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## “It’s just part of our blood to love it”

### Baker farmers recognized for advanced farming techniques

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BAKER — Surrounded by 2,500 acres of cotton and peanut farm in Baker, James Marshall, his wife Helen, and their son Nick reflect on farming in today’s world.

“It’s a job that you’re going to get out of it whatever you put in it just like anything else,” James said. “You work hard at it, you’re going to get rewarded down the line.”

The Marshall family works “can to can’t” from spring to fall. “It takes a special person to be able to do it,” James said.

“It’s a lot of hours,” Nick said. The Marshall family has been farming for over 40 years. James began farming at his father’s farm in Jay when he was 18. He moved to Baker in the 70s and began Marshall Farms in 1977. Nick began farming with his father in 1999 after graduating from Baker School.

Marshall Farms recently received a County Alliance for Responsible Environmental Stewardship (CARES) award by the Florida Farm Bureau Federation for their advanced farming

techniques.

These include paying a fee for genetically modified or “BT” cotton plants meant to minimize spraying of harmful insecticides and the strip-till practice — plowing a smaller strip for erosion control.

They also use a GPS tracking system on their fertilizer and spraying machines keeping them from over-saturating crops.

Although some new advances in farming are environmentally beneficial, they’re pricey. One new piece of equipment they looked into buying was at least \$300,000.

## Healing Hoof Steps partners with Veteran’s Court for horse therapy services

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CRESTVIEW — An equine therapy group demonstrated their services for Okaloosa County’s Veterans Court administration.

In attendance of the demonstration was Judge Angela Mason, presiding over Veteran’s Court, an officer from Okaloosa County Sheriff’s Office, and administration from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

This demonstration marked the beginning of a partnership between Okaloosa County Veteran’s Court and Healing Hoof Steps for veterans in need of therapy services.

Located in Crestview, Healing Hoof Steps offers assisted therapy and learning services to anyone suffering from mental and behavioral health issues.

This type of therapy is unlike any other in the Crestview area.

Affiliated with Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association (Eagala), Healing Hoof Steps uses a combination

of activities with the horses and communication with a licensed mental health counselor to help clients actively work through their issues and find effective solutions.

“Instead of sitting in an office with bad paint and bad wallpaper talking about your feelings for an hour, you actually come out and work with a therapist in the arena outside with the horses,” Narissa Jenkins, founder of Healing Hoof Steps, said.

Jenkins refers to this type of therapy as “experiential.”

“Especially when it comes to veterans dealing with (post traumatic stress disorder), there’s not as much talking,” Jenkins said. “A lot of it’s more doing and finding ways to work through anxiety and depression.”

The horses at Healing Hoof Steps are used to help clients with emotional growth, Jenkins said.

“It creates a unique learning environment,” Jenkins said. “... Sometimes you see a reflection of yourself in the horse. It’s pretty powerful stuff.”

### Baker School student receives award from congressman for volunteer services

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BAKER — A 6th grade student at Baker School received a Presidential Volunteer Service Award from Congressman Matt Gaetz Sept. 18 in Pensacola.

“I’m very honored,” Kadance Fredericksen, 11, said.

Kadance, also a beauty queen, began doing community service after entering a pageant that required at least 3 hours of service.

“From there, all she wanted

to do was serve,” Lisa Fredericksen, Kadance’s mother, said.

Kadance used her wooden lemonade stand featured in front of her home, which she called “Kadance’s Lemonade Stand,” as a fundraiser raising money for the Ronald McDonald House.

She charged \$1 per glass of lemonade. In three years, Kadance has raised over \$14,000 for the non-profit organization helping sick children and their families with financial needs.

Just shy of her \$7,000 goal when receiving the award, Gaetz donated \$1,000 to Kadance completing her donation to the Ronald McDonald House.

Along with her lemonade stand, Kadance has a long list of volunteer services including food drives for the Crestview Homeless Shelter and delivering 200 teddy bears she collected to the Children’s Coalition of Florida.

Lisa started entering Kadance’s volunteer hours into the Presidential Volunteer Service Award’s website two years ago. Kadance was at 120 hours when she was approved for the award.

Lisa said she is very proud of her daughter.

“There’s not words to describe it,” Lisa said.

Kadance’s name and achievements will be featured in the Library of Congress.



### TINA BEUKENKAMP 1915 - 2018

Tina Beukenkamp, a 38-year resident of Shalimar, FL passed peacefully in the presence of family on September 8, 2018, at the age of 103.

Jantina Etty was born to Jan and Alida Mensinga on January 28, 1915 in Rotterdam, the Netherlands. An accomplished athlete, Tina participated in women's crew and competitive ice skating in her youth. Her motto, "motion is lotion," kept her physically active, participating in water aerobics into her mid-90's. Her academic studies led to certification as a teacher, and her intellectual pursuits were life-long, evidenced by well-informed opinions on current events and lively discussions of the latest literature with her monthly book club.

