Governor says he's still contemplating Mary Beth Jackson's fate

CRESTVIEW – Gov. Rick Scott didn't completely rule out Monday that he might yet formulate some sort of reprimand for Okaloosa County School Superintendent Mary Beth Jackson.

He acknowledged receiving correspondence from county residents asking for Jackson to be removed from office in the wake of a scandal that has resulted in child abuse-related arrests of four employees, including her deputy superintendent of human resources.

"We're going through it. We want to make sure we get all of the right information," Scott said.

Scott also would have access to two grand jury reports following investigations into the school district's operations, policies and procedures. Both questioned Jackson's ability to lead a controversy-ridden district.


The grand jury recommended the Florida Department of Education review Jackson's behavior, lack of leadership, and failure to fulfill her obligations as superintendent and take appropriate action. As governor, Scott is the only person with the authority to remove an elected school superintendent from office.

Okaloosa County's troubled school district obviously wasn't a high priority for Scott on Monday. Politicking for a U.S. Senate seat, the Republican visited the Hub City Smokehouse and Grill to energize supporters from the area of the state he always acknowledges as crucial to both of his successful gubernatorial campaigns.

"I won my two races because of the Panhandle," he told a cheering group of local dignitaries and diners.

Scott was keen to announce that Florida's crime rate is at a 47-year low and that unemployment had dropped in his two-term tenure as governor from 8 percent to 3 percent. The governor also promised to fight in the Senate for federal term limits and criticized his incumbent opponent, Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson, by claiming Nelson had voted more than 300 times to raise taxes.

He spoke of cutting Florida's taxes and reducing the state's debt. When asked about Jackson, he slipped smoothly into a discussion of the importance of taking care of kids and the steps he's made as governor to improve K-12 education.

U.S. Rep. Matt Gaetz and state Rep. Mel Ponder attended Scott's appearance, as did Okaloosa County commissioners Graham Fountain and Carolyn Ketchel. Crestview Mayor David Cadle was also present.

Restaurant owner Mike Carroll was given a brief moment to greet the assemblage and commented that with "so many important people" in the room he felt better thanking his hard-working staff than trying to name all the dignitaries.

"I think it's great, I wish I had a bigger place," Carroll said as he watched his diner fill before the governor arrived. "This is a pretty good turnout for a small place."

Scott didn't stay for lunch. His staff said the candidate, who claimed to have visited 60 Florida counties during this campaign, was on a tight schedule.

The only reporter seeking to ask questions was granted just one.

'Warning' sign found at Baker School

BAKER – The night before the first day of school, a sign was placed on the roof of Baker School.

The large white sign with black lettering read, "WARNING: Exposure To Sexism, Raceism, White Privilage, & CHRISTIANITY."

Okaloosa County School Superintendent Mary Beth Jackson said Baker

Principal Mike Martello discovered the sign, misspellings and all, at 6:30 a.m. Monday and removed it prior to students arriving.

She said law enforcement is analyzing footage from surveillance video.

"I sincerely hope we can locate the individual responsible for the sign," Jackson said via text message.

Martello declined to comment and directed


and Oleatha Edenfield. Twelve grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren brought her much joy and enriched her life immensely.

Hicks earns provost's list honors

Amber Hicks of Crestview achieved provost's list status at Troy University for the summer semester of the 2017/2018 academic year.

The Provost's List honors full-time undergraduate students who are registered for at least 12 semester hours and who have a grade point average of at least 3.65.

College attains funding goal in strategic plan

Northwest Florida State College advanced to the silver category in the Florida College System's Performance-Based Funding Model.

"For the first time since the inception of the Performance-Based Funding Model in the Florida College System, NWF State has been designated to the

silver category," NWFSC President Dr. Devin Stephenson said. "This is a significant move upward for the college and the attainment of one of the significant goals in our College's 2017-2020 Strategic Plan."

The college has ranked no higher than bronze since the Florida College System first adopted the Performance-Based

Funding Model in 2013. Colleges in the bronze or purple categories do not receive additional state-allocated performance dollars. Measurements in the Performance-Based Funding model include retention, completion, job placement/continuing education, and entry-level wages.

"Since 2013, we have lost approximately \$1.3

million in "new" funding that we would have received had we been in the silver or gold categories instead of bronze. By advancing to the silver category this year, we will receive approximately \$480K in additional funding" NWFSC Vice President of Administrative Services/Chief Financial Officer Randy White said.

