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Local woman sentenced to 12 years



Lorie Ann Miller killed Kentucky man in 2017 crash

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FORT WALTON BEACH — The family of Chris Reinert will never see him again, but on Monday, they got a little bit of closure as the legal proceedings against the woman charged with his death wrapped up in court.

Lorie Ann Miller, the 44-year-old Crestview woman who plead no contest last month to vehicular homicide and marijuana possession, was sentenced to 12

years in prison by Okaloosa County Circuit Judge Michael Flowers.

Miller was driving on Antioch Road south of Crestview just before 5 a.m. on April 8, 2017 when she drove across the center line, through a turn lane and struck Chris's vehicle on the front driver's side.

Chris, who was 50 years old, was driving back to his home in Crestwood, Kentucky after spending spring break in Destin with his 18-year-old son and his son's friend. Chris was killed instantly, crushed to death in front of his son and his son's friend who were riding in the car with him. Neither boy was

seriously injured.

Miller, who was also injured in the crash, faced up to 15 years in prison for the charges. She'll be required to serve at least 85 percent of her 12-year prison sentence, pay \$515 in fines and will have her driver's license revoked for three years upon her release.

Eight of Chris' family members, including his siblings and mother, as well as two of his friends and his longtime girlfriend flew in from Kentucky and Texas to attend the hearing. Five of them gave powerful victim impact statements before the court as his mother, Sue Reinert, held a

"I don't know if they're going to have that this year, but I hope they do, because I want to defend my title," she said, laughing. She especially enjoyed that their Grilling Granny judges were 20 middle- to high school-age children.

Area residents got a taste of her competitive chops when the retired

Army veteran cooked and shared simple recipes with the public Sept. 29 and 30 at the Niceville Walmart. Some attendees may have

recognized Williams from her appearances on Food Network competitions such as "Guy's Big Project" and "All-Star Academy."

"It went really well. I love it! I loved talking to them about food," she said. "It was a lot of fun."

On Saturday morning she made sweet and spicy pulled pork sliders with mild peppers and ranch dressing, and a pecan pumpkin mousse parfait that afternoon.

Sunday recipes included Asian-inspired pork fried rice and piña colada slaw with pecans.

She also showed her audience how to make substitutions for recipe requirements that may not be in stock at the grocery store. For instance, sausage

New courthouse to share history

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CRESTVIEW — Okaloosa County Clerk of Court and Comptroller J.D. Peacock wants to help ensure that some local history is recognized when the new courthouse opens later this year.

The grand opening for the 68,000-square-foot building in downtown Crestview is set for Nov. 16.

To help honor the county's roots, Peacock is considering displaying the first book of the official county record in a public area of the new facility. The large, ledger-type of book could be displayed in a glass case, he said.

Okaloosa County was established in 1915. The first County Commission met in the temporary county seat of Milligan until a special election was held in 1917 and Crestview was chosen as the new permanent seat, according to county information.

Peacock said book No. 1 of the official record is handwritten, starts on Oct. 4, 1915, and runs through July 15, 1918. Contained within several places in

the book, he said, are mentions of the acquisition and construction of the original courthouse, which opened in 1918.

Book No. 2 is typewritten and contains the brief minutes of the first commission meeting on Dec. 10, 1918, Peacock said.

The county's second courthouse opened in 1955 and closed in April 2016 because of problems with asbestos and black mold.

In addition to its courtrooms and offices, the new courthouse will host the commission's regular north-county meetings on the first Tuesday of each month.

The new facility, which has a \$23.7 million construction budget, also will include a state-of-the-art electronic law library as well as modern security features for its evidence storage room and other areas.

"We're doing a lot of innovative things (with the new building), and I want to make sure we get some history in there as well," Peacock said.

Commission Chairman Graham Fountain, who is helping put together the





canvas photo of Chris and his two sons while she was sitting in the courtroom watching the testimonies and quietly sobbing.

Chris' girlfriend at the time of his death, Angie Morrison, said she was "lucky to have been loved by Chris" and described him as funny, charming and dedicated to his friends and family. She said the motto he lived his life by was "making memories."

"I only had a year-and-a-half to make memories with Chris," she told the judge. "He brought me and my kids some of the greatest joys of my life."

Cindy Reinert Hall, one of Chris' older sisters, said he had "so much to live for" and had just celebrated his 50th birthday.

