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## City moves ahead with shooting range

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CRESTVIEW — Plans for a police department shooting range in Crestview have resumed following Monday's city council meeting.

The council voted 5-0 at their May 14 meeting to terminate the hold on the project and move forward with the shooting range for the Crestview Police Department.

Plans originally went on hold after the council's April 9 meeting when county

resident Mark Anderson, who lives near the proposed site, raised concerns about safety and noise levels. The site is being built about one-quarter mile from Anderson's home, and adjacent to a currently unoccupied piece of property he owns.

Police Commander Andrew Schneider downplayed the impact of the shooting range on neighboring properties.

"The majority of the time, the range will be silent," Schneider said. "It's not going to be utilized as much as it's perceived."

Schneider estimated that the firing range would be in use 12 to 13 days out of the year, with the worst-case scenario being 45 days. CPD will also use the range for other types of training, including SWAT training and K-9 training.

"There will be some days where we'll be out there for the majority of the day, especially for SWAT training," Schneider said. "But there are some months where we won't utilize the range at all."

## Crestview nonprofit gets new director, location

Belief Foundation hires Kingdom Life founder, pastor to lead it as it looks to meet growing demand

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CRESTVIEW — A local charity that works with at-risk youth is undergoing major changes this month. The Belief Foundation recently hired a new director and is looking for a new building to meet growing demand.

The Belief Foundation announced May 7 that Darlene Haynes-Scheuermann will take over as director.

Haynes-Scheuermann also serves as the founder and pastor of Kingdom Life Worship and Training Center. She said the Belief Foundation will move its

operations to the church facilities for now, until a larger building can be found to house the foundation.

"I'm looking forward to whatever we can do to impact the city and make a difference in the city," Haynes-Scheuermann said.

Rosa Rivera, the previous director, started the foundation in 2016 with her son, Jeremias Rodriguez. Rodriguez died in 2017 after going to the hospital with pneumonia. Rivera continued as director of the foundation, but had recently been looking for someone to take over the charity.

The program focuses on students who are at risk of failing school due to poor grades or disciplinary issues, or have had run-ins with the juvenile justice system.

"We provide them a place to

be able to come and get their GED testing done, as well as a homeschool program," Haynes-Scheuermann said.

The foundation currently has 21 students enrolled in a GED preparation program and another 16 enrolled in virtual school. Haynes-Scheuermann said there are another 109 students on the waiting list and they are hoping to increase their capacity soon to meet the demand.

Along with educational programs and mentoring, the foundation has programs for athletics, music, performing arts and basic life skills like cooking and sewing.

"If we don't give them the tools that they need to be successful, then we're looking at homeless people," Haynes-Scheuermann said. "This is what's going to happen with them if we don't get them completing their education and furthering it and seeing themselves as people that can be productive citizens."

## Redevelopment board considers history museum

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CRESTVIEW — A new historic and cultural center could be in Crestview's future.

The Community Redevelopment Agency unanimously agreed at its May 14 meeting to move forward with a grant application to restore the Bush House at the corner of South Wilson Street and Martin Luther King Jr. Avenue in downtown Crestview. The historical \$50,000-grant requires the CRA match the funds.

CRA Director Alisa Burleson brought the grant proposal before the board with the idea that the site could be used as a historic museum and cultural center in the future. The building currently houses Elder Services of Okaloosa County, which would share the building under the proposed plan.

Burleson envisions "a place where Crestview history is actually seen instead of just talked about."

According to Burleson, the museum would display items from Crestview's history, many of which are currently housed at the Baker Block Museum. Burleson is working with the museum's director, Ann Spann, on ideas for the Crestview museum.

The site would also serve as a cultural center that could host travelling art and history displays. Burleson said it could also put on special cultural exhibits for things like Black History Month and Crestview's sister city program.

The grant would be for funding the planning phases of the project. If successful, the board could then apply for a larger grant next year to cover the cost of repairing and refurbishing the building.

Burleson said there are a number of issues with the building, which is currently maintained by the city's public works department, including foundation problems and leaks. An estimate received by the CRA put the total cost of repair at between \$100,000 and \$300,000.

The CRA will now draw up a proposal for the grant, which will be awarded June 30.

