

Air Force Enlisted Village has a kind and caring mission

SHALIMAR — For 50 years, the Air Force Enlisted Village's nonprofit mission has been to provide a safe, secure home for surviving spouses of retired enlisted U.S. Air Force members who are 55 and older. Housing is provided at Bob Hope Village, an independent living community, and at Hawthorn House, an assisted-living and memory-care residence on the Bob Hope Village campus.

Every resident has a deeply touching story, but Theresa's path to Bob Hope Village last winter is uniquely moving. Theresa asked that her real name not be used in order to protect her privacy, but her story typifies why the Air Force Enlisted Village is needed.

After Theresa's husband, Bob, retired from the Air Force, the two became full-time RVers. They had plans to travel all over the U.S., but when Bob got sick their plans were put on hold. He passed away just a couple of months later.

"My husband had told me that if anything happened to him, I should contact the Air Force and that's how I found out about the Air Force Enlisted Village," she said. "I called, and I was told to come right away and there would be an apartment waiting for me at Bob Hope Village."

Air Force Enlisted Village President and CEO Brooke McLean said it's an honor to help military spouses.

"At the Air Force Enlisted Village, we believe spouses serve our country alongside the active-duty member, and our residents have dedicated their lives to service and helping others," she added. "We provide a small 'thank you' in recognition of their sacrifice."

Theresa joins other military widows who enjoy the camaraderie and worry-free living at Bob Hope Village. Bob Hope Village is a community where residents have access to scheduled bus transportation, prescription pick-up service, activities, social events, on-site conveniences and a variety of amenities to promote fitness, wellness and independence.

Lundy family seeks help for funeral

CRESTVIEW — The family of a lifelong Okaloosa County resident seeks assistance following their tragic loss.

Wayne Murry Lundy, 63, of Crestview, died

due to injuries he received in a June 4 motorcycle incident.

The family is accepting donations at <https://www.gofundme.com/5oir9cw> to cover costs associated with his funeral, which was June 10.

One of his children, Bobby Lundy, described the U.S. Army veteran as a hard worker who loved motorcycles.

"There is literally not a year that I can remember that he did not have a motorcycle. He always had a motorcycle, with Yamaha and Honda being his favorites."

One of the things he recalled about his dad was that Wayne Lundy had a Yamaha motorcycle and painted a Harley Davidson logo on its gas tank.

"We called it his Yama-Harley. Everybody thought it was funny. Nobody he ever met disliked him. He was a really good guy," Bobby said.

"He liked to fix things. I say that because he had a lot of stuff on his property — motorcycles, boats ... he did a lot of everything."

"He was a hard worker and loved by all, but never planned for future misfortunes. He had no life insurance," Lundy said.

"His mother, my grandmother, paid for his funeral expenses and I am trying

Josh's passion for music started at an early age and always stayed with him. He played in many bands with his brothers and friends from his teen years through to adulthood. He was a gifted songwriter and guitarist, and the best "hype man" his bandmates could ever ask for. Those who knew Josh enough would attest to the fact that he was the best at storytelling, and had an amazing silly laugh. His stories could



sometimes seem wildly fanciful but often proved to be true -- like the time he ended up modeling for a Japanese clothing company's calendar while sitting in the park, or how he survived being hit by a car on three separate occasions. He had a huge heart and loved his friends and family intensely, and was always reaching out to his loved ones (usually between 2 and 5 am) to talk or check on them.

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Eglin donates almost 1,000 stuffed toys to Crestview police

CRESTVIEW — The next time Crestview Police Department officers have to calm a distraught child, they'll be well prepared, thanks to the generosity of airmen and civilian employees at Eglin Air Force Base, who donated nearly 1,000 stuffed teddy bears and other critters.

The collection drive was spearheaded by Staff Sgt. Teara Nedimyer, the mother of 8-month-old Charlie, who oversaw the recent delivery of the stuffed animals to the CPD from the comfort of his mother's arms.

"I have always wanted to host a teddy bear drive for the police department," she said in a March 8 Facebook message to the department. "I would love to get a good bundle of donations for the local community's children that are in need of some comfort and a companion in a tiring or challenging time."