"I've thought and thought about what to say today ... all I can say is, I hope to God no one else ever has to go through this again," she said.

Diana Wood, another one of Chris' older sisters, was the third to give a victim impact statement. She tearfully described how hard her brother's sudden death had been on the family, especially

his two sons, and said more than 1,200 people showed up to his funeral — a testament, she said, to the wide impact he made on the community.

Vince Reinert, Chris' older brother, testified that he was a "special person" who was "full of personality."

"He was the type of person who would walk into a room and the room was immediately lit up," he said.

And another brother, Pat Reinert, said Chris

was fun, loving, interesting and engaging.

Miller's attorney, Ricky Dayaram, asked the judge to sentence Miller to 119 months in prison, with all but 24 of those months suspended and followed by 10 years of probation. The defense brought two of Miller's friends to the stand to testify about her being a loving mother to her 10-year-old daughter and a devoted friend. Additional testimonies came from Miller's mother, as

well as a psychiatrist who treated Miller, and Miller herself.

The doctor testified that Miller suffered from depression, anxiety and bipolar disorder and had entered treatment three times in the past. She also testified that marijuana, amphetamines and Ambien were found in Miller's system after the crash, but when Miller was on the stand she only admitted to smoking pot and taking Ambien the night of the crash.

Miller apologized directly to the family during her testimony and said she kept a picture of Chris on her phone and would "always be linked to him."

After she was sentenced, Miller was taken to be fingerprinted and the family left the courtroom. Once outside, they embraced each other and shed tears.

"We get some closure 'cause it's over, but it doesn't bring him back, but we're happy it's over," said Chris' brother Pat.

Chief Assistant State Attorney Bill Bishop, who presented the state's case at sentencing, said he was pleased with the judge's sentence.

"It's a very difficult case," he said. "There are no winners today. No winners."

program for the courthouse's grand-opening ceremony, said other historic county items also

could go on permanent display.

They could include photos of the cleared, former wooded area that became the site of the original courthouse, as well as old land plats of the Crestview area, Fountain said.

Members of the Crestview Historical Society and Baker Block Museum are helping make the historic displays a reality.

"Our kids and our young people coming up today don't learn about history like we did," Fountain said. "And a

lot of them are not interested in it.

"But we think it's important for our citizens to know about the early years of our county — just to teach people what we all did and how we did business."

crumbles were an ingredient in the fried rice recipe. She showed attendees how they could buy sausage patties, chop them up and use them instead.

"We used all of Walmart's Great Value products and their Marketside Value, and all the recipes you can make in

less than 30 minutes," Williams said, "and the meats are all fully cooked already."

The parfaits called for four ingredients, including pumpkin in the can, whipped cream, crushed shortbread cookies and nuts.

Sherri also spoke about her love of

cooking competitions and the challenges that go with it. She said you have to be able to think really fast, make food that tastes good, cook it, plate it and put it in front of the judges.

"You've gotta be a real fast thinker. You've got to think on your feet and just do it," she said.

She said in one grilling competition, they had these huge red snappers that had to be scaled, cleaned and prepped

before they could cook them in the limited time they had available. And the weather was not cooperating with the grilling they had to do.

"You have to have a back up plan," and adapt to the conditions you're working in, she said. With the rainy weather not helping, she wound up flaking the fish she prepared instead of serving the fillet portion she'd planned on.

Crestview Police officers step in for absent dads at Riverside lunch

CRESTVIEW — Yellow “visitors” name tags were in vogue at Riverside Elementary School Wednesday. A highlight of DADS Day — which stands for Dedicated Achievement Demonstrates Success — was the opportunity for fathers and grandfathers to have lunch with the kids.

Unfortunately, not every child’s father, or a surrogate for him, could be present. To fill the void, several Crestview Police Officers happily slapped on visitor passes and headed to the cafeteria.

“It was great to be there for children whose parents were deployed or otherwise unable to make it,” Officer Javonnia Peak, a father himself, said.

The officers rotated around the cafeteria, sitting down and chatting with students — especially those who didn’t have a parent at their table. Little faces visibly brightened when a cop sat down.

Several boys wanted to know about the equipment Officer Peak carried on his belt. A few tables over, some children asked Officer Tyler Thomason about the insignia on his uniform. Sometimes the officers heard touching stories about how the police had helped their parents, themselves or families.

And sometimes the stories tugged at the cops’ heartstrings.

