How the half-cent sales tax could be used in north Okaloosa County

CRESTVIEW — In almost one month, Okaloosa County voters will have a chance to decide on the 10-year, local option, half-cent sales tax referendum (LOST).

But what exactly will this sales tax — also called a surtax — fund for the north end of Okaloosa County?

The Okaloosa County commissioners have a list of

proposed projects that could be funded by LOST revenue.

However, that list has not been finalized as of this writing.

Commissioners and the county's Infrastructure Surtax Advisory Committee will meet at the County Administration Building in Shalimar on Oct. 10 at 1:30 p.m. to discuss the potential projects and allow public input.

At the Oct. 4 Crestview Chamber of Commerce

meeting Okaloosa County Commission Chairman Graham Fountain spoke about the sales tax.

"Ya'll know me, what you see is what you get," Fountain said. "We've got to the point where we're running on the same or less millage rate than we were back when our population was 110,000 people."

According to the U.S. Census Bureau estimation, Okaloosa County's population was at almost 203,000 as of July 1, 2017.

The projects are part of an effort by the county to benefit traffic issues especially in the Crestview area, Fountain said.

"Whether you live in the south end and you work here or your trucks are going back and forth, you're sitting in traffic," Fountain said.

The goal would be eventually to have a bypass going all around the city of Crestview, according to Fountain.

Crestview Hooters restaurant closing after 15 years

CRESTVIEW — On Sunday, the Crestview community will say goodbye to the Hooters restaurant located off of State Road 85 after 15 years of hot wings and football. However,

it could be a temporary farewell.

The closure comes after Hooters could not come to an agreement with the new landlord, according to Larry Fox, Hooters managing member.

The landlord who previously owned the property sold it over a year ago, Fox said.

Fox also said the Crestview

branch had not been performing as well as other locations, which he believed was due to the building's location.

"That property is extremely hard to get in with all the traffic on 85," Fox said.

However, Fox said they have been looking for another location in Crestview with better

access.

"We're in a transition phase, and hopefully, we can find a location very soon," Fox said.

All employees were notified a few weeks ago and given the opportunity to work in other Hooters locations including those in Destin, Panama City, and Pensacola, according to

Fox.

"We've got an unbelievable staff," Fox said. "It's easy for us to build a building. It's next to impossible for us to staff it with good employees."

Fox said there is no time frame at the moment for when Hooters will open again in Crestview.

Laurel Hill moving forward with updating and advancing water system files

LAUREL HILL — Using the services of Dewberry, the Laurel Hill city council will map out their already existing water system. The

contract between Dewberry and the city states this service will cost the city \$20,000.

Last month, the city was awarded a Technical Assistance Grant for \$20,000 for the purpose of contracting out a company to map out the

current water system.

The city council is looking to have all of the existing water system put into a geographic information system file to "expand the system."

"It's a pretty simple process to update those maps," Crystal Weatherington, a

Dewberry employee, said at the Oct. 4 regular meeting. "You guys will basically have a living document — living file — that you're able to update as changes occur in your water system."

TINA BEUKENKAMP 1915 - 2018

Tina Beukenkamp, a 38-year resident of Shalimar, FL passed peacefully in the presence of family on September 8, 2018, at the age of 103.

Jantina Etty was born to Jan and Alida Mensinga on January 28, 1915 in Rotterdam, the Netherlands. An accomplished athlete, Tina participated in women's crew and competitive ice skating in her youth. Her motto, "motion is lotion," kept her physically active, participating in water aerobics into her mid-90's. Her academic studies led to certification as a teacher, and her intellectual pursuits were life-long, evidenced by well-informed opinions on current events and lively discussions of the latest literature with her monthly book club.

On March 18, 1939, Tina married Dr. Radboud "Bob" Laurens Beukenkamp, PhD., an aspiring agronomist. Their 54-year journey together commenced with a honeymoon in Austria, driving through pre-war Germany on the back of a motorcycle.

