

Seeing the light P.J. Adams flashing light could become traffic signal

A citizen's concerns about heavy traffic on P.J. Adams Parkway that he brought before the Crestview City Council could lead to a traffic light at Villacrest Drive that county engineers say is warranted by recent traffic flow studies. However, the solution agreed to by the council

didn't sit well with a Crestview Estates resident.

At its Feb. 27 meeting, Bill Cox told the council that trying to make a left turn from the Villacrest Drive eastern intersection with P.J. Adams during evening rush hour traffic is "more than dangerous." The 1.4-mile long, horse-shoe-shaped street also intersects with the parkway at its west entrance.

After the council adopt-

ed a resolution supporting a traffic signal at the east intersection, Okaloosa County Public Works department engineers initiated a traffic study at both of Villacrest Drive's P.J. Adams Parkway intersections. Their report was emailed to Cox on May 24.

"The installation of a traffic signal can be appropriate according to the MUTCD (Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices)

guidelines," engineer Clay Simmons stated in his report to county Public Works Director John Hofstad.

However, Simmons' report stated, "staff recommends against the installation of a signal at the Villacrest (East) intersection at this time," citing the lack of funding for the project "and the future P.J. Adams four-laning improvements which would make any in-

stallation temporary."

A temporary signal could be erected at a cost of \$40,000, the report states, which would include timing it with the signal at P.J. Adams and State Road 85. However, another solution, Simmons suggested, would be activating the existing emergency flashing light that serves the Crestview Fire Department station at the corner of Ashley Drive and P.J. Adams.

Ashley Drive becomes Villacrest Drive after crossing P.J. Adams. Key Lime Place becomes Villacrest East when it crosses P.J. Adams. Ashley Drive serves residents of the Riverchase and Southview Estates neighborhoods.

An added benefit to this location is that the signal would likely benefit both Villacrest intersections

How to stay safe on your bike, at the beach or in the water

School's out and the lure of the great Northwest Florida outdoors beckons locals of all ages to enjoy the many recreational resources found in our area. Days at the beach or a favorite fishing pond, splashing in the local swimming hole,

and leisurely bike rides are on the agenda for many area residents.

While having fun with their friends is usually foremost in kids' minds, keeping their children safe while they're playing is often their parents' primary concern. Here are some basic safety tips, gleaned from area experts. Remember, when outside, apply a high SPF sunscreen on exposed skin and use bug spray with DEET to

Contractor's donation to help patch potholes

Laurel Hill to benefit from donation of leftover asphalt

A \$4.7 million resurfacing

project on State Road 85 could yield an unexpected benefit for Laurel Hill residents.

The contractor for the state-funded project, Anderson Columbia Co., Inc., has agreed to pave the parking lot at City Hall and donate any leftover asphalt at the end of each workday that could be used to repair potholes on city roads, city officials said.

The amount of donated asphalt could be substantial. According to Laurel Hill Wa-

ter Clerk Cindy Oloughlin, an Anderson Columbia representative said sometimes the amount of asphalt leftover each day "is going to be a ton, and sometimes it might be three tons."

Anderson Columbia was awarded a contract to resurface 13 miles of S.R. 85 from Bill Lundy Road to the Walton County line, Florida Department of Transportation

by creating pauses in the traffic flow," Simmons' report stated. "Higher traffic counts exist on Ashley Drive which would make this intersection a better overall candidate for signal installation.

"We would also assume that some traffic flow would shift to the signalized intersection resulting in lower traffic pressure at the eastern Villacrest intersection."

In fact, the county's study showed average traffic counts at Ashley Drive and P.J. Adams far exceeds traffic at both Villacrest intersections combined. For 20 hours of the day, Ashley Drive meets the criteria warranting a traffic signal, while Villacrest East meets the criteria 15 hours a day and Villacrest West and Key Lime didn't meet the criteria at all.

At its busiest peak,

which was between 6 and 9 a.m., an average of 390 vehicles were counted at the Villacrest East/Key Lime intersection, while an average of 1,194 were counted at Villacrest West/Ashley Drive, the county study states. Between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m., 3,748 vehicles were averaged at Ashley Drive and 549 at Villacrest East.

Because the county suggested possibly splitting the cost of the \$40,000 project with the city, Council President Ben Iannucci III wondered if the county could therefore put up the entire \$20,000 cost of activating the P.J. Adams and Villacrest West/Ashley Drive signal.

