Budget to include millage increase

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CRESTVIEW — Three of five City Council members have reluctantly nodded to raising ad valorem taxes while the firefighters union presented a proposal to force senior management members into early retirement.

City Clerk Betsy Roy left Thursday's budget workshop — which Fire Chief Joe Traylor called "a spirited debate" — with somewhat of a council consensus

to finalize a budget based on a .25 percent millage increase.

Most of the three-and-a-half-hour meeting focused on the Crestview Fire Fighters Association's proposal to force Traylor, Deputy Chief Cedric Peterson and Battalion Chief John Rydell into retirement.

Traylor confirmed that the three firefighters are eligible to retire, and that at least three more will be eligible for retirement during the next fiscal year, but said that it should be up to

the firefighter to decide if it is time he should retire.

"The offer of early retirement is probably an appropriate thing to do," Traylor said. "If people accept it, then they accept it."

Capt. Jim Poirrier, the firefighters union's president, said forcing the three department leaders into early retirement would be preferable to laying off a junior firefighter, who would receive no pay.

"If you can send a person home without a paycheck, you can send some-

one home with a retirement check for the rest of his life," he said.

Of the three, two, including Traylor, have fewer than 20 years of service and could retire with about \$60,000 in annual retirement pay. Peterson, with 30 years of service, would be eligible for \$89,000 annually in retirement, Poirier said, using data he received from Finance Director Patti Beebe.

Junior firefighters' starting pay is between \$25,000 and \$28,000. The union es-

timated the city would trim \$301,000 from its budget by retiring the more highly paid senior management and replacing them with lower salaried junior leaders.

Council members were cautiously receptive to the idea, but generally agreed it was not feasible to implement the plan this year. Council President Robyn Helt pointed out that previous realignments in other departments have been successful.

Councilmen Joe Blocker, Shannon Hayes and Mickey

Rytman spoke in favor of accepting the budget as presented by Roy at the start of the meeting, while Helt and Councilman Tom Gordon continued their stance that a tax increase was unacceptable.

"I don't think it's reasonable, I don't think it's fair, and most importantly, I don't think it's sustainable," Helt said of a millage increase.

The meeting abruptly adjourned at 8:30 p.m. in mid-debate upon Hayes' motion and a voice vote of approval.

Yes, we're poor drivers

Speeders, red light runners and inattentive drivers are common threats

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CRESTVIEW — Many local drivers complain about their fellow motorists, but are they as bad as that?

The answer is yes, traffic officers say.

"My belief is the biggest reason we've become bad drivers in the last five years is inattentiveness," Crestview Police Department traffic division officer José Pereira said.

Texting, answering and making phone calls, applying makeup, fiddling with onboard electronics and other distractions cause accidents such as rear-end crashes, driving off the road and sideswipes.

"It scares me when people drive the way they do," Pereira. "You can't watch out for the other driver if you're texting or talking on the phone."

And the state's lightweight new law against texting while driving is ineffective, he added, because it is a secondary offense and people know it.

MYTHS DEBUNKED

Pereira said he wanted to debunk some traffic enforcement myths.

- "We have no quota!"

WHAT WE DO WRONG

Crestview Police officer José Pereira offers these observations after almost three years in the traffic division:

- **No turn signal or incorrect turn signal use:** "People don't know what they (turn signals) are. The law is clear: you have to use a turn signal whenever you change course."
- **Four-way stop confusion:** "People just don't understand what a four-way stop is."
- **Distracted driving:** "It doesn't frustrate me as much as it scares me, because I know what the potential is."
- **Running red lights:** "Waiting a couple minutes for it to turn green again is better than losing time to receive a citation, being involved in a wreck or being transported to the hospital."

We're not required to write one ticket or 300 tickets a day," he said. "All we do is enforce traffic law."

- Police easily defeat ra-

dar detectors and jammers

- Plastic license plate shields don't confuse radar or laser.

Thursday morning, Pereira and his partner, Brian Mulbach, were patrolling the city's problem spots.

"Speeders are our biggest problem," Pereira said, followed by impatient drivers running stoplights.

Even as he spoke, Mulbach, staged at the Tom

The Red Roots to perform Sept. 14 in Crestview

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CRESTVIEW — You can't smooth-talk a Christian country girl, but if you're Central Baptist Church, you can attract her to perform a concert with her sisters.

At least, that's the case for the Red Roots, who will visit the Hub City next weekend before releasing their third album of inspirational music in October.

Nika, Natalie and Nicole Taylor, the 22-year-old red-

home state.

"The way they present themselves is amazing," White said. "If your youth group is looking for good role models, they are it."

Nashville-based Red Hen Records, Daywind Music Group's country music division, agrees that the Red Roots have that "it" factor. The company signed the group to a long-term recording and publishing agreement last month.

Performing in Crestview is a first for the trio, Natalie said.

"We are super-excited about

coming to Crestview," Taylor said. "The crowd can expect high energy on stage with electric guitar solos, rockin' banjo and violin sawin'. All mixed in with a little keyboard, drums, bass and mandolin."

