

ORANGE PARK – Town council members have agreed to name a town-owned patch of land "Somer's Sunshine Park" in remembrance of Somer Thompson, a 7-year-old child who police say was abducted and murdered inside a house just two blocks from the proposed site.

The council also agreed to hold a dedication cer-

emony at the "pocket park" on the southeast corner of Gano and Debarry avenues on Friday, Oct. 21 – the exact date two years ago when Somer's body was discovered at a Southeast Georgia landfill. A time has not been set, but the event will be open to the public.



meeting held on Tuesday, Oct. 4 that the proposed park – which also sits walking distance from the slain child's home -- will have a sign, a few benches and a short walkway that will create "a peaceful area to sit and relax."

"That would be our goal," Hall said. "It's not a big park, so it wouldn't be developed into anything else"

The planned dedication is in addition to a live oak tree town officials planted in Somer's memory at Clarke House Park on Kingsley Avenue last April.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Perfect weather, live entertainment, a 45-minute parade and the smell of sweet potato pie, collard greens and fried ox tail drew a record crowd to the 10th annual Soul Food Festival.

More than 7,000 people strolled the grounds or sat under canopies at Vera

Francis Hall Park, feasting on plates piled high with white rice, greens, barbecued ribs and other soul food favorites on Saturday, Oct. 1. Virtually everyone enjoyed a full day of music, street dancing and socializing with friends old and new, according to organizers who agree the festival was by far the best in its 10-year history.

In 1913, Clay County Sheriff Cherry murdered in woods at Yellow Water

For several decades after the Civil War, Clay County danced around the edges of complete civil disorder. In the years between 1885 and 1917, of the eight men elected to serve as sheriff of Clay County -three were killed in the line of duty and two went missing under suspicious circumstances. The migration south from exhausted forests in Georgia and Alabama of the turpentine industry brought gangs of abused and desperate workers full of hopelessness and anger into the county to exploit the rich pine forests. With law enforcement sparse and potential victims isolated, criminals, derelicts and miscreants were attracted south and into Florida like ants to a picnic.

People were afraid, they were armed. Mothers outside of Middleburg tended gardens with toddlers playing around their ankles and a shotgun within reach. When men gathered on the courthouse lawn in Green Cove to talk business or play checkers it resembled an armory with the Remington rifles leaning against stumps, trees,

In August of 1911, Sheriff James Weeks at age sixty lay on his death bed and the fear and violence in the county was approaching the boiling point. Young Shelt Cherry was generally proclaimed as the most likely to keep the lid on the pot

He was charming and charismatic, a man of his word. But those eyes --- one pale blue the



within reach.

other pale gray - could harden into a killing gaze. July 6, 1913, turned out to be gray and overcast. Before sun up, Sheriff Cherry drove a buggy west out of Green Cove Springs accompanied by a deputy on horseback. They were headed up to a troublesome turpentine camp at Yellow Water near the Duval County line to check on some things.

Near Middleburg, they turned north and approached the camp about 6 AM. As the story goes, Cherry arrived ahead of the deputy and spoke with one of the camp owners who stood on the porch of the commissary.

Allegedly, they were approached by a drunken turpentine worker carrying a shotgun and Cherry attempted to question the man. As Cherry stepped from the buggy, turning his back on the shotgun, the turpentine worked is supposed to have shot him down in cold blood. Regular normally law-abiding citizens were afraid and angry at loosing not just a sheriff but a friend --- and, momentarily, their hope and good conscience.



On July 6, 1913, Shelt Cherry became the third Clay County sheriff killed in the line of duty in less than eight years.

By noon, the accused killer, Rosco Smith, was riddled with over 500 bullets the newspapers claimed. But there were no answers only questions. Some say Cherry was not murdered but politically assassinated. That the turpentine worker was set up and probably never pulled the trigger. The the owners of the camp had bragged that if Cherry ever stepped on their property again he would end

But the questions were not officially asked. People were too ashamed at what they had already learned about themselves and their neighbors and not anxious to learn more.