Nedimyer, a Crestview resident, placed collection boxes all over the base near the beginning of April. Little did she anticipate the outpouring of furry love her effort received.

"We collected on Eglin between 900 and a thousand teddy bears," Sgt. Nedimyer said. "I would've been satisfied with a hundred or 200."

She and her colleagues recently loaded them into two SUVs, and brought them to the Whitehurst Municipal Building in Crestview. There, Interim Chief Jamie Grant and Community Services Officers Wanda Hulion and Sam Kimmons accepted the generous gifts with gratitude. With the assistance of Auxiliary Sgt. Al Humphrey, transferred them to

police vehicles to be sorted and stored at the Community Services substation.

"When our officers go out into a home and sometimes it's not the best day for the children that are in the homes, we can take a bad situation, give a child a stuffed animal, and make it easier for them," Hulion said.

In addition to helping calm anxious children, some of the new stuffed animals still in packaging will also become part of the Community Services Division's annual Toy Run, held a couple of days before Christmas, in which officers load a trailer

with toys and games and head to Crestview public housing neighborhoods for distribution.

Doing the teddy bears drive for the Crestview Police Department was an easy decision for Nedimyer.

"I live in Crestview. It's my community. I want to give back," she said.

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'Computer fix' scam targets Crestview area residents



CRESTVIEW – The Crestview Police Department has recently taken several calls from residents regarding a computer scam in which the caller identifies himself as a Microsoft technical support representative and tells the recipient their computer has viruses and needs to be fixed.

The "Microsoft representative" states for a fee, and the customer's help in allowing him to obtain remote access to their computer, he will "debug" it for them. This allows an unknown person complete access to any personal information on the computer.

The scammer is insistent and frequently asks for the victims' banking account information to pay for the "cleaning service," Crestview Police Dispatch Center staff report states.

"Microsoft will not make unsolicited telephone calls to you; all communication must be initiated by the customer," Officer Chris Roll said. "Be wary of companies using scare tactics, being pushy, or only accepting checking account numbers as a form of payment."

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Police are not the answer to every social ill

As policymakers nationwide scramble to deal with policing issues — everything from excessive force; to disrespect for authority; to the role of police in troubled neighborhoods — the recurring question is, are we asking police officers to do too much?

Alex Vitale, Professor of Sociology at Brooklyn College, and author of “The End of Policing” told NPR, “The problem is that they’ve (police) been given a limited set of tools and placed into circumstances where those tools often can be counterproductive.”

Vitale is not alone. “What police have been forced to do in this country is perform triage,” Dallas Police Chief David Brown told the Washington Post.

In Dallas, according to the Post, police work includes corralling potentially dangerous dogs, among other duties that extend well beyond routine crime. “We have got a loose dog problem — let’s have the cops chase loose dogs,” Brown said. “Schools fail? Give it to the cops.”

Vitale said “the answer is to quit using police to solve every social problem under the sun. Instead we need to invest in new systems of discipline that treat people with

dignity and respect and try to identify what’s driving problematic behavior and actually address those root causes.”

The opioid epidemic has exacerbated the role of the police is addressing the community’s social problems, whether criminal or not. Dallas Police Detective Chelsea Whitaker told Reuters, “We can be glorified social workers.”

She described her contact with two teenagers who constantly got into fights at school. One of them had not been eating. Whitaker took her to grocery store to buy food.

“I had to take another girl to get sanitary napkins because nobody ever taught her that,” Whitaker told Reuters. “She is angry and fighting all the time; of course, you would be angry.”

“A lot of the officers are resistant to what we call social work. They want to go out and fight crime, put people in jail,” Capt. Ron Meyers of the in Chilli-cothe, Ohio Police Department told the Washington Post. “We need to make sure the officers understand this is what is going to stop the (opioid) epidemic.”

Officers are finding children who were barricaded in rooms while their parents got high, and they are responding to the same homes for the same problems. Feelings of exasperation course through some departments in which officers are interacting with the same drug users over and over again, sometimes saving their lives repeatedly with naloxone, a drug that reverses an opiate overdose, reported the Post.

