Knife-wielding suspect captured

Suspect apprehended by potential victim's father

Krajewski was arrested and charged with three counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and violation of probation for grand theft

A good deed quickly turned into a dangerous encounter last week for a Oakland Hills man and his daughter.

But fortunately, the possible victim's father became the captor in a Friday evening incident at the Oakland Hills Medical Complex, 13940 State Road 441.

Roy James II and his three-year-old daughter

were walking their dog near the north side of Building 400 in the medical complex where they saw a man lying on the ground between the building and an outdoor table, according to a sheriff's office report.

When James asked the man if he was alright, he indicated that he had had a seizure, according to sheriff's Capt. Kevin Hofsicker.

He then produced a knife and began stabbing at the cement, the report states.

The suspect, Kenneth Alan Krajewski, 40, The Villages, then got up and lunged at James and his daughter in a swinging motion, according to the report.

James grabbed his daughter and fled to a nearby residence to call 9-1-1. He returned with his father, Roy

James Sr., a retired federal law enforcement officer, and they saw Krajewski drop to a kneeling position with his arms extended as if he had a firearm that was pointed at them.

In fear for their lives, the senior James pulled out a handgun and told Krajewski to lay on the ground until law enforcement arrives.

When Deputy Mike Dragnoff arrived about 7:30 p.m., the suspect was apprehended while James Sr. held him at gunpoint. Krajewski did not have a gun, according to Hofsicker.

Krajewski was arrested and charged with three counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and violation of probation for grand theft.

He was placed in the Sumter County Detention Center without bond.

Man gets 2 years for pig assault

A man arrested on animal cruelty charges after allegedly breaking into the livestock pens of a local school's agricultural department and attacking three pigs was sentenced to 2 years in prison after pleading no contest to the charges.

Dallace Lee Hatley, 19, of Bushnell, was a student at South Sumter High School prior to Jan. 20, when the pigs were injured by his dog while Hatley was trespassing on school property.

According to a sheriff's office report, on Jan. 18, a teacher told school resource officer Deputy LJ Wynn that the three pigs had been injured and when Wynn arrived at the

Oak Grove Cemetery double murders

If she had lived, Shirley Elizabeth Whitten would be 58 years old. But Whitten never made it past her 19th birthday. She and an acquaintance were found brutally stabbed to death in 1972 in a remote Wildwood cemetery.

The two would become Sumter County's most horrific murder case that remains unsolved to this day.

Whitten, a Coleman resident, was a clerk at the Union 76 truck stop in Wild-

wood back then. On Feb. 22, 1972, while at work, she met a man from Ft. Lauderdale passing through town.

His name was Roger Dale Higgins. Higgins, 26, stopped with his employer at the truck stop to rest.

Enraged killer brutally murders two people in Wildwood cemetery

He had just accepted a job as a laborer for a moving company.

Higgins and Whitten drove in the early morning hours that day to the Oak Grove Cemetery, off

Ice Plant Road, where they had sex, according to information from the Sumter County Sheriff's Office murder file.

But they were not

alone in the cemetery.

Someone either followed them or knew they were there, said sheriff's Major Gary Bran-

nen. About 8 a.m. that day, about five hours after they left the truck stop in a 1969 Chevrolet, their bodies were discovered

Interstate repairs under way **COLD**

Motorists need to be on the look-out for construction on Interstate 75 from the Lake Panasoffee Bridge to the Florida Turnpike in Sumter County, as the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) begins resurfacing more than six miles of I-75.

The project starts at the north side of the Panasoff-

kee Bridge to the Florida Turnpike. It includes resurfacing, guardrail, and protective walls at the bridges at County Road 514 and the Turnpike.

Ajax Paving Industries of Florida is performing the work. The project lasts approximately 140 calendar days, weather permitting. The project cost is \$2.7 mil-

lion.

