.FLEMING ISLAND — It not only came with a unanimous vote from the school board, but a letter of support from Florida's premier space agency.

The Clay County School Board voted Nov. 2 to named Elementary School "Y" Discovery Oaks Elementary and with that vote, also named the school's mascot the Voyagers.

ORANGE PARK – For one evening, Bryan Benda and Russell Payne got to go back to elementary school.

celebration, and were instantly transported back to the mid-1970s when they were students.

"It's amazing how similar it is," Payne said

"To come back and visit really brings back memories of the school," Benda added.

The men stood shoulder-to-shoulder as they flipped through old yearbooks and photographs that were on display in the school's library, where some of the books may still have the two men's names scrawled onto their check-out cards. They

discussed minor changes, such as the relocation of the principal's office, and that their old playground had been turned into a pond. An old oak tree that contained hundreds of football-torn t-shirts had been cut down, too, but overall the campus felt, and smelled the same.

"The smell of the wood in all the classrooms brought back memories for me," Payne said. Inspired by that notion, Benda led his friend to their old art classroom, "We're gonna' go smell the art room!" he said before leaving the room — although the

Moosehaven came to the rescue

y the 1920s, the population and economic health of Orange Park were in a severe decline. The fickle tourist trade had dwindled and died. The burgeoning orange industry crashed when the freezes of 1895-96 killed every grove to the roots. The final straw was the demise of the town's American Missionary Society's noble dream to educate the children of former slaves. Things were looking bad.

Then, unbeknownst to locals, The Loyal Order of Moose, a fraternal and service organization, founded in 1888, entered the picture. They were already praised for the creation of a thriving home for the orphans of Moose members in Illinois known as Mooseheart.



After construction of concrete porches and a coat of pearl dash stucco the former Victorian styled, clapboard Hotel Marion at the southwest corner of River Rd. and Kingsley Ave. became Moosehaven's Brandon Hall.

The organization began the search for a place where their brothers and family members who were returning from the trenches of World War I unable to cope and adapt to the fast-paced rollicking, roaring twenties and all the cultural changes the period introduced. For some it also seemed their health had been broken and dealing with the harsh northern winters had become impossible.

Leadership immediately began looking for a site to create a similar program to provide a slower paced way of life in a healthier climate that allowed the men, some with wives, an opportunity to contribute and thrive. It was anticipated that the project would be self-supporting.

For two years, various delegations of obviously successful northern men arrived in their three-piece suits with ornate watch chains draping considerable abdomens. Rumors were in the air in Clay County.

The original contingent of Moosehaven residents arrived in a band of 21 on a rainy

City of Green Cove explores annexing former Navy housing

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – After a month with no meetings, the Green Cove Springs City Council made up for lost time Tuesday with an almost 5-hour meeting.

Development Services Director Janis Fleet asked council for direction on the city's six-part annexation plan. City staff started to make moves on the first of the six properties they hope to add to the city, an 80-acre area that houses the St. Johns Landing Apartments, currently in unincorporated Clay County.

"We have been working diligently with the property owners, because we got a request from the owners of St. Johns Landing about their desire to annex into the city," Fleet said.

Fleet said that she and her staff have figured out a way to make the annexation happen, but needed a go-ahead from council before beginning any formal annexation procedure. The decision would not be a guaranteed yes vote for the city to annex

the property, but would allow Fleet to put together a proposal that she can bring back once all parties involved have reached some common ground. Originally built as housing for U.S. Navy families when Lee Field was in operation through World War II, the complex is currently operated by Atlantic Realty as an apartment community.

"I think this is a wonderful complement to our land mass and our city," said Council member Pam Lewis.

Most council members agreed that this annexation is one that "makes sense," as council member Steven Kelley put it, because the area is already hooked up to the city's electric service and wastewater systems. However, council member Van Royal brought up some concerns that might come up as the city continues through the annexation process.

"This is the one area of annexation that kind of goes either way for me," Royal said. "The problem that I see is that until you have a different development, it's a cost to

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School district ramps up classroom tech

MIDDLEBURG – Clay County District Schools are now more connected than ever with almost 3,000 wireless access points throughout the district.

This number is up from just over 1,000 at the beginning of the 2017-18 school year, and the effort is part of a much larger three-month plan to ensure that every core classroom at every school will have the materials necessary to meet the tech needs of their lesson plans.

"We are now a totally wireless school, we have access points in every classroom," said Laura Fogarty, principal at Tynes Elementary School.

Tynes hosted Superintendent Addison Davis last week after he reached out to the school to serve as a demonstrative model for the district's recently-completed tech upgrades. The upgrades will allow better access to the OneClay portal as well as the iReady and Achieve 3000 learning applications.

"We've got to stay connected and relevant," Davis said. "The big thing for me is equity for our kids, and to make sure that they have the best tools that they need to compete and to be successful."

While touring a couple of second grade classrooms at Tynes, the district's updated model for education could be seen clearly. Teachers no longer stand in front of a room full of kids reviewing a chapter from a book and assigning a one-page homework assignment from that chapter. Now kids shift between about three stations within

Seeking justice for puppies

fter a puppy was beaten to death in Volusia County earlier this year, the fight to give animal abusers harsher penalties is gaining momentum at the state Capitol.

And if passed, those who are convicted could be banned from owning or contacting animals.

It all began in April when neighbors heard a racket coming from inside a

Ponce Inlet home, where Travis Archer, the owner of Ponce, a black 9-month-old Labrador retriever, lived.

Upon entering the home, police found the dog dead in the backyard. According to a Daytona Beach News-Journal

news-Journal report, Archer said the dog "tore up his house" and that he had hit it several times to discipline it.

Rep. Tom Leek is looking for harsher punishment for animal abusers.

Travis was charged with animal cruelty, which means he technically could face up to five years in prison if convicted. But because he has no prior convictions, there is no mandated prison time under the current law.

The case sparked outrage locally, prompting animal rights advocates to push for more severe sanctions that would make it more likely for animal abusers to serve time behind bars. This week the push for that began at the state level with a bill (HB 473) filed by Rep. Tom Leek(R-Ormond Beach).


While the proposal, called "Ponce's Law," would make it more likely for those convicted of animal abuse to serve time, it still does not guarantee it. It will all depend on the person's criminal background and a judge's discretion. Under the bill, judges would be allowed to use their discretion to determine whether someone found guilty of these crimes should be banned from owning or coming in contact with an animal.

It's hard to imagine banning a convicted animal abuser from a dog park, but that could be the result.

"The horrific event that took place in Ponce Inlet will remain a somber reminder of the evil inflicted upon animals across our state," Leek said in a statement.

The effort is being spearheaded by Ponce Inlet's Chief of Police Frank

The numbers are shocking

he numbers are shocking
Regardless of whether you
like or dislike former President
Bill Clinton, it's hard to disagree that
when a current or former president visits your city, it's an historic occasion.

His entire trip here involved the opioid crisis and how it is challenging

the healthcare system, families and law enforcement.

Clay County is not immune from this epidemic, which is creating a bit of history on local streets and there are numbers to show it.

However, this type of history is not one that anyone will want to chronicle in the history books. The opioid epidemic is creating some eye-opening statistics in Clay County.

During the first seven months of 2017, Clay County Fire and Rescue administered a drug that prevents drug users from overdosing a total of 407 times, compared to the same sevenmonth period in 2016 where the pace was at 319 doses.

Narcan, which is administered nasally, was developed specifically for patients who show signs and symptoms of opioid overdose. By comparison, in 2016, Narcan was administered a total of 600 times by Clay County emergency medical professionals. However, this year is on track to outpace 2016.

