Crestview resident's generosity leads to longest-running kidney chain

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CRESTVIEW — A kidney chain in Alabama surpassed 100 recipients on July 20 making it the longest running kidney chain in the nation. It started when one Crestview woman donated her kidney to a stranger.

That woman is former Bulldog, Paula King. She listened to a friend's story about his decision to donate a kidney to his father.

"It gave his dad extended life that they could spend together," King said, "and that struck me that it was a very noble and a good thing to do."

A few years later, King's husband at the time needed a bone marrow transplant from someone, and finding a match became an issue.

"It was not a good feeling knowing that his livelihood was at somebody else's mercy, a stranger," King said.

King decided to call The University of Alabama at

Birmingham, an academic medical center, because they did kidney transplant surgeries.

"It was sort of like the Holy Spirit had been telling me for a while, 'You need to do this,'" King said.

King called UAB in 2013 and offered her kidney for donation. It took a month but they found a recipient: Shalimar resident Lornette Stewart.

At the time, King said she wanted her donation to remain anonymous, afraid she wouldn't approve of the recipient.

However, King said she decided to allow the recipient to contact her after encouragement from the hospital staff.

When she heard from Stewart, King said she knew the donation was meant to be.

"She sent me an email, and when I opened it up, she started out by saying, 'God has blessed me by this,'" King said. "That got me teary-eyed because then I knew God had been telling me all along to do this."

In 1995, Stewart's battle

began with Lupus, which affected her kidneys. She needed a donor, and her daughter, Jovi Williams, was not a match.

Stewart said UAB contacted her daughter and asked if she would be willing to donate a kidney on behalf her mother.

Williams agreed to donate, not realizing she was

Officer misconduct flourished under Taylor, mayor's report says

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CRESTVIEW — A group of Crestview police officers, possibly acting under orders from then Chief of Police Tony Taylor, held a May meeting at Speck Pond in Walton County to "dig up dirt" on their commanders.

This "unauthorized meeting, held out of Crestview jurisdictional boundaries on federal land without permission," helped prompt Mayor David Cadle to place Taylor on administrative leave and eventually fire him, according to a report by Cadle released Monday.

"This was a waste of taxpayer funds by having city vehicles at the site. Dispatch was never informed of their location but GPS technology verified the presence of city vehicles at Speck Pond," the report said.

The meeting at the pond was held on the same day that Cadle confronted Taylor and the Police Department command staff. At this meeting the chief, according to Cadle's report, charged that his subordinates were attempting to undermine his authority.

The three officers who led the meeting at the pond, identified in the report as Christina Dawson, Shawn Temple and Jay Seals, have been on administrative leave since May 10 and a Police Department internal investigation remains ongoing.

Dawson told others at the May 8 meeting that Taylor had arranged the get together, which she told

some less-willing participants was mandatory K-9 officer training, but that Taylor couldn't be there.

"The chief was unable to attend because there had been a blow-up at the chief's office that afternoon," the report states, paraphrasing Dawson.

Two of the six officers who went to the Speck Pond meeting contacted their supervisor, Cmdr. Andrew Schneider, afterward. Both said they believed the meeting to be "improper and unethical" and directed more toward gathering dirt against Schneider than actual training.

In a report of his own, Schneider writes that at the command staff meeting — held on the same day as the Speck Pond gathering — Cadle had brought up the topic of a "secret meeting" and that Taylor denied knowledge of the meeting. He expressed concern that if what Dawson told her fellow officers at Speck Pond was true, then Taylor had "blatantly lied" to the mayor and command staff at the

'It's the right thing to do'

Fellow airmen from the 919th Special Operations Wing replace woman's missing flag

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CRESTVIEW — When KaSandra Gray lost her U.S. flag near Crab Island earlier this summer, she was heartbroken.

She came to terms with the fact that she probably would never see it again. But when members of the 919th Special Operations Wing at Duke Field read about her story, they decided to give her a new one.

"I had such a crappy year, and losing that flag was such a huge hit to me," Gray said.

Gray — a 14-year veteran of the U.S. Air Force who is stationed at Hurlburt Field — went to Crab Island June 24 with her family. After a day

on the water, they packed up and went to shore.

Halfway to the boat ramp, Gray's stepson realized their flag was missing. The American flag Gray bought before her first deployment to Afghanistan more than 10 years ago had fallen off the boat's flag pole.

The group quickly turned around and searched for the flag, but had no luck.



EDWARD GILLESPIE LATHAM 1930 - 2018

After being surrounded by his loving family for his last few days, retired Lt. Colonel Edward G. Latham, Jr. died peacefully on July 30, 2018 in his Santa Rosa Beach hometown. His humor, his dedication, and his extraordinary ability to fix almost anything will be sorely missed by his family. He was born and raised in Birmingham, Alabama. He attended Auburn University, where he met the love of his life, Carolyn Ennis Latham of Tallassee, Alabama, and they married in 1952 after graduating with Engineering and Teaching degrees, respectively. Ed joined the Air Force immediately after graduation and was assigned to Eglin AFB where he spent much of his 28-year Air Force career over 3 separate assignments.

