## Crestview activism group tops 1,500 members

CRESTVIEW — Jennifer Jackson never expected her Facebook group to become so popular.

"It took on a life of its own. This was not expected. It was kind of a knee-jerk reaction to even start the group," Jackson said. "Then it just took off."

Jackson and her husband, Terry, started Crestview

Citizens for Change on Facebook in 2017, along with another Crestview resident, Matt Gates. They formed the group after the 2017 municipal election, in which Joe Blocker was re-elected to the city council with

fewer than 600 votes cast in the race, a 3.8 percent voter turnout.

"That was appalling," Gates said. "So the Jacksons and I got together with this idea that we were going to spur some involvement and get people involved in the city."

Since then, the main focus for the group has been to push to amend the city charter to allow for a city manager. The city is in the process of craft-

ing the ballot question that will appear on the August 28 primary ballot. If approved, it would allow the city council to appoint a city manager to oversee the various city departments.

Gates thinks that would be a good thing.

"I want a qualified professional to come in and set us up for success," Gates said. "We don't need a politician. We need a professional."

One problem with the current form of government, Gates said, is that things

move too slowly due to the city council only meeting two or three times a month.

"These guys are expected to run a city twice a month. I can't do my job twice a month. If I can't do my little thing over here that only has to do with me, how can they run a city effectively twice a month?"

The city council currently holds a regular meeting the



## First aid training for Florida students passes in combined bill

CRESTVIEW — With the signing of Bill 7055 in March, Gov. Rick Scott made first aid training for Florida students part of state law.

A brief section of Bill 7055, posted on <http://laws.flrules.org>, recommends first aid basic training every two years for students beginning in the sixth grade, and that the training must be based on a nationally recognized program using "the most current evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines."

The bill further states, "The instruction must allow students to practice the psychomotor skills associated with performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation and use an automated external defibrillator when a school district has the equipment necessary to perform the instruction. Private and public partnerships for providing training or necessary funding are

encouraged."

The AED is a device that can check a person's heartbeat and shock the heart back into a normal rhythm when it stops functioning, according to the American Heart Association's website, [www.heart.org](http://www.heart.org). The device also provides guided instruction on its use.

Dexter Day, Crestview High School principal, said CHS students currently have the option of taking CPR classes as one of their electives, after which they are CPR certified/

### A personal view of the bill

The Simas, Stacey and Shawn, and their two children, Lexi and Carter, are among people who have worked to get the bill passed over the last two years.


# North Okaloosa students recognized

# A reliable car can be golden

My first car was a 1991 Honda Civic, a basic model that was so bare-bones it didn't have automatic anything. There was no cupholder, not even a clock.

But at 16-years-old, after sharing a car with my mom for six months, I didn't care. I had originally wanted a newer model Civic, one that wasn't already six years old and didn't look like a box-like white cube. My father told me, however, that I should feel lucky to even get a car. He, after all, drove a 1931 Model A Ford, a basic model business coupe as his first car when he was in high school in the late 1960s.

When I was learning to drive, my dad would take me to the parking lot at our neighborhood

school on the weekend to practice. I think that was more stressful on him than it was on me. But I can still hear his motto — the same his dad told him; that a car was “to get you from point A to point B safely and as reliably as possible.”

“Anything else is just icing on the cake,” he always said.

That's something that has stuck with me through the years.

I drove that first Honda Civic through the rest of high school, all of college and grad school. I tried to make it mine: In high school I used a portable CD player Walkman and Velcro-ed it onto my dashboard so that I could play CDs. I bought an after-market cupholder that screwed onto the emergency brake so that I'd have somewhere to put my drinks. And I bought a tiny clock and adhered it to the area where a digital clock would have gone, if the factory had installed one.

The car wasn't perfect.

It wasn't pretty. But for seven years, it got me from point A to point B, safely and reliably, only breaking down once.

In 2004, however, the air conditioning died. It was going to cost more to fix than what the car was worth. While finishing up graduate school, I bought another used Honda, which I'd drive for another seven years. Then, when I was a married mother of two with a third child on the way, we bought another used Honda, a minivan.

But always, in the back of my mind when I'm thinking about cars, I hear my dad's voice, telling me “from point A to point B.”

Last week, I took my 9-year-old daughter out one evening after dinner to buy a new book she was asking for and we got frozen yogurt afterward as a special treat. As she climbed out of the back seat of our minivan in the parking lot of the yogurt shop, she froze.