Here's another shocking statistic. In 2015, there were 66 babies born in Clay County that were exposed to illicit substances(although alcohol exposure is also included in the numbers). However, in 2016, that number jumped to 138, which is a 109.09 percent in-

crease year-over-year. The Agency for Healthcare Administration, which provided the data, has not released 2017 monthly numbers yet, but either way, they hit you in the face at first glance. On a per capita basis, Clay's number are higher than Duval County's. The Agency for Healthcare Administration reports that Clay County had 62.53 substance-exposed births per 1,000, while Duval County had 35.96 substance-exposed births per 1,000 in 2016.

Those numbers earn Clay County the No. 10 spot on the list of counties with babies born substance-exposed. Is that really a ranking we want, Clay County?

These numbers are a symptom of something we've been writing about at Clay Today now, going on three, if not four, years. Heroin is here, and it is killing our friends, neighbors and loved ones.

And to top it off, fentanyl entered the Clay County streets and alleyways last year as well. Fentanyl is so potent that, experts say, one grain will kill a first-time user. The drug gets even more deadly when mixed with other drugs, such as heroin, but that is happening right here in Clay County.

Last week, officials who got to meet

Requirement to appoint the superintendent of schools could be on ballot again

Most counties in Florida elect their Superintendent of Schools but about 1/3 have chosen to have their Superintendent appointed by their local School Board. Currently, the decision to have an elected or appointed Superintendent is made by the voters of individual counties to suit their preference and needs.

Every 20 years, the Florida Constitution Revision Commission meets to determine items to place on the statewide ballot. One of the items that will be considered is a requirement that ALL counties in Florida appoint rather than elect their Superintendent of Schools.

In 2014, 61 percent of the voters of Clay County decided to continue directly electing their Superintendent of Schools. However, if this measure makes it through the Constitution Revision Commission and is placed on the 2018 ballot, the determination of how we do things locally will be determined by the voters of the entire state of Florida. It could pass and then we in Clay would be forced to appoint our Superintendent of Schools despite the fact that Clay voters have already spoken against this. It is possible to contact the Constitution Revision Commission and voice your opinion. For more info go to flcrc.gov. The item in question is P0033. The decision to place this on the ballot has not yet been made and can be stopped.

5 years ago, 2012

Political newcomer Johnna McKinnon defeated one-term incumbent Frank Farrell in the District 4 race for the Clay County School Board with 52 percent of the vote compared to Farrell's 47 percent. In the District 3 race, retired educator Tina Bullock defeated attorney Joseph Wiggins Sr.

The Fourth Circuit State Attorney's Office charged Charles "Chuck" Fryer for allegedly discharging improperly treated wastewater into a Fleming Island holding pond. Fryer, an employee of the Clay County Utility Authority, said he was only following orders.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office was awarded \$138,000, while the Green Cove Springs Police Department was awarded \$12,888 from the U.S. Justice Department to buy equipment to strengthen local law enforcement.

Hospice Northeast opened its first Clay County office at 1123 Kingsley Avenue in Orange Park.

30 years ago, 1987

Green Cove Springs Police investigated the mugging of Francis G. Harris, 65, of 309 Green St., in the city. Harris said he was robbed in his front yard while getting out of his truck around 9 p.m.

Fabrizio, the ASPCA, the Halifax Humane Society in Volusia County and Debbie Darino, who launched a "Justice for Ponce" petition proposing an amendment to current state animal cruelty laws. The petition garnered nearly 75,000 signatures.

Darino is also the founder of a closed Facebook page, Justice for Ponce. If the posts on Facebook are any indication, people should expect colorful banners with Ponce's face and the hashtag #DogsLivesMatter to pop up as the measure moves ahead.

In other news from Tallahasse, Gov. Rick Scott didn't debut a state budget last week as he usually does at the annual Associated Press Legislative Session planning session. But he did release some details, such as \$1.7 billion in requested environmental funding, including \$355 million for the Everglades, \$100 million for beach restoration, and \$50 million for state parks. He also wants \$50 million for repairs to the dike at Lake Okeechobee. And he'll build in \$10 million for additional Department of Children and Families abuse investigators and \$198 million for statewide adoption subsidies.

Meanwhile, Senate Appropriations
Chairman Jack Latvala told the Florida
Association of Professional Lobbyists it
was going to be a very tough budget year
for a whole host of spending categories.
The Clearwater Republican said his fellow
Senators should think twice before filing
spending requests if they've been vetoed
before in the last three years. Lawmakers also shouldn't try tucking projects in
university funding, as that is where "suspicious stuff" has been found, he added.
Funding toward Hurricane Irma repairs or
storm-hardening projects will fare much
better, he advised.

In the wake of a sex scandal that rattled the state Capitol involving Sen. Jeff Clemens and his extramarital affair with a lobbyist, Sen. President Joe Negron defended the process in which sexual harassment complaints are reported in the Senate. He spoke at last week's AP Day. While Negron reiterated there is

"zero tolerance" for misconduct or sexual harassment in the Senate and that he has seen very "respectful treatment" among staff members, a recent policy change in the Senate came under fire. The policy adjustment sought to change how sexual harassment is reported in the chamber and some scrutinized it because it would have made it harder to file complaints.

Trial lawyer, outspoken medical marijuana advocate and potential gubernatorial candidate John Morgan played agent provocateur on Twitter last week. In a rapid series of tweets fired at each of the major gubernatorial candidates, Morgan sought their public comment on their individual stance on the legalization of marijuana. They garnered a bit of engagement, allowing Morgan to draw attention to himself as he probed a gubernatorial field that now boasts four Democrats and two Republicans.

The main backer of a proposed constitutional amendment that would automatically restore some felons' voting rights after they complete their sentences says his group now has collected over 750,000 signatures. Desmond Meade, president of the Florida Rights Restoration Coalition, also said he's confident the amendment will have a million signatures by year's end. The Division of Elections website showed over 300,000 signatures for citizen ballot initiative known as "The Voting Restoration Amendment." Initiatives need 766,200 valid signatures for ballot placement.



If you build it... Raiders' alum helps rebuild ball field

ORANGE PARK – Jay Adair has been watching Orange Park High School baseball for a few years now.

His son Jordan is currently a junior at the school, and his son Jared recently graduated from OPHS. During his years of sitting in the stands rooting for the home team, Adair noticed a small problem with the ballpark after his older son twisted his ankle in a game while leaving the shortstop position and heading toward the outfield to chase the ball.

The area between second and third base, just into the outfield, had a significant drop-off. One day after a game, Adair walked onto the field to take a look at the spot, and noticed that there was a depression in the field that went about 2.5 feet down at its lowest point. The problem was bad enough that Adair, who heads up information technology with Jacksonville-based contractor Petticoat-Schmitt, decided to try and get something done about it.

"Someone could've gotten a real injury from [the elevation change], we're lucky we haven't had one," Adair said. "It needed to be fixed, so I spoke with the athletic director about three or four months ago to see if we could work on getting together to make it happen."

In addition to creating a potential hazard for players, the area led to drainage problems, and there were other areas on the field that needed work. Once Adair got the ball rolling with the school, his com-

pany agreed to help out in any way they could, especially considering the connection of the company's owners to OPHS.

Petticoat-Schmitt President Ryan Schmitt is an Orange Park High graduate himself, a member of the class of 1985. Schmitt, a soccer player at OPHS in the 1980s, saw this project as a great way to propel his company's community-first message and help his alma mater at the same time.

"Our goal is to give them a better playing field and something that they can be proud of," Schmitt said. "Part of our mission is to give back to the community."

For him, this project was a perfect combination of giving back to the community, and helping the sports program at OPHS to which he attributes his own coming of age.

Once Schmitt's company and the school were on the same page, Petticoat-Schmitt sent out surveyors, and eventually heavy equipment operators to start what Schmitt estimates to be a nearly \$7,000 dirt-moving project pro bono. The district estimates the entire project to run around \$25,000 including re-landscaping and running irrigation, but the dirt-work gives them a solid starting point.