Ed spent much of his career as a navigator in the back of a B-52 Stratofortress. During the October 1962 Cuban missile crisis and as part of the Strategic Air Command (SAC), Lt. Colonel Latham flew from the US mainland to the Russian border, aided by in-air refueling, with multiple nuclear weapons on board. Once in the area of the Mediterranean, they remained airborne for several hours waiting for a command to attack their designated target, Moscow, should there not be a satisfactory outcome to the crisis. After nearly a month, the crisis abated and the nuclear armed B-52's returned to regular duty.

A year later, the USAF sent Ed to the University of Chicago where he earned his MBA. From there, he returned to Eglin for most of the remainder of his career. He spent 1968-69 in one of the most dangerous bases in South Vietnam, Pleiku, flying an O-2A reconnaissance plane responsible for directing air strikes against North Vietnamese targets. The plane flew at such low altitudes that it required a metal-reinforced pilot's seat to protect from small weapon fire from the ground.

After a stint at Pope AFB in Fayetteville, NC, Ed finished his career at Eglin, with responsibility for developing and executing the operating plan to aid tens of thousands of South Vietnamese refugees in Eglin's "tent city." He then transitioned to become a major force behind the development and initial operation of Eglin's Armament Museum as its first Director. He retired from the Air Force in 1980.

In 1979 Ed and Carolyn became rare full-time residents on the beaches of 30A in South Walton.



Ed had a litany of responsibilities during the next 35 years, including an instructor at Troy University's FWB campus, an owner of a small gift and ice cream store on highway 98, a volunteer fire fighter, a member of the Code Enforcement Board, a Deacon of Santa Rosa Beach Community Church, the unofficial sheriff of Beach Highlands for years when there were few year-round residents, and the manager of the Santa Rosa Beaches Historic Gulf Cemetery.

Ed became permanently sober in October 1987 and was a founding member of the Buster's group of AA. He dedicated a special part of his last 30 years to the AA groups in the Santa Rosa area and there are few members that haven't been touched by his presence and his firm but generous spirit during that time.

Ed is survived by his wife of 65 years Carolyn, who taught over a decade at Niceville HS, daughter Lisa (John Boushy) of Santa Rosa Beach, son Brett (Karen) of Shalimar, and daughter Susan (Walter Johnson) of Jackson, MS; grandchildren Brandon, Jennifer, Kevin, Phillip (Amanda), Michael and Lauren (Alex); Blake and Brice; and Calvin and Erin, and one great grandchild, Kennedy, daughter of Blake.

Ed was predeceased by his three sisters, Pat Burnham, Carmen Callan and Mary Rowell.

A memorial service will be held on Saturday, August 18, at 10:00 am at Santa Rosa Beach (SRB) Community Church with Pastor Pete Hyde presiding. Interment with military honors will follow at SRB Historic Gulf Cemetery. A reception will follow at the SRB Community Church Fellowship Hall from about noon until 1 pm.

State health department recognizes National Breastfeeding Month

FORT WALTON BEACH — The Florida Department of Health (DOH-Okaloosa) and partners across the state are celebrating World Breastfeeding Week, Aug. 1-7. This year's theme is "Breastfeeding: Foundation of Life." The department also will celebrate Black Breastfeeding Week Aug. 25-31.

"We know that an infant's first 1,000 days are a crucial time for ensuring the child grows up healthy and thriving, and breastfeeding can significantly improve health outcomes for both mothers and infants," State Surgeon General and Secretary Dr. Celeste Philip said. "Supporting mom and encouraging breastfeeding in the first days of baby's life are essential steps for ensuring successful breastfeeding."

The Florida Department of Health is working to promote breastfeeding as a vital health

activity, and encourages breastfeeding-friendly hospitals, child care facilities, work places and communities. Okaloosa has 20 worksites and 15 child care centers designated as breastfeeding friendly worksites either through the Florida Quest for Quality Maternity Care or through the Florida Department of Health.

"The Health Department is working with both delivery hospitals to advance breastfeeding initiation and working with Healthy Okaloosa worksites and child care centers to implement policies to support breastfeeding mothers," Dr. Karen Chapman, DOH-Okaloosa director, said.

As a part of the department's Healthiest Weight Florida and Florida's Healthy Babies initiatives, the Baby Steps to Baby Friendly project focuses on increasing breastfeeding initiation and duration among

Florida women. Visit <http://www.healthiestweightflorida.com/activities/baby-steps.html> for details on that program.

There are steps everyone can take to help improve breastfeeding rates. They are:

- Promote the implementation of the Baby-Friendly Hospital initiative (www.healthiestweightflorida.com/activities/baby-steps.html).

- Provide access to skilled breastfeeding counseling. Studies have shown that breastfeeding promotion interventions increase exclusive and any breastfeeding rates at 4-6 weeks and at six months.