School board candidates address issues ahead of Aug. 28 election

FORT WALTON BEACH — Ahead of the Aug. 28 primary election, the seven candidates for Okaloosa County School Board are focused on the various challenges they will face if elected.

While three of the five districts (1, 3 and 5) are on the ballot, only one incumbent — District 1's Dr. Lamar White — is running for reelection.

Candidates said infrastructure and funding are priorities, but there is another issue that they consider crucial: improving public perception of the board.

"I think helping to restore trust from the voters and the citizens in the process of what the board does with the district coming after the last year is the most important thing," said Linda Evanchyk, who is running for a District 3 seat. "To let the people know that the board has put into place some measure to make sure that we don't have anymore surprises in what's going on."

Evanchyk said when talking to constituents, she gets the sense that the public doesn't trust the board and the district to make the right decisions right now. And she's not the only one.

"When I walk around neighborhoods and when I talk to people ... there's one overriding concern that our people have," said Bran McAllister, running in District 5. "They feel as though there's been somewhat of a decline in their confidence in the leadership of the school system."

District 3 candidate Alby Clendennin has had the same experience. Being a recent graduate from an Okaloosa County high school, Clendennin says he understands the negative perception people both within and outside the school system



they're calling 'hardening of schools,'" Kelley said, referencing the Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act, part of Senate Bill 7026. "That has given us some funding which will help us take care of some of our safety needs ... but we'll still need to incur some of those costs."

Kelley says part of acquiring more funding for safety is restoring public trust so the district can be reconsidered to be part of the sales tax initiative.

The responsibility of the school board is to develop and adopt policy based upon the recommendation of the superintendent. The board is responsible for approval and adoption of an annual budget that provides the basis for the buildings, furnishings, staff, materials and equipment needed to carry out all educational programs, according to the district's website.

With aging infrastructure and the growth of the student population in recent years, handling district funds in an efficient manner is at the top of many candidates list of priorities.

Last year, the school system added 1,000 more students. This year, another enrollment increase is expected. The district already has more than 100 portable classrooms dispersed throughout the school district, with some schools having 13 or more portables, according to District 1 incumbent

White.

"Our facilities are antiquated," White said. "Funding is required to create the additional classrooms that additional students need. And more students impact our student transportation services in terms of additional school bus routes, additional school buses and additional school bus drivers. There are other issues, but in my mind ... funding and associated costs from student growth looms as the largest issue."

Lacking infrastructure is a concern Slusser also plans to address if elected.

"Our infrastructure is a mess. We have so many old schools and schools in disrepair," Slusser said. "It's not that the staff isn't doing a good job, you can only do what you can do with what you have. We have been so short on funds."

Evanchyk says the school board will always face these kinds of issues, but it's important to look at the big picture and anticipate any future problems that may occur.

"Instead of just reacting to situations brought in front of the board, I would like to be — as much as I can within the law — more proactive," Evanchyk said. "To anticipate some upcoming situations so that we can be a little more prepared to act upon them instead of just reacting to what has to happen."

District 1 candidate Willie Harmon did not respond to calls or emails in time for this writing.

FWC receives 'BearWise' applications for funding

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission will provide up to \$500,000 in BearWise funding to local governments to help reduce human-bear conflicts. The funding helps offset some of the costs for residents and businesses to acquire bear-resistant trash cans and dumpsters. Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton are among the eight counties and two cities that have applied for funds. Their requests total \$935,181.

Gov. Rick Scott and the Florida Legislature approved the \$500,000 for the BearWise grants under the condition that 60 percent of the funding goes to communities with BearWise ordinances that require residents and businesses to keep their trash secure until the morning of garbage pickup.

Applicants with BearWise ordinances include Lake, Orange, Santa Rosa and Seminole counties. The city of Apopka is currently in the final stages of consideration for their ordinance, and if approved, would be the second city in Florida to have passed a BearWise ordinance. The first was Fort Walton Beach.

Last year, the FWC distributed over \$500,000 in BearWise funding to seven counties and two homeowner's associations. The funds paid for almost 3,000 bear-resistant trash cans, 3,800 sets of hardware to secure regular trash cans, and to modify 54 dumpsters to keep bears out. A total of 66 percent of last year's funding was provided to communities with BearWise ordinances.

Bill includes provision for veterans, assisted living

The U.S. Senate recently approved a \$716 billion annual defense spending bill for the next fiscal year. The legislation, which now heads to the president's desk to be signed in law, includes several items affecting the military and veterans.