### BIRDS Attract hummingbirds with reliable food source

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# Jay Royal becomes naval aviator, headed to Japan

MILTON — Lt. j.g. Payden Roberts of Jay, formerly of Milton, earned his Wings of Gold onboard Naval Air Station Whiting Field in a ceremony on April 27. Roberts, who said both towns hold a special place in his heart, is deeply rooted in the areas surrounding NAS Whiting Field. Roberts and his family lived in Milton for most of his childhood, where he attended the Pensacola Christian Academy, Bagdad Elementary School and Avalon Middle School. After sixth grade, they moved north to the small town of Jay, where Roberts graduated from Jay High School. "Technically, I could call Milton my hometown," Roberts said. "But I most often say Jay. It's where my immediate family still lives and where I would say I really 'grew up' the most. Plus, it's almost a conversation piece. Since no one knows where it is, I get to tell them about it." Roberts lived the classic, small-town-America childhood of close-knit friendships, town pride, and baseball.

"I do love where I grew up and where I'm from," he said. "The relationships are really what attach me to this place. Even after moving, I am still

able to keep in touch with my friends from Milton and Pace, mostly through baseball." But living just west of the busiest airspace in the world is a severe departure from classic small-town America. Roberts says there is no wonder where the idea to fly for the Navy originated. Roberts hardly went a day without thinking about aviation, between the Blue Angels ripping through the sky, numerous visits to the National Naval Aviation Museum in Pensacola, a week at Starbase Atlantis onboard NAS Whiting Field

in fifth grade, and his family home being located directly under the T6-B Texan II course-rules for formation flights. "I have been watching the orange and white planes and helicopters fly over my head my entire life," Roberts said. "It's always been my dream." Yet, there was an even stronger contributor to Roberts' decision.

"Just as much or more influence came from my family's prior service," he said. Nine members of Roberts' immediate and extended family are serving or have served

the nation through military service, in the ranks of the Navy, Marine Corp, Air Force, Army and Coast Guard. With representation in all military branches, Roberts could have claimed family tradition in any one. But he was especially drawn to the Navy, following the steps of his grandfather, retired Lt. Cmdr. Joel Roberts Sr. "The person who really sparked my interest in all of this, and the Navy in general, was my grandfather on my father's side," Roberts said. "He served 30 years in the Navy, enlisting and then earning his commission through Officer Candidate School."

Robert's grandfather passed away when Roberts was eleven, but his family had a surprise for him after the winging ceremony.

"I remember always asking him to show me his sword, which I thought was so cool. Unbeknownst to me, my father actually found my grandfather's 57-year-old sword and cleaned it up," Roberts said.

He was then presented the sword as a gift, following a Navy tradition.

"It was a pretty emotional moment, as both family and tradition are very important to me." Roberts was pinned at the ceremony by his father,

At the April meeting, Anderson suggested moving the proposed site to a nearby, city-owned wastewater spray field.

The council then voted

to put a hold on the project while they explored that idea.

The Department of Environmental Protection officials said that while they would not say no the idea, they did not recommend it, citing examples of other cities that have not had success locating ranges on spray fields due to chemical exposure.

The council was unanimous in pushing the project

forward, citing the need for city police to have access to firearms training and the expense of sending them out-of-county to train.

"A community ought to just bend over backwards to make sure that their police department is that well-trained and proficient, especially with their firearms," Councilman Doug Faircloth said.

Councilman Shannon Hayes agreed, citing the overall benefit to the city.

"I think that the beneficial part to the city outweighs that little benefit to an individual at this time," Hayes said. "Even though I'm concerned about individual rights, I believe the city's needs are worthwhile in pursuing this effort, so I'm for it."

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# Officials: Expect rain, rip currents in coming days

FORT WALTON BEACH — A low-pressure system in the southern Gulf of Mexico has weather experts on alert, but they don't expect it to turn into anything substantial over the next few days.

The National Hurricane Center released an alert on Sunday that a large area of cloudiness, showers, and thunderstorms extending from western Cuba across the southeastern Gulf of Mexico has a 40 percent chance at developing tropical or subtropical characteristics over the next five days.

It has a 30 percent chance at formation through Wednesday.

The system is currently dumping rainfall across parts of southern Florida and is expected to move northward over the next several days, bringing rain to many parts of Northwest Florida.

"The impacts are going to be increased rain chances across the Northwest Florida panhandle, with the best chance of heavy rain being further to the east," said Jason Beaman, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Mobile.


He said it's not "unheard of" to see this kind of activity in the

Gulf of Mexico before hurricane season starts on June 1, but added he thinks the system has a very low chance at organizing into something stronger, like a tropical storm or a hurricane.

"On occasion, you'll see a weak system develop into a hybrid system that has some tropical characteristics," he said.

He said in addition to rainfall, an increase in the number and strength of rip currents is also expected.