OMG!” she shouted. “I WANT THAT CAR.”

In front of her was parked a late model Chevrolet Camaro painted metallic gold.

It wasn't just painted a normal gold. It was almost foiled gold, looking like it had been dipped in 14K.

“Is that real gold?” my daughter asked in awe. I told her no.

“Can we get our van painted like that?” she asked.

When I laughed and said no, she told me that one day, when she turned 16, she was going to get a gold sports car like that.

I just laughed. But then, I got to thinking. It's only five short years until my daughter is eligible for a driver's permit — six years before she gets her license. I'm hoping by then the metallic gold Camaro will be long forgotten, and that we can instill in her our long-held family belief of reliable, used cars to get from “point A to point B.”

But I also know that 16 will come quickly. Too fast, for me.

## Saving for College? Consider a 529 Plan

Do you know about 529 savings plans? If not, you are not alone — although these plans have been around since 1996, many people are still unaware of them. And that's unfortunate, because a 529 plan can be a valuable tool for anyone who wants to help a child, grandchild, friend or other family member save for education expenses.

Here are some of the key benefits of a 529 plan:

- **Potential tax advantages** — A 529 plan's earnings are not subject to federal income taxes, as long as withdrawals are used for qualified education expenses (tuition, room and board, etc.) of the designated beneficiary, such as your child or grandchild. (You will be subject to ordinary income taxes, plus a 10 percent federal penalty, on the earnings portion of withdrawals not used for qualified education expenses.)

- **High contribution limits** — Contribution limits are generally quite high for most states' 529 plans. However, you could possibly incur gift tax consequences if your contributions, plus any other gifts, to a particular beneficiary exceed \$15,000 during a single year.

- **Ability to switch beneficiaries** — As the old song goes, “The future is not ours to see.” You might name a particular child or grandchild as a beneficiary of a 529 savings plan, only to see him or her decide not to go to college after all. But as the owner of the plan, you generally may be able to switch beneficiaries whenever you like, right up to the point when they start taking withdrawals. (To make this switch non-taxable and penalty-free, you must designate a new beneficiary who is a member of the same family as the original beneficiary.)

- **Freedom to invest in any state's plan** — You can invest in the 529 plan offered by any state, regardless of where you live. But if you invest in your own state's plan, you might receive some type of state tax benefit, such as a deduction or credit. Additional benefits also may be available.

- **Flexibility in changing investments** — You can switch investment options in your 529 plan up to twice a year. Or, if you'd rather take a more hands-off approach, you could select an automatic age-based option that starts out with a heavier emphasis on growth-oriented investments and shifts toward less risky, fixed-income vehicles as the beneficiary approaches college age.

While a 529 plan clearly offers some benefits, it also raises some issues about which you should be aware. For example, when colleges compute financial aid packages, they may count assets in a 529 plan as parental assets, assuming the parents are the plan owners. To clarify the impact of 529 plans on potential financial aid awards, you might want to consult with a college's financial aid officer.

One final note: In previous years, 529 plans were limited to eligible colleges, universities and trade schools, but starting in 2018, you can also use up to \$10,000 per year, per beneficiary, from a 529 plan to pay for tuition expenses at public, private or religious elementary and secondary schools. (Not all states recognize K-12 expenses as qualifying for 529 plan benefits, so consult your local tax advisor before investing.)

Education is a great investment in a child's future. And to make that education more affordable, you might want to make your own investment in a 529 plan.

Because the people at the gym knew CPR and used an AED, they were able to resuscitate Lexi until paramedics arrived.

“As we stood over Lexi as she laid in the emergency room, we didn't know if she would live or die. The helpless feeling you have as a parent is indescribable,” her dad, Shawn, said in a previous News Bulletin interview.

“Lexi never had really any health problems. She had been an athlete since 4 years old. She started playing T-ball and soccer when we lived in Crestview. Sudden cardiac arrest struck our family out of nowhere ... I made a promise to God that we would pay this forward if he gave her another chance and he did. The Lord has worked this out for our good and the good of others,” Shawn said.

Lexi spent three weeks in the hospital. Doctors implanted a cardiac defibrillator in her chest

that has to be checked by a cardiologist every three months, but they cleared her to return to school and all activities except contact sports. She finished her junior and senior years as a varsity cheerleader at Viera High School.

Along the way, she and her father requested that the Brevard County school board pass legislation for her fellow high school students to take CPR training, which they did Nov. 21.