Couple addiction with mental

illness and the tension between the police and a bad actor can escalate rapidly — often with disastrous results. Police departments are looking for new and innovative ways to cope with this growing menace.

Amy Watson, an associate professor of social work at The University of Illinois at Chicago, described Crisis Intervention Teams (CITs) for Social Work Today. The CIT Model is an innovative police-based first responder program designed to help law enforcement recognize and appropriately respond to a mental health crisis.

As money for mental health institutions evolved into community based treatment, prisons have become de facto mental health facilities. Police officers have become the caretaker in the community charged with protecting the public from the double malaise of addiction and mental illness.

Being a cop isn’t easy. Sending him or her into the street to deal with issues beyond the scope of law enforcement is outrageous. Sure, training is available, but shouldn’t police officers focus on public safety and law enforcement while other trained professionals deal with illnesses like addiction and schizophrenia?

grown over its 50 years to meet the ongoing and ever-changing needs of residents. In 2005, Hawthorn House opened to provide assisted living for residents who needed a higher level of care. Later, a memory support wing was added to for residents with dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

"We survey our residents every year to identify their needs and we do our best to provide them with quality housing and outstanding amenities," McLean said. "Residents had been asking for more fitness and wellness activities so we've launched a wellness program for residents and later this summer we'll be opening our new fitness wing at the Bob Hope Village community center."

Air Force Enlisted Village board members are currently planning the construction of an additional village at Bob Hope Village that will open in 2020 and meet the demands

of a growing population of baby boomers.

"The demographics are clear. Our nation is changing with the aging of the baby boomers and we have some large challenges to address," McLean explained. "We want to be part of the solution to care for more residents in new and innovative ways."

As a private, non-profit organization, the Air Force Enlisted Village has provided over the past five years an average of \$897,000 per year for the direct support to the widows of retired enlisted Airmen who embody the core mission.

"We receive support from active duty Air Force members around the world, but we also rely on a robust level of support from our local donors," McLean noted. "Every donation changes lives of people just like Theresa who from no fault of their own have found themselves living in less than desirable conditions."

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Don't Let Your Investments Go on "Vacation"



The two methods for canning are the "boiling water bath" method and pressure canning. The boiling water method is appropriate for making jams and jellies but pressure canning is the only safe way to can vegetables.

When canning, it's

important to use foods at the peak of their quality and be

sure to follow the strict canning procedures specified for

your product.

Before eating your canned foods, look for any signs of spoilage and remember: canned foods can be as nutritious as fresh produce.

To make sure that you are following the most current and safe recommendations in canning your produce and in food preservation, contact the Family and Consumer Sciences extension agent at the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences Extension Office in your county or visit this website: <https://bit.ly/2JQy69t>.

‘A special day’

The Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge hosts a groundbreaking for its Navarre complex

NAVARRE — It was just a little more than a year ago that the Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge announced plans to move from the old Okaloosa Island fire station to Navarre.

Thanks to the donation of a 2.238-acre parcel on Cloptons Circle from refuge President Bill Andersen and his wife, Stormy, and community support, the new refuge is more than 42 percent funded.

Refuge board members, state and local officials and volunteers celebrated the official groundbreaking Saturday.

“We’ve gotten a lot done, but there’s still a lot to do,” Bill Andersen told the crowd of supporters. “It will take community effort to get this built, so we thank you in advance for your support. We’re betting

the organization’s future on the support.”

Santa Rosa County District 4 Commissioner Rob Williamson gave recognition to the “sweat equity” volunteers have put into the refuge. Staffers from Keller Williams Realty in Navarre spent

an entire day last month building the refuge’s first animal habitat. Congressman Matt Gaetz presented the team with a certificate of special recognition for their support.

“This is a special day and a special moment,” Gaetz said.

“To be able to be here at the beginning ... ultimately what will make this work, what will make this so unique and all so proud will be the people that serve on the staff that volunteer. That is what we’re here to celebrate.”

