Help Sought in Pioneer Fires

Suspicious Fires Being Investigated by State Fire Marshall's Office

On Aug. 29 between 9:57 p.m. and 11 p.m., Hendry County Deputies responded to reports of two structure fires in the Pioneer Plantation area.

At 9:57 p.m., Hendry County Deputies responded to the 3055 12th Street, Pioneer, regarding a trailer fire. When deputies arrived on scene they found the double wide mobile home fully engulfed in flames. Pioneer Fire Department arrived on scene and was able to extinguish the flames.

A short time later Deputies were dispatched to 3950 10th Street, Pioneer, responding to a second structure fire. Deputies reported that when they arrived they found a single wide mobile home fully engulfed in flames.

A Window Into the Past



The Clewiston News: Making History Since 1928

The Clewiston News has been reporting history since it was first published in 1928. Some stories mark events that residents will always remember, such as the election of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the assassination of John F. Kennedy, and even the opening of the U.S. Sugar Mill. Leading up to our 85th anniversary next year, we will be picking articles from our archives. The stories offer an interesting perspective into the town's history and provide a candid look at the Clewiston of yesteryear.

The following are stories, as they appeared, in archived editions of The Clewiston News:

Clewiston Mourns President's Death

Thursday, November 28, 1963

The four days that rocked the world started with the firing of a bullet on a Dallas street Friday shortly after noon. On November 22nd, 1963, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, president of the United States, was assassinated.

From radio and television outlets and wire services the shocking news spread locally from person to person. There was almost universal disbelief and incredulity, but finally with confirmation of the announcement of the President's death, everyone faced the reality.

At Clewiston High School, a radio was turned on in the principal's of-

fice, and when the President's death was announced Principal Brandon, asking a few other teachers to help, went from classroom to classroom to inform students and teachers.

S.R. 80 Project Begins

State Road 80, from C.R. 833 to East of U.S. 27, is beginning the transformation from a two-lane road to a four-lane road.

The plan to widen S.R. 80 has been in effect for many years, though action is just now beginning to take place.

The contractor hired for the reconstruction is C.W. Roberts Contracting, Inc., which is based in Tallahassee.

Preliminary work started just recently in the last half of August, which has included placing construction signs and installing erosion control, which is a technique used to prevent or control wind and water from eroding the concrete, according to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

This work will take about two weeks.

No lane closures are planned and construction work is planned for daytime hours, though some activity may take place during the night.

The project will cost a total of \$9.4 million and is estimated to be completed by spring of 2014, if weather conditions are right.

S.R. 80 is a highly traveled road and modifying it to four lanes will reduce commuting time between areas.

With that comes the possibility of economic growth as industries take advantage of the improved highway system.

"It's also an evacuation route from one side of Florida to the other. So with the widening you will have improved passing," explained Phil Gillogly, Engineering Intern at Hen-

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Inland Birding Fun: Northern Flicker (NOFL)

September 15th marks the 7th year that Hendry Glades Audubon has participated in the Florida Fall North American Migration Count (NAMC).

The area of a count is not a circle, but the boundaries of a County. The idea is to have a contiguous interlocking set of non-overlapping counts across North America.

Volunteers will be using various modes

of travel including cars, bicycles, or be on foot during their search for birds. Join a team or count at other locations. The following teams, who will be meeting at 7 a.m., need additional counters, compilers and photographers: STA5, Okaloacoochee Slough State Forest, or Lakeport Area.

Contact Margaret England for copy of the report form or to volunteer to help a team or survey from your home for an hour or more on Sept. 15. Most of the teams will be surveying wetland areas where they will identify birds by sight or sound.

Reports of migrating and resident birds found in other habitats are needed in order to get a more accurate snapshot of the birds in inland Florida including the Northern Flicker. This common Florida Bird lives in open habitats near trees, including pine and mixed woodlands and residential areas.

Northern Flickers are a fairly large woodpecker that is smaller than Pileated Woodpeckers and larger than other Florida woodpeckers. They have a slim rounded head, slightly downcurved bill, fairly long tail, and broad wings. The feathers located on the undersides of the wing and tail of the eastern birds is bright yellow.

Their brown plumage is patterned with black spots, bars and crescents. The oldest known Northern Flicker lived to be at least nine years and two months old. Northern Flickers' calls can be loud rolling rattles or a loud single-note "kyeer". They also make quiet, rhythmic "wick-a, wick-a" sounds when they are close together or displaying.

