### Firefighters also recognized for decade of service

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CRESTVIEW — Special Olympics USA Games athlete and gold medalist was awarded a "key to the city of Crestview" during the city council's regular meeting Monday night.

Crestview resident Harrison Mauldin competed in July at the 2018 Special Olympics USA Games in Seattle, Washington.

Mauldin explained his medals to the crowd at the city council meeting. He was sporting two gold medals, one bronze medal, and a quartz medal around his neck. He received the gold medals after placing first in the

10,000-meter run and the 4-by-400-meter run.

Mayor David Cadle then asked Mauldin about his experience.

"It was wonderful. To be honest, the weather over there was a bit nicer. It's still nice here," Mauldin said.

After Mauldin spoke about his experience, Cadle then presented Mauldin with the wooden plaque with a large golden key placed at the top. "The key to the city" award is typically given to honor someone of significance to a city.

"You did us proud. The highest award that I can present to you is the key to the city," Cadle said. "The key to the city is presented to Harrison Mauldin ... Congratulations."

Mauldin received a roaring

## Business director leaves for Pensacola

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CRESTVIEW — The only building official and license holder for the Crestview building department left Friday for a job in Pensacola. Jonathan Bilby is the only person in the building department that is licensed to administrate and interpret the Florida Building Code.

"I can't say that his leaving is not going to create a vacuum. He's very valuable ... The question is how quickly can we fill the position with a qualified individual," council president J.B. Whitten said.

The department will be relying on qualified employees of Fort Walton Beach's building department to assume Bilby's responsibilities.

"The building official we're going to rely on is very good at his job. We shouldn't see any slowdowns as far as that goes," Bilby said.

According to the agenda at the Aug. 13 city council meeting, Fort Walton Beach will be using electronic systems to review plans and

will perform inspections via Skype or Facetime.

The agenda says, "The electronic transfer of files is the most efficient and cost-effective ways to accomplish the task."

The city will be required to pay the building official from Fort Walton Beach \$48 per hour and the inspector \$25 per hour.

The inter-local agreement—a contract allowing local government agencies to perform joint operations—between Crestview and Fort Walton Beach passed 4-0 with Councilman Shannon Hayes missing from the council.

Bilby has been with the city since 2012 but decided to leave Crestview after receiving an offer for the Inspection Services Administrator position in Pensacola.

"It comes with a substantial pay increase. It's a chance to manage a larger jurisdiction, and then, I will actually be closer to home because I live in Navarre," Bilby said.

## Former Crestview chamber president arrested

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CRESTVIEW — Former Crestview Area Chamber of Commerce president Valerie Lott was arrested Thursday after turning herself into the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office.

Lott was arrested on a felony count of larceny for allegedly stealing over \$77,000 from the chamber from November 2012 to September 2017, according to an arrest report from the Sheriff's Office.

The arrest report details the many alleged fraudulent transactions Lott made using the chamber's Regions credit cards and checks, and also withdrawing cash from the chamber's bank accounts. The report also states that Lott repaid the Regions bank card by using money from the chamber's bank account in hopes of hiding the thefts.

According to the report,

Lott forged the signatures of chamber members on 17 checks totaling almost \$30,000.

Among the personal purchases made by Lott was a vacation to Disney World for her family that totaled over \$4,000, veterinarian services for her dog and 48 Amazon purchases, according to the arrest report. She also allegedly used the funds to pay household bills, from lawn care to electricity.

Gillis Powell Jr. of Powell, Powell, and Powell has been representing Lott since

September 2017 when she was removed from her position as chamber president.

Powell said Lott has a "severe mental disorder" that was undiagnosed until she was hospitalized for 11 days in 2017.

"The psychiatrist that she is seeing gave a statement that she does not know right from wrong," Powell said. "This was open and obvious that she didn't know what she was doing and the board should have brought it to her attention ... she begged them to look at the books.."

Powell also said Lott is now on medication and has a job that will allow her to start "paying back the funds."

The timing of Lott's departure in 2017 closely coincided with a fire at the chamber headquarters that the State Fire Marshal's Office confirmed was intentionally set. On Aug. 25, 2017, Lott was found placing documents in the kitchen area at the chamber office. Two days later on a Sunday, a fire broke out in the chamber's building.

