Not the same ol' cafeteria

National School Lunch Week observed in area schools

CRESTVIEW — The days of mystery meat and sudden vegetables are long gone, school cafeteria managers said, as north county schools observe the School

Nutrition Association's National School Lunch Week.

Today's students may not notice their white meat chicken patties are baked, or that they're served on whole wheat buns, or that vegetables are crisp and French fries aren't fries at all, but they have noticed improvements in quality and selection.

With a choice of 10 entrées a day in high school,

between five and eight a day in middle school, and four entrées — including two cold and two hot — at the elementary level, students have more choices under the Okaloosa School

District's new food service than when the district ran school cafeterias with food pre-made at a central kitchen.

Twin Hills Park ducks get a nesting place

Eagle Scout candidate receives help for wildlife preservation

CRESTVIEW — Duck production at Twin Hills Park may improve due to a teenager's efforts.

Friends and family of Austin Boyd, 17, joined the Boy Scout at Twin Hills Park on Monday to watch city employees implement his Eagle Scout project, spreading six fabricated, over-water nesting structures on the ponds. Such human-made structures

can improve nest success and species production, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"It's really pleasing to see this," Boyd said as he watched city employees pull his floatable duck nests into the park ponds by boat. Boyd, a Crestview High School senior, worked with the city to build the nesting docks.

"I just noticed that (ducks) kept getting in people's way (at the park)," Boyd, a Boy Scout Troop 731 member, said.

He remembered that when the time came to select a project that would qualify him for Boy Scouts of America's highest honor: Eagle.

Laurel Hill Hobo Festival attendance up

LAUREL HILL — Despite its near cancellation, the annual Hobo Festival went on as planned Saturday at Gene Clary Park. About 600 people attended the event, and organizers said they anticipate future festivals based on attendance.

"For the most part, vendors are saying they are going to come back next year," Elgin "Trea" Duley said

of the event that reportedly netted \$300 for various community projects. General admission was free, but each vendor paid \$25 or \$20, respectively, for a spot with or without electricity.

Vendors — including ceramic artisans, clothiers and bric-a-brac peddlers — lined a paved walkway in front of the main stage that featured local country music artists David Lyle, The River Chase Band and Robert Wayne. Marvin Williford, the band's lead singer,

helped auction off several items including bottles of wine, gift cards and movie passes.

Artisans displayed their wares to earn some extra income and Laurel Hill School's K-12 students ran two booths to raise money for upcoming school functions.

The junior class sold cups of sweet iced tea, with proceeds benefiting the school's April 6 prom. The Minority Council also had a booth where attendees could throw a pie at a student's face for \$1. Proceeds will benefit a springtime field trip to Florida State University in Tallahassee, according to club sponsor and Laurel Hill English teacher Neisha Williams.

Collectively, both groups of students raised nearly \$150 for their efforts, according to Williams. She said she doesn't know the amount needed for the trip, but she believes that the sophomore class will make its goal for the school prom in the next few months.

Children's activities included a giant inflatable

slide and a dunking booth. In addition, Okaloosa County Sheriff's Posse members allowed kids to get in the saddle and take their horses for a guided ride.

Volunteer fire Chiefs Kevin Kendrick of Laurel Hill and Charles Carroll of Almarante, along with the festival hobo, Rev. Mike McVay, were among those dunked. McVay, of First Baptist Church of Laurel

Hill, reprised his role as the festival's iconic hobo, which honors the city's railroad history. After the Civil War, soldiers-turned-migrant-workers traveled the railroads and gave labor to local farms during pit stops.

Florala resident David Fowler, who attended the festival with his family, seemed surprised by the crowd.

"I've been to this festival

the last couple of years," he said. "This is the biggest turnout that I have seen so far."

Laurel Hill residents Jeneane and Herschell Williams brought their grandson Colton Steele, 2.

"We figured this would be the perfect place for him to come and blow off some steam," Herschell Williams said.

His wife seemed pleased by the weather.

"It's a perfect day for this festival," she said.

Children could get their face painted and paint faces on small pumpkins at Darlene and Jeri Garrett's booth.