The newlyweds' world was soon plunged into darkness, as Europe was engulfed by World War II and the Netherlands were invaded and occupied by Nazi Germany. The ensuing war years brought times of joy, as Tina and Bob celebrated the births of their first three children, along with harrowing times of oppression, deprivation, and hunger. They were active in "The



Resistance' (the organized underground force fighting the Nazis.) These life stories are legendary among family and friends. Tina's trademark iron will, strong mettle, and ingenuity were forged in those years.

The post-war years of the late '40s and early '50s found Tina and family living overseas, as Bob was posted first to Buenos Aires, Argentina in diplomatic service to the Netherlands, and later to Washington, D.C., where their fourth child was born. Bob subsequently entered the private sector and the family moved to Lisbon, Portugal. In the mid '50s, Tina, Bob, and the children returned to Washington, D.C., eventually becoming U.S. citizens.

Bob's business pursuits next took the globetrotting family to Geneva, Switzerland and Mexico City. In the mid '60s, they again returned to Washington, D.C., when Bob reentered government service with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Residencies in D.C. were interspersed with diplomatic postings to Rome, Italy and Brasilia, Brazil.

Each destination brought with it another language to learn and new friendships that lasted a lifetime.

After living in New Orleans for several years, Tina and Bob retired to Shalimar in 1981. Devout parishioners of St. Simon's on the Sound, they traveled far and near proclaiming love of Christ as leaders of the Disciples of Christ movement, and Tina served on the Vestry at the young age of 100.

Tina's zest for life and insatiable curiosity were undiminished by Bob's passing in 1993. A multilingual citizen of the world, she loved engaging with fellow humans in all their cultures and ethnicities and continued to travel, visiting Indonesia, Iceland, Scotland, Scandinavia, S. America, Alaska, and Russia, among other places.

Tina was particularly devoted to her 11 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren, all of whom shared a special and very personal bond with "Oma Tina". She is survived by her children, Alida Codel, Jackie Gahan, Erik Beukenkamp and Felix Beukenkamp.


Ruth, you were loved by so many and will be missed by even more. Hopefully you are up there straightening them all out and doing all the craft projects you want to do. We Love you Mom.

and beneficial information to the public and partners," said FWC Executive Director Eric Sutton. "We will continually expand efforts to assist during this difficult event."

Seashore eliminates park-specific waterfowl hunting permits

GULF BREEZE – Gulf Islands National Seashore will no longer issue park specific Waterfowl Hunting Permits. However, hunting within the national seashore during the state designated waterfowl hunting seasons is still authorized. Hunters must still follow all rules and regulations and may not hunt in certain closed areas. Unless exempt, hunters must carry a valid State of Florida hunting license, Florida Waterfowl Permit, Migratory Bird Permit and a signed federal "Duck Stamp."

In accordance with the Superintendent's Compendium and through an interagency partnership with Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, waterfowl hunting is permitted in the national seashore during the corresponding state hunting season, with the exception of marine areas adjacent to high visitor use areas in Florida. National seashore

rules, regulations, and hunting closure maps are available on the park's website at www.nps.gov/planyourvisit/waterfowl-hunting-regulations.htm. The enabling legislation establishing Gulf Islands National Seashore specifically allows for waterfowl hunting within the boundaries of the national seashore in coordination with

the state of Florida. No other hunting is permitted within the boundary of the national seashore.

"The seashore provides numerous recreational opportunities for visitors, including waterfowl hunting. By eliminating the park specific permit requirement, we are reducing the added administrative requirement and burden for hunters while still providing the same protective measures for resources," said Superintendent Dan Brown.

State hunting licenses and permits, along with Federal Duck Stamp, may be obtained at county tax collector's offices and license agents, or online at www.MyFWC.com/License.

Just when you thought it was safe

I'm not wrong often, but when it am, it's usually pretty bad.

He smiled wryly as he eviscerated a woman who claims to have suffered unspeakable acts at the hands of a man who may spend the rest of his life as one of nine Supreme Court justices.

The crowd cheered.

That's chilling stuff.

If you watched Dr. Ford's testimony and didn't believe her — or at least have doubts about how much culpability to attribute to Kavanaugh, I understand.

