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Council approves millage rate, budget

CRESTVIEW — In the less-than-15-minute final hearing, city council members unanimously voted with one member missing to adopt the budget and millage rate for the next fiscal year.

The millage rate will stay the same at 6.9 mills, equivalent to \$6.90 for every \$1,000 of

assessed property value.

Millage rates are used to calculate local property taxes, and Crestview's rate will allow the city to collect around \$7 million in property taxes.

Crestview's millage rate remains the highest in Okaloosa County.

The \$37.5 million budget was approved without changes.

Both the budget and millage rate will go into effect on

Oct. 1, 2018 and end on Sep. 30, 2019.

Included in the budget is the city manager position, which was also discussed in a workshop meeting on the same night.

According to the workshop agenda, some of the city manager's responsibilities will include:

- Attendance of all meetings
- Monthly financial reports, "unless otherwise directed by

the council"

- Working with the city clerk and other departments on the budget

- Advising the council on financial status and needs of the city

- Maintaining public and media relations

Qualifications were also listed on the agenda.

Although some council members prefer to have a city manager from Crestview, they

are not required to live in the city.

According to the agenda, the city manager's salary will be "negotiable."

However, the next fiscal year budget has \$300,000 allotted for the city manager position.

The council is expected to begin accepting applications on Oct. 9.

Once a log cabin mission, now a full-time church

CRESTVIEW — Bobbie Brown, 84, sifts through memories with Woodlawn Baptist Church's senior adult pastor George Katzman laughing and reflecting on a meaningful part of her life since she was 20 years old — her church.

For 62 years, Bobbie saw a church grow from a small log cabin with six members to the full-time ministry it is today.

"When I think about Woodlawn history, I get a little sentimental and a lot humble," Bobbie said. "And, sometimes I cry."

Woodlawn Baptist Church began in 1955 as a mission church — a church receiving support from other ministries.

First Baptist Church borrowed money from the Home Mission Board, which they used to purchase a log cabin in Crestview.

Thus began the Woodlawn Baptist Mission.

Bobbie, from Laurel Hill, was attending her parent's church and First Baptist Church prior to Woodlawn Baptist Mission.

Water line break occurs on Carver Avenue

CRESTVIEW — Soggy ground caused by a broken water line required several hours of work Monday morning on Carver Avenue in Crestview.

Rita Florence, who lives on Carver across from Evelenar Missionary Baptist Church, said her sister, who lives with her, knocked on her door and asked her if she knew what was happening in their front yard.

"She said, 'There's something wrong. The mailbox is gone.'"

"I was coming out here and then the water just shot up and the whole road collapsed. They're trying to get the mailbox out now," Florence said.

Part of Florence's front

yard and the road next to it had become waterlogged when a fire hydrant pipe below ground burst open. Her mailbox, which had a brick surround, sunk into the dirt underneath it, and the paved road buckled as well.

"I'll have to go to the post office and tell them to hold the mail," Florence said.

Auburn Water System employees arrived that morning and began digging to uncover and fix the pipe that had burst, with Okaloosa Gas employees on stand by in case gas lines were affected.

AWS General Manager Doug Sims said the company uses two types of water lines, one of which is for potable water residents use for drinking, cooking and the like.

O SON LUDWIG 1929 - 2018

O Son (Joanne) Ludwig, age 89, passed away on Sunday September 16, 2018, at Hawthorn House, Shalimar, FL. Joanne was born on February 5, 1929, in Seoul, South Korea, to Mr. Hyong Chae Park and Mrs. Soon Suk Oh. She was the youngest of a family of three sisters, one brother, two half-sisters, and one-half brother. She is survived by husband Richard; three sons, Randall, Raymond and Russell; eight grandchildren, Reece, Riley, Ross, Rachel, Ragan, Ryan, Erika and Kevin. She is also survived by numerous nephews, nieces, grand-nephews, and grand-nieces.

Joanne graduated from the most prestigious private high school in Korea and was a young and popular elementary school teacher when the Korean War broke out in 1950. Her father was a spiritual leader and founded a school for girls in Seoul, South Korea. Her family was forced to flee Seoul due to the invasion by the North. Her mother, aged 52, died during their escape during the war. Joanne later, working in the Base Exchange, met Richard Ludwig, of the United States Air Force, and they married in 1959. Joanne immigrated with Richard to New England in 1962 and lived near his family there. She embarked on her new life in the United States as a "promised land" which would provide wide-open opportunities for her young family.

