Military family overcomes hardship

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CRESTVIEW — After being denied twice for a VA mortgage loan before moving 500 miles away, Anthony, Meghan and their son Caiden Simme have finally moved into their home in Crestview.

Anthony is an active duty special operations soldier at 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne).

The Simme family, previously stationed at Fort Campbell in Kentucky, found a home in Baker. They put in an offer for the home and decided to apply for a VA mortgage loan.

The same day they were closing on the house, the bank lender denied the approval because their debt to income ratio was too high.

"He had the loan for two

months. It was ridiculous," Meghan said. "We got a call last minute after we had paid for the inspection and put our deposit down. It was just a mess."

Meghan then put an extension on the Baker home and went to another lender — same result.

"I was like, 'Okay, I give up,'" Meghan said.

Although renting was an option, the Simmes prefer buying instead of renting. Meghan said she likes to make the home her own.

"I feel like we're putting our roots down," she said.

With less than a week before their move, Meghan was browsing Facebook and noticed the BBMC Mortgage "We've got your six" sweepstakes, in which the winner could receive one year of mortgage paid by BBMC Mortgage.

Meghan entered the contest on Sep. 1 and said a few minutes later, she got a phone call from Patton Gade, a West Point graduate and veteran who runs the BBMC Mortgage office in Phoenix.


At first, Meghan said she thought the whole thing was a scam.

"(Gade) called me, and by the time we ended our conversation, he told me that he had been stationed at Fort Campbell," Meghan said. "... He kind of gave me enough facts to make me realize it's real."

Meghan told Gade about the issues she had faced with various lenders denying the VA mortgage lone.

After hearing Meghan's story, Gade contacted his underwriter and had them underwritten by Tuesday.

Local teens facing drug, gun, grand theft charges

CRESTVIEW — Three Crestview teens who tried to flee in a stolen car and then hide in someone's apartment Saturday evening were arrested by Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office deputies.

According to an OCSO press release, a deputy on patrol spotted a black Kia that had been reported stolen in Panama City on Aug. 14. He attempted a traffic stop on North Pearl Street but the driver fled — speeding and disregarding traffic signs.

The car stopped in the area of South Lloyd Street and West Edney Avenue, and

three males ran from the scene. They were found hiding in an apartment at Hero's Landing. When contacted,

the owner said they did not have permission to be there.

Inside the apartment deputies found a Glock 9mm pistol — reported stolen to the OCSO earlier this year — partially hidden underneath a couch. In suspect Jamarcus Ollie's backpack, they found a Glock magazine and marijuana, according to the release.

Ollie later stated he hid his gun under the couch.

Ollie, who is 17, is charged with armed trespassing, grand theft of a firearm, principal to grand theft of a motor vehicle, resisting arrest and possession of marijuana.

Isaiah Durham, 18, the suspected driver of the stolen car, is charged with fleeing police with disregard to the safety of others, trespassing, principal to grand theft of a motor vehicle and resisting arrest.

Trevone Fitzgerald, 17, is charged with principal to grand theft of a motor vehicle, trespassing, resisting arrest and possession of marijuana.

Crestview council seeks transportation funding

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CRESTVIEW — The federal government offers a variety of ways to receive funding for public transportation, and the Crestview city council is looking to take part in that funding.

At the regular city council meeting on Sep. 10, Growth Management Director Teresa Gaillard presented the Title VI and Non-Discrimination Policy and Plan including Limited English Proficiency Plan to the council members.

The plan would be adopted by form of a resolution which states, "For the City of Crestview to continue receiving and utilizing state and federal grant funds it is necessary to adopt the Title VI and Nondiscrimination Policy and Plan including Limited English Proficiency (LEP)." The resolution is likely to be voted on at the October meeting.

According to the policy statement on the agenda, because the city receives federal funds, they are

required to adhere to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 in attempt to prevent any

kind of discrimination of both government employees and those partaking in government services.

The policy statements also said, "As a recipient of federal funds, as well as being a Florida Department of Transportation fund recipient, the City will ensure that its programs, policies and activities comply with all federal and FDOT Title VI Regulations of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and other applicable regulations."

The Title VI program adopted by the city will be subject to review every 3 years.

Gaillard said the purpose of adopting this plan is for the city to remain more independent from Okaloosa County.

"This will put us where we can stand on our own feet," Gaillard said.



