U.S. OKs marijuana drug for seizures

WASHINGTON — U.S. health regulators on Monday approved the first prescription drug made from marijuana, a milestone that could spur more research into a drug that remains illegal under federal law, despite growing legalization for recreational and medical use.

The Food and Drug Administration approved the medication, called Epidiolex, to treat two rare forms of epilepsy in patients 2 years and older. But it's not quite

medical marijuana.

The strawberry-flavored syrup is a purified form of a chemical ingredient found in the cannabis plant — but not the one that gets users high. It's not yet clear why the ingredient, called cannabidiol, or CBD, reduces seizures in some people with epilepsy.

British drugmaker GW Pharmaceuticals studied the drug in more than 500 children and adults with hard-to-treat seizures, overcoming numerous legal hurdles that have long stymied research into cannabis. FDA officials said the drug

reduced seizures when combined with older epilepsy drugs. FDA chief Scott Gottlieb said his agency had supported research on cannabis-derived products "for many years."

"This approval serves as a reminder that sound development programs that properly evaluate active ingredients contained in marijuana can lead to important medical therapies," Gottlieb told reporters.

The FDA has previously approved synthetic versions

Man captures video of 'mystery cat'

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CRESTVIEW — When Joshua Neel heard a noise and saw a black blur in his backyard north of town, his first thought was that it was a rogue raccoon or a house cat.

But when he took a closer look, he says he almost couldn't believe what he saw.

"I was like, 'Oh my gosh,'" he said. "It was a really big cat ... a black panther. I think it was about 2 feet at the shoulders, but from the tip of his tail to the tip of his nose I'd guess it was between 4 to 5 feet long. This was not a house cat."

He estimated the animal weighed as much as 60 pounds, with a head as big as a pie plate. It bent his fence when it jumped over, he said.

Neel whipped out his phone and took a video of the animal as it slinked across his backyard, followed by a pair of curious guinea fowl.

Due to the shrubbery and trees, only fleeting glimpses of the large, dark, catlike creature were captured on

camera before it darted out of view. Its size is difficult to determine from the video.

Neel believes the animal he saw was a black panther. If true, it would be the first recorded black panther spotting in Northwest Florida — and North America.

According to the nonprofit organization Big Cat Rescue, the North American black panther is widely believed to be a myth, and is commonly mistaken for one of several animals including melanistic

(or dark-tinted) leopards, pumas and jaguars.

"None have ever been photographed or shot in the wild, and none have been bred. There is wide consensus among breeders and biologists that the animal does not exist and is a cryptid (a creature whose existence has never been documented)," the organization says. "Sightings are currently attributed to mistaken

Online tool provides exemption estimates

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The owners of certain homesteaded properties in Okaloosa, Santa Rosa, Walton and most other Florida counties can go online to find out whether they would benefit from a possible third Florida homestead exemption.

In the Nov. 6 general election, voters statewide will be asked whether to approve a proposal that would amend Florida's Constitution and provide for a third \$25,000 exemption.

If the proposed Amendment 1 is approved by at least 60 percent of the voters, the new exemption would take effect Jan. 1, 2019. It would apply to homesteaded properties with an assessed value between \$100,000 and \$125,000.

That portion of a home's value would be exempt from all property taxes other than public school taxes, and the current maximum exemption of \$50,000 would be increased to \$75,000.

In that scenario, the owner of a \$125,000 home would only pay taxes on \$50,000 of its valuation.

Okaloosa County Property Appraiser Mack Busbee recently had a "third homestead estimator" link added to the homepage of the county Property Appraiser's website at okaloosapa.com. The estimator also is on the homepage of the Walton County Property Appraiser's website at waltonpa.com.

The estimators on both of those sites include estimates for properties in most Florida counties, including Santa Rosa County.

With this online tool, property owners simply enter their address to see if they would benefit from the third possible exemption.

The estimator uses 2017 values and therefore provides only an estimate, according to Busbee.

Currently, the state Constitution provides for an exemption on the portion of home values between \$1 and \$25,000 and \$50,000 and \$75,000.



species identification by non feline experts, and ... exaggeration of size."

So, if it wasn't a black panther, what was it?

According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, panthers and bobcats are the two big cat species native to Florida. There are only 120 to 230 adult Florida panthers, and most of them live south of Lake Okeechobee, although some have been documented throughout the peninsula and even into Georgia.

After viewing the video, Susan Bass with Big Cat Rescue in Tampa, said it is unlikely the animal in Neel's backyard was a panther or a bobcat.