Joanne lived in Niagara Falls, NY, Bangor, ME, and in Richard's ancestral family home in Rockland, ME during her husband Richard's service in the Air Force. Upon Richard's retirement from the United States Air Force in 1968, the Ludwig family moved to Long Beach, CA. Joanne lived and raised her family in Long Beach, until Richard and Joanne retired and moved to Niceville, FL in 1998. Joanne and Richard resided in Bluewater Bay in Niceville for twenty years and frequently visited family and friends in CA, ME, OH, and Canada. Most recently Joanne and Richard resided at Hawthorn House (Air Force Enlisted Village).

Joanne was a very strong woman with a fierce determination. Her dream was for her family to achieve success and happiness in the United States. She was head of her household for a year while Richard was serving overseas. During this time, she refurbished his inherited ancestral home in Rockland, ME. After raising her young children, Joanne began driving and worked as a seamstress at Newport Fashions in Long Beach, CA. She worked hard, saved money and bought a cabin in Big Bear, CA where she and her family vacationed often. She eventually became a successful small business owner. During the course of her career, Joanne owned and operated Ludwig's Coffee Shop and Diner, and the Tenderloin Restaurant. She also made successful real estate ventures in both California and Florida. Joanne's



hobbies included painting, knitting, sewing, furniture refinishing/upholstery, cooking, gardening, camping, travelling, and playing cards. Her idea of a pleasant and enjoyable time was playing Hearts, Pinochle, or Canasta with her family and friends. She also enjoyed watching her television in the kitchen while cooking, or at the end of the day. She particularly enjoyed watching and discussing politics on cable TV.

Joanne placed a high value on excellence. She instilled the importance of education in her sons and pushed them to excel in all things in life, particularly education; she was a Renaissance woman. She was the primary influence for her sons Randall to graduate from UCLA, Raymond to graduate from Stanford University, and Russell to graduate from California State University, Long Beach. She was very proud of her sons' success in school and careers.

God has always been an important force in Joanne's life. Joanne raised her children with a Christian upbringing at the Wrigley Heights Baptist Church of Long Beach, CA., where she was a member of the choir. Joanne was a strong, devoted and longstanding member of the All Nations Baptist Church of Mary Esther, Florida. Joanne was instrumental in the establishment of the church in 2009 at the current location at Mary Esther, FL. She was a treasurer at the church for 8 years. Joanne made many close friends at All Nations Baptist Church, whom she loved dearly, and who provided caring spiritual support during the end of her life. The Ludwig Family will always be grateful for the faithfulness and love of her church family. Joanne loved her children and was a strong, wise, kind caring mother. on current events and lively discussions of the latest literature with her monthly book club.

On March 18, 1939, Tina married Dr. Radboud "Bob" Laurens Beukenkamp, PhD., an aspiring agronomist. Their 54-year journey together commenced with a honeymoon in Austria, driving through pre-war Germany on the back of a motorcycle.

The newlyweds' world was soon plunged into darkness, as Europe was engulfed by World War II and the Netherlands were invaded and occupied by Nazi Germany. The ensuing war years brought times of joy, as Tina and Bob celebrated the births of their first three children, along with harrowing times of oppression, deprivation, and hunger. They were active in 'The Resistance' (the organized underground force fighting the Nazis.) These life stories are legendary among family and friends. Tina's trademark iron will, strong mettle, and ingenuity were forged in those years.

The post-war years of the late '40s and early '50s found Tina and family living overseas, as Bob was posted first to Buenos Aires, Argentina in diplomatic service to the Netherlands, and later to Washington, D.C., where their fourth child was born. Bob subsequently entered the private sector and the family moved to Lisbon, Portugal. In the mid '50s, Tina, Bob, and the children returned to Washington, D.C., eventually becoming U.S. citizens.

Bob's business pursuits next took the

globetrotting family to Geneva, Switzerland and Mexico City. In the mid '60s, they again returned to Washington, D.C., when Bob reentered government service with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Residencies in D.C. were interspersed with diplomatic postings to Rome, Italy and Brasilia, Brazil. Each destination brought with it another language to learn and new friendships that lasted a lifetime.

After living in New Orleans for several years, Tina and Bob retired to Shalimar in 1981. Devout parishioners of St. Simon's on the Sound, they travelled far and near proclaiming love of Christ as leaders of the Disciples of Christ movement, and Tina served on the Vestry at the young age of 100.

Tina's zest for life and insatiable curiosity were undiminished by Bob's passing in 1993. A multi-lingual citizen of the world, she loved engaging with fellow humans in all their cultures and ethnicities and continued to travel, visiting Indonesia, Iceland, Scotland, Scandinavia, S. America, Alaska, and Russia, among other places.

Tina was particularly devoted to her 11 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren, all of whom shared a special and very personal bond with "Oma Tina". She is survived by her children, Alida Codel, Jackie Gahan, Erik Beukenkamp and Felix Beukenkamp.

