Economic report emphasizes training, keeping workers

CRESTVIEW — The city council heard a positive report on the area's economic outlook this week.

Nathan Sparks, executive director of the Economic Development Council of Okaloosa County, spoke to the council at its May 14 meeting about opportunities for economic growth in the north end of the county.

Sparks talked about the pace of economic progress in the county, mentioning the recent agreement between state and local officials on working to alleviate traffic problems in Crestview, as well as securing

Triumph Gulf Coast funds for that and other projects. "We're moving now at a pace we haven't been able to move at," Sparks said.

The EDC is a non-profit organization that promotes business development specifically in the engineering, manufacturing and technology sectors. They offer assistance to existing businesses in these sectors and provide information for those looking to start a new business.

Sparks touted the EDC's Jan. 28 Educate the Educator event at Embry Riddle Aeronautical University in Crestview, as one of the organization's successes.

Gulf Power prepares for hurricane season

PENSACOLA — With the start of the Atlantic hurricane season just weeks away, Gulf Power officials want customers to be well-informed about storm-related power outages.

"We've gotten really good at keeping the lights on in normal circumstances, so people are really used to, when they hit that light switch, it always coming on," Gulf Power Communications Manager Jeff Rogers said Wednesday. "But when we have a major storm, with limbs on lines, broken poles and that type of thing, it will take longer to get the power back on."

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 through Nov. 30. Researchers at Colorado State University predict this year's season could be slightly above average with 14 named storms.

Of those, they predict seven to become hurricanes and three to reach Category 3 strength with sustained winds of at least 111 mph.

While last year's season had six major hurricanes, the last major storm to hit Northwest Florida was Hurricane Dennis, which was a Category 3 storm that made landfall July 10, 2005.

On Wednesday morning, Gulf Power's 1,300 or so employees participated in a drill to help them prepare for a cyberattack on the company's electrical system.

Baker School dedicates freedom shrine

BAKER — Baker School's JROTC unveiled a new patriotic display this week honoring military and first responders.

The freedom shrine was dedicated at a May 17 ceremony at the school. The shrine consists of seven wall-mounted panels displaying a collage of photos from each branch of the military, as well as panels for law enforcement and firefighters.

Each panel also has historical documents displayed over the photos. The documents run in roughly chronological order along the length of the

shrine, starting with the Mayflower compact and ending with Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have A Dream" speech, telling the story of American history throughout. Important historical documents like the Bill of Rights, the Declaration of Independence, and the Gettysburg Address are also present.

The Exchange Club of Crestview, which is no longer in operation, helped coordinate the project. Exchange Clubs across the country facilitate freedom shrines in schools and supply the historical documents for the displays.



Mayor Cadle, who served as President of the Crestview Exchange Club, played a key role in making the freedom shrine a reality.

"One of the main targets that we had for our projects was Americanism, and the shrine was the biggest gift that we could give," Cadle said. "It was quite evident where we felt the freedom shrine would get the best attention and the greatest respect (at Baker School). We're extremely proud of

this."

JROTC officers raised \$1,200 by calling potential donors and taking contributions. Battalion Executive Officer Peyton Horton led the project, collecting photos from each military branch and first responders, and putting together the collages.

The freedom shrine fulfilled a JROTC requirement that students put together a yearly project that benefits the community in some way.

"The shrine is a constant reminder of the fundamental principles upon which this great nation was

founded," Baker Principal Mike Martello said. "The words of the documents echo our great American history, and the best thing we can derive from history is the enthusiasm it raises in us."

Martello gave a dedication speech before the unveiling of the shrine, speaking about the reminder of the sacrifices Americans have made and continue to make to secure freedom.

"We are here today to emphasize the message of encouragement these documents hold for our students, our faculty and the entire Baker community."

The workers, which included many gathered at the company's training and storm center in Pensacola, later participated in a storm drill to further hone their power-restoration skills.

"We have a plan and we drill throughout the year," Rogers said. "And we urge our customers to have a plan and go through it every year. Make sure you know what you're going to do: Are you going to evacuate or stay and batten down?"

Rogers then addressed some common post-storm questions posed to Gulf Power's staff.

For example, many people will wonder why they don't

have power while their neighbor across the street does.

"The neighbor across the street might be on a feeder (or power line) with a hospital," Rogers said.

Hospitals, fire stations and police stations are critical facilities that must have electricity restored before homes and businesses, he said.

If your neighbors have power and you do not, call 1-800-GUPOWER(487-6937).

To stay updated on power outages and restorations, Gulf Power customers can download the free Gulf Power app, which provides access to the company's outage map. It's also found at outagemap.gulfpower.com.

Customers can sign up to have outage alerts sent to their cell phone by texting REG to MyGulf(694853).

The program targets teachers and guidance counselors to educate them on the needs of area employers.

"Connecting our young people to career pathways is a very important function of what we all need to be doing," Sparks said. "Certainly our school district and our college

partners ... they all understand that today's student is tomorrow's employee."

With the unemployment rate in Okaloosa County below 3 percent, Sparks said it was important not only to prepare current high school and college students for jobs in those industries, but to keep them in the area as well.

"Preparing those young people for careers that are in demand in Okaloosa County, frankly, is something that we put front and center in our

overall objectives at the EDC," he said.

Keeping the general public informed on innovation happening at local businesses is another thing Sparks emphasized to the council.