- Encourage employers and communities to promote and support breastfeeding.

World Breastfeeding Week encourages everyone to be an advocate for breastfeeding.

It has positive lifelong health effects on infants,

such as lower incidence of respiratory infections and ear infections for infants and children and reduced risk of breast and ovarian cancer for mothers. Also, breastfeeding reduces the risk of obesity compared to formula feeding.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends exclusive breastfeeding for infants for the first year of life and beyond, with the addition of appropriate complementary foods when the infant is developmentally ready, around six months of age.

DOH-Okaloosa holds breastfeeding classes in the WIC clinic in Fort Walton Beach and Crestview. Contact WIC, 833-9254 or 689-7858, for more information.

'In God We Trust' coming to schools

State law requires signage to be displayed in all public school buildings

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Most Northwest Florida students return to school within the week — and new signage will be there to greet them.

The Florida Legislature recently signed a bill into law that instructs all public schools and school district buildings to display the words "In God We Trust" by the first day of school this year. There are more than 4,000 public schools in Florida.

The mandate comes as a part of a change for Florida State Statute 1003.44, which covers patriotic programs. The bill — part of the omnibus education bill HB 7055 passed last legislative session — requires schools to display the words that serve as both the state and national mottos.

The statute requires that the motto must be displayed in a "conspicuous"

location. Some local superintendents are allowing the principals to determine the placement of the motto in each school.

Walton County Superintendent Russell Hughes said principals received the signage last week, and it will be up to them where to display the words that are framed and printed on poster board.

The Okaloosa County School District is still waiting for their signs to arrive before the Aug. 13 first day of school.

"The school district is in the process of completing this mandate," Superintendent Mary Beth Jackson said. "Barring any complications with the production of the signs, the plan is to have signs up in all our schools and auxiliary buildings by the start of the ... school year."

According to Superintendent Tim Wyrosdick of Santa Rosa County, the district will have the signs up before their first day.

"We are putting posters with the language in every school site," Wyrosdick said. "Mainly in the front office."

beginning the longest-running kidney chain—a series of transplants in which family members donate a kidney to someone in need on behalf of a loved one receiving a donation.

"Every time we look at the chain ... We just see what God has done, what He orchestrated," Stewart said. "I look at it now, and all the people

have received transplants because the first person said yes."

Although they attended Navy boot camp in 1986, Stewart and King didn't know each other personally. King said they have met in person and have visited together a few times.

King, Stewart, and Williams are all currently in good health.

Health department issues heat stress warnings for outdoor workers

FORT WALTON BEACH — The Florida Department of Health in Okaloosa County (DOH-Okaloosa) would like to share recent findings regarding heat stress and evaluation of exposure limits for outdoor workers. Heat stress is the workplace measurement recommended for use by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, which publishes recommended occupational exposure limits for heat stress.

These limits are based on wet bulb globe temperature (WBGT), workload, and heat acclimatization status.

WBGT incorporates four environmental factors (air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed, and radiation [often sunlight]) that contribute to heat stress and is the recommended workplace environmental heat metric. The term Heat Index is an "apparent" temperature that combines humidity and air

temperature to quantify what the condition "feels like" to the human body, but it does not account for the effects of direct sunlight, stagnant air, work clothing, and strenuous activities.

Heat stress, an

environmental and occupational hazard, is associated with a spectrum of heat-related illnesses, including heat stroke, which can lead to death.

Protective measures to prevent occupational

heat-related illnesses, published by the CDC and the NIOSH, include the following:

- Train supervisors and workers about heat-related illness signs, symptoms and first aid.
- Designate someone to monitor heat conditions and oversee protective measures.
- Provide extra protection for new workers until their bodies acclimatize to heat.
- Schedule frequent breaks in a cooler location (such as in shaded or air-conditioned areas).
- Use validated tools to assess workplace heat stress.
- Adjust schedules and workload to stay below established heat stress limits.
- Recognize that lower heat stress limits are needed for new workers, those with pre-disposing conditions, those who perform heavy physical activity, and those who wear hot clothing.
- Provide water and electrolyte-containing beverages.
- Comply with applicable state workplace heat regulations.

A Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report includes these findings. Among 25 outdoor occupational heat-related illnesses and fatalities examined for this study, WBGT-based occupational exposure limits were exceeded for eight of 11 nonfatal illnesses and all 14 fatalities. Six fatalities occurred when the Heat Index was less than 91 degrees Fahrenheit.

Whenever heat stress exceeds occupational exposure limits, workplaces should employ heat-related illness prevention programs that include acclimatization programs, symptom recognition, first aid training, and the provision of rest breaks, shade, and fluids. A Heat Index of 85 degrees Fahrenheit could be used as a screening threshold to prevent heat-related illness. The Florida Department of Health works to protect, promote and improve the health of all people in Florida through integrated state, county and community efforts. Do we still have the right stuff?