Lane closures are restricted to Monday through Friday, 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. and Saturday and Sunday, 9 p.m. to 7 a.m. Motorists should be alert for construction personnel and equipment along the construction corridor. Motorists are urged to use caution and drive with care.

just outside of the car by a man who came to the cemetery to repair a grave-stone.

Their bodies were found beside each other. Both Whitten and Higgins had been murdered by someone who repeatedly stabbed them to death with a pocketknife. Wound marks covered their bodies. They were no larger than one centimeter in width.

Whitten, whose body was naked from the waist down, had been stabbed 33 times. She suffered wounds in her chest, knee, legs, ear and liver. Stab wounds in her lungs and aorta are believed to have caused her death.

Higgins, who may have attempted to run from the murderer and was then

brought back to the car, had been stabbed a similar amount of times.

Stab wounds ran from the back of his hairline down his neck to his back. The upper lobe of his right lung had been punctured, causing his death.

Investigators don't believe the murders were the work of some unknown assailant or a "crazed serial killer," Brannen said. Their deaths are believed to be the work of one man, someone who knew Whitten and became enraged because of her involvement with Higgins.

The cemetery was too remote for someone to just happen upon the pair, someone knew they were there, Brannen said.

And the murders aren't believed to be random killings, the suspect won't choose a pocketknife as a murder weapon, he said.

"Somebody knew they could find her there," Brannen said. "Either they

went looking for her at the truck stop and someone said she had gone to the cemetery or Whitten and Higgins were seen together and someone followed them there."

"The suspect was probably jealous...in a rage," he said. "He slashed the car tires and then things escalated from there."

Brannen believes the murders may still be solved.

"Somebody local knows about this case and they could help solve this case," he said.

Brannen said he is hopeful that someone may want to clear their conscience and finally bring to a close the Oak Grove Cemetery murder case.

scene he found the animals bruised and bleeding in their pen.

An investigation revealed that Hatley allegedly unleashed his pit bull on the pigs and the dog repeatedly bit the animals that were caged and unable to es-

cape.

Hatley claimed the dog entered the pigs' cage without his help and he had to use a hoe to get the dog off the pigs.

Little more than a month after his arrest, Hatley was arrested again in an unrelated incident involving burglary and grand theft of items taken from a deputy's car.

Hatley was found guilty on one count of animal cru-

elty and one count of trespassing on school property for his January arrest at school and one count of burglary of a structure and one count of grand theft for his role in the February burglary of a deputy's vehicle.

Hatley was sentenced to two years in prison and ordered to pay fines and court costs during his June 14 hearing at the Bushnell criminal court complex, according to court records.

Coleman home crushed

Debra Mclean had been raking leaves in the yard when ominous dark clouds suddenly gathered and strong winds from a thunderstorm began to sway tall trees surrounding her mobile home.

Mclean, 57, who suffers from severe diabetes, decided to go inside and take a nap until the storm passed. She might have been in the kitchen pouring some ice tea, making a sandwich, or she could have collapsed in a chair in the living room to rest, but fortunately, shortly

after noon on Monday, June 6, she decided to lie down on the bed in her bedroom.

Fortunately, because that's when a 70-foot oak tree snapped near ground level and crashed through her kitchen and living room ceilings, snapping trusses and ripping a five-foot slice through the exterior wall over the kitchen sink.

Mclean, who is disabled, had to move in with her daughter, Latasha Golphin, and her children, after the incident.

"I thank the Lord I was sleeping," said Mclean.

Mclean said she woke to a "bang" and "jumped out

of bed.

"If I was cooking or sitting in the living room that tree might have killed me," Mclean said.

Mclean, who has lived in Coleman her entire life and attended Wildwood High School, does not have insurance and her 1987 mobile home was all but destroyed by the massive tree. As a result of diabetes it's difficult for her to get around and some days she can hardly walk. Mclean says she has no money to repair or replace her home.

The Friday after Mclean's aging single-wide mobile home on Clark Ave., in Coleman, was

sliced open by the tree, her daughter brought her back to retrieve clothing and other personal belongings.

