Additional supplies and equipment
- Opportunity to hire qualified Veterans trained to your agency's specifications
- Opportunity to hire a trainee at an apprenticeship wage
- VA provided necessary tools, equipment, uniforms and other supplies
- Help to provide appropriate accommodations based on individual needs
- Minimal paperwork requirements
- VA support during training and placement follow-up phase to assist with work or training related needs

Work Opportunity Tax Credit

The Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) is a Federal tax credit available to private-sector businesses and certain non-profit organizations for hiring certain individuals, including veterans, who have consistently faced significant barriers to employment. The WOTC program enables the targeted employees to gradually move from economic dependency into self-sufficiency as they earn a steady income, while participating employers are able to reduce their federal income tax liability. The VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011 extended and expanded the tax credit for hiring certain qualified Veterans. Through WOTC, for-profit employers may receive tax credits as high as \$9,600 per qualified Veteran or up to \$6,240 for qualified tax-exempt organizations. The amount of the credit will depend on a number of factors, such as:

- The length of the Veteran's unemployment before hire
- The number of hours the Veteran works
- The Veteran's first year of wages

The WOTC only applies to new employees and the qualified Veteran must start work on or after November 22, 2011 and before January 1, 2013. Before claiming WOTC on a federal tax return, employers must first apply for and receive certification from a State Workforce Agency, in our case, JobsPlus, to ensure that the new hire is a Veteran that meets the required qualifications. Other Important Provisions of the VOW Act

In addition, the VOW Act contains several provisions that are designed to enhance the Department's current activities and programs targeted towards veterans. These enhancements include, but are not limited to:

- Required participation in the Transition Assistance Program, which is designed to increase veterans' awareness and utilization of the employment, education, and training programs that are available to them
- Increased veterans' access to apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship programs
- Clarified priority of service reporting requirements within the public workforce system
- Identification of skill equivalencies between military and civilian occupations.

The Department, working in collaboration with other Federal agencies, as needed, is actively developing a strategic plan to implement these provisions within the timeframes contained in the VOW Act. 'Curing' ADD and ADHD?

Old-fashioned parenting more effective than drugs, psychologist says

Dr. Peter T. Oas, speaking at the Crestview Public Library's June First Tuesday program, said his "cure" for children's attention deficit disorder (ADD), attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and oppositional defiant disorder (ODD) is nothing more than skills parents traditionally used.

"We talk about ADD or ADHD or ODD as if it has some kind of genetic basis," Oas said. "We can put whatever spin we want on a particular behavior. I would propose that all ADD and ADHD is, is typical 3- or 4-year-old children's behavior that we haven't trained."

As a clinical psychologist, Oas said he helps parents learn stronger parenting skills. Abandoning the trend of parents being their children's "best friends" and returning to their traditional role of authority figures, though difficult, is key to solving the problem of most so-called "disorders."

"Some think it's pre-determined at birth," Oas told the audience, including some parents with toddlers. "But my percep-

tion is if you have a strong-willed child, you have a weak-willed adult in their life. It has nothing to do with children's brains, but in teaching a child how to behave and grow up."

For part of his presentation, Oas sat in what he called the "ready position" that he teaches his child patients. With feet flat on the floor, hands clasped in his lap and eyes on the adult who is speaking, children are ready to learn and pay attention.

"Why is it that a child can sit like this," Oas said, demonstrating a child's video game playing posture, "for hours and concentrate on complex visual audio and visual stimuli, but they can't sit still for 45 minutes in math class? Maybe we need to teach children how to sit down and pay attention."

While some medications are needed in some situations, Oas said, many popular drugs, such as Ritalin, simply mask a behavioral problem while not addressing its cause, Oas said.

"Are we going to keep prescribing amphetamines to kids?" he asked. "The problem with medications is they don't last, but they affect your heart rate and stunt your growth. It's

not healthy stuff we're putting in our kids' bodies.

"You don't get to the fundamental problem that causes the symptoms. Instead of giving our kids performance enhancing drugs, let's look at retooling ourselves and you won't need to give your children amphetamines."

Reshaping a child's response to parental instructions is part of Oas' approach.

"It's a matter of teaching and learning," he said. "It's not so much a blame-game thing but accepting parental responsibility. You have to tolerate the idea that it is a matter of responsible parenting. Sometimes it's really difficult to accept parental responsibility for how your child acts."

A major step is to reestablish the traditional role of parents, a philosophy Oas said he shares with popular child psychologist and columnist Dr. John Rosemond.

"John Rosemond gives very good advice," Oas said.

"Healthy, functioning families are not democracies. Monarchies or dictatorships, maybe," Oas said. "That's not a real popular notion these days. We've kind of lost the sense

of respect children must have for their parents. The 'terrible twos' is an important time to start training the child to be culturally responsible."

Disciplining a disobedient child calmly, promptly and consistently is important, he added. Rewarding a child for doing something he should be doing anyway is counterproductive.

"We can't shape positive kids by always rewarding them," Oas said. "Sometimes you have to allow the child to suffer the consequences of poor choices. You have to revisit the whole idea of what discipline is. If you say 'no' to a child and it doesn't hurt, are they going to change? Of course not. You must be willing to allow your child to suffer."