Northwest Florida can expect to begin seeing the impacts of the system as early as today, Beaman said. It's likely to have moved inland and dissipated by Thursday.

### National debt, fiat currency and Jimmy Buffett

**“There’s no free ride in this carnival world.”**

Remember when we used to be concerned about the national debt? Back then folks were only arguing about single-digit trillions. The current amount? You don’t want to know. OK, it’s more than \$21 trillion. And counting.

It’s scary. If you don’t believe me, go to [usdebtclock.org](http://usdebtclock.org) and watch how fast we add \$100,000 to the national debt. It happens in less time than it’s taken you to read this far. Seriously.

Some economists say that this level of debt, fueled by annual large deficits, isn’t all bad. A government with a fiat currency (one where it can always print money and inject it into the economy) does not necessarily need to balance its annual budget in the way you and I do in our personal households. For us to have money, we must generate it through jobs, investments or the sale of businesses or real estate. The government can just crank up the printer. So granted, comparing Congressional spending to our household spending is like comparing apples to oranges.

The reason a stable country like the United States can borrow money so easily is because, in some form or other, we can always repay what we owe. If we really wanted to, we could simply print enough money to pay off all our debt tomorrow. But we choose to carry the debt instead, because printing that much money would devalue our currency significantly and likely leading to hyperinflation.


So until the United States simply can’t pay off its debt without having to run our money printing machines overtime, we should be able to borrow money at relatively low rates for the foreseeable future. But there certainly must reach a point where a country’s debts start to look suspect, right? Carmen Reinhart and Ken Rogoff, national debt experts, cite 90 percent debt-to-GDP as the level at which debt starts to erode growth. We’ve recently passed that mark.

Even so, some are not overly concerned about the national debt. At every new trillion dollar mark people were lamenting the end of the republic under the crushing debt load. Japan is the most indebted developed economy in the world, yet borrows at rates lower than we do. We doubled the debt during the Great Recession while attempting to revive the economy. During that crisis, practical choices regarding adding to the debt were few and far between.

Interest payments, though, are a concern. In 10 years, interest on the national debt is expected to reach almost a trillion dollars annually.

### Ban media? Be careful what you wish for

Last week, there was an outbreak of tweeting in which the president decried “fake news” which, by now, we know is dog-whistle for “news I don’t like.”

He mused whether he should revoke the White House Press Corps credentials of those outlets who publish and broadcast negative stories.

This, from a person for whom media attention has been like mother’s milk for 40 years.

While such bloviating might play to the fan base, it is fantasy to think a ban would stop reporters from filing stories.

If he doesn’t believe it, then he should do it.

There isn’t a leader alive or dead who has enjoyed media scrutiny, who hasn’t complained about reporters’ questions, angles and motives. Most, however, understand why a free press is a necessity.

From this country’s beginning, politicians have tossed choice and unprintable words at reporters, but none of any substance has ever crossed the Rubicon by describing the press as the “enemy of the people.”

That’s despot talk.

#### Biggest threat

Every cause for change, every step of progress this country has made, from ending slavery

to defeating dictators, was first taken up by the press.

We’re here today because colonial-era newspapers pressed the cause for independence long before the Continental Army was organized.

We see every day what happens in countries where there’s no such thing as a free press. It’s not a coincidence that some of the richest people on earth exert power in countries where a free press doesn’t exist.

An officeholder who promises to serve one or two terms suddenly becomes “president for life.”

Those journalists who try to expose corruption suddenly turn up dead.

Right now, the biggest threat to this country is not the press, but those who have figured out they can sow chaos by using that which resembles journalism just enough to fool, anger and frighten us.

What makes us unique is that free speech is the first thing we enshrined, right out of the gate.

President John F. Kennedy noted the press is the only industry specifically protected by the Constitution.

Was the media of Kennedy’s own day derelict in not covering some of his issues? Yes.

The current president contends the media ignores or under-reports the administration’s successes, but then steps on his own narrative because he cannot resist settling scores, real and imagined.

It isn’t enough to tout employment statistics or possible peace with North Korea. It must be done while denigrating others.

#### ‘Breaking’ news is broken

Media is a public service, but it’s also a business. Consumers have every right to refuse to patronize those which fail in their duty.

But that’s not a call for a president to make.

I recently met a Canton (Ohio) Repository reader who is concerned that news is in danger of being swallowed up by a nonstop flow of opinion, rather than straight reporting.

She’s right. Because of a push for profits, the constant feeding of social media and fear of a 24-hour hole, cable news outlets in particular create smash-ups using with so-called experts, and the facts are getting lost in the yelling, histrionics and finger-pointing.