"My daughter decided to check on me that day, and when she drove up, she thought I was dead," Mclean said.

Golphin told how she drove up to her mother's house after the storm and was terrified by what she saw.

"I hadn't heard from her yet, and when I saw that tree lying across my mother's home, it scared me – I thought she was dead," said Dolphin.



Wildwood crossing should be approved

The state seems to be waiting for someone to die before it will grant Wildwood the right to install a pedestrian crossing at the intersection of U.S. 301 and Rutland Street in downtown Wildwood.

According to a letter from City Manager Robert Smith addressed to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), 23,000 vehicles travel U.S. 301 between S.R. 44A and County Road 466A daily. Also, the proposed signalized east-west pedestrian crossing includes an emergency signal for nearby Fire Station 31, the busiest in the county.

Nevertheless, FDOT recently denied the city permission to construct the crossing because it says, "no pedestrian or vehicular crashes considered correctable by a signalized mid-block pedestrian crossing or an emergency signal" have occurred, yet.

We believe the state is wrong to oppose a signalized pedestrian crossing, especially when the county has agreed to pay the project's \$120,000 cost and Lake-Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization has approved the plan. The potential for serious or fatal pedestrian and vehicular crashes in downtown Wildwood is not even arguable. U.S. 301 is a four-lane major highway that serves as Main Street for the growing city.

Signalized pedestrian crossings are recognized by municipalities all over the world as effective mechanisms in preventing pedestrian deaths. Why not in Wildwood?

The need for a safe, signalized pedestrian crossing and emergency signal to warn motorists that emergency vehicles are entering the traffic flow is patently obvious to city officials and many residents. The county must feel likewise as it has agreed to pay for the crossing. FDOT is the unnecessary red light in this case.

We wonder why state officials feel more "crashes," with potential for a pedestrian fatality or two, are necessary before approving a crossing and emergency signal paid for by the county.

In a letter to city officials dated May 19, the state contends that a crossing would "introduce new crash patterns." We contend that victims of a Main Street fender bender would fare better than a pedestrian struck by a truck while attempting to cross the street in downtown Wildwood.

The Southwest Florida Water Management District's Governing Board accepted the resignation of Executive Director David L. Moore today and appointed the District's General Counsel William S. Bilenky to serve as interim executive director.

Moore, who was appointed executive director in March 2003, resigned on May 26, but had offered to continue temporarily in the role to help facilitate the successful transition of the next executive director. The Board accepted Moore's resignation today during a special workshop and praised him for his service to the District. Moore will continue to serve in an

advisory capacity until July 15.

The Board also authorized District Human Resources staff to begin the recruitment process for a new executive director immediately.

Bilenky has been with the District since September 1999 and has served as its general counsel since March 2000. As the District's general counsel, Bilenky provides legal advice and support to the Governing Board and the District, appearing on their behalf before the Department of Administrative Hearings, the Legislature, the state trial and appellate courts, and federal agencies and courts.

British-American recognized by Hospice

Living in Sumter County is a WWII hero with a rare dual American-British citizenship with a royal past.

Order of the British Empire recipient and Cornerstone Hospice and Palliative Care patient Stanley Edward Jewkes, 98, was born in Boston in 1913 to British parents and grandparents. As Stanley observed the tender age of six, the Jewkes clan returned to Dudley, England, to help with the family's bakery and grocery business and as Stanley grew into a young man, he graduated as an engineer and received his bachelor of arts degree from the Institute of Civil Engineers. Continuing his studies, he became an associate of the Royal Institute of British Architects in London.

At 27, Stanley and his English bride Ella, married in May, 1939, the year the Luftwaffe started early bombing forays in London at the onset of WWII. Bombings increased in earnest in July of 1940, the year their only daughter Carole was born. Stanley thought his engineering and architectural degrees may be of help to his adopted homeland and volunteered for enlistment under Her Majesty's Home Guard, the equivalent of America's Army where his superiors determined his engineering and architectural training would be invaluable to the allies to thwart the advance of the menace on the other side of the world, the Japanese advance throughout the Pacific.

