Okaloosa memorial will honor downed pilot

Name to be added to Crestview monument within months

CRESTVIEW — Within the next few months, the name of a 1965 Choctaw High School graduate who was shot down over South Vietnam in 1972 will be engraved on the Okaloosa County Veterans Memorial.

The memorial, on the Okaloosa County Courthouse grounds in Crestview, honors county residents who were killed, captured or listed as missing in action in wars involving American military personnel.

Capt. Jack Harvey will become the latest addition to the monument sometime this spring or summer, according to Crestview Mayor David Cadle, a member of the memorial's board of directors.

The delay in recognizing Harvey is a result of ongoing construction of the new courthouse, which has left the grounds near the memorial in some disarray. The memorial board is concerned that the grounds' current condition wouldn't be conducive to honoring Harvey, Cadle explained.

"We'd like for it to be a little more palatable," Cadle said. Courthouse construction is slated to be complete in about five months.

On the morning of Nov. 28, 1972, 24-year-old Lt. Jack R. Harvey -- he was promoted to captain after he went missing -- was piloting an F-4D Phantom from Udorn Royal Thai Airfield to Da Nang Air Base. Also on board was Capt. Bobby Jones, a flight surgeon. At an estimated 20 miles west of Da Nang, the jet disappeared from radar, going down in an area of heavy enemy activity in deteriorating weather. A search and rescue effort was initiated, but the weather and enemy activity forced its quick cancellation.

Search efforts have continued periodically in the ensuing years. Pieces of the aircraft have been recovered, but no human remains have been located.

For Jim Hawkins, a long-time Okaloosa County resident who pressed for years to have Harvey's name included on the monument, news that the name is just months away from appearing on the memorial is welcome.

New courthouse to feature enhanced security, more parking

CRESTVIEW — Construction of the new Okaloosa County Courthouse is on track for a late-July opening.

The courthouse was originally scheduled to be complete by July 3 but

inclement weather last fall pushed the contract end date to July 29.

Jason Autrey, director of Okaloosa County Public Works, said that while the building may be open by July 29, it could take more time before the courthouse is fully operational.

"We're (going to) have about two, two and a half

months of making sure the building is operating correctly," Autrey said. "I would expect us to have full operation in October."

One of the major features of the new courthouse will be enhanced security measures to keep inmates separated from judges

City Council talks voter outreach

CRESTVIEW — The Crestview City Council, at its work-shop Monday night, discussed ideas for reaching out to voters to educate them about the upcoming city charter referendum slated for the August 28 primary election.

will appear on the August 28 primary election ballot for voter approval.

Part of the discussion focused on how the options would appear on the ballot, but most of the debate was centered on voter outreach and education.

"That's been my concern for three years, educating the people," Councilman Joe Blocker said. "I still believe, number one, that should be done and we're (going to) have to spend a few dollars to do it."

The council debated a number of ways to reach out to voters, ranging from social media outreach to public town hall forums to including inserts within city water bills. However, the consensus was that there is no single form of outreach that would be most effective. A combination of channels would be necessary to educate voters.

Christian Wirth, a Crestview resident who owns a software engineering company, offered to help with internet outreach.

"I think if we spread the word, if we tell people what we're talking about at these events, a lot more people will come," Wirth said.

Councilman Shannon Hayes emphasized the need to make the options simple and readable in order to be accessible to more voters. He was also concerned about low voter turnout, even with outreach efforts in place.

"No matter how much we do to educate the public, there's (going to) be a certain percentage that we're not (going to) reach regardless,"





Alaska; McClellan AFB, California (twice); Okinawa, Japan (twice); Scott AFB, Illinois; and Hurlburt AFB, Florida. He was the manned space recovery team leader for the Apollo-Soyuz and project Skylab space flights while assigned to McClellan AFB, California, and Royal AF Woodbridge, England, respectively.

At McClellan AFB, Terry was the noncommissioned officer in charge of what came to be the largest Pararescue team in the history of the Air Force Pararescue. At Scott AFB he was Chief of Pararescue Operations. Because of his endeavors and sustained accomplishments, Terry was chosen to work on a multitude of important programs concerning doctrine, policy, and force structuring that made the Air Force Pararescue career field what it is today.