Some of the bill's provisions, which Senator Bill Nelson sponsored, do the following:

- Allow disabled veterans with a permanent disability rating of 100 percent to travel on military aircraft when there are available seats.

- authorize the U.S. Air Force to transfer land necessary to build a new assisted and independent-living care facility for veterans and wounded warriors near Eglin Air Force Base.

- Authorized the Department of Defense to provide grants to state and local governments to help make infrastructure improvements around military installations. Nelson's provision will allow the Department of Defense to help pay for roads, schools, hospitals, utility infrastructure and other community support infrastructure around them.

- streamline launch approval process at Cape Canaveral, making it easier for commercial space companies to launch from there. It eliminates overlapping Air Force and Federal Aviation Administration approval processes for commercial space companies.

- use \$106.8 million to improve and modernize the military's testing and training ranges, including the testing and training range in the Eastern Gulf of Mexico. Increasing the military's investment in the range will help defend against future attempts to allow off-shore drilling there.

- Require a report to better manage public access to Naval Air Station Pensacola, which will help in increasing tourism while protecting our servicemen and women at the same time.

Food as medicine: Doctor's office provides fresh produce

When Esther Caicedo visited her doctor's office Friday, she left not with a prescription but with acorn squash, mangoes, tomatoes, tuna and several other items to feed herself and her family.

With the help of Ohio University medical student Max Farenwald, she had filled four grocery bags from large coolers and a pantry in a meeting room at OhioHealth Riverside Family Practice on the Northwest Side in Columbus, Ohio.

"Would you like some

broccoli this week?" Farenwald asked before placing two heads in a bag. "How about some cauliflower?"

The 34-year-old Caicedo is one of about 50 patients enrolled in the practice's Food is Health program, a new initiative to arm diabetes patients with nutrition education and healthy foods, all right in the doctor's office.

Since April, the practice's diabetic patients have been asked a number of questions to screen for food insecurity — unreliable access to affordable, nutritious food.

Those screening positive are asked if they would like

to take part in the Food is Health program, through which they visit the practice every week or two for free produce and canned goods.

The food budget for the program, which is free to patients, comes to about \$6 per person per week, with each family member counted separately, said Dr. Laurie Hommema, who directs a program that trains new doctors — residents — who help staff the initiative. She expects food costs to be about \$30,000 to \$40,000 a year, with items purchased from a number of vendors, including the Mid-Ohio

Foodbank. Costs are built into the practice's budget, with some support from OhioHealth Riverside Methodist Hospital.

The initiative was sparked by Brian Jepson, the hospital's president, who also sits on the Mid-Ohio Foodbank board.

Matt Habash, Mid-Ohio's president and chief executive, said the program fits into a relatively new strategy looking at a "food-as-health" mode, through which 68 percent of the food bank's distributed food is fresh.

Riverside Family Practice is the first to set up a pantry inside a doctor's office, Habash said.

Some other providers have programs through which patients are directed to sites where they can obtain fresh food.

"All of those things are

starting to work really, really well," he said. "And we're getting ready to figure out, 'How do we scale this in a big way?'"

Hommema, who has been at Riverside Family Practice for 10 years, said she had no idea that certain patients had difficulty affording food.

"You're in the room with a patient and you say 'make sure you're eating fruits and vegetables' not realizing they, one, can't afford it, and they, two, can't find it; and, three, sometimes they can't store it, and they don't know what to do with it," she said.

Plans are to track patients' health data, including test results and trips to the emergency department, for the next six months to a year in an effort to determine whether the project

reduces treatment costs.

Patients in the program "shop" for food after a roughly 20-minute appointment with a resident and students from the Ohio University Heritage College of Osteopathic Medicine and Ohio State University College of Medicine. They provide nutrition education, recipes and tips on preparing and storing food.

A community health worker arranges transportation for the client if needed.

Caicedo, who lives on the Northeast Side, was diagnosed about five months ago with diabetes after becoming so sick that she spent five days at Riverside Methodist Hospital. Caicedo's doctor prescribed her medication and encouraged her to join Food is Health.

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Help prevent fatal deer disease

Chronic Wasting Disease, or CWD as it's more commonly called, has most recently been detected in Mississippi. This is the closest the fatal deer disease has been to our Florida border.

"We're fortunate that CWD has not been found in Florida or our immediate neighboring states, but it's going to take the help of hunters to keep it that way," Cory Morea, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's Deer Management Program coordinator, said. "Anyone planning to hunt deer, moose or elk out of state needs to be aware of certain laws and regulations aimed at preventing

CWD from coming into our state."