Assigned to the LST547, he successfully maintained all radio and radar equipment from March 1944 until January 1946. In April 1946 he reported on board the USS Shangri-La where he was promoted to Petty Officer and assigned responsibility for all radar maintenance. During that assignment, he was awarded a citation from Adm. Blandy for a successful radar mission during Operation Crossroads, the Atomic Bomb test at Bikini Atoll in July 1946. At war's end he found a challenging and rewarding career at the US Naval Research Laboratory (NRL) in Washington, DC. His technical expertise was critical in the success of many submarine technology projects. During the development of an underwater detection and tracking system, Jim successfully completed training at the Navy Deep Sea Diving School at age 40! He also obtained a private pilot's license to help with the test missions. Jim also participated in the search for the USS Thresher in 1963. During that search many new subsea remote operated vehicles and cameras were developed to work at the extreme depths at the wreck site. These many projects resulted in numerous NRL awards and several patent applications. Upon



retirement in 1984, he moved to Ft. Walton Beach, FL, with his wife, Anita Verna Roberson. Jim enjoyed fishing, boating, bowling, restoring his daughter's classic car, working with his son on the "Long Run", and troubleshooting every electrical and mechanical problem he or anybody else encountered. He especially loved swapping (the same old) stories with his "good buddies" at the weekly "Boy's Nite Out". Jim was a loving husband, father, grandfather, and great grandfather. He was predeceased by Anita, his wife of 66 years. Surviving are his children: Mrs. Gloria Roberson Cushman (David), of Southern Pines, NC and James E. 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'The memory lives on'

Mementos left at Memorial Wall preserved by 7th Group

EGLIN AFB — Gleaming in the sun, or spattered with raindrops, the dozens of brass plaques on the semicircular black granite Memorial Wall at the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne) compound are somber testimony to the more than 130 Green Berets the group has lost in service to the United States.

Every now and again, though, the stark monument reflects the decidedly human dimension of those losses, as friends, family and fellow soldiers leave mementos to the fallen soldiers.

"It's been like that since the wall was erected," said Maj. Kimbia Rey, the group's public affairs officer, "just like at a grave site. They are items just showing that the memory lives on."

On a recent summer day, a pot of flowers shimmered in waves of heat rising from the wall. But flowers aren't all that is placed there, according to Rey. Fellow soldiers often will leave their military unit coin next to the name of a friend, she said. Photographs also are left frequently at the wall. In one instance, someone left a resealable plastic bag filled with photos, Rey said.

The wall, privately funded through the work of Chapter 7 of the Special Forces Association, was dedicated in 2016. And while the 7th Group's primary area of responsibility

is Latin America, the Caribbean and South America, a number of its troops have made the ultimate sacrifice in Iraq and Afghanistan, as the war on terror that began with the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks on the U.S. has continued.

Earlier this year, the Memorial Wall was rededicated as 67 new names were added, doubling the number of troops honored in metal and stone. The large number of new names is the result of a change in the criteria for inclusion. Now, 7th Group troops who have died in training accidents and other non-combat situations are included on the wall.

"It's about remembrance," Col. Patrick Colloton, 7th Group's commander, said at the May re-dedication.

The leaving of tokens of remembrance at the 7th Group's Memorial Wall mimics a similar practice at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. Mementos frequently are left along the nearly 500-foot length of black granite bearing the names of service members lost in that war. And just as at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, efforts are made to preserve the mementos left at the 7th Group memorial.

Items placed on the wall are left in place for awhile, Rey said. In some instances, the items are brought in and stored by the group, wrapped carefully and placed in a special locker. That practice also applies to a second memorial at the 7th Group compound, a rock garden maintained by the group's 1st Battalion.

"They're preserved," Rey said. "They're respected."

For leadership at the 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne), leaving mementos at the wall is recognized as part of the ongoing process of grieving and remembering the departed Green Berets.

The waist-high Memorial Wall was, in fact, designed to include a spiritual element.

The semicircular structure is separated into two parts, representing both the bodies and the spirits of the departed troops.

Usually, mementos are left during some scheduled event, such as the annual Red Empire Week, a reunion of 7th SFG(A) troops. Red

Empire Week also includes a Community Day, where the public can come into the compound.

But family members and former 7th Group troops who maintain access to the compound can, and do, come at other times to leave mementos.

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Coggins tests help prevent spread of the virus in horses

Sometimes we can get complacent and forget why we do things.

A Coggins test in horses is one of those things. We know that it is a requirement in Florida to have a current negative Coggins test (within the last 12 months) in order to:

- Move horses within the state.
- Move horses out of the state.

- Change ownership of horses.
- Breed horses.
- Congregate horses for the purpose of shows, exhibits, sales/auctions, trail rides, rodeos and even boarding.

Normally, proof of negative Coggins test is in the form of a paper with information about the owner, horse and lab performing the test. Cards (negative EIA test verification cards) are available for an additional fee. These cards are more convenient for those who travel often with their horses.

But why do we need a negative Coggins test every 12 months?

The Coggins test screens horses for Equine Infectious

Anemia, a viral disease that has no vaccine and no treatment. A veterinarian must collect the blood sample and send it to a state and federally approved lab for testing.

The U.S. started using this test in 1972 and has significantly reduced the number of new cases since then.

The EIA virus is transmitted by large biting flies such as horseflies and deerflies; or contaminated needles and equipment. Horses with EIA can show clinical signs such as fever, weight loss, yellowing of skin, anemia, swelling of limbs and weakness.