During his remarkable career, he was responsible for saving 121 lives, became a master parachutist with more than 500 jumps, and a senior aircrew member with more than 3500 flying hours in a multitude of

weapon systems. The Rescue motto is: "These Things We Do, That Others May Live."

His military decoration and awards included:

United States Air Force 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year, 1979 Distinguished Flying Cross - 1 Oakleaf Cluster Airman's Medal - 1 Oakleaf Cluster Purple Heart - 1 Oakleaf Cluster Meritorious Service Medal - 1 Oakleaf Cluster Air Medal - 5 Oakleaf Clusters Air Force Commendation Medal - 1 Oakleaf Cluster Air Force Achievement Medal (And many more, with multiple awards.)

After retiring from the Air Force, Terry attended Okaloosa VoTech in Fort Walton Beach for two years, majoring in the building trades. He then went on to run his own business in construction and home remodeling for a number of years. It was during this time that Terry met and married Kathleen. God graced them with many years together, to grow in love for Him and each other, to travel and enjoy the retirement years together.

Terry always loved the outdoors and was on

the first High Altitude Rescue Team to successfully climb to the top of Mt. McKinley. Interestingly, shortly afterward, he was actually on a high altitude rescue mission on Mt. McKinley. Terry was always loved and respected by everyone with whom he worked, and was an inspiration to many.

Terry was perhaps most proud of and devoted to his children, Jason and Dana, as he watched them grow and develop into adulthood, as they chose their career paths and raised their own children. Jason followed in his father's footsteps, being selected at the United States Air Forces' (USAF) first Combat Rescue Officer (CRO) Selection and graduating as the first class to complete the Combat Rescue Officer Training Pipeline. To the grandchildren Savannah, Austin, Gabe and Fyn, he was known as their beloved Pappap, as he took them individually on trips across the country, as he took them on walks on the beach in Fort Walton Beach, or through the wash in Vail, Arizona, picking up treasures along the way, and creating cherished memories for a lifetime. They all were his pride and joy.

Terry was a member of the First United

Methodist Church in Fort Walton Beach. It was in his later years that Terry grew closer to the Lord, and endeavored to show God's love to all. It was this love of God that radiated from Terry's sweet smile and easygoing manner.

Terry is predeceased by his mother Edith and father Kenneth, and by all his aunts and uncles. He is survived by his wife Kathleen; his siblings Karen, David and Keith Wetzel; his son Jason Wetzel and daughter Dana Wetzel Fragoso; a daughter-in-law Chrissy Wetzel; a son-in-law Mario Fragoso; grandchildren Savannah, Austin, Gabe and Fyn; his former wife Sandi Rosado; and by many cousins, nieces and nephews.

"It makes me feel great," said Hawkins, an Army veteran and a 1971 graduate of Choctaw High School.

Hawkins said that for him, the fact that Harvey's name was not on the memorial meant that he had been lost twice.

"He was lost in Vietnam, and lost in Okaloosa County," Hawkins said.

According to Hawkins, there are a handful of other Okaloosa residents whose names should be on the memorial in Crestview, and he is continuing to work to have their names added to the monument.

Efforts to have Harvey's name added to the memorial gained momentum in January. At that time, the board of directors announced they were searching for family members as a final step in getting Harvey's name on the monument.

The board consults a variety of sources to determine whether a local combat death can be included on the memorial, and then talks with the family.

"We don't want to put any name of the wall without the family's knowledge," Cadle said in a January interview.

Within a day of a Northwest Florida

Daily News story on the board's search for Harvey's family, his widow contacted the newspaper. The former Barbara Harvey, now Babs Sullivan, had been a local businesswoman for a number of years. She is now retired and living on Choctawhatchee Bay near Niceville. The couple's daughter, Kelly Fernandez, also lives in the area.

Barbara Bell and Jack Harvey met at Choctawhatchee High School and were married a few years later. In the years after her husband's disappearance - he wasn't listed as "deceased" until 1980 - Barbara Harvey became an advocate for families with military members missing in action.

Cadle spoke with Sullivan about having Harvey's name inscribed on the memorial shortly after her story appeared in the newspaper.

"We had a wonderful conversation," he said. "She's just thrilled by this."