I don't think she had a political motive. I think she is a political hammer. I believe she truly recalls that event happening. Was it Kavanaugh? Was it as bad as she remembers? Is she conflating and

combining memories of that night and others? I'm not sure. She isn't sure of much either.

But I believe she believes she is telling the truth. I don't think she was trying to help Democrats delay a Supreme Court appointment. "It's not a north/south county issue," Fountain said. "It is an Okaloosa County issue." Among those outside the city, here are Crestview improvements listed on the proposed projects document.

John King Widening

According to the proposed projects document, this project would allow for widening the road between State Road 85 and Live Oak Church Road.

The county would also consider intersection improvements and additional lanes, the document says.

Crestview Northwest Bypass

Okaloosa County looks to match funding with the Florida Department of Transportation for a Project Development and Environment study using revenue from the sales tax, the project document says.

During a PD&E study, "design options and their social and environmental effects are examined," according to the FDOT website.

Raspberry Road Corridor

Raspberry Road, off of Antioch Road, would be phase five of the county's southwestern bypass project. The Raspberry Road project would receive funding from both Okaloosa County and the City of Crestview, the proposed project document states.

According to the document, the total for this project is \$9 million. The county would contribute \$500,000. More information about the potential projects will be available on the Okaloosa County and city of Crestview websites as projects become more concrete, county officials said.

Actually, it's been four decades since the most recent one, with Kris Kristofferson and Barbra Streisand as the established star on his way down and the newcomer on her way up. The story has always been about the relationship between the two characters and an examination of their careers right around and soon after the time they meet.

Now those roles have been handed to Bradley Cooper as a hugely successful country-rocker, and Lady Gaga as a waitress who only wants to

sing. The questions for this new one are: Can she act? Can he sing? And even more important, seeing as this is the first time Cooper has called the shots, can he direct?

The three questions get three big affirmatives. This is a splashy and spectacular modern-day romantic drama with music.

Sure, it can be accused of depending on a string of coincidences to get the story spinning: After a big show, Jackson (Cooper), exhausted and in need of a drink, tells his driver to stop at a bar, any bar. The one he enters — not knowing it's a drag bar, which provides some early humor — just happens to be the one

where Ally (Gaga) sings at night, hoping to forget her day job and keep her musical dreams alive.

And there are plenty of clichés to deal with: He's a hard drinker and a pill popper, but even in his stupor, the moment he hears her launch into a gorgeous rendition of "La Vie en Rose," he's smitten, captivated, both by her voice and by her. Later on, their harmonizing, whether it's the vocalizing kind or the romantic kind, is perfect. Even later, after he convinces her to go for it and she begins to attain it, someone else enters the scene, your standard record producer who's looking for the next big thing, trying to make her his own. Yes, all Hollywood clichés, but somehow, none of them get in the way of where this film is going.

BREAST CANCER AND MEN

Gene mutations that contribute to risk can also signal prostate, pancreatic cancers

Having a mother or daughter who carries a mutation on the BRCA1 or 2 genes puts women at an increased risk of developing breast and ovarian cancer. The same is true for men, although few men undergo genetic testing.

"Men are equally as likely as women to inherit a BRCA mutation," said Dr. Christopher Childers, a resident physician in the department of surgery at the David Geffen School of Medicine, University of California-Los Angeles. "If a male has a BRCA mutation, his risk of breast cancer increases a hundredfold."

A study published in JAMA Oncology in April found that few men are screened for BRCA genetic mutations. Analyzing data from the 2015 National Health Interview Survey, researchers found that men underwent testing

for breast/ovarian cancer genes at one-tenth the rate of women.

It may be the first national study analyzing the rates of genetic cancer testing for both men and women, Childers said.

"Men who carry BRCA mutations are at higher risk for a variety of cancers including breast, prostate, pancreatic and melanoma. In particular, males who carry BRCA2 mutations are at increased risk of often early

and more aggressive prostate cancers," Childers said.

