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Locals remember business owner

CRESTVIEW — Crestview lost a well-known member of the community after a tractor accident in rural Alabama.

Glenn Edward "Ed" Lowe, 53, passed away at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday in a town 3 miles outside on Greenville, Ala.

Lowe owned Crestview Paint and Body — a business the city and Crestview Police Department used for towing services.

Mayor David Cadle said Lowe was an important figure

in the community.

"Many people had come to rely on Ed Lowe for the services he offered at (Crestview Paint and Body)," Cadle said. "He was always looking out for his customers ... He has a lot of customers that have been with him for many years."

The Crestview Police Department have utilized Lowe's business for years when accidents occurred to return the normal traffic flow.

Brian Hughes, Crestview's Public Information Officer, said in an email, "In this, he is a great partner

with the Crestview Police Department."

Glenn Branton, originally from Crestview, said he knew Lowe and his family from their childhood in the 70s.

"He was a great guy, generous and very, very funny," Branton, of Alabama, commented on Facebook. "I always enjoyed seeing him or talking to him, he was always upbeat and made you feel like he was glad to see you."

Lowe began helping his father run the body shop behind their home on

Resident concerned about recycled items

BAKER — Brittney Sanchez is worried that people who do not bring their recycled items to the transfer station in Baker run the risk of such items being treated as household trash and taken to a landfill.

Sanchez, who has lived in Holt for about four years, said she began learning more about recycling about two months ago.

"I posted a Facebook video on what can or cannot be recycled," she said.

Sanchez said while Adams

Sanitation collects her household trash, it doesn't pick up recycled items, so she brings them to the transfer station.

"What I take does get recycled," she said. "The stuff that gets put in the big metal shipping containers at the Baker transfer station (gets recycled). It's the stuff on the trucks that does not get recycled."

Sanchez was referring to recycled items that Waste Pro brings to the Okaloosa County-managed facility in Baker. She said the company for several months has been collecting recyclables with a garbage truck.

"I've seen garbage trucks in

parts of Baker and Crestview pick up recycled stuff, but it gets contaminated," Sanchez said.

She also said two transfer station employees have told her that recycled items collected by Waste Pro end up in a landfill.

Ron Pecora, senior vice president of Longwood-based Waste Pro, said the company uses the same trucks, but on different days, for garbage and recycling pickups.

"Yes, (recycled items) are dumped in the same truck (that collects garbage), but

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



Nationwide alert test coming

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), will conduct a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) Sept. 20.

The WEA portion of the test commences at 1:18 p.m. and the EAS portion follows at 1:20 p.m. The test will assess the operational readiness of the infrastructure for distribution of a national message and determine whether technological improvements are needed. This is the first national WEA test message sent to WEA-compatible cell phones and the fourth EAS nationwide test sent via broadcast media.

The WEA test will be sent through IPAWS at 1:18 p.m. Cell towers will broadcast the WEA test for approximately 30 minutes. During this time, cell phones that are switched on and within range of an active cell tower should be capable of receiving the test message. FEMA will send one WEA message to mobile devices and because the WEA message is a presidential alert, users will not be able to opt out of receiving the message, even if they have deactivated alert notifications in their mobile devices. The WEA message will display on mobile devices as a presidential alert and will read:

"This is a test of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed."
• The WEA system is used to warn the public about

dangerous weather, missing children, and other critical situations through alerts on cell phones. It allows customers whose wireless provider participates in WEA and who own a WEA compatible wireless phone to receive geo-targeted alerts of imminent threats to safety in their area through unique tones and vibration.

• WEAs can be sent by state and local public safety officials, the National Weather Service, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, and the president of the United States.
• WEAs can be issued for three alert categories - imminent threat, AMBER, and presidential.

• WEAs look like text messages, but are designed to get your attention and alert you with a unique sound and vibration, both repeated twice.
• WEAs are no more than 90 characters, and will include the type and time of the alert, any action you should take, as well as the agency issuing the alert.

• WEAs are not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts, calls or data sessions that are in progress.
• Mobile users are not charged for receiving WEAs and there is no need to subscribe.