"So many people drive past a business and have no idea what happens inside those four walls," he said. "I can tell you some pretty innovative things that are happening right down the street in Crestview."

Sparks also spoke about the

recent decision by Okaloosa County to build water and sewer infrastructure at the Shoal River Ranch property located on Highway 90 east of Crestview. The county is receiving \$1.5 million in Triumph funding for that project, which will cover an estimated 35.7 percent of the costs.

The property sits on a total of more than 10,000 acres, spanning both sides of Interstate 10. The two sides are connected by an overpass spanning the interstate.

Okaloosa County approved an option to purchase 1,665 acres of the property for potential economic development late last year.

"Ten thousand acres can accommodate a lot," Sparks said, citing the county's hope to secure a large industrial tenant for the property.

Previous potential developers chose not to develop on the property because the appropriate infrastructure was not yet in place, according to Sparks.



Indonesia, Malaysia demonstrate Southeast Asia's importance

Bloody, murderous terrorist attacks in Indonesia in mid-May have provided the Islamic State with another opportunity to claim victory. Two families including young children carried out suicide bombings in Surabaya, the second largest city in the nation.

Meanwhile, May elections in Malaysia have brought an important transition in national government and a benchmark on the road to stable representative democracy. Naturally, the first news topic has received vastly more media attention.

In Indonesia, there is no meaningful victory for terrorists, whatever the current state of their collective self-delusion. Victims are added to others injured and murdered by terrorists.

Indonesia has suffered other terrorist acts. In a 2016 attack, four people died, including an Algerian-Canadian along with Indonesians. In 2002, the worst attack killed 202 people on Bali, including many foreign tourists who were targets. These crimes have only reinforced the Indonesian people's hatred of terrorism.

Malaysia parliamentary elections May 9 have resulted in a stunning upset. The governing party was defeated and an opposition coalition was successful. The Barisan Nasional and predecessor governed Malaysia from independence.

The opposition Pakatan Harapan secured 113 seats in the Dewan Rakyat, the lower house

of the national parliament. This constitutes a narrow majority. In addition, the Sabah Heritage won another eight seats. This small party is aligned with Dewan Rakyat, and the two groups together have a solid majority to form a government.

New Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad is 92-years-old, making him the oldest head of government in the world. Mohamad plans to secure a pardon for jailed opposition leader Anwar Ibrahim, and then turn the office over to him.

The Indonesia attack was carried out in the world's largest nation with a Muslim majority. Geography including trade routes provides Indonesia with strategic significance. The international and foreign policy implications are self-evident, for the United States and other nations.

Washington has an opportunity to highlight Indonesia as a success story of stability, modernization and the rule of law. Since former general and long-time autocratic President Muhammad Suharto was forced from power in 1998, Indonesia has moved to representative government.

Indonesia's international conflicts today are largely technical and legal, notably the maritime disputes which generally involve the nations of East and Southeast Asia. Dictatorship has ended, but corruption remains a problem.

The situation used to be quite different. During the height

of the Cold War, Indonesia was regarded as a major pivotal leader among Third World nations. Flamboyant nationalist President Sukarno played the Soviet Union and U.S. off against one another. CIA efforts to bring Sukarno down were frustrated, a sobering experience quickly overshadowed by Vietnam.

By the mid-1960s, cooperation between Indonesia and the Soviet Union was moving forward. This development was extremely important in the decision for large-scale U.S. military intervention in Vietnam in 1965. We largely have forgotten these experiences today.

British forces, with Australian and New Zealand allies, did defeat Indonesia attacks on Malaysia. Earlier, Britain defeated a virulent, aggressive Communist insurgency in Malaya, which today is part of Malaysia. Among other factors, Britain's military avoided introduction of massive firepower, in contrast to the U.S. military strategy in Vietnam especially from 1965.

The Indonesia attack will boomerang in strong public sentiment against terror groups. Malaysia has joined other nations enjoying peaceful government transitions. The U.S. government has opportunities to strengthen ties in both nations.

FROM THE PULPIT

Take the listening command to heart

When a person tries to convey a message, words, tone of voice, and body language all help to convey that message. When all three parts of the message mesh, and the listener receives it as intended, a clear communication has been made.

If one of those parts is off, a mixed message is given, and there can be confusion on the part of the listener.

How do you respond when you experience a miscommunication? Do you ask questions to clarify if what you thought you heard was the intended message, or do you fly off the handle in a fit of anger or despair?

This is why the Letter of James in the Bible tells us to "be quick to listen."

There is an old expression which strongly recommends taking a deep breath and counting to 10 before responding in anger. Taking a deep breath and counting to 10 helps to not respond inappropriately in a flash of

anger. It allows for a brief moment to discern if your anger or hurt is justified, or if perhaps you misunderstood what was being said.

Your first response should not be, "How can I get even?" but rather, "How can we take this and make it better? How can we learn from this and grow from it? How can we grow stronger because of it?"

It is very easy to let emotions flare up quickly in the heat of a moment. But when you briefly hold your tongue and reflect on what is being said, you will be able to respond more clearly, more rationally, more appropriately.

I encourage you to keep your ears open, and your heart ready to hear the word of God and respond to God's leading — especially when communicating with others.

When you look for the positive in any given situation, you will be able to look beyond yourself and discern what God would have you do, and how God would have you respond. You will allow God, and God's word, to live in you and through you.

Crestview police academy grads ready to hit the streets – almost