"The cat has a long tail, so it's not a bobcat. With that long tail it could be a Florida panther, but the voice of the man in the video says it's a black cat — Florida panthers are tawny golden colored, not black," Bass said in an email to the Daily News. "And if this is in Crestview, way up in the Panhandle, it's very unlikely a Florida

panther. So I'd say it's a big house cat."

Jayne Jordan, lead zoo-keeper at the Emerald Coast Zoo in Crestview, also said she believed the animal was most likely a house cat.

"There's a second in the video where I can't quite tell if it has the normal tabby cat stripes," she said. "There are no black panthers, so it's definitely not a black panther."

Jordan also guessed the animal could be an elusive creature called a jaguarundi.

At least three more animal experts contacted by the Northwest Florida Daily News agreed. A jaguarundi is described as a "cat very similar genetically to the puma" by the Big Cat Rescue organization. It's slightly larger in size than a domestic house cat and can grow up to 5 feet long, including a 20-inch tail, according to the Pangea Institute. Its coat can be reddish-brown or dark gray, and it typically hunts during the day.

But jaguarundi are elusive and known to mostly live in Brazil and southern Mexico, although rare sightings have been recorded in Arizona and Texas, animal experts say. There has never been an official sighting of a

jaguarundi in Florida, and none has ever been recorded on camera or video.

Shelby Proie, a wildlife technician with the Emerald Coast Wildlife Refuge on Okaloosa Island, believes the animal is a jaguarundi.

"It looks too small to be a Florida panther, and its tail is the wrong length and shape to be a bobcat," Proie said. "(A jaguarundi) is the only animal that kind of makes sense. Maybe it's an escaped pet? The guinea fowl didn't seem fazed by it at all, which is weird."

Neel, who works as a pastor at Destiny Worship Center in Crestview, said he has contacted the FWC and is working with an agent to determine what the animal could be. The Daily News reached out to the FWC but had not heard back as of Thursday afternoon.

Neel said he's certain what he saw wasn't a house cat, and is setting up a game camera in his yard to try and catch the animal again.

In the meantime, he said there's only one thing he knows for certain.

"There definitely won't be any children playing in the backyard without supervision."

If Amendment 1 is approved, the average homeowner would receive an estimated \$240 tax break, but municipal and county governments statewide would lose more than \$730 million during the first year, according to the Florida Association of Counties.

Busbee gave a presentation on the third

homestead estimator to the Okaloosa County Commission earlier this year.

After the presentation, Commissioner Nathan Boyles said the county would take a "several million-dollar budget hit" if voters approve the third exemption.

"There will be no equivalent reduction in the services to be provided," Boyles said. "We'll still be looking at the equivalent costs (of services such as stormwater services and Sheriff's Office

protection). The result will be a transfer of that cost from the citizens who will receive a benefit from the homestead exemption to those who don't."

In response to a question from Commission Chairman Graham Fountain, Busbee said there are about 43,000 homesteaded parcels in Okaloosa County.

"About 30 percent (or about 13,000) of those will not see any effect from this (proposed third) homestead exemption, he said.

of another cannabis ingredient for medical use, including severe weight loss in patients with HIV.

Epidiolex is essentially a pharmaceutical-grade version CBD oil, which some parents already use to treat children with epilepsy. CBD is one of more than 100 chemicals found in marijuana. It doesn't contain THC, the ingredient that gives marijuana its mind-altering effect.

Physicians say it's important to have a consistent, government-regulated version.

"I'm really happy we have a product that will be much cleaner and one that I know what it is," said Dr. Elaine Wirrell, director of the Mayo Clinic's program for childhood epilepsy.

"In the artisanal products there's often a huge variation in doses from bottle to bottle depending on where you get it."

Side effects with the drug include diarrhea, vomiting, fatigue and sleep problems.

Several years ago, Allison Hendershot considered relocating her family to Colorado, one of the first states to legalize marijuana and home to a large network of CBD producers and providers. Her 13-year-old daughter, Molly, has suffered from severe seizures since she was 4 months old. But then Hendershot learned about a trial of Epidiolex at New York University.

"I preferred this to some of those other options because it's a commercial product that has gone through rigorous testing," said Hendershot, who lives in Rochester, New York.

Since receiving

Epidiolex, Hendershot says her daughter has been able to concentrate more and has had fewer "drop" seizures — in which her entire body goes limp and collapses.

CBD oil is currently sold online and in specialty shops across the U.S., though its legal status remains murky. Most producers say their oil is made from hemp, a plant in the cannabis family that contains little THC and can be legally farmed in a number of states for clothing, food and other uses.

The immediate impact of Monday's approval on these products is unclear.

FDA's Gottlieb warned about the use of CBD products with "unproven medical claims."

