Crestview meets its new senator

Don Gaetz holds 'Neighborhood Day' for local residents

With Florida's recent redistricting accomplished in time for the 2012 election, state Sen. Don Gaetz picked up the Crestview area. On Tuesday, Gaetz paid a visit to Crestview for a "Neighborhood Day" with citizens, business people and community leaders.

Gaetz met with constituents, addressed the Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce Education

Committee, sat down with the News Bulletin editorial staff, conducted radio interviews and helped cut the ribbon at the new Crestview office of the Northwest Florida Blood Services Center.

Gaetz, the former superintendent of the Okaloosa County School District, spoke first at the chamber's Education Committee.

"We have to do a lot better job of making sure when a student walks across the graduation stage at high school or college, they actually get more than a diploma," Gaetz said. "A

high school diploma or a college baccalaureate degree without job skills is just Confederate money. You're not going to go anywhere."

Assuring our state universities prepare students for a job is as important as teaching them the curriculum of their chosen fields of study, he said.

"One of the issues is the disconnect between a lot of what we're doing in our state universities and the realities of the job market," Gaetz

Riding with a mission

Foundation to purchase children's graveside headstones

Local motorcyclists are teaming up to create a foundation that will pay for graveside headstones for deceased children from needy families in Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa and Walton counties.

On June 16, AMVET Post 35 in Crestview hosted a poker run

that netted more than \$6,000 for the foundation.

About 135 motorcycle riders and their passengers gathered in the parking lots of the Crestview American Legion Post 75 and adjacent Okaloosa County Health Department in preparation for the ride.

Low turnout prompts 2 food site closures

Two of the sites in Crestview where children can get free meals during the summer are closing because of low turnout.

There are several other locations in the city, however, which will continue to provide free food.

Wednesday was the last day for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Summer Feeding Program at Crestview High School. With only a few children showing up each day for free breakfast and lunch, the program was shut down, as was the one at Lifepoint Church on South Ferdon Boulevard.

Employees who provide the free meals have to be paid and keeping the sites open was not cost effective given the few children who came in for the free food, said Larry Haile, general manager for Sodexo, which provides food services for the Okaloosa County School District.

"I think there are more kids that could take advantage of it," Haile said of the program. "Literally, we could have the football team practicing there and they could get a free lunch. I don't know why the coaches don't encourage that."

Crestview resident Lynn Winstead said the lack of participation is unfortunate.

"There are too many hungry kids out there, and there is free food available," Winstead said. "I would love to see the program utilized to the max."

Eight locations in Crestview, as well as Baker and Laurel Hill schools, will continue to provide free breakfasts and lunches.

All children 18 and younger are eligible for the

Club hosts National Radio Field Day

Members of NOARC — the North Okaloosa Amateur Radio Club — are inviting the public to visit their annual National Field Day event that takes place today and Sunday. Members will start setting up temporary antennas this morning. About 1 p.m. they will begin operating on the air, making contacts with other ham radio operators that are also part of the nationwide emergency preparedness drill.

More than 35,000 amateur radio operators will be part of National Field Day, an activity sponsored by the American Radio Relay League — ARRL — since 1933.

"This is one of the ways we keep our communications skills honed in case we are needed for an emergency," NOARC member Cal Zethmayr, W4GMH, stated in a news release. "Visitors will see and hear our club members talking on the air with other Field Day operations and you can even pick up a mike and chat with someone in another part of the country."

NOARC Field Day 2012 will be at the club station operating at the Dorcas Fire Station No. 42 on Deer Springs Road directly behind the old Mattox Store, about 8 miles east of Crestview on U.S. Highway 90. More information about NOARC is available at www.w4aaz.org.

# DINING FOR MEDICINES | International feast to benefit local medical mission to Belize

A contingent of Crestview medical professionals will depart in August on their third voluntary mission to bring health care to underserved families in Belize. Tomorrow, local supporters can help raise money for needed pharmaceuticals and medical supplies and simultaneously sample cuisine from around the world at a fundraiser dinner at Shoal River

Middle School.

For \$10, attendees will savor samples of two or three culinary treats from each of 10 different cultures. The dinner is sponsored by the Crestview chapter of the Knights of Columbus and will be 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday. Tickets are limited to 600, and volunteer Charlene Cox said hundreds have already been sold.

"It's an oval plate, and the plate was so full," Cox said after a Wednesday "trial run." "It's a huge plate. For \$10, people are go-

ing to get their money's worth."