"This is really a blessing to us," said OPHS Athletic Director Michael Harrison. "Without their help we couldn't do this project."

Harrison said the dirt-moving project officially began Oct. 26 and should be done sometime this week. After that sod will be laid and irrigation placed to get the field all finished up before baseball season starts

after one of our nation's most storied and historic vehicles: Space Shuttle OV-103. aka DISCOVERY, and to have as a mascot the name of one of humanity's greatest scientific instruments: the Voyager spacecraft, the only sign of man beyond our Solar System," stated Frank DiBello, president of Space Florida, in his letter of support.

The second name considered was Bear Creek Elementary School where the mascot would have been the Cubs. This name would be an homage to Clay County's Black Bear population, which is labeled as "abundant" by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

The third name considered was Canopy

tendent Addison Davis about the timeline to appoint a principal for Discovery Oaks.

He said it was "best practice" to have a seasoned principal open up a new school, while adding he wants to see principal candidates come in with a vision to make this school the envy of Clay County.

The current vision calls for developing Discovery Oaks as a STEAM school where Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Math are the driving force behind curriculum. Davis said Terri Stahlman, assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction, and Michael Kemp, assistant superintendent for operations, appointed a committee of teachers and principals who are tasked with creating content areas for Discovery Oaks.

"We had our first kick-off meeting last week and everybody was given their charge. They saw the blueprint of the school, they learned about what has come out of the ground already, what they can influence. Mostly, our decisions are in furniture and equipment decisions," Stahlman

She said a team of teachers are going to be traveling the state looking at other STEAM models that are excelling in hopes of duplicating and even improving upon to implement in Clay County.

"It's fun work. It's a lot of work. Those content teams that Dr. Stahlman put together for the facility planning; it's a huge

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responsibility. They're representing more than their own wishes, they're representing the content for years to come for what's going to happen inside that facility," Kemp

"We were there for an hour-and-a-half and they were still there excited and planning and strategizing, so I think we're going to see a really inviting school choice opportunity for our families in Clay County," Stahlman said.

After Stahlman's comments. Condon asked what was meant by referring to the new school as a school choice opportunity. Davis responded by saying, "It's a theme.

It's theme-based."

Condon said she wanted to make sure the district was not creating another concept school much like Orange Park Elementary.


Discovery Oaks is under construction in the Eagle Landing area of Oakleaf and is targeted to open the start of the 2018-19 school year. The school is being funded with residential construction impact fees, which prevented the district from having to borrow funds for the estimated \$23 million project. It's the first new school to be built in Clay County since Oakleaf High opened on August 26, 2010 for the 2010-11 school

Before the official meeting got underway Nov. 2, Davis opened the meeting and took on an "acting chairman" role to kick off the board's annual reorganization meeting in which a new chairman and vice chairman are elected.

Outgoing Chairman Kerekes nominated outgoing Vice Chair Carol Studdard to serve as chair, while Ashley Gilhousen nominated Mary Bolla. When the votes were counted. Studdard was named chairman by a vote of 3-2 with Condon, Kerekes and Studdard voting for Studdard and Bolla and Gilhousen voting no.

Kerekes then nominated Condon for vice chair, the sole nominee. When the vote was taken, Condon was elected 5-0.

The next school board meeting will be a special workshop Nov. 9 at 4 p.m. to discuss the rezoning parameters for Discovery Oaks Elementary.

Students get virtual tour of Navy rescue

FLEMING ISLAND - Fleming Island High student Elliot Mendez walked out of a trailer on campus with a smile on his face on Tuesday.

Mendez, a cadet in the school's Fleming Island High School Navy Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps, was one of the students who got a glimpse of simulated Navy life. Thanks to virtual reality technology, he was able to step into the shoes of a Navy boat captain tasked with rescuing a cadre of Navy SEALs.

The simulator was brought to the school campus Nov. 7 after the weekend-long air show at Naval Air Station Jacksonville. The air show hosted the U.S. Navy's virtual reality simulator, a portable trailer complete with Oculus Rift goggles, and SubPac backpack systems that allow participants to feel vibrations and provide a fully-immersive experience. The simulator operates as a recruitment tool and tours the country for large events and air shows.

Once the air show came to an end, the simulator didn't have anywhere to go for a few days, so the Navy reached out to FIHS to see if they would like to have the simulator brought on campus for their NJROTC class. "What I like about this particular unit is that it is smaller and more cozy. It brings kids together with technology and introduces them to actual Navy recruiters who know Navy life," said Heather Ewton, the Navy's public affairs officer for the regional recruiting district. "The simulation shows kids the capabilities of the navy and exposes them to future career opportunities. It shows them that when you join the Navy you aren't just a sailor on a ship."

One of the Fleming Island JROTC instructors, Jeff Barlow, was on site to supervise cadets from Fleming Island, as well

as those from the Middleburg High School NJROTC program who were invited to participate as well. Barlow, a first-year teacher at FIHS, was excited to hear that the simulator would be coming to their school.


Navy recruiting events.

"This is a really good opportunity for them to check out what the Navy has to offer," Barlow said. "The more these kids see and the more they are exposed to will make them better able to choose which route to take in life.

The simulator isn't all that different from popular military-based video games, but the added value of the VR goggles, immersive sound and the SubPac, in addition to using a real steering wheel and throttle, creates a different environment from someone's living room game console setup.

Before heading to his next class, Mendez only had one suggestion for how to improve the simulation, "I wish it was longer!"



Clay teachers earn Governor's Shine Awards


TALLAHASSEE - Two Clay County teachers are among 18 educators from across Florida who received the Governor's Shine Award on Tuesday.

Watch out for manatees

TALLAHASSEE – Florida manatees are on the move and public stewardship on the water makes a difference.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is asking people in November to watch out for manatees as they begin migrating to warmer waters. Watching out for the slow-moving creatures makes a difference in the species' survival. Florida is home to more than 6,600 manatees.

Many seasonal manatee protection zones go into effect Nov. 15. Though some signs identifying manatee zones may have been damaged by Hurricane Irma, information on manatee zone locations is also available online. If you see damaged waterway signs, report them at MyFWC.com/Boating by clicking on "Waterway Management," "Waterway Markers" and then "Damaged/ Missing Waterway Markers."

Earlier this year, the Florida manatee was reclassified from endangered to a threatened status, under the federal Endangered Species Act, in a decision announced by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. While this is a notable step, there is still work to be done to ensure continued progress toward recovery of the official Florida marine

"People's efforts to help Florida manatees are working. Let's celebrate the fact that conservation actions are making a difference and manatees are no longer endangered by thanking all the individuals and organizations that contributed to this milestone," said Carol Knox, who leads FWC's Imperiled Species Management Section.

"It's important though to remain vigilant," Knox said. "Let's keep up the efforts that are helping with manatee recovery."

FWC also asks residents to report injured, entangled, orphaned or dead manatees to the FWC's Wildlife Alert Hotline: 888-404-FWCC (3922), #FWC or *FWC on your cellphone or text Tip@MyFWC.com.

the former president talked about longterm treatment and different programs in the area that are working to get pregnant women off drugs and provide them access to appropriate pre-natal and post-birth care. Here in Clay County, local healthcare officials are aware of the growing epidemic and are collaborating on ways to control the problem and get the word out.

In June, the Healthy Start program at the Florida Department of Health in Clay County formed a work group as part of the larger, regional Substance-exposed

Newborn Task Force to study the issue. It meets once a month at Orange Park Medical Center and continues to grow.

Lisa Rogers, program manager of the Healthy Start Coalition who facilitates the Clay County meetings, said the main goal of the work group is prevention and education. More importantly, she said, healthcare professionals are focused on five aspects of the mother and child's lives pre-pregnancy, pregnancy, testing for drugs at birth, infancy and adolescence.