CWD is a transmissible disease caused by an abnormal protein called a prion. It affects the brains of infected, eventually causing them to become emaciated, display unusual behavior and die.

"While there's no evidence that CWD can be transmitted to humans or livestock, the impacts of this disease can have a significant negative impact on deer populations and our traditional hunting activities," Morea said.

Transmission occurs by direct contact with infected deer or by consuming prions

that have been deposited into the environment. Once present, prion stays in the soil and can remain infectious for years.

To date, CWD has been found in mule deer, white-tailed deer, moose and elk in these 25 states: Arkansas, Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming. It also has been detected in Canada (Saskatchewan and Alberta), Norway, Finland and in South Korea.

Rules for out-of-state hunting

Hunters are prohibited from bringing into Florida whole carcasses of any cervid from any of the above listed CWD-positive states or countries. From these areas, hunters can only bring back deboned meat, finished taxidermy mounts, cleaned skulls, antlers and hides – as long as all soft tissue (meat) has been removed.

The importation of live deer into Florida is also prohibited. The public is encouraged to report any possible violations to the FWC by calling the Wildlife Alert Hotline, toll-free, 888-404-FWCC (3922).

How to help

Another way to help is by reporting deer that are sick or found dead from unknown causes to FWC's toll-free hotline, 866-293-9282. Warning signs that hunters can look out for while in the field include deer that are extremely thin or appear sick, or those exhibiting odd behavior such as staggering, walking in circles, standing with a wide stance or head tremors. Do not handle the deer. The FWC will collect the whole carcass and conduct an examination.

Time to choose your source of light

Earlier this summer, the Trump administration broke a promise regarding a path to citizenship for thousands of foreign-born men and women who have committed their lives to serving and protecting us through the military.

The administration said the decision to discharge some foreign-born, active-duty military personnel was a matter of national security because their personal information could not be confirmed easily.

Immigrants have been recruited to serve in America's military since 1775, because they are needed. According to a Heritage Foundation report published in February, three-fourths of Americans age 17 to 24 are ineligible to serve due to problems ranging from obesity to having a criminal record to being under-educated to being unable to pass a drug test.

As a result, the Pentagon is unlikely to reach its recruitment goal of 80,000 for 2018.

In the midst of ordering these discharges, the commander in chief, a beneficiary of five draft deferments, also found time to antagonize Americans who could have dodged their obligation but who didn't.

It takes a special, immeasurable kind of gall to punish people who want to serve while

also disparaging those who did.

American heroism

At the outbreak of World War II, 20-year-old George H.W. Bush postponed college to join the Navy, where he became one of the youngest bomber pilots to serve.

On Sept. 2, 1944, the Japanese shot down Bush's plane. He was the only one of nine Navy airmen who avoided capture. The others not only were beheaded, but parts of their bodies were eaten.

During his presidential inaugural address 45 years later, Bush described his ideal America as a place of "1,000 points of light," a country in which citizens and organizations engage in volunteerism and community service, which he described as "duty, sacrifice, commitment and a patriotism that finds its expression in taking part and pitching in."

Yet, this phrase recently was made fun of by the current president, a person who had no record of public service until 2016, and who also uses Sen. John McCain's name to gin up boos from people who are demanding more civility.

McCain, a Navy pilot like Bush, was shot down in Vietnam, where he suffered five years of disfigurement and torture as a prisoner of war.

Some of the same people who once lauded McCain for his service now contend he was no American hero. Neither, they say, is former Marine Capt. Robert Mueller III, who earned a Bronze Star with

Valor, a Purple Heart, two Navy Commendation Medals and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry before he went on to serve as director of the FBI.

How did we get to this place, where serving one's country becomes a means by which to be insulted?

How did we come to be this particular America?

Then there's Charlottesville

We recently passed the one-year anniversary of Charlottesville, no longer just a city, but a byword for the kind of barefaced hatred that no longer feels the need to stay cloaked.

The shameful spectacle of torch-wielding neo-Nazis and other various and sundry terrorists openly marching through an American city reminds us there are all kinds of light.

Light enlightens us. It also exposes us.

It can illuminate and heal, but also burn and destroy.

It can show us the path on which we will find honor and character or it can blind us to the truth.

Because America is one of the few flickering points of light in the world, if we are not vigilant, if we lose sight of that light, if we forget what happens when people give up even a crumb of freedom to sate the monsters of despotism, we'll soon find ourselves staggering in darkness.