The upcoming inclusion of Harvey's name on the Okaloosa County Veterans Memorial likely will be accompanied by some sort of ceremony, Cadle said. That's partly in hopes that calling attention to the memorial might prompt other local families who lost service members in war to come forward, he explained.

"I'm sure we've missed people," he said.

who has custody of her granddaughter. Bennett said the house they were previously living in was old and in poor condition. As with other houses built by Habitat for Humanity, the family is required to participate in building the

home. "The guys are taking care of her, making sure that she doesn't overdo it," Bennett said. "But she's become almost everybody's grandmother here. She's wonderful, and she's got almost all of her sweat equity hours done." Once completed, the house will be the 60th Habitat Okaloosa County has built, including some in the same neighborhood.

The house will include three bedrooms and two bathrooms, and is expected to be completed in late April or early May.

Deputies charge Crestview youth with threatening another student

SHALIMAR — Okaloosa deputies have charged a 12-year-old homeschooled Crestview resident with sending a threat to kill or do bodily injury to another student living in Hillsborough County.

The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office responded to a notification from the Hillsborough County Sheriff's

Office that a post showing a collection of guns and ammunition allegedly was sent to a teen there with the caption, "Many guns to die from," and another post stating, "So you want to die?"

According to an OCSO media release, authorities traced the posts to a Crestview youth who allegedly sent them through an online school portal for the Florida Cyber Charter Academy.

The release stated the defendant allegedly admitted to sending the messages, and said he was just trying to "be funny" and was trying to stick up for a girl that was being bullied in his class by the recipient of the threats. Authorities arrested the 12-year-old Feb. 22 at his home.

Writing threats to kill or do bodily injury is a felony offense.

Off-duty officer helps catch Crestview burglary suspect

CRESTVIEW — A Crestview resident faces burglary and grand theft charges, as well as tool theft from a shed on Old Bethel Road.

According to an Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office media release, deputies arrested William Fontenot, 40, after an off-duty OCSO sergeant saw him "driving a car linked to some local break-ins, including one where he entered a Laurel Hill home while a nine-year-old boy was there alone."

The sergeant followed Fontenot until he allegedly stopped at an address on Patch Avenue, got out of the car and went into a shed.

More deputies arrived at that location and took Fontenot into custody without incident. They towed the vehicle for potential

additional evidence after a search warrant is obtained.

According to the media release, deputies had been searching for a green Nissan Titan with a Florida license plate starting with "GW." Authorities acquired the information from a Feb. 19 break-in where cash was stolen from a home on Steel Mill Creek Road in Laurel Hill.

"OCSO deputies, with the assistance of Covington County, Alabama authorities, were able to develop [Fontenot] as a suspect ... The child who had been at the house picked Fontenot out of a photographic line-up February 21st and warrants were issued for Fontenot in that case," the release stated.

Crestview police officers help homeless man

CRESTVIEW — Two Crestview Police Department officers purchased a meal for a hungry homeless man, according to the department.

When a pair of Crestview Police officers arrived at Main

Street South at State Road 85 responding to a citizen welfare check, they encountered a homeless man sitting by the road. The man appeared to be in a weakened condition, according to the CPD press release.

"He mentioned he hadn't

eaten for a long time and (Officers Corey Newcomb and Cristina Dawson) handled that," Officer Nate Marlar said.

The officers picked up a to-go order of food from a nearby eatery, used their own money to pay for it and returned to give it to the man,

according to the release. They remained with him a few minutes to make sure he was well.

"A concerned citizen had seen him and gave us a call," Newcomb said. "We talked to him and found he hadn't eaten in a couple of days, so we got him some food from the Exxon

station store."

Marlar said officers try not to judge citizens they encounter by their appearances or situations.

"He's another human being," he said. "He needed a hand. That's how we roll at CPD."

Fixing American Education: Politics

In the mid-1960s American education was still among the best in the world. Today, comparative test scores indicate we rank well down the line as compared to other developed nations. Why? The problems are multiple and books have been written that focus on the various problems. Several of these will be examined in future columns. This column is focused on “political” meddling from Washington D.C.

It was 1966 when the first of the massive educational “new broom” programs swept through Congress and landed on our public school system. Since then each new administration that comes to Washington D.C. seems to feel the need to “fix” public education. The results have not been good.