Tip of the Week

From a cough that won't go away to a sore throat they caught from the classroom, children and their vulnerable immune systems can fall victim to common illnesses quicker and more often than adults. However, while these health issues are typical, it is not always easy to identify what they are when symptoms strike.

According to pediatrician Dr. Nina Shapiro, an important part in understanding a child's symptoms is also being prepared to help fight back with the right tools at home and to know when it's time to bring them to see a doctor.

Alleviating some of the uncomfortable symptoms at the first signs of sickness or discomfort will help your child get back to being a kid faster and can aid their long-term health. When pain and discomfort do strike, knowing the signs and symptoms of some of these common problems can help determine the best course of action.

1. Ear pain

Ear pain can be caused by myriad issues, including swimmer's ear, an existing cold, an ear infection or tooth pain traveling up the jawline, among other things. An over-the-counter pain reliever, elevating the child's head when sleeping and a warm compress on the ear may help lessen the discomfort. However, if the pain continues to worsen, is accompanied by a high fever and/or swelling and pus exists, the best option is to visit a pediatrician for an in-office exam to determine the exact cause.

2. Constipation

According to a recent

survey commissioned by Pedia-Lax, nearly 45 percent of parents with children between ages 2 and 11 noted their children experience constipation at least once a month. Recognizing the symptoms of constipation can be tricky depending on the child's age - especially if they can't voice their issue. Luckily, there are physical and emotional symptoms to look out for, including less than three bowel movements a week, stomach aches, a decrease in appetite and increased irritability. Shapiro suggests opting for a medicine that's formulated specifically for children versus an adult formula. To help prevent constipation, encourage your child to eat a well-balanced, fiber-rich diet, drink lots of fluids and speak up whenever they feel they need to use the restroom.

3. Hand, foot and mouth disease

Hand, foot and mouth disease is a pesky, highly contagious illness often seen in young children - especially during the beginning of the school year when children are back inside in close quarters. It is caused by a virus similar to the cold virus and, as the name suggests, can involve the hands (primarily the palms), the feet (primarily the soles) and the mouth. Telltale signs are sore throat due to sores on the palate and the lips, sores on the palms and sores on the feet. In general, the throat sores tend to give the worst of the symptoms, leading to inability to swallow, severe throat pain and fevers. Kids that refuse to eat or drink due to throat pain can be at risk for dehydration. The treatment plan includes pain medications, drinking cool liquids and rest.

4. Pink eye

From the bus to the classroom to the playground, children often spend a lot of time in close quarters with their friends. While sharing is an important lesson to learn at a young age, kids will often, unfortunately, share their germs too. Conjunctivitis, commonly known as pink eye, is spread through hand-to-hand contact, which can transport the highly contagious condition to the eyes. While symptoms like itchy and watery eyes could be mistaken for allergies, watch out for increased yellow or green discharge and a change in color to the whites of the eye, which may indicate pink eye. Over-the-counter eye drops and a warm compress on the eyes can help soothe the irritation at home but, given how fast pink eye can spread to family and friends, it's always best to head to a doctor for medication. Sometimes doctors will prescribe an antibiotic eye drop if the infection appears to be bacterial and not viral.

When sickness strikes, it's important to be armed and ready with not only the knowledge of the common symptoms of these pediatric health issues, but also the best treatment options so your child can get back to the playground in no time. Okaloosa, Santa Rosa among counties receiving Bearwise funding

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is awarding a total of \$500,000 to 10 communities to help them reduce human-bear conflicts.

BearWise funding will be used to share the cost of bear-resistant trash cans, dumpsters and other equipment that will keep bears out of trash in neighborhoods and parks. The FWC is distributing BearWise funding to each of the 10 communities that applied for it.

The Legislature and Gov. Rick

Scott provided \$500,000 this year to the FWC to cost-share with local governments in areas with high levels of human-bear conflicts. At least 60 percent of the funding had to go to communities with BearWise ordinances that require trash be kept secure from bears in all or parts of their jurisdictions.

The FWC awarded 69 percent of this year's funding to four communities with BearWise ordinances, including Okaloosa County - \$18,000 to purchase hardware to modify trash cans to make them bear-resistant in the southern portion

of the county; and Santa Rosa County - \$58,000 to modify dumpsters to make them bear-resistant at restaurants and other businesses in the southern portion of the county.