They forage mainly on the ground for insects, especially ants and beetles. This Flicker's long tongue can snag prey about two inches beyond the end of its bill. Their diet can also include fruit and seeds, especially in the winter.

Breeding pair will work together to excavate

a nest cavity in dead or diseased tree trunks or large branches in about 12 days between late March and June.

They often reuse cavities that they or other species used in previous years. Their nest cavity is 13 to 16 inches deep with a 3-inch diameter entrance hole. The female lays 5 to 8 eggs in the nest cavity that are incubated for 11 to 12 days with the young fledging in 25 to 28 days.

You are invited to join Hendry-Glades Audubon volunteers for birding trips to Stormwater Treatment Area 5 (STA5) at the new Deer Fence Trailhead located 29 miles south of Clewiston on Sept. 15 during the NAMC or Oct. 13 during an

escorted trip.

Road Construction and Closure on CR 835

New Traffic Signage

The City of Clewiston is changing traffic patterns and rights of way at two more intersections in town. Citizens and drivers should be aware of the changes at the following two intersections:

•Ventura and San Benito: The intersection is currently a 4-way stop. The City will be removing the two stop signs facing East and West on Ventura Street. Ventura will now be a through street and only traffic traveling North and South on San Benito will be required to stop.

•Aztec and Berner: The intersection is currently a 3-way stop. The City will be removing

the two stop signs facing East and West on Aztec. Aztec will now be a through street and only traffic Southbound on Berner will be required to stop.

The changes are expected to be implemented the week of Sept. 10.

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


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SFWMD Continues Moving Historic Magnitude of Water

Since the onslaught of Tropical Storm Isaac five days ago, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) has moved more than 25 billion gallons of water in western Palm Beach County, which was heavily inundated with rainfall during the storm.

The agency's Emergency Operation Center remains fully activated, and emergency operations continue to provide flood relief to communities hit hardest by the 1-in-100-year storm event.

"The District's flood control pumps and infrastructure were operating at maximum capacity to move huge volumes of water through the regional system during and after the event," said Tommy Strowd, SFWMD Director of Operations, Maintenance and Construction.

"With areas of western Palm Beach County receiving more than a foot of rain over a three day period, water managers moved water at record rates to reduce the impacts of flooding."

are forecasting below-average rainfall through the Labor Day weekend, further allowing flood waters to drain without additional inflows.

With one day left in the month, August rainfall to-date for the Palm Beach County area was 16.18 inches. This is double, or approximately 8.64 inches more rainfall, than the average for the month.

The C-51 Basin received 27 percent of its average annual rainfall in the four days of rainfall associated with Tropical Storm Isaac. Eastern Broward, Miami-Dade, Martin and St. Lucie counties, the Lower Kissimmee Basin and Lake Okeechobee all received above-average rainfall for the month.

Regional Flood Control

The South Florida Water Management District operates and maintains the regional water management system known as the Central and Southern Florida Project, which was authorized by Congress more than 60 years ago to protect residents and businesses from floods and droughts.

The regional water management system is comprised of more than 1,600 miles of canals, 1,000 miles of levees/berms, 1,300 water control structures and 64 pump stations.

During the past five years, the District has invested approximately \$240 million to maintain the region's flood control infrastructure and ensure it operates at optimal capacity.

Stormwater Volume

Based on radar rainfall estimates, up to 14.85 inches of rain fell over 72 hours in an area of western Palm Beach County known as the C-51 Basin, encompassing communities that include Royal Palm Beach, Loxahatchee Groves and the Acreage.

Since Monday, water managers moved 25 billion gallons of water in the C-51 Basin in response to the storm, enough to fill 38,000 Olympic-size swimming pools.

At the peak of storm response, the C-51 canal was moving 9,600 cubic-feet of water per second, the highest rate ever recorded. The C-51 Basin covers 100,000 acres, one-quarter the size of Lake Okeechobee.

In addition to the regional system's permanent pumps moving water through the primary canal system, the District also deployed nine temporary pumps in western Palm Beach County to help alleviate flood conditions in the Acreage and Deer Run communities.

Rainfall

In a boost for recovery efforts, the most heavily impacted areas received little to no rainfall in the past 24 hours. District meteorologists

Gas Price Update

Average retail gasoline prices in Florida have not moved in the past week, averaging \$3.77/g on Sunday. This compares with the national average that has increased 1.4 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.80/g.