Secretary of Education, Betsy DeVos said, “Federally mandated assessments, Federal money, and Federal Standards, all originated in Washington, and none solved the problem.”

One approach that is still creating “waves” in the public school system is a George W. Bush program called “No Child Left Behind.” Most educators think that “No Child Left Behind” has left many children behind. A key portion of that program

seems to say, “Let’s reward the teacher when his/her students score well on standardized tests.” This approach is designed to motivate the teacher to teach to the test which may develop a nation of really good test takers but not much productivity in more important areas.

President Donald Trump has some thoughts on how to improve our education system too. I suspect his ideas will show up in Congress eventually and our schools will have yet another “new broom” to deal with. Perhaps you will forgive the sarcasm when I say “Oh good, someone else who never spent a day in a classroom or prepared a lesson plan telling the professionals how to teach our children.”

Knowing little about the technical aspects of boats and automobiles, I should never try to tell a mechanic how to fix one. The point is that the amateurs in Washington D.C. should leave the education of our children to those who are trained and dedicated to do the job. The educational process is complicated. There is no “one size fits all” in teaching children. Creating a positive learning environment must be done one to one in the classrooms of America not by the politicians in Washington D.C.

The most important aspect of a positive educational system is the involvement of parents and teachers in the process. You can’t do that from the halls of congress. It must be done locally, school by school, all across the country.

I am among those who believe it isn’t a coincidence

that student achievement began to drop at about the same time Congress and the president began to meddle in our education system. As Stan Laurel of the old Laurel & Hardy comedy team used to say, “It’s a fine mess you’ve gotten us into now Ollie.”

All involved directly in the education of our children know the process is complicated. Many factors have changed since the mid-1960s when our students topped the comparisons in almost every category. The makeup of our school population is significantly different; the

challenges of the 21st century are much greater than ever before, yet our time on task approach is still stuck in the traditions and schedule of an agrarian society; other countries we are compared with have made significant advance in their approaches but we have been slow to change. One might ask, “How does one compare student achievement when we have seven identifiable areas of intelligence and can only test two of them, language usage and math?” Are such tests a good measuring stick for academic competence?

Lest you think I have left out some very important aspects of education in the focus of this column, please note I have word limitations. Thus, to get a broader look at our educational approaches that need remediation tune in next week for the third in this educational series.

Change has always been brought about by youth movements

On Monday, Feb. 1, 1960, four freshmen from North Carolina A&T State University entered a Woolworth’s in

Greensboro, N.C., and took seats at the lunch counter.

As American as baseball, Woolworth’s is where we get the phrase, “five-and-dime.” But its nostalgic patina camouflaged the cruelty of a Jim Crow South.

The four teenagers, who knew they were in violation of the city’s segregation laws, ordered coffee and waited until closing time without being served. They

did so, fully aware of what happened to Emmett Till five years prior, and how no one was held accountable for it.

They sat, knowing that if things went wrong, no police officers would be coming to their rescue.

In the weeks to follow, the sit-ins grew. Students persisted, even as they were pelted with flour and scalded with coffee.

Their cause was taken up by adults who picketed retailers with “Don’t shop where you can’t work” signs.

Mark Twain was right: History might not repeat itself, but it sure does rhyme. The latest movement born on the campus of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, reminds us that young people always have been the tip of the spear in fostering change.

The teenagers who survived a Valentine’s Day mass shooting that killed 17 of their classmates have lighted a fire in response to adults’ inability – or unwillingness – to offer little more than thoughts and prayers.

Children’s crusade Youth embraces what’s possible, even if no one else can see it. Martin Luther King Jr. was not yet 30 when history came calling. His “Children’s Crusade,” with its televised images of children and teenagers being stuffed into jail cells and faced down fire hoses and police dogs, landed in American living rooms like a bomb.

Nine months before Rosa Parks, 15-year-old Claudette Colvin was arrested

for refusing to sit in the back of a public bus in Montgomery, Alabama. But civil rights leaders deemed Colvin too mouthy, too defiant to serve as a test case.

In other words, she was a teenager.

The Vietnam War’s demise was hastened by the passionate and unrelenting protests led by young Americans who saw it for the quagmire it was. By the way, Hollywood got it wrong: It wasn’t middle-age men who saved the world from the Axis powers during World War II. Most GIs were teenagers, 20-somethings, and young husbands and fathers.