Since 2007, a total of \$2.1 million of BearWise funding has been provided to local governments. Over \$1.4 million of this was provided with support from the Legislature and Gov. Scott and \$680,000 from the Fish & Wildlife Foundation of Florida using proceeds of the Conserve Wildlife license plate.

Learning through repetition

It's always helpful to learn lessons from hurricanes that might be useful to those of us who are threatened by them six months of every year. Unfortunately, some of the lessons many will learn the hard way from Hurricane Florence are repeats from past storms. Here are two of them:

1. Only 3 percent of North Carolina homeowners have flood insurance.

The figure is 9 percent in South Carolina and 2 percent in Georgia. I haven't seen the figures for some of the other states Florence threatens to inundate, but I would be surprised if they are much higher.

I wrote about these figures in July because the next time a hurricane hits Terrebonne and Lafourche parishes here in Louisiana, the residents here will find themselves in the same predicament that is about to play out along the East Coast.

Thousands of homeowners in Florence's path are going to face the brutal reality that their homes — for many, their greatest investment — have been destroyed and that they will get little or no financial help to rebuild. Homeowners' insurance does not pay for flood damage. The National Flood Insurance Program is the only institution that does that — but only for people who buy policies.

Americans are about to hear the tearful pleas of Florence victims who lack the financial means to rebuild their lives. The trauma will play out in Congress, where lawmakers from flood-stricken communities will work to introduce taxpayer-financed bailout packages, but those that manage to pass won't come close to making people whole.

The same misery resulted after the 2016 floods that inundated much of Louisiana, causing an estimated \$10 billion to \$15 billion in property damage. The most money each uninsured homeowner could expect from federal aid was \$33,000, while the average payout was closer to \$10,000.

And, unless something changes drastically, the same sad scenario will occur here the next time a major storm hits. In Terrebonne and Lafourche, only about 30 percent of homeowners have flood insurance. Maybe they will listen and learn from unfortunate Florence victims who will reflect on their losses and, in many cases, question how it could happen in place that never flooded before.

2. The U.S. flood insurance program remains broken.

More than 400,000 homeowners in the Carolinas, Georgia and Virginia have flood insurance, with \$106 billion in combined coverage. R.J. Lehmann, a flood insurance specialist with the R Street Institute, a Washington-based think tank, told the McClatchy news agency that if 10 percent of those homeowners suffer flood damage, the program could face at least \$10 billion in claims.

Anybody who has followed this issue knows Congress has delayed reforms for years, and one of the results is that the National Flood Insurance Program is more than \$25 billion in debt. Lawmakers tried in 2012 with the Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act, which sought to align policies' cost with the actual risk of flooding. Congress scuttled the law, however, after some homeowners in south Louisiana and other flood-prone areas saw costs rise from a few hundred dollars a year to \$20,000 or more.

The House passed a measure in November that includes some reforms, though Louisiana lawmakers expressed concerns about potential price increases.

Women's self-defense seminars teach empowerment

CRESTVIEW — Recent local Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office seminars provided several women with tactics to protect themselves.

Ashley Bailey, who attended the Fort Walton Beach class, said, they try to hold the class three or four times a year. She is with the OCSO Crime Prevention Department.

She said the classes have taught hundreds of women self-protection. Previous attendees have also come back for refresher courses, and brought others with them: mothers and daughters, friends and relatives.

"It's a great, empowering class, and it's great for women to come out and feel empowered to learn how to protect themselves," she said.

At the Crestview session, attendees warmed up for a few minutes, then instruction began.

They learned how to maintain their balance during an attack. For instance, standing on one leg and lifting the other up for leverage while swinging at an assailant makes it easy for them to pull you off balance.

In addition to physical defense, Amanda Powell, Gordon Martial Arts program director, covered the potential issue of women ignoring their instincts out of politeness.

"(Never) ignore that alarm that goes off inside of you, because we try to be so nice

to people and give people the benefit of the doubt ... Do not feel bad for feeling uncomfortable or feeling like something's wrong ... If you feel odd, if you feel an alarm, you should listen to that alarm."