The late Neil Armstrong was the perfect hero.

He was so unassuming, most Americans couldn't have identified him in a police lineup.

In terms of spirit and temperament, he was a direct descendant of Wilbur and Orville Wright, the Dayton brothers whose aircraft changed the world in 1903, and Col. John Glenn, another Ohioan who became the first American to orbit Earth.

Armstrong doubtlessly was a touchstone for others, including the late Judith Resnick of Akron, a brilliant NASA engineer who lost her life onboard the Space Shuttle Challenger in 1986.

Strange how Ohioans — people who live so close to the ground — are at the center of the three most important aviation stories in history.

But I digress.

Armstrong's own brilliance and immeasurable bravery were obscured by his lack of self-aggrandizement. No true Ohioan was really surprised when he returned to his farm in Wapakoneta after retiring from NASA.

But on July 20, 1969, on a night hotter than a wool blanket, Neil Armstrong descended from Apollo 11 onto the surface of the moon and changed the world.

You probably have to be a certain age to fully grasp the courage and audacity it required for the U.S. to attempt a manned moonshot. Even in the maelstrom of Vietnam and the fight for civil rights, NASA and its astronauts embodied our collective innate belief that we always figure it out; that we could accomplish anything. We are America

As Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin, and Michael Collins took off in their module, the message was clear: We are America. There's nothing we can't do.

So how we get from there to here?

When did the country that delivered Armstrong, Aldrin and Collins to the moon and back without so much as a scratch, become so afraid, so small, so willfully incurious?

How did we go from traversing the Sea of Tranquility to wrestling down in the mud?

On July 20, 1969, we accomplished what should have been impossible. Consider the technology in your pocket is more sophisticated than what jettisoned Armstrong, Aldrin and Collins from Earth's surface.

But we did it. America conquered that which had eluded and fascinated man for millennia.

So, why can't we get it together here on the ground? It's math

Perhaps it's because space exploration are essentially mathematics and physics problems.

"Two plus two equals four" is an immutable equation in any language, culture or belief system.

You can't spin, shade or argue against it.

In 2018, everything else, it appears, is subject to debate. When its findings are inconvenient, even science, the method by which we explore the wonders of the universe, is subjected to a level of distrust and second-guessing unseen in times past.

Colonoscopy – avoid colon cancer – please

I had my fourth colonoscopy recently. The best part of the procedure is when it's over. Honestly, it's not that big of a deal but it's always easier to say that when it's over!

When I was in my gown five minutes before the test I thought about the inconvenience of the colonoscopy but then quickly remembered the inconvenience of colon cancer.

My father was 60 when he was told that the large mass inside his colon was cancer.

Under the instruction of our family doctor Bob Hall in Paintsville, Kentucky he underwent surgery to remove a large section of his colon that also resulted in a colostomy in the

right side of his stomach. He would wear a bag on his side for three months. I vividly remember the pain and sickness of that surgery in 1980. Three months later the doctor did another extensive surgery and reconnected his colon. Seemed to me he was sicker after that surgery than the one before. Eventually he regained normalcy once again, never had radiation or chemotherapy and lived 25 more years. He was one of the lucky ones. He had one really bad sick year but he lived.

My mother in law had colon cancer and had most of her colon removed in her forties. She spent the rest of her life with a stoma. A stoma is where a section of the bowel is brought out through the stomach area. However, she didn't wear a pouch but irrigated her colon every other day. It was one awful surgery but she lived forty more plus very active years of life.

A high school friend not long ago went to the doctor and found out he had stage four

colon cancer. He couldn't beat it and died recently. A dear minister friend at the peak of his ministry in his early fifties found out he had colon cancer. He fought it hard but it didn't take long and he soon died.

Something will take us all out. We are all going to die. My dad used to say; "None of us will get out of this world alive." This is a true statement. However, a colonoscopy is not that big of a deal. The routine procedure, two hours at the hospital might prevent you from having your colon cut out. Now, that would be good, right? Or, maybe it might prevent you from dying in your sixties or even fifties or late forties. It happens a lot.

I had my first colonoscopy at the age of fifty and they cut out three polyps. If I had never had that procedure done I would probably be dead by now from colon cancer. I had another one three years later. Another one five years after that and came

Crestview, it's time!

Dear editor,
The city of Crestview enacted its present charter in 1963 when our population was about 7,500 people. Current estimates are that we will exceed 25,000 in 2019 which is over a 3-time growth rate. Unfortunately, our charter, which was fine for a small town, has not changed to reflect our growth to a moderate sized city.

Our form of government exists in only 85 of Florida's 412 cities, with the average population of 83 of them at 1,700. Being out of step with other cities is not in itself a bad thing if what you have works.

As one of your elected officials, I will tell you what we have doesn't work very well. We have five departments; two of which fall under a part-time mayor and three of which fall under five part-time council members, who by charter only have to meet once a month and can't talk to each other in between these public meetings. Is that any way to run a city?