"The promotion and use of these unapproved products may keep some patients from accessing appropriate, recognized therapies to treat serious and even fatal diseases," Gottlieb said.

The FDA previously issued warnings to CBD producers that claimed their products could treat specific diseases, such as cancer or Alzheimer's. Only products that have received formal FDA approval can make such claims, typically requiring clinical trials costing millions.

Most CBD producers sidestep the issue by making only broad claims about general health and well-being.

Industry supporters downplayed the impact of the FDA approval.

"I don't know a mom or dad in their right mind who is going to change what's already working," said Heather Jackson, CEO of Realm of Caring, a charitable group affiliated with Colorado-based CW Hemp, one of nation's largest CBD companies. "I really don't think it's going to affect us much."

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

Canada: Lynchpin ally may reject U.S.

Canada has not yet announced building a wall on the nation's southern border, but at this point, such a step would not be surprising. Relations between the two nations have been deteriorating rapidly.

In hindsight, signs of trouble appeared at the start of the current administration in Washington. President Donald Trump ignored the tradition of visiting Canada early and instead went to Saudi Arabia.

Saudi Arabia is currently pursuing a controversial and undeniably bloody intervention in Yemen. The Saudi government today pursues reform but remains relatively repressive.

In stark contrast, President Barack Obama, respecting tradition, made Canada his first foreign destination. On February 19, 2009, he and Prime Minister Stephen Harper met and found common environmental ground. They avoided open clash on the "Buy American" provision of the U.S. economic stimulus plan.

President John F. Kennedy eloquently summed up the relationship in an address to the Parliament of Canada in early 1961, noting, "Geography has made us neighbors, history has made us friends, economics has made us partners, and necessity has made us allies."

Regional trade agreements further strengthen Canada-U.S. ties. The 1994 NAFTA agreement, now under attack, lowered trade barriers between Mexico and the rest of North America. An essential predecessor was the Canada-U.S. Free Trade Agreement of 1988, in turn facilitated by the successful Uruguay Round of multilateral trade negotiations.

Canada's government professionals traditionally foster cooperation with Britain and the U.S. on military security and wider diplomatic as well as economic matters.

Such cooperation in promotion of international community has deep roots reaching back to the earliest phase of World War II. During that desperate time, U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill met for their first summit on naval warships off the coast of Newfoundland, Canada.

The principal result was the Atlantic Charter, a dramatic declaration of Allied strategy and goals, including the postwar period. Reflecting extraordinary determination and optimism during the bleakest phase of the global struggle, FDR and Churchill explicitly proposed the United Nations.

Very nationalistic Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker clashed with JFK. At the end of the 1961 presidential visit, Bundy accidentally left behind a briefing memo on which the president had scrawled a note asking his aide how to deal with the "SOB."

Diefenbaker's staff delivered the memo to him. He promptly flew into a rage and threatened to involve the press.

Kennedy pleaded poor penmanship and said he actually had written "OAS," the Organization of American States. At a press conference, the president pointedly praised Bundy.

Early the next morning, the national security adviser arrived at the office to find a staff note: "Congratulations, you can stay." Humor then helped mitigate serious political frictions, but did not end them.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo now works hard to maintain reasonable diplomatic relations with Ottawa. Pompeo's military experience should help. The U.S.-Canada partnership, dating from FDR, survived earlier conflicts.

Let's hope that continues.

CRESTVIEW – During the next community update meeting Thursday at Samuel's Roadhouse, Eden at Crestview Executive Director Alan Woods will discuss medication management. A pharmacist from Guardian Pharmacy will be available as well to take questions.

As some people age, their memory begins to fail making managing their own medications difficult. Family members may be concerned their elderly loved ones are missing doses or taking too many.

"That's what I see a lot of is that fear, fear that they're not taking it right," Woods said. "They doubt because mom's 80-year-old memory is not what it used to be."

Communication, accuracy and dependability are all key aspects in

medication management at Eden.

"The family is looking for really good communication between us, the resident, the family and the physician," Woods said. "We'll call and say mom or dad are refusing to take their medication or they're running out and need to call the doctor... It's all part of that being consistently accurate and dependable."

With nurses on staff distributing medication and an electronic system tracking it, family members can rest assured their loved ones are receiving their medications per doctor's orders.

Eden at Crestview monitors non-prescription medications as well as over-the-counter

medicines, herbal supplements, vitamins and laxatives.

"If mom or dad is having a memory issue," Woods said, "they might take a laxative and an hour later take another (one)... They might have eye drops sitting around. Everyone has herbal remedies... A prescription might have a negative reaction with a non-prescription like an herbal remedy..."