A memorial service will be held at 2 pm on Saturday, October 6, 2018 at St. Simons on the Sound Episcopal Church, followed by a reception. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to St. Simon's Episcopal Church, 28 Miracle Strip Pkwy SW, Fort Walton Beach, FL 32548.

Panel to review possible sales-tax projects

SHALIMAR — The Okaloosa County Commission recently approved the appointment of five local residents to an advisory committee that potentially would give recommendations on the county's proposed half-cent sales tax-funded projects.

On Nov. 6, voters will decide whether to approve the county's 10-year, local option half-cent sales tax referendum.

If approved by a simple majority of voters, the tax

would take effect Jan. 1. It is expected to generate an estimated \$17 million annually.

Much of the potential sales tax revenue would help pay for infrastructure projects such as road and stormwater work in the unincorporated area and local municipalities.

If the referendum passes, members of the Infrastructure Surtax Advisory Committee would provide recommendations "to assure the public

that those projects selected for funding are adequately reviewed and will provide the greatest benefit to the citizens," according to county information.

Each committee member's term would run concurrently with the term of the commissioner who appointed him or her. The committee would be required to meet at least twice a year.

Here is information on the committee appointees:

- Commission Chairman Graham Fountain chose Henry Berry, a former fire chief of the Destin Fire Control District

and a former county Sheriff's Office employee

- Commission Vice Chairman Kelly Windes chose Jim Foreman, a former Destin City Council member

• Commissioner Carolyn Ketchel chose retired Brig. Gen. Robert Buhrow

- Commissioner Nathan Boyles selected Katie Sharon, who is a portfolio manager with BBVA Compass Bank in the Destin/Fort Walton Beach market

• Commissioner Trey Goodwin selected Matt Turpin, branch project manager for Bank of England Mortgage in Fort

Walton Beach.

"We have really good representation here" on the committee, Fountain said at last week's commission meeting.

County Administrator John Hofstad said staff will provide information on the county's potential half-cent sales tax-funded projects at the Oct. 2 commission meeting.

Ted Corcoran, president/CEO of the Greater Fort Walton Beach Chamber of Commerce, recently said that the county's municipalities have not yet completed their lists of potential projects.

Veterans support VA medical marijuana bill

PANAMA CITY BEACH – After his experiences during the Vietnam War, disabled Marine veteran Larry Striblin said medical marijuana helps him sleep.
 Striblin has post traumatic stress disorder and thinks the VA should be able to prescribe medical marijuana for veterans. So does U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson (D-Fla.), who recently co-filed legislation with Sen. Brian Schatz (D-Hi.) that directs the VA to “conduct research on the effects of medical marijuana on veterans who are in pain and how prescribing marijuana to veterans can be used to reduce opioid abuse among veterans,” according to a news release.
 “It can get us off a lot of drugs,” Striblin said.
 In 2011, the National Institute of Health reported

veterans being seen by the VA were twice as likely as civilians to overdose on opiates.
 The bill also creates a “temporary, five-year safe harbor protection” for veterans using medical marijuana. While VA doctors can't currently prescribe medical marijuana since it's still federally illegal, Florida is one of many states that allows medical marijuana use under certain circumstances.
 Several veterans in Bay County said they support the legislation and veterans using VA-prescribed marijuana to at least some extent. Here are the takes of four other Bay County veterans.
John Kittler
 John Kittler, who served in the Navy from 1975 to 2005, is skeptical about medical marijuana's benefits. Kittler cited a 2017 medical study, prepared for the VA and other agencies,

that said cannabis was overall associated with a higher risk of short-term adverse effects in reviews examining effects on chronic pain. The study also said heavy smoking of marijuana may have the potential to cause adverse pulmonary effects over an extended period of time.
 “I'm not discounting the anecdotal evidence because if you feel better, you feel better,” Kittler said. “I agree with the conclusions of the study. The body of evidence at this time says it's not advisable to use it for veterans.”
Dave Hunsberger
 A disabled Air Force veteran who served from 1982 to 2004, Hunsberger said it should be prescribed if the VA cuts back on opioid prescriptions. Hunsberger isn't fond of the pain medication he currently has to take.

Ken Waringa
 A Vietnam veteran who served in the Navy, Waringa doesn't have a problem with the VA prescribing medical marijuana if they document that it helps patients. Waringa said some people “swear it helps them out a lot” and enough states and studies are coming along to justify the benefits.
 “Even if it's just psychological, if it's helping them out, it's a good thing,” Waringa said. “In some instances, it might (help). There are circumstances to be prescribed and circumstances not to.”
Anna Miner
 An Army veteran who served during the Korean and Vietnam wars, Miner said medical marijuana could work if it's treated like other pain

medications. People should be able to use the medication as long as they don't abuse it, she said.
 “The time has come where we need to seriously consider using it as an alternative to the opioids that we're dishing out now,” Miner said. “It has to be regulated. It has to be given out at the appropriate time and place. It's just like anything else. Aspirin is good for some people and it's not good for others.”
 However, Miner did wonder about veterans who have to be drug-tested if they work in government jobs.