She gave an example of being at a gas station and someone approaching her suspiciously. It is important to call attention to that person and identify their intentions.

To illustrate her point, she backed away rapidly and held up her hands up in front of her, palms outward, loudly saying, "Hi sir, how you doing? Can I help you with something?"

Call attention to them, she said. It may be weird, but safety is priority.

"Let him worry about why I'm being weird, right? I'd rather be overly cautious than underprecautious," she said.

That person may stop and check on you, and ask, "I'm just throwing this trash away — are you okay?" she said. But if that person doesn't acknowledge you and keeps moving toward you, start backing up and preparing yourself.

Powell told attendees if they see other people, especially other women in a dangerous situation, never be afraid to call the cops or feel guilty for identifying someone to authorities.

"It is so much better to send somebody out there to investigate or to do their portion of their job, than to not do anything and then there's an issue later on," she said.

Fact check with these 5 online resources

We hear heralds of doom spouting about fake news left and right these days, whether on the internet or on TV. The President even tweets about it (or tweets it, depending on your personal stance!)

Perhaps the most frequent place we encounter it is social media. Especially on Twitter and Facebook, it's superbly simple to glance at something and share it a second later. So how do you distinguish what is true? Even more importantly, how can

you, just a humble Crestviewian, combat the dissemination of fake news?

As a librarian, it's my sacred duty to make sure I help people sift through the sludge and find answers. I am hardly qualified as a social media expert, but I do know a thing or two about tools to help locate quality information.

One fantastic tool to truth-check a post or email is to look it up on www.snopes.com. Snopes has been around since the mid-90's, and is widely regarded as one of the best fact-checkers available. Trust me, you didn't actually get emailed by a Nigerian prince in need of some wired cash.

To round out options for general fact-checking, similar sites include www.hoax-slayer.com and www.truthorfiction.com.

Likewise, if it's politically charged news, you may want to use the Pulitzer-winning www.politifact.com. Politifact uses a meter to distinguish what is true, a half-truth, and false. Factchecker.org is another resource freely available to assess your political readings. Using both can help sieve various biases.

It's hard not to be lured in by fear-mongering social media posts; however, with a few searches, you can help be a crusader for quality information. Oh, and you won't have to worry any more about being cursed for 15 years if you don't immediately forward a post to everyone and their mother.

their skillsets."


NWF State donated a 0.11-acre triangle of land, as well as a 0.09-acre sliver of land on the other side of the Heritage Museum building.

New bar pays homage to Destin's roots

DESTIN — Blink and you'll miss it.

The new 1835 Porch Bar beside Dewey Destin's Harborside Restaurant is kind of a secret garden, but bar manager Tarra Wixom said it's time to get the word out about the new craft cocktail bar on the Destin harbor.

"It's been open for two months now but it's still a work in progress," she said. "The whole idea of opening this outdoor space is, first of all, the view, and secondly, the opportunity to offer draft craft beer and craft cocktails."

1835 Porch Bar is owned by

Dewey Destin and is operated as a satellite bar west of Dewey Destin's Harborside Restaurant. The outdoor bar is located directly to the west of Dewey Destin's Harborside Restaurant on the back porch and sprawling cobbled patio of the adjacent dry storage building.

"This used to be a swimming pool back here, but we filled it with sand and cobbled over it to make this patio," Wixom said of the outdoor space. "A lot of people are still surprised to find us here."

The bar got its name from the year Capt. Leonard Destin found his way to what would later be called the World's Luckiest Fishing Village.

Everything on the menu is

handmade with fresh ingredients. The menu changes weekly with seasonal cocktails such as the strawberry vodka Collins and the Florida smash, and tapas such as ceviche, steamed shrimp, tuna dip and homemade pimento cheese.

"Our chef at Dewey Destin's Harborside, Jim Shirah, gets to exercise his creativity with the Porch Bar," Wixom said.

Wixom said 1835 Porch Bar was designed to be a haven for locals. With its view of the harbor, sprawling live oaks, lawn games and community events, 1835 Porch Bar aims to make the most of the cooler fall evenings.