Some horses with EIA show no signs of infection, but can still transmit the virus to healthy horses.

Horses that test positive for the virus are either euthanized or segregated from negative horses. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has set forth Uniform Methods and Rules for detecting, controlling and preventing it. This is the minimum standard for states to follow. Florida rules exceed these minimum standards since it is a historic "hot zone" state.

In 2017, 108,388 Coggins tests were performed in Florida, with two horses testing positive. So far in 2018, one positive horse was reported in March in Hardee County.

Currently, less than 0.01 percent of U.S. horses tested are positive for EIA. In 1972, four percent of those tested

were positive. If we get complacent and ignore EIA since it is no longer very prevalent, we will see an increase in cases around the US. Testing is our best defense against it, as it is fatal and there is no cure for it.

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Florida colleges move up in national ranking

GAINESVILLE — The University of Florida is ranked No. 8 in the country for best public university, according to the U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges list released on Monday.

The university is up one spot from last year, when it tied with the University of California-Irvine and the University of California-San Diego for ninth. The 2019 list has UF tied with Georgia Institute of Technology for the eighth spot.

Florida State University is the next highest ranking Florida university at No. 26, moving up seven spots from last year. FSU is also ranked No. 70 among best national universities and No. 37 for most innovative school.

The University of South Florida ranked No. 58, up from the 68th spot last year. The University of Central Florida jumped three ranks from No. 90 to No. 87, while Florida International University climbed 22 spots from last year to No. 100.

The University of Central Florida, Florida Institute of Technology, University of

West Florida, Florida Atlantic University and Florida A&M did not make the list for best public schools. However, UCF ranked No. 165 in best national universities, with Florida Tech also at No. 177. UWF, Florida A&M and FAU tied with 68 other schools for No. 230 best national university.

Assistant State Attorney Kylie Kennon attended UF for her undergraduate degree and graduated in 2013 with a bachelor's degree in criminology.

"I spent four of the greatest years of my life at the University of Florida," Kennon said in an email to the Daily News. "I still

remember to this day, where I was and what I was doing when I found out I had been accepted to UF and the excitement I felt. I am the 15th member of my family to attend and graduate from the University of Florida. ... While chomping in the swamp makes for the best Saturdays, academics as well as athletics are important and top-notch."

In a press release, UF President Kent Fuchs thanked Florida Legislature, Gov. Rick Scott, the college's Board of Governors and Board of Trustees for the continued support.

Yet he saved his

greatest appreciation for UF's employees.

"Our faculty and staff have moved mountains to make this happen, and to them I extend my most heartfelt thanks," Fuchs said.

The closely watched U.S. News rankings are based on 15 measurements aimed at evaluating the academic quality of the institutions. The measures include graduation rates, retention rates, class sizes, peer reputation and faculty resources.

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Eating made teen sick

PENSACOLA — Every time Kerri Thrush's 15-year-old daughter Erica ate more than a couple of bites of food, she experienced severe stomach cramping, vomiting and nausea. The debilitating discomfort caused her to lose 40 pounds over several months.

"Doctors couldn't find anything physically wrong with Erica, so they suspected she had an eating disorder," Thrush recalled. "Unfortunately, we convinced ourselves of that, too."

Before placing Erica in an eating disorders treatment center, Thrush called a friend at Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola, asking for her help in finding a doctor who could figure out why her daughter couldn't eat. Her friend recommended Alan Sacks, M.D., a pediatric gastroenterologist, and James Burns, M.D., a specialist in adolescent medicine, both University of Florida faculty who practice full-time at Studer Family Children's Hospital at Sacred Heart.

In four months, Erica, a straight-A student at West Florida High School of Advanced Technology, had gone from a healthy 116-pound competitive dancer to a severely malnourished 76-pound teen who missed school days because of her declining health. Thrush knew they were running out of time, so Erica was admitted to the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at The Studer Family Children's Hospital at Sacred Heart, where she could receive the multidisciplinary care she needed. Sacred Heart is part of Ascension, the nation's largest, nonprofit health system.

"Dr. Sacks and Dr. Burns were the only doctors who listened to Erica when she described the pain she felt when she ate," Thrush

said. "It meant the world to us to have them working together as a team to find answers."

After an upper endoscopy revealed she had undigested food in her stomach, Dr. Sacks ordered a stomach emptying test to measure how quickly food was leaving her stomach. The results were positive for gastroparesis, a condition that causes incomplete stomach emptying. As a result, she wasn't absorbing nutrients from food. The hallmark symptoms for this disease are nausea, vomiting, loss of appetite, bloating and chronic abdominal pain.

Erica's malnutrition was exacerbated by another digestive condition called superior mesenteric artery syndrome, or SMAS, that occurs when part of the small intestine is pinched between two arteries, completely blocking digestion. To make sure Erica receives the basic nutrients she needs to thrive, a nasal feeding tube was placed in June to provide continuous feeds for 20 hours each day.