Eden also offers flexibility in medication management options. The service is included for those in the memory unit, naturally. On the other end, some loved ones coming to stay at Eden may be capable of managing their own medications. In between, some residents may need the management but use their own pharmacy. Finally, Eden has a pharmacy as well.

"The bottom line is," Woods said, "we manage prescriptions and non-prescriptions so mom won't take 12 Aspirins."

Study: Existing drug preserves insulin production in new Type 1 diabetes cases

GAINESVILLE — A drug used to help kidney transplant recipients ward off rejection of their new organs is showing promise in another area: preserving insulin production in newly diagnosed Type 1 diabetes patients.

A TrialNet study led by University of Florida Health researchers sought to determine whether the drug thymoglobulin, alone or in combination with another drug, could slow insulin loss. Clinical trial participants given a low dose of the medication, also known as ATG, had higher levels of insulin production compared with placebo recipients, the research revealed. The drug also reduced significantly reduced hemoglobin A1c levels, a long-term measure of average blood sugar levels, in participants with new-

onset Type 1 diabetes. "It gives us hope that we really are on the right path to preventing and reversing Type 1 diabetes," said Michael Haller, M.D., a UF Diabetes Institute researcher and the study's lead author. "We still have a long way to go but this is a remarkable success that we should celebrate. These findings remind us and our patients that we are indeed making progress."

The findings by the TrialNet research consortium of 14 universities and research institutions were presented today (June 25) at the American Diabetes Association Scientific Sessions in Orlando.

TrialNet enrolled 89 people between ages 12 and 45 who were diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes in the past 100

days. Some study participants received ATG, while others were given a placebo or ATG combined with another drug. A year later, insulin production had increased in those given low-dose ATG.

In Type 1 diabetes, the body's immune system attacks insulin-producing islet cells in the pancreas. The pancreas produces insulin to control the level of sugar in the blood. Elevated and uncontrolled blood sugar levels can lead to a variety of complications and, if left untreated, result in death.

Essentially, ATG works by killing immune cells that have "gone rogue." It targets white blood cells that attack and kill insulin-producing beta cells instead of attacking viruses or bacteria that invade the body. Low-dose ATG appears to target these "rogue" cells without disrupting other types of beneficial white blood cells, Haller said.

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

Building resilience with living shorelines

Along quiet Alaqua Bayou on the Eglin Air Force Base reservation, Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance staff and AmeriCorps members have been busy.

During the hot, early summer days along the Florida Panhandle, the team works quickly to move plastic buckets of limestone from the truck to the shoreline. Each piece of limestone – sourced from Vulcan Materials – is carefully placed in a pyramid shape just offshore to protect the bayou's banks. At high tide, the top of the reef pokes up from beneath the waves.

Alaqua Bayou has been experiencing shoreline erosion, a result of both boat wakes and storm events. The erosion was becoming so pronounced that Eglin AFB staff grew concerned about the natural and cultural resources adjacent to the bayou, and sought an innovative solution: a living shoreline.

According to the National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration, Living shorelines are a green infrastructure technique using native vegetation alone or in combination with offshore sills to stabilize the shoreline.

To protect Eglin's coastal property in Alaqua Bayou, CBA planned two reefs – one made from recycled oyster

shell, and one from limestone rock.

The team completed the oyster reef breakwater in late 2017, utilizing shell recycled from local restaurants in Okaloosa and Walton County. After drying in the sun for 3-6 months, the shells were bagged using marine-grade

mesh by CBA, AmeriCorps, and community members before placement along a 1700 linear foot reef. Since completion, erosion has noticeably slowed, while sand and sediment has built back up along the bayou.

The new limestone reef, slated for completion in

summer of 2018, will stretch 750 linear feet. In addition to stabilizing the edge of the bayou, the limestone will act as a comparison to the oyster reef. CBA staff continually monitors the reefs to measure oyster growth, shoreline accumulation, and wildlife usage.

In addition to reducing erosion and providing a home for marine critters like crabs and juvenile fish, the reefs serve as critical habitat for oysters. Juvenile oysters – known as spat – latch on to the hard shells and limestone to survive. As each oyster can filter up to 50 gallons of water each and every single day, the reef breakwaters improve water quality within the bayou.

Once both reefs have been completed, the Eglin project will serve as a model for other public and private landowners throughout the Panhandle. Living shorelines reduce erosion, provide for wildlife, and improve overall water quality.

Tips for those living alone

With so many living by themselves, there is a need to have medical information readily available should there be an emergency.

Take an index card and write down the following information:

- Your name
- Medications you currently take

- Medical conditions such as diabetes, asthma, COPD, etc.