Including the change in gas prices in Florida during the past week, prices yesterday were 17.2 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 25.1 cents per gallon higher than a month ago.

The national average has increased 20.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 12.9 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"With the conclusion of the summer driving season, we can expect gasoline prices to go on a diet," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan.

"Like all diet programs, you may not see immediate loss in the short term, but we'll likely see some loss in the longer term, say the next several weeks, as factors align in motorists favor-specifically as Isaac has exited without much ado, demand to see seasonal decline, and with cheaper to produce winter-spec higher RVP gasoline coming, there's light at the end of the tunnel," DeHaan said.

New Glasses Top Back-To-School List

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Lady Tigers Find Their Groove Against Immokalee

Senior Mandi Perry got her groove. Sophomore Kiana Hardy got her groove. The Lady Tigers got their groove. And the Clewiston fans got their groove. Everyone brought it together for a thrilling 3 games to 2 varsity volleyball victory last Thursday against Immokalee at the Clewiston High School gym.

The Tigers defeated the Indians 13-25, 25-23, 25-6, 22-25, and 15-11 to win the match.

Between her serving and her perfect setups, Perry helped swing the Tigers effort toward success with her critical play in Games 2 and 3. With her team down 1 game to none and 18-21 in the second game, Perry unleashed six straight serving points to push the Lady Tigers to a 24-21 lead, the last point coming on a Hardy kill. Three volleys later, the Lady Tigers owned a 25-23 win.

The crowd also gave the hometown gals an extra push. Irritated that the Immokalee fans on hand chanted loudly, "You know!" when their team scored, Tiger fans began to counter by repeating the line when the Lady Tigers scored. Tiger growls and yells collided in midair with Indian chants and calls the rest of the raucous night.

Perry led off Game 3 by serving 12 consecutive points that helped build a 13-0 Clewiston lead. She had found a chink in the Indians' armor in Game 2, arcing her serves toward a particular player on the Immokalee back line.

Perry worked it over and over in Game 3, as the Indian defender could not dig out the low balls and mishandled the higher balls, sending them off in a variety of directions, unplayable by her teammates.

"She was making wild passes," Perry said of the victim of her personal best consecutive service points. "Either the ball didn't get to her or she didn't have any control when it did."

Clewiston left Immokalee in shambles after Game 3, 25-6.

But the Indians weren't done. When they had every reason to fold, they found a second wind. Destiny Christopher, whose presence on the front line is as big as anyone's, nailed kills from her front line posts, sending sharp, diagonal hits down the middle and across to just inside the right boundary. Callie Davenport, who began strong and then struggled in Game 3, regained her form and set up the front line or put the ball over the net herself, keeping her team's volleys alive. Perry who lofted it high for Hardy. Hardy would pounce on it and drill it to helpless Indian

defenders. Hardy would finish with 17 kills on the night. Senior libero Brooke Flynn also made critical digs, passes, and put overs. Perry would score 35 serving points in the match.


This meeting is open to the public, and interested citizens are invited to attend. No decisions concerning Special Magistrate recommendations will be made by the Board at the meeting.

Record Breaking Wet August

After a mixed-bag of rainfall for much of the summer, the month of August was characterized by periods of widespread heavy rainfall.

Most of the eastern metro region of South Florida received anywhere from 10 to 20 inches of rain, with another area of over 10 inches over western sections of Collier and Hendry counties.

Of the 31 sites that report daily rainfall over mainland South Florida, all but five reported monthly rainfall in excess of 10 inches. Two locations, Palm Beach Gardens and West Palm Beach, exceeded 20 inches for the month.

Tropical Storm Isaac was responsible for much of this rainfall, but heavy rain fell on several other days in August as South Florida was under a predominantly moist southerly wind flow resulting from lower atmospheric pressure over the eastern half of the United States.

According to the South Florida Water Management District, it was the 5th wettest August for the district since 1932 (Note: the district includes areas north and northeast of Lake Okeechobee not covered by NWS Miami).

In areas where summer rainfall was copious even before August, particularly over the east coast metro, year-to-date rainfall is on pace to break the all-time record for a calendar year.

These locations include Miami International Airport (68.48 inches as of 8/31), Miami Beach (48.34 inches) and The Redland (63.54 inches). West Palm Beach is on pace for their second-wettest year on record (61.47 inches).

Temperatures

The increased cloud cover and rainfall played a big role in keeping temperatures near to slightly below normal during August.