"It's a good place to start your night," Wixom said. "We have live music coming

Beaches deal with red tide on Gulf, feces in Miami

CLEARWATER — It was a rough week for Florida's beaches, with a resurgence of red tide on the Gulf Coast and returning feces-related problems in South Florida.

Red tide returned to beaches on Saturday along Pinellas County on the Gulf Coast, bringing with it countless dead fish. In South Florida, the Florida Department of Health in Miami last week raised the number of no-swimming alerts to seven beaches because of elevated levels of bacteria that can lead to urinary tract infections and other problems.

The Tampa Bay Times reports that county employees and contractors worked through the day and night to remove dead sea-life from

beaches of Pinellas County.

"There are just too many to count," said Kelli Levy, director of environmental management for Pinellas County. "They're stacked up."

Waters on the gulf side at Fort De Soto Park were tea-colored, causing officials at the park to waive entrance fees. The water also was discolored at Madeira Beach, Redington Beach, St. Pete Beach and Pass-a-Grille.

At a foot race in Pass-a-Grille, only about a quarter of the expected crowd — 225 people — showed up for the race. The others stayed away from the smell and respiratory irritation caused by red tide.

Jenni Schmidt was one of the volunteers who passed out masks to participants since the aroma was so bad.

"It was hurting my lungs," Schmidt said. "Getting out of the car it just assaulted you."

The toxic algae bloom overran Florida's southern Gulf Coast this past summer. Red tide is a natural occurrence that happens due to the presence of nutrients in salt water and an organism called a dinoflagellate. This most-recent bloom started in November. The last toxic bloom in the Gulf happened between 2004-2006

The Miami Herald reports that some South Florida beaches have struggled in recent months with numerous advisories warning swimmers of feces-related problems in the water. Storm water runoff, wildlife, pets and human sewage are common causes for high levels of the bacteria, the Herald reports.

State asks justice to clear way for amendments

TALLAHASSEE — Saying First Amendment arguments raised by opponents are “irreconcilable with our constitutional history,” Attorney General Pam Bondi’s office Monday asked the Florida Supreme Court to overturn a ruling that could block at least three proposed constitutional amendments from going on the November ballot.

Bondi’s office filed a 44-page brief in a battle focused on proposed amendments that the Florida Constitution Revision Commission approved this spring. Leon County Circuit Judge Karen Gievers ruled Sept. 5 that the proposals should not

go on the ballot because they improperly “bundled” unrelated issues.

In doing so, Gievers sided with arguments raised by former Supreme Court Justice Harry Lee Anstead and fellow plaintiff Robert J. Barnas, who contend the bundled proposals would violate voters’ First Amendment rights. That contention stems from voters potentially having conflicting opinions about issues in the same proposal.

But the brief Monday assailed that argument, describing it as a “novel constitutional theory.” The brief pointed, for example, to state and federal constitutional changes that bundled different issues.

“In short, our constitutional

history is replete with examples of situations in which voters have been asked to vote up or down on bundled provisions addressing distinct rights and issues — including the ratification of the Constitution and the First Amendment,” the brief said. “This longstanding historical practice militates against any suggestion that the First Amendment requires arguably unrelated provisions to be adopted on a piecemeal basis.”

Anstead and Barnas last month challenged six proposed amendments approved by the Constitution Revision Commission, a 37-member panel that meets every 20 years and has unique power to place measures on the ballot.

Gievers’ decision in the case focused on three amendments because the other three were subjects of separate challenges at the Supreme Court.

But the brief filed Monday by Bondi’s office indicates the case could lead to invalidating more than the three amendments addressed by Gievers. A footnote in Gievers’ ruling said her findings “apply to all 6 of the proposed amendments” but that because of the other challenges “(no) further opinion will issue here as to those amendments.”

The three proposals blocked by Gievers included a measure that would ask voters to ban offshore oil drilling and vaping or the use of electronic cigarettes in workplaces. Gievers rejected

the suggestion that the oil-drilling and vaping proposals could be considered related.