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Gone, but not forgotten

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FORT WALTON BEACH — A pile of rubble sits on Miracle Strip Parkway where the Dolphin Inn once stood.

The structure, which was built in 1957 and became a local landmark, was demolished Tuesday to make room for a new motel under a new name.

“I just wanted something that looked nicer,” said Sam Patel, who has owned and managed the inn since 1999.

Patel said the demolition should be completed this week and the construction of the new motel — to be named Hilton 2 — will begin in October. However, City Manager Michael Beedie said the city has not yet received a development order submission, the first step in


the building approval process with the city.

Before it was the Dolphin Inn, the business was called the Papagaya Motel, which reportedly had the city’s first swimming pool, according to Cissy Wyninegar who grew up in the area. It preceded

many buildings on Miracle Strip Parkway, and can be seen in old pictures surrounded by woods.

“Oh, it was a big hit,” she said, remembering the trouble she got into there as a teenager.

Wyninegar and some friends caught a shark on

the Destin bridge and put it on the back of her 1950 Plymouth. They didn’t know what to do with the shark so they brought it to the motel and threw it in the pool.

“I think it hit the papers,” she said. “I can remember my dad saying, ‘Do you girls know anything about the shark in the pool?’”

Wyninegar wasn’t the only teen to get into some trouble at the motel. It was a popular place to go “pool hopping” in the summertime.

“When I first came to this area in 1970, I lived in the Miramar (Apartments) directly across (from) this place,” Mick Privette said on the Facebook page titled Fort Walton Beach: What We Did. “I do remember someone putting an alligator in the swimming pool one night.”

Charles Burford said he worked at the front desk in 1968-69 while attending Okaloosa Walton Junior College. He remembers the rock band The Classics IV pulling up one day in pink Corvettes and

renting some rooms.

“I got to visit them in their rooms, and they were extremely nice,” Buford said. “I used to bring friends there for pool parties. Fun place to work at age 19.”

Amanda Ashe Kofroth, a Fort Walton Beach native, was also employed there as her first summer job when she was 15.

“My husband and I spent our wedding night at the Papagaya in March, 50 years ago,” Melba Barnes Poole said. “My sister lived here in Fort Walton Beach and paid for the room for us as a gift.”

The Dolphin Inn has had its fair share of scandals in recent years.

In 1999, a man barricaded himself in a room and threatened to detonate an explosive. The motel had to be evacuated. In 2001, a woman was murdered in a second-floor room.

The Okaloosa County Sheriff’s Office tracked down five burglars to the motel in December 2017. In May 2018, the Fort Walton Beach Police Department recovered a missing juvenile and a large amount of drugs in a room.

One Saturday afternoon, Bobbie said the mission's pastor visited their home inviting them to the mission.

In January of 1956, Bobbie and her late husband, J. W. Brown, attended the mission's first Sunday night service in the cold log cabin with a broken fire place behind the preacher, one "naked" light that was just a light bulb hanging from the ceiling, and slatted pews Bobbie said were uncomfortable.

Three people not including her and her husband attended the service, Bobbie said.

At the first Sunday night service, J. W. became the first person to profess his Christian faith, according to Bobbie. He was also the first person to partake in baptism at the mission.

Bobbie said she moved her letter of membership from her church in Laurel Hill to the mission after that Sunday night service.

Although they were small, Bobbie said the church started on a good note with a pastor, a full set of Bible studies for Sunday school, and mission programs.

"We had Bible school, and we had one little boy that first year jump out of the screen window," Bobbie said.

Bobbie was involved in many parts of the church including the first five-person choir.

"We would sing and you had to watch

— bugs would fly in your mouth," Bobbie said.

She also taught Sunday school classes and kept the church's records.

In one year, Woodlawn grew from a mission to a full-time church that no longer relied on help from other ministries.

But, this required hard work of members like Bobbie and her "dear friends" who believed in their cause.

"We had doubts, but our faith really helped us out," Bobbie said.

All of the labor, the church members did themselves from cleaning bathrooms to building Sunday school rooms. Katzman described it as "see a need, meet a need."

In 1958, the church moved out of the log cabin into a white cinder block sanctuary, one that Bobbie said actually had air conditioning.

"We had real good light there," Bobbie said as she chuckled.

From there, the church continued to expand their buildings and in 2000, had their first service in the current worship center.