Other outlets constantly tout “breaking news” as to render the term meaningless.

Yet with all this, imagine trying to find out what’s going on in the world without people who are willing to search for information and report it.

Now, maybe you’re thinking that wouldn’t be the worst thing. But what happens when the people you support no longer hold power?

If the press is permitted to be harassed, threatened and bullied out of doing its job, it won’t stop with us.

It will end at you trying to explain why you said what you said about the government while sitting at your own kitchen table.

# Court upholds ‘stand your ground’ shift

TALLAHASSEE — A South Florida appeals court has upheld the constitutionality of a controversial change to the state’s ‘stand your ground’ self-defense law — but also might have set the stage for a debate at the Florida Supreme Court about how the change should apply in some cases.

The decision Friday by the 3rd District Court of

Appeal in a Miami-Dade County shooting case came a week after another appeals court ruled on similar issues in a Hillsborough County case. The two appellate courts disagreed on a key issue about how judges should carry out the “stand your ground” change in older cases, a type of legal conflict that can spur the Supreme Court to take up issues.

Both rulings dealt with a move by the Legislature in 2017 to shift a

key burden of proof in “stand your ground” cases from defendants to prosecutors.

In the decision Friday, a panel of the 3rd District Court of Appeal disagreed with a Miami-Dade County circuit judge, who ruled that the legislative change was unconstitutional because it violated the separation of powers. The circuit court ruling was rooted in the Supreme Court’s constitutionality authority to set rules of practice

and procedure for the court system.

The “stand your ground” law says people are justified in using deadly force and do not have a “duty to retreat” if they believe it is necessary to prevent death or great bodily harm. When the defense is successfully raised in pre-trial hearings, defendants are granted immunity from prosecution.

Before the change was passed last year, the Florida Supreme Court had said defendants had the

burden of proof in pre-trial hearings to show they should be shielded from prosecution. With backing from groups such as the National Rifle Association, the 2017 change shifted the burden from defendants to prosecutors to prove whether self-defense claims are justified.

In Friday’s decision, the 3rd District Court of Appeal said the Legislature did not overstep its constitutional authority in shifting the burden of proof. It said lawmakers have “the constitutional authority to enact procedural provisions in statutes that are intertwined with substantive rights.”

“The amendment (to the “stand your ground” law in 2017) shifts the burden of proof to the prosecution after the defendant has made a prima facie claim of justified use of force, and it requires that the state (prosecutors) meet this burden of proof with clear and convincing evidence,” said the decision, written by appeal-court

Judge Ivan Fernandez and joined by judges Thomas Logue and Edwin Scales. “This is consistent with the well-established legislative practice of passing statutes allocating the burden of proof in judicial proceedings.”

The decision came in a case in which Tashara Love sought to use the “stand your ground” law to be shielded from prosecution after a November 2015 altercation outside a Miami-Dade County nightclub. Love shot a man as he was about to hit her daughter, according to the decision.

But the appeals court Friday ruled against Love on a key issue — and created a conflict with a May 4 decision by the 2nd District Court of Appeal in a Hillsborough County case.

The issue centers on whether the 2017 shift in the burden of proof should be applied to cases that occurred before the change took effect. Both appeals courts asked the state supreme court to rule on this issue.





## How Can You Meet Your Short-term Goals?

Why do you invest? If you’re like most people, you’d probably say that, among other things, you want to retire comfortably. Obviously, that’s a worthy long-term goal, requiring long-term investing. But as you journey through life, you’ll also have *short-term* goals, such as buying a second home, remodeling your kitchen or taking a much needed vacation. Will you need to invest differently for these goals than you would for the long-term ones?

To answer that question, let’s first look at how you might invest to achieve your longer-term goals. For these goals, the key investment ingredient is *growth* – quite simply, you want your money to grow as much as possible over time. Consequently, you will likely want a good percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks and other stock-based investments, to fund your 401(k), IRA or other accounts.

However, the flip side of growth is risk. Stocks and stock-based investments will always fluctuate in value – which means you could lose some, or even all, of your principal. Hopefully, though, by putting time on your side – that is, by holding your growth-oriented investments for decades – you can overcome the inevitable short-term price drops.

In short, when investing for long-term goals, you’re seeking significant growth and, in doing so, you’ll have to accept some degree of investment risk. But when you’re after short-term goals, the formula is somewhat different: You don’t need maximum growth potential as much as you need to be reasonably confident that a certain amount of money will be there for you at a certain time.