- Allergies to medicines and foods

- Doctor's name and phone number

- Nearest relative's phone number

Keep this card in your wallet and keep the information updated. For those with smart phones, this information can be stored on your phone. You should also have a complete written medical history that includes any surgeries and the dates.

If you live alone, a key should be given to a trusted neighbor so that they or emergency personnel have

access to the house. If needed, both the Crestview police and the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office will conduct welfare checks to ensure a loved one is safe.

Crestview Police Department offers a wonderful service called "R U OK?" It is a free program

Their website (<http://crestviewpd.org/index.php/community-service-programs/r-u-ok/>) states, "The Crestview Police Department's "RUOK?" program is designed for elderly and/or disabled citizens who live alone.

Those enrolled in the program receive (a) phone call from our Communications

Center at a scheduled time each day to check on the person's welfare."

If the person cannot be reached by phone, a patrol officer will visit to verify the person's well-being and a designated family member or caregiver will be notified. Those who wish to join the program may suspend calls as needed for hospitalization, visits with others, or appointments that may mean they are unavailable by phone.

The website also states, "...to register ... we will need a few simple questions answered, a list of medications and illnesses/conditions, and a list of local

emergency contact(s) to use in case of an emergency." To sign up, call 682-3544 and ask to speak to a Community Services Officer.

Alternately, many people subscribe to monitoring services where all one needs to do is push a button for help. In some cases these monitors, worn around the neck, wrist or ankle, will detect falls. There are many services available to seniors to help them stay safe.

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





Meet a Supreme Justice

Brown v. Board of Ed.

One of Thurgood Marshall's most famous cases was *Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka (Kansas)*. In 1954, Rev. Oliver Brown, an African-American, wanted his daughter to go to the school closest to their home, but it was a white school. Thirteen other families joined the lawsuit, and the case made it to the Supreme Court.

Thurgood Marshall argued the case, and the justices ruled **unanimously** (all in agreement) to end school segregation. Marshall became famous.

Serving his country
President John F. Kennedy offered Marshall a new job in 1961: a federal judgeship on the U.S. Second Circuit Court of Appeals in New York City. In 1965, President Lyndon Johnson asked him to be **solicitor general**, or the government's lawyer in cases before the Supreme Court.

Finally, in 1967, Johnson appointed Marshall to the Supreme Court. He served for 24 years, and he continued working for civil rights for all Americans.

On Aug. 30, 1967, Thurgood Marshall took a historic oath. He became the first African-American appointed as an associate justice to the Supreme Court of the United States.

This week, The Mini Page honors Marshall's 110th birthday by telling the story of a little boy born in Baltimore who made his way to the highest court in the country.

An interest in law

Thoroughgood Marshall was the second son of a kindergarten teacher and a steward, or headwaiter, at a club. His father's father was an escaped slave who ran a grocery store in Baltimore.

Born on July 2, 1908, Thoroughgood got tired of his long name as a child and changed it to Thurgood. He convinced his mother to change the name on his birth certificate. He had already started winning arguments!

When Thurgood's father wasn't working, he would take his boys to the courthouse to watch trials and arguments. Afterward, they would debate the cases and try to come up with better arguments.

Segregated schools

Thurgood grew up in a neighborhood with both white and black people, but he had to attend a **segregated**, or all-black, elementary school. Biographers say he was not a good student, and sometimes his eyes would wander to the police station next door to the school.

He noticed that the black prisoners were beaten more than the whites. He felt that the

unfair treatment was wrong, and he started to think about becoming a lawyer.

When Thurgood got into trouble at school, teachers would make him read the Constitution of the United States. By the time he graduated, he knew it by heart.

A law degree

In college at Lincoln University in Pennsylvania, Thurgood started paying more attention to his studies. He wanted to go to law school at the University of Maryland, but it did not accept African-American students.

Instead, Marshall went to Howard University Law School in Washington, D.C. When he had time, he would go to the Supreme Court and watch lawyers argue cases before the justices.

After graduating from law school, Marshall and his former professor, Charles Houston, defended a black man who sued the University of Maryland over its discrimination against African-Americans. They won, and the school was forced to **integrate**, or accept all races, in 1935.

Marshall continued his career and argued many cases, concentrating most on integrating schools. He worked with the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

CRESTVIEW — Milligan residents Kim and Rick Shelley are requesting prayers and support for their family and the people of Guatemala since the Fuego volcano erupted there June 3.

The couple has two sons, Chris, 30, a project manager who lives in Crestview, and Stephen, 27. Stephen and his wife, Michelle, are missionaries in Guatemala.

Kim, Rick and Stephen answered the following questions.

When you first learned your son was moving to Guatemala, how did you react?