"We actually had over a hundred kids come by....," Darlene Garret said, adding that she enjoys coming to the festival in Laurel Hill.

"It's real 'tight-knit' community out here," Garrett said.

Still, the festival almost didn't happen.

Earlier this year, low volunteer participation reportedly threatened the event's occurrence.

Even with his stubborn ways, he had a way of getting to you that endeared him; his great sense of humor and his smile will be missed by all."

Surviving are his mother, Josephine Goodwin, Port Jervis; sons, Louis Austie Jr.

and his wife Regina, Milton, and John Harley "Jay" Austie, Crestview; daughter, Christina Austie Crestview; stepdaughter, Sherrie Stanley and her husband Chris, Holt; brother, Darryl Austie and his wife Georgette, Rome, N.Y.; brother, William Goodwin and his wife Juliana, Punta Gorda; sister, Carol Starr and her husband Doug, Forestburgh, N.Y.







In praise of scouting

Earning the Eagle Scout honor isn't easy.

Achieving the Boy Scouts of America ranking requires a scout to:

- Pass through several phases including Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star and Life

- Earn 21 merit badges including First Aid, Citizenship in the Community, Environmental Science, Personal Fitness, Family Life and Emergency Preparedness

- Lead the troop for six months

- Participate in a Scoutmaster conference

- Plan and deliver a community-oriented service project

These things don't happen overnight. It takes several years to progress through the Boy Scouts, and few from each area tend to earn the Eagle honor. Just 51,473 — 5 percent of all Boy Scouts — made it last year, according to scouting.org, the Boy Scouts of America's website.

However, boys who do go the distance have received significant training that uniquely prepares them for life's mishaps.

If they get a flat tire in Timbuktu and lose cellphone reception, they can build a fire, pitch a tent and camp in the woods. They could make a sundial to tell time and plan their days. They can hunt, fish and live off the land for as long as they need to.

If they're camping with friends and someone passes out, they can build a stretcher out of tree branches and fabric from their clothes to safely transport the person. If it's a burn, they can dress the wound. If it's a broken bone, they can splint it.

Scouting projects and survival tips preceded iPhone's "There's an app for that" trademark — and we were better for it. Long before smart phones made us lazier — I mean "more efficient" — scouts had a do-it-yourself project that saved you a trip to the store and some cash, but more important, exercised your brain and made you self-sufficient.

The same is true for the Girl Scouts of America, who also learn vital life skills and receive early entrepreneurial



The hoagies, which include a popular toppings bar, and a wider choice of beverages — including 100 percent fruit juices and flavored waters, but no carbonated sugary drinks — also appealed to Baker School eighth-grader Jamaal Day.

"I think it's nice not having to drink milk all the time," Jamaal said. "I personally like eating the subs here."

Crestview High senior Alex Andrews is partial to the pizza made on a whole-wheat crust with low-fat cheese.

"I don't get it every day, though," Alex said as he took his basket with a chicken patty sandwich, fresh apple, fruit cocktail and chocolate milk to the checkout. "I enjoy a little variety."

Fruits and veggies

"That's part of our national nutrition patterns," Crestview High food manager Lynn Roberts said. "You see more fruits and vegetables on their trays."

Haile said research showed that while 99 percent of elementary school students include a serving of fruit or vegetables in their basket, the percentage dropped to 42 percent of middle-school students and just 36 percent of high-school kids.

"Students must take a fruit or a vegetable with their meal," Haile said. "And hopefully they'll eat them."

Two dieticians at the district office prepare county schools' menus, Haile said, and follow nutritional guidelines including the U.S. Department of Agriculture's new MyPlate standards, those of the School Nutrition Association of Florida, and voluntary standards set by the Alliance for Healthier Education. While previous guidelines under the Department of Education had minimum caloric standards, now that school meals fall under the USDA, "they also put a maximum on it," Haile said.

While the pizza and hoagies were a top choice at Crestview High and Baker School, farther south, the kids at Riverside Elementary School had a different favorite.

"Chicken nuggets," Principal Marline Van Dyke said. "They all love chicken nuggets."