People were invited to the

groundbreaking and tour of the property to get a sense of what the finished product would look like. Refuge animal ambassadors such as Petunia, the Virginia opossum, and Landlord, the gopher tortoise, were on hand to greet people.

Parmelie McManamy has been a volunteer with the Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge for six years. Like many supporters, she said she’s looking forward to the new facility.

“(The current facility) is asphalt and no space,” McManamy said. “This natural habitat will be so much better for the animals. They’ll be away from the urban noise and fire trucks. It’s less of a shock to them.

Before the groundbreaking was over, the refuge had received an additional \$31,500 in donations. Andersen said it’s proof that the nonprofit is on the right path.

“I’m looking forward to seeing a world-class, custom facility get built,” he said. “This kind of support shows the community is hungry for something like this.”



Fresh North East mushrooms inspire spring stew

As I was looking for recipes for this week, I found myself in North East (Ohio) reporting a story on community supported agriculture on the farm of Gordon Post. One of many remarkable parts of Post's farm is a stunning array of logs arranged in a patch of deeply shaded woods, on which he grows mushrooms for his CSA customers, including shiitake and oyster mushrooms.

He and his daughter, Anatasia Post, general manager of the farm's CSA operations, hadn't started packing up members' weekly bags yet, and lots of fresh fungi were ripe and ready for harvest — and cooking.

I try to write about produce in season. Obviously, this counted. I had a bag of fresh mushrooms and I needed a recipe to make and write about. Rarely do I trip into a journalistic situation with this kind of synergy. Usually, I find myself canvassing the city searching in vain

for ingredients. I decided not to mess with whatever universal energies had put me in this position and dug around for a recipe that called for what Post had given me: About a pound and a half, two big shiitakes and a sizable chunk of oyster mushrooms.

The New York Times (whose readers probably have access to every ingredient known to man) had a delicious-looking dish called Fresh and Wild Mushroom Stew. It's not really stew season, but it's not really not stew season either. It's kind of in the middle. All I know is there's plenty of room on any menu for this triumph.

Fresh and Wild Mushroom Stew

Total time: 1 hour; serves 4-6
1 1/2 pounds cultivated brown mushrooms, such as shiitake, cremini or portobello
1/2 pound pale wild mushrooms, such as chanterelle (or use King trumpet or oyster)
Extra-virgin olive oil
1 large onion, diced

Salt and pepper

1 tablespoon chopped thyme
1 teaspoon chopped sage or rosemary
Pinch red pepper flakes or cayenne
1 tablespoon tomato paste
3 small ripe tomatoes, peeled, seeded and chopped
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
Porcini broth, heated, or use chicken or vegetable broth
1 tablespoon butter
3 garlic cloves, minced
3 tablespoons chopped parsley

Clean mushrooms, keeping colors separate, and trim tough stems. (Save stems for stock.) Slice mushrooms about 1/8-inch thick.

In a wide skillet, warm 2 tablespoons olive oil over medium-high heat. Add onion, season with salt and pepper and cook, stirring, until onion has softened and browned, about 10 minutes.

Remove from pan and set aside.

Add 1 more tablespoon oil and turn heat to high. Add brown mushrooms, season lightly and stir-fry until nicely colored, about 3 minutes. Lower heat to medium.

Add thyme, sage, red pepper and tomato paste. Add tomatoes, stir well, and cook for 1 minute. Season again with salt and pepper. Sprinkle with 1 tablespoon flour, stir to incorporate and cook for 1 minute more. Stir in reserved onions.

Add 1 cup mushroom broth and stir until thickened, about 1 minute. Gradually add 1 more cup broth and cook for 2 minutes. The sauce should have gravy-like consistency; thin with more broth if necessary. Adjust seasoning. (May be prepared to this point several hours ahead and reheated.)

Just before serving, put butter and 1 tablespoon olive oil in a wide skillet over medium-high heat. When butter begins to brown, add chanterelles, season with salt and pepper, and sauté for about 2 minutes, until cooked through and beginning to brown. Add garlic and parsley, stir to coat and cook 1 minute more. Add chanterelles to the brown mushroom mixture and transfer to a warm serving bowl. Accompany with polenta or pasta if you wish.