"Although finding out Erica has gastroparesis and SMAS is not something we wanted to hear, there was comfort in having a diagnosis instead of not knowing what was wrong," Kerri said.

With the help of the feeding tube and a registered dietitian at The Children's Hospital who taught Erica how a special diet can minimize symptoms, she has regained 14 pounds.

Kerri said she admires Erica's resilience.

"Her dad tells her, 'Fight the good fight today,'" Kerri said. "On good days, she doesn't let her feeding tube get in the way of living her life. She has gone camping and to the beach, enjoys swimming in the pool with her sister Gianna, and recently performed at a dance recital."

Once Erica regains more weight, her team will explore other treatment options. In the meantime, she will be starting her sophomore year at West Florida High School.

New gene therapy for inherited eye disorders found effective in animal model

GAINESVILLE — A new gene therapy developed by University of Florida Health researchers stops vision loss and improves sight in dogs — a key step toward testing the treatment in people affected by a group of genetic eye disorders.

The therapy uses a small, harmless virus to deliver genetic material that blocks and reverses the effects of retinitis pigmentosa, a group of inherited diseases that kills light-sensitive cells in the retina.

The gene delivery vehicle, known as an adeno-associated virus, or AAV, vector, is unique for its sight-saving double punch: It silences the mutant rhodopsin gene that causes retinal degeneration while also delivering a normal, replacement copy of the gene. The AAV therapy saved photoreceptor cells and prevented vision loss among the dogs in the study. The findings are published today in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

It's the first time that a gene therapy for retinitis pigmentosa has been tested in dogs, Alfred Lewin, Ph.D., said. Lewin is a professor in the UF College of

Medicine's department of molecular genetics and microbiology.

"We were able to save cone vision in the dogs. If we can do that in people, it will save the central vision that allows them to recognize faces, read and watch television," Lewin said.

While much additional research remains before the treatment can be tested or used in people, Lewin is encouraged because dogs and humans both have retinas rich in photoreceptors known as cone cells.

At the University of Pennsylvania, 10 beagles with naturally occurring retinitis pigmentosa were treated with eye

injections by William A. Beltran, Ph.D., a professor of ophthalmology, and his team. In nine weeks, the AAV therapy "considerably reduced" the level of mutant ribonucleic acid compared with untreated areas of the eye, the researchers found. After more than eight months, the AAV injection had successfully and completely protected rod cells, the other type of photoreceptor cell in the retina, they noted.

Beltran said, "The treatment targets a region of the rhodopsin gene that is homologous in humans and dogs and is separate from where the mutations are located. That gives us great hope about making this a translational treatment."

Lewin said he is hopeful that AAV therapy could be used against other diseases, like those that cause kidney and liver cysts and also arise from a single copy of a mutant gene. He credited Michael Massengill, a student in the UF M.D.-Ph.D. program, for doing significant work constructing and testing the virus. Massengill received his Ph.D. in August just resumed medical school at UF.

Oscar, Felix and the musical sound of laughter

The sound of audiences laughing at his material provided the affirmation that his own childhood denied him. My favorite film adaptation is "The Odd Couple," released in 1968 and starring Walter Matthau and Jack Lemmon. Characters Oscar Madison and Felix Unger cohabit Madison's New York apartment while Unger and his wife endure a separation. Madison is a total slob who is driven insane by Felix and his obsessive neatness.

Mike Nichols won his second Tony Award for directing the Broadway version of the play. "Barefoot in the Park" made Robert Redford a star. And Burt Bacharach scored his musicals. His plays enjoyed 9,000 performances on Broadway in a 15-year period (1965 to 1980), with four running simultaneously in 1966. He wrote "Brighton Beach Memoirs," "Biloxi Blues," "Lost in Yonkers," "The Prisoner of Second Avenue," "Plaza Suite" and many more.

Neil Simon was born in the Bronx on July 4, 1927. His salesman father left and returned repeatedly. Eventually the family dissolved and Neil was shuffled off to live with relatives. Several of his plays, including "Lost in Yonkers," draw from his early life experiences. Simon was awarded a Tony and a Pulitzer Prize for that play.

After his discharge from the Air Force, he began writing comedy sketches for Phil Silvers and Sid Caesar. His first play, "Come Blow Your Horn," was written in 1961 and enjoyed 677 performances.


Simon wrote about middle class people, their foibles and funny mannerisms, and the struggles of families, marriage, and everyday living. After his first wife died of cancer in 1973, he married actress Marsha Mason and wrote what he considered his favorite play, "Chapter Two," based on their marital strife. "Biloxi Blues" was developed from Simon's own military experiences in Denver.