"I think it was the Lord's will for it to happen," Bobbie said.

Although she's unable to attend church due to health issues, Bobbie still proudly holds on to many pieces of Woodlawn's history like a window and pew from the log cabin and other pieces of church history.

"Not a lot of people would go into a mission like that," Bobbie said. "You put more into it, but you get more out of it."

"Another is a solid line used for fire hydrants. They come in 20 foot sections that fuse together. One of the fused joints came loose," he said.

The company had to order parts set to arrive the next day, "two couplings to make that joint strong again. It's buried about 10 feet deep. We want to make sure it doesn't come undone again," Sims said.

Since the pipe was for fire hydrants, residents won't need to boil water due to the broken line.

He said the section of road would be finished off by Monday evening as a dirt road so that residents could access the area. AWS is sourcing contractors to repave it with asphalt.

Where does Kavanaugh rift leave #MeToo?

The teetering confirmation of Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court may be a harbinger of the collapse — or lasting impact — of the #MeToo movement.

Conservative prosecutors, law enforcement agencies and lawmakers are at a crossroads with their counterparts on the left who want to pursue sexual assault at all cost — no matter how long ago. In Pennsylvania, lawmakers expressed frustration with the state's statute of limitations that prohibited the prosecution of 299 out of 301 predatory priests listed in a recent bombshell grand jury report. Advocacy groups were also quick to attack the statute of limitations for blocking victims from pursuing Bill Cosby or Harvey Weinstein.

Professor Christine Blasey Ford has accused Kavanaugh of sexual assault which occurred 36 years ago, in Maryland. There is no statute of limitations for rape or sexual assault in Maryland.

According to the Washington Post, Senate Republicans have signaled that they will move ahead with Kavanaugh's confirmation in spite of Ford calling for a pause and the intervention of the FBI.

Why not have the FBI reopen Kavanaugh's background investigation? The FBI reopened Justice Clarence Thomas' background investigation in 1991 after Anita Hill came forward — or let the Montgomery County, Maryland

District Attorney's office conduct a criminal investigation.

Ford has described a sexual assault by a U.S. Supreme Court nominee who is about to take a lifetime appointment on one of the most powerful tribunals in the world.

A spokesperson for the Montgomery County Police Department told The Intercept that since "nobody has come forward to report any allegation or incident" they can't start an investigation. Don't they have televisions in Montgomery County?

Why abolish the statute of limitations if a prosecutor chooses to ignore the highest profile allegation of sexual assault in modern history with no limitations on his ability to act?

In June, the New York Times reported, "The battle over statutes of limitations for sexual assault is so fraught that it has upended traditional political alliances. Women's rights activists typically partner with progressives on political issues ... those who advocate abolishing the limits find their staunchest allies in conservative lawmakers."

As Kavanaugh's confirmation presses forward it is ironic that Senator Mitch McConnell and his GOP colleagues in the Senate are pushing for a Monday hearing — with or without Ford.

McConnell was a major force behind the effort to push out Senator Larry E. Craig, the Idaho Republican arrested at an airport in 2007 in an undercover sex sting. McConnell was the chairman of the ethics committee when Oregon Senator Bob Packwood resigned after he was accused of sexual harassment. He pushed for the resignation of Minnesota Senator Al Franken amid allegations

of sexual misconduct.

Last year, McConnell said Roy Moore, a Senate candidate from Alabama, would be unfit to serve in the senate after multiple women accused him of long ago sexual abuse.

Surprisingly, McConnell doesn't require the same level of fitness for the United State Supreme Court as he does the United States Senate.

I recently wrote that there is a purpose behind the statute of limitations. The statute, or some version of it, has been around since antiquity. There has long been a concern that individuals should not be forced to defend themselves years and years after an event that allegedly caused harm to another person.

Today Show co-host Megyn Kelly — an unlikely ally of the Trump Administration — said this week, "It's been 34 years. He (Kavanaugh) was allegedly 17 when it happened. How is he supposed to defend himself? There's a reason we have statutes of limitation in this country and that's because ... memory fades, details fade and it's impossible for him to prove a negative."

As the flaws of abolishing the statute of limitations are laid bare — the challenge for victim advocates is to convince the public that victims — however long ago their victimization — are entitled to be heard whether in a courtroom or a senate hearing room.

Is there a 'sweet spot' for sodium intake?

Please pass the salt and start the conversation. Some new research finds average salt consumption is safe for heart health, but other experts disagree.

Sodium — the key element in table salt — is essential for life and makes food tastier, yet the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that most Americans consume too much of it and that it's connected to high blood pressure and related health issues.

Recommendations from the American Heart Association advise restricting sodium intake to less than 2.3 grams a day (about 1 teaspoon of salt) with an ideal limit of 1.5 grams a day. Most Americans consume more: on average, 3.4 grams a day, according to the CDC.