"We're trying to touch everyone at every stage of their lives to stop this epidemic," Rogers said.

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
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Navy air show excites, thrills

JACKSONVILLE - Naval Air Station Jacksonville was a hub of excitement last week leading into the weekend.

Planes packed the skies ranging from personal jets to the elite planes of today's military like the F-22 Raptor. Included in the weekend's lineup were the NAS Jaxborn group of elite pilots that make up the Navy's Flight Demonstration Team, also known as the Blue Angels.

The group, now based in Pensacola, started at the local Navy base in 1946 when the first demonstration of their precise flying was put on display for Navy officers, eventually leading to the internationally-performing group known today.

When the Blue Angels come, people hear about it, and this year the base es-

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"This annual event is highly anticipated by the local community," said Executive Officer Capt. Sean Haley, commander of NAS Jax, in a prepared statement. "The air show not only entertains our community, but also serves to showcase the pride and professionalism of our young men and women who have chosen to serve this great nation as a member of the armed forces."

Friday the performers, both the Blue Angels and some of the world's mostrenowned civilian air show pilots, did a dressed rehearsal for the Saturday show. They followed the schedule to the minute and worked out any problems as they may arise. The practice day also allowed friends and family of those stationed on the base, as well as local school children, the opportunity to witness the spectacle without battling the traffic on Saturday that caused more than two-hour delays for some motorists hoping to catch a glimpse of the show.

About 43 members of the Fleming Island High School Navy Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps were among the thousands of school students at Friday's run-through.

"It's just cool to see all this going on," said Fleming Island senior Tristan Thacker. Thacker said he plans to attend college after graduation, and hopes to pursue a career in the Navy after college.

One of the FIHS NJROTC instructors, Jeff Barlow, also attended the air show, and despite spending 30 years in the Navy, Barlow had never experienced a Blue Angels performance in person, or even been to an air show.

"It's not every day you get to see jets flying through your city," Barlow said. "This was my first time [at an air show] anywhere, ever. I would recommend against waiting 30 years to go to one."

the city.

Royal mentioned that the area has been the site of continued grandiose plans for new development that would make the annexation a no-brainer for the city. However, Royal said that these talks have been going on since he moved to Green Cove Springs in the 1980s. For him, the city would gain nothing from the annexation as the property stands today.

Fleet said there were some plans in place, which Royal requested be sent to all members of the council as soon as possible. He said that before he could vote yes on anything related to this annexation, he would need to see that the city would gain something from this property.

Members of the council discussed Royal's concerns, but maintained a positive outlook on the annexation with the hopes that it will be redeveloped in the future as the First Coast Expressway moves closer to the city. 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

a core class, either in a small group with the teacher for that face-to-face traditional style of learning, or in groups with their peers working together to complete a task. More recently another category of learning has emerged – allowing students individualized learning using Chromebooks, which is where iReady and Achieve 3000 come into play.

"We have a blended model and we want to protect a blended model," Davis said. "The bulk of learning will be [whole group]. This is just a small percentage [that is tied to this technology]."

The programs allow each student to move through education resources that adapt to the learner, slowing down to help some kids, or presenting more difficult challenges to those who breeze through a lesson. Through the connection to the One-Clay portal, these applications can provide statistics on each student and show teachers areas where students are excelling, or areas where students need improvement.

The use of these platforms will now be available district-wide with the school district providing at least six devices per classroom after the purchase of 6,200 Chromebooks since August, bringing the district total to about 20,700, which will increase by about 500 next year.

In an effort to continue to stay ahead of the tech obsolescence curve, the devices are rented by the district, and will be upgraded on a yearly basis for about the same \$600-700,000 price tag in each year's budget, most of which comes to the

district through federal education dollars.

"Most of the money comes out of our E-Rate," said Sabrina Thomas, the district's Technology Services supervisor. "Also, we received some help from the facilities team, our technology budget and our Digital Classroom Plan."

According to Thomas the district is close to meeting its goal for devices, which places one device per two students in grades Kindergarten through second, and one device per child for students in grades three through high school.

Davis is aware that the introduction

of technology in the classroom needs to be a gradual process, and is doing what he can to direct staff to help maintain the ultimate goal, which is to teach the "whole child."

"We're trying to implement this with high implementation, but couple that with high support," Davis said. "We want to make sure that we take it slow, that we have high support, and that it's being implemented in an effective manner within our school district, so it's not driven at such a fast pace that we lose the integrity of what we're trying to accomplish."

aul had no patience with Barnabas and the young man that he believed deserted him on their missionary tour. John Mark had enlisted to journey with them to spread the Gospel. The team faced many hardships as they ministered. At Pamphylia, John Mark announced that he did not want to go on with the two men. He had decided to return home.

The deeply dedicated Apostle Paul looked at John Mark's decision as failure and betrayal of his companions and their mission.

When Barnabas and Paul were preparing to start their second missionary venture, Barnabas wanted to take John Mark with them again. Barnabas may have been affected by his relationship with Mark. (They were cousins.) Paul strongly objected to including Mark on this trip. The disagreement became contentious and the two men, Paul and Barnabas, parted and went on separate journeys.

Because Mark had failed them once before, Paul believed he was likely to fail again. He did not want to give the young man another chance.

But the story of Mark's life is not finished. Later when Paul was imprisoned in Rome, he wrote a letter to the Colossians and he says one of the brothers who was assisting him was Mark. Paul had accepted him again as a faithful, fellow servant of Jesus, and he became a great blessing to Paul. Later, as Paul wrote what is believed to be his last epistle, he asks Timothy to come to him and bring Mark with him. Paul said Mark is "profitable (useful) to me for the ministry." (2 Timothy 4:11)

Because you have failed does not mean you are a failure. When you fall, get up and move on. Do not accept the labels that others want to put on you.

Mark made a big mistake. He obviously failed. But the message of Jesus is a message of recovery, restoration and redemption. Mark became useful, helpful and needed in Paul's ministry. Regardless of your missteps and mistakes, there is a way back to great usefulness in God's kingdom.

County opens special needs ballpark

ORANGE PARK – Brian McElyea got a little teary-eyed as he spoke to county commissioners, Special Olympics volunteers and area first responders Tuesday night at a ribbon cutting ceremony as he witnessed one of his daughter's dreams come true.

"We were reminiscing on the way here about what we started here in 2001 with the purpose of leveling the playing field for children who were in non-mobile situations," said McElyea, who with wife Jill and wheelchair-bound 23-year-old daughter Brienna, were on hand for a ceremony to add a special needs baseball field to the Moody Avenue Park. "Parks across Clay County were not able to accommodate wheelchairs. The Sunrise Rotary stepped up back then to create this park and now we are adding to it."

First came the installment of playground equipment, swings and facilities able to be used with wheelchairs and adaptable to children with mobility restrictions. Brienna McElyea became a folk hero as Brienna's Foundation supported the endeavor

Both Clay County Commissioner Diane Hutchings and Clay County Special Olympics coordinator Ronna Smith concurred that the timing was right for the funding necessary to take the park one more step and create the baseball field.

"With everything that is going on with state funds; hurricanes, budgets, schools and all, special needs funding sometimes takes a back burner," Smith said. "I think we just kind of hit it at the right time to get the funding from the state, get a donation from Walmart and get some grants."

Walmart, just 100 yards west of the park, had donated a \$1.2 million funding package plus the 15-acre parcel of its land to allow for expansion of the park. The county also received a \$200,000 Department of Economic Opportunity grant, as well as a \$430,000 Department of Environmental Protection grant to get things moving.

"The construction began in August of 2013 to celebrate the opening of the play-ground," said Hutchings, who serves as vice chair of the county commission. "To-day, we celebrate the opening of the base-ball facility and the pavilion nearby that can be used for gatherings. A lot of people put their talents together to get this done."