Represented will be traditional fare from countries and cultures as diverse as the Philippines, Germany, India, Colombia, Guam, Italy and Puerto Rico.

Dr. Joseph Peter, a Crestview pediatrician, will be the lead physician on the annual mission to Belize. He will be joined by Dr. John Johnson, Dr. Indu Christopher, a pharmacist and nurses, plus Knights of Columbus members who perform maintenance and repairs on the clinic and other

facilities in Belize.

The annual clinic is arranged through Our Lady of the Waves Church in Belize City, a sister parish of Crestview's Our Lady of Victory Catholic church.

"Their priest reaches out to the satellite villages," said Bernadine Peter, wife of Joseph. "What we do is, we go fully prepared. That is why we are raising money to buy medicines and transport. Basically we have to take everything with us."

Bernadine Peter said the group

primarily treats cases such as asthma, heart disease, childhood diseases and tropical diseases.

"Now the people know us and have got used to us," she said. "You can't just go over and buy medicine or see a doctor like we take for granted. Medicines are expensive, so that's why we are having this fundraiser."

Bernadine Peter said tickets are still available and may be purchased at the door.

"It's amazing," she said. "It was just a small idea and it grew."

free meals. Program sites provide breakfast or lunch to children in the community, as well as to students enrolled in summer school. The program ensures anonymity and the children do not have to enroll or provide their names. There are no parent income restrictions.

The meals, which consist of cold foods, are given away on a first-come, first-served basis.

"Lunch may be milk, juice, baby carrots and a sandwich," Haile said. "We may do chicken fajita wraps one day and a peanut butter and jelly sandwich the next day."

At Antioch Elementary School, where the last day of the feeding program is June 29, Principal Wanda Avery said about 120 students enrolled in summer school and 160 children in day care get the free lunch and breakfast through the program.

Avery said that although some children from the community who aren't enrolled in summer school or day care have taken advantage of the free food, there haven't been that many.

Among the riders was "Sparky" White, a veteran AMVET Post 35 rider.

"The most important thing to me is this gives us a chance to give back to the community and being in a position to help whenever we can," White said.

The project is the brainchild of Terry Egan, a member of AMVET Post 35, who knows what it is like when someone loses a child and can't pay for a proper burial or a marked headstone.

Three years ago a longtime friend of Egan's lost his son, who was killed by a drunken driver in Florida's Lake County. The friend was unable to pay for the funeral and headstone and Egan and fellow motorcycle enthusiasts volunteered

to organize a poker run, raising more than \$8,000 toward the purchase of a headstone.

"That boy was like a nephew to me, and I had to help," Egan said. "I knew my friend didn't have the money so I came up with a plan for him to pay for the funeral and I'd pay for the headstone."

What Egan didn't realize was how successful the poker run would become. Instead of purchasing the single tombstone as they had intended, Egan and his group suddenly realized they had much more money than they needed and immediately set about establishing a charitable foundation named in memory of Bradley Summersill, the young man who had been killed.

The Summersill Foundation exists today and continues to serve disadvantaged families of Lake County and surrounding communities.

The foundation has purchased five tombstones since 2009.

The fundraiser Saturday was the initial kickoff of a similar foundation to be created here.

A rider who only identified himself as "Hawk" was among the participants.

"I can't think of another thing I'd rather be doing this morning than what we are about to do and it's for a good cause," Hawk said.

Crestview resident and fellow rider Wade Hutto agreed.

"We do it because it's the right thing to do," Hutto said.

said, noting he will push for legislation that will create incentives for Florida's state universities to "establish courses that lead to actual job skills, so when someone graduates from college they can actually get a job."

"I think the community colleges are sensitive to the local economy ... but if you look at our universities, half the students who graduated from American universities are unemployed or underemployed, and they're saddled with huge debt."

Gaetz also touted proposed legislation that would create an "economic security report" that would help parents and students make career field choices, beginning as early as the sixth grade. The reports would detail colleges offering degree fields that interest the student, predict employment potential for the field, and indicate likely salary ranges.

"My hope is that parents can use that economic security report to ask questions," Gaetz said. "Is this degree right for my child? What kind of degree? What kind of school?"

As the Senate's incoming

president, Gaetz said the Florida Legislature will continue to face economic challenges in the next two or three years.

"The green poultice (money) eases a lot of wounds," Gaetz said. "When there's less money, there's a lot of debate and discussion on how resources are used. I think this is the best time to lead the Florida Senate. When you're forced to make choices you're forced to examine all of your assumptions."

Trimming health care costs and making Medicaid more proactive than reactive are potential areas to reduce the budget, he said.