Previous efforts to get Senate and House

CPR bills passed in Florida failed. “It was called an unfunded mandate, meaning the state did not want to mandate this training without the funds,” Shawn Sima said in a previous interview.

“Essentially the cost should not be an issue at all. Most of the CPR kits are donated. We could honestly set up a Go Fund Me and have the money. We are actually working with the American Heart Association to possibly set up an area for donation in the state of Florida,” he said.

second Monday of each month and a workshop the fourth Monday. Special meetings are scheduled as needed.

Gates said a major benefit of the city manager form of government is that the city manager is appointed, so he or she can be fired by the council

for poor performance without having to wait for another election. The cities of Milton and DeFuniak Springs recently fired their respective city managers, leading to some controversy among Crestview's neighbors to the east and west.

Jackson said she hasn't thought much about what the group will focus on after the August charter vote, but she feels the group will find some way to push solutions to the

problems that appear with Crestview's growth.

“It's growing. There's nothing you can do to stop it,” Jackson said. “If we're growing population-wise, then we need to be growing to support our population.”

Jackson and Gates both hope the group has an impact on voter turnout in the August 28 election and the upcoming municipal elections in 2019. Two city council seats and the mayor's office will be up

for grabs in that election, scheduled for March.

“If this whole move results in 20 percent voter turnout, I'm going to see it as a success,” Gates said.

# New CPD officer candidates sweat out physical test, interview

CRESTVIEW – Three new Crestview Police Department recruits ably passed the agency's strenuous, department-mandated physical abilities test, or PAT, on a hot Tuesday morning. But perhaps as equally stressful as the PAT was the interview that followed for two of the candidates.

Brian Foreman, Nellie Roberts and Ann Ruryk each successfully completed the vigorous course in under the maximum allowable time of six minutes, four seconds. Without even a chance to change into spiffier duds, Foreman and Ruryk were seated outside Interim Chief Jamie Grant's office waiting to interview for police officer positions.

Each of the three had graduated from a Florida police academy and received their law enforcement officer certification.

Roberts, having already successfully interviewed with Police Department command staff members, was a step ahead of her

fellow recruits once she passed the PAT. She now moved into the background check phase.

In addition to command staff, Cmdr. Grant expanded the interview panel to include patrol officers and investigators. These are the law enforcement officers alongside whom a new officer would be serving, and under some of whom new officers undergo approximately 14 weeks of field training before they are authorized to hit the streets of Crestview as full-fledged police officers.

After nearly half an hour each of prepared questions, exploratory questions and candidates' own statements, both Mr. Foreman and Ms. Ruryk were given conditional offers of employment as Crestview Police officers, joining Ms. Roberts in the extensive background check phase.

"All of them are strong candidates," operations Commander Andrew Schneider said. "We're looking forward to having them as part of our family here at the Crestview Police Department."

# It shouldn't be this hard to be a kid

She's too young to be so forlorn, but when a reporter asked the teen if she was surprised that a mass shooting struck her high school in Santa Fe, Texas, she replied it was only a matter of time.

Literally, days after Oliver North, the incoming president of the NRA, called a group of student-activists "civil terrorists" for demanding we adults do something — anything — about gun violence, another mass shooting occurred on an American high school campus.

The great majority us will do what we did the last time: We'll move past the wreckage and the trauma. We'll tell ourselves what we always tell ourselves: Kids are resilient; they'll find a way to carry on.

We'll pretend there's a "getting over" playing dead so you won't die or watching a classmate bleed to death.

We'll pretend we never heard the experts' warnings that, untreated, the emotional damage left in the wake of such incidents will result in more tragedy.

But to change this national equation means someone in

power will have to sacrifice his or her own ambition for the greater good, and, well ...

### Triple digits

High school has always been difficult to navigate. You're taken out of the comfort of your elementary school and thrown into a social maze where you spend four years trying to find out where you belong.

Learning how to mix with others isn't easy, but it's what makes the high school experience invaluable.

It shouldn't be this hard, however, be downright dangerous. No kid should have to wonder if today is the day he's going to die in a classroom closet.

It shouldn't be this hard. Not in Chicago. Not in Jackson Township, Ohio. Not in Santa Fe, Texas.

Last year, the U.S. had more school shootings than 12 other industrialized countries put together — by triple digits.

It's time to stop pretending such things don't happen in certain types of communities — high achieving, privileged, homogeneous — when that's exactly where they happen.