It's like a business owner putting control of his company in

the hands of a part-time board of directors and having no CEO. That, people, that key word, CEO, is what Crestview needs.

In 2017, the City Council appointed a seven-member Citizens Charter Review Committee to examine our charter and make a recommendation to maintain what we have or to change. During their nearly four-month study, they focused on a governmental change that would have one individual in charge of the city on a daily basis. (Minutes of their meetings are available on the city's website.)

Their biggest challenge was whether it would be a full-time strong mayor or a hired city manager. They came to the conclusion, and in October presented their proposal to the city council, that we should have a city manager, that would be vetted and hired by the city council.

In addition to that, they recommended that we move from electing our city council members, who by charter only have to meet once a month and can't talk to each other in between these public meetings. Is that any way to run a city? It's like a business owner putting control of his company in

to make the final decision.

On Aug. 28 of this year, all registered Crestview voters will get to vote on those changes. There will actually be three amendments: one to allow the city council to clean up outdated language from the 1963 charter (no structural changes), one to allow the city council to appoint a city manager, and one to allow the city council to appoint the city clerk.

You will be allowed to vote yes or no on each separate item.

As your city council president, I am encouraging everyone to vote for these changes. It will move us from an inefficient government with little accountability to a more efficient government that has someone in charge who can hold each and every city employee accountable!

Not all screen time is created equal

Screen time. You've heard the phrase before, and if you're a parent, you've probably agonized over creating a screen time policy for your family. You understandably want a policy that reflects your family values, and you also want to consider your child's wants, needs and expectations.

The American Academy of Pediatrics, a go-to resource for parents on screen time guidelines, has determined that not all screen time is created equal. New research is changing the way parents look at screen time, and challenging parents to examine the quality of the time spent in front of devices. Quality is especially important when your children are seeking screen-based entertainment — games, shows, social media — and this is where family policies get tricky.

How much online entertainment is too much? Can there be too little? The team at Star Stable Online — makers of a popular online, horse adventure game — recommends parents get involved with their children's online activity, monitor their online behavior, explore their favorite games, shows and activities, and create a family screen policy that is more than just "hours or minutes."

The conversation around screen time is less about time and more about active digital engagement. If you do not recognize all the activities they're enjoying online, this is a great

opportunity to ask questions and create a dialogue about their digital habits. To help you determine whether your child is enjoying quality screen time, the team at Star Stable Online recommends these questions to get the conversation started:

- Do you interact with other kids online? This question helps you determine if the child is building social skills in a safe, online environment. Parents must determine if the game or online activity promotes positive social and collaborative play.

- Do you solve problems in the game? This question helps you determine how the child interacts with the game and what he/she learns from playing. Determine if your child faces challenges in an environment that is constantly changing and expanding, forcing them to adapt. Find out if they need to use their best reasoning skills to complete challenges independently or as a team.

- What does success look like and how do you feel when you succeed? This line of questioning helps you determine if the game is building your child's personal character. Does the game include storylines and activities that promote responsibility and respect for others? If your child interacts with other players, ask how that makes him/her feel (happy, motivated, helpful or strong).

- Have you learned new vocabulary while playing the game? This question helps you determine if reading is a big part of the game or if it's all visuals. Reading is a fundamental life skill and any screen time

your child is involved in should provide an element of age-appropriate reading. This will push your child to expand their vocabulary and even help to grow a lifelong love of reading.

- Have you learned anything about money management? While this seems like an odd question, screen time solutions should do more than simply provide children a way to spend money, they should teach kids how to manage money or currency. It's not a "must" for all screen time choices, but games or activities that provide a weekly allowance certainly help reinforce money management skills (spend, save and budget).

Finding the right screen time solution for your child

The screen time debate is no longer a matter of hours or minutes, but how your kids are investing time interacting with a screen. Ultimately, it's a balancing act of time and quality that will help your child build a positive digital footprint and smart screen time habits that can serve them their entire life.

out with four large polyps and one looked very precancerous. Thus, recently three years after the last one I had my fourth and for the first time ever the doctor told me I had no polyps in my colon. Hallelujah! I was so glad. I've been eating daily fruits and vegetables. Going for the broccoli, the asparagus, fruit, peppers, etc. I'm convinced fruit and vegetables are the ticket. I would recommend you make fruit and vegetable a part of your daily life. If you remember, they told us this stuff in health class in elementary school. It's true.

The day before your procedure you will have to drink some nasty tasting stuff. At least I did. I was allowed to eat a little bit as late as 4:00 in the afternoon. Very little but I didn't starve by any means. Two o'clock in the morning I was drinking more nasty stuff. Plus

I drank about a gallon of water to flush the nasty tasting stuff down. From about 2:00 in the morning until 4:30 I was in the bathroom almost constantly. At 6:30 I was at the outpatient center of the hospital. The people were great and explained everything. By 7:45 I was receiving propofol, (Michael Jackson drug) which puts you to sleep almost instantly. By 8:45 I was leaving the hospital with my good news of no polyps. My wife had to drive. You must have a driver with you. By 9:30 I was having a Greek omelet and four large pancakes. I felt like I had earned every bite.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in America. Over 50,000 people die from colon cancer every year. Let's all get routine colonoscopies and at least try to avoid dying from colon cancer. Good luck!