“The court is unconvinced by the respondent’s (state’s) argument that offshore oil and gas drilling and vaping are germane as they are both environmentally related,” she wrote. “These measures are independent and unrelated and do not constitute a comprehensive plan of revision and cannot be imposed upon the voters as a unit. Voters cannot reasonably answer the statutorily required yes or no question ... without potentially being deprived of their First Amendment constitutional right to cast a meaningful vote on each independent and unrelated proposal.”

they're not mixed in with anything," Pecora said. "These trucks are emptied every day, so there is

no garbage in them when they're on a recycling route."

He said uncontaminated recyclable items ultimately end up at the Emerald Coast Utilities Authority recycling facility in Pensacola, while

contaminated items go to a landfill.

"Contamination is an enormous issue, and one pizza box (containing food residue) will result in the recycling not being accepted," Pecora said.

County spokesman Christopher Saul said the county does not have a contract with or any responsibility for Waste Pro.

"If they say they're bringing in trash (to the transfer station), then we're taking it in as

trash," Saul said.

In the county's contract with Waste Management that covers much of the unincorporated area, the mixing of recyclables with trash is prohibited, he said.

As far as we're concerned, our only provider is Waste Management, and the contract says to recycle stuff that's recyclable," he said.

Saul added that all of the county's trash is taken to the Springhill Landfill in Jackson County.

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Officials: Air Force must grow

Increased air power needed to confront China and Russia

The Air Force must grow its air power substantially by 2030 to meet rapidly evolving threats from China and Russia, senior officials said.

A new internal study found that the service needs to increase the number of operational squadrons by about 25 percent by 2030, from 312 today to 386.

The proposed changes, which have not been worked into Pentagon budget plans, would require Air Force personnel levels to grow by about 40,000 service members on

top of current growth projections, officials said. Air Force officials have not yet completed an estimate of what the increase would cost.

If approved, the addition of more than 70 new squadrons would bring the Air Force to a size not seen since the height of the Cold War, when there were

401 operational squadrons.

“Over the last 17 years we have had the luxury of being the dominant power focused on violent extremism,” Air Force Secretary Heather Wilson said Friday during a preview of the study. “We have to be clear-eyed about the world in which we live.”

“The Air Force is too small for what the nation is asking us to do,” she said.

Wilson and Gen. David Goldfein, the Air Force chief of staff, described a complex array of challenges including extremist movements, cyber threats, a resurgent Russia and, most importantly, China’s rapidly improving air capacity. Beijing has made massive military investments, improving its long-range bomber capacity

and establishing new outposts in the Pacific, and has churned out new weaponry.

That makes it even more important for the United States to maintain its edge in air operations, the officials said.

“The Cold War was a bipolar world,” Wilson said. “This is a much more complex situation.”

To meet that challenge, the Air Force must increase the number of bomber squadrons from nine to 14 and tanker squadrons from 40 to 54, the study found. Operational squadrons include bombers, airlift, cyber, combat search and rescue, and other functions. Squadrons vary in size, but range from about 100 to 1,200 people. A fighter squadron, for example, includes about 24 aircraft.

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Four dogs die in house fire



More than 150 wounded warriors and their caregivers participate in Soldiers on the Water

DESTIN — Combat wounded troops, caregivers, service dogs and active-duty military were among the large crowd on hand Saturday for the 6th Annual Soldiers on the Water event hosted by the Emerald Coast Association of Realtors.

Natalie Sayles, who lives in Atlanta, has been coming for three years. She served as an Army combat medic for 17 years and was medically discharged in 2012 after breaking both her legs during training.

Sayles said she enjoys the "camaraderie" among the veterans.

"I've been fortunate enough to take care of myself medically, so I like to try to extend that favor ... through conversation, through talking," Sayles said.

Soldiers on the Water features a free fishing trip for veterans or active-duty troops who have combat-related injuries.

It was the second time around for Elrades Wright, a 12-year Army veteran, who suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). He said the event is like "therapy."

"I have depression from pain and stuff like that, so

when you get out here, it's relaxing," Wright said. "It takes your mind off that ... It's therapeutic being around other veterans that are going through similar things."

Joe Morgan, chairman of Soldiers on the Water, said one difference this year is that veterans' caregivers could go fishing.