As the Japanese started attacking British possessions and territories throughout Southeast Asia and the Far East, the Home

Guard (England's army) made Stanley Engineer of the British Empire in the Far East, eventually becoming an officer in the Volunteer Force for the Federated Malay States (included North Borneo and Singapore), a British territory at the time which was eventually overrun and occupied by the Japanese. In order to disrupt transportation routes to impede Japanese advancement, Stanley was ordered to utilize his engineering knowledge in determining the points of vulnerability where explosives could be placed on bridges so he could dynamite several structures, including the massive Gedung River Bridge in Malay.

Pat Lehotsky, president and CEO at Cornerstone Hospice, expressed that "these veterans come to us after having suffered traumatic experiences during the war years and the six and seven decades elapsed since then to the present do not by any means ameliorate the physical and mental effects those hostile engagements have left on these military patients."

Upon the fall of Singapore, Stanley and dozens other refugees were escaping on a small ship which got bombed and sunk by Japanese fighter planes in the Straits of Malacca. Survivors were picked up by a friendly Chinese crew on a small motor launch which took everyone to the island of Sumatra where they were eventually rescued by an Australian cruiser which had just escaped from the battle of the Coral Seas, and survivors were taken across the Indian Ocean to India. There, Stanley joined the Indian

army serving as king's commissioner officer as part of "Vinegar Joe" Stillwell's 14th Allied Army, credited for preventing the Japanese from invading India from nearby Burma.

Fran Sykora RN, CHPN and executive regional team manager at Cornerstone Hospice for the Lake and Sumter region, points out that "our medical and social work staff, along with other Hospice disciplines, have received training designed by a national VA expert to meet the unique needs of veterans under an individualized plan of care based on the patient's medical, emotional, physical, social and spiritual needs."

Upon the Japanese surrender Aug. 15, 1945, Stanley returned to his more secure engineering and architectural professions and amidst the fanfare of blaring trumpets and much pomp and circumstance at Buckingham Palace on Jan. 1, 1958, was awarded the coveted Order of the British Empire. Besides English, Stanley is fluent in French, Malay plus conversant in German, Spanish, Hindustani, Bengali, Pashto (language spoken in Afghanistan and western Pakistan), and several other Far Eastern dialects. Our hero and his wife, Ella eventually retired in 1988 at age 75, relocating to Florida.

Construction plans move ahead for Bushnell park

Bushnell plans to begin construction of a town square park that includes a 35-foot gazebo and decorative fountain across from City Hall within six to eight weeks.

The park that City Manager Vince Ruano describes as esthetically transforming will serve as a hub for new sidewalks and bicycle paths that will snake beyond the city for many miles in all directions.

The multi-modal transportation project that includes storm drainage upgrades was initiated by the city over four years ago and is funded by the state Department of Transportation, according to Ruano.

"Working around the Fall Festival is a challenge, but we're moving forward on the project and should break ground here in about six weeks," said Ruano.

The city will develop the \$2.2 million central element first, including parking areas, the gazebo and a large fountain on the property in front of City Hall.


The park will include about 50 parking spaces, thousands of decorative pavers and trees and other landscaping surrounding the fountain and gazebo, according to construction plans and composite drawings.

The entire project, down to the species of decorative trees, the gazebo roof profile and scenic showcase of the historic courthouse, is designed to meld esthetically, however multi-modal functionality is the key element, Ruano said.

The availability of parking will allow residents to park their cars and stroll or ride their bicycles around town and beyond.

Ongoing work along U.S. 301 north of downtown is the result of the multi-modal project.

The sidewalk and bike paths are parts of the Bushnell project that were started early so the facilities would be completed without interference from planned roadwork on U.S. 301.