Which shall we choose?

Are you interested in Florida history, Crestview history, or genealogy? Please allow me to acquaint you with a fantastic resource you may not be aware of that is right at your fingertips.



The Florida Memory project was created and is maintained by the State Library and Archives of Florida.

The newsletter contains the history of the camp and a roll of its participants. Confederate pension application files and Spanish land grants — including maps, voter registration rolls and World War I service cards — are just some of the genealogical treasures available to peruse. One can also browse numerous videos, audios and photos.




This 1942 newsletter is among items accessible in Florida archives. [SPECIAL TO THE NEWS BULLETIN]

Too few Americans being screened for cancer

How Can You Help Your Kids Pay For College?

It's still summer, but we're getting close to a new school year. One day, though, “back-to-school” will mean “off to college” for your children. Will you be financially prepared to help your kids cope with the costs of higher education?

Your first step, of course, is to know what you're up against, so here are some numbers: For the 2017-18 academic year, college costs (tuition, fees, room and board) were, on average, nearly \$21,000 for in-state students at four-year, public schools and nearly \$47,000 for students attending private colleges or universities, according to the College Board. And you can probably expect even bigger pricetags in the years to come.

To help prepare for these costs, you might want to consider putting your money in a vehicle specifically designed to help build assets for college, such as a 529 education savings plan. All withdrawals from 529 plans are free from federal income taxes as long as the beneficiary you've named uses the money for qualified college, trade school or graduate school expenses. Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified education expenditures may be subject to federal, state and penalty taxes on the earnings portion of your plan. (However, tax issues for 529 savings plans can be complex, so please consult your tax advisor before investing.)

You can generally invest in the 529 savings plan offered by any state, but if you invest in your own state's plan, you may be able to claim a tax deduction or receive a tax credit.

By starting your 529 plan early, when your children are just a few years old, the investments within the plan have more time for potential growth. Plus, you can make smaller contributions each year, rather than come up with big lump sums later on.

A 529 plan is not the only education savings tool you can use, but it has proven effective for many people. Yet you may also want to consider ways to keep college costs down in the first place.

For one thing, your children may be eligible for various forms of financial aid. Some types of aid depend on your family's income, but others, such as merit-based scholarships, are open to everyone. But you don't have to wait until you get an offer from a school's financial aid office — you can explore some opportunities on your own. For example, many local and national civic and religious groups offer scholarships to promising young people, and your own employer may even provide some types of grants or assistance. Plus, your state also may offer other benefits, such as financial aid or scholarship funds. It can certainly take some digging to find these funding sources, but the effort can be worthwhile.

Here's another option for reducing college costs: Consider sending your child to a local community college for two years to get many of the “general” requirements out of the way before transferring to a four-year school for a bachelor's degree. "I used to own the biggest alligator north of

questions to the district.

Baker School was the topic of several local news articles last school year after a race discrimination lawsuit was filed by the parents of two black Baker School students.

On March 17, the Okaloosa County School District agreed to pay \$500,000 to parents Tyrone and Lakisha Adams, settling a race discrimination lawsuit the Adams' attorney called "unprecedented."

The School Board voted 5-1 in a closed meeting to approve the settlement recommended by its insurance carrier. Insurance covered \$475,000 and the School District paid \$25,000, board

attorney Jeff McInnis confirmed.

The Adams' legal complaint, filed in U.S. District Court in Pensacola, not only accused about 40 students and teachers at Baker School of harassing their boys with taunts, threats and physical abuse, it further claimed the School District took no meaningful action.

Chief District Judge M. Casey Rodgers ruled prior to the settlement that the case could be taken to trial and that attorney Fred Flowers of Tallahassee could argue the School District had failed to protect the two boys, an eighth-grader and a 10th-grader at the time of the alleged harassment.

It's unclear, however, whether the Monday morning incident was related to the Baker discrimination lawsuit.

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Scam avoidance tips from Gulf Power

FORT WALTON BEACH — Gulf Power is reporting an increase in scams involving its customers. Since Jan. 1, the company's Customer Care Center has received over 400 reports of this criminal activity.

Scammers target Gulf Power's residential and business customers and are known to attempt a variety of scams, including posing as a Gulf Power employee contacting customers door-to-door, over the phone and online. Scammers often threaten disconnection unless immediate payment is made via phone or in person.

The company offered the tips below for its customers.