You may want to work with a financial professional to select the appropriate investments for your short-term goals. But, in general, you’ll need these investments to provide you with the following attributes:

- **Protection of principal** – As mentioned above, when you own stocks, you have no assurance that your principal will be preserved; there’s no agency, no government office, guaranteeing that you won’t lose money. And even some of the investments best suited for short-term goals won’t come with full guarantees, either, but, by and large, they do offer you a reasonable amount of confidence that your principal will remain intact.

- **Liquidity** – Some short-term investments have specific terms – i.e., two years, three years, five years, etc. – meaning you do have an incentive to hold these investments until they mature. Otherwise, if you cash out early, you might pay some price, such as loss of value or loss of the income produced by these investments. Nonetheless, these types of investments are usually not difficult to sell, either before they mature or at maturity, and this liquidity will be helpful to you when you need the money to meet your short-term goal.

- **Stability of issuer** – Although most investments suitable for short-term goals do provide a high degree of preservation of principal, some of the issuers of these investments are stronger and more stable than others – and these strong and stable issuers are the ones you should stick with.

Ultimately, most of your investment efforts will probably go toward your longer goals. But your short-term goals are still important – and the right investment strategy can help you work toward them.

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# SHINE for elders with healthcare assistance

MILTON — Medicare can present challenges to its members. Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders offers guidance to seniors on the program.

SHINE is a private nonprofit agency sponsored by the federal government designated by the Department of Elder Affairs. The award-winning program

provides free Medicare counseling as well as other health insurance counseling by trained counselors both over the phone and at counseling centers in Santa Rosa, Escambia, Walton and Okaloosa Counties. All counselors are non paid volunteers. "Things get very complicated for seniors once they get on Medicare," Marti Hearn, SHINE liaison for the Northwest Florida division, said. "That is what SHINE is for, to help people navigate the Medicare system. The program is totally free, unbiased counseling. We are not sales people and we are not affiliated with any insurance company."

Seniors on Medicare should know that in April Medicare began mailing out new Medicare cards to members, according to Hearn. "This new card has a unique number," she said. "Old cards had the member's social security number, which put them at a higher risk of fraud." Hearn said that Florida was not on the first wave of cards being mailed out. Members should be looking for them in the mail. The new cards will be paper. Upon receiving the new ones, Hearn advised destroying the old card immediately.

Seniors can call 494-7101 to speak with a SHINE representative for

## Crestview-based animal rescue seeks volunteers and fosters

CRESTVIEW — A north Okaloosa County nonprofit pet rescue has been operating a cat adoption center in east Crestview for just over a year.

My Safe Place Pet Rescue became a 501c3 in 2013 and opened the Kelly Curtiss Memorial Cat Care and Adoption Center in March 2017.

The facility was made possible after MSPPR received a \$25,000 grant.

Curtiss was a friend of MSPPR owner and founder Cindy Hunter who died from cancer at 30 years old. Curtiss' mother donated the funds after her daughter's death.

According to Hunter, the facility is where the organization houses at least half of their cats.

The center was needed due to the lack of foster families willing to accept cats.

"We're mostly foster-based," Hunter said. "It's a mobile home that we transformed into a cat-care center. It's free roaming and all of them just live there."

Approximately 60 cats currently live in the care center, according to Hunter.

"Right now, we are at capacity due to kitten season," Hunter said.

Hunter urges pet owners to have their animals spayed and neutered to cut down on overpopulation. The organization has 14 active foster homes and most have more than one animal. Hunter herself has 13 foster cats in her home.

The center allows for more space and dedicated care areas.

These care areas include a quarantine space for newcomers who have not been fully vaccinated or tested for disease, and a newborn wing for mothers and their kittens.

The majority of MSPPR's animals are cats, according to Hunter, but they also rescue dogs. Most of the cats at the rescue come from kill shelters, including the Laurel Hill branch of Panhandle Animal Welfare Society. They are also found on Facebook pages.

Potential adopters make appointments with the rescue to meet the animals and visit the facility. The center's address is not made public to

avoid unwanted animal drop-offs, Hunter said.

In addition to seeking adopters for the pets, MSPPR seeks foster homes, volunteers for the care center and transporting, and donations in the form of money, food and cat litter. The organization regularly holds adoption events in Fort Walton Beach and Crestview. The next event will be May 19 at Petsense in Crestview.

"We... always need fosters," Hunter said. "We have volunteers that come twice a day to clean, feed and play with kitties."

The rescue spends about \$1,200 per month on food, flea and heartworm medications and vet visits, Hunter said.