This is a continuation of the temperature patterns observed since the beginning of the rainy

season in May.

Outlook and Hazards

The long-range outlook by the Climate Prediction Center for the rest of September calls for equal chances of above, below or near normal precipitation and temperatures. Long-range models such as the CFS call for drier-than-normal conditions through September and extending into October.

This reflects the typically-high amount of uncertainty in long-range outlooks. Considering that September ranks as one of the wetter months of the year, this still means we'll see areas of locally heavy rain which is typical of the time of year.

September in South Florida means that tropical cyclones are a possibility. September ranks second behind October as the month in which South Florida has been directly hit by hurricanes, and is the month of greatest MAJOR hurricane strikes.

While South Florida did not experience major wind impacts from Isaac last month, the severe flooding experienced in some areas was a stark reminder that tropical cyclones bring more than one type of threat.

Make sure you are prepared for the peak of hurricane season by ensuring that personal and business hurricane plans are in place. Go to ready.gov for information and preparedness checklists.

September is also a prime month for rip currents. Always swim near a lifeguard and heed the advice of Ocean Rescue personnel. Pay attention to flags posted at lifeguard stands which alert of the potential rip current danger.

The poised artist quietly studied the intricacies of the flowering image that stretched across the canvas in an array of tropical colors. A long silence prevailed as the artist pondered and then the timeless moment was broken by the motion of a delicate art brush passionately guided by a petite hand. Lifelike droplets of water soon began to appear as each brush stroke miraculously birthed life into the painting.

This year the Clewiston Museum is honoring artist, Sue Corbin, in memoriam at its second annual art show on September 27, 2012, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. The museum will display several of her favorite art pieces in addition to many prints that were made from Sue Corbin's original paintings.

Mrs. Corbin was always a person of many talents. Surprisingly, marksmanship was one of her early talents. As a young girl, living in Kentucky, she was known as a 'crack shot' with her rifle and brought many squirrels home to grandma's frying pan. She attended Murray State Teacher's College (now Murray State University), and upon graduating worked at the First Bank of Murray in Murray, Kentucky as a bookkeeper.

In 1948, she married the love of her life, John Corbin. The Corbin family moved to Ft. Myers in 1955, then to Clewiston in 1956. Sue Corbin

played the piano and always enjoyed the arts. The arts were limited in rural Hendry County, so she made it a priority to educate her children (Nancy and Mary) with annual visits to museums and trips to musical theatre performances in Ft. Myers.

Mrs. Corbin dabbled in drawing and oils as her children were growing up, but she was in her 60's before she earnestly began seeking ways to develop her artistic talent. She enrolled at Palm Beach Junior College where she took drawing classes from Sandra Holder. She later studied oil painting under renowned artists, Mimi McCallum and Diane Richmond-Hall.

In the years that followed, Mrs. Corbin became an accomplished artist. She enjoyed painting realism and used close-ups from nature as her main subjects. Mrs. Corbin also perfected the placement of water droplets on her work; it was a distinct talent and one that would become her trademark.

Mrs. Corbin seldom sold her paintings, but was generous in making donations of her paintings to area charities and non-profit groups for silent auctions. This is primarily the way people have obtained her paintings, although she has sold a handful and made a few gifts to people who enjoyed her art pieces. She also made prints of her paintings and gave the beautiful print cards to friends on special occasions.

Mrs. Corbin is dearly missed by all that knew her, but her legacy continues through the beautiful paintings that were created by her loving hands.

Special People, A Special Holiday

My calendar notes that September 9th is set aside as "Grandparent's Day." There is not much mentioned in scriptures about grandparents; a fleeting reference in the Second Epistle to Timothy (1:5) mentions it.

Paul remarks that Timothy has a sincere faith; first lived in his grandmother Lois, and then in his mother Eunice.

For this reason, Paul is persuaded that Timothy too has that faith now living in him, and that it may be fanned into a great flame.

One of the ministries where I served was at a home and program for troubled young persons.

The program had a Grandparent's Coordinator as one of the staff. In these times of troubled and broken homes, it is often the grandparents who take responsibility for children; their guidance and input becomes a foundation like Paul noted in Timothy. They often provide the stability young persons need in a troubled, chaotic and changing world.

They've lived through many of the chances and changes of their own generations and have come to terms with life often better than their own children; being a gift of a stable quantity in an unstable and tumultuous world. They also embody a wisdom that comes with age; having lived through their own times of difficulty and met the challenges of their generations.