Spot a scam

Gulf Power will not show up to a customer's home or business to collect on a payment. If an account becomes past due and is subject to disconnection, Gulf Power will contact the customer via a prerecorded message to the primary account telephone and by letter requesting that the customer call Gulf Power to discuss the account.

Gulf Power will never ask for any form of payment over the phone or through email.

Customers have reported that scammers will call, usually in a very aggressive tone, requesting for payment through a credit card, pre-paid debit card or gift card. Hang up, delete the email and contact the company's customer service line at 1-800-225-5797 to report it.

If a Gulf Power employee has a service-related reason to visit a home or business, customers will in most cases receive notice of the visit beforehand and the employee will always be wearing a Gulf Power employee ID badge with their photo, company's name and logo.

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



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Pay attention to fertilizer analysis percentages when preparing lawns for winter, especially when it comes to the amounts of potassium and nitrogen. [SPECIAL TO THE NEWS BULLETIN]

3 tips to prepare lawns for winter

While suffering through the dog days of summer, we need to begin preparing our lawns for the winter.

Lawn winterizing products will soon be in local stores. Unfortunately, many products marketed as “winterizers” contain a high percentage of nitrogen fertilizer.

If nitrogen is applied in the fall, it should be done at least eight weeks before the average first frost date, which is typically the first week in November here in Northwest Florida. This allows time for the turfgrass to go dormant before cold weather can cause injury.

When applied too late, nitrogen fertilizer will promote shoot growth at a time when the grass metabolism is slowing. This results in a depletion of carbohydrates and stress on the plant. The

new growth has a low cold tolerance and is often killed. Additionally, the nitrogen is available to the developing cool-season weeds and may increase the incidence of large patch disease.

The fertilizer analysis gives the percentage of available nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P), and potassium (K) in the product.

Potassium plays the key role in winterizing because it has been shown to enhance cold tolerance of turfgrasses. If selecting a winterizer fertilizer containing nitrogen, be sure that the nitrogen content is low compared to the potassium.

Potassium is integral to many growth processes in plants, including: photosynthesis, starch and protein production, enzyme reactions, water movement, protein synthesis, cell wall components, and fruit development. Sandy soils tend to be more deficient in potassium, because it is leached easily. Soils with a low pH (acidic soils) may contain enough potassium, but it is not available to plants. Having a soil test performed is the best way to determine

the need for potassium. Kits are available at the University of Florida Extension offices.

Besides applying potassium, there are cultural practices that help warm-season turfgrasses maintain optimum health through the winter.

•First, increase sunlight to the turf. As deciduous trees defoliate, keep the fallen leaves off the lawn. The turf that has been growing in shade has experienced reduced photosynthesis and, therefore, less carbohydrate production. Carbohydrates are needed for increased cold tolerance.

•Second, loosen compacted soils through spike aeration. However, core or plug aeration should not be done until after spring greenup.

•Finally, raise the mowing height in late summer. Not only will this promote deeper rooting, but will leave more leaf tissue for photosynthesizing and shading out weed seed.

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
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

Busy offseason

NICEVILLE — Rece Hinds gazed around the locker room enamored. How could he not be?

Off in one corner was Bryce Harper, the 2015 National League MVP. In another was Yadier Molina, a two-time World Series Champion.


Then there was Rhys Hoskins, the fastest player in Phillies' history to reach 30 career home runs. There was Alex Bregman, the second pick in the 2015 MLB Draft. There was Francisco Lindor, already a three-time all star at only 24 years old.

And in the middle of all these MLB stars was Niceville slugger Rece Hinds, the Daily News Large Schools Hitter of the Year.

"Getting to be able to hang out with all those MLB players and just like relaxing with them in the locker room is crazy," Hinds said.

That was back in July. Hinds was at Nationals Park in Washington D.C., competing in the 2018 High School Home Run Derby, the same event he was forced to miss between his sophomore and junior seasons after suffering an ankle injury.

It was the highlight of a summer that included a second straight trip to Under Armour All-American Game where Hinds won the event's home run derby, tryouts for Team USA's 18U squad where he made it through cutdowns to reach the 40-man roster and the opportunity to play in the Perfect Game National Showcase, which in turn led to his appearance at the Perfect Game All-American Game in August.




Rece Hinds celebrates after the Eagles scored in a game this past season. [MICHAEL SNYDER/DAILY NEWS PHOTOS]

"It's been busy," Hinds said with a chuckle.

It's understandable why Hinds, an LSU commit, has been in high demand this summer. He's coming off a dominant junior campaign in which he led the district-champion Eagles in every major offensive category with a .494 batting average, 45 runs, 53 RBI, 13 home runs, 25 extra-base hits, 1.156 slugging percentage and a 1.747 OPS.