How to control Florida pusley weed in lawns

Recently I've been getting plenty of requests for identification and control of Florida pusley from homeowners frustrated with this common lawn weed. If you wait until this weed is mature with a well-developed root system and after it is producing its white flowers, you'll find it difficult or impossible to achieve control.

Keys to controlling this weed include maintaining a healthy lawn (watering to prevent drought stress and mowing at the correct mowing height) and controlling the weed before it reproduces itself.

Regular irrigation (during dry periods) to prevent wilting can allow a lawn to better compete with Florida pusley. Small infestations can be physically removed.

It is important to control the plants before they begin to reproduce. It reproduces by seeds. Seed production quickly follows flower production. Mature, well-established plants are more difficult to control.

Florida pusley can be an indication of nematode infested soil. More information on nematodes and Florida lawns is available through your UF/IFAS County Extension Office or online at <http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/ng039>.

Larger infestations will likely require herbicide treatment. A pre-emergence herbicide such as pendimethalin should be applied during February to early March when day temperatures reach 65-70 degrees Fahrenheit for four to five consecutive days. A second application may be needed six to nine weeks after initial application to achieve season-long control.

With postemergence herbicides such as those containing 2, 4-D, dicamba, carfentrazone or imazaquin make your

application when the weed is young, actively growing and not under drought stress. Check the herbicide label for specific application rates and turf grass tolerance before use.

Florida pusley is a common and possibly native lawn weed that can be difficult to control. It is a summer annual but perennial

types of pusley may be found growing with Florida pusley, including largeflower pusley and Brazil pusley.

In routinely mowed lawns, Florida pusley will have a spreading growth habit. Plants produce noticeable white, tubular flowers that are clustered at the ends of branches. Flowers are produced in late

spring, summer and fall.

Florida pusley can become mat forming in sunny, thinning areas of a lawn. It's very drought tolerant and will easily out-compete lawn grass on well drained, sandy soils during dry periods when the lawn is not being irrigated adequately.

All pesticides, including herbicides, should be

used in accordance with directions on the label. Read and follow directions and precautions on the product's label.

The Daily News wrote about Gray's situation in late June, and the story caught the eye of Maj. Terrell Eikner with the 919th Special Operations Wing.

"I said, 'Hey, I have a flag that was flown in combat in Afghanistan and I think we need to replace her flag because she's a member of the Air Force family,'" Eikner said. "It's the right thing to do."

Eikner and the rest of the wing presented Gray with a new flag on Sunday in a hangar on Duke Field in front of her parents, boyfriend and children. Before Eikner presented the flag, he explained the significance behind it.

"I go up to my attic to retrieve the flag. I have about 50 boxes in my attic," Eikner said. "Luckily, it's in the first box that I grab ... I pull the flag out, there's a certificate in there. On that certificate (it says) 'flown by Maj. Bradfield.' Now, Col. Bradfield — our wing commander.

"I'm telling you ma'am, this

whole thing ... it was meant to be."

Eikner presented Gray the flag, the original certificate and a new certificate made just for her. With tears in her eyes, she thanked him and the rest of the soldiers for their generosity.

"This is a huge honor for me to receive something that

you've kept for so long," Gray said, choked up. "And I fully understand, and I'm so, so grateful that you guys magically found this and decided to give it to me. I'm overwhelmed with gratitude."

After the ceremony, Gray and her family got to meet Col. Les Bradfield and thank

him, as well.

"I'm very sorry that you lost your original flag, but so glad that you got this (new one)," Bradfield said. "I'm proud of this wing because there's a lot of great citizen air commandos that see things like that and reach out. I'm glad we can help."

meeting he did attend.

Taylor was fired exactly a month later on June 8.

Cadle also details in his report "another situation in which taxpayer funds were abused."

Dawson, while a trainee/student at the Northwest Florida police academy, received more than \$1,400 in compensation from the Crestview Police Department for tuition and fees and another \$554 for her student uniforms. Neither expense had been budgeted for or approved by the city, Cadle said in his report.

Also, while attending the academy, Dawson was allowed to work as a dispatcher, a task for which other trainees would be paid as a dispatcher. Dawson, however, received the pay of a fully certified police officer, Cadle reported.

"These accommodations have never been offered another student before or since," the report said.

Dawson received another perk no other uncertified officer received, Cadle reported. She was allowed to park a patrol car at the apartment complex where she lived and obtain reduced rent for doing so.