Guest Column BCC should restore funding

As Sheriff of Clay County, I am very proud of the work CCSO has done both operationally and financially for the past seven (7) years. But it might surprise many to know that even though most costs have risen in the last seven years, as it stands today, the approved 2012 operating budget for CCSO, excluding employee health insurance, is basically the same as the first budget I submitted as Clay County Sheriff in 2005 of \$36,800,000. I don't know of many law enforcement agencies that can say that.

On September 27, 2011, the Clay County Board of County Commissioners voted to increase the millage but, in a separate vote, cut the Sheriff's Office budget by \$2.5 million.

During the years between 2005 and today, all agency cost increases were absorbed through innovative programs, downsizing, outsourcing, civilianizing and volunteerism. Those increases are familiar to all Clay County citizens in our personal lives when we pay for food, fuel and doctor visits. The Sheriff's Office faces those same increases on a larger

scale dealing with inmate food and medical care, insurance and fleet fuel costs. All unfunded mandates from the State of Florida have been absorbed, most notably those related to monitoring sexual offenders and predators. Raises for employees in 2005 and 2006 are also included in that number. CCSO employees have not had raises since October 2007 but did have their salaries reduced by 3% this year by the State Legislature.

During that same period of time every effort was made to save money all year so that a cash carry forward of unused money could be used as a reserve account to roll forward into the next year's budget. Each year that cash carry forward averaged over \$1 million. No "use it or lose

it" end of year spending sprees ever occurred out of respect for the taxpayers' money. Since law enforcement has many unknowns each year, such as a natural disaster or a major crime that taxes our manpower resources and requires massive overtime expenses, a built-in reserve is a necessity. That reserve is now gone and, with it, the ability to ensure proper and necessary staffing in the event of a catastrophic occurrence.

Clay County is one of the safest communities in Northeast Florida and when crimes do happen the offenders are twice as likely to be caught here than the state's average because of CCSO's 44 percent crime clearance rate. We can't continue to deliver this kind of top rate service, however, when adequate funding is not available. The first responsibility of government is to protect its citizens; all else is secondary. I urge the Clay County Board of County Commissioners to restore adequate funding to its law enforcement agency so that the outstanding men and women of CCSO can continue to keep Clay County one of the safest in the country.

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Black bear in Camp Blanding study suspected of pilfering food at MacClenny home

CAMP BLANDING -- The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has received reports about a black bear in the Macclenny area, west of Jacksonville, this week

"The bear apparently broke into a home at 2 a.m. Monday and grabbed food items, including a birthday cake," said Karen Parker, FWC public information coordina-

An FWC biologist went to the scene Tuesday to assess the situation.

"There was a well-used trail behind the house and quite a bit of garbage that had been spread around by the bear. Remains of the birthday cake also were scattered on the ground," Parker said.

Wildlife officials have set up a culvert trap and baited it with cupcakes, since this bear seems to like cake, according to Parker.

"The bear has been part of an FWC research project on Camp Blanding and is outfitted with a white collar and two ear tags. Biologists are monitoring the bear. It's easy to identify," Parker said.

According to the tracking information at 5 a.m. Tuesday, the bear has moved several miles south of Macclenny and is on the south side of Interstate 10.

We are attempting to capture the bear," Parker said. "Relocating this bear is not an option. Public safety is our No. 1 concern. When we catch it, we will euthanize it. We do not want the bear entering another

Black bears normally are too shy to risk contact with humans, but their strong food drive can overwhelm the instinct to get away from humans.

When bears have access to unnatural food sources such as pet foods, garbage, barbecue grills, birdseed or livestock feed,' Parker said, "they quickly learn to associate people with food."

Properly storing or securing garbage is a proven method of discouraging bears. Bird feeders and barbecue grills should be stored in a secure place, such as a garage or a sturdy shed.

Place garbage cans outside on the morning of pickup, rather than the night before. People can encourage their neighbors, community or local government to use bear-resistant trash containers or dump-"People can also help by feeding pets indoors or bringing in dishes after feeding," Parker said.

If you see a black bear, remain calm. Don't run away. Walk calmly toward a building or vehicle and get inside.