### LEE EDWARD BOUNDS SR. 1922 - 2018


LtCol Lee Edward Bounds Sr, USAF

30 Year Veteran Serving in WWII, Korea, and Vietnam Wars

LtCol Lee Edward Bounds, USAF, passed away August 8, 2018, in Fort Walton Beach, Florida. He was born in Burkburnett, Texas, to Hollis and Rachel Hubert Bounds on June 17, 1922. He was raised on a farm along with eight aunts and uncles by his grandfather and grandmother, Robert E. Lee and Eula Featherstone Bounds after the death of his Mother.

LtCol Bounds moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma, in 1928 when his father married Olive Kimbrell, and was joined by his sister Naomi and step-sisters, Betty and Barbara. He attended Woodrow Wilson High School and Tulsa University before joining the US Army Air Corps during World War II earning his pilot wings in 1943. Awaiting overseas assignment in 1944-45, he flew the PT-19, B-24, B-26, and glider aircraft. After WWII, he flew F-84s and P-51s with his lifelong friend and brother-in-law, Col. Harry Underwood in the Oklahoma Air National Guard.

LtCol Bounds was recalled to active duty in 1950 and flew combat missions in Korea (F-86) and Vietnam



Wars (O-1 and O-2) earning the Distinguished Flying Cross(2), Bronze Stars (3), Air Medals (11), Meritorious Service Medals (3) and various WWII, Korea, and Vietnam Medals. He flew over 30 types of aircraft, including the F-100, F-4, B-47, B-52, T-33, T-39, and co-piloted helicopters. He was known to say, "You start it, I'll fly it." He flew missions with his son, Lee Jr, during the 1968 Vietnamese Tet Offensive. Both of his sons, Lee and Jim, became Navy helicopter pilots.

After retiring from a successful military career, he joined his wife, Carolyn, in Bounds Village Travels, with offices in Fort Walton Beach and Destin, Florida. He was an avid sportsman who enjoyed skiing, golfing, music, animals, and flying. He was a member of the Order of Daedalians.

He was the linchpin to family gatherings with the Bounds, Wilson,

Underwood, Fletcher, Kimbrell, Jones, and Campbell clans. He was especially close to his Oklahoma nieces and nephews, Mary Jaye, Laura, Steve, and Rachel Underwood, Andrew Kimbrell, Randy Jones, Barbara Wilson, and Mark Hambric.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 56 years, Carolyn Ioecker Bounds, father, mother, and sister, Naomi Underwood. 

Raymond Maurice Demara, a decorated veteran of the Korean War, passed away at his home in Laurel Hill, Florida after a year-long struggle with kidney failure. He was 87.

Mr. Demara was born November 16, 1930 in Providence, Rhode Island to parents George Leo and Germaine Rose Demara.

In 1948, Mr. Demara enlisted in the US Army and served for 22 years, first as an infantryman and later in artillery as a specialist. Sergeant First Class Demara was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action near Nae-dong, Korea on January 7, 1952 as well as the Purple Heart. As an artillery specialist, SFC Demara worked on several of the US Army's new rocket and missile programs including the Redstone and Nike Ajax/Hercules systems. SFC Demara met the love of his life, Lorraine, in 1952 and



they were married at Camp Rucker, Alabama. During this phase of his military career, SFC Demara took duty assignments in nine different States with one additional deployment to Korea in 1965. He retired in 1969 to Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

# Always seek help for caregiver fatigue

CRESTVIEW — Caregiver fatigue is the physical and/or mental exhaustion one can suffer from meeting daily needs of someone who cannot completely care for him or herself, Eden at Crestview Executive Director Alan Woods said. For those taking care of an elderly loved one, Eden can help.

Burnout is suddenly around the corner by the time a caregiver has this problem, Woods said.

Woods said. "There are some caregiver support groups, family and friends that might help and of course Eden at Crestview — we're here to help you."

Eden is an assisted living community, but also offers temporary staying options for those not ready for a permanent move.

Eden offers two types of stays: day stays and respite care.

As the name implies,

day stays allow caregivers to take a day off while the professionals at Eden care for your elderly loved one.

Respite care is for longer stays for when caregivers need weeks at a time. "There are no long-term contracts," Woods said.

Caregivers can become in danger of losing their compassion, Woods said.

"Your compassion drains out of you, becomes merciless,


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## Audio Recordings – Omarosa, President Trump and Billy Graham

#### We don't have to follow suit

Dear editor,  
In just a matter of a few short weeks the citizens of Crestview will be asked to revise the city charter and toss out a form of government that has served this city well for over a century.