New research from McMaster University in Ontario, Canada, however, finds that an increased salt intake isn't unhealthy except for those who eat more than 5 grams a day, the equivalent of 2.5 teaspoons of salt. Published in *The Lancet*, the research also shows that people who consume higher amounts of salt can offset any negative effects by adding fruits, vegetables, dairy, potatoes and other potassium-rich foods to their diets.

About the study

The large study followed 94,000 people, ages 35 to 70, for an average of eight years in communities from 18 countries and found a risk of cardiovascular disease and stroke only where the average sodium intake is greater than 5 grams a day.

Focusing on sodium intake and cardiovascular disease in an earlier study, "we found that both low (below 3 grams a day) and high (above 5 grams a day) of sodium is associated with a higher risk of cardiovascular events or death. So there is a sweet spot in the middle (3 to 5 grams a day of sodium) associated with the lowest risk of harm," said Dr. Andrew Mente, first author of the study and researcher at McMaster University's Population Health Research Institute.

The key seems to be potassium.

"In our data, we see that higher potassium has beneficial associations with each health outcome, including heart attacks, stroke, cardiovascular disease and total mortality. This would suggest not only a potassium effect per se, but also that potassium is a marker of an all-around healthy diet," Mente said.

Potassium is found in fruits, vegetables, nuts and dairy products.

"These are foods that are generally beneficial and can be included in an all-around healthy eating pattern," Mente said. "So follow an all-around balanced diet that contains plenty of fruit, vegetables, nuts and dairy, and don't worry about sodium restriction."

Concerns

"I'm not convinced," said Dr. Paul K. Whelton, professor of public health at Tulane University and contributor to many major dietary guidelines. The findings are unexpected, and that means responsible people should step back and ask questions about how it is biologically possible, he said.

"The one thing we know is that high blood pressure is related to cardiovascular complications. The second thing we know is that lowering blood pressure reduces the risk of cardiovascular complications. We also know that higher sodium intake is closely related to higher blood pressure. We know this. Everyone agrees. If you lower sodium, you lower blood pressure and you lower the risk of cardiovascular complications," Whelton said.

"The study has many problems. The most important is their measurement of sodium, which is fundamentally flawed," said Lawrence J. Appel, professor of medicine at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and director of the Welch Center for Prevention, Epidemiology and Clinical Research. "Elevated salt intake raises blood pressure, which is the leading cause of preventable mortality worldwide and also a major cause of substantial morbidity, particularly stroke."

- Advice on lawns,



Crestview Fire Department extinguishes vehicle, dumpster fires

CRESTVIEW — The Crestview Fire Department responded to a fully involved vehicle fire at 10 p.m. Sept. 21 at the intersection of Tallokas and Old Bethel Roads in Crestview.

Firefighters were able to quickly extinguish the blaze.

According to an online CFD Facebook post, the fire was the

result of the driver of the vehicle losing control and overcorrecting, causing the vehicle to leave the road and then return back to the roadway.

"Once the vehicle had returned to the roadway, damage from under the vehicle created friction with the roadway asphalt. It is believed that the fuel tank had ruptured and the heat caused by the roadway friction lead to the ignition of the fire," the CFD stated in the post.

No injuries were reported as a result of the fire and the vehicle was considered a total loss. The Crestview Police Department

also assisted with the incident.

The CFD also responded to several dumpster fires after 3 a.m. Tuesday in the Miramar Apartment Complex on Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard in Crestview, according to information on the CFD Facebook page.

"Firefighters arrived at the apartment complex and were able to quickly extinguish the dumpster fires. Personnel were not able to determine what, or who, caused the fires, but it is believed to be the result of criminal mischief," the CFD stated.

The fires caused minimal damage to both dumpsters and their contents, but no other property was damaged. No injuries were reported as the result of the fires. The Crestview Police Department also assisted with the incident.






American Business Women's Day is celebrated on Sept. 22. And there is indeed cause for celebration, because, in recent decades, the number of women business owners has risen sharply, to the point where nearly 40 percent of all businesses are now women-owned, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. If you are one of these owners, or thinking about becoming one, you'll always have a lot to think about when running your business, but there's also an area you can't ignore – your retirement. Specifically, you need to consider establishing your own retirement plan.