"It is evident that an atmosphere of misconduct without consequences as well as favoritism by some officers has been allowed to flourish at the Crestview Police Department, Cadle said in closing his report. "This is reflective of a failure of diligent oversight and responsive leadership which has led me to dismiss Tony Taylor as Chief of Police of the City of Crestview."



North Okaloosa Medical Center had about four tables based on topics such as women's health, physicals and a table where employees shared the benefits of handwashing.



North Okaloosa doctors promote dehydration awareness

North Okaloosa Physician Group is making people aware of how student athletes can avoid dehydration during hot weather. Even mild dehydration can affect your child's athletic performance and make him or her lethargic and irritable. Left untreated, dehydration increases the risk of other heat-related illnesses, including heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heatstroke.

Encourage your child to pay attention to early signs and symptoms of dehydration, including:

- Dry or sticky mouth
- Thirst
- Headache
- Dizziness
- Cramps
- Excessive fatigue
- Disinterest in the game
- Inability to run as fast or play as well as usual

Remind your child that he or she should report signs and symptoms to the coach right away. Don't let embarrassment keep your child on the field.

If dehydration is detected early, fluids and rest might be all that's needed. If your child seems confused or loses consciousness, seek

emergency care.

Prevention is key. If your child plays sports in hot weather, encourage him or her to drink plenty of fluids before, during and after practices and games. Teach your child the signs and symptoms of dehydration, as well as the importance of speaking up if they occur.

Involve your child's coach, too. Talk to the coach about adjusting the intensity of practice depending on the temperature and humidity on the field - and support the coach's decision to cancel games and practices when it's dangerously hot outside.




CRESTVIEW — The Crestview High School Cheerleaders attended Cheer Camp 2018 at Auburn University in Auburn, Alabama.



Blackbeard's life

Historians don't know a lot about Blackbeard. His real name was Edward Thatch, and he was probably born in England around 1680. He went to the Bahamas in 1713 and started working with Benjamin Hornigold, a Jamaican privateer, or sailor on an armed ship. Hornigold put Thatch in charge of his own pirate ship in 1716.

Blackbeard had a frightening appearance: He was tall and thin and wore long hair and a long, dark beard. During battles, he wrapped slow-burning coils in his beard, which made smoke and fire swirl around his head.

But while he was scary-looking, some historians believe he never killed anyone until his final battle.

In fact, many people in Britain and the Colonies thought of Blackbeard as a Robin Hood-like hero, fighting against cruel and harsh rulers.



Early outlaws

During the 1700s, pirates were the outlaws of the sea. They chased down and took over merchant ships carrying goods back and forth over the Atlantic Ocean or up and down the Atlantic coast. Then they sold the "booty."

Blackbeard's group of pirates made their base in the Bahamas and were active only about seven years, from 1713 to 1720.

Terrorizing the seas

In October 1717, on a ship called *Revenge*, Blackbeard and his crew attacked other ships in Chesapeake Bay, Philadelphia and New York Harbor. As they were sailing in the eastern Caribbean, they captured a French slave ship with 516 slaves chained below deck.

Blackbeard renamed the ship *Queen Anne's Revenge* and kept a small number of slaves to work as its crew.

Blackbeard's last battle

Blackbeard and many of his men settled in North Carolina near Bath and Ocracoke, where they could easily launch their ships and return with their loot. The governor there, Charles Eden, let them stay because the thieves provided him with many luxuries, such as sugar and chocolate.

But Virginia's lieutenant governor, Alexander Spotswood, wasn't as welcoming. He sent Royal Navy Lt. Robert Maynard to North Carolina with two ships to defeat Blackbeard.

When the battle began, one of Maynard's ships was ambushed by Blackbeard's men. But aboard the second ship, Maynard's men hid below the deck, and when the pirates boarded the ship, they attacked.

Blackbeard was killed by Maynard on Nov. 22, 1718. The sailors cut off his head and strung it up on their ship, and they tossed his body into the sea.

Queen Anne's Revenge

In November 1996, a search team found cannons and anchors on the ocean floor near Beaufort Inlet in North Carolina. Other items they found led the discovery team to believe that the ship was the *Queen Anne's Revenge*.

In 2004, the site was added to the National Register of Historic Places, and a number of other items have been recovered since then.



In the past 200 years, the ocean has become much more acidic. It has absorbed 500 billion tons of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. 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Okaloosa retains tax rate

CRESTVIEW — The Okaloosa County Commission recently gave its unanimous approval to setting the county's tentative fiscal 2019 property tax rate at 3.83 mills.

It's the same as the existing rate and equals \$383 per \$100,000 of taxable property value.

In the new budget year, the rate is projected to generate about \$64.5 million in

property tax revenue. Because of higher property values, that is about \$4 million more than what was collected for the current budget.

The new fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

The county's overall proposed fiscal 2019 budget totals about \$387 million. That's more than \$8.2 million, or about 2.2 percent, higher than the existing budget, County Administrator John Hofstad said at the commission's final budget workshop Monday morning.