“A boy told me he didn’t have enough to eat at lunch usually,” Officer Gabe Dunlap said. Having a son of his own, he bought the boy a lunch.

“A little guy thanked me for eating with him because his own father couldn’t be there, due to being in jail,” Officer Peak said. “He said he doesn’t get to see his dad very often.”

One of Officer Sam Kimmons’ young dining companions told him that sometimes his wheelchair-bound father makes it to school events, but on Wednesday, he wasn’t feeling well enough to attend lunch.

Being there for Crestview’s junior citizens was a highlight of the officers’ day, they agreed afterward.

“It’s great being out in the community, and it’s just good to give back,” Officer Peak said after lunch. “Especially when you know you made a kid’s day brighter.”

October is Emergency Contact Information Awareness Month

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles and To Inform Families First (TIFF) are recognizing October as ECI Awareness Month and urge residents to register or update their emergency contact information.

ECI is a state-supported, secure system that allows Floridians, with a valid driver license or ID

card, to designate up to two emergency contacts. The system may only be accessed by law enforcement and only in the event of an emergency.

"Registering emergency contact information is the first step to providing peace of mind for loved ones," said DHSMV Executive Director, Terry L. Rhodes. "Floridians should keep their information updated in the ECI system, so law

enforcement can notify contacts immediately."

The ECI program was first established in Florida in 2006 after Christine Olson tragically lost her daughter Tiffany in a traffic crash. It was several hours after Tiffany's death before authorities were able to contact Christine. Compelled to save others from the same misfortune, Christine worked with Senator Bill Galvano to create a voluntary program

allowing people to submit their emergency contact information as part of their secure driver license or ID card record.

"Through unimaginable tragedy, Christine Olson selflessly worked to create a program that would benefit all Floridians," said Senator Bill Galvano. "I am honored to have helped create the ECI program and proud of the service it has provided families over the past 12 years."

On Oct. 2, 2006, Christine Olson became the first person to register ECI in Florida, creating the first ever ECI program in the nation. Due to its success in Florida, the ECI program has been replicated in six other U.S. states. As of September 2018, more than 14 million Floridians have registered their information in the ECI system.

"Taking two minutes to register or update your ECI can save you hours

of worry, fear and not knowing," said To Inform Families First President, Christine Olson. "Do it today - your family is counting on you."

Parents should be aware that children as young as five years old are eligible for a Florida ID card and can be registered in the secure ECI system. Teens are encouraged to register their ECI as they apply for their driver license or ID card and keep the information updated.



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

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Parents can help prevent bullying

According to the National Center for Educational Statistics, approximately one in five students report being bullied.

Most children will therefore experience some form of bullying during their developmental years, if not as victims, then as bystanders or perpetrators. While schools have an important role to play in helping to eradicate bullying, parents too must become advocates of treating others with kindness and respect. Here are a few ways moms and dads can help prevent bullying.

1. HELP KIDS IDENTIFY BULLYING BEHAVIORS

Bullying can be exhibited physically or verbally, but also as a type of social behavior (mimicking, making faces, spreading rumors, acts of exclusion, etc.). Bullying can also occur as harassment perpetrated online (cyber bullying). In all cases, bullying involves acts of aggression on an ongoing basis and is based on a real or perceived imbalance of power. Parents who discuss bullying in all its forms with their children are arming them with the capacity to recognize and report the behavior if it occurs.

2. TEACH KIDS TO TAKE A STAND AGAINST BULLYING

Bullying behavior rarely occurs in isolation. More often than not, it's a group phenomenon with a number of students involved as either participants or onlookers. But research indicates that almost 60 percent of bullying situations

come to a halt when a peer intervenes on behalf of the bullied student (Hawkins, Pepler, and Craig, 2001). Teach your kids that they can make a difference by being an advocate for others.

3. MODEL HOW TO TREAT OTHERS

One of the most powerful ways parents can help prevent bullying is by modeling appropriate behaviors. When parents treat the people in their lives with courtesy and compassion, their children often follow suit.

Thwarting bullying is more likely when parents actively take action to prevent it. The most important thing they can do is talk to their kids and keep the lines of communication open.