It's also time for more parents to become jerks; that is, to be a lot more nosy and intrusive.

How could your kid be enamored with Nazism and you not know it?

### The hard stuff

Let's quit pretending there isn't something fundamentally broken in a culture in which more young Americans have been shot and killed in school this year than have died in combat in Afghanistan.

From silent film shoot-'em-ups to video games, we are a nation besotted with gun violence.

We need to stop saying nothing can be done when, in truth, there has been little desire to enact the kind of changes voters have said they want.

It isn't that we can't do the hard stuff; we're the country that cured polio, landed men on the moon and invented the internet. Money, fear and an addiction to power have weakened the will and obstructed the way.

We adults have the gall to harumph and be shocked (shocked!) when student-activists curse and fail to give elected officials the deference they're used to getting. But why shouldn't they? They know what happened in Columbine, in Newtown, at Virginia Tech and even Las Vegas, and they know nothing has changed.

We've lied to them repeatedly about making things safer, then have the nerve to accuse them of making matters worse when they call "BS."

*Building resilience with living shorelines*

**A** long quiet Alaqua Bayou on the Eglin Air Force Base (AFB) Reservation, Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance (CBA) staff and AmeriCorps members have been busy. During the hot, early summer days along the Florida Panhandle, the team works quickly to move plastic buckets of limestone from the truck to the shoreline. Each piece of limestone – sourced from Vulcan Materials – is carefully placed in a pyramid shape just offshore to protect the bayou's banks. At high tide, the top of the reef pokes up from beneath the waves.

Alaqua Bayou has been experiencing shoreline erosion, a result of both boat wakes and storm events. The erosion was becoming so pronounced that Eglin AFB staff grew concerned about the natural and cultural resources adjacent to the bayou, and sought an innovative solution: a living shoreline.

According to the National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration, "Living shorelines are a green infrastructure technique using native vegetation alone or in combination with offshore sills to stabilize the shoreline." To protect Eglin's coastal property in Alaqua Bayou, CBA planned two reefs, one made from recycled oyster shell, one from limestone rock.

The team completed the oyster reef breakwater in late 2017, utilizing shell recycled from local restaurants in Okaloosa and Walton County. After drying in the sun for 3-6 months, the shells were bagged using marine-grade mesh by CBA, AmeriCorps, and community members before placement along a 1700 linear foot reef. Since completion, erosion has noticeably slowed, while sand and sediment has built back up along the bayou.

The new limestone reef, slated for completion in summer of 2018, will stretch 750 linear feet. In addition to stabilizing the edge of the bayou, the limestone will act as a comparison to the oyster reef. CBA staff continually monitor the reefs to measure oyster growth, shoreline accretion, and wildlife usage.

In addition to reducing erosion and providing a home for marine critters like crabs and juvenile fish, the reefs serve as critical habitat for oysters. Juvenile oysters – known as spat – latch on to the hard shells and limestone to survive. As each oyster can filter up to 50 gallons of water each and every single day, the reef breakwaters improve water quality within the bayou.

Once both reefs have been completed, the Eglin project will serve as a model for other public and private landowners throughout the Panhandle. Living shorelines reduce erosion, provide for wildlife, and improve overall water quality.







# FWC cautions boaters

With the release of the 2017 Boating Accident Statistical Report, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) encourages boaters to focus on simple, effective steps that make boating safer.

"For 2017, the leading contributor to boating accidents was the operator's inattention or failure to maintain a proper lookout. It is critical for operators to be diligent in observing and being aware of what is going on around them," said Lt. Seth Wagner from the FWC's Boating and Waterways Section.

In 2017, 261 boating accidents involved collisions and 38 percent of all collisions were due to inattention or the operator failing to maintain a proper lookout.

"It's important that while out relaxing and enjoying Florida's beautiful waters, boaters remember to be safe," Wagner said.

Florida had 766 boating accidents in 2017, 52 more accidents than in 2016. However, there was no change in the number of fatalities. A total of 67 people lost their lives last year in boating accidents. Falls overboard have been the leading type of fatal accident since 2003, with drowning as the leading cause of death.

Eighty-one percent of these victims were not wearing a life jacket. Today's boaters can choose from several models of light and comfortable inflatable belt-pack or over-the-shoulder life jackets that can be worn while fishing or enjoying the sun. Boating accident statistics support

an important message: "Life Jackets Save Lives."