He always seemed to shine in the game's biggest moments, senior pitcher Chance Huff said.

"Whenever he stepped up to the plate in a big-time situation, you knew the game could change on one swing," Huff said. "That was always nice to have. In the line I was always like, 'All right, good. We got Rece comin' up soon.' In a close game it was always

like, 'All right, he's about to do something.'"

A Vanderbilt signee, Huff said he pitched against his teammate only once. It was during one of Niceville's first intra-squad scrimmages. He can't remember who won the battle, but he said he wished they had faced each other more often.

"It would have been fun to face him some more," Huff said.

Opposing area pitchers might not feel the same, though they can breathe a sigh of relief going forward; Hinds has elected to transfer to IMG Academy for his senior season.

"I just thought it was the best option for to keep

progressing forward as a baseball player, keep progressing forward as a person and just getting better and getting where I want to be," Hinds said. "I thought that would give me the best opportunity, with the coaching and the facilities, the ability to do what I can do on that campus what I couldn't do where I am now."

Located in Bradenton, Florida, IMG is known as one of the nation's premier baseball programs for preparing student-athletes to play at the next level and beyond. Widely regarded as one 2019's top position prospects, Hinds will likely have to make a decision this coming year about where

his baseball career takes him next.

He said he believes IMG can help him make that decision.

"I haven't really put a lot of thought into it because I know that I still have a lot more work to do to get to that point," Hinds said. "I just want to take it day by day and get better each day until it gets to that time."

Stanton earns Dandy Dozen nod

CRESTVIEW — Jay Stanton is offering up a little bulletin material.

For his Crestview Bulldogs. For Central and South Florida teams. For rival Niceville.

And for area running backs. After all, the Dandy Dozen running back is that confident. In both his talent and his team's.

On St. Augustine, which bounced the Bulldogs two straight years in the playoffs: "We'll get them this year."

On South Florida powerhouses like Armwood, Northwestern, Carol City, Miami Central and the slew of programs that have contributed to a 23-year state-title drought for teams in the Daily News' coverage area: "We're not worried about them."

On Niceville: "We don't like them and we'll beat them again this year. They better get used to losing to us."

On being the best running back in the area, which includes Baker's Junior McLaughlin, Navarre's Dante Wright, Choctaw's Reggie Fain and Niceville's T.J. Pope and Jack White: "Oh, yes sir, I'm the best."

The root of the senior's confidence is an offensive line that returns five starters, including two fellow Dandy Dozen nods. A wide receiving corps that includes the Voisin twins. A defense anchored by safety Marcus Purcell,

linebacker Chris Johns and, again, the Voisin twins.

"We have more chemistry this year because the majority of us have played together since we were 5," Stanton said.

Standing 5-foot-10, 195 pounds, Stanton is everything you'd want in a back.

He's explosive between

the tackles with breakaway speed. He sees the field well. He's strong.

"Jay's a playmaker," said Tim Hatten, Crestview's head coach.

Last year Stanton broke out for 1,086 rushing yards and scored 15 times. In eight of those nine starts he topped 100 all-purpose yards. In five

of those starts he had multiple touchdowns.

That included 120 yards and two scores against Niceville, 188 yards and a pair of touchdowns against Milton, two scores against Choctaw and 136 yards and a touchdown against Fort Walton Beach.

In the playoffs alone he rushed for 383 yards and five touchdowns and caught six passes for 141 yards and two scores over just three games.

This year Stanton expects to build on last year's breakout.

"I just want to break my last year's rushing record and touchdowns. Somewhere up there around 1,500 or 2,000 yards sounds about right," he said.

A big part of that will fall on his experienced O-line, a collection of guys who stand between 6-2 and 6-5 and 270 and 315 pounds.

"I have a lot of faith in them that they'll make the hole for me," Stanton said. "Everybody worried about the Voisins, so that opens it up for me."

How Stanton goes, the offense goes.

"We're finna break out this year," he said.

Getting Along at Home

Mini Fact:

Your brother or sister may be your best friend when you're grown-ups.

As the new school year approaches, kids and teachers start thinking about how to get along with others. One of the best places to start is at home, with your **siblings**, or brothers and sisters.

The Mini Page checked in with Dr. William T. Garrison for some ideas about getting along better with sisters and brothers.