Caregiver Myria Britt had the largest catch — a 28.8-pound mackerel — on her first catch of the day.

Britt takes care of a retired Army captain suffering from PTSD. She decided to make the five-hour drive

from Atlanta after hearing about the event because it sounded "awesome."

"I would tell anybody about this event," Britt said. "It was really exciting and a lot of fun."

Registration began at 7 a.m., and the fishing trip lasted about four hours. Owners of 11 fishing boats volunteered their time and fishing gear.

This year's event attracted more than 150 combat-wounded troops and caretakers — the largest turnout ever.

In addition to the fishing, participants were

treated to a free dinner at Brotulas Seafood House and Steamer, which prepared their catches.

Those who didn't go fishing could take a ride on the Buccaneer Pirate Cruise or tour the Gulfarium Marine

Adventure Park on Okaloosa Island.

Morgan said Soldiers on the Water is a way to say "thank you" to those who have sacrificed for their country.

"One of the reasons that

made me do it that very first time I did it, someone said, 'it's about me,' and I get that all the time," Morgan said. "It wasn't a pity party. It was about me, and that means something."

In Okaloosa County alone, we've already seen a pair of epic overtime contests. Choctaw beat Milton in Week 2 on Tom Kiehn's OT field goal, and Navarre edged Crestview 41-35 after Josh Carter came up with the OT interception and Dante Wright scored from 9 yards out in Week 3.

Both games finished with awesome dog pile celebrations. Both games finished with closure.

Both games were simply better because they didn't end in a tie.

Voting is a privilege

Florida's primary election was Aug. 28.

In Okaloosa County there are 133,025 people registered to vote.

According to statistics from the Okaloosa Supervisor of Elections website, <https://enr.electionsfl.org/OKA/Summary/1923>, only 35,254 voted in this primary, or 26.5 percent of those eligible.

What a sad turnout. There were other issues on the ballot, besides Governor, U.S. Senator and Congressional Representatives. There were three school board positions, as well as local issues.

Less than 30 percent of eligible voters decided the issues for our county and cities.

It is very easy to vote in Okaloosa County.

There are early voting days as well as convenient polling places near our homes.

Voting is a privilege, one that our forefathers fought a war over.

When King George III was on the throne, he and Parliament ruled the "Colonies" as the U.S.A. was known at that time. The colonists, who were British citizens, had no say in how their country was ruled, how much tax they paid and how the taxes were spent.

Taxes were gathered and spent the way the king and the British Parliament wanted, and in some cases taxes went into the royal coffers. The slogan in the colonies became, "No taxation without representation," meaning the colonists wanted a say in where there taxes were spent and taxation was one of the main points for the Declaration of Independence from Great Britain.

The city of Crestview's voters decided to hire a City Manager who is answerable to the elected City Council rather than the taxpayers.

There were 1,683 who voted Yes; 1,132 voted No.

I looked up salaries

and the median salary for a City Manager is about \$86,376. Along with the City Manager's salary, there will be other costs, such as a pension, city vehicle, personal assistant and so on (https://www.payscale.com/research/US/Job=City_Manager/Salary).


I don't live in the city, however, for a city that has 23,567 residents (more or less), this seems a huge expense to undertake. A total of 551 votes decided the city would take on this financial responsibility.

When taxes, building permits and other city service rates rise, remember that to have a voice in taxation and other city matters, one must vote.

We are fortunate to live in a country where we can freely vote. We need to make our voices heard by taking the time to cast an informed ballot.

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

Since then, at different times, large groups of people have come to North America from Europe, Asia, Africa, and Central and South America.

In fact, even if you and your parents were born in the United States, your family may be able to trace its roots to another country.

Why immigrate?

Immigrants have come to the United States for many reasons. Some were looking for land to farm or better jobs. Others wanted to freely practice their religion, or they were unhappy with the government in their homeland.

Today, immigrants may be trying to escape harsh governments or military organizations in their home countries. In some parts of the world, people are persecuted, or treated in a harmful way, because of their religion or race.

Immigration's effects

Immigration adds a lot to the culture of a nation. People from other countries bring new ideas, customs, foods and languages to our communities.