For Brienna McElyea, the extension of her first installment of Moody Avenue Park is just another step in her dream to allow families to play together regardless of their abilities.

"I never thought about the impact," said McElyea, who though unable to speak, communicates through a computer module at her home and with her eyes. "We just wanted a place where everyone could play together."

The McElyea family has been persistent in keeping the options open for expansion of parks in Clay County and Brienna sees the education system as her next vision.

"My next goal is to work on the educational systems, just like the playgrounds, and level the playing field there," she said. "Especially college for handicapped people. I don't think of it as a legacy. Just shedding light on issues and barriers as we come across them and then try to fix them"

The baseball field, a first in Clay County, is complete with a fenced-in and lit field

about half the size of a regulation baseball field, with fences behind home plate and in the outfield. Its surface is made of a rubberized material much like a college track.

Hutchings noted that the spectator facilities – bleachers, the pavilion and the rest room facilities are all made to encourage the community to join the park activities.

"We wanted to make the park enjoyable not just for children in wheelchairs, but our veterans can enjoy the park, families can spend a day here with plenty of activities around them and the facilities are well kept and designed with nearly every possible need for special needs people," said Hutchings. "It truly is a project that has taken ideas from around the county to make it work."

Smith has been instrumental in elevating Special Olympics to a major impact sport in Clay County and noted that the McElyeas have been right next to her all along.

'It warms your heart to hear the McE-lyea story and their dedication to Brienna's dreams," Smith said. "They have had that vision for their daughter Brienna as much as for every other kid with a disability in Clay County. We can now see the possibilities for these athletes. It's about coming together as a community."

Domestic abuse victims have legal advocate

ORANGE PARK – The first punch came while Jane stood in the doorway to her home.

Prior to the first assault, Jane, whose name is hidden to protect her identity, was skeptical that her husband's abusive tendencies would evolve into physical assault. But they did.

The assault arrived on the heels of years of emotional and sexual assaults that Jane was either unable or unwilling to recognize as warning signs of a narcissist and lifelong abuser.

"The signs were there but I could not fathom that a physical assault could occur, I don't think I wanted to think that something like that would occur and I was believing the best," Jane said.

When her doubts were realized, she knew something had to change. She began a three-year saga to divorce her husband, a gregarious business executive that, on all outward accounts, seemed a settled and loving family man.

This was 2009, and at the time, Jane had no clue where to proceed. She said picking a lawyer to help with her case was like picking a name out of a hat, or, in this case, a phone book.

Jane isn't alone in her experience. The experience is shared among thousands of victims in Florida who struggle to find their first steps out of an abusive relationship.

In many counties, solace can come from the court system. But with often limited information, many victims don't know where to turn to get restraining orders from their abusers while they work out divorces, a time consuming and costly endeavor.

For Clay County, Winnie Eilert is the go-to pro-bono lawyer for restraining orders in these cases. And a year after she arrived in the county, many appear to have taken notice.

"We have had a lot of success with this," Eilert said. "I will say we've helped a lot of people get the help they need, the protection they need from the people they need it from."

Quigley House hired Eilert in May as part of a federal grant through the 1984 Victims of Crime Act, which uses fines from federally-convicted offenders to pay for survivor services on a local level at no cost to victims.

Quigley House renewed the grant Oct. 1, so Eilert is here to stay for at least another year. Appropriately or coincidentally, the grant would be reauthorized in October, which is recognized as Domestic Violence Awareness Month.

Peggy Payne, Quigley House executive director, said many organizations that received the grant across the country decided

Understanding the Impact on Your Property Assessment

Dear Clay County Property Owner,

One of the responsibilities of the Clay County Property Appraiser's Office (CCPAO) is to determine the market value of all property in Clay County in accordance with Florida law. I serve the citizens of this great county in a ministerial capacity; therefore, I do not have legislative authority to create or amend the law – only to administer it as prescribed.

In early September, Hurricane Irma made an unwelcomed visit to our area – leaving behind many damaged properties. As the cleanup and repairs continue, I felt it necessary to explain how this unfortunate event may affect your property assessment.

Assessments

Pursuant to Florida law, the 2017 property assessments were determined and certified based on market-derived variables (including property condition) <u>as of January 1, 2017</u>. Therefore, an adjustment for Hurricane Irma damage for the 2017 assessment would be improper and unlawful. However, properties that were damaged, <u>and not repaired as of January 1, 2018</u>, will be adjusted accordingly for the 2018 assessment roll.

Inspections

Our office received a list of damaged properties as reported and complied by the Clay County Emergency Management Department. Utilizing this information we have begun the process of inspections for the 2018 assessment roll. Property owners who want to ensure their property is identified on the damaged report list and/or to report damage that is anticipated to remain on January 1, 2018, please contact the CCPAO Appraisal Services Department at (904) 284/269-6305 (option 4) or sjackson@ccpao.com.

The two teams went about it in different ways. The adults tied the cotton swabs into a bucket, while one of the student teams used the straws as a fishing rod to drop the bundle of cotton swabs they had created with the string into the bucket.

Despite their prowess, the adult team eventually prevailed simply due to some cotton swab sharpshooting.

The point wasn't to win or lose, according to program directors. The point was to have the teams collaborate together to find the best method to prevail.

school programs in Clay County. "Anytime we get a chance to include parents in that process it just kind of helps strengthen the family as well."

The YMCA holds before and after school programs in every elementary school in Clay County, and has for the last 20 years according to Steinfurth. And while their costs range from \$95 to \$79 a week, the programs focus on providing academic support as well as character development and physical fitness.

Parent Ozzy Trevino competed with his children Natalie and Logan. Coming from out of state, he said the program's focus on character development and play is unlike anything he's experienced before.

"I'm really big on family events, anything I can do with my kids, I'm all for it," Trevino said. "I try to keep it creative in the home life, I try to do things that are good for their productivity, their morale, their home life."

The program at Thunderbolt Elementary focuses on STEM activities for students to develop critical thinking skills. YMCA received a \$10,000 grant in September to buy more advanced materials for the students to play with.

Thunderbolt Elementary is a sort of staging ground for after school programs for the rest of the county to see what works and resonates with students.

"We're the flagship for the county, we experiment with everything through here," said Christine Jarman, Thunderbolt Elementary site director. "It's a new pilot program"

And while the students get to experience new activities daily, they seemed to enjoy competing with adults three times their size.

It's beneficial, too, Steinfurth said.

"It's nice every once and a while to act like a kid and get to do some kid activities," Steinfurth said

not to file for renewal after a year. She said the need in Clay County was just too great to avoid filing again.

"For me, it's like with our domestic violence program, if somebody calls the domestic violence hotline for the first time and tells their deepest darkest secrets for the first time, I'd call that a success," Payne said. "So the fact that we're seeing 30 people a month take advantage of this tells me that it's greatly needed and it is a success."

There is an even distribution of the individuals taking advantage of her services among every economic background. Often, Payne said, while wealthy families may have money to hire a personal lawyer to litigate or file an injunction, often the abuser controls all of the family money.

Often, this means that even well-off abuse victims can't sit down with an attorney for counsel.

"Winnie can be of value to anyone, whether they have money and means or they don't," Jane said.

For Jane, Eilert became indispensable in placing an injunction for her and her four children after her ex-husband turned his scorn on them, she said. Since 2009, she has gone through four attorneys, and her time through the court system has been marked by demonization.

Often, her abuser presented himself in court as an upstanding citizen, and defense attorneys framed Jane as a woman attempting to take her abuser's children away. The defense exploited every loophole they could, including the second chance Jane gave her ex-husband after the first physical assault, as a way to frame her as a liar

"I lived with him for almost a year after that – and it did not improve, it got worse," Jane said while tears streamed down her face. "He had threatened to smother me."