Council member Robyn Helt agreed and moved to direct Administrative Services staff to draft a resolution to that effect. The motion passed 4-1, with

council member Charles Baugh Jr. voting nay.

That solution, however, did not sit well with Cox, who complained that activating the light at the west intersection would force motorists on the east leg of Villacrest to drive a mile to reach it.

"I don't think that has any merit to it," Cox said.

One of his neighbors, speaking during the public comment period, agreed the light should be at Villacrest East.

"Cannot the city do in-house work with the county to put that light there?" resident Thomas Sims asked. "In my opinion, you'd be better off not doing anything (than activating the west intersection signal)."

"The county has the master oversight over that road (P.J. Adams)," Helt pointed out.

said. "Drivers in vehicles are not accustomed to seeing something coming at them in the same lane."

Kimmons explained that in the event of a collision with a vehicle, the chance of injury is lessened if the bike is traveling in the same direction as the car.

"You hopefully go in the ditch instead of having a head-on collision," Kimmons said.

According to a Florida Pedestrian and Bicycling Safety Resource Center brochure distributed by Kimmons and his partner, officer Wanda Hulion, bicyclists who ride facing traffic cause 25 percent of car/bike crashes.

"Wear reflective clothes and light-colored clothes after dark," Hulion also recommended.

Other safety precautions the officers recommended include:

- Bicyclists must obey the rules of the road, including stopping at red lights and stop signs.

- Always wear a properly fitted bicycle helmet. Crestview police officers will gladly assist with fitting your children's helmets.

- Avoid cycling on busy streets.

- Adults should supervise young cyclists.

- Use correct hand signals for stops and turns.

your physical capabilities and don't exceed them.

- Swim in a safe area free of strong or rip currents and obstructions such as tree limbs.

- Have a lookout: Someone who is not actively participating should keep an eye on everyone else and summon help if needed.

- Swim only with people sharing your capability and in areas suitable to your skill.

- Never swim alone, and always keep an eye on your buddy.

"The two primary causes for accidents around the water are lack of supervision and violation of safety rules," Hoover said.

Finally, Hoover cautioned, swimmers should familiarize themselves with unfamiliar waters. Always wade into unknown waters or jump in feet first, he advised. Don't dive until you have determined the water is deep enough.

"Severe spinal, neck and back injuries frequently occur, often including lifetime paralysis, when someone dives into water that wasn't deep enough," Hoover said.

Boating

Whether it's a canoe trip down the Blackwater River or just paddling a rowboat around a local pond hoping to reel in that big one that escaped last time, practice basic boating safety tips:

- Every person in a boat or canoe should wear a personal flotation device, such as a life jacket, Hoover advised. In a mishap, even the strongest swimmer can be injured or knocked unconscious and the life jacket will keep him or her afloat.

- If both paddlers fall out of a canoe, they should climb back in from opposite sides at the same time.

Then as one settles in his seat, the other should help stabilize the canoe before assuming his own seat.

- Even if it becomes submerged or partially submerged, most canoes will remain near the surface of the water. Most injuries and drownings occur when the victim leaves the craft. Climb back into the flooded canoe and use the paddles or your hands to row it to shore, where you may then dump the water out.

Swimming

"People get into trouble right away when they get over confident," said Dick Hoover, director of water

safety at the Boy Scout's Gulf Coast Council. "They try to swim beyond their capabilities. They get into water that's over their heads, and if they're in the ocean, they get caught in a rip tide."

A good way to stay out of trouble is to follow the same Safe Swim Defense practices used by the Boy Scouts, Hoover said.

- Have qualified supervision: an adult should be in charge of group swim activities.

- Be physically fit: Know

spokesman Ian Satter said. The work also includes drainage improvements and joint replacements on a bridge that passes over an old railroad corridor.

Work on drainage improvements began in March. Resurfacing work is expected to begin in about 60 days,

towards the end of summer, Anderson Columbia Project Manager Bobby Braun said.

Resurfacing will be done at night and wrap up by 6 a.m. Road crews dump the unused asphalt on the side of the road each day and clean it up after the project is complete. If not used

quickly, the asphalt hardens and is no good for use.

"If they can use it, they are welcome to it," Braun said.

The city's two water department employees and one road department employee could then use the asphalt to patch city potholes.

"They need that," Laurel Hill resident Barbara Edwards said. "These potholes aren't doing nothing but tearing up people's cars."