Overnight Oats make a healthy breakfast and other meals easy

Quick cook, slow cook, instant from a small paper package — oatmeal is an easy and nutritious breakfast that can be made quickly in the morning for parents on the go or for people like me who work at home and just want to get started on the day's work as soon as possible. The clock's tickin' in that deadline each and every day. I live in a place where it's 100 degrees F for days on end and on most of those days I can't even think about cooking something on the stove in the morning, even with air conditioning.

Now, I make Overnight Oats the night before or in a batch on the weekend, no heat needed. My little ramekins of oats dotted with banana and nuts or strawberries and a touch of honey or chia seeds and coconut are ready in the morning for me to pull out of the fridge and enjoy. I'm eating more of this more healthful breakfast and much less of what I used to make — fried eggs in way too much butter. I've also been experimenting with savory overnight oats for lunch or a quick dinner.

The premise is simple. Rolled oats and a liquid like milk, both dairy and non-dairy, in equal parts are placed in a jar (a half pint mason jar works nicely) to sit overnight. Add yogurt, fruit, sweetener, spices, vanilla, nuts, the combos are endless. The oats become a creamy mingling of great flavors and some are downright dessert-like.. Here's a basic recipe:

Overnight Oats

1/3-1/2 c. rolled oats
1/3 to 1/2 c. liquid (cow's milk, almond milk, coconut milk, etc.)
1/3-1/2 c. yogurt if desired
A pinch of salt
1 or 2 tsp. sweetener of some sort like honey or maple syrup
Mashed fruit
Seeds and nuts, etc.

Add it all together in the jar (you can also leave out the fruit and nuts), stir and let sit overnight (or at least 4 hours) in the fridge. You might need to add more liquid if it dries out. Add

more toppings if you like. Here are some variations I've tried with much success.

Start with the base (1/3-1/2 c. rolled oats, 1/3 to 1/2 c. liquid, 1/3-1/2 c. yogurt, a pinch of salt, 1 or 2 tsp. sweetener of some sort like honey or maple syrup) and mix in the ingredients up to the toppings. You can mix it all together or layer the toppings for a more colorful look. Let it all sit in the fridge overnight and add the toppings if desired.

Pumpkin spice (good even in the summer)

1/3 c. mashed pumpkin
 1/4 t. cinnamon
 1 pinch each nutmeg and cloves
 1/8 t. vanilla extract

Toppings:

1 T. dried cranberries or chopped dates
 1 T. toasted pumpkin seeds

Cacao

2 - 3 t. good quality cocoa powder
 1 T. creamy nut butter
 1/2 well ripened banana, mashed
 1/4 tsp vanilla extract
 For topping:
 1/2 T. cacao nibs
 1 T. shredded coconut

Hawaiian

2 T. kiwi, diced
 2 T. pineapple, diced
 For the topping:
 1 T. toasted coconut flakes

Neapolitan Overnight Oats

Adapted from Lee Hersh at www.fitfoodiefinds.com
 This one is like a dessert, mimicking the layers of Neapolitan ice cream.
 For the vanilla layer:

1/3 c. rolled oats
 1/2 t. chia seeds
 2 T. Greek yogurt
 1/3 c. milk
 1/4 t. vanilla extract
 1 t. honey

For the chocolate layer:

1/3 c. rolled oats
 1/2 t. chia seeds
 2 t. cocoa powder
 1/3 c. milk
 1/2 T. maple syrup

For the strawberry layer

1/3 c. rolled oats
 1.5 T. Greek yogurt
 2 large strawberries
 1/2 t. chia seeds

1/4 c. milk
 1 t. honey
 pinch of salt

For the vanilla and chocolate layers, mix all ingredients in a small bowl and place in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours or overnight.

For the strawberry layer, place strawberries and milk into a small food processor or hand held mixer and puree. Mix with the rest of ingredients in a small bowl. Place in refrigerator for at least 2 hours or overnight.