"If you have children or pets, bring them inside. Encourage the bear to leave. Bang pots and pans, or blow an air horn or whistle. The more stressful the encounter with you, the less likely the bear is to come back." Parker said.

If a bear is in a tree, leave it alone. Remove people and pets from the area. The bear usually will come down and leave when it feels safe.

If the bear is threatening the safety of humans, pets or livestock or is causing property damage, report it to the FWC at 888-404-FWCC (3922).

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



Gas prices fall 6 cents in area

JACKSONVILLE -- Average retail gasoline prices in Jacksonville have fallen 6.1 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.31/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 5.9 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.46/g, according to gasoline price JacksonvilleGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Jacksonville during the past week, prices yesterday were 69.0 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 25.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 20.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 73.3 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"Motorists are certainly delighted that average gasoline prices are at their lowest since early March, but compared to prices a year ago, motorists are still feeling a pinch at the pump," said Patrick DeHaan, seniors analyst. "It's great to see gasoline prices falling, but at the same time, prices a year ago were nearly 75 cents less per gallon.

Troublesome deer munching roses

Q. I live near a large wooded area and have a major problem with deer feeding on my roses. I've used everything people have suggested from smelly sprays, to moth balls, to human hair, to bars of soap, but nothing seems to work. Short of fencing my yard off or getting rid of the roses, what's the best thing for me to do?

R. Actually you've tried most of what we might suggest. The problem is what works for one person might not work for another because deer are capable of deciding what bothers them and what does not. If one deer decides soap is not going to bother them when there are tasty roses to be had – that won't work on that one deer that probably has friends who they can also induce to ignore the soap. So what can you do?

Something that has worked for a local high school we work with is the installation of a motion sensing sprinkler head. These are impulse sprinkler heads placed on a pole with a hose attached on the bottom that have a battery run motion sensing device. When a large enough animal moves nearby. the sensor picks it up and turns on the sprinkler for a few minutes - long enough to scare the animal away or else wet it sufficiently enough it decides it is not worth staying around. They have worked really well for this particular rose bed where deer have been a real problem – try it and see if it works for you. To find who sells them I went online and typed in "Deer Sprinklers." Lots of supply sources popped up.

Another tried and true method that does a great job is an electric fence around the rose bed itself. I've personally had good luck keeping deer from

rose beds using this. Chargers are available now that can either be plugged into an extension cord or can run on a battery. A single wire can be run through a hole in PVC pipe inserted in the ground at 4-5 feet high. The pipe will act as its own insulated fence post. There are certain seasons when deer will be more active. During those times, keep the fence turned on. Once they get shocked a few times, they'll probably not

even come to the fence when it's turned on or off. To be more effective, use a charger designed to fence in livestock rather than pets. These fences do not put out enough charge to seriously hurt the deer or a person, but they are unpleasant. Just be sure to turn this off before you work your roses!

Note: If you live in a residential community, it's important to post signs that indicate the fence is charged. Such signs can be bought at most supply houses that sell the fencing material.

Italian cypress are pretty, but disease is killing them in state

Q. I have two large Italian Cypress trees at the corners of my house. My problem is they are dying from the bottom up and even though I keep spraying with fungicides, more branches die the minute I stop spraying and then nothing grows back into the dead areas. They look terrible – what should I do?

R. Italian Cypress (*Cupressus semper-virens*) – also known as the Mediterranean Cypress, Tuscan Cypress, Graveyard Cypress and Pencil Pine where

once used a lot in our part of the state until a disease became widespread on them that causes the dieback you are describing. Because of this many nurseries have stopped selling them, but there are still people planting more because they are very beautiful evergreen trees that have that tight "columnar" form which helps accent formal walkways, gardens, or in your case the corners of your house. With time however, they often grow too tall and overpower what a person was trying to accent. For this reason they really have limited value in most residential landscapes.

This might be OK were it not for the fact that our climate and soil in this part of Florida just does not suit them. The normal Mediterranean climate (where they are from) is much drier than Florida. Here in our often poorly drained soils, the heavy summer rains we see keep the ground wet for days leading to root rot on many of these.