The rural city north of Crestview with fewer than 600 residents has struggled to repair its roads.

Steele Mill Creek Road,

New Ebenezer Road and Sunnyside Avenue are among the roads with major potholes that could be patched with the donated asphalt.

Another item on the city's wish list has been to repave the parking lot at city hall.

"We have allowed them (FDOT and Anderson Columbia) to use City Hall for their meetings, so they are going to pave the parking lot," Mayor Joan Smith said.

"They are helping us out, so we are going to help them out," Braun said.

SUV flips on Antioch Road

'The day can only get better,' driver says

The driver of a sport utility vehicle that flipped Friday morning shortly before 8 a.m. on Antioch Road was not injured. The driver said he "drifted off the side of the road" as he rounded a curve. Correcting, he almost avoided sideswiping a utility pole.

However, Kenneth Miller said, the wheels of his Ford Explorer got mired in the earth that was soft due to recent rains, which pulled his car down a slight embankment, causing it to flip over. Miller had been traveling northbound when the mishap occurred about half a mile

before the intersection with U.S. Highway 90.

Miller's SUV landed on its wheels in a marshy area beneath the electrical lines crossing Antioch Road. The car ended up facing the direction he had been traveling from. Debris from the car was scattered around the scene.

"Water was dripping into the car," Miller said. "It kind of freaked me out. I thought it was gas, but the car was still running when I landed."

Miller said though he is insured, he didn't believe his insurance would cover the entire cost of replacing the car if it is totaled by his insurance company.

"If the frame's not bent, maybe I can drive it like this awhile," he said hopefully. "It would sure get some attention."

Gulf Power arrived on the scene to check the utility pole for any damage. Miller believed he might have cracked the pole as he sideswiped it. Tire tracks in the soft earth indicated he almost missed the pole as he endeavored the drive back on the road.

"I'm glad I had my seatbelt on," Miller said. "My speaker flew out the back though," he added, showing a large amplified speaker.

"I found my phone and my iPod," Miller said. "I guess the day can only get better from here."



Do homework when applying for education grant

A call was received at the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office from a 19-year-old college student who reported being scammed out of nearly \$1,000 in what she thought was an opportunity to receive funding to help pay for her education. The victim applied online through several websites for financial assistance and within a matter of days received a call from a man who identified himself as "Mr. Green," who congratulated her for qualifying for financial aid.

"Mr. Green" told the victim that all she had to do to

receive the grant, valued at several thousand dollars, was make a donation to a charity for sick children. Over the course of several days, the victim wired several hundred dollars via Western Union to Nepal, along with placing several hundred dollars on a "Green Dot" card accessed by the scammer.

Becoming a victim of scams like this one can be avoided if you watch out for the following:

- If someone tells you they will need money up front before they can offer you any information or assistance.

- Promises or guarantees that you'll get the grant in the amount you want while offering prizes to divert your attention away from parents and students.

- Requires your credit card number, Social Security number, or bank account number to get you started.

- Requires you to make a decision quickly because your opportunity is about to expire or be offered to someone else.

- Offers to send "free grant money" in the mail with instructions to deposit the check and wire money to pay for processing fees. Most legitimate forms of grant money are sent directly to universities, not to students or parents of future and current college students.

An education beyond high school is a costly investment and the process to pay for college can often be overwhelming for both parents and students.

Federal Student Aid, an

office of the U.S. Department of Education, administers the federal student financial aid — grants, loans, and work-study programs — available for education beyond high school. Federal Student Aid interacts with postsecondary

schools, financial institutions and other participants in the student aid programs to deliver services that help students and families plan and pay for college. To learn more about Federal Student Aid and how to pay for college, visit www.FederalStudentAid.ed.gov or call 1-800-4-FED-AID.



Council likes incentives proposal

Helt then moved to ask staff to invite Kay Rasmussen from the EDC to speak to the council on the issue of the ad valorem tax

abatement proposal, which would have to be approved by voters.

"I think it would be beneficial to the citizenry for her to go on record so they could hear the pros and cons," Helt explained.

Helt's second motion also passed unanimously.

With Professor Dennis Mitchell on the keyboard and Erika Moreno and David Colón from the Fred Astaire Dance Studio gliding patrons around the dance floor, it was an evening of music and fun. More than 75 kids made bookmarks during a crafts session, and dozens of cupcakes vanished as children and adults marched around the circular cakewalk.