The event doubled as an open house for members of the public to stop by and learn more about the department.

# Crestview shines in spring game

The spring jamboree setup was unconventional.

The result, however, was vintage Crestview. Well at least the 2017 version the area came to revere.

After getting dressed Saturday night in the University of Southern Mississippi locker room filled with Brett Favre lore, the Bulldogs dominated 4A Mississippi state runner-up Poplarville as part of a three-day jamboree at M.M. Roberts Stadium.

Twenty-five teams played at "The Rock." The Bulldogs, fresh off a 10-1 season where they advanced to the regional finals, and Poplarville were the final to square off on a cool spring night around 8 p.m.

Crestview scored 13 times amid 54 scripted plays. Poplarville found the end zone just six times.

"It was a good experience and we had a lot of fun," said Tim Hatten, Crestview's head coach. "It was a spring game so you can't read too much into it, but we played well offensively. They're the 4A runners-up from last year and they returned 20 of 21 players, so they're good. But we brought down 42 of our best guys and played well."

The setup was unique. Both teams ran three series of 10 plays from the opponent's 40 yard line, two series of eight plays from 20 yards out, four plays from the 1 yard line and a series of third-down plays.

What Hatten saw was a

"There was no safety and they were running zero coverage," Hatten said. "They can't defend us that way. We just took what they gave

"We have the athletes and the speed, so we're going to exploit you when there's no

Defensively, Hatten said the Bulldogs were far from midseason form. But for the most part Crestview shut down Poplarville's Wing-T.

"Defensively, we have some areas where we can improve," he said. "But to play in a college environment like Southern Miss, we had a lot of fun."

Niceville plays 7A semifinal Saturday; 3A Rocky plays Monday

The state title bids for Niceville and Rocky Bayou softball will have to wait.

Severe weather has postponed the 2018 Florida High School Athletic Association State Championships at Historic Dodgertown in Vero Beach, pushing back Rocky Bayou's 3A semifinal five days and Niceville's 7A semifinal from Friday to Saturday.

"We appreciate the understanding and flexibility of our member schools and fans for supporting this change." FHSAA Executive Director George Tomyn said Monday. "Our goal is to give the student-athletes a fantastic championship experience they will remember for a lifetime. We are confident that this amended schedule will ensure a positive atmosphere for a great championship event."

Danny Hensley's Eagles will face off against Viera for a 4:05 p.m. (EST) first pitch on Saturday. A win would shore up a second straight finals appearance for the Eagles at 3:05 p.m. Sunday against the winner of reigning state champion Fort Myers and Pembroke Pines Charter.

The delay for Lynn Holcomb's Knights is much more pronounced, Rocky Bayou's 3A semifinal against Cornerstone Charter moved from Wednesday to Monday at 3:35 p.m. (EST). Win and the Knights will face the victor of John Carroll and Admiral Farragut in the title game next Tuesday at 4:35 p.m.

Niceville and Rocky Bayou will make the eight-hour trek south with disparate track records at state.

Rocky Bayou (20-1) is making its first Final Four appearance after beating St. Johns Country Day 6-0 for the program's first regional crown. The Knights have won 15 straight since an 8-7 loss to North Florida Christian on March 5 and have outscored opponents 22-1 in the regional playoffs.


Niceville (21-6), meanwhile, is making its fifth Final Four trip in the last eight years. The Eagles won it all in 2011 and are 3-1 during that span in the state semifinals. They enter Saturday on a five-game win streak with a 29-4 run differential in the regional playoffs.

Both Rocky Bayou and Niceville have depth in the batter's circle and an ace on the mound.

Led by UF commitment Sam Roe's .620 batting average, seven Knights are batting .377 or above. Roe's eight homers and 45 RBI lead the Knights, while Alicyn Grete is batting .569 with a team-best 43 runs to accent 23 RBI, three homers and 13 extra-base hits.

Niceville has the reigning Hitters of the Year in Sydney Byrd and Grace McIntosh, joined by hard outs like Katie Lightfoot, Blake Eslinger, Raiven Bryant, Michaela Brocato, Riley Gibson and Carley Kidder, and depth in the pitcher's circle with Mikhala Hampton, Katelynn Inness and Emma Langston.

# 7th Group rededicates Memorial Wall

**More than 60 names added in Saturday's ceremony**

EGLIN AFB — Hundreds gathered at the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) Memorial Wall as 67 names were added on Saturday.

The event was a solemn reminder of the ultimate sacrifice, but also of the brotherhood among the 7th Group.