Most plans available to you are fairly easy to establish and maintain, and are not terribly costly to administer. Here are some popular options:

- Owner-only 401(k) – This plan, also known as an individual or solo 401(k), is available to self-employed individuals and business owners with no full-time employees other than themselves or a spouse. For 2018, you can put in up to 25 percent of your annual income as an "employer" contribution, and you can defer up to \$18,500 (or \$24,500 if you're 50 or older). The sum of your employer contribution and your salary deferrals cannot exceed \$55,000, or \$61,000 if you're 50 or older. You can make elective contributions on a pre- or post-tax (Roth) basis. Pre-tax contributions reduce your taxable income for the current year. Roth contributions don't offer any immediate tax benefit, but any qualified withdrawals will be 100% tax-free.

- SEP IRA – If you have just a few employees or are self-employed with no employees, you may want to consider a SEP IRA. You'll fund the plan with tax-deductible contributions, and you must cover all eligible employees. As an employer, you can contribute the lesser of 25% of your compensation (if you're also an employee of your own business) or \$55,000.

- Solo defined benefit plan – Pension plans, also known as defined benefit plans, are less common than in previous years, but you can still set one up for yourself if you're self-employed or own your own business. This plan has high contribution limits, which are determined by an actuarial calculation, and your contributions are typically tax-deductible.

- SIMPLE IRA – A SIMPLE IRA, as its name suggests, is easy to set up and maintain, and it can be a good plan if your business has fewer than 10 employees.

However, while a SIMPLE IRA may be advantageous for your employees, it's less generous to you, as far as allowable contributions go, than an owner-only 401(k), a SEP IRA or a defined benefit plan. For 2018, your annual contributions are generally limited to \$12,500, or \$15,500 if you're 50 or older by the end of the year. You can also make a matching contribution of up to 3% of your compensation. As an employer, your contributions are fully deductible as a business expense up to certain limits; as an employee, your pretax contributions reduce the amount of your taxable income for the same tax year.

Before opening any of these plans, you'll want to consult with your tax advisor on the tax issues and a financial professional on the investment aspects. But don't wait too long. You will need to work hard to keep your business thriving – so choose a retirement plan that works just as hard for you.


He said Zuppa also was

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





If you're a pessimist, that means Baker goes undefeated and loses in the state title game. If you're an optimist, it means the Gators drop a meaningless regular season contest and roll through the playoffs like the men among 1A boys they are.

Either way, they're right on track. Baker has outscored opponents 140-27 and hasn't struggled with any team on its slate thus far. Senior Junior McLaughlin seems like he could put up 200 yards and three scores in his sleep.

Choctaw Indians: C-

We had the Indians going 5-5 in our pre-season projections.

With Choctaw sitting at 1-4, that looks optimistic, though it's worth mentioning the Indians have been beset with injuries and have been forced to start third-string quarterback Isaiah Abbot multiple times.

Crestview Bulldogs: C-

We had the Bulldogs going 11-2 in our pre-season projections, likely taking a lump against a Navarre or a Thompson (Alabama) before making a run to the region final.

The hype surrounding this team was high coming into the year. Crestview had six Dandy Dozen selections and was the favorite to repeat as district champions. Starting 3-2 doesn't change that, but it does qualify as underperforming.

Fort Walton Beach Vikings: C+

We had the Vikings going 3-7 in our pre-season projections.

At 1-4, they can still make that a reality, but it doesn't mean the season has been that much fun to watch. This was going to be a rebuilding year on 400 Hollywood Blvd. and, surprise, the construction crews are still laying the foundation.

Freeport Bulldogs: C-

We had the Bulldogs going 6-4 in our pre-season projections.

Brandon Siples has been

Navarre Raiders: A+

It's been dominant at times and dramatic at others, but anyway you slice it, Navarre has exceeded expectations.

We had the Raiders going 9-3 in our pre-season projections. Through five weeks, they're undefeated with a 28-point comeback victory against Crestview and a last-second victory against then-undefeated Pine Forest.

This is a team that appears to have few weaknesses and no quit.

Niceville Eagles: B

We had the Eagles going 8-3 in our pre-season projections.

They're 4-1 with their only loss coming on the road against one of Alabama's best teams. That record is bolstered by a forfeiture win against Lincoln, though. Niceville hasn't been its usual dominant self, but it has been good enough to think the Eagles could get four more wins out of its remaining schedule.

Rocky Bayou Christian Knights: B-

We had the Knights going 3-7 in our pre-season projections.

To this point, 2-2 Rocky Bayou has won the games it was supposed to and lost the games it was supposed to. The Knights are right on track to meet or exceed that 3-7 finish.

Lice Aren't Nice

What to do

Lice are hard to get rid of. Lice products sold without a prescription will probably not get rid of all the lice on someone's hair. Head lice have probably developed resistance to these products.

If people get head lice, they may need a special shampoo from the doctor. They can also use a **nit comb** to remove nits and live lice. This treatment takes a lot of work.

The most important thing to do is to remove live lice and nits from the hair.