Simon died recently at age 91. From a relatively impoverished and dysfunctional upbringing, Neil Simon rose to the top of his profession as a playwright. He took the everyday agony and unhappiness surrounding him, and turned it into professional success through good humor, hard work and immense natural talent. Perhaps it is hyperbole, but one critic called him the most prolific playwright since Shakespeare.

There is a common misconception that rich, successful Americans inherit their place in society from their similarly wealthy parents. While exposure to handling financial issues can provide a leg up, a person must develop his or her own financial and career success, regardless of background. Many times, the desire to escape and deal with dysfunctionality or poverty can provide remarkable financial motivation to achieve.

We won't forget Sept. 11, but we can't ignore today's terrorists

This is the time of year when you will hear some people lamenting that our remembrance of Sept. 11 terror attacks has gone by the wayside.

But no one who was at least 10 years old on Sept. 11, 2001, can possibly forget the chaos, confusion, anger, raw grief and fear.

On that sunny morning, the world as we'd always known it was no more.

Anyone who was even remotely aware back then remembers that, for a time at least, we came together as one people, as a country that was more "unum" than "pluribus."

What we're less likely to recall are the details of the dozens of terror attacks that have occurred since 9-11 because they were never classified as such.

That doesn't make them any less true.

We're less apt to remember them because there have been so many, they've started to blend together.

We can't keep up.

But the mass killings of innocent people, whether it occurs on an Army base, in a movie theater, a gay nightclub, at an employee holiday party or on a campus all qualify as acts of terror. The math of murder

The killings of nine

unsuspecting Americans during a Bible study by a man who shouldn't have had access to a gun but did because someone blew the paperwork was an act of terror.

The specter of thousands of music fans huddled together in Las Vegas waiting to be shot down by an unseen assailant fits the definition of "terrorism" any way you cut it.

The math of mass murders that have occurred since Sept. 11, 2001, makes the argument that terror has seeped into the American fabric and proves that we have much, much more to fear from our fellow Americans than from the likes of ISIS.

Across the county, police have expressed much more concern about homegrown, non-Muslim extremism than about Al-Qaeda. As we see in certain parts of Chicago, as we just saw in Jacksonville and in Cincinnati, you have a much greater chance of being shot by another American than being blown to bits by some foreign religious fanatic in a bomb vest.

Today, however, news of a mass attack has a shorter shelf life than milk, even if the victims are children.

There were many who thought — hoped — the slaughter of 6-year-olds at Sandy Hook would be our cultural tipping point. Not only have there have been 1,606 more mass shootings since 2012, the parents of those children killed at Sandy Hook still are being harassed by Truthers — another kind of domestic terrorist whose weapons of choice are paranoia, lies and propaganda.

Seventeen years after Osama bin Laden struck at this country's heart and soul, the most likely perpetrator of terror in 2018 is one of us. Familiarity not only breeds contempt, it also causes blindness, resulting in our describing domestic terrorists as "troubled," their acts driven by mental illness.

In his research, Dr. Michael Stone, a Columbia University forensic psychiatrist and author of "The Anatomy of Evil," found that just two out of 10 mass shooters demonstrated a serious mental illness.

Our concern only seems to linger when the perpetrator appears to be an "other." There's no way jihadists would have been able to conduct a torchlight parade through an American city with impunity the same way neo-Nazis did in Charlottesville, Virginia.

Such selective outrage is not only naive, it's also dangerous.

We will never forget those who were killed in New York, Shanksville, Pa., and at the Pentagon. They were a part of us. But we would be remiss to pretend terror is not being born and bred right here on our shores.

Just as in the aftermath of Sept. 11, our grief for those lost to other acts of terror since then should compel us to offer more than thoughts and prayers, so there will never be another San Bernadino, Charlottesville, Parkland, Sutherland Springs, Aurora, Santa Fe ...



Meghan said her realtor, Jamie Vargas, was able to show her a home in Crestview on short notice. They found one they liked and closed on the home Friday, Sep. 7. Having been a military spouse since she was 17, Meghan, 22, had been through the process of moving her locations a few times before. However, this time, she learned a few lessons.

"You don't have to use a local lender. I didn't know that," Meghan said. "... You need to make sure you find a realtor who has enough time for you. I would say just find a good support team...find people that are educated to help you."

Meghan hopes other military families will see her story and know that they have many options when buying a home. "As military families, we are so lucky that we have all these perks, and we don't even take advantage of them," Meghan said.

Consider Financial Gifts for Your Grandchildren

National Grandparents Day is observed on Sept. 9. If you're a grandparent, you may get some gifts or cards – or maybe even a phone call! But you might feel that it's better to give than to receive, especially when it comes to your grandchildren. And you can make a real difference in their lives by making a financial gift for their future.