Retired Master Sgt. Marco Arboleda came hundreds of miles from southern Florida for the rededication. He served with 7th Group from 1983 to 1992, and knew the flesh-and-blood men behind a half-dozen of the metal plaques affixed to the bifurcated stone structure.

Saturday's ceremony was an emotional one for Arboleda.

"When you get old like me, you start crying," Arboleda said.

His voice trembling just a bit, a hint of moisture forming the the corner of his eyes, Arboleda tried to explain the special bond formed by Special Forces troops in the crucibles of training and combat.

"They are my brothers," he said, "more than my own brothers."

The ceremony doubled the number of 7th Group soldiers honored at the privately funded memorial, a semicircular structure that is a focal point of the group's compound near Crestview. The structure is separated into two parts, representing the bodies and the spirits of the departed troops.

Families and friends of the fallen troops, current and former 7th Group soldiers and community representatives attended the rededication.

The large number of additions to the wall this year was due to changes in the criteria for memorialization. The biggest single change is that the memorial now honors 7th Group troops who have died in training accidents and other non-combat situations.

As was the case with previous additions to the wall, the latest names to be added were considered on a case-by-case basis by a board comprising people with a long history and deep knowledge of the 7th Special Forces Group, explained Maj. Kimbia Rey, the group's public affairs officer.

"This is my family," said

retired Brig. Gen. Joseph Stringham, who drove nearly seven hours for Saturday's ceremony. "I'm proud of them. I'm proud to be a part of them. This is a reunion for me."

Also at Saturday's ceremony was Sgt. Becky Robles, daughter of Sgt. Maj. William Robles, who was among the 134 soldiers from 7th Group whose names were read aloud as the wall was rededicated.

Sgt. Robles, now 24 and working as an Army intelligence analyst, was born while her father was in the middle of the selection process for the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne).

"I've always been a 7th Group baby," she said. Her father "loved 7th Group," she said, and having his name on the wall gives him a continuing presence there, she said.

"It's almost like having his spirit in an organization he was part of," she said.

That is exactly the point of the wall, according to Col. Patrick T. Colloton, 7th Group's commander.

"It's about remembrance," he said.

But there is also a deeper message from the names on the wall for those currently serving in 7th Group, Colloton said.

"I think we also get

inspiration" from the men and their stories, Colloton added.


The spirit of the day was also captured by 7th Group Chaplain Dave Meyer, who

### Cats and people

Pets are good for people in many ways, according to experts:

- Pets are wonderful companions. They give unconditional love and can teach people how to love in return.

### Adopting a pet

Have you ever wanted a pet? If you have, you may have begged your parents for a cat or dog.

Experts say it is very important that your parents want the pet, too. You will need to help care for the pet, but they will be the ones most responsible for it.



Pet owners must make sure their animals have good medical care.

Did you know that Americans have more cats as pets than any other animal? According to the Humane Society of the United States, Americans have more than 94 million pet cats. They have about 90 million pet dogs.

### Why are cats so popular?

- Cat lovers think cats are graceful and fun to watch. Some cats are comical and playful, and some are serious and independent.

- Although some people think cats are too independent and aloof, cats can be very affectionate. A purring cat can make humans feel happy and calm.

### All about cats

Cats can open their pupils three times wider than humans can. This lets in more light to help cats see in the dark.

- **Cat ears.** Cats can move each of their ears separately, and they can move them fast. One ear can be pointed in one direction

while the other ear is pointed in another. This enables them to pick up sounds from all around them.

Members of the cat family can also hear sounds humans cannot hear. They can pick up soft sounds from prey animals.

- **Cat whiskers.** Sensitive whiskers on cats' faces and legs help them detect obstacles around them. This extra knowledge helps them to pop in and out of small places quickly.

### Wild cats

Most experts believe the domestic, or house, cat came from a type of African wild cat that is now extinct.

People started taming wild cats thousands of years ago. Because cats kept rats and mice away from stored food, people probably wanted the cats to stay nearby.

There are 38 different species, or kinds, of cats in the world. Scientists divide the cat family into two groups, "big cats" and "small cats."



One of the differences between big and small cats is the sounds they make. Small cats can't roar, and big cats can't purr.

A big cat's "happy" sounds are not steady like a small cat's purr. The big cat's happy noise, called a **chuff**, is made when the big cat breathes out of its nose and mouth at the same time.

## Citizens can impact local transit needs

CRESTVIEW — Okaloosa County residents who want to get involved in bringing transportation projects to their community have the opportunity to make their voices heard.