Those nuggets "are whole muscle meat and baked fresh," Haile said. "We don't fry anything in any school."

Van Dyke said very little encouragement is required for her students to make healthy choices when heading down the lunch line.

"It's surprising. When you put healthy selections out there, they'll eat it," she said. "They have whole wheat buns and they probably don't even realize they're having whole wheat buns. They can probably teach their parents something about healthy eating."

Riverside's food service manager Lydia Bradley said the kids generally like the selections.

"There's always something for everybody," she said. "They have a lot of variety. But now and then, we get that one who won't eat anything."

Healthier, with less waste

As kindergartener Jazmyn Diggs carefully used the tongs to help

herself to a crisp quesadilla, Haile said letting the students serve their own portions has proved cost effective.

"We see less waste when the kids serve themselves than when we portion it out," he said.

"We no longer put the food on their plates," Baker School food service manager Cynthia Mims said. "They do it themselves. We just make sure that they are getting the right amount."

Haile said district food service officials are always tweaking the menu in response to student preferences, and learning all the time.

"The kids'll tell you what they think," he said. "They're not shy."

While a Crestview High cafeteria worker took a temperature reading from pizza on the school's à la carte self-serve line, Haile said, "Food safety is very important," noting that each school food service operation is inspected three times a year by state authorities "and they have to maintain an A rating each time."

"We have to document everything to make sure we are abiding by the regulations," Mims said. Occasionally, Haile said, the district office receives a call from parents who say

their children complained about their lunch's variety or quality. Haile said he always encourages those parents to come to lunch at their child's school.

"I invite them to come see what they are served," Haile said. "I've never had a parent come back after they see what their child has to choose from."

Last year in the Okaloosa County School District, Sodexo Education served more than 2.5 million lunches, Haile said. And his customers are noticing.

"Our lunches have greatly improved in the last three years," Van Dyke said.

"I was just blown away that this woman has just lost her son and she was considering fundraising for our cause," Werner said. "I asked her if this is what she wanted to do and she replied, 'I just can't let another child die.'"

Werner said she had gotten to know Taylor during his illness and, like many others, found him inspirational. Although he was wheelchair-bound and used oxygen, Taylor returned to Crestview from the University of Alabama at Birmingham Hospital for his senior prom, and again a few weeks later for First Baptist Church's senior dinner and his graduation.

"I came to see Taylor graduate and then to lose

him days later — this is an opportunity to make a huge difference," Werner said. "I'm like Jenn: We can't let another kiddo go this way. We are so close to finding a cure for this disease."

"This year alone, a new drug entered the market that shows great promise to those living with CF," Adams said in an email. "That is one reason the Race for Lace has now teamed up with Great Strides, the nationwide campaign to raise money and awareness of CF."

Adams said the Nov. 3 events would include games and a slide for registered kids, an after-run breakfast and live music, including a performance by the Crestview High School

jazz band. Awards will be presented for age groups with 5-year increments and for teams, costumes and stroller categories. Boston butts will be available for \$30.

Door prizes include a beach-view condo vacation, a New Orleans vacation, Okaloosa Island Pier fishing passes, a Destin fishing trip for two, a Lewis & Company diamond necklace and local gift cards, organizers said.

The chairpersons said this year's goal is to raise \$30,000, of which \$12,000 in sponsorships is pledged.

"While having all this fun, we are finding a cure for children and adults living with cystic fibrosis," Adams said.

Shoal River capitalized on multiple Davidson mistakes to take a 33-8 win and wrap up a spot in the playoffs.

The Mustangs (5-2) finished as the No. 3 seed in the county and travel to Niceville to take on No. 2 seed Bruner on Thursday in a 6:30 p.m. game.

"It's always good to beat a good football team," Shoal River coach Ryan Gillis said. "Hats off to (Davidson) coach (Chris) Small and his staff. They always

come in prepared.

"They've had a rough year this year, but it's always a battle when you come in here. It's good to get a win. It's always good to beat the Davidson Panthers."

Depending on who you were rooting for, things went from good to great or bad to worse in the blink of an eye when the Panthers fumbled on the first play from scrimmage and LaJonte Watson recovered the fumble and advanced the ball for the Mustangs at the Davidson 19-yard line.