In the morning, serve layered like Neapolitan ice cream.

And now for the savory. These overnight oats come out almost like risotto, rice or congee (which is eaten for breakfast in many cultures) and are great warm or cold.

Curried chickpea overnight oats

Ingredients: Use your basic overnight oats recipe. Leave out the sweetener if you like and make this vibrant topping:

1 T. olive oil
 2 T. curry powder
 1 c. unsalted chickpeas, drained and rinsed
 1/2 c. coconut milk
 Pinch of salt
 2 T. chopped roasted red peppers
 1 T. chopped Thai basil

Heat oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add curry powder; stir for 30 seconds, until fully combined. Stir in chickpeas. Add coconut milk simmer for 5 minutes. Sprinkle with salt and toss to combine. Place all on top of your overnight oats.

More savory ideas:

In addition to milk in your overnight oats, add a touch of miso or soy sauce. The next day, top with toasted nuts or seeds, chopped green onions, shaved daikon radish, a soft boiled egg, avocado, mushrooms and so much more. Slices of marinated pork and teriyaki chicken are great, too.



Safe in the Sun



Mini Fact:
The largest organ of the human body is your skin!

If you've been out in the hot sun this summer, your skin may have turned red or brown where the sun's rays touched it. Sunshine helps our bodies produce vitamin D, and experts say sunlight makes our moods happier.

But exposure to the sun's rays can also damage our skin and cause some health problems. This week, The Mini Page learns more about being safe in the sun.

What is UV light?


Ultraviolet, or UV, radiation comes from the sun. Our eyes can't see this light, but these are the rays that can burn our skin when we're in the sun too long.

There are several types of UV radiation, but only UVA and UVB rays reach the surface of the Earth.

Have you ever heard someone announce the UV Index on the news or weather report? The index is a prediction of the intensity level of UV light in a certain region.

For example, if it's cloudy in your city today, the UV Index will be lower than in another town where the sun is shining.

The UV Index is a scale from 1 to 11+, where 1 represents a slight risk of too much exposure to the sun, and 11+ tells us that the risk is very high.



UV rays are partially filtered by the ozone layer, a protective layer of gas around the Earth.

Skin and sun

Exposure to UV light is the biggest risk factor for skin cancer. But we can easily prevent damage to our skin from the sun and lower our chances of getting skin cancer.

Researchers believe that getting sunburns in childhood increases a person's risk of having skin cancer. So it's important to take care of your skin now and throughout your life.

Staying safe

Even though we think of summer as the sunniest time of the year, the sun's rays strike us all year long. If you plan to be out in the sun for any length of time, use sunscreen.

People who need to be even more careful about sun exposure are those who have:

- pale skin
- blond, red or light brown hair
- a family member who has had skin cancer.

But skin protection is important for everyone. The Environmental Protection Agency advises people to:

- Wear clothing that covers the skin — long-sleeved shirts, pants and broad-brimmed hats.
- Reapply sunscreen at least every two hours.
- Wear sunglasses.

Grand jury seeks no indictments

The panel has ended its second review of the Okaloosa County School District's operations

FORT WALTON BEACH — The criminal investigation of the Okaloosa County School District has been concluded, and no indictments of district

officials will be sought or more charges filed unless new information is brought forward.

State Attorney Bill Eddins confirmed his office's intention to wrap up its case Wednesday, soon after a grand jury filed a report following a second round of testimony.

The grand jury heard evidence Tuesday and Wednesday and returned no true bills seeking indictments,

he said.

"The investigation by our office has been lengthy, detailed and thorough, and has reached a point where we've interviewed all the witnesses, looked at all the documents and reviewed all information provided by the public," Eddins said.

The grand jury's second presentation will be released in 15 days unless a person named in the report requests a judge's review in hopes of

The grand jury's second presentation will be released in 15 days unless a person named in the report requests a judge's review in hopes of having information repressed or expunged.

having information repressed or expunged.

Such a request could delay or even prevent the release of the document.

Eddins' office embarked on its second round of investigation of the school district in March at the request of the grand jury after it met in February.