Doors open at 5 p.m.; show starts at 6 p.m. at 951 S. Ferdon Blvd. Tickets cost \$10 per person; \$15 per area youth group.

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

Thumb on the corner or State Road 85 and P.J. Adams Parkway, radioed a description of a tractor-trailer that ran a red light at the intersection.

Drivers breaking the law even when officers are parked and watching traffic is not uncommon. Those drivers are so distracted they don't even notice patrollers, Pereira said.

"I never try to hide," Pereira said. "I have a big, white car. They can see me. There's other places I could sit and be more discreet, but

I want them to see me and know we're enforcing traffic law."

POOR TRAINING

Patrolling 30-mph Aplin Road, where speeding is a problem, Pereira soon netted a 16-year-old Crestview High School student driving 43 mph. Her car had a radar detector — and a classmate passenger.

"This'll probably be all around the high school by lunchtime," Pereira said as he completed the ticket. He hoped the experience

would encourage the young driver to be more attentive.

"We try to help people but not everybody realizes it at the time,"

he said. "Like that young lady: Maybe her parents will give her a little remedial driving training. Maybe instead of giving her a radar detector they'll take it out and teach her to drive the speed limit."

With only one driver education teacher at Crestview High, Pereira said too many young drivers are not receiving thorough training.

"They don't know how to drive on a highway. They don't know how to merge," he said. "They don't know how to do many things because they're not taught it."

Parents, who are supposed to supervise their children's 50 hours of road-driving time required for a driver's license, are often also unskilled and pass poor driving habits on to the next generation of motorists, Pereira said.

Slowing down, paying attention and obeying red lights would eliminate most of the city's traffic accidents, Pereira said.

"It's a statistical certainty, proven over and over: The more people obey traffic law, the fewer crashes we have," he said.



Bulldog volleyball team sweeps Escambia, Tate

CRESTVIEW — It was a rare doubleheader for Crestview High School's varsity volleyball team Tuesday evening.

The Bulldogs were scheduled to play Escambia and had no problem disposing of the Gators in straight sets by scores of 25-7, 25-5 and 25-3.

And then the twist: an unscheduled match was played against District 1-7A foe Tate. The Aggies showed up early for a match scheduled for Oct. 3.

So after making short work of Escambia, the Bulldogs turned around and took on a much stronger Tate squad.

Crestview spotted the Aggies the first set before pulling away to a 3-1 to improve to 5-0 overall and 1-0 in district play. Set scores were 23-25, 25-20, 25-11, 25-18.

"We were supposed to play them (Tate) Oct. 3 instead of Sept. 3, and she (Tate coach Erika Burkett) checked the website and saw we were playing Escambia, but she never called me," Bulldog coach Kathy Combest said.

The Gators never challenged the Bulldogs in the first match.

Escambia led 2-1 in the opening moments of the first set before a score from Brittany Pase tied the match at 2-2.

A Gator rotation violation put

Crestview in front 3-2 and the Bulldogs were off and running on the way to the first set win.

An Escambia serving error to open the second set gave the Bulldogs a lead they would never relinquish. Crestview reeled off four more points with Macie Adams in serve to increase the lead to 5-0 before the Gators finally scored.

Only once in the set was Escambia able to score back-to-back points as Crestview coasted to the win.

It was more of the same in the final set. The Bulldogs opened a quick 6-0 lead with Adams in serve and never looked back.

Pase and Jasmine Middleton led the Bulldog attack with five kills each. Nicole Lefevre and Kierra Potts each had two kills. Adams and Molly Kitchen had two aces each.

The Aggies proved to be a tougher test than Escambia.

Tate used a quick attack at the net in taking the first set.

However, once the Bulldog players adjusted to the faster Aggie tempo, Crestview (5-0, 1-0) was able to swing things in its favor.

"We came out flat in the first game and we just had to pick it up," Combest said. "I was glad to see them coming back and really getting down (to business against Tate)."

Adams led an early charge

in serve as the Bulldogs opened the second set with a 7-0 run. A Middleton kill put an exclamation point on the outburst and Crestview.

But Tate refused to go away as the Aggies battled back to tie the set a 13-13 and again at 16-16. Three quick Bulldog points pushed the Crestview lead to 19-16.

Crestview finally put the set away on back-to-back kills by Middleton and Pase.

The Bulldogs jumped to a 9-1 lead in the third set and were never challenged as they pulled away to the easiest win of the match.

The Aggies refused to go quietly into the night, though, in the fourth set as they tried to force a fifth and deciding set.

Tate led 4-3 early in the set, but a Pase kill tied things up. A Bulldog serving error allowed Tate to tie the set at 5-5.

Once again, Pase responded with a pair of kills that put the Bulldogs in front once and for all.

"They (Tate) did some things and showed me some things we need to work on; letting balls fall that we should get because we just stand and watch," Combest said. "I think if you can watch a ball hit, you can get a ball up."

Unofficially, Pase had 16 kills against the Aggies. Middleton added seven kills and Marisa Rogers had two kills.