In the weakened state that results from this, they seem particularly susceptible to several foliar diseases we just lump together and call the "Juniper Blights" because they also attack other plants such as Juniper, Arbor Vitae and Leyland Cypress. On the Italian Cypress they seem to get really bad.

While spraying with fungicides such as those containing copper seems to slow the spread of these foliar diseases, once a branch browns, all you can do is cut it off the afflicted plant – which you must do to slow future spread of the pathogen. As you have noted however, in doing this the lower portions of the plant are slow to regrow new growth – if at all. Not much you can do about it.

Bottom line – a no win situation – this will be a constant problem for your Italian Cypress trees that can only get

worse as the plants become more and more unattractive in the landscape. Your call but I would bite the bullet now and just remove them.

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

"I attribute that to all of the entertainers, the volunteers, the city of Green Cove Springs and all of our sponsors," an elated Felecia Hampshire said. "It takes all of them to make something like this successful

"I was amazed," she added. "We're used to three or four thousand people, maybe."

Hampshire said a \$1,200 grant from the county's Tourist Development Council helped boost attendance because the money was used to expand advertising to include TV spots on Black Entertainment Television.

Highlighting the entertainment was the platinum-selling 69 Boyz, a hip hop group from Jacksonville best known for its 1994 hit, "Tootsee Roll." Others, including Orange Park vocalist Nalani Quintello and a zumba aerobics dance group from Starke, had people up and moving as well.

The zumba demonstrations proved so popular that Hampshire wants to invite other groups to next year's event.

"I'd love to have a zumba dance-off," said Hampshire, a city council member who celebrated her 51st birthday on Saturday. "Maybe we could invite four or five groups."

Music and dancing weren't the only reasons people spent the day at the park, named after a well-respected city resident and longtime Clay County educator who died in 1977.

Sonia King Daniels said she moved from Green Cove Springs several years ago, but has attended the last two festivals and plans to come back next year.

"It's awesome," she said minutes before the Parade of Pride began its march down Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. "It gives me a chance to see old family and friends."

Lee Bentley, director of the city's planning and zoning commission, said everyone he has talked to agrees that festival organizers could be on to something big.

"Many of the festival patrons were impressed," he said. "Those people were really into the soul food. They had some great entertainment and all the vendors were very pleased."

PENNEY FARMS -- Penney Retirement Community (PRC) resident Barbara Betker turned 80 on Sept. 8.

That is not remarkable. About half of PRC residents have done that.

What is unusual is the bash that Barbara threw for over 100 people family, friends from other places, PRC residents, a housekeeper and her family. In her cottage apartment? Well, no. Barbara's heart is at least as big as Barrows Hall, and that's where 14 tables were set up to hold her many guests. It didn't happen on Sept.8 because Barbara's special friend Marilyn Hollowood was traveling in Peru and Ecuador. But on Saturday, Oct. 1, Marilyn was back, and the Blast from the Past took place. Barbara had planned it with her granddaughter, Lisa, who lives conveniently on Fleming Island. Barbara's daughter Margaret, Lisa's mother, came from California with her husband. Leo: her other daughter is even farther away, in Hawaii.

The Blast from the Past started with the theme of movies. On the punch table stood an elaborate papier maché movie camera of the old days. Four short movies were shown on the screen. A rogue investor found him and loaned him \$50,000.00 and took a mortgage on his property by telling him that no payments would be due. After a year when Mr. Jones became ill, the investor demanded payment unless he signed a contract to sell for \$150,000. He signed. A rogue church member learned of the situation and offered a purchase contract for \$175,000.00; he signed. LEGAL ENTANGLEMENT. The investor sued for foreclosure or in the alternative, to enforce his purchase contract; the church member sued to enforce her purchase contract. Then Mr. Jones died. His family hired us and the property went into probate. RESULT: Both purchase contracts were voided and cancelled; the foreclosure was delayed long enough to sell the property for fair market value and then the \$50,000.00 loan was repaid without interest and the family received their inheritance. at Clarke House Park on Kingsley Avenue last April. More than 40 people, including Somer's mother, Diena Thompson, and Diena's father, Phillip Bowling, took part in the Earth Day observance, which included placement of a memorial plaque at the base of the tree.