According to experts, it is not as important to wash all bedding, stuffed animals and clothing. Lice cannot usually live for more than 12 hours away from a person's hair.

Preventing lice

To avoid getting lice, try not to share hats, scarves, helmets or hairbrushes with other kids. At slumber parties or when playing, try not to have head-to-head contact with other kids. Lice can't fly, but they can move from one head to another.

You and your family may have had to deal with head lice — the itchy, microscopic insects that love human hair.

More kids are infested with head lice than ever before. Experts believe this is because kids are with other kids so much, in day care, classrooms and after-school activities. Experts think between 6 and 12 million American kids get head lice each year.

Let's get ahead of lice with some information about these little bloodsucking critters.

It's not about dirt

Some people believe that people who get lice are dirty. This is not true. In fact, it is just the opposite.

Lice like clean hair. It is harder for them to cling to dirty, oily hair.

Lice infest children more than adults. This is probably because kids have more contact with one another than adults do. They are more likely to come in contact with each other while playing, for example.

Girls are more likely to get lice than boys. Girls usually have longer hair, which means it may touch other hair more often.

What lice are

A louse is a type of insect with no wings. When there is only one, it is called a louse. More than one are called lice.

Different kinds of lice live on different kinds of hair. They don't usually move from one type to another.

For example, human head lice would not be happy living on your pet. They don't live on other body hair, either. They like fine hair that grows fairly close to other hairs.

What lice do

A louse is a type of **parasite**. A parasite is a plant or animal that lives in or on another living creature. This being is called a **host**. The parasite feeds off the host and gives nothing back. Some parasites may harm their hosts. Head lice do not harm humans.

Lice suck blood from the host's body. They need to feed every hour and a half.

The bloodsucking causes itching and irritation in the person infested with lice. People can sometimes feel the insects crawling through their hair.

A growing problem

A female louse may attach an oval-shaped egg to a person's hair about one-half inch from the scalp. That spot is where the best hatching temperature is.

The egg hatches after seven to 10 days. When an egg hatches, the empty louse egg is called a **nit**.

Toasted Tortellini

You'll need:

- 12 ounces cheese-filled tortellini
- 1 cup pasta or pizza sauce of your choice
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1/4 cup reduced-sodium dry bread crumbs

- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh basil

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

Baker farmers recognized for advanced farming techniques

BAKER — Surrounded by 2,500 acres of cotton and peanut farm in Baker, James Marshall, his wife Helen, and their son Nick reflect on farming in today's world. "It's a job that you're going to get out of it whatever you

put in it just like anything else," James said. "You work hard at it, you're going to get rewarded down the line."

The Marshall family works "can to can't" from spring to fall. "It takes a special person to be able to do it," James said. "It's a lot of hours," Nick said.

The Marshall family has been farming for over 40 years. James began farming at his father's farm in Jay when he was 18. He moved to Baker in the 70s and began Marshall Farms in

1977. Nick began farming with his father in 1999 after graduating from Baker School.

Marshall Farms recently received a County Alliance for Responsible Environmental Stewardship (CARES) award by the Florida Farm Bureau Federation for their advanced farming techniques.

These include paying a fee for genetically modified or "BT" cotton plants meant to minimize spraying of

BAKER — A 6th grade student at Baker School received a Presidential Volunteer Service Award from Congressman Matt Gaetz Sept. 18 in Pensacola.

harmful insecticides and the strip-till practice — plowing a smaller strip for erosion control.

They also use a GPS tracking system on their fertilizer and spraying machines keeping them from over-saturating crops.

Although some new advances in farming are environmentally beneficial, they're pricey.

One new piece of equipment they looked into buying was at least \$300,000.

Along with equipment costs, farmers face battles with nature and economics. Tariffs are

a source of uncertainty causing a revenue drop for some farmers.

James said the current tariffs are "killing us" because China is not buying cotton produced in the U.S.

Nick, monitoring cotton prices on his phone, said cotton dropped 150 points or a penny and a half that morning.

For Marshall Farms, that means losing about \$30,000 a day.

"The crazy part about it is that there's no rhyme or reason for it because the United States crop this year is in bad shape...The only good cotton this year is in the southeast," Nick said.

James and Nick also mentioned a recurring

fear — weather, namely drought and hurricanes.

The peak season for hurricanes is June 1 to Nov. 30 — the cotton and peanut harvest period.

If Marshall Farms had experienced a hurricane like Florence, James said all of their cotton would be ruined. Some fellow farmers in North Carolina have, he said.

Most farmers purchase crop insurance to protect losses during a natural disaster, which James said, for their farm, is about \$135,000 a year.

Still, the Marshall family can't imagine not farming.

"We've all grew up on a farm. It's just part of our blood to love it," Helen said.

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

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