The Citizens' Advisory Committee of the Okaloosa-Walton Transportation Planning Organization (OWTPO) currently has only 10 out of 30 seats filled. The 20 open seats can be filled by any resident of Okaloosa or Walton County.

Transportation Planning Organizations are made up of elected officials from the areas they cover, and are tasked with identifying transportation needs and recommending new projects to the Florida Department of Transportation.

"The TPO is kind of the filter organization that gives DOT direction on how DOT will spend its money," Nathan Boyles, current vice chair of the TPO, said. Boyles is one of four Okaloosa County Commissioners that sit on the board. The rest are elected officials from throughout both counties, including three Crestview city council members.

The organization makes long-range planning decisions on transportation projects and prioritizes them before sending them off to FDOT.

Projects that are approved by the TPO are added to a needs list, and then a shorter list of cost-feasible projects if they are determined to have a reasonable probability of being funded.

One place those projects can get their start is the Citizens' Advisory Committee. Citizens who sit on the committee are tasked with making recommendations that are then reviewed by the elected officials on the main body of the TPO.



“The folks who sit on the CAC have the ability to make recommendations on things that the TPO should be looking at,” Boyles said.

ments and other safety projects originate with the TPO as well.

The advisory committee is looking for people who are interested in helping find constructive solutions to transportation issues in the area.



The suit alleges that a competitor, Advanced Cable Ties, Inc., is employing undocumented workers at its Gardner, Mass. plant and alleges Twin City Temporaries, Inc. provided 60 percent of ACT’s labor force.

Representatives from Advanced Cable Ties, Inc. were not available for comment at press time and did not respond to multiple phone calls. Twin City Temporaries, Inc. and Tuyen Vo could also not be reached for comment.

According to the lawsuit, AEM is seeking unspecified monetary damages stemming from ACT’s alleged use of workers who are not eligible to work in the U.S. It specifically states the company has lost contracts and had to lower prices as a result of ACT’s alleged labor practices. “We’ve had to significantly lower prices to retain customers because of what we consider unfair practices,” AEM CEO Bob Sires said.

The lawsuit alleges that ACT contracts with a company called Twin City Temporaries, Inc. for at least 60 percent of its labor force.

“Based on sources that we have, they told us that almost all the night workers and a fair amount of day workers in the factory were employed by Twin City,” Sires said.

Sires declined to identify his sources, saying they wished to remain anonymous. He claims Twin City

Temporaries brings in workers from Vietnam and other countries and pays them under the table to avoid taxes and payroll costs.

Tuyen Vo is listed as the president of Twin City Temporaries, which is based in Fitchburg, Massachusetts. Sires said Vo approached him a year to a year-and-a-half ago and proposed a similar arrangement with AEM, claiming they could help cut labor costs.

“Of course we said no to it,” Sires said. “I let it sit for a while, but then I realized we started losing a couple of clients’ accounts to them and they were competing in an unfair way at a lower cost.”

The lawsuit also alleges that ACT has made false representations to the marketplace, including the U.S. Government, which the lawsuit claims is a customer of ACT.

It reads, in part, “ACT misleads the relevant marketplace by disingenuously attempting to convey a wholesome image of its workforce where, in reality ... over sixty percent of ACT’s workforce is ineligible to work in the United States.”

The suit also claims that American Elite Molding hires only legal workers and pays them in accordance with applicable labor laws, “without exception.”

Sires echoed that claim.

“We take our workers very seriously,” he said. “They’re a true asset to our company. We feel that this undermines the model that we should be following in the U.S.”

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# Record turnout for Korean Martial Art Festival in Crestview

CRESTVIEW — The 12th annual Korean Martial Arts Festival took place April 20, 21, and 22.

Instructors traveled from across the United States, Canada, and South Korea to teach and attend classes.

The event is hosted by Gordon Martial Arts of Crestview Florida and became reality through a collected effort of local volunteers and internationally ranked martial arts masters.

To show the power and foresight Gordon brought to the festival, Black Belt Magazine listed the event as one of the top ten events in the nation, 2012.

Official Karate Magazine endorsed the event in 2014.

The festival originally took place in a hotel dining area.

5,000-square-foot location near downtown Crestview.

The event has outgrown the space and now includes Friday evening and Saturday classes at Warriors Hall, next to the Crestview police station.

This year, the event filled the space to near capacity. "We had 130 show up for the event. It was a record turnout for us. It looks like we took 40 rooms at a local hotel. Some other places got some overflow from that as well. Then there are the restaurants, gas, and everything else," Gordon said.