Instead of being dismissive of the protests being led by teenagers in Parkland, Florida, we should be rejoicing that another generation has stepped forward to become more engaged in determining their country’s future.

The young leaders of this latest outburst are the embodiment of the words of Thomas Paine: “We have it in our power to begin the world over again.”

No going back Sometimes, youth forgets to tell you how scared you should be. Rep. John Lewis was 18 when he jumped feet first in the civil rights movement, eventually chairing the Student Nonviolent Action Coordination Committee, and became one of hundreds assaulted on Bloody Sunday in 1963.

Carl Bernstein was 28 in 1972, when his reporting on the Watergate break-in helped to bring down an American president and changed the

course of history.

Once people realize they hold the power to make change, there’s no going back, no matter how young they are. The current generation, armed with the power of social media, is leaving us adults in the dust.

Joseph McNeil, Franklin McCain, David Richmond and Ezell Blair Jr. could not have foreseen how their simple, dignified act of ordering a cup of coffee would change America. Certainly they had faith something would change; otherwise, why take such a risk?

In July of that year, Woolworth’s desegregated. Other businesses quickly followed suit.

Wouldn’t it be something if as a result of teenagers, the most powerful legislative body on the planet found the courage to act in the best interests of the vast majority of its constituents who favor better mechanisms of trying to ensure guns don’t fall into the wrong hands?

There are adults who are dismissing and trying to undermine the student-survivor movement in Florida, believing the teens are being coached or prodded, that they couldn’t possibly organize and lead without help from adults with an agenda.

This year, an estimated 4 million teens will turn 18 before Election Day.

Ignore them at your own peril.


to schools and public libraries, or given to other groups that make books available for free or little cost to young readers. Even better, when you buy a book, purchase a second copy to donate or give away.

and the public. Inmates will arrive at the facility through a separate entrance from the public, and will be secured at all times until they reach the courtroom.

"The inmates come into an area," Autrey said. "They never mix with the public, they never mix with the judges, they're completely separated."

In the old courthouse, inmates would enter the building through the same entrance as the victims and judges. That presented a security concern now resolved in the new courthouse design.

"It takes advantage of the best management practices that we have available to us," Autrey said. "Security

is probably our most state-of-the-art component."

The evidence storage room also has enhanced security features. In the event of a fire, the room will be sealed and a fire suppression system will remove all oxygen from

the room, eliminating the need to fight the fire with water, which could damage evidence.

Along with the courtrooms and judiciary offices, the courthouse will host the Okaloosa County Board

of Commissioners when it meets in the north end of the county. It will also feature an electronic law library located adjacent to the first-floor lobby.

"A lot of the information now, since it changes so

fast, as opposed to having volumes of books, you just put it on the internet," Autrey said. "They'll have a kiosk so they can access it there."

The new building will also include a fourth courtroom and judges' chambers, after county commissioners voted to approve the addition in November of 2017. The board approved other smaller changes at the time, adding more than \$500,000 in expenses to the project. However, the current cost is still within the original \$23.7 million budget.

When it opens, the courthouse will be greater than 50 percent larger than the old courthouse with 20 additional parking spaces.

"It's really nice," Autrey said. "It's functional; it's a very efficient use of space. It'll serve the needs, what we need for 50-plus years to come."

Hayes said. "My major concern is I know a certain percentage that is (going to) be well informed. What about the ones who aren't informed and aren't (going to) vote?"

Council President J.B.

Whitten acknowledged concerns about voter turnout, citing 3.8 percent turnout in the last city council election, but was optimistic about civic engagement in Crestview.

"I've seen a change since the last election," Whitten said. "There are people engaged that were not engaged before. I think you're (going to) be surprised. I think

there are (going to) be people showing up at the polls that we didn't see before."

Whitten cited as evidence town halls that he has held over the past year, and civic-minded groups such as the Crestview Citizens for Change Facebook group, which has over 1,300 members.

Crestview Director of

Growth Management Teresa Gaillard said under Florida law any message to voters that comes from the city paid for with city funds must be strictly factual and unbiased. However, individual council members are free to state their opinion on the referendum and its outcome at any time.