How to spot a bully

Children who commit acts of bullying or violence may do so for various reasons, such as the desire to fit in with a certain group or to get revenge for past bullying they themselves experienced. Whatever the case, they need help. But when no one's speaking up, how can you tell if one child is bullying another? Some of the most frequently observed traits linked to bullying include:

- The need to dominate and maintain a certain status within a group
- A lack of interpersonal skills (difficulty making friends)
- Impulsivity • Lack of empathy
- Authoritarian or manipulative behaviors
- The belief that violence is a good way to resolve conflicts
- The unjustified belief that others are ill-willed

HOW YOU CAN HELP

If you find out that your child has been bullying others, remain calm and listen

to what he or she has to say. While you shouldn't condone the bullying, it's important to be supportive. Explain that the consequences for this type of behavior are severe, both for the bully and his or her victims. Remind your child that it's important to respect others, regardless of their differences.

Work with your child to find ways he or she can express feelings of anger without having a negative impact on other people. Contact the school for further support, and if needed, don't hesitate to seek professional help from a social worker or psychologist.

Help Okaloosa win Peanut Butter Challenge

Join Okaloosa County Extension along with University of Florida Institute of Food & Agricultural Sciences and the Florida Peanut Producers Association to help take a bite out of hunger by participating in a local peanut butter drive.

We are competing against other peanut-producing counties in the Panhandle for the most jars of peanut butter donated. Participate and help make Okaloosa a winner. Bring unopened jars of

peanut butter to one of the drop-off locations listed below Oct. 1 through Nov. 21. All peanut butter collected will be donated to local food pantries during Farm-City Week.

In 2014, peanuts were grown on an estimated 163,000 acres in Florida with Okaloosa County growing almost 3,000 acres. The two largest peanut-producing counties in Northwest Florida are Jackson County, with almost 35,000 acres, and Santa Rosa County, with more than 22,000 acres.

Ten states grow 99 percent of the U.S. peanut crop: Georgia (which grows about 42 percent of all U.S. peanuts), followed by Texas, Alabama, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Mississippi, Virginia, Oklahoma and New

Mexico. The Southeast is the largest peanut production region, with Florida producing about 9 percent of the total national crop.

The majority of peanuts grown in Florida are dried, shelled and processed into peanut butter, roasted nuts, candy or other products. But for those who enjoy boiled peanuts, we do have some fresh market peanuts, also referred to as "green" or "boiling" peanuts sold this time of year as peanuts are being harvested.

It takes about 540 peanuts to make a 12-ounce jar of peanut butter. The average child will eat 1,500 peanut butter-and-jelly sandwiches before he or she graduates high school. Keep children eating locally grown peanuts

in healthy, nutritious and yummy peanut butter by donating jars of peanut butter.

Traffic relief is coming to south Crestview

I had a late lunch with a friend this week at Cracker Barrel. We visited for a bit after lunch and it was around 3 p.m. when we left.

I decided I'd better get on the road as traffic really backs up during the afternoon, rather than shop. Trying to make a left turn from Cracker Barrel Road onto State Road

85 was absolutely impossible given the amount of traffic, both northbound and southbound; so I waited for about seven minutes, finally made a right turn and managed to safely get into the left hand lane so I could make a U-turn at John King Road.

Adding to the confusion of making a legal left turn from Cracker Barrel Road onto State 85 is the fact that people in the Exxon gas station make illegal left turns, which makes the situation even more dangerous.

When attempting to make a left turn onto northbound State 85, one has to watch

for drivers turning left onto Cracker Barrel Road, those coming from the hotel across the street, and cars driving southbound, as well as cars trying to turn left illegally from the gas station. These are accidents waiting to happen.

Something needs to be done at that intersection for safety — perhaps a stoplight? At the very least, flexible delineator posts need to be put up to keep people from turning left out of the gas station.

I was able to speak with Scott Bitterman, the County's engineer, who let me know there are several things in the works for this

area of State 85 to help relieve the congestion we face.

South Crest Drive (Wendy's) and Cracker Barrel Road are city maintained roads, while State 85 is state maintained.

Improvements are coming in about two years to help relieve congestion. This intersection will have three-quarter access in which cars may turn left from State 85 into either Cracker Barrel Road and South Crest Drive, but no left turns will be allowed on to State 85 from these two streets.

This improvement should greatly increase safety and traffic flow. The intersection

at John King will then have two left turn lanes allowing for U-turns, to increase safety. The city, Florida Department of Transportation, and the county are all working very hard to relieve the traffic stress in this area. At this time, FDOT is working on extending the northbound turn lane onto I-10 West to help clean up congestion.