Bowling, who serves as vice president of The Somer Thompson Foundation, requested that the pocket park – a triangular shaped parcel that measures less than an acre – be dedicated to his granddaughter in October, which Clay County commissioners have designated as S.T.O.P. Month. S.T.O.P. is an acronym for Stop the Offenders and Predators.

The Somer Thompson Foundation was formed in March of 2010 to develop and distribute child abduction prevention materials, monitor child safety legislation and provide financial and emotional support to families who have lost a child to a predator.

Council members agreed to name the park shortly after listening to a brief presentation made by Hall.

"How can you say no to that request?" Mayor Pete Morgan said.

Somer was kidnapped on her way home from Grove Park Elementary School on Oct. 19, 2009. Clay County Sheriff's Office investigators believe that area resident Jarred Harrell, who was 24 years old at the time, lured her into a vacant Gano Avenue house and sexually assaulted her before asphyxiating her and placing her body into a dumpster that subsequently was taken to the Chesser Island Road landfill near Folkston, Ga.

The discovery ended a two-day, community-wide search that drew national attention.

Harrell was arrested in Meridian, Miss., in February of 2010, and has been held in isolation at the Clay County Jail ever since. He also faces molestation charges involving another child, and will go to trial in that case Jan. 30 after a pretrial conference set for Jan. 17.

Harrell, who also faces multiple counts of possession of child pornography, has entered a plea of not guilty in the murder case. A trial date on the kidnapping and murder charges has not been set, but is expected to be held sometime during the first quarter of 2012.

Also on Tuesday, council members agreed to proceed with a plan to improve the aesthetic appearance in certain areas of the town – particularly the commercial corridor on Park Avenue.

The proposed plan — which town administrators didn't want to lay out in detail until the council approved the concept — would create an "abatement budget" of \$15,000 to \$20,000 that would allow the town to make repairs and cosmetic improvements to non-residential properties that have been abandoned or neglected.

The town then would place a lien on the property, and the cost of any materials or work performed on the buildings would be reimbursed by the property owners before — or at — the time of sale.

General Services director Alaina Ray told council members she believes an abatement budget would go a long way in improving the town's image.

"We don't have anything that really addresses the way [neglected buildings] look," she said. "We don't have anything in our codes" to force owners of dilapidated property to improve their appearance.

Ray said priority would be placed on non-residential buildings "visible from the street," and that property owners would be given a chance to make repairs and improvements on their own before the town takes action.

"We would use common sense," she said.

Ray and the town manager said they will present the council with a detailed plan in the near future.

Ngoy was undergoing a kidney transplant in India. Those who know him praised God for his recovery and return to strength and activity.

Dr. Mampunza's mother tongue is Kikongo, as he comes from the area between the mouth of the Congo River and the capital city of Kinshasa, where American Baptist missionaries work. He spoke directly to the audience in English, though. He is the Dean of the Medical School of the University, having come there from a similar position with the government medical school. He preferred to work in a Christian institution training doctors who will go practice in the rural areas, where 80% of Congolese still live. The cities, with 20% of the country's population, are served by 80% of the doctors.

In 1959 the Congo Protestant University, founded by Methodists, Presbyterians, American Baptists, British Baptists, and Disciples of Christ working in cooperation, boasted three students and three professors, foreigners. After two moves it is now located in the capital city, where 7,500 students are served by 200 professors, all Congolese with doctorates from European

or American universities. Dr. Ngoy earned his Ph.D. in Strasbourg, writing his dissertation on The Early Church Fathers.

Penney Memorial Church donates at least \$3,000 a year to the University as scholarship aid for students whose families could never afford the tuition. Drs. Ngoy and Mampunza showed pictures of some of those students, of classrooms and buildings and equipment and visiting teachers, bringing their supporters up to date on the vision, present state, and needs of the institution. It includes Schools of Theology, Business and Economics, and Law, as well as the Medical School, only five years old. The first year 1500 students applied. The faculty chose 850 to come to the campus and take the entrance exam. Of those, 270 were accepted. The first year is preparatory, because secondary schools in the DRC vary greatly in quality. The next three years teach basic sciences, and finally, in the fifth year, the students actually study medicine. Then they are sent to large teaching hospitals in the bush for handson experience.