Gas lighting the abused in court is a common method for abusers and defense attorneys to frame the abused as incompetent, Payne said.

"We all wear masks when we're out in public," Payne said. "We all have those masks on and we put them up and talk about how great of a day it was...batterers are like that...abusers will often drop that mask for a moment in court and show their true selves."

Payne said one way to counteract the way abusers can manipulate the court system to their advantage is to diligently record abuses.

Jane remarried last year, an action she said was an exercise in trust and forgiveness. He's a genuine man, she said. Her experience with her abuser still sits raw, but she's no longer wounded by it. She can't be, she said, for the sake of her children.



art room is not in the same location he remembered.

Aside from the walk down memory lane offered up in the SBJ library, the cafeteria served as the hub of activity during the half-century celebration. The schedule was packed with speakers, including former principals and teachers, and performances by the school's chorus, and the Orange Park Junior High School band, whose membership contains former SBJ students.

Beverly Oglesby taught at the school from 1971 until her retirement in 2009.

When it came time to celebrate the school's first 50 years, Oglesby was asked to speak about the nearly 40 years she spent on the faculty.

"A lot of things have changed since 1971," she said after taking the stage. The bulk of the changes she listed consisted of changes to the way students are taught. She appealed to the crowd to talk to kids, and to instill in them manners and discipline, because, according to her, kids today need these lessons more than ever.

For Oglesby, though, many of the things about S. Bryan Jennings elementary that made her stick around all those years are still in place.

"SBJ has always been a family-oriented

school," she said. "To educate one child. you also have to be concerned about their families.' Oglesby mentioned in her speech that she had seen a couple of families there she had taught for at least two generations, she

knew those families almost as well as her own. That sense of a school family seemed to resonate throughout the program - old friends were reunited, and students were able to catch up with their former teach-A cork board placed in the cafeteria for

the event allowed students and alumni to post notes about their favorite teachers and school events. The boards were packed with notes and among the favorite activities, were family-oriented events like the Thanksgiving turkey feast and Christmas gift giving

That feeling of being a part of something greater has even been extended to the school's current principal, who is in her first year with SBJ.

"I felt that before tonight, as early as this summer and into the first two weeks [of the school year]," said Principal Elise Love. "Everyone has been so welcoming and so accepting. The students here are the most loving and accepting you'll find anywhere."

Love hopes to stay a part of S. Bryan Jennings Elementary for years to come, seeing this as the best experience she's had as a part of a school in the Clay County School District.

"I've been teaching in Clay County schools since 1995 or 1996," Love said. "I have never seen or experienced anything like what is present here at this school."

20-year-old killed in Clay Hill crash

CLAY HILL – The Florida Highway Patrol reports that a 20-year-old Orange Park man was killed in a two-vehicle accident Tuesday in Clay Hill.

Police said Dyllon D. Smith was driving a 2005 Hyundai Sonata heading southbound on U.S. Highway 301 when he came upon a semi-tractor trailer that had stopped in the left turn lane. FHP said the driver of the semi – Ariel Bermudez, 33, of Orlando – failed to yield to oncoming traffic as he traveled out of the left turn lane in front of the Sonata. The front of the Sonata collided with the rear of the semi.

Both vehicles came to rest in the center median, according to the FHP press release.

FHP said charges are pending.

Man charged with striking mother-to-be

ORANGE PARK – An Orange Park-area man faces two counts of aggravated bat-

tery on a pregnant female after police responded to a disturbance on Monday.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Justin David Lockhart, 35, on Nov. 6 at 12:24 a.m. in the 2000 block of Sunrise Village Drive.

According to the police report, when officers arrived they could hear Lockhart "yelling angrily" and "a female screaming loudly."

The victim told police that the fight erupted when she walked from a bedroom to the living room and asked Lockhart to be quiet, so she could sleep.

According to the report, he then poked her in the left eye, then pushed her onto the couch and began "poking her in the face repeatedly," states the report.

After Lockhart allegedly slapped the victim – who is eight months pregnant with his child – she gathered her belongings into a backpack intending to leave the home.

Police said Lockhart slurred his speech when he spoke and had trouble standing.

He was booked into the Clay County Jail where, at press time, he remained with bond set at \$50,006.

Passenger killed in traffic crash

ORANGE PARK – The Orange Park Police Department continues to investigate the cause of a one-vehicle traffic crash that resulted in one fatality over the weekend.

Police said Luther Hill Elliott IV, 40, of Orange Park, was pronounced deceased at the scene on Nov. 4 at 2:55 p.m. in the 2200 block of Doctors Lake Drive.

When police arrived on the scene, they found a pickup truck crashed off the east side of the road. One occupant of the vehicle was transported to the Orange Park

Medical Center and treated for injuries and is expected to recover.

However, Elliott was pronounced dead at the scene by Orange Park Fire Rescue Personnel. The Clay County Sheriff's Office also assisted in the investigation.

Doctors Lake Drive was shut down in both directions from the intersection of Oak Court to the intersection of Birdwood Drive for several hours while the investigation continued. Drivers were forced to use alternate routes of travel while police and rescue were on the scene.

Mall fight ends in felony charge

ORANGE PARK – An 18-year-old Jacksonville boy faces a felony charge of child abuse after a mishap at the Orange Park Mall last weekend.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Jacquez Malik Pough on Nov. 4 at 9:15 p.m. after witnesses told police that he placed a 13-year-old boy in a head lock and dragged him out of the Chick-fil-A into the mall common area.

At press time, Pough remained in the Clay County Jail where his bond is set at \$2,503.


Miami man extradited here on theft charges

Fleming Island man pleads to running Georgia pill mill

BRUNSWICK, Ga. – The Florida Times-Union reports that a Fleming Island businessman pled guilty Oct. 30 in U.S. District Court to a conspiracy charge involving the operation of a pain clinic in Camden County, Georgia.

David Joseph Muyres, 55, admitted he and others prescribed pain killers and other drugs for "no legitimate medical purpose" from October 9, 2014 through June 13 this year at a clinic in St. Marys, Ga.

Court documents state Muyres and his associates conspired to launder the cash proceeds of the business to disguise the nature of their illegal operation called Coastline Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

Drug Enforcement Administration Agent Gerald Hughes told the court that Muyres ran a cash-only business and gave the appearance of legitimacy by requiring would-be pill buyers to have an MRI and fill out medical questionnaires.

Muyres and his co-conspirators hired a

physician who doled out prescriptions for oxycodone, hydromorphone and hydrocodone and alprazolam, an anti-anxiety drug.

"Most if not all the patients received the same medication" and the sole practice was in prescribing pain medicine," The Times-Union reported.

Hughes said the regular fee was \$330 but the clinic offered a discount rate of \$200.

Over time, Muyres deposited more than \$1.2 million at Ameris Bank, proceeds from the pain clinic. Since his arrest, federal authorities have seized some of the pill mill proceeds, including \$17,572 from Muyres' home in the 2400 block of Stockton Drive on Fleming Island.

Muyres has also consented to forfeit a number of gold and platinum bars and some cash that the feds seized from a Wells Fargo bank safe deposit box.

The maximum sentence Muyres could receive is five years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and three years of probation.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Karl Knoche told the judge the government would agree to a lesser sentence in exchange for Muyres' guilty plea and his full cooperation in the investigation.

The court allowed Muyres to remain free on a \$50,000 bond, but limited his travel within the Southern District of Georgia and the Middle and Northern Districts of Florida.

The next phase of the investigation is Muyres' sentencing hearing.

day in November of 1922 and settled into the Marion Hotel complex and the adjoining 18 acres on the north side of Kingsley Avenue at River Road. Moosehaven records indicate a lease-purchase agreement with local developer Charles Brown that stipulated a deposit of \$4,000, rent of \$150 a month for two years with the option to purchase for \$30,000 during that time.