The FWC is responsible for reviewing, analyzing and compiling boating accident data for the state. Its

statistical report details boating accidents and their causes. The theme of accident-related messages from FWC staff is clear: Officers want to help keep Florida's beautiful waterways a

safe place to boat.

## FWC announces fishing changes

The Florida fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission announces the recreational harvest of greater amberjack and gray triggerfish in Gulf of Mexico state and federal waters closes June 1 and will reopen August 1.

Gag grouper will open for recreational harvest in most state Gulf of Mexico waters and all federal Gulf waters June 1, and will remain open through Dec. 31.

Seasonal harvest closures help conserve Florida's valuable greater amberjack and gray triggerfish populations and improve these fisheries for the future.

Gulf state waters are from shore to 9 nautical miles. Federal waters begin where state waters end and extend to 200 nautical miles.

The minimum size limit for gag grouper in Gulf waters is 24 inches total length, and the daily bag limit is two fish per person within the four-grouper per person aggregate limit.

Those who plan to fish for gag grouper in Gulf state or federal waters from a private recreational vessel must sign up as a Gulf Reef Fish Angler. Annual renewal is required. ## Audubon reminds beachgoers to share the shores with baby birds

TALLAHASSEE — Millions of visitors flock to Florida's beaches and Audubon Florida reminds beachgoers and boaters to enjoy the beach while respecting posted fencing around nesting shorebirds and their fluffy chicks. Florida's beaches are nurseries for species like Snowy Plovers, Black Skimmers and Least Terns.

"Just like people, birds love our beaches too... we're asking beachgoers and boaters to give nesting birds some space," said Julie Wraithmell, Audubon Florida's executive director. "Eggs and fluffy chicks are on our sandy shores and tree islands right now, and the end of May is a critical time for Florida's iconic coastal birds."

Many nesting sites are visibly posted and well-marked on Florida beaches to protect them from human disturbance. Unfortunately, when boaters or beachgoers enter posted areas, they may unintentionally cause the death of chicks and eggs. When parents are frightened from nests, chicks and eggs are left vulnerable to predators, overheating in the summer sun, crushing under foot (in beach nests), or falling and drowning in water beneath the nest (from tree nests). A single disturbance can destroy an entire colony.

"Whether or not human disturbance is intentional, the sad result for birds is the same," said Dr. Marianne Korosy, Audubon Florida's director of bird conservation. "By following Audubon's easy tips, we can all work together to ensure

this holiday weekend is safe and enjoyable for people and birds."

Volunteer "bird stewards" chaperone nesting bird colonies on many Florida beaches. These stewards help educate beachgoers about nesting colonies while reminding them not to enter protected areas. Audubon's beach tips:

- Keep your distance. Respect areas posted with signs, even if you don't see birds inside them. Birds, eggs, and nests are well-camouflaged.
- Leave no trace. Take all your trash with you and always dispose of fishing line and tackle appropriately.
- Avoid disturbing or agitating birds. If birds take flight or appear agitated, you are too close.

- Keep pets leashed and far away from birds. Even on a leash, dogs are perceived as predators by birds.

- Don't feed birds or wildlife. Feeding attracts predators like crows and gulls that will prey on eggs and chicks of beach-nesting birds.

- Keep quiet and calm near nesting areas. Beach activities like flying kites or using personal fireworks can cause parents to abandon nests. Help prevent a catastrophe for vulnerable chicks and eggs.

- Look out for nesting birds, even outside of posted areas. Beach-nesting birds can't read signs and sometimes nest outside of posted areas. If you notice birds circling noisily overhead, you may be near a nesting colony. Leave quietly and enjoy from a distance.

## Prevent Tick-borne Illnesses

Ticks can be found year round in Florida due to our mild winters. They carry and transmit several diseases.

Brown dog ticks are found mainly on dogs and can carry Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

American dog ticks are also usually found on dogs but will also attach to other mammals and humans. They also can transmit Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. American dog ticks can cause paralysis when they attach to the base of the skull or spinal column. Recovery usually occurs within 24 hours of tick removal.

Gulf Coast Ticks are similar to the American dog tick with larger mouthparts. They transmit a less severe relative of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. They are commonly found on the ears of large mammals such as horses and cattle.

Lone Star Tick is the most common human-biting tick in Florida. They transmit Southern Tick Associated

Rash Illness which is similar to Lyme disease.

Black-legged tick, also called deer tick, is most commonly known as the carrier of Lyme disease.