Check family history

Previous studies have shown that men believe breast cancer is a female issue, but this couldn't be farther from the truth, said genetic counselor Kimberly Childers, study co-author and regional manager at the Center for Clinical Genetics and Genomics at Providence Health & Services Southern

California. The Childerses are married.

"The strongest risk factor for carrying a BRCA mutation is having a family member with a BRCA mutation. If your mother, father, sister, brother or child has a BRCA mutation as well," Kimberly Childers said.

Other factors that may indicate a high probability of carrying a mutation include a personal history of male breast cancer, pancreatic cancer or high-grade or metastatic prostate cancer, Kimberly Childers said.

"Men without a history of cancer may also be at risk of carrying a mutation if there is a strong history of these cancers in their family," she said. "It's important for men to know that if their female relatives have ovarian or early breast cancers, that this may translate into a higher cancer risk for them, too."

Course of action

Men with a BRCA mutation are recommended to undergo clinical breast exams every year starting at age 35, Christopher Childers said.

"Once a BRCA mutation is identified, it is important that they ask their doctor to show them how to perform a self exam of their chest, learning what abnormal tissue might feel like and what could be of concern," he said.

Most but not all breast cancers in BRCA-positive men occur after age 50. Starting at 45, men with BRCA mutations are often recommended to undergo prostate cancer screening (prostate-specific antigen and digital rectal exams), Christopher Childers said.

If men are concerned about their risk they should discuss it with a primary-care provider or genetic counselor. To find a local genetic counselor, visit nsgc.org/findageneticcounselor.

What experts want you to know

When asked, "What's one thing you want people to know about breast cancer?", here's what a few experts said:

"We are now living in the era of personalized cancer care. It is no longer one-size-fits-all, but each and every patient deserves a detailed evaluation and explanation, not only of their recommended treatment plan, but also the reasons and rationale for that plan."

— Dr. Dennis Citrin, medical oncologist at Cancer Treatment Centers of America, Chicago

"Early detection matters. Get a mammogram."

— Dr. Harold Burstein, a breast oncologist at Susan F. Smith Center for Women's Cancers at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, Boston

"Trust your doctors, realize that your cancer is 100 percent different from the next person's cancer, and don't let things you read or see give you fear or anxiety that you're not getting proper treatment. I've been through this and I'm here today as your surgeon and as a survivor."

— Dr. Alicia Vinyard, breast surgical oncologist at Georgia Cancer Center, Augusta

"It is important for patients and their loved ones to understand that the treatment of breast cancer requires coordination by a whole team of caregivers. There are many treatment options and each patient's treatment plan is different, so it is important to build your team starting from the time you get the news of your diagnosis. This will help you to understand how the different parts of treatment (surgery, chemotherapy, radiation, targeted medication) all fit in with each other. I also recommend that patients bring a trusted friend or family member to their appointments since all the information can be

overwhelming."

"Breast cancer is a disease associated with aging, and this will become more relevant over time with the aging of the U.S. population. We know that there are issues with both undertreatment and overtreatment in the care of older adults with breast cancer. We as oncologists must ask the question of how we can optimally treat patients to improve outcomes while minimizing risk. As health-care providers, we need to do our part in assessing our older patients, so that we can help them and their families make the best personalized decisions possible."

— Dr. Meghan Karuturi, assistant professor of breast medical oncology at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, Houston

"While a cancer diagnosis can be a challenge, connecting with others in a similar situation either face-to-face, online or over the phone helps give patients a sense of control over what can be a chaotic and stressful situation."

— Licensed clinical social worker Sara Goldberger, senior program director at Cancer Support Community, the largest professionally led non-profit network of cancer support services worldwide

"Unfortunately, breast cancer occurs in 1 in 8 women and has profound effects on the lives of those it touches. The good news is that we have made amazing strides in the screening and treatment of breast cancer. Every year, advances are made that not only improve survival but lessen the impact on a patient's quality of life. However, the most important aspect of breast cancer treatment lies with the patient in performing routine screening mammography and being an

advocate for their own health. The earlier we can catch the process, the better the outcome and less the patient may need to go through."