For starters, think about your grandchildren's education. If college or some type of vocational school is in their future, you may want to help them meet some of the costs, which can be considerable. One common education-savings vehicle is a 529 savings plan. With this plan, earnings on withdrawals are tax free, provided they are used for qualified education expenses. (Keep in mind that 529 savings plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to ordinary income tax and a 10% IRS penalty on the earnings.) You also may be eligible for a state income tax incentive for contributing to a 529 savings plan. Check with your tax advisor about these incentives, as well as all tax-related issues pertaining to 529 savings plans.

A 529 savings plan's contribution limits are quite generous. And, as the owner of a 529 plan, you have flexibility in choosing where the money goes – if your grandchild decides against college or another type of advanced education, you can transfer the plan to another beneficiary. And due to recent tax law changes, the scope of 529 plans has been expanded to include qualified withdrawals of up to \$10,000 for tuition expenses per year per beneficiary at public, private or religious elementary or secondary schools. Be aware, though, that a 529 savings plan could affect any financial assistance your grandchild might receive. Although a 529 plan owned by a grandparent won't be reported as an asset on the Free Application For Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), withdrawals from the plan are treated as untaxed income to the beneficiary (i.e., your grandchild) – and that has a big impact on financial aid. So, you may want to contact a financial aid professional about the potential effects of any gifts you're considering.

A 529 savings plan isn't the only financial gift you could give to your grandchildren. You also might consider giving them shares of stock, possibly held in a custodial account, usually known as an UTMA or UGMA account. However, you only control a custodial account until your grandchildren reach the age of majority as defined by state law, at which time they take it over. They then can use the money for whatever they want – and their plans may not have anything to do with books or classes.

Still, your grandchildren might be particularly interested in owning the stocks contained in the custodial account – many young people enjoy owning shares of companies that make familiar products. And your gift may even get your grandchildren interested in long-term investing.

No matter what type of financial gifts you give to your grandchildren, make sure you keep enough money to pay for your own needs. It's important to balance your personal savings needs with your desire to be generous.

Giving financial gifts can be rewarding – to you and your grandchildren. Consider exploring some possibilities soon.

Also included in the city's Title VI plan is the Limited English Proficiency plan. LEP individuals are those who

don't speak English as their first language or are not proficient in writing, reading, or understanding English. The LEP plan is to see that these individuals have equal access to city programs and services.

The LEP plan is based off information about

those who speak English from the census. If adopted by the council, the plan would be based off the 2020 census.

"We may be surprised by the increase," Gaillard said.

According to Gaillard, the Title VI plan will have a "coordinator." At the

moment, Gaillard said there is only one person who would be qualified, and he has completed half of the required classes.

The Title VI notice is currently posted at City Hall and on the city's website, www.cityof-crestview.org.

Patronis to residents: Don't let your guard down

TALLAHASSEE — On the one-year anniversary of Hurricane Irma's landfall, Monday, Florida Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis warned residents not to let their guard down during the peak of hurricane season. Florida experienced two hurricanes during this time of year for the last two years including Hermine and Matthew in 2016 and Irma and Nate in 2017.

CFO Jimmy Patronis said, "One year ago, Hurricane Irma slammed into Florida causing more than \$10 billion in insured losses, with more than 1,800 private flood insurance claims. Many residents are still recovering. Today is a reminder that we can't let our guard down and we must act now

to ensure our families and property are protected. With more storms brewing in the Atlantic, I encourage all Floridians to review their insurance policies and have a hurricane plan in place before the next storm takes aim at Florida."

Hurricane prep tips for Florida residents:

- Review your policy — Homeowners', renters' or property insurance policy should be examined to ensure you understand the coverage they provide.
- Purchase flood insurance — National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) policies or even private policies can be purchased through your homeowners' or renter's insurance agent. Flood insurance policies take 30 days to go into effect.
- Make necessary

coverage changes — When the National Weather Service issues a hurricane or tropical storm watch or warning for any part of Florida, many insurance companies cease issuing new policies. When this occurs, insurance coverage cannot be purchased until 72 hours after the last watch or warning has been lifted.

• Be aware of scam artists — Crooks may offer to increase your insurance or sell you insurance coverage as a storm approaches or during a storm. CFO Patronis has activated his Disaster Fraud Action Strike Team for the 2018 Hurricane Season to curb any post-storm fraud.

• Know your deductible — Most policies have a hurricane deductible of 2 to 5 percent of a home's insured

value. If your property is damaged, you will be responsible for a portion of the repair costs.

• Take inventory — Make a list of your household items, including receipts, purchase dates and serial numbers. Photograph or videotape your possessions and keep copies of this information along with your insurance policies with the originals in a safe place.

• Take action — When a hurricane threatens, take action to protect your property. Buy the materials you need to secure your property and minimize losses. Cover your windows with shutters, siding or plywood. Move vehicles into a garage or carport when possible. Grills and/or patio furniture should be moved inside.

Gulf Power storm kits tested by Gordon

After a relatively quiet season in Northwest Florida, Tropical Storm Gordon swept through Northwest Florida causing power outages for 26,000 Gulf Power customers. It was an opportunity to test a new procedure to help speed power restoration.