Here are a few ways to prevent tick-borne illnesses:

- Remove ticks as soon as possible.
- Wear light colored clothing so ticks can easily be seen.
- Keep all clothing buttoned, zipped and tucked in.
- Use Repellents with 20-30% DEET on exposed skin.
- Apply Permethrins to clothing and allow them to dry before wearing.
- Avoid brushing against plants in tick-infested areas.
- Clear brush along pathways and walk in the middle of pathways.

If you are bitten by a tick and develop symptoms, contact your physician. Early diagnosis is best and makes treating tick disease easier and more effective.





## Cook's Corner

### Grilled Banana Splits With Candied Peanuts

**You'll need:**

- 1/2 cup dry-roasted, salted peanuts
- 1 tablespoon light brown sugar
- cooking spray
- 4 medium bananas (slightly underripe)

- 2 cups light ice cream of your choice
- 1 cup whipped cream or whipped topping



**What to do:**

1. Combine peanuts and brown sugar in large skillet over medium heat. Cook for 3 to 5 minutes, stirring frequently, until sugar melts and coats peanuts. Remove from heat.
2. Coat stovetop grill pan with cooking spray and preheat over medium-high. Leaving skin on bananas, cut them in half lengthwise. Place bananas cut side down in hot pan. Grill for 30 seconds to 1 minute, until flesh is golden brown.
3. Peel bananas and transfer to dessert plates. Top with ice cream, peanuts and whipped cream. Serves 4.





## Florida's largest power company is getting a lot bigger

TALLAHASSEE — In a major move in the state's utility industry, the parent company of Florida Power & Light said Monday it will buy Northwest Florida's Gulf Power as part of a \$6.475 billion deal.

NextEra Energy Inc. plans to buy Gulf Power, the Florida City Gas natural-gas company and ownership interests in two power plants from The Southern Company. The purchase of Gulf Power and the stakes in the power plants, which are subject to federal approval, are expected to close during the first half of 2019, while the Florida City Gas purchase is slated for the third quarter of 2018, according to a NextEra Energy announcement.

The deal would expand NextEra Energy's already-massive footprint in the state. Its Florida Power & Light subsidiary is by far the largest electric utility in Florida, serving nearly 5 million customers.

Gulf Power, with about 450,000 customers in eight counties, is the largest utility in the Panhandle.

Florida City Gas has about 110,000 residential and commercial natural-gas customers in Miami-Dade, Brevard, St. Lucie and Indian River counties.

NextEra said it will buy a 100 percent ownership interest in a power plant near Cocoa known as Plant Oleander, which has contracts to sell electricity to the Florida Municipal Power Agency and Seminole Electric Cooperative. It also will buy a 65 percent stake in a generating unit, known as Stanton A, at the Stanton Energy Center complex near Orlando.

The unit is jointly owned by The Southern Company, the Orlando Utilities Commission, the Kissimmee Utility Authority and the Florida Municipal Power Agency, according to information on The Southern Company website.

"These transactions will provide meaningful benefits for the state of Florida,

and Gulf Power and Florida City Gas customers, as well as NextEra Energy shareholders," Jim Robo, chairman and chief executive officer of NextEra Energy, said in a prepared statement. "Importantly, these transactions are consistent with our long-standing, disciplined approach of maintaining the strength of our balance sheet and credit ratings, both of which are among the strongest in the industry."

NextEra Energy plans to finance the deal through the issuance of new debt, according to the announcement. The \$6.475 billion total includes NextEra Energy assuming \$1.4 billion of Gulf Power debt.

Subsidiaries of The Southern Company, which is based in Atlanta, operate in numerous states. In addition to Gulf Power, the subsidiaries include Alabama Power, Georgia Power and Mississippi Power. The Florida Public Service Commission last year approved a settlement agreement that set base rates for Gulf Power. In the announcement, NextEra Energy said that with the addition of Gulf Power, Florida City Gas and the power plants, the Juno Beach-based company "will be even better positioned to generate long-term shareholder value through a more robust financial profile, greater scale and an expanded platform for growth."

But the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy, which frequently intervenes in utility cases in Florida, expressed concern Monday about the purchase.

"While Southern Alliance for Clean Energy is still reviewing this deal, it raises concerns that any one monopoly utility would control such a significant percentage of Florida's energy market," the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy said in a prepared statement. "Such consolidation of control may limit competition at a time when we need more and not less."