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

Wyatt and Cosby don't get to play the race card, however, not after Cosby admitted to drugging women for sex, including the black woman on whom his criminal trial was centered.

Not when a black man is the one who outed his heinous behavior.

Wyatt, who likely has been suspected and feared merely because he's black, needs to save his sympathy for Cosby's daughters, black women whose lives have been ruined. He should reserve it for all the law-abiding black men and boys who can't even drive, walk down a public street or enter an elevator without someone feeling threatened.

No doubt, there are people who are thrilled by Cosby's demise for reasons other than his crime. But a better bet is that most Americans of all stripes were shocked, stunned and horrified that someone they long admired, who embodied family values and who achieved the American dream, has turned out to be nothing more than a woman's nightmare.

Earwax and the elderly

Buildup, blockage in ears poses unrecognized risk in long-term care

Of all the indignities that come with aging, excessive earwax may be the most insidious.

Don't laugh. That greasy, often gross, buildup occurs more often in older ears than those of the young, experts say. And when it goes unrecognized, it can pose serious problems, especially for the 2.2 million people who live in U.S. nursing homes and assisted living centers.

"The excessive amount [of earwax] can cause hearing loss or ringing in your ears. Some people experience vertigo, which increases the risk of falling," said Jackie Clark, a board-certified audiologist who is president of the American Academy of Audiology. "Right now, we see some correlation between hearing loss and cognitive decline."

Earwax — which is not really wax at all, but a substance called cerumen that binds with dirt, dust and debris — is normally produced by the body as a way to clean and protect the ears. In most people, the self-cleaning process works fine.

But in others — including about 10 percent of young children, 20 percent of adults and more than 30 percent of elderly and developmentally disabled people — the wax collects to the point where it can completely block the ear canal.

Up to two-thirds of people in nursing homes may suffer

from that condition, known as impaction, according to 2017 guidelines for removal of impacted earwax issued by the American Academy of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery Foundation.

In 2016, federal Medicare recipients logged nearly 1.7 million earwax removal services at a cost of more than \$51 million, according to payment records analyzed by Kaiser Health News.

"In elderly patients, it's fairly common," said Dr. Seth Schwartz, a Seattle otolaryngologist who led the most recent update of the guidelines. "It seems like such a

basic thing, but it's one of the most common reasons people present for hearing-related problems."

It's so bad that Janie York, of Omaha, Neb., started Hear Now mobile hearing solutions, one of a growing number of businesses devoted to cleaning hearing aids and checking the ears of elderly people living in residential care settings.

"It's epidemic," said York, whose clients now include 10 local centers. "About 3 in 5 people I see have some degree of impaction and most are completely impacted."

Julie Brown, assistant

director of nursing in the memory support unit at SilverRidge Assisted Living in Gretna, Neb., said impacted earwax can be a particular problem for patients with dementia. It exacerbates hearing loss, which can impede communication and worsen aggression and other difficult behaviors.

"As soon as the earwax is cleared up, even their behavior has calmed down," Brown said.

Excessive earwax sends about 12 million people to see health workers every year, including about 8 million who require wax removal,

according to the otolaryngology association.

That's not counting the people who try DIY treatments to get rid of earwax, nearly all of which are frowned on by the professionals.

"People put everything in their ears: Q-tips, bobby pins, pencils, fingernails," Schwartz said.

Usually, the best way to control earwax is to leave it alone, Schwartz said. But that advice can backfire when families or caregivers neglect to check the ears of elderly people in residential care.

Hearing-aid users should have regular ear checks every three to six months, the guidelines suggest. People with dementia should also have earwax removed regularly.

It can take a professional with an otoscope — a device that can look deep inside the ear — to tell if cerumen is blocking the ear canal. Usually, earwax can be safely removed by softening it with water, saline or commercial ear drops and then through gentle syringing or manual extraction with a device called a curette.

The effects in the elderly can be immediate. A small 2014 study by Japanese researchers found significant improvements in hearing and cognitive performance in elderly patients with memory disorders when impacted cerumen was removed.

Too often, though, earwax in the elderly goes unnoticed.

"I'm seeing 15 people here, but what about the other hundred?" York said. "Nobody's looking. I don't know why it's been neglected for so long."