Taking away favorite toys or privileges, such as TV or computer time, or early bedtimes are tools a parent can use to make discipline "hurt." "It's a matter of creating the 'ouch,'" Oas said. "There are a zillion ways to create an ouch."

Many audience members supported Oas's assertions during the dialogue that followed his presentation.

"We stopped the Ritalin and started disciplin-

ing," one mother said. "It used more as a means to works."

"These are teachable, but it's not useful for diagnosing the root of the learnable skills," Oas said. "ADD and ADHD are the problem."

"The preferred environment for those with dementia is generally at home," said Potter, who served on the expert panel to help develop content for the Alzheimer's CARE Training Program.

And yet, families caring for seniors with Alzheimer's at home are dealing with challenging behaviors such as anger, aggression, wandering and refusing to eat, according to research conducted for the Home Instead Senior Care network.

The foundation of the Alzheimer's CARE Training Program is an approach called "Capturing Life's Journey" that involves gathering stories and experiences about the senior to help caregivers provide comfort while honoring the individual's

past. Because people with Alzheimer's disease have difficulty with short-term memory, the Capturing Life's Journey approach taps into long-term memory.

The Home Instead Senior Care network assembled the top experts in Alzheimer's disease to develop the CARE approach. "The training we're offering to families is the same kind of training our professional caregivers receive," he noted.


tributes and testimonies in honor of their retiring pastor.



Twin Hills camp has big turnout

If attendance at this year's Twin Hills volleyball camp is an indication of the growing popularity of the sport, the game should be alive and well in Crestview for several years to come.

Twenty-five youngsters participated in the camp, which was divided into age groups 8-10 and 11-13.

"And a lot of the older girls, because the FSU (Florida State University) camp (at the high school) was in the afternoon, they come here in the morning and they still get to go to the FSU camp. And we didn't plan it that way."

Buckelew credited Crestview volleyball coach Kathy Combest with raising the interest of the sport in the Crestview community.

"She's a very good promoter and does a very good job with the girls," Buckelew said of Combest. "I think that helps volleyball."

Buckelew devoted the camp to the basics of volleyball. The players worked on passing and setting Monday. Tuesday they added serving, and on Wednesday, Buckelew was going to lower the nets so the players could get a feel for hitting and blocking.

Buckelew said she didn't have any players back from last year's camp, but she could see an improvement in the overall skills of those at this year's camp.

"The ones that play at middle school are getting better," she said. "I think the skill levels this year are better than last year. I don't know, but we seem to have more athleticism out here this year."

"They listen well to instruction and they follow through. We break everything down little by little so they can understand what we are doing — spoon-feeding rather than throwing an entire meal at once."

Bulldogs host Florida State volleyball camp

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Crestview High School was Seminole territory last week as the Bulldogs hosted the Florida State Volleyball Camp.

Seminole assistant volleyball coach Gokhan Yilmaz led the three-day camp that was broken into morning sessions for high school players and afternoon sessions for middle school players.

The satellite camp is similar to the ones held on the Florida State campus and serves multiple purposes.

"It is to go and reach out to the community and to get more of our name out there so people will know who we are and what we are doing at Florida State," Yilmaz said. "And it gives these players a chance to see how we work at Florida State and for them to get to learn from our perspective how to work."

"These kids will be college age in the next couple of years, so it's important for them to get to know us and know what we are made of and to get the word out about what we are doing. We can come out and get the foundation of our fans for the future."

Yilmaz said the satellite camps also allow players who might not be involved in club or travel volleyball a chance to get noticed and recruited.

"We have a chance to see the local talent that we usually don't see," he said. "So if there is somebody that is really talented, yes, we tell them we are interested in them and would like to talk with them."

The camp focused on the fundamentals of passing, setting, hitting, blocking and serving for both the high school and middle school players, but the high school girls also got a feel for the pace of a college practice and how to set a faster tempo for the game.

Bulldog coach Kathy Combest said she was thrilled with the turn-

out of 17 high school players and 13 middle school players. She was equally happy to see that the things she teaches are in line with what they coach at Florida State, and she was impressed with the way Yilmaz related to the girls.

"It makes us feel good that we say some of the same things," she said. "He says it different, but we actually do some of the same drills they are, just named different."

"He is so charismatic that the girls have just responded to him, and he is warm and humorous. He's got an easy flow about him, and the girls have taken to him real well."

Combest was quick to admit she was learning along with her players.

"You just learn from people that are better than you," she said. "And there is always someone that is better than you. I'm sure he is way better than us because he coaches in college and has his experience behind him."

"Like I say, I don't know everything about volleyball. I try to do my best and learn from everybody and do what I can do."


Crestview players were excited about what they learned from Yilmaz as well.

"I've only been playing a year, and I feel like I'm learning a lot more," Kerrie York said. "I think for everybody it's just going to be setting a positive tone for our season because we are all together and we are having fun but we are still learning. It brings us together as a team."

"They fixed all the little things that haven't been fixed," Middleton said. "Nobody is perfect, so everybody gets better."

"It feels really good that they will come all the way down here to help us. And the team bonding part, I think it is bringing a lot of us together."