Jurors were originally called to look at allegedly flawed School District operations, policies and procedures that included evidence of child abuse, sexual misconduct and cheating.

PTSD-affected family helps veterans

CRESTVIEW — The Winkler's Wish Foundation is having a Facebook fundraiser to increase efforts to help military veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder.

The money will fund the monthly peer group meetings and dinners the nonprofit organization hosts for area veterans. It will also be used for foundation literature and outreach items.

The group has raised \$700 of its \$2,000 goal at <https://bit.ly/2HufK82>.

Rebecca Winkler said, "We chose to do a social media Facebook fundraiser to reach the many people who had heard our story about losing our veteran son to suicide from PTSD but are not in our local area. It also allows for raising funds without having a physical fundraiser."

The meetings are 6-8 p.m. the fourth Monday of each month at Crosspoint Church, 2250 P J Adams Parkway, Crestview. There are sometimes guest speakers who present useful information or provide veterans services.

Foundation meetings started with three to five veterans in 2017. They have grown to 10 to 15 veterans and their families.

Winkler said she and her husband, Richard, began the meetings after their son, Drew, died May 30, 2016 by PTSD-related suicide.

His last message, posted via Facebook, referenced himself as one of the 22 veterans a day lost to suicide.

"We quickly realized there were no peer group meeting opportunities in Crestview, Fla. for veterans. We started the meetings with nothing but faith and less than \$500 in the bank. We jumped off the bridge in faith that this was what we were supposed to do.

They also saw evidence that in many cases faculty, staff and administrators turned a blind eye to much of what they saw.

The grand jury was provided testimony concerning the suspicious closing of an investigation documenting physical abuse by one special education teacher.

Jurors were made aware of the arrests of four school officials, including one teacher charged with child abuse and three others, including and district's former assistant superintendent of human resources, for failing to report child abuse.

The grand jury issued a harshly worded report in February that placed much of the blame for the district's missteps on School Superintendent Mary Beth Jackson.

Jackson, the grand jury said, had failed to fulfill her obligations as both a superintendent and an elected official.

It said it was Jackson's duty to see that employees were properly trained and supervised, and made aware of their obligation to report child abuse. It called upon her to revise and enforce district policies and procedures.

Most seriously, it questioned "inconsistent statements" Jackson made in denying any knowledge in the disappearance of the investigative report of the special ed teacher.

The grand jury called upon the State Attorney's Office to look specifically at Jackson to see if evidence existed of criminal behavior. Eddins vowed to do so.

Eddins said Wednesday that even though no more criminal charges are expected, he believes the investigation and the intense media coverage generated by the School District has served the public well, particularly vulnerable students.

"I feel, as a result of the investigation and the attention brought to the issue by the media, the schoolchildren of Okaloosa County and the First Judicial Circuit are safer today than when this investigation started," Eddins said. "People are now better aware of issues related to child abuse than they were when we started."

These mail-outs often include Florida Voter Registration Applications with information pre-filled and are addressed to informal names, children under voting age, pets, and deceased family

members. These letters originate from the Voter Participation Center and the Center for Voter

Information, two organizations not associated with the Florida Division of Elections or the Okaloosa County Supervisor of Elections.

The VPC and CVI generate address lists for these mailings from

outdated and often incorrect data, which can lead to confusion regarding eligibility for voting, especially among voters who are already registered.

Okaloosa voters who know they are registered are urged to confirm their voter record by using the Voter Lookup Tool on the Supervisor of Elections website, www.GoVote-Okaloosa.com, or call one of the Supervisor of Elections offices.

Do not rely on the information printed

on these mailed-out applications.

Any questions regarding eligibility for those currently not registered can also be directed to the website or the Supervisor of Elections offices. Voters may also visit a new Florida Division of Elections site, www.registertovoteflorida.gov, to register or update their information online.

Otherwise, applicants may access Florida Voter Registration Application forms at either Supervisor of Elections office in

Okaloosa County or at your local public library. Registering in person at either of these locations is the best way to confirm that the application is received and that the information is correct.