I was fortunate to have a grandmother around while I was in my formative years. World War II was a time of challenge unlike any other the nation had seen.

Work schedules were long and arduous, food was rationed and so was gasoline, air-raid drills meant blackouts and practices, no family was untouched.

Shortages and military call-ups left many homes broken up "for the duration." In the midst of it all, God sent a stable person who had time for an inquisitive and restless youngster.

She would read to me from the Bible and tell stories with lessons in them. My other grandmother took it upon herself to support two invalid relatives and see that they were housed, clothed and fed.

Both had lost their husbands, my grandfathers, prematurely but they had a spirit to keep on doing what needed to be done in the midst of hardships.

Today, the challenges are as serious and as potentially devastating to our society and world. Maybe the silent message to me was "We've been there, we've lived through it, so will you!"

That's the same message that grandparents may carry to our younger generation to-

day as well. Awhile back Hiam Ginott observed that "kids and grandparents get along so well because they have a common enemy!"

There's more to it than that; grandparents represent a second time to provide the gifts of faith, hope, charity, virtues and values when the first "lines of defense" (i.e. parents) are unable for whatever reason.

The scriptures may not speak much about grandparents, but records in many places the place of "elders" and their role in leadership, counsel, influence and foundations.

I am sure that the greater majority of those elders were also grandfathers and grandmothers; picking up their calling once more and leading with steady hands and open hearts all of those that were to follow them. Perhaps your calendar denotes Sunday, September 9th as "Grandparents Day" and you commemorate it in your worship or with those loved ones who have been sources of faith and strength in your lives.

If it is not on your calendar; what's to keep you from saying "Thanks" to those special people who have made your life special too?

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Nationally Known Speaker Coming to Hendry and Glades Counties

Drug Free Hendry County and Hendry Tobacco Free Partnership is proud to be bringing a nationally known drug addictions expert, Dr. Victor DeNoble to Hendry County to talk with students and parents about tobacco and drug issues.

Dr. DeNoble will be speaking to students during the day and to parents and community members in the evenings.

Dr. DeNoble received his Doctorate degree in 1976 in the field of Experimental Psychology from Adelphi University, Garden City NY.

He has postdoctoral fellowships from both the National Institute of Alcohol and Alcohol Abuse at Downstate Medical Center in Brooklyn, New York and the National Institute of Drug Abuse at the University of Minnesota.

In 1980, while a postdoctoral fellow, Dr. DeNoble was recruited by Philip Morris Tobacco Company to establish a Behavioral Pharmacology Laboratory to support a nicotine analogue program to study the behavioral and physiological effects of nicotine.

Dr. DeNoble subsequently worked in drug discovery for the DuPont Merck Pharmaceutical Company and Ayerst Research Laboratories specializing in the area of Central Nervous System Diseases.

Currently, Dr. DeNoble is the Vice President of Hissho, Inc., a scientific and medical communications company.

In 1994 after a congressional release from that confidentially agreement with the tobacco

company Philip Morris, he became the first "whistle-blower" to begin tearing down the wall of secrecy built by the tobacco industry.

He was a key witness in the federal governments case against the industry and has testified before Congress, the Food and Drug Administration and former Vice President Al Gore's Tobacco Settlement Committee.

His educational program on drug addiction is entitled "Drug Addiction - It's All in Your Brain." Groundbreaking discoveries about the brain have revolutionized our understanding of drug addiction.

This program reviews these discoveries and provides information about the science of the disease including the many harmful consequences

- Plans are being formulated and volunteers recruited for our next Clewiston Recreation Dept. Community event – "Fall Festival" tentatively scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 27.

Utilities Director McCarthy reports:

- Overall, the City fared very well through Tropical Storm Isaac, we had NO electrical outages even through the 40+ MPH wind gusts. We had over 6 inches of rain which did show some of our problems with inflow into our sewer system. With the manholes underwater, we have pumped an additional 1.5 million gallons through our plant. The flow is returning to normal and we will be addressing some of our worst areas from both a drainage and inflow issue.

- A flock of doves has been trying to roost in our substation; the unfortunate 12 will not be a problem anymore. The last two times that feeder two has tripped has been caused by birds. We have not had this kind of problem in our substation in the past and will be installing bird guards on top of the feeder breakers. We are also looking into some other methods of discouraging them from being in the substation.