This season, Gulf Power's general warehouse team incorporated an idea learned last year while helping restore power following Hurricane Irma: pre-assembled storm kits filled with everything the crews and support personnel need for repairs, from fuses to breakers, wire and bolts.

"Previously, it took a full day to get a storm kit ready," said Gordon Paulus, Gulf Power spokesperson. "Now our warehouse team loads

these pre-assembled kits on a truck in about half an hour, allowing crews to essentially grab and go when they're called out for storm duty."

These kits contain almost all of the necessary items needed to work on the lines and cut down on the time it takes to assemble them on the fly.

"Having these kits ready to go means our crews are able to begin repairs more quickly after damage from a major storm," Paulus said. "The bottom line is that this helps them get our customers power restored more quickly."

Each Gulf Power storm kit is made up of seven bins. They're weatherproofed and labeled so crews can easily find what they need and two full kits can fit into a tractor-trailer rig. In addition, two of these kits are specially prepared for beach environments and include stainless-steel material resilient to salt spray.

During Tropical Storm Gordon, two of the storm kits were used in the Pensacola area as crews worked to restore power.

"As Gulf Power maintains storm readiness, we also encourage our customers to stay prepared despite with the quiet season we've had so far," Paulus said. "We encourage our customers to stay connected to us on social media — Facebook,

Twitter and Instagram — for the most up-to-date storm news, whether it be a hurricane, tropical storm or even a severe thunderstorm."

Find storm updates on the Gulf Power homepage. If a storm enters the Gulf of Mexico, Gulf Power is on alert and watches the storm's path and will provide customers important information.

Sign up for Outage Alerts: Register on your cell phone by texting REG to MyGulf (694853). You'll receive a text back to confirm the registration. You can also use our Preference Center and choose whether to receive texts, emails or calls. Log in to your account and set your Outage Alerts options.

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Student arrested after alleged sexual assault

"We will continue to cooperate with the BCSO as needed but, due to privacy concerns for the victim and the nature of the investigation, we will not be commenting further other than to reassure our parents that student safety and supervision remains our focus," Bullock said in a statement.

Windows licensing scam and others are back

I received a robo-call this week from 866-978-6277 stating that my Microsoft Windows license key had expired and by calling back, it would be fixed (for a fee, I'm sure.)

Microsoft Windows licenses never expire. This is a scam, please don't fall for it.

Furthermore, Microsoft never randomly calls consumers, they only call if you request a call. The best way to avoid these scams is to ignore phone calls from unknown phone numbers. A legitimate business or person will leave a message.

Don't ever give anyone remote access to your computer, as that sets you up for theft of personal and financial information, as well as corruption of your computer files.

'Should you suspect that you have computer problems, take your computer to a reputable computer repair store. Never allow someone that

randomly calls – who claims you need computer repairs or who claims to be with Microsoft – to "fix" your computer.

I filed a report with Microsoft to alert them this scam is an ongoing problem. Unfortunately, these scammers take advantage of plenty of people. Stay alert and don't get swindled.

Criminals also attach phony card readers on gas pumps to steal credit or debit card information. According to the Federal Trade Commission, "Skimmers are illegal card readers attached to payment terminals." Furthermore the FTC suggests that people "try to wiggle the card reader before you put in your card. If it moves, report it to the attendant. Then use a different pump."


occurring this past week, it is also a good time to make sure that we in Crestview are prepared for tropical storms or hurricanes that may head our way.

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

CRESTVIEW – In a span of three to four weeks, Michael King, his wife Ruth, and their daughter Monnie Villanea transformed a former church building into a colorful play arena for children from crawlers to 12-year-olds.



Tips to improve your bow season

The 2018-19 hunting season is already underway in south Florida, and will soon be opening in the other three state zones. Becky Shuman, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's assistant deer program coordinator and biologist, offers the following tips about deer and hunting on Florida's wildlife management areas.

"Before I ever set foot on a potential hunting area, I like to look at aerial imagery to find transitional zones between different habitat types,"

Shuman said. "Deer like to bed during the day in areas with dense vegetation and move out into more open areas at night to feed. The edge between these habitats is a good place to catch deer heading to and from feeding areas at dusk and dawn."

After Becky pinpoints a couple of spots she wants to scout, she checks them out on foot.

"I look for all types of deer sign - well-used game trails, tracks, scat, buck rubs and scrapes," Shuman said. "You

can tell a lot about the deer in the area without even using a game camera."

She then looks for a spot to hang her tree stand.

"I look for a straight mature tree with some vegetation in front and behind it to break up my silhouette," Shuman said. "I then can do a quick internet search to learn what the predominant wind direction is for that area in the fall and winter and position my stand so that it is downwind from where I think the deer are coming from. I also make tree stand safety a priority and inspect my tree stand, all safety devices and my fall-arrest system/full-body harness before each use."