— Dr. John Kiluk, surgical oncologist at Moffitt Cancer Center, Tampa, Florida

"The interaction between lifestyle and both breast cancer incidence and treatment is underemphasized. My goal as a physician is to educate both the community as well as my patients in terms of nutrition, exercise and mindfulness. We have the power to prevent a substantial number of breast cancer diagnoses. In those already diagnosed with breast cancer, lifestyle changes can lessen toxicities during treatment and improve long-term health. The key is to eat a variety of plants, incorporate both aerobic and resistance training, and find a practice like meditation or yoga that fosters mindfulness."

— Dr. Amber Orman, radiation oncologist at Florida Hospital, Tampa

"Access to some of the most promising advances is often limited by the rising cost of cancer care, including high drug prices. Patients are increasingly bearing the financial burden of care, often forcing them to choose between treatment and other fundamental needs. I am seeing more patients unable to afford optimal treatment, stopping treatment early, mortgaging their homes or even going into bankruptcy. ... Patients should talk to their doctor about their concerns and also find out how much of the treatment costs they'll be responsible for."

Potential signs of breast cancer

Feeling a lump in the breast is a classic sign of breast cancer, but there are other less-well-known signals that can tip off potential trouble.

"The hope is that women know their own bodies and would find a mass before it becomes palpable, but the truth is that radiologists can find tumors so small — 3, 4 or 5 millimeters — that it's rare to be able to feel a small tumor before it can be discovered by mammogram," said Dr. Therese Bevers, medical director of the Cancer Prevention Center at MD Anderson in Houston and an expert in breast cancer screenings.

Today, breast self exams are not widely recommended, but that doesn't mean you should stop investigating your breasts, Bevers said. The keywords now are "breast awareness. You know how your breasts look and feel. If something feels different, have it checked out," Bevers said.

Women themselves discover "a substantial amount of breast cancer because nobody knows a woman's body as well as she does herself," said Dr. Rachel Brem, director of breast imaging and intervention at The GW Medical Faculty Associates in Washington, D.C.

"Women have to understand that mammograms are imperfect. Fifteen percent of breast cancers cannot be seen on mammograms. The death rate of breast cancer has decreased 35 percent in the past few decades, and mammograms are one part of that. They're one tool in our toolbox, but there's other things like MRIs, diagnostic ultrasounds and molecular breast imaging," Brem said. "We have many kinds of technology; no one size fits all."

Some of the signs of potential breast cancer:

Red, inflamed breast

A swollen and sometimes warm, red breast should be evaluated promptly, Bevers

said. Inflammatory breast cancer is a rare but aggressive disease. Swelling and redness affecting one-third or more of the breast is cause for concern. Smaller changes, like the size of a half-dollar, are probably not breast cancer, "but get it diagnosed," Bevers said.

Peeling, scaling

Flaky, peeling or scaling skin on the breast could be a sign of Paget's disease, a type of breast cancer, or it could be minor skin irritation, Bevers said. Watch for whether the skin changes only occur in one breast, often starting in the nipple area, and spread from there.

Dimpling of the skin

"A dimpling on the skin of the breast like a pimple that doesn't heal" can also be a sign of breast cancer, Brem said. The nipple may also become retracted because there's a tumor pulling it inward, Bevers said. The dimpling might be subtle and noticeable only at certain times, for example, when you stand in front of a mirror and raise your arms to brush your hair, Bevers said.

Nipple discharge

Most nipple discharge is not breast cancer, but it is of more concern if it is spontaneous, from one breast only, or clear rather than milky or greenish, Brem said. Nipple discharge may not have a high suspicion rate, but have it checked out.

Mass in the armpit

An ancillary mass in the region, such as a lump in the armpit, could be breast cancer in the lymph nodes, Bevers said. "Not all lumps in the armpit are breast cancer. It could be an ingrown hair, but it needs to be checked out," she said.

A thickening

If your breast feels firmer than before, that change should be evaluated by a doctor. "If it's a change to you, it doesn't matter what you can see or feel," Bevers said. Use your awareness of your breasts. If something doesn't feel normal, get it checked out.