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A move to work chest, shoulders, upper back

With the summertime temps still in the 90s, you'd never know the calendars say it is fall.

We will still hang on to our tank tops and shorts for a while and focus on toning our upper body.

Our move today is an alternating pec deck. This move will be working our chest, shoulders and upper back. You will need a set of light to medium weights for this exercise. This move can be executed either standing up or sitting down.

Begin by grasping your hand weights in each hand, rolling your shoulders back and down and lifting your chest. Lifting each arm up to either side of your head, extend

the arms out to each side of your body, with your elbows bent at shoulder level. Keeping both palms facing forward, you are ready to move.

Start by guiding one arm at a time around

to the front of your body. Keep the weights upward, and direct with your elbow bent and at a 90-degree angle. Once you reach your fullest contraction on the front side of your



body, redirect your arm back to starting position on the outside of your body. Continue with the opposite arm in the same motion.

Keep your movements somewhat slow

and methodic, as the positioning can be a bit awkward, causing fatigue quickly.

Shoot for eight to 10 repetitions, for at least three sets. Give yourself a small break

between each set. Also, if your hand weights feel heavier, reduce the amount of weight or use no weight at all. You will still get the benefits of the move, just without the extra resistance. If you need more resistance, increase your weight.

This move targets a few areas, so it is great to add into any upper body routine.

And keep in mind every muscle is important all year round. It's just nice to give the visible ones a little extra TLC from time to time.

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Financial Advisor. Financial Tips for Alzheimer's Caregivers

If you are, or will be, a caregiver for elderly parents or another close family member living with Alzheimer's disease, you may experience some emotional stress – but you also need to be aware of the financial issues involved and what actions you can take to help address them.

You will find few "off the rack" solutions for dealing with the financial challenges associated with Alzheimer's. For one thing, family situations can vary greatly, both in terms of the financial resources available and in the availability and capabilities of potential caregivers. Furthermore, depending on the stage of the disease, people living with Alzheimer's may have a range of cognitive abilities, which will affect the level of care needed.

Here are some general suggestions that may be useful to you in your role as caregiver:

- Consult with family members and close friends. It's extremely hard to be a solo caregiver. By consulting with other family members or close friends, you may find that some of them have the time and ability to help.
- Consider obtaining durable power of attorney. If you possess a durable power of attorney for finances, you can make financial decisions for the person with Alzheimer's when he or she is no longer able. With this authority, you can help the individual living with the disease – and your entire family – avoid court actions that can take away control of financial affairs. And on a short-term basis, having durable power of attorney can help you take additional steps if needed. You'll find it much easier to acquire durable power of attorney when the individual living with Alzheimer's is still in the early stage of the disease and can willingly and knowingly grant you this authority.
- Gather all necessary documents. You'll be in a better position to help the individual living with Alzheimer's if you have all the important financial documents – bank statements, insurance policies, wills, Social Security payment information, deeds, etc. – in one place.
- Get professional help. You may want to consult with an attorney, who can advise you on establishing appropriate arrangements, such as a living trust, which provides instructions about the estate of the person for whom you're providing care and names a trustee to hold title to property and funds for the beneficiaries. You also might want to meet with a financial advisor, who can help identify potential resources and money-saving services. And a tax professional may be able to help you find tax deductions connected to your role as caregiver.

Finally, use your experience as a caregiver to remind yourself of the importance of planning for your own needs. For example, a financial professional can suggest ways of preparing for the potentially huge costs of long-term care, such as those arising from an extended stay in a nursing home.

Caring for an individual living with Alzheimer's has its challenges. But by taking the appropriate steps, you can reduce uncertainties – and possibly give yourself and your family members a greater sense of security and control.






Advocating athletic mobility

Fort Walton Beach-Niceville always brings out bad blood and bad memories.

Ever since the transfer-gate incident of January 2014 saw seven Viking players, including Division-I talents such as Romeo Finley and Deonte Sheffield, file the paperwork to suit up for the Eagles the following year, the annual matchup always brings the disgruntled out of the woodwork.

Saturday afternoon, one such person left a comment under a post with the game story from Friday's 42-0 Eagle victory, showing the discontent of 2014 remains alive in certain circles.

"Until they get (rid of) these out-of-zone waivers who participate in sports, this will never end," the commenter wrote. "I know this because I lived in an area where the zoning chart was and kids wanted to play for a different school because the school had a winning team, but not knowing that if they stayed in the school they were zoned for, they just might be a winning team."