At the end of the workshop,

meeting attendees offered their own takes on how to engage voters and what the message should look like.

"We need to maybe look at that, as far as getting the word out there to the people on voting," Crestview resident Sue Jones said. "It doesn't matter who you're voting for or what you're voting for, just go to the polls and vote."

The investment outlook for 2018

By most measures, 2017 was a pretty good year for investors. But what can you expect in 2018?

It's difficult to predict precisely the immediate future of the financial markets. However, many signs point to improved global economic growth and rising corporate earnings — both of which are important drivers of stock prices. In the United States, economic growth may be more modest than in other regions, which could result in international stocks outperforming domestic ones.

Here's another consideration: Low interest rates typically benefit the financial markets — and unless inflation jumps sharply, the Federal Reserve will probably remain patient, only raising short-term rates slowly throughout 2018.

Despite these positive signs, there's also reason for caution. Political uncertainty and changes in economic policies may lead to increased market volatility.

Another factor is the long-term history of the stock market, which includes a drop of 10 percent or more — technically called a "correction" — about once a year. We've gone two years since the last correction, so it would not be surprising if we saw one in 2018.

Given this outlook — which could be classified as moderately optimistic — what investment moves should you consider this year? Here are a few suggestions:

- Rebalance your portfolio — The market's gains may have increased the value of your stocks so much that they now represent a greater percentage of your portfolio than you had intended — and you may not be comfortable with this increased presence.

So, you may want to rebalance your portfolio to achieve a suitable mix of stocks and bonds, based on

your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. As part of this rebalancing, and in an effort to help reduce the impact of market volatility, you may need to add investment-grade bonds and cash investments. (Of course, bonds carry some risks, too, including interest rate and credit risk.)

The availability of cash will also make it easier for you to purchase stocks during a market downturn, when prices may be lower.

- Look beyond U.S. borders — You may want to consider adding some international equity investments to your portfolio, if appropriate. As mentioned above, these stocks may do better than U.S. stocks in 2018, but regardless of performance, the presence of global stocks can help diversify your portfolio — and diversification can help decrease your overall risk level. (However, diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

Keep in mind that international investing carries some inherent

risks, such as those related to currency fluctuations and foreign political and economic events.





How Did Music Begin?

Mini Fact:

Do you play an instrument? Some kids learn to play the piano or violin. Others join the school band.

You and your friends or family might enjoy music at home, in the car or at concerts. Even if you just like to sing, you're using a completely natural musical instrument — your voice!

Music is a big part of our modern lives. But music in one form or another has been part of people's lives for thousands of years.

March is Music in Our Schools Month. This year's theme is Music Connects Us. The Mini Page plays along by looking at the origins of some musical instruments.



The earliest musicians

Prehistoric music is music made before people were writing things down. Because there are no records, experts have to hypothesize (hi-POTH-eh-size), or make guesses, about how early people made music.

Human voices

Humans used different noises to express fear or joy. These sounds, along with some of the sounds they heard from animals, such as birds' chirping, might have led them to make music.

Finding a rhythm

When people began to use tools, for instance to pound grains, they may have done so in a rhythm, or a regular pattern. These sounds

might have led them to make other pleasing rhythms with the first percussion instruments.

Percussion instruments

Early humans probably banged rocks together to make tools. When they did, pieces might have broken off that they used for another purpose, such as scraping.

Those same pieces of stone could have been used to scrape rhythms on shells, wood or other stones.

Early people probably made clapping sounds with their hands. They also might have hit sticks on a hollow tree and noticed how loud it was. This may have been the beginning of a hollow wood instrument called a **slit drum**. These drums are still played in parts of Africa, Southeast Asia and Oceania.

Slit drums are played by the Bamileke people in Cameroon in Central Africa.

Later, people stretched animal skins over wooden frames, then hit the drums with their hands or sticks. Such drums were used in honor of animals or plants.

Some filled gourds, shells or other items with small stones, nut shells or animal teeth and shook them as **rattles**. They were used to accompany, or go along with, music and dance.





Brawl erupts after school basketball game

A high school boys' basketball game between the Laurel Hill Hoboes and Bethlehem Wildcats ended with an altercation between fans of the two schools, according to eyewitnesses and an incident report filed by the Holmes County Sheriff's Office on Monday.