Twice in the past two decades the matter of revising the charter and the form of government has gone before the electorate, and twice the matter has been soundly defeated. Nonetheless, there is an element that still thinks that the city will be better off if drastic changes are made.

I do not know the precise time when the current form of government was established, but for the uninformed suffice it to say that it is unique.

The city has a mayor who is in charge emergency services, i.e., the police and fire departments, for which she gets a city hall office with an administrative assistant, and an annual salary of \$25,000. Although it is not spelled out in so many words, the incumbent represents the city at many events and occasions, greets visiting dignitaries, rides in parades, and kisses babies!

Gee, you might say, who does the rest of the work?

Under the current charter there are several departments that are headed by directors or the City Clerk. The Clerk, being an elected official answers to no

one; the other personnel answer to the five member City Council.

Now there is an effort afoot to take management of all city functions and place them under the control of City Council, not in so many words but in actuality.

The revised charter, if accepted, will empower city council to hire a "professional" city manager who in turn will oversee all city departments, directing the various functions as he, or she, sees fit.

Just as it will take only three affirmative votes by council to hire a manager, it will take only three supportive votes to allow the incumbent to "manage" as one chooses.

In other words, so long as the "manager" pleases three members of the city council, no other person or body has a say as to how things are done.

Now, one might ask why it is that we should give up some control or the expression of opinion to an outsider who has been blessed by perhaps only 60 percent of city council. The answer is quite simple.

There are some 410 municipalities, give or take a few, in the state of Florida, and virtually all incorporated communities of our size have city managers.

Does this mean that these cities are any better run? No! It simply says the electorates have given up on selecting their

administrators and have turned the job over to a mere handful of "policy makers" who are judged to be better qualified to hire a manager than the voters.

Okay, then, you may say, if the city manager is such a good idea, what is it going to cost us?

There is a monthly publication put out by the Florida League of Cities that has a classified section towards the back of the magazine. Therein is a listing of municipalities seeking managers and another listing of individuals seeking employment. Generally speaking, both lists indicate that "professional managers" are being compensated between \$125,000 and \$150,000 per annum, before benefits, and a dedicated city vehicle. (The current council president states that no car will be provided, but if one is to be hired that fact remains to be seen.) Throw in a private office and an office for a secretary, plus compensation and benefits for the secretary, and it is readily apparent that the citizens will be asked to shell out some \$250,000 per annum for a job that is being done at one-tenth the cost.

It is my opinion that just because other municipalities have gone one way it does not mean that we must follow suit. **Bob Allen**, Crestview

"The fire appeared to originate on the records Lott previously placed in the kitchen area prior to the records being reviewed by the Chamber's board," the Lott arrest report said.

When officers arrived to investigate the fire alarm activation, an unnamed chamber employee was seen leaving the building, according to a police report. The female employee was interviewed after an officer entered the chamber office through an unlocked but possibly damaged back door and discovered documents burning in the kitchen. The fire did an estimated \$200 damage.

The State Fire Marshall's Office declared the fire to be an arson.

The fire remains under investigation.

The Crestview Police Department, the first agency on the scene of the alarm activation that led to the discovery of the fire, also noted a door had been damaged and conducted a burglary investigation of its own. No charges have yet been filed in that case.

It is unclear whether any additional charges will be made. The chamber declined to comment when contacted Thursday afternoon.

Wayne Harris, who served as Crestview chamber president before Lott and is a former county commissioner, said he was dismayed by the events.

"I'm saddened by it," he said. "All the hard work so many people have done to put that chamber where it was, to have it destroyed by one person."

Lott is being held on a \$10,000 bond.

During her Wednesday practice, Simmons said yoga was not a religion.



CRESTVIEW — Crestview residents will take to the polls in less than three weeks for the primary election. Early voting is Aug. 18 to Aug. 25, and for those who don’t vote early, election day is Aug. 28.

### Governor

Both Republicans and Democrats have a list of choices for governor. Leading in the latest poll for Democrats is U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham at 28 percent.

Graham is leading amongst four other opponents. Right behind Graham is Palm Beach billionaire Democrat Jeff

Greene at over 23 percent. According to St. Pete Polls, nine percent of the 1,652 Democratic voters who participated were undecided.

Meanwhile, Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, Republican, is currently leading in the latest poll conducted by Mason-Dixon from July 23 to July 25.

Putnam is leading at 41 percent — a double digit lead over his opponent Rep. Ron DeSantis, Republican, who has since received an endorsement from President Donald Trump via Twitter.