Shuman said, "With some of our WMAs, areas near roads and trails can get crowded, especially on weekends. Spending the extra time and effort to find the more remote locations can really pay off and add to your overall hunting experience."

Florida's WMAs offer a wide range of hunting opportunities from quota/limited entry hunts, special-opportunity hunts, and public hunting areas where hunters can walk on to hunt. See MyFWC.com/WMAbrochures.

Statewide public archery and shooting range details are at MyFWC.com/Ranges. The FWC site also offers

a bowhunter education course; registration; tips for new hunters; and hunting zone dates and license requirements. To hunt during archery season, you may hunt only with a bow and you must have a Florida hunting license and an archery permit. During crossbow season, you may use either a crossbow or bow, but you must have a crossbow permit along with your hunting license.

You can obtain all the licenses and permits you'll need at a county tax collector's office, any retail outlet that sells hunting and fishing supplies, by calling 888-HUNT-FLORIDA or at GoOutdoorsFlorida.com.

Kudos to Navarre. Based on what I heard from sports editor Seth Stringer and the highlights I saw on MaxPreps, it was a heck of a game against Crestview. Honestly, it was a heck of a game based solely on the fact the Raiders won 41-35 in overtime after trailing 28-0.



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


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

Becoming a citizen

If a lawful permanent resident wants to become a citizen, he or she must apply for naturalization. The U.S. government will check the immigrant's history and make sure he or she is eligible.

Naturalized citizens have the same rights and responsibilities as native citizens, except they cannot be president of the United States.

Solving a problem

Some immigrants arrive in the U.S. illegally. In other words, they come into the country without permission, called a visa, from the government.

The problem of illegal immigration is a big one that presidents and Congress have not been able to solve. Recently, you may have heard about families being detained, or held, on our border with Mexico after trying to enter the U.S. illegally. This is just one part of the problem.

Lawmakers have many different ideas about how to solve our immigration issues, from building a wall on the border between the U.S. and Mexico to refusing to allow any immigrants at all. It will take a lot of cooperation and creative new ideas to solve this challenge for our country.

Lazarus' poem was meant as a welcome for people coming to America — people who wanted to be free, who had to leave their native lands, and who had traveled a long way.

America's immigrants

Immigrants are people who come to a new place to live permanently. Most experts agree that the earliest immigrants to North America probably came across a land bridge between northeast Asia and Alaska about 13,000 years ago. These people are believed to be the ancestors of Native Americans.

Since then, at different times, large groups of people have come to North America from Europe, Asia, Africa, and Central and South America.

In fact, even if you and your parents were born in the United States, your family may be able to trace its roots to another country.

Why immigrate?

Immigrants have come to the United States for many reasons. Some were looking for land to farm or better jobs. Others wanted to freely practice their religion, or they were unhappy with the government in their homeland.

Today, immigrants may be trying to escape harsh governments or military organizations in their home countries. In some parts of the world, people are persecuted, or treated in a harmful way, because of their religion or race.

Immigration's effects

Immigration adds a lot to the culture of a nation. People from other countries bring new ideas, customs, foods and languages to our communities.

But immigration also puts pressure on a country. Sometimes it's difficult for people of different backgrounds to get along. Added people can strain a nation's resources, such as energy, water and food supplies, housing, jobs, health care and education.

Cornbread Casserole

You'll need:

- 1 (15.25-ounce) can whole-kernel corn, drained
- 1 (14.75-ounce) can cream-style corn
- 1 (7-ounce) package sweet yellow cornbread mix
- 1 large egg

- 1 tablespoon melted butter
- 1/2 cup sour cream

5. Top with cheddar cheese the last five minutes of cooking time. Allow to cool for 10 minutes before cutting into squares. Serves 6.







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City council approves budget

Tentative millage rate budget set for 2019

CRESTVIEW — The Crestview city council unanimously voted to approve the tentative millage rate and budget for the fiscal year, which is from Oct. 1, 2018 to Sep. 30, 2019.

The millage rate is expected to continue at the current rate of 6.9 mills, equivalent to \$6.90 for every \$1,000 of assessed property value.

According to the resolution approved by the council, this rate is more than the rolled-back rate by over 5 percent.

Millage rates are used to calculate local property taxes, and Crestview's rate will allow the city to collect around \$7 million in property taxes.

Crestview currently has the highest millage rate in Okaloosa County. The city council also unanimously approved the tentative budget but it can make changes before the next regular council meeting, which is less than a week away.

However, according to the

resolution, the "the city council during fiscal year 2019 may, by resolution, make any amendments to the budget adopted by this resolution, as it may deem necessary and proper."

Although the goal of the meeting on Thursday was to hold a public hearing, no one from the public came before the council. The final hearing for the millage rate and budget is expected to be held on Sep. 24 at City Hall.