After six months of operation, the residents were 54 strong and they were doing all the work. They cared for a growing dairy operation, which provided all of their requirements for milk and eggs with some left over to sell to townspeople. They raised fodder for the cows and other livestock.

For the struggling residents of Orange Park, it was a blessing to see people coming into town for a change and the newcomer proved to be a good neighbor.

Moosehaven guaranteed one half of the pre-subscriptions required to bring electric and telephone service from Jacksonville in 1924. The town simply would not have qualified without their participation.

To maintain insurance for their multiplying acquisitions at a reasonable cost, Moosehaven purchased the town's first fire engine and paid the Orange Park Woman's Club to cater luncheons and dinners at the frequent visits by national Moose delegations and the national convention held in Orange Park. Proceeds from these events helped pay for their clubhouse and financed school and community projects.

Moosehaven provided homemade ice cream for the monthly birthday party celebrations for community children held in their solarium and supervised by the Woman's Club. For children raised in the Great Depression in Orange Park, memories of parties in the glass room became a special

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'Bash Brothers' move on; wins in 50, 100 free

GAINESVILLE – "They are back" Fleming Island High swim coach Jordan Bright had an ear-to-ear smile on his face early in the region 1-4A swimming championships and the meet was only half over.

"We haven't had a girls team go to state in the 200 free relay in quite a while and our boys team going for a three-peat is a big deal," said Bright. "Andrew Heinton had an outstanding meet with his win in the 100 and his anchor in the 400 free relay that also won."

Bright's glee came from three dominating performances in the first half of the championship session with senior Jack Neeley blowing up the 50 free, sophomore Andrew Heinton knifing to victory in the 100 free and the boys 200 free relay; the two-time state champions, offering up a plate of crow to rival Seminole High with a commanding win in that event.

In team points, the Fleming Island boys, second in Class 4A last year, took fourth with 229 points in the region championship behind Oviedo's 319, Buchholz' 267 and Seminole's 260.5. Buchholz was womens team champs with 444.5 points with Fleming Island 10th with 69.5 points.

In the 50, with Neeley in lane two and Heinton in lane eight, both synched up for a 1-2 finish with Neeley plowing in at 21.67 and Heinton on his tail at 21.69. In 2016, Neeley finished second at the Class 4A championships in 21.20 with Heinton fourth in 21.64.

In the 100 free, Neeley started in heat

two of three and finished second in the heat with a 49.22 time behind the winning time of 48.83 from Deland's Elijah Wheeler.

For the state meet rankings, Neeley is fourth with Heinton fifth behind a 20.89 region best from Kyle DiMatteo of Park Vista.

"We did a fast workout on Monday and now we'll start to back off and work on starts, turns and relay stuff," said Bright. "There is not much to do to get faster at this point. We just have to get down there and swim smart."

Heinton was again in lane eight of the third heat where he blasted the field with a 47.13 split. Runner up was timed in at 47.36 with three Seminole High swimmers under 49 seconds behind Heinton as Neeley awaits region tallies to see if he earned a state slot for the 100 free. Heinton was seventh at last year's state meet in 47.87.

Heinton earned a number three rank behind DiMatteo, last year's runnerup at 46.08, as the top seed with a 45.21 region time. Neeley did not make the top 24 with 48.90 the final qualifying time.

In the 200 relay, with newcomer Jacob Thompson, a Colorado transfer with state meet experience from the west, leading off and setting the team on the path to dominate, Fleming Island took control and never looked back with Neeley, Heinton and Nick Hackett finishing off the field. Fleming Island's winning split of 1:26.71 beat rival Seminole by more than a second with their 1:27.50 the runnerup time. Fleming Island won the 200 free relay at last year's state meet at 1:24.53 over defending team champions Riverview High. Riv-

erview swam a 1:28.10 at the region meet for third. The bonus for the day was a win in the 400 free relay with the same four-some bumping out Buchholz with a 3:09.85 split to Buchholz' 3:10.05. The relay lineup was the same, but Hackett was leadoff leg and Heinton was anchor.

"Andrew swam another 47-point 100 to bring it home," said Bright.

Fleming Island was second in last year's 400 free relay to Riverview at last year's state meet. Riverview was third at regions with a 3:12.15. Seminole was eighth.

Hackett, the defending 4A champion in the 200 free and 100 butterfly, took second in both events with a 1:42.22 finish in the 200 just behind winner Jacob Hill of Buchholz who hit in at 1:40.63. Hackett is ranked fifth in Class 4A in the 200 free with Hill's time the top time from regions.


In the 100 butterfly, Hackett was second to Mason Wilby of Buchholz with a 50.45 split to Wilby's winning 48.73, an All-American-A time. Hackett beat Wilby at the state meet last year with a 48.88 split.

Fleming Island's girls 200 free relay; Sarah and Emma Grimm, Corrina Laird and Alicia Sullivan, is ranked 10th for Class 4A with a 1:40.28. Buchholz tops the list at 1:33.21.

LAKE CITY — St. Johns Country Day School cross country coach Jay Birmingham may very well rate November as his favorite month of the year, despite Christmas in December.



PALM COAST – Fleming Island High School's boys cross country team got their top two guys; seniors Andrew Miller and Evan Fuller, in the top 15 at the region 1-4A slugfest held at the Flagler County Fairgrounds on Nov. 3, but the remainder of the Golden Eagles surprising team was swept out of the top 15 in one of the fastest top 15s in Class 4A.


"Our goal was to get the team to state and it didn't happen," said Miller. "This was very fast up front and our young guys may have gotten sucked into that first mile; about five minutes flat."

Miller and Fuller both return to the state meet with Miller, 12th last year, finishing ninth in 16 minutes, 22.21 seconds and Fuller, who went two years ago, finishing 11th in 16:26.73. Top time was Kayamo Galloway of Oviedo in 15:52.16 who edged out Lake Minneola's Noah Quintana's 15:53.58. The top four runners were under 16 minutes with the top 15 under 16:31.44.

For the anticipated state meet in Tallahassee on Saturday, region 4-4A was won in 16:40.02, region 2-4A was won in 16:04.84 and region 3-4A was won in 16:22.47 putting 1-4A with four under 16 minutes the fastest qualifying region.

Within the top 15 pack in region 1-4A were; in third at 15:57.50 , Bryce Bell of Lyman, fifth in 4A last year at 16:11.02; in fourth at 15:59.19, Kyler Hodges of Lyman, 19th last year at 16:29.95; in eighth at 16:18.01, Canaan St. Lewis of Lake Mary, 24th last year in 16:38.40, and Miller, 12th last year in 16:23.29. Fuller was 16th at last year's regions.

Miller who sat in the middle of the lead pack with Galloway and Quintana for the first 1.5 miles started to fade from there with Fuller trying to hang on in a second pack just seconds off the pace.

"I was hoping some of those guys would fall back, but the whole group was strong," said Fuller, who had his best region finish after surging in the final 100 meters to finish 16th last year. "The ground was soft and we were kind of sloshing out there."

In team points, Oviedo was team champion with 65 points ahead of Lyman's 111 as runnerup. Fleming Island finished eighth with 228.

Fleming Island's final finishers were off their pace with freshman Jayden Scherer third in at 72nd in 17:58.28; Gage West at 77th in 18:04.70; Kameron Wallizada at 95th in 18:27.52 and Samuel Terry at 96th in 18:29.92.

For the Fleming Island girls, senior Julie Franzoni again led a three-runner contingency for the Golden Eagles with her 29th place finish in 20:32.05 followed up by freshman Emma Millson and sophomore Jennifer Fliess striding in at 32 and 33 in 20:35.66 and 20:37.96, respectively.