But immigration also puts pressure on a country. Sometimes it's difficult for people of different backgrounds to get along. Added people can strain a nation's resources, such as energy, water and food supplies, housing, jobs, health care and education.

Becoming a citizen

If a lawful permanent resident wants to become a citizen, he or she must apply for naturalization. The U.S. government will check the immigrant's history and make sure he or she is eligible.

Naturalized citizens have the same rights and responsibilities as native citizens, except they cannot be president of the United States.

Solving a problem

Some immigrants arrive in the U.S. illegally. In other words, they come into the country without permission, called a visa, from the government.

The problem of illegal immigration is a big one that presidents and Congress have not been able to solve. Recently, you may have heard about families being detained, or held, on our border with Mexico after trying to enter the U.S. illegally. This is just one part of the problem.

Lawmakers have many different ideas about how to solve our immigration issues, from building a wall on the border between the U.S. and Mexico to refusing to allow any immigrants at all.

It will take a lot of cooperation and creative new ideas to solve this challenge for our country.

Cornbread Casserole

CRESTVIEW — This story began with one wounded warrior and his wife's desire to help another wounded warrior by donating their puppy to become a service dog.

On Friday, David McCaulla, a veteran from Mississippi, met Crestview residents Jennifer and Benjamin Garcia, who donated a Dogo Argentinian puppy that will be McCaulla's service dog.

After joining Operation Heal Our Patriots (OHOP), a religious organization centered around healing for wounded veterans and their spouses, Benjamin, a 14-year Army veteran, said he wanted to do something for other wounded warriors like himself.

"One thing I learned about being at OHOP is there's actually a lot of people out there that care about you, and a lot more people like us that are dealing with the same issues," Benjamin said. "I just want to pay it forward."


Jennifer began researching different organizations, and they decided to donate one of their puppies to become service dogs.

Benjamin said he knows from personal experience the positive effect these dogs can have on wounded veterans.


Two copies of the book are also available for checkout from the library's local authors shelf. When it came to picking the items featured in the exhibit, McDaniel chose them based on their historical significance.

Jeff and his wife, Tina, gathered ideas for games and researched different locations with a decent amount of traffic.

McCaulla served in the Army Infantry for nine years and currently suffers from post traumatic stress disorder as well as back and leg issues.

The donation from the Garcia family comes after McCaulla had been searching for a service dog, and he said he was "very grateful" for the donation and company.

"The biggest thing with the service dogs is somebody's there with you all the time," McCaulla said.

Although McCaulla received the puppy Friday, the dog will go through training with Britnee Kinard, founder of the non-profit

organization The SD Gunner Fund in Claxton, Georgia. Kinard said she trains about 12 to 15 service dogs a year for wounded warriors and special-needs children.

The puppy donated by the Garcia family will go through 8 to 18 months worth of training, depending on the dog's capabilities. Kinard said she was glad that Jennifer reached out to her about donating this rare breed to become a service dog.

"We're excited to take on this challenge of learning and training this breed, and really helping try to make her wish come true because she really wants this dog to be a service dog," Kinard said.

McCaulla will be present for part of the training and plans to move closer to the training location.

"The collection was 45 years of thoughtful accumulation and careful conservation by a caretaker of baseball history. He bequeathed his life's work to me while he was still alive (so he could see his

son enjoy them)," J.J. said. After receiving that inheritance, J.J. began a quest to collect a museum-quality super set (every example known to exist, including all variations), from a 1-cent wrapper through two salesman sample cards. Sample cards were used to sell products in 1956 and discarded after use, which makes them rare. His dad's Topps set

is the subject of the third section of "Papyophilia." Over the past year, the book became a guide for other collectors, some of whom have contacted J.J. online. As a result, he said, "I have been invited to serve as the resident expert on topics like vintage Yankee baseball cards and 1956 Topps set-building. On Facebook, I advise more than 1,000 collectors in

three different forums." When asked if baseball is still America's national pastime, he said, "Football has surpassed baseball in popularity. With that said, in my opinion, baseball is a national treasure that should be celebrated above all other pastimes." He said it is one of the most detailed, with game statistics being listed on cards as far back as the 1800s.

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
