## State closes Wakulla Bank

State banking officials, escorted by Florida Highway Patrol troopers, arrived at local branches of Wakulla Bank at closing time Friday to seize control of the financial institution.

Signs of trouble first arose in August 2009 when the Florida Office of Financial Regulation issued a cease and desist order to Wakulla Bank citing "unsafe and unsound" practices. A deadline was set to correct the problems, but the issues were apparently not resolved to the state's satisfaction, leading to the closure on Friday.

According to a press release from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), to protect the depositors, the FDIC entered into a purchase and assumption agreement with Centennial

## Corrections officer, hospital employee face fraud charges

*Oh, what a tangled web we weave, when first we practice to deceive.*

A twisted web is being unraveled at Calhoun-Liberty Hospital where an anonymous tip helped uncover a case of alleged insurance fraud.

Warrants were issued Tuesday for the arrests of Dallas Hogans, 26, of Bristol, and Cedric Bernard Simmons, 34, of

Blountstown. Both Hogans and Simmons are being charged with three counts of conspiracy to commit insurance fraud over \$20,000. Hogans is charged with three counts of forgery and Simmons is charged with being a principle to forgery.

Administrator Phillip Hill recently received an anonymous phone call from a concerned person who believed insurance fraud could be occurring at

the hospital. The caller provided enough information to prompt Hill to conduct an internal investigation.

After Hill did some digging, he spoke with Hogans, a housekeeping employee, who eventually confessed that she was working with Simmons, a correctional officer at Gulf Correctional Institution, in a scheme to obtain life insurance on a patient. Hogans said her role was

to scope out potential victims. Specifically, she was to determine if the patient could "speak, write, or had family visiting."

Hill contacted Blountstown Police Chief Glenn Kimbrel and Inv. Timothy Partridge was assigned to the case. He learned that Hogans and Simmons had applied for three life insurance policies on a 74 year-old patient who met their "criteria" of not being able to speak or

write and didn't have family stopping by. The policies totalled \$200,000 with Hogans and Simmons reportedly 50/50 beneficiaries.

Hill said Hogans was immediately fired and two other employees have been suspended pending further investigation.

Chief Kimbrel commends Hill for contacting authorities. "My hat's off to him for the way he handled the situation."

## Patriots tackle at-large voting

The Calhoun Liberty Patriots have voted to tackle an issue that has concerned many area residents for years.

Currently, voters in Calhoun County can cast ballots for only one county commissioner and one school board member to represent their district. However, over in Liberty County, as well as many other areas, every registered voter gets to vote for each representative on the commission and school board.

Back in 1996, a local group pushed to have the issue placed on the ballot in Calhoun County as a referendum asking voters if they wished to change from single member districts to at-large voting. Calhoun Countians spoke loud and clear, with 70 percent in favor of switching to at-large voting in both the commission and school board elections, which were listed separately on the ballot. The following year, the

According to the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office, Hansford was stopped on Flatwoods Road Sunday night by Dep. Nick Keller and Dep. Nate Jordan for speeding and having an expired tag. Dep. Eddie Dalton and his K-9 were called to the scene and the dog alerted to the presence of drugs. Several cold medicines, lithium cell phone batteries, lighter fluid, ammonia nitrate, and tools used to strip lithium batteries were discovered, leading to Hansford's arrest.


### Mills jailed for being disorderly

## Many believe septic law stinks; effort to repeal

Attention septic tank owners: Beware of Florida Law SB 550!

As of 1/1/11, all septic tank owners will be required to have their tanks pumped and inspected every five years - whether they need it or not. If your tank fails the state inspection, it must be repaired or replaced. Some systems may require complete replacement costing \$3000 to \$4000, plus the inspection fees. If you don't comply, you can be fined \$500 per day, plus a misdemeanor charge.

If your systems fails to pass and you can't afford to repair it or qualify for a grant, you may not be able to live in your house with a non-compliant septic system because your electricity could be subject to be turned off for not having a working system.

For city sewage, the law will require that all septage, including at the treatment

plant, not be disposed of land after 1/1/16. This will increase the city sewage rate. Also if DOH has control, they they and EPA plan to enforce numeric nutrient criteria on the city treatment plans which would cost up to \$75 billion in Florida. Do the math: that's \$60 per person, per month on a 10 year amortization.

Florida residents need to act now before the November election and send a message to politicians that they could lose our support in the upcoming election if they don't repeal this law in special session before their term ends.



## Landowners advised of Oct. 29 conservation program deadline

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Florida has set a cutoff date of October 29, 2010, to submit applications for several voluntary conservation programs that may help eligible participants pay for conservation practices to prevent soil erosion, improve water quality, restore wetlands and provide habitat for wildlife.