The Friends of the Library kept the partiers sated with a buffet of snacks, wraps, drinks and more cupcakes. Other patrons joined the four-round music trivia contest, showing off their knowledge of music through the seven decades since Crestview's first library opened and taking home prizes donated by local merchants.

Guests included members of the Friends of the Library, and Nellie Fleming, a strong supporter of the Crestview library as well as an early organizer of the Okaloosa County Library Cooperative. She was also a founder of the first Friends of the Library.




Choctaw scored two runs in the third inning and added another in the fourth inning and it looked as if the three runs would be more than enough with Blalock in control.

Davis Champion looked sharp on the mound for the Bulldogs in throwing the shutout win in the opener against the Vikings.



I know I'm not a college coach, but if I was Henderson and Dean would be at or near the top of the list of players I would want to sign.



Summer is here! Let's go on a beach safari

Not everyone has a green backyard with bushes and trees. Florida is a peninsula, with the longest coastline of all states in the continental United States. Most of Florida's nearly 19 million residents live less than 60 miles from the Atlantic Ocean or the Gulf of Mexico, making the beach, sand and saltwater their "backyards."

So let's go on a summer backyard beach safari!

Begin your treasure hunt by shelling. Take a walk along the water's edge, and you'll discover hundreds of varieties of shells hurled onto the beach by waves that roll or crash onto the shore.

Seashells were once living organisms. The shell is the hard, protective outer part of an animal, usually a mollusk. Mollusks are animals like scallops, snails, clams and oysters. These creatures make their own shell. When the animal dies or gets eaten by another creature, the empty shell stays empty or becomes a home to other sea critters, like hermit crabs.

Shelling provides hours of fun while looking for that one-of-a-kind, colorful treasure. Before you keep a shell, make sure there is nothing living in it. Otherwise, you need a special license to keep it.

Another activity is digging in the sand for coquinas (pronounced "Ko-KEE-nahs") and mole crabs. It's easy to spend hours getting lost in the color and movement of coquinas and the squirms of mole crabs. Coquinas are tiny clams that live just below the surface of the sand where the waves roll in. Tides carry and deposit them along the shoreline, where they feed on microscopic organisms in the sand. They are a dazzling sight with wonderful colors, like tiny jewels. Sometimes you don't need to dig because incoming waves



because they are soft and fragile. When you are finished observing the crab gently place it back into the soft, wet sand.

Bird-watching is another fun activity. Gulls live on the beach and are known to swoop in to steal your food! Pesky as they might be, they are still fun to watch. Other birds to watch at the beach are pelicans. Pelicans glide just above the water's surface, and then SPLOOSH! They dive into the water head-first to grab a fishy meal.

It's also fun to look for bird tracks in the wet sand. Can you identify the tracks you find? Do not chase the birds to make them fly. Simply watch and admire their behavior.

While on your safari, be sure to wear sunscreen so you can avoid sunburn, and have fun this summer!

Don't panic over horse pigeon fever

Pigeon fever in horses is an infection caused by the bacteria *Corynebacterium pseudotuberculosis*. There are three forms of this disease: external abscesses, internal infection and ulcerative lymphangitis (limb infections).

Since no vaccine exists, the only prevention is fly control, good sanitation and proper wound care. Isolating infected horses and disposing of contaminated bedding are recommended. Decrease fly populations by using fly sprays, feed-through fly control, fly parasites or adult fly traps. The good news is this disease is rarely fatal.

Pigeon fever is sometimes called dry-land distemper because it frequently occurs in the western United States.

Drought conditions seem to encourage outbreaks of this disease. North Florida is still experiencing a moderate to severe drought, making conditions favorable for an outbreak.

Currently, there have been more than 40 cases in north Okaloosa and north Walton counties and, recently, a couple of suspect cases in south Okaloosa County.

The most common form is external abscesses of the pectoral or ventral abdomen. This form causes swelling resembling a pigeon's breast in the horse's chest. The disease is spread via flies, such as horn flies, stable flies and houseflies. It can also be spread by horse-to-horse contact and through contaminated soils.

The Division of Animal Industry is not recommending that horse shows or camps be cancelled due to the pigeon fever cases in the panhandle.

Pigeon fever is primarily spread to horses by flies, so prior to traveling to a show, camp or other event, use fly control on the horses and ensure they appear healthy with no abnormal swellings, fevers or other clinical signs consistent with pigeon fever.