Sibling rivalry

"Rivalry" means competition," Dr. Garrison says. "Competition between brothers and sisters is normal. It shows up as jealousy and in other ways.

"If your brother or sister has something that he or she does really well, the chances are that there is something that you are good at, too. Remember that everyone is different."

Parents' attention

"Every child wants as much attention from their parents as they can get," Dr. Garrison explains. "You have to learn to share this attention. Older siblings can help parents by paying attention to their younger brothers and sisters, too."

Younger siblings

"Younger kids often look up to their older brothers and sisters. They want to be like them. If older kids will keep this in mind, then

being 'bugged and bothered' by their younger brothers and sisters might not be so annoying."

Older siblings

"Older brothers and sisters come in handy," Dr. Garrison reminds kids. "They can teach you how to understand what is going on in the world around you. If you have some questions you don't want to ask your parents, they can be very helpful."

Fights

Dr. Garrison notes: "While you might fight at home, older brothers and sisters can be very protective when they're away from home. If you are going to fight — and brothers and sisters do — remember, no hitting or punching. Learning to argue, discuss and settle things is an important part of growing up."

Stepbrothers and -sisters

Have you had to adjust to new step-siblings? "Parents sometimes get remarried, and suddenly you have new brothers and sisters," Dr. Garrison explains. "Getting along can at first be difficult.

"It takes time to begin to feel like a real family. The most important thing is to learn to respect one another."

Talk it through

If you're having trouble getting along with siblings, it might be helpful to calmly talk about the things that bug you and things you like.

Here's a chart to get you started. Make a copy for each sibling, then talk about the things you marked. Add your own items.

I like it when my brother or sister ...

- helps me figure out what to do when I need help.
- thinks of something to do when I'm bored.
- lets me sleep in his or her room when I'm scared.
- walks to school with me.
- reads to me.



CRESTVIEW – A historic building in downtown Crestview is being converted into a new, multi-functional facility with office and retail space.

Demolition on parts of the new Courthouse Suites, which was previously Seaside Engineering and Surveying Inc., has already taken place.

CRESTVIEW – The addition of a city manager is in one of the three questions to appear on the primary election ballot. The city of Crestview has approximately \$300,000 allocated in next year's budget proposal for the tentative city manager's office, according to city officials.

"This would not be just for salary but all aspects of establishing a new position," city clerk Elizabeth Roy said in an email.

The money budgeted for the city manager's office would go back into the general fund if citizens vote against the amendment, council

president J.B. Whitten said.

According to Whitten, the number in the budget proposal is higher than the anticipated costs.

Although this will be an additional cost, Whitten said he thinks it's a good investment for the city because the position could potentially pay for

itself.

"I would never sit here and guarantee somebody that if we pay someone \$100,000 that it will save the city \$100,000. I think it will, but I can't guarantee that," Whitten said.

The city manager would be a full-time position and would receive benefits that part-time employees like the mayor and council members don't receive, Whitten said.

"Typically, a city manager for a city our size is going to cost north of \$100,000, which right now, we don't even pay that for the mayor. We have a part-time council and part-time mayor," he said.

For comparison, Destin and Fort Walton Beach pay their city managers over \$120,000.

Both cities are smaller than Crestview.

Qualifications would also affect the city manager's salary, Whitten said.

"If you hire someone that's got a master's degree and 20 years experience as a city manager in a large city, then you would pay that individual more than someone that just came out of public administration school and no experience," Whitten said.

This charter is the city council's second effort to replace the current mayor-council government with a council-manager government.

Primary election day is Aug. 28. Early voting begins Aug. 18.

"We're trying to make the most of the square footage and bring some nice things to downtown," Barthe' said.

The property will bring a more modern feel to the downtown Crestview area, Barthe' said. The main building will have two floors with a couple conference rooms and about 20 office suites. The retail and office buildings will be adjoined by a shared area.

"It brings various amenities to Crestview," Barthe' said, "and it's an opportunity for some of the things that in Crestview, we would like to see."

Barthe' purchased the historic property in February, he said, after hearing the county considered purchasing the property for courthouse parking.

"It's a historic building, and that would be a tremendous waste to do that. So, I'm glad that I had the opportunity to get the building," Barthe' said.

One issue facing Courthouse Suites is parking. According to Growth Management Director Teresa Gaillard, the city will not require them to have additional parking because they are located in the downtown parking district.

"Part of Cedar Avenue was taken up by the courthouse parking, and the planning department's Teresa Gaillard said we can use space just inside of the courthouse fence," Barthe' said in an email.