Winter Park won the girls title with 65 points with Fleming Island 11th with 261.

Mezera key to Fort Hays 10-0 season

MARYVILLE, Mo. - Fort Hays State outlasted Northwest Missouri State 13-12 on the road in a great battle between the top two defensive teams in the MIAA. The No. 6 ranked Tigers moved to 10-0 overall, while the No. 8 Bearcats dropped their second straight game and moved to 8-2. The Tigers secured the MIAA Championship outright with the win.


In the fourth quarter, Fort Hays quarterback Jacob Mezera, an Orange Park High graduate, hit a 66 yard scoring pass to end Harley Hazlett that Hazlett caught over the middle of the field then broke away to hit paydirt. The score put Fort Hays up 13-3 with 9:25 left in the game.

The win snapped Northwest Missouri State's 23-game home win streak that dated back to the 2014 season when Pittsburg State knocked off the Bearcats. That led to an MIAA co-championship between Pittsburg State and Northwest Missouri State. The Bearcats had either shared or won the conference title outright four consecutive years until today, as the Tigers became the first team to win the title outright other than NWMSU since the 2012 season when Missouri Western claimed the title out-

Most importantly for the Tigers, they remain in good position for a potential No. 1 seed in the NCAA Playoffs. The Tigers are looking for their first NCAA Playoff appearance since 1995. It was also the last year the Tigers won a conference title before Saturday, topping the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

With both defenses allowing less than 300 yards of total offense per game entering Saturday, the game had every indication of being a defensive battle. That turned out to be the case and one big Fort Hays State play on offense proved the difference in a game where moving the ball was a hard thing to do.

Neither team could find a first down on the opening five drives of the game until

FHSU broke through with a first down on their third drive of the game. Northwest Missouri put together the first fruitful drive that lasted through the end of the first quarter, putting the first points of the game on the board with 14:08 remaining in the second quarter on a Parker Sampson 28-yard field goal. The drive took 15 plays, covering 48 yards in 6:27. NWMSU gained three first downs on that drive.

The Tigers responded with a field goal of their own. Brandon Brown connected from 48 yards after an 8-play, 34-yard drive that took 3:14. That knotted the score with 10:59 remaining in the opening half. Monterio Burchfield had a 15-yard reception and Drew Kite had a 16-yard catch on

the drive. The 3-3 deadlock turned out to be the halftime score.

Two big offensive plays led to Fort Hays State's second half points. The first was a 52-yard run on the first play from scrimmage by Kenneth Iheme, immediately putting the Tigers in the redzone. A few plays later, Brown gave FHSU its first lead, 6-3, with a 36-yard field goal. Neither team scored the remainder of the period.

The second big play came on the second Fort Hays State drive of the fourth quarter with Mezera's scoring pass.

From there, they had to hold off Maryville magic. Northwest Missouri State made those final nine and a half minutes of the game uncomfortable.

On the ensuing drive, NWMSU marched 14 plays covering 75 yards over 6:06 to get its only touchdown of the game. It came on

a 21-yard touchdown reception by Quincy Woods. At that point, 3:19 remained on the

Fort Havs State's offense could not gain a much-needed first down and NWMSU had all of its timeouts remaining. The Bearcats began to march again as Bearcat Stadium reached a fever pitch. But the air went out of the stadium when Connor Shedeed picked off a deep pass down the right sideline at the FHSU 14. The clock read 1:05.

With two timeouts remaining, the Bearcats were able to force FHSU into a punt situation with 17 seconds remaining. FHSU opted to have punter Dante Brown run out the back of the end zone for a safety. FHSU was clinging to a 13-12 lead with 13 seconds remaining.

with a 42-11 victory over visiting Orange Park Nov. 4 at Fleming Island High School.

Fleming Island (8-2) earned a region playoff berth and will travel to Robert E. Lee High (9-1) Nov. 10 for a 7:30 p.m. start. Lee has a long history of playoffs dating back to 1964 and including 11 straight playoff berths from 1977-1986 under legendary coach Corky Rogers, who recently retired from the Bolles School. Lee coach O.J. Small, who started in 2015, has put the Generals in the playoffs the past two years; with a state semifinal loss to Plant High of Tampa last year. Plant was Class 7A runner-up to St. Thomas Aguinas. Fleming Island last earned a playoff spot in 2013 under coach Frank Hall. The Golden Eagles made the region 1-5A finals in 2007 (Neal Chipoletti), 2009 (Jeff Webb) and 2010 (Jeff Webb).

Against Orange Park, Fleming Island showed off its stout defense; one that will surely tested against the high-scoring Lee offense.

"It all starts in the trenches," said Fleming Island head coach Damenyum Springs. "Our defensive line played well tonight."

Defensive linemen Josh Harris, Marquavian Wright, Jake Libretto and Jalyn Robinson dominated the line of scrimmage. Libretto had three of the Golden Eagles eleven tackles for loss as the hosts held the Raiders to a negative rushing total until Alex Collier ran for a 69 yard touchdown on the Raiders' final drive of the game. yard line and led to a scoring run by Dewayne McBride on the next play.

"We do a turnover circuit in practice," said Springs. "But most of that happens as a product of playing physical."

The Raiders had two long laterals fall to the ground, one causing a twelve yard loss and the other a fumble that was recovered by Golden Eagles outside linebacker Jackson Bull

The Fleming Island offense, while not sustaining a drive longer than six plays until the fourth quarter, made enough big plays to put the game away. When Chauncey Garrison burst up the middle for a 50 yard touchdown run with 8:10 remaining in the second quarter, the Golden Eagles led 20-0 despite having earned only two first downs.

"The new playoff points system rewards teams for scheduling teams with winning records and we had a few," said Dickinson. "Now, we go one game at a time."



Broncos end season with a strong finish

MIDDLEBURG – With a full moon on Senior night, the one-win Middleburg High Broncos knew they could go out with a bang in the last game of the 2017 season. If the game ended at halftime, their dream would come true

"I think we're tired," said Middleburg Head Coach Karl Smeltzer, who finishes at 1-9 after a region playoff finish in 2016. "The second half they started running and we couldn't get anything going on offense again. It seemed to be a common occurrence for us. The defense is on the field an awful long time, and they get tired."

After a Tornado punt. The Broncos would start on the 40-yard line and get a huge shot of adrenaline from Tyler Bryant as he scooted 39 yards to get the Broncos deep within the Tornado red zone. After two runs and an incomplete pass, Morris would get the call again to give the Broncos a 10-0 lead halfway through the second quarter.

Still up 10-7 after a Bradford 25 yard touchdown run, Bronco kick returner Tanner Nobles lead the way with a 48-yard return to fire the team and the Bronco crowd back up. 

After the free kick, Northwest Missouri took over at its own 37 with nine seconds remaining. A 19-yard pass over the middle pushed the ball to the FHSU 44 with four seconds remaining. On the final hail mary attempt of the game, FHSU put several wide receivers back at the goal line and Hazlett came up with the game-sealing interception to give FHSU its first-ever MIAA Championship in football.

By the end of the game, the Bearcats had 318 yards of total offense and the Tigers had just 251. But the big plays were the difference in the game, giving FHSU just enough of an edge on the scoreboard for the win.

Mezera, with 180 for the game, went past the 5,000-yard mark in his career with the effort, the fifth quarterback in Tiger history to reach that mark. Hazlett finished with 84 yards on three catches, while Burchfield had 71 yards on three catches. On defense, Tanner Hoekman and Jose Delgado each had 11 tackles, while Jibowu, Shedeed, and Hazlett came up with the three interceptions of the Bearcats. The Tigers won the ball security battle, 3-0, by not turning the ball over at all.

The Tigers move to 10-0 for the first time in history and goes for an undefeated regular season November 11 against Nebraska-Kearney.