It took the Mustangs seven plays to move the 19

yards before quarterback Rusty Moorer found Cameron Parker with an 11-yard touchdown pass.

The Panthers moved the ball deep into Mustang territory on the night's second possession. However, the drive stalled at the 3-yard line, and Shoal River took over offense again.

Momentum swung in Davidson's favor for a brief moment when the Panthers dropped Kenny Whaley in the end zone for a safety.

Micah Reed powers Bulldogs past Choctaw

FORT WALTON BEACH — It was the Micah Reed Show Friday night at Joe Etheredge Stadium.

Splitting the tackles for a pair of 70-plus-yard runs and routinely running over linebackers and making tacklers miss left and right, the Crestview running back rushed 31 times for 260 yards and four scores to lead the Bulldogs (3-4) to a 28-24 District 2-6A win over Choctaw (2-5).

"What a warrior," Crestview Coach Kevin Pettis said. "I'm so proud of Micah, who's just been a workhorse for us all year."

Reed said an offensive line that opens holes for his highlight-reel runs should receive the praise.

"The offensive line played great," said the senior, who had touchdown runs of 76, 74, 1 and 7 yards, the latter with 8:27 in the fourth that proved to be the game winner. "They opened up holes that were amazing, and I just did my best to run through them."

Though the running back's totals were headline-worthy, Pettis, in addressing his team in the post-game huddle, said, "The most important stat of all is 1-1."

The 1-1 mark he alluded to was the Bulldogs' district record, which sounds much better than their 3-4 overall mark.

That sub-.500 record, which included a four-game losing streak entering Friday night, was largely the product of the Bulldogs' fourth-quarter woes, illustrated in the 41-14 deficit they had in that 12-minute frame en route to their 2-4 mark.

The Bulldogs brushed those memories aside Friday night, outscoring the Indians 7-0 in the decisive quarter.

"We talked all week to the kids about finishing games," Pettis said. "I thought for the year we've played well enough in the first three quarters to win ballgames, but we've had those meltdowns. Tonight, we shrugged those off and came back renewed and earned the win."

The win came on the heels of a 21-17 setback to Fort Walton Beach, tied 2-0 with Navarre atop the district standings.

Meanwhile, the Indians fell to 1-2 in league play. It was the Indians' fifth heart-breaking loss this season, losing by just 19 points in those five setbacks and never by more than seven points in any one. That includes last week's 21-17 loss at Navarre, a team they led 17-6 late, and again Friday night, the Indians couldn't close out the win.

The Indians received 117 rushing yards and a score from a John Hicks to go along with a rushing score by Sebastian Shacon and Chase Whitehead. They also had their moments defensively with three sacks and four forced fumbles. They recovered two of those as they looked in control through the first three quarters.

However, the Bulldogs struck first — and, not surprisingly, it was on Reed's legs.

The senior ate up 51 yards of the game-opening 78-yard drive on nine carries, the last a 1-yard run to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

The momentum, though, didn't last because of ball-security issues.

Late in the first quarter, after Choctaw punted the second time in as many drives, Zachery Theriault recovered a Dakota Davis fumble at the Bulldogs' 15. Four plays later, Chase Whitehead punched it in

on a 4-yard run to knot the score at 7.

Crestview's turnover woes weren't over just yet.

After a pair of defensive stops by both teams, Crestview's Tate Sweatt coughed up the ball on a punt return and Darryl Johnson pounced to set up Choctaw camp inside the red zone. Two plays later, Chacon capped off the 16-yard drive with a 1-yard touchdown run 8:10 to play in the half to give Choctaw a 14-7 advantage.

"We just gift-wrapped them 14 points there," Pettis said.

In response, Crestview would turn back to Reed's legs. Giving him 140 yards in the first half, Reed busted a 74-yard touchdown run up the gut to knot the score at 14 with 1:31 to play in the half.

With the Bulldogs set to receive the ball first in the second half, Choctaw didn't take its foot off the gas. The Indians marched 35 yards to the Bulldogs' 32-yard line, setting the stage for Dominique Jordan. Giving his team the momentum, the soccer player split the uprights to stake the Indians to a 17-14 lead headed into the locker rooms.