There may be less than 100 who actually graduate. They go out to the poor, hardworking people of the villages, of the hills and valleys, most of whom believe that disease is caused by sorcerers, some of whom can ride on crocodiles, casting spells – or turn themselves into crocodiles! What a challenge!

Faith Walk

David Livingstone was a great missionary to Africa. Secular historians have emphasized Livingstone as an explorer, but he was really a missionary with God's heart for the lost.

Livingstone returned to his home in Scotland for a time of rest and speaking engagements sixteen years after his first journey into dark Africa. He was asked to speak to the students at the University of Glasgow.

In those days the undergraduates always heckled the speakers that came. They were going to greet this preacher with every kind of noise maker. When Livingstone walked to the speaker's podium, his left arm hung limply at his side, having been almost ripped from his body by a huge lion. His face was furrowed with innumerable lines and was a dark leathery brown from sixteen years in the African sun. Bouts of African fever had racked and emaciated his body. His frail body bore the marks of attacks by jungle savages. Half deaf from rheumatic fever and half blind from other jungle assaults, he stood before them, the missionary/preacher - more than an explorer.

Shocked, the students stared and recognized that here was a man who had burned out his life for God. No noise maker was heard. There was a hush over the auditorium.

They listened in silence as David Livingstone told about his journeys. He told of the tremendous needs of the vast African population.

"You may ask what sustained me in the midst of these toils, hardships, and incredible loneliness," he said. "It was a promise given me by a gentleman of the most sacred honor.

"It was this promise, 'Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the rould'."

This truly was a group of boys and coaches to be reckoned with; the love and respect for the game that just emanates from them all on the field is powerful. Obstacles were overcome and



to Sept. 30. The report covered everything from revitalization plans for the city's U.S. Hwy. 17 corridor to the placement of trash cans and benches along Walnut Street near Spring Park.

Mayor Debbie Ricks called the report "impressive," adding, "You are to be congratulated."

Councilman Bob Page echoed Ricks' words, saying, "The city manager has done a great job of addressing the tough issues." Page particularly noted Judd's leadership on the city's recently passed \$37 million budget for fiscal year 2011-2012, which, despite the tough economic times, maintained the millage rate at 2.57 (\$2.57 for every \$1,000 of assessed property value).

"It's a sound budget," Page said. "She's done an outstanding job."

Both Councilwoman Felecia Hampshire and Vice Mayor Pam Lewis also thanked Judd for her hard work, with Lewis especially praising Judd's professionalism and her ability to do her job with "tact and grace." Councilman Mitch Timberlake said even Green Cove Springs residents were taking note of Judd's performance.

"Citizens in the city have approached me and said they see a difference," he

Judd took on the reigns of city manager in late January, following the departure of her predecessor Don Bowles. Bowles had agreed to resign his post after narrowly escaping termination by the then-council after accusations that he violated election ethics by campaigning in the April, 2010, elections. Many city residents were extremely upset by what they saw as unfair treatment to the longtime former city manager.

In responding to the council's praise for her work so far, Judd said she especially wanted to thank the staff for their support. "I know it's been a tough transition for the staff, as all transitions are," she said, adding that she had "pushed them very hard" in trying to stay ahead of the demands of a tough economy.

In other action, the council approved the request of the Greater Green Cove Civic Association to coordinate the 8th Annual Parade of Trees celebration in Spring Park over the holiday season. The Civic Association did not request any funding support from the city either in the form of direct costs or inkind services.

In a related move, the council and the Civic Association accepted 90 sets of LED lights to light 30 of the 150 trees used in the Parade of Trees. The lights were a gift from Junior Girl Scout Troop 608 as part of a project the troop put together over the past several months. The troop spent more than 300 service hours sorting and storing decorations from past parades, and then staging fundraisers in order to cover the \$1,500 cost of the LED lights in an effort to save the parade both money and power.