For those owners traveling from the affected areas, we also recommend they clean and disinfect their trailer and equipment before going to an event. For those properties with active cases of the fever, we are recommending no horses travel to events until all clinical signs have resolved and any abscesses have drained and healed.

Symptoms to look for


include external abscesses, fever, severe lameness, decreased appetite and lethargy.

Dr. Reese Williamson, a large animal veterinarian who practices in Okaloosa and Walton counties, advises if a horse has a fever above 102 degrees Fahrenheit, goes off feed or is excessively lame, contact a veterinarian promptly. Treatment must be individualized for the horse, the form of disease and the locations of the abscesses.

Proper wound care of all horses is important. An open wound is an easy way for the bacteria to enter and infect the horse. Clean wounds carefully and use products such as fly repellent ointments on wounds. For more information, contact Jennifer Bearden at 689-5850 or heady@ufl.edu.

Hatchery bass making a difference in Florida

Fisheries biologists often refer to a three-pronged approach to fisheries management: habitat, fish and people. To develop and sustain high quality recreational fisheries, all three components need to be addressed.

Most biologists stress that habitat – from water quality and quantity, to the amount of structure, including aquatic plants and resulting forage – may be the most critical. However; managing fish, which is often seen as stocking more or “better” fish, is often the first thought of anglers.

provided a limited zone for bass to spawn and where submerged aquatic plants could grow. Those plants help shelter fish eggs from currents and provide places for baby fish to hide and feed.

Consequently, FWC biologists implemented a three-phased approach to manage largemouth bass there, beginning in 2000 by planting shoreline vegetation, stocking hatchery fish and implementing an 18-inch minimum size limit on black bass. Today, native bulrush, much of which was transplanted by FWC programs, comprises 5 percent of the shoreline. The goal is 7 percent to 10 percent.

Since then, the FWC has stocked more than 700,000 advanced-sized (3- to 4-inch) hatchery bass. These fish are difficult to raise to this size in large numbers at hatcheries because of their cannibalistic nature and the pond space and time required. However,

these stockings, using fish from the two FWC freshwater hatcheries (Blackwater in Santa Rosa County and the Florida Bass Conservation Center in Sumter County) proved immensely successful.

Timely releases of 2-to-3-inch hatchery bass, reared in ponds on natural food, resulted in 17 percent to 40 percent of the young fish collected in Lake Talquin from October 2000-2003. Three years later, hatchery fish comprised about 25 percent of the angler catch from bass tournaments on Lake Talquin. These fish were identified using a metal-detecting wand to determine the presence of a coded-wire tag that biologists implanted in the hatchery fish before stocking. (See MyFWC.com/Fishing, and click on “Freshwater” then “Stocking” for a video of the tagging process.)

Since 2010, at least 15 hatchery bass weighing 8 to 11.5 pounds have been recaptured from Lake Talquin. Since only about one-fifth of the stocked fish were tagged from 2000-03, many more fish could have been harvested, or caught-and-released, by anglers who didn't know they were holding a hatchery-spawned bass. Supplemental stocking and aquatic plant management activities, as well as the 18-inch minimum length limit may have contributed to the trophy largemouth bass fishery on Lake Talquin.

Previous stocking efforts typically involved Phase-I fingerling bass, which were pond-reared in hatcheries on zooplankton to a size of about 1 to 1.5 inches. But, the fish were vulnerable to predators.

Unfortunately, raising enough 3- to 4-inch bass in hatchery ponds to supplement a significant number of lakes in Florida is cost-prohibitive. As a result, the FWC is experimenting with two alternate approaches. The first uses new artificial diets and a method the FWC developed to train fingerling bass to consume it, rather than each other, so they can be grown in intensive tank management systems more cost effectively. The other involves tricking adult bass in hatcheries using light and temperature to spawn earlier (or later) than they would in nature. This allows pond-reared, Phase-I bass to be stocked when there is abundant forage, such as baby threadfin shad.

Charlie Mesing, the FWC Habitat and Species Conservation biologist responsible for helping manage Lake Talquin, and other FWC scientists experimented with the latter approach recently. Their 2008 scientific publication concluded that stocking low numbers of 3- to 4-inch pond-reared bass prior to the threadfin shad spawn, which occurs around mid-

continues to study ways to make stocking more successful, while enhancing habitat and using appropriate regulations to ensure Florida remains the Fishing Capital of the World.