"Medicaid is very shortsighted and short-fund-

ed in paying for preventative care or primary care," Gaetz said. "I think there are things we can do to move money from the back end of Medicare to the front."

Gaetz also discussed his opposition to oil drilling in the Gulf of Mexico.

"Every time the price of gas gets near 4 bucks, somebody wants to drill in the gulf," he said. "We learned in the oil spill that even an international company that we thought was doing things right can do things very wrong. I'm not going to vote for anything that can damage our environment or our beaches."

Given the fatal shooting of a man in south Florida by

a neighborhood watch member, the state's "stand your ground" law will almost definitely be a hot topic in the next legislative session, Gaetz said.

"There will be many well-financed and well-orchestrated attempts to repeal that law," he said. "I will not vote to repeal that law. Just because someone uses a law for a defense doesn't mean they've used it properly and it doesn't mean the law is wrong. It's a gut issue for people, especially in this part of Florida."

Gaetz said his one-on-one meetings with constituents covered a broad range of topics, and will keep him and his staff busy for several weeks addressing each person's concerns.

"A steady stream of people came this morning with every kind of issue," he said. "International, national, state and local. Whatever's been sticking in their craw: gun rights, local zoning, Veterans Administration, Eglin Air Force Base issues."

"I volunteered for this job and nobody forced me into it, and I believe we have to tackle these issues," Gaetz said.

## Okaloosa Teen Court coordinator charged with domestic battery

The coordinator of Teen Court in Okaloosa County has been charged with felony domestic battery by strangulation.

Sean Reed, 40, of Crestview, was arrested Sunday at his home after he allegedly choked a woman during a dispute, according to his arrest report from the Crestview Police Department. The police officer who responded saw red marks around the woman's neck and chest, according to the report.

Reed claimed in the report that he acted in self-defense.

"I don't believe it's going to be going to trial," Reed said Wednesday from the office of Lutheran Services Florida, which runs Teen Court. "I am still working, but I can't comment on anything else."

According to the probable cause affidavit in the police report, Reed and the woman went to Johnny O'Quigley's for drinks after dinner.

The woman told officers when she and Reed arrived at Reed's home later, she could tell he was angry. According to the woman, after they got inside Reed grabbed her by the throat, pushed her against the wall and began choking her, the report said.

Reed told officers the woman had come at him and he was forced to push her

away, according to the report.

He suffered a bite mark on his left arm during the incident, but did not mention it to the officer until he was questioned. Then he said he was trying to get away from her when she leaned toward him and bit his arm, the report said.

The woman said she bit Reed while he was choking her, according to the report.

Beth Deck, regional director of Lutheran Services and Reed's supervisor, said Reed will keep his position until further investigation.

"I know what it's like to get the juicy stuff as soon as possible, but it's disappointing it has to get into the news before it had a chance to make its way around," Deck said.

Lutheran Services partners with the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, the local Juvenile Justice Council, the state attorney's office, the Florida judiciary and the Okaloosa and Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Offices to operate Teen Court.

The program offers first-time juvenile offenders a chance to avoid the courts system and keep arrests off their record. Teens who plead guilty to misdemeanors or lesser felonies are sentenced by a jury of their peers.

Reed has been coordinator of Okaloosa County's Teen Court for nine years.

He is scheduled to appear in court July 17.

## Sheriff's office starts economic crimes unit

The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office is expanding a pilot project involving the formation of an Economic Crimes Unit. The unit will work directly with local financial institutions on combating crimes ranging from check and credit card frauds to identity theft.

On Thursday, June 14, the head of the Criminal Investigations Division, Capt. Arnold Brown, met with local banking officials to discuss the partnership that will allow bank personnel to have direct contact with a team of assigned investigators who focus on their particular crime issues.

"Fourteen percent of the cases assigned to our Criminal Investigations

Division involve economic crimes," Brown said. "This proactive initiative will allow us to train and educate banking personnel, share information such as bulletins of suspects, and to form a type of crime watch system within the local financial industry."

Investigators say the direct access will also mean they get information more quickly on details of the suspect activity, which in turn will enhance their ability to make quicker apprehensions. In the past, patrol deputies took initial reports from bank personnel, then passed the reports on to investigators.

A trial run of the new concept began in January 2012 with Eglon Federal Credit Union and was deemed very successful.

## Residents cautioned to watch for fraud

# College trustees approve 2.5 percent tuition increase

The governing Board of Trustees of Northwest Florida State College has approved a balanced \$33.3 million annual operating budget that maintains the college's tuition rates among the lowest in the state despite budget challenges, according to a college press release.