KIM: At first, I didn't want him to go because it is so far away. As his mom, I wished he lived closer, but I know God has called Stephen and Michelle to the mission field.

RICK: Stephen was called by God to the mission field back in 2014. He went on an 11-month mission trip called "The World Race" that took him to several countries in Africa, Southeast Asia, and Central America, including

Guatemala. I remember being apprehensive, and prayed at first only for his safety, but one day stopped in mid-prayer. If I should have tried to talk him out of going in the first place ... Shortly after (the World Race and a) few months of training, he returned to Antigua, Guatemala, high in the mountains just west of Guatemala City. He has been there ever since.

How did you first hear about the Guatemala volcano?

KIM: We were talking with Stephen and Michelle on FaceTime right as the volcano was erupting! They were driving, held up the phone, turned the camera around, and their windshield was trying in vain to wipe away the volcanic ash.

RICK: Volcan de Fuego ("Volcano of Fire") is about 10 miles west of where Stephen and Michelle live ... [They] were headed home due to respiratory and other concerns associated with the volcanic ash, but were not in any immediate danger otherwise.

They described it as tiny rocks falling from the sky.

We checked back a couple of hours later, and they were hunkered down indoors until

the ash fall stopped. Note that Antigua, Guatemala is on the east side of Volcan de Fuego; the devastation we have heard about and seen on the news is primarily on the west side, as the lava and pyroclastic flows head toward the Pacific Ocean.

How did you end up living in Guatemala? What do you do there?

STEPHEN: My wife and I both felt called to come to Guatemala when we were still single. (They met in 2016 and got married in Antigua in January 2018.) We both originally were sent through an organization called Adventures in Missions. We recently transitioned into a staff position with an international church plant called Shoreline City Antigua. Their main campus is in Dallas, Texas. We work with their church plant in Guatemala, Shoreline City Antigua. It launched officially about 15 months ago. We lead worship for the church, as well as are heading up the church's relief efforts in response to the eruption.

How much danger were you and the people you work with/assist in when the volcano

erupted? How has it affected your day-to-day life there?

STEPHEN: The volcano erupted Sunday around noon. We were finishing our Sunday service in Antigua when ash and debris began to fall on the town for about an hour. We drove home through the ash fall thinking it was a bigger eruption than normal. (Fuego erupts often, but not at this magnitude.)

We found out the next day that areas west of the volcano were hit hard and covered heavily from the pyroclastic flow (this is the fast moving mixture of rock, gas, and lava with scorching temperatures close to the eruption). Antigua is ... still susceptible to more ash from further eruptions. Some major roads near the affected areas were closed for safety concerns as damage is still being assessed and rescue efforts continue.

What's the top priority for yourself and the mission organization you work for now?

STEPHEN: Over the next few weeks, we will be contacting disaster relief groups, as well as various other ministries

One of the things he recalled about his dad was that Wayne Lundy had a Yamaha motorcycle and painted a Harley Davidson logo on its gas tank.

"We called it his Yama-Harley. Everybody thought it was funny. Nobody he ever met disliked him. He was a really good guy," Bobby said.

"He liked to fix things. I say that because he had a lot of stuff on his property — motorcycles, boats ... he did a lot of everything.

"He was a hard worker and loved by all, but never planned for future

misfortunes. He had no life insurance," Lundy

said. "His mother, my grandmother, paid for his funeral expenses and I am trying to raise awareness of a GoFundMe page to pay her back. I don't think any

person should have to go through the pain of losing their child. Covering the expenses on top of such a tragic event makes it even more difficult to handle," Lundy said.

In addition to Wayne's death, his wife, Wanda, is in deteriorating health. She was admitted to the hospital shortly after his passing. Despite that, all money from the fundraiser

to see the other side... Each and every time a shoebox is packed, that's a chance for a child to receive a shoebox like I did. That's what I get a chance to do," he said.

Creating new memories

Nsengimana, his brother Fils, and sister Lillian lived with their grandmother and two uncles in Kigali, Rwanda's capital. They saw two of them, his grandmother and one of his uncles, killed by their neighbors, members of the militia in Rwanda.

They were among almost one million people killed from April 6 through July 4, 1994, making over 400,000 children orphans.

Nsengimana and his brother came to live in an orphanage with 250 other children, and his sister lived with friends of the family.

They lived at the orphanage for several years, and it was where he

receivedhis OCC shoebox.

"I remember I was so excited, because we still had to hold it until everybody had got one, but for some of us we had to hold our presents for about five minutes, five long minutes," he said.

School supplies, hygiene items, toy cars, balls, coloring books, paintbrushes, and other items were inside.