The Florida High School Athletic Association game, which was played Feb. 17 at Ponce de Leon High School, ended in a 66-57 victory for Bethlehem in the District 1-1A final. The win was the Wildcats' third over the Hoboes this season.

The report states that a man from the Laurel Hill section threw a bottle onto the court, hitting one of the Bethlehem players in the head, which then sparked a heated exchange between fans from both sides. Holmes County deputies then directed fans to leave the gym.

Carla Standridge, who attended the game and witnessed the post-game incident, said the fighting erupted after insults and racial slurs were directed at Laurel Hill fans.

"Language being used was the problem," she said. "Emotions are high, then you're being cussed at and told to leave. It escalated so quickly from one or two punches to a massive amount of people."

A video circulating on social media Monday purportedly showed scenes from the altercation. Originally uploaded to Snapchat, and then shared on Facebook, the video shows fans yelling and fighting, both on the court and in the bleachers. Two men can be seen wrestling another man to the ground near the end of the video.

Standridge claims that two children were injured in the fighting.

No arrests were made during the incident, though officers did detain and release the man suspected of throwing the bottle, according to the incident report.

As of Monday, no official charges had been filed with the Holmes County Sheriff's Office. The incident report stated that Bethlehem High School would provide video of the incident to deputies on Tuesday.

The two teams could meet again, at the same site, in less than a week as part of the Class 1A state tournament. They would play for the regional championship on Feb. 27 if they advance this week with wins in the semifinals Thursday.

Some misconceptions about fish sources

I have been involved in the aquaculture industry since the late 1980s, when I got my first job out of college on a tropical fish farm in Plant City. As you can imagine, the industry has changed a lot since then.

When folks find out I have worked in aquaculture, the same question seems to arise: "Is farm-raised fish safe to eat as wild caught?" I would like to say that I don't understand where this question comes from, but over the years I have seen a bewildering number of mass media headlines touting misinformation about farm-raised fish and not enough touting the benefits.

In fact, I saw a post this week on Facebook actually claiming that tilapia have no skin or bones and cannot be found in the wild, both not true. It is no wonder people are so confused. Many of the claims made are not research-based and a quick review of the scientific literature will disprove the statements, but who has time for that?

Aquaculture currently

supplies over 50 percent of all seafood consumed and will expand in the future due to a limit on the amount of wild fish

that can be sustainably harvested, and increasing demand by a growing population. Sustainable, responsible aquaculture is needed to fill that gap. Fish are farmed using a variety of production methods including ponds, raceways, recirculating land-based systems

and in ocean net pens. Each one of these fish species and production methods comes with pros and cons, similar to the production of livestock and fruits and vegetables. Each species can be evaluated based on its environmental impact, production method, and even country of origin.

The American Heart Foundation recommends eating fish (particularly fatty fish rich in Omega-3s) two times per week. We currently only consume about half of that.

This recommendation includes a variety of farm-raised and wild-caught fish. Both are crucial to meet current and future demand for seafood and Omega-3 fatty acids.

A common misconception is that farmed

fish is not as healthy or nutritionally valuable as wild caught fish, although this claim has been largely disproven. One recent paper (Trushenski et al, 2017) compared the nutritional values of wild-caught and farmed bluegill, largemouth bass and hybrid striped bass and concluded that the farmed fish provided more long-chain polyunsaturated fatty acids (LC-PUFAs) per portion than wild fish. However, both are excellent sources of high quality protein and nutrients.

With the Lenten season upon us — a time of a traditional increase in seafood consumption — there is an easy way to choose wild and farm-raised seafood.

One website and

smartphone application that I find easy to use is Seafood Watch (www.seafoodwatch.org). The app uses an extensive evaluation system using research and a panel of experts to label seafood products as green (best choice), yellow (good alternative) and red (avoid) depending on the variety's sustainability.

With this information and a little bit of homework, I hope you come to the same conclusion that I have. Both farm-raised fish and wild-caught fish are delicious, nutritious and great additions to your diet.

if you're having to wait to in line to get your pass," he said. "Doors open at 10, get there earlier."

Three-day passes that are purchased before Feb. 21 are available for early pickup at the venue Thursday night, between 6 and 8 p.m. After that, they are available for pickup at any time during the event.