Following a lengthy discussion, trustees voted to approve a 2.5 percent tuition increase that will result in about \$183 in extra annual cost for a full-time associate degree student and an additional \$279 per academic year for a full-time bachelor's degree student.

The college administration had proposed a 5 percent increase in tuition, the press release states. Trustees chose instead to increase fees by a smaller amount and to reduce the college's contingency budget for the difference.

Starting July 1, college credit classes will cost \$100.12 per credit hour for lower division associate degree courses and \$118.59 per credit hour for bachelor's degree upper division courses.

The general operating budget for the college's 2012-13 fiscal year is \$33.3 million, with a slight increase of \$93,185 over the college's current fiscal year.

The total college budget in all funds, including construction, student financial aid, auxiliary operations and other categories for 2012-13 is \$49 million, changed from \$66.4 million in 2011-12.

College president Ty Handy noted during the budget discussion that the college had received about \$638,000 less in state funding than it normally would have under Florida's traditional funding model since about \$36 million was allocated to nine colleges from

among the 28 via special appropriations.

"The effect of the legislative process used this year was to subsidize one third of the colleges with state funding from the other two thirds of the colleges," Handy told trustees. "As one of the colleges with the lowest tuition cost per student, we have less flexibility to absorb this impact ... resulting in the need to request a modest increase in student tuition and fees."

In other matters, trustees approved an articulation agreement with the University of West Florida that further strengthens the partnership between the two colleges by providing an opportunity for students in the state college's teacher education baccalaureate degree program to be eligible to receive credit for up to six credit hours as they enter the master's in education program at UWF.

The degrees are offered in elementary education, middle grades science education and middle grades math education.

Handy cited the collaborative effort as an example for the state in joint partnerships and noted that the two institutions had recently received \$200,000 in state grants to develop a program that will result in an eventual bachelor's degree in hospitality being offered in the region.

Trustees also approved the long range purchase of a new college enterprise wide computer operations system, the Ellucian (formerly known as Banner) product used by colleges across the nation to control finance, registration and all college operational processes.

Employees spent 18 months researching a system and selected the Ellucian product at a cost of \$7.6 million.

Trustees approved a financing plan at a fixed rate of 1.712 percent through Sun Trust Equipment Finance and Leasing Corporation to finance \$5 million of the total cost over a seven-year period.

Ellucian will replace a 15-year-old product that had been developed and maintained through a consortium of state and community colleges that is no longer adequate for the needs of the college for the coming decades.

Trustees also selected trustee Brian Pennington of Shalimar as chairman and Paul Foster of Fort Walton Beach as the vice chair.

Organizational changes to the president's office were also approved, including the naming of Cristie Kedroski, current director of College Advancement and NWFSC Foundation, to the post of vice president of College Advancement.

The college trustees also approved separating the dean of students and athletic director functions, formerly a combined position held by the recently retired Mickey Englett.

The college is currently conducting a job search for an athletic director and Christine Bishop, the current dean of Enrollment Services, was named to fill the dean of students post in addition to her current enrollment services role.

The annual contract for the college president was amended to comply with new laws related to severance pay and to clarify retirement contributions.

Trustees also approved a retirement resolution honoring the more than 33 years of service of Maxine Randolph of Niceville, who served in a variety of roles, most recently as Student Services specialist at the college's Fort Walton Beach campus.

"Just because somebody has a camp in Pensacola it doesn't mean they have the qualification to do the best camp. They (the players) have to know who can coach, and that's what we have to get over to the kids. For \$45 you get two days and eight hours with two of the best coaches in the world in my book, and you can't beat that."

Combest said the camp will hit the fundamentals. Other aspects of playing the game will be taught as well.

"They are going to learn to score on offense off the dribble and off the pass and coming off the pick," she said.

Combest said they also will teach defensive techniques, such as coming off a pick and working through the person setting the screen.

The camp also will be a learning tool for Combest as she retools herself as a coach.

"You can't be complacent and do the same thing from year to year," she said. "It might not be year to year that you have to change, it may be every 10 years that you have to change, but you have to change. You have to learn new things."

"I'm going to be here learning and filming, and I'm going to be just like everyone else."

Combest said she thinks the camp will open the eyes of some players so they can see what is possible for them through the game of basketball.

"The camp is important because we are going to show them where you can go and what you can do just by doing the right things, working hard and listening to people that know the game more than me," she said.