"I told the kids we just have to quit beating ourselves and our time would come," Pettis said. "I said, 'If we take care of the football, we will win this ballgame.'"

His words proved prophetic, as the Bulldogs didn't commit a single second-half turnover.

Meanwhile, Reed started the half with a 76-yard touchdown run and, following a Hicks 46-yard touchdown carry, provided the game winner with a 7-yard score in the fourth.

The Bulldogs' defense, which limited Garrison Floyd to just 9-for-18 passing for 37 yards and held the Indians to under 200 yards of offense, then held up its end of the bargain, closing out a win Pettis called a "momentum builder."

do what we do and control our own destiny. The worst thing as a coach is to have to rely on another team to help you get into the playoffs. You want to be able to do it yourself."

Navarre (5-1, 2-0) is under the command of first-year coach Jay Walls, who, like Pettis, is a Rutherford graduate.

"Navarre's got a good football team, and Coach Walls and them do a good job," Pettis said. "We are going to have to bring our A game if we want to win."

"They are burning it up right now, so I'm sure they are going to bring a big crowd. We will have a big crowd, so it will be a playoff-type atmosphere."

The Raiders run a spread offense that features tight end/wide receiver Jordan Leggett. The 6-foot-6 Leggett isn't Navarre's only weapon.

Pettis said quarterback Andrew Rieves and running back Jay Warren are very capable players as well.

Defensively, the Raiders run a 3-

3-stack defense and could put eight men in the box to try to shut down Micah Reed and the Bulldog running attack.

Pettis said Crestview quarterback Dakota Davis will need to step up to keep Navarre from concentrating strictly on the Bulldog running game.

The Bulldogs overcame two turnovers against Choctaw that led to a pair of Indian touchdowns. Pettis hopes the lessons learned against the Indians will help them down the stretch.

"A lot of times, a team would just give up and we didn't," he said. "We fought through adversity — and you need wins like that. You need wins that you win because we've lost a lot of close ones, and we needed a close one that we won just for the mindset of the kids."

It has been more than a month since the Bulldogs won at home, and Pettis said it is important for them to reestablish a home-field advantage.

"I think home field is so huge," he said. "We've lost some games here at home, which I'm not used to doing, so our guys have really got to understand that you don't lose at home. You've got to have the home field advantage, and the crowd has got to get into it."

"It's about confidence going into the next few weeks. We've got to establish that you can't come into the Jack (Foster Stadium) and win. We've got to get that killer instinct about us when we are at home."

"Our guys played within ourselves," Baker Coach Matt Brunson said. "I think we did what we had to do to win the game. Sneads has some big athletic backs that we had to contain, and I think all our guys did what they had to do to win the game, and I'm proud of our effort."

Crowson and Thomas provided a one-two punch as the Gators opened the third quarter going 61 yards on six plays. Crowson did most of the work, gaining 53 yards all on the ground including the last 26 for a touchdown.

Thomas finished off the Gators' scoring, first with his 67-yard run that came with 2:24 left in the third, and finally with his 2-yard scamper with 5:40 left in the fourth as the Gators put the game out of reach.

Keys added another late touch-

down for the Pirates with less than two minutes on the clock, but by then the game was well in hand and the fans were starting to celebrate the win.

The Pirates, who did not attempt a pass, ran the ball 47 times for 215 yards. Joe Boyd led Sneads in rushing with 84 yards on 15 carries.

Martin led Baker in receiving with three catches for 46 yards. Kodi Nixon had two catches for 36 yards.

The Gators return to District 1-1A play next week when they travel to Jay to take on the Royals.

"When you talk about Jay, you have the attention of our guys, so it should be an exciting week next week, getting ready for Jay," Brunson said.


The ball finally bounced Davidson's way on Shoal River's first drive the third quarter. The Mustangs were on the move and had the ball down to the Panther 8-yard line.

Brunson, who played at Baker during the 1980s and was an assistant coach at the school in the '90s, is well aware of the history between the teams.