The writer has a point. I will give him that. In the case of the seven athletes departing one school for another, you have to wonder whether that's a good move based on the sheer number. If seven of you are leaving, you can probably make a difference no matter the uniform you wear.

But in the case of a single athlete, why can't they choose the school they think offers them the best opportunity to succeed?

As it stands right now, all students, including student athletes, are allowed to transfer to whatever

school they wish provided their school of choice has the space to accommodate them. Student athletes in particular will be eligible to play at their new school provided they "meet all other eligibility standards."

I like that.

I grew up in a suburban Texas town with five high schools where the school district was annually rezoning my neighborhood. Without transfer waivers, I was slated to attend six different schools in six years from fourth grade to ninth grade. That would have been awful but, thankfully, it was avoidable.

I was able to attend the middle school and high school of my choice, learn from teachers and coaches I still hold in high regard today and graduate with honors. Without the ability to have a say in my education and extracurriculars, I might not be in the position I am today — holding down a steady job with benefits and consistently making rent at 23.

If you think about it, suggesting transferring should be limited or cut altogether is somewhat unfair. Athletes are allowed to choose their team in some way or another at every other level of organized athletics.

In college, recruiters come to the athletes. If the athletes don't like the schools recruiting them, they can try to walk on at the school of their choice.

In the pros, yes, there is usually a draft of some sort. Players have less say in what team they play for, but once a player has completed his initial contract, he or she is typically free to sign, again, with the team of his or her choice.

Why is it so bad if high school students are afforded the same opportunity?

You need your iodine
Iodine is an essential element for healthy human life, enabling the function

of thyroid glands to produce needed hormones for proper metabolism. When children in the womb don't get enough iodine from their mother, fetal brain development is impaired. During pregnancy, iodine deficiency can cause a child to develop learning and intellectual disabilities as well as developmental problems affecting speech, hearing and growth.

Iodine deficiency was a problem in the U.S. as well, until American salt producers started adding iodine to table salt more than a century ago. Today, about 70 percent of the table salt sold in the U.S. is iodized. In fact, salt has been and remains the primary source for iodine in the American diet. The effect of this public health initiative has been to virtually eliminate

the incidence of thyroid related illness.

Opioid crisis illuminates the need to see pain medicine specialists

- The infection can occur when antibiotics cause an intestinal imbalance of "good" and "bad" microbes that leads to an overgrowth of the bacteria.

- C. diff is most common among people 65 and older and those with conditions requiring prolonged use of antibiotics.



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

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

Do you have heroes who are fictional characters? Whether it's Harry or Hermione, Katniss or Gale, there are many boys and girls in books and movies today who are worthy of our admiration.

In 1867, there weren't so many female characters for girls to read about and admire. A wise publisher, Thomas Niles, thought girls would like to read about characters like themselves, so he wrote to a young author, Louisa May Alcott, to see if she would write a book for girls. "Never liked girls or knew many, except my sisters," Alcott wrote.

But Alcott did like to make money, so she set about writing the story of the March sisters, also known as "Little Women."

A year later, the first part of her famous book was published, with the second part following in January 1869. This week The Mini Page celebrates 150 years of "Little Women" and the author behind the classic.

Louisa's life

Louisa May Alcott was born in 1832 in Germantown, Pennsylvania. She grew up as one of four sisters. Their father, Bronson Alcott, was an educator and philosopher, and the family moved around a lot.

She and her sisters worked from an early age, as her father didn't make enough money to support the family. The girls sewed and

took care of children, and Louisa wrote and sold stories and articles to make money.

The sisters

In "Little Women," Alcott, her sisters and their mother are the main characters. She named the girls Meg (her sister Anna), Jo (herself), Beth (Lizzie) and Amy (May). Their mother is known as Marmee.

While there are differences between the book and Alcott's real life, many of the events in the story come from actual facts. For example, in the book, Amy is an artist. In real life, May was also an artist.

Louisa and Jo

The character Jo is different from others in the book. She is tall and sometimes clumsy, rather than small and ladylike. She likes to run and play sports. Her best friend is a neighbor boy, Laurie (short for Laurence), and as an adult, Jo is not interested in marrying. Jo thought boys were more free to be themselves than girls.



This picture of Jo, writing at her desk, appeared in part two of "Little Women."