\* The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is a conservation program that provides financial and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers who face threats to soil, water, air, and related natural resources on their land. Through EQIP, NRCS develops contracts with agricultural producers to voluntarily implement conservation practices.

Persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production and owners of non-industrial private forestland are eligible for the program. Eligible land includes cropland, pastureland, private non-industrial forestland, and other farm or ranch lands.

\* The Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program (WHIP) is a voluntary program for developing or improving high quality habitat that supports fish and wildlife populations of National, State, Tribal, and local significance. Through WHIP, the NRCS provides technical and financial assistance to private and Tribal landowners for the development of upland, wetland, aquatic, and other types of wildlife habitat.

\* The Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) provides







Willard and Alma's daughter, Tracy, had the



The win put the Wildcats at 10-6 for the season.







T. J. Granger leaps high as he and his teammates attempt to block a Graceville punt.



get on the show.

I didn't have to wait! Early this year, I received an email from Wheel of Fortune telling me I had been invited to audition. I couldn't believe it! Somehow, by God's hand, I had been chosen. I didn't hesitate to call and tell them I would love to try out!

When I arrived at the audition, there were only 75 people—much less than I expected. The contestant coordinators took our names and a picture of each of us so they could identify who we were. They called our names and we were given an opportunity to choose a letter and try to solve a puzzle. I solved a puzzle (and won a Wheel of Fortune baseball cap) that round. I felt pretty good. Next, the coordinators gave us five minutes to solve fill in the blank puzzles. The coordinators collected our puzzles and scored them. Then they came back in the room and called out 25 of us and told us that we could stay. I had made it to the final round of tryouts! We tried out like it was the show, with five of us at a time taking turns pretending to spin, guessing letters, and solving puzzles. I solved another puzzle that round. After everyone had a few chances to try out, they told us our audition was over. They let us know if we were selected to be a contestant, we'd receive a letter in the next two to three weeks.

Almost three weeks to the day, I received my letter from "Wheel of Fortune" telling me that I had been selected to be on the show and that I would receive a call sometime within the next eighteen months about when I would be taping my show! I had to wait until the end of July before I received my call. I was told my tape date would be Friday, August 13th. The next two weeks went by so fast. I studied like I was taking a final exam. I went online and found a lot of helpful hints about solving puzzles. And of course I had recorded and watched every single episode of "Wheel of

Fortune" this year.

My husband, John, and I arrived in LA the day before the taping. I was so concerned that I would sleep in for my shuttle to the Studios that I tried to go to bed early. I didn't realize I'd be up at 4:45 AM and ready to start my day because of the time difference. I made myself try to sleep a little more. I was up and ready to meet the shuttle at 7:15 AM.

When I got to the lobby, I met some of the other contestants that had traveled to be on the show. Wheel of Fortune tapes six shows a day, two or three days each month. There were twenty contestants that day (including two alternates, just in case anyone does not make it). We were taken to the studios and were not allowed to use our phones or have access to any one outside the studio. I did not know my mom's flight had been delayed in Panama City the night before and she barely made it to the studios in time.

The four hours before the show went by quickly. I stayed calm as I got to know the other contestants. The contestant coordinators talked to us and gave us tips. We had an attorney go over the legal paperwork

for being on the show. We had our makeup done professionally. They took us out to the stage. The Wheel is big and very heavy. We got familiar with layout — where the Letter Board and Score Board are, how to spin the Wheel, how to clap, and they moved the risers up and down for our heights. While we were on stage, I saw my husband John, my mom, Frances, and Laurie come in to be seated which made me nervous. Then the contestants went back in the room and had more instructions from the coordinators. I barely recognized Vanna when she breezed through and wished us good luck.

The next thing I knew, it was show time. I was in the group for the first taping. I was both relieved and nervous to be first. I was relieved, because I wouldn't have to wait until 5:00 to tape a show, but I really wished I could have watched a few others go before me. They had us go on stage before Pat and Vanna. I saw them behind the Puzzle Board. It was at that moment that it hit me: this was a special moment in my life— one I'd never forget.

BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of Calhoun County, Florida ("Board"), acting as the governing body of the School District of Calhoun County, Florida ("District"), as follows:

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY FOR RESOLUTION. This Resolution is adopted pursuant to Section 1011.71(3)(b), Florida Statutes, and other applicable provisions of law.

SECTION 2. FINDINGS. The Board hereby finds and determines as follows:

A. All School Boards in the State of Florida, including this Board, have experienced drastic funding reductions in recent years while operating expenses continue to rise.