"At 7 years old living in

an orphanage, we really didn't have that many toys to play with, so the shoebox items brought us that joy. They reminded us that we are cared for—we are loved, and it gave us something to hold on to.

"And it planted new memories in our mind, because of what had happened during the war and what...was so traumatic that the shoebox became an opportunity to plant

new memories in our lives."

The items themselves had lasting value for Nsengimana.

"One of my favorite items was a hair comb that I kept for the next three years ... I would take it everywhere I went for the next three years. That's how special the items were."

After Nsengimana and his siblings survived their

experiences, two came to the U.S. He and his wife are Minnesota residents and his brother lives in Wisconsin. His sister lives in Rwanda with her family, including two sons.

"I'm a very blessed uncle and I get a chance to see them every time I go back," he said.

As an OCC spokesperson, he has met other shoebox recipients as well. "It is so encouraging

to see all of us shoebox recipients coming out and sharing a very unique story of how that shoebox made a difference in our lives, made an impact (and) launched a process in our lives of hope and love," Nsengimana said.

Since the OCC ministry started in 1993, volunteers have packed over 157 million shoeboxes and distributed them all over the world.



Canada: Lynchpin ally may reject U.S.

Canada has not yet announced building a wall on the nation's southern border, but at this point, such a step would not be surprising. Relations between the two nations have been deteriorating rapidly.

In hindsight, signs of trouble appeared at the start of the current administration in Washington. President Donald Trump ignored the tradition of visiting Canada early and instead went to Saudi Arabia.

Saudi Arabia is currently pursuing a controversial and undeniably bloody intervention in Yemen. The Saudi government today pursues reform but remains relatively repressive.

In stark contrast, President Barack Obama, respecting tradition, made Canada his first foreign destination. On February 19, 2009, he and Prime Minister Stephen Harper met and found common environmental ground. They avoided open clash on the "Buy American" provision of the U.S. economic stimulus plan.

President John F. Kennedy eloquently summed up the relationship in an address to the Parliament of Canada in early 1961, noting, "Geography has made us neighbors, history has made us friends, economics has made us partners, and necessity has made

Regional trade agreements further strengthen Canada-U.S. ties. The 1994 NAFTA agreement, now under attack, lowered trade barriers between Mexico and the rest of North America. An essential predecessor was the Canada-U.S. Free Trade Agreement of 1988, in turn facilitated by the successful Uruguay Round of multilateral trade negotiations.

Canada's government professionals traditionally foster cooperation with Britain and the U.S. on military security and wider diplomatic as well as economic matters, and are numerous among the professionals who staff the United Nations, NATO and the other substantial and influential intergovernmental organizations.

Such cooperation in

promotion of international community has deep roots reaching back to the earliest phase of World War II. During that desperate time, U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill met for their first summit on naval warships off the coast of Newfoundland, Canada.

The meeting occurred in August 1941, several months before the attack on Pearl Harbor brought America directly into the war.

The principal result was the Atlantic Charter, a dramatic declaration of Allied strategy and goals, including the postwar period.

Reflecting extraordinary determination and optimism during the bleakest phase of the global struggle, FDR and Churchill explicitly proposed the United Nations.

Throughout the war, a series of conferences took place to hammer

out the details of the new world organization.

Very nationalistic Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker clashed with JFK. At the end of the 1961 presidential visit, Bundy accidentally left behind a briefing memo on which the president had scrawled a note asking his aide how to deal with the "SOB."

Diefenbaker's staff delivered the memo to him. He promptly flew into a rage and threatened to involve the press.

Kennedy pleaded poor penmanship and said he actually had written "OAS", the Organization of American States. At a press conference, the president pointedly praised Bundy.

Early the next morning, the national security adviser arrived at the office to find a staff note: "Congratulations, you can stay." Humor then helped mitigate serious political frictions, but did not end them.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo now works hard to maintain reasonable diplomatic relations with Ottawa. Pompeo's military experience should help. The U.S.-Canada partnership, dating from FDR, survived earlier conflicts.

Let's hope that continues.

'Computer fix' scam targets Crestview area residents

regarding a computer scam in which the caller identifies himself as a Microsoft technical support representative and tells the recipient their computer has viruses and needs to be fixed.

The "Microsoft representative" states for a fee, and the customer's help in allowing him to obtain remote access to their computer, he will "debug" it for them.

This allows an unknown person complete access to any personal information on the computer.

The scammer is insistent and frequently asks for the victims' banking

account information to pay for the "cleaning service," Crestview Police Dispatch Center staff report states.

"Microsoft will not make unsolicited telephone calls to you; all communication

must be initiated by the customer," Officer Chris Roll said. "Be wary of companies using scare tactics, being pushy, or only accepting checking account numbers as a form of payment."