In the new fiscal year, the county plans to give a roughly 3 percent pay raise to all county employees, including the 579 general fund employees, as well as Sheriff's Office employees with the ranks of sergeant and below.

Hofstad told commissioners that the staff also has budgeted slight funding increases for various non-profit groups, including Elder Services of Okaloosa County.

The commission set the tentative fiscal 2019 millage rate at a special meeting on

Monday afternoon.

At that meeting, Commissioner Carolyn Ketchel wondered what good is it for the county to have the lowest or one of the lowest millage rates in Florida if it cannot maintain its roads.

She then voiced support for the county's 10-year local option half-cent sales tax referendum, and indicated that the millage rate might be increased if the referendum fails.

If approved by a simple majority of voters in the

Nov. 6 general election, the tax would take effect Jan. 1, 2019. It is expected to generate an estimated \$17 million annually.

Much of the potential sales tax revenue would help pay for infrastructure projects such as road and stormwater work in the unincorporated area and local municipalities.

The commission's two public budget hearings, which are needed in order to formally adopt next year's millage rate and budget, are set for Sept. 4 and 18.

CRESTVIEW — A nationally known nonprofit organization is rallying people across the country to donate money for Crestview Police Department's K9 Officer Kody to receive a ballistic vest.

James Hatch, a retired Navy Seal, founded Spikes K9 Fund. Hatch was critically wounded during his last deployment but credits his survival to K9 Spike, who was killed in Iraq in 2006.

The organization raises money for K9s specific needs like protective equipment, GPS trackers, and medical coverage for K9's who have retired.

K9 Kody, who often answers to Freddy, received a place on the fundraiser list after Jenn Parks, the Florida representative for Spikes K9 fund, reached out to the Crestview Police Department.

Hatch said that before the K9 makes the list, the handler must go through a verification process and prove the K9's need for the vest.

Before Kody was placed on the list, Nate Marlar, Kody's handler, had to take his measurements and choose the color for the vest.

Marlar said he chose a "coyote brown" ballistic vest for his canine partner. He has been with the police department for three years and Kody for eight months.

CRESTVIEW — The lights are on, and the building is nearly completed. But, the Popeye's in Crestview isn't ready to open quite yet.

Florida Department of Transportation required that the The Popeye's in Crestview have an access to State Road 85.

According to FDOT Public Information Specialist Tanya Branton, a permit has been issued to Popeye's for access to State Road 85.

"It's kind of a difficult site there," Crestview Growth Management Director Teresa Gaillard said. "But, they have been working back and forth with the FDOT trying to get something that the FDOT would work with."

The Popeye's site has a gravel entry-way leading to 85, but the entry-way will need approval from the FDOT. Joe Mann Sr., the construction manager from Vertical Construction Management, said they will be meeting with the FDOT on Monday to go over their current plan.

The site is expected to be ready within 30 days, but it could take up to 60 days for the restaurant to open depending on when Popeye's receives approval.

"With DOT, it's always a wild card. They work at their pace. I think it's a minimum of 30 to 60 days," Mann Sr. said.

The opening of Popeye's was delayed past the original date of July 24.

Mann said there were multiple factors in play.

One of them was the previous general contractor, who was fired over issues like poor performance, quality of work, and occasionally, not paying the subcontractors, Mann said.

CRESTVIEW — It was a rainy, dreary Wednesday outside the Crestview Police Department, but it was anything but inside Warriors Hall because it was time for K9 and SWAT day at the youth academy.

Officer Wanda Hulion took role call as kids from the community waited for Officer Josh Ellrick and K9 Officer Hero.

This marks the third year for the Crestview Police Department's Youth Academy, a program for youth 7 to 15 years old to learn from officers about law enforcement.

"We want the kids to know we're people just like they are," Hulion said. "This is our job. You have a lot of kids saying they want to know what a police officer does because they want to be a police officer when they grow up, so, that's our main goal."

Ellrick began his lesson by describing Hero's intense smelling abilities. He said Hero can smell up to four individual toppings on a pizza at one time.

Hero was there to demonstrate that instinctive smelling ability by sniffing out the marijuana and methamphetamine Ellrick had Officer Javonna Peak hide near the front door.

After Ellrick brought Hero out, the kids watched as the K9 sniffed around the room until he sat with his tail pointed upward signaling he had found the drugs.

Cheering and laughter rang through the hall after Hero received payment for doing his job in the form of a plastic stick.

Many of the kids raised their hand throughout Ellrick's lesson with questions. One of the children mentioned he saw on a television show someone use oils to disguise drugs from a K9.

"I'm glad you bring that up... You guys can't smell it. I can't smell it," Ellrick said. "However, because Hero's sense of smell is so strong, no matter what you do to disguise the odor of a narcotic, Hero will be able to find it because that's his designed purpose."

"Sneaking in some educational points without them knowing...because in our area with it being high military, most of the time kids have guns at home," Kimmons said. "Plus, it's still southern territory. There's a lot of people (whose) parents hunt."