On March 18, 1939, Tina married Dr. Radboud "Bob" Laurens Beukenkamp, PhD., an aspiring agronomist. Their 54-year journey together commenced with a honeymoon in Austria, driving through pre-war Germany on the back of a motorcycle.

The newlyweds' world was soon plunged into darkness, as Europe was engulfed by World War II and the Netherlands were invaded and occupied by Nazi Germany. The ensuing war years brought times of joy, as Tina and Bob celebrated the births of their first three children, along with harrowing times of oppression, deprivation, and hunger. They were active in 'The Resistance' (the organized



underground force fighting the Nazis.) These life stories are legendary among family and friends. Tina's trademark iron will, strong mettle, and ingenuity were forged in those years.

The post-war years of the late '40s and early '50s found Tina and family living overseas, as Bob was posted first to Buenos Aires, Argentina in diplomatic service to the Netherlands, and later to Washington, D.C., where their fourth child was born. Bob subsequently entered the private sector and the family moved to Lisbon, Portugal. In the mid '50s, Tina, Bob, and the children returned to Washington, D.C., eventually becoming U.S. citizens.

Bob's business pursuits next took the globetrotting family to Geneva, Switzerland and Mexico City. In the mid '60s, they again returned to Washington, D.C., when Bob reentered government service with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Residencies in D.C. were interspersed with diplomatic postings to Rome,

Italy and Brasilia, Brazil. Each destination brought with it another language to learn and new friendships that lasted a lifetime.

After living in New Orleans for several years, Tina and Bob retired to Shalimar in 1981. Devout parishioners of St. Simon's on the Sound, they travelled far and near proclaiming love of Christ as leaders of the Disciples of Christ movement, and Tina served on the Vestry at the young age of 100.

Tina's zest for life and insatiable curiosity were undiminished by Bob's passing in 1993. A multilingual citizen of the world, she loved engaging with fellow humans in all their cultures and ethnicities and continued to travel, visiting Indonesia, Iceland, Scotland, Scandinavia, S. America, Alaska, and Russia, among other places.

Tina was particularly devoted to her 11 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren, all of whom shared a special and very personal bond with "Oma Tina". She is survived by her children, Alida Codel, Jackie Gahan, Erik Beukenkamp and Felix Beukenkamp.


### JOHN ALLEN PARISH 1951 - 2018

# Lean on Me program evaluates disaster preparedness

FORT WALTON BEACH — Hurricanes and tropical storms can develop quickly in our area and the only way to successfully be ready is to have a plan before a storm becomes a threat. Severe weather can be catastrophic to community members of all ages, but vulnerable individuals — people with one or more disability who are 65 or older — are at the most risk.

The Okaloosa-Walton Medical Reserve Corps offers free preparedness support to vulnerable individuals and their families through an outreach program called “Lean on Me.” The Florida Department of Health program is a free service delivered by credentialed volunteers that help make this mission possible.

Program volunteers conduct in-home preparedness consulting to vulnerable Okaloosa and Walton County residents. They ensure community members know if they are going to shelter in place, evacuate or go to a shelter, then complete a plan and check lists to help guide the resident on assembling disaster supply kits and what actions to take.

The volunteers are trained to educate community

members on measures such as individual health conditions, pets, family members, and other needs they may have. Upon each visit, participants receive a small disaster supply box, first aid kit, flashlight, and a weather radio.

“Since the Lean on Me program began offering this free service to our community members, we’ve seen an increased confidence in our vulnerable populations. They now know what to do, where to go, and who to call during emergencies, Karen Chapman, Okaloosa Department of Health director, said.

“We’ve successfully conducted Lean on Me visits to 87 vulnerable community members in the past year and we expect that number to continue to increase.”

The OWMRC is committed to providing these services to as many vulnerable residents as possible.

# Groups come combine to support longleaf pine, other conservation efforts

Gulf Power, in partnership with the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and other groups announced its 2018 round of Longleaf Stewardship Fund grants that will benefit habitat restoration and species recovery across Northwest Florida.

The lion's share of the \$1 million — \$920,000 — has been awarded to Longleaf Alliance for work on Gulf Coast Ecosystem Plain Partnership lands. GCPEP is a collaboration of 15 public and private landowners with over 1.3 million acres of land that stretches from the Florida-Alabama border on the west, east to the Choctawhatchee River and includes the Conecuh Forest that adjoins the Blackwater River State Forest on the northern border of Santa Rosa and Okaloosa counties.

The partners take a landscape approach to conserve

and restore the dwindling longleaf pine ecosystem.

"This is the most money we've received at one time, and it's a huge step for ecosystem restoration and rare species recovery in the landscape," said Vernon Compton, the Alliance's GCPEP director.

"It will allow our Ecosystem Support Team to work across the landscape on multiple projects from helping with prescribed burns to invasive species control, and to do more work on species recovery. The Ecosystem Support Team is trained for the specialized and labor-intensive work rare species recovery requires."