FORT WALTON BEACH — FWC with its partner agencies, Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office marine unit and security personnel, Okaloosa County Jail Processing Center, U.S. Coast Guard, Escambia County Sheriff's Office marine unit, Fort Walton Beach Police Department, Fort Walton Beach Fire and Rescue, Okaloosa Island Fire and Rescue, and Air Force Security Forces, provided public safety for the 63rd Billy Bowlegs Pirates Festival. Part of the Billy Bowlegs event involved about 600 to 700 vessels anchored off Santa Rosa Sound near the Fort Walton Beach landing. Law enforcement and first responder actions included 692 vessel stops; 2,256 citizen contacts; 18 BUI arrests; 56 uniform boating citations issued; 112

written warnings issued; 13 fight and disturbance interventions; 43 calls for service or public assist; four search and rescues; 19 medical responses; six medical transports; one medical transport to hospital; three drug possession charges; two intoxicated individuals secured at the drunk tent; one possession of alcohol under 21 years of age; and one boating accident.

DESTIN — Officer Corbin was on land patrol conducting boating safety, resource protection and license compliance in the Destin area. The officer saw three individuals actively fishing with rods and reels off the Destin Beach. Officer Corbin waited in the parking lot until one of the individuals returned to their vehicle. He made contact and asked to inspect the individual's required Eglin Beach permit. The individual did not have the permit. The other two individuals also returned to the vehicle.

The officer explained that Eglin Beach closes at sunset. All three individuals did not have a saltwater fishing license. During the fisheries inspection, Officer Corbin saw beer in the cooler. All three individuals were under the age of 21. The owner of the vehicle claimed ownership. All individuals were issued citations for no fishing license.

CINCO BAYOU — Officer Corbin was on land patrol conducting boating safety, resource protection and license compliance at Cinco Bayou Boat Ramp. The officer saw a male subject exit a vehicle and enter the water with a spear gun and snorkel gear. He saw the subject swimming parallel with the bridge and spear fishing. About three hours later, the subject returned to his vehicle by land without his spear gun. Officer Corbin explained that he saw him spear fishing within 100 yards of the bridge without

a divers down device displayed. The individual did not have a valid fishing license. The individual intentionally left his spear gun on the other side of the bayou because he felt there was an FWC officer in the parking lot. The subject was cited for spear fishing within 100 yards of a fishing bridge, no divers down device and no fishing license.

DESTIN — Officers Corbin and Carter, Investigator Hein and Major Duval were on vessel patrol conducting boating safety inspection and resource protection in the Destin area. They saw a vessel returning from the Gulf of Mexico with rods and reels displayed. The vessel was stopped and a fisheries inspection revealed that a red snapper was harvested out of season. The boat operator was issued a notice to appear citation.

DESTIN — Officers Pifer, Winton and

Investigator Patterson were on vessel patrol conducting boating safety inspection and resource protection in the Destin area. They saw a vessel returning from the Gulf of Mexico with rods and reels displayed. The vessel was stopped and a fisheries inspection revealed red snapper and gray triggerfish harvested out of season, along with an undersized red grouper. The operator was issued a notice to appear citation for the resource violations.

Officers Pifer, Winton and Investigator Patterson made a vessel stop that resulted in the arrest of the operator for BUI. Further, Officer Pifer charged the operator with possession of cannabis under 20 grams and paraphernalia. The operator was transported to Okaloosa County Jail.

DESTIN — Officers Corbin, Matechik, Carter and Investigator Hein

were on vessel patrol in the Destin Harbor. A boating safety stop was conducted on a 2007 21-foot vessel. While conducting the boating safety inspection, Investigator Hein, who is a Drug Recognition Expert saw a vape pen when a subject opened a compartment on the center console of the vessel to retrieve the vessel registration. Investigator Hein saw the oil in the vape pen was not consistent with the type of oil normally used in a vape pen. The oil inside the vape pen was thick and a dark yellow color, consistent with Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the intoxicant inside cannabis. Upon consent to a search, Investigator Hein detected an odor of cannabis. A field test was done and it was determined the oil in the vape pen was THC. The owner was issued a notice to appear citation.

DESTIN — Officers Corbin, Carter, Investigator Hein and Major Duval were on vessel patrol conducting boating safety inspections in the Destin Pass. The officers saw a vessel being operated on the east side of Crab Island with several adults and children on board. The officers asked the operator if he had a PFD onboard the vessel for the infant and he provided a PFD for a child weighing less than 50 pounds, the improper size for an infant. It was determined the vessel was rented and the livery failed to provide the proper life jacket. The livery personnel who rented the vessel issued a notice to appear citation.