B. In the School District of Calhoun County, currently recognized revenue losses from the 2007-2008 fiscal year to the 2009-2010 fiscal year are equivalent to a per pupil decrease of more than 6.1 percent in total funding, and a decline of \$2,088,869 million in state revenues, and additional reductions are anticipated for the 2010-2011 and subsequent fiscal years.

C. As authorized by Section 1011.71(3)(b), Florida Statutes, as amended by Ch. 2009-59, § 33, at 35,

Laws of Fla., this Board determined, by an annual super majority vote, to levy an additional 0.25 mills for critical operating needs of the District (or "Critical Needs Millage") for the 2009-2010 fiscal year in an effort to preserve critical operations of the District while enduring declining state revenues.

D. This Board has also expressed its intent to continue to levy the Critical Operating Needs Millage for the 2010-2011 fiscal year, again endeavoring to preserve critical operations of the District while enduring declining state revenues.

E. Section 1011.71(3)(b), F.S., as amended during the 2010 Legislative Session (CS/HB 5101) provides that in order to levy such millage in any year after the 2010-2011 fiscal year, by a super majority vote, to levy the 0.25 Critical Needs Millage must be approved by the voters of the school district at the 2010 general election or at a subsequent election held at any time, for a period not in excess of two years or until changed by another millage election, whichever is earlier.

F. Subject to approval by the electors of the District at a referendum held as provided in Section 1011.71(3)(B), Florida Statutes, as amended by CS/HB 5101, Reg. Sess. § 30 (Fla. 2010), the School District of Calhoun County, Florida has the authority, by an annual super majority vote, to levy the 0.25 Critical Needs Millage for Critical Operating Needs of the District for the 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 fiscal years.

SECTION 3. CONTINUING LEVY OF CRITICAL NEEDS MILLAGE. Subject to approval by the electors of the District at a referendum held as provided in Section 1011.71(3)(b), Florida Statutes, as amended by CS/HB 5101, Reg. Sess. § 30 (Fla. 2010), the School District of Calhoun County, Florida has the authority, by annual super majority vote, to levy the 0.25 Critical Needs Millage for Critical Operating Needs of the District for the 2011-2012 and the 2012-2013 fiscal years in an effort to preserve Critical Operating Needs of the District while enduring declining state revenues.

SECTION 4. REFERENDUM ELECTION ORDERED. A referendum election is hereby ordered to be held in the District on November 2, 2010, to determine whether or not the School District of Calhoun County, Florida has the authority, by an annual super majority vote, to levy the 0.25 Critical Needs Millage for Critical Operating Needs of the District for the 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 fiscal years.

SECTION 5. NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ELECTION. The Superintendent is hereby authorized and directed to place a notice of the referendum election in a newspaper of general circulation published in the District. The publication shall be made at least 30 days prior to the referendum and shall be made at least twice, once in the fifth week and once in the third week prior to the week in which the referendum is deemed to be held. The notice of referendum shall be in substantially the form provided in the attached Exhibit A. This Resolution shall be published as a part of such notice.

SECTION 6. PLACES OF VOTING; INSPECTORS AND CLERKS. The polls will be open at the voting places on the date of the referendum election from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. All qualified electors residing within the District shall be entitled and permitted to vote at the referendum election on the proposition provided in this Resolution. Bank of Conway, Arkansas, to assume all of the deposits of Wakulla Bank.


Depositors at all 12 branches of Wakulla Bank will automatically become depositors of Centennial Bank. Deposits will continue to be insured by the FDIC.

The closure of Wakulla Bank raises the total number of bank failures across the country in 2010 to 129 and the 25th in Florida.

As of June 30, 2010, Wakulla Bank had approximately \$424.1 million in total assets and \$386.3 million in total deposits. Centennial Bank did not pay the FDIC a premium for the deposits of Wakulla Bank. In addition to assuming all of the deposits of the failed bank, Centennial Bank agreed to purchase essentially all of the assets.

The FDIC and Centennial Bank entered

into a loss-share transaction on \$212.7 million of Wakulla Bank's assets. Centennial Bank will share in the losses on the asset pools covered under the loss-share agreement. The loss-share transaction is projected to maximize returns on the assets covered by keeping them in the private sector. The transaction also is expected to minimize disruptions for loan customers. The FDIC estimates that the cost to the Deposit



Insurance Fund (DIF) will be \$113.4 million. Compared to other alternatives, Centennial Bank's acquisition was the least costly resolution for the FDIC's DIF.



BP has also given grants of \$87 million to the states to help tourism recover and bring people back to the Gulf beaches.

And we've dedicated \$500 million to work with local and national scientific experts on the impact of the spill and to restore environmental damage.