Alcott modeled Jo after herself; although Jo finally does marry in the book, Alcott herself never did. She took in her sister May's daughter after May died, and she loved her nieces and nephews, but she was not interested in having a husband.

Dressed-Up Broccoli

You'll need:

- 1 (10-ounce) package fresh or frozen broccoli florets
- 3 tablespoons low-fat sour cream
- 2 tablespoons low-fat milk



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Crestview student charged with making school threat

Staff report

CRESTVIEW — A 15-year-old Crestview High School student has been charged with writing or sending a threat to kill or injure, according to a news release from the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office.

A school resource officer was notified Monday that a girl had received threatening text messages from a freshman boy at the school.

He wrote how law officers had been at his home a few nights before because it was

believed he was going to kill or hurt someone.

He also stated, "Every 1 is always making me getting to the point of where I'm gonna end killing sum1 or shooting up the school," according to the release.

The student also allegedly made several additional comments referencing death.

He later admitted to sending the messages but said he did not really plan to shoot anyone. He said he was feeling depressed at the time, the release said.

The girl said the threats made her fear for her safety and the safety of others.


Sheriff Larry Ashley stressed that the Sheriff's Office has zero tolerance for threats of school violence.

A similar situation occurred at Crestview High in May when a 14-year-old student threatened to "shoot up" the school. Two classmates heard him discussing his plan in the lunchroom.

The student pulled out a bullet and placed it on the lunchroom table.

School administrators later found a 9 mm bullet in his pants pocket. He told the school resource officer he had "been under a lot of stress" and did not have access to firearms.

\$400,000 in stolen coins unearthed

CRESTVIEW — Okaloosa County sheriff's investigators think they not only solved the mystery of who stole \$400,000 worth of silver coins from a safe at a home, but also recovered most of the money.

Stephen Aaron Barnes, 37, of Destin was charged last Thursday with grand theft of more than \$100,000, according to a news release from the Sheriff's Office.

Investigators say Barnes took the coins from a safe at his mother's home on Lake Ella Road northeast of Crestview and buried them in three locations on the property.

The money reportedly belonged to Barnes' stepfather and was to be part of his divorce settlement with Barnes' mother, the release said. But when Barnes' stepfather went to retrieve the money Aug. 30, he was unable to get into the safe and had to call a locksmith, the release said.

After the safe was opened, he found the coins and a rifle missing.

He told investigators he had last seen the items during a visit in November 2017.

He also said his estranged wife was to receive the coins or be given a check for what they were worth, the release said. Barnes' mother told deputies she did not know what happened to the money.

Barnes was developed as a suspect and later confessed to taking the coins, according to the news release.

He allegedly said he was mad at his stepfather for the suffering he had caused his mother during the couple's on-going divorce proceedings. He said he buried the coins in three spots on the property, according to the release.

'To each other, we're a family'

Baker varsity volleyball team remains undefeated in district

BAKER — In a team sport like volleyball, unity and chemistry is an important part of achieving success.

This rings true for the Baker School varsity volleyball team, who leads their district with an undefeated record working towards another successful season.

The back of their team t-shirt reads, "To everybody, we're a team, but to each other, we're a family."

Coach Kathy Combest said this is more than a saying — it's their motto.

The Gator's volleyball team has taken the district title for 15 consecutive years. Combest said she hopes to make this year number 16. Currently, the team has a record of 15-3 with two losses to Crestview High School but no losses in their district.

Combest's goals for her team this year is to see them advance all the way to the state championship.

"This season, we want to go all the way," Combest said.

Winning a state championship is a big goal to have, but Combest said she has ways to prepare her girls for the challenge — intense training and playing tougher teams like Crestview High School and Fort Walton Beach High School.

"The better competition we play, either you're going to rise up to it or you're not," Combest said.

The Baker volleyball team has never won a state championship, Combest said. Combest, also the girl's basketball coach, has been with the Baker volleyball team for a total of 26 years, but her career as a volleyball coach began in 1986.

Prior to 1986, Combest said she had never played volleyball.

“What got me into it is when I came here to coach basketball, the volleyball coach retired,” Combest said. “...They asked me to coach, and I said, ‘Well, I’ll coach, but if I suck, you’re going to find somebody else.’”

Combest retired in 2008 for health reasons but returned to the game in 2011 at Crestview High School. In 2016, she made her return to Baker.