The grant dollars will be used to:

at-risk species, including bobwhite quail, gopher tortoise and reticulated flatwood salamander.

- Support local environmental conservation jobs.
- Provide ecosystem support for reticulated

flatwood salamander breeding wetlands.

- fund the rescue of gopher tortoises from

construction sites in Central and South Florida and relocate them to the Eglin Air Force Base conservation lands. The project's goal is aimed at bolstering the populations to prevent the tortoises from being listed in 2023 under the federal Endangered Species Act, a development that could impact some of Eglin's training and testing operations.

The fire-adapted longleaf pine ecosystem once encompassed more than 90 million acres across the Southeast, but it has been reduced to only about 5 percent of its historical range. It supports immense biodiversity and important game species such as the bobwhite quail, wild turkey and white-tailed deer.

## The Great Recession, Great Depression and today's financial dangers

The worst financial crisis since the Great Depression," has become standard shorthand for the global financial crash and resulting severe recession. This fall, we mark the 10th anniversary of the 2008 benchmark bankruptcy of investment house Lehman Brothers.

The economic recovery was slow, but far removed from the 1930s environment. The Dow Jones Industrial Average is well above 25,000. In 2012, the 13,000 threshold was reached for the first time since 2008. Unemployment rose and remained frustratingly high, but well below the extraordinary measured level of about 25 percent during the Great Depression.

The 1929 stock market nosedive which ushered in the economic collapse was sudden and steep. From a peak of 381.17 on Sept. 3, U.S. stocks lost 25 percent in value over a tumultuous two days, and then drifted down to the historic low of 41.22 in July 1932. During the height of the selling frenzy, stocks were traded in volumes not reached again until the late 1960s.

Stocks did not return to the 1929 peak until 1954, in great contrast to our more rapid rebound. Great public suspicion as well as hostility toward bankers defined American political life for years.

In the recent crash, many banks failed and others were saved only by enormous emergency federal fund infusions. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, established during the New Deal, has remained up to the task of protecting individual depositors.

The principal catalyst of the recent crash was the great volume of high-risk debt centered on real estate, originating in the United States but unfolding worldwide. Both funds and fears today can quickly move globally, fueled by electronic transfer networks. The G-20 major nations, in particular central bankers, now engage in continuing coordination of national policies.

The U.S. central bank provided leadership in aggressive bond buying. Traditionally, the money supply and interest rates have been principal financial tools. The Fed today controls a relatively small share of total dollars. At the same time, the global reserve role of the currency has facilitated the radical bond purchase initiative.

Commercial banks are more regulated again, with capital requirements raised along with their rescue. In 2010, the comprehensive Dodd-Frank Act became law, including the important initiative of Paul Volcker to separate commercial from investment banking funds.


Recovery predictably has brought political mischief. Bank lobbyists work hard to reverse the new bank regulations, with some success. Republican tax cuts mean our federal deficit and national debt are growing rapidly.

There is more subtle evidence of long-term dangers. Major investment banks collapsed with Lehman. They generally survived the Great Depression. Investment bankers ain't what they used to be.

During the 1930s, humorist Will Rogers became enormously popular. Homespun rural homilies contrasted with big-city financiers.

Inspired by Will Rogers, here are three direct down-to-earth guidelines. First, as a worker, take pride. The United States — you and me — has the most productive and largest economy in the world.

When tiny Mark Zuckerberg of Facebook sat on a cushion to testify on privacy before the Senate, his condescension was palpable. First, the 75-year-old senators had no idea how to even access their iTunes password and should not have been the ones questioning him. Second, by day two Zuckerberg was so confident he was not going to be punished that he intimidated some senators by mentioning their favorite pets, mothers' maiden names and where they met their spouses.

Along with equipment costs, farmers face battles with nature and economics. Tariffs are a source of uncertainty causing a revenue drop for some farmers.

James said the current tariffs are "killing us" because China is not buying cotton produced in the U.S.

Nick, monitoring cotton prices on his phone, said cotton dropped 150 points or a penny and a half that morning. For Marshall Farms, that means losing

about \$30,000 a day. "The crazy part about it is that there's no rhyme or reason for it because the United States crop this year is in bad shape...The

only good cotton this year is in the southeast," Nick said.

James and Nick also mentioned a recurring fear — weather, namely

drought and hurricanes. The peak season for hurricanes is June 1 to Nov. 30 — the cotton and peanut harvest period.

If Marshall Farms had experienced a hurricane like Florence, James said all of their cotton would be ruined. Some fellow farmers in North Carolina have, he said.

Most farmers purchase crop insurance to protect losses during a natural disaster, which James said, for their farm, is about \$135,000 a year.

Still, the Marshall family can't imagine not farming.

"We've all grew up on a farm. It's just part of our blood to love it," Helen said.