Health Dept. warns of risks of wildfire smoke

The Sumter County Health Department and the Florida Department of Health caution citizens about wildfire smoke. Smoke from wildfires is a mixture of gases and fine particles from burning trees and other plant materials that can cause a scratchy throat or irritated eyes and nose. Smoke can irritate your respiratory system, and worsen chronic heart and other chronic respiratory or lung conditions such as asthma.



- Use common sense when outside conditions are smoky. Avoid prolonged outdoor activities. It is especially important to limit time spent outdoors for children and persons with existing medical conditions.

- Limit strenuous outdoor activity.

- Stay indoors and run your air conditioner. Keep the fresh air intake closed to prevent bringing additional smoke inside and run the air conditioning with re-circulated air. Keep the filter(s) clean. Note: Do not stay indoors in hot weather if you do not have an air conditioner. Staying indoors with closed windows is dangerous in extremely hot weather and you should seek alternative shelter.

- To help keep particle levels lower inside avoid using anything

that burns, such as wood fireplaces, gas logs, gas stoves and even candles. Do not vacuum, which stirs up particles already inside your home.

- Do not smoke tobacco.

Smoke can irritate your respiratory system, and worsen chronic heart and other chronic respiratory or lung conditions such as asthma

- Follow your doctor's advice about taking medicines and following your asthma management plan if you have asthma or other lung disease.

Call your doctor if your symptoms worsen

- Pay attention to local air quality reports, news coverage or health warnings related to smoke.

Wildwood faces thousands for needed city hall repairs

LARRY CLIFTON/Sumter County Wildwood City Manager Robert Smith said bad building design, including air conditioning handlers that produce poor and uneven heating and cooling results in different areas of City Hall and chronic leaks from condensation lines, is behind the extensive repairs proposed for the City Hall building.

Wildwood City Hall, built just 11 years ago, is scheduled for \$326,573 in repairs, work that is set to begin in September.

The biggest problem with the City Hall building is a leaky, "poorly designed" heating and air conditioning system, according to City Manager Robert Smith.

The placement of system air handlers produces wide variances in temperature in different areas of the building, and water accumulating from condensation continually leaks from holding pans, according to Smith.

"We've got to act because there is the potential for developing a serious mold problem," Smith said, who added some city employees are forced to bring in small electric heaters during winter months to keep warm.

The city has contracted an independent engineering firm to inspect the new heating and cooling system installation to be sure the work is done right this time. The inspection and certification will cost \$15,000. As it happens, all warranties and recourse with the original building contractor have lapsed, Smith said, adding that funding for the repair project comes from reserves in the city's general and enterprise funds.

The repairs include over \$45,000 to correct a "wall gap" at the wall and roof connection on the first floor; \$221,000 to replace and repair the building's heating and air conditioning system, \$15,000 to inspect and certify the new AC system and more than \$45,000 to repair and paint the building's massive exterior columns, which have large gaps between the building and the columns' caps and bases.

State kills pedestrian crossing

A proposed pedestrian crossing at U.S. 301 and Rutland Street in downtown Wildwood that would have included an emergency signal for Fire Station 31 is dead on arrival.

"We are very disappointed since the project was paid for by the county and included an emer-

gency signal for the busiest fire station in the county," said Smith.

A lack of pedestrian and vehicular crashes deemed "correctable" and minimal thresholds of pedestrian and vehicle traffic were cited as reasons for not approving the east-west walkway, according to a letter from the Department of Transportation (DOT).

"The county was set to pick up the tab and all we needed was approval from DOT," said Smith. The state is concerned the proposed traffic signal would introduce new crash patterns," said Smith.

From Smith's perspective, even if the state is right about increased accidents, the crossing would protect pedestrians who are more vulnerable than motorists.

New plans for old library building


Wildwood officials have suggested a couple of uses for the empty library building on Huey Street in Wildwood.

Because funds for the building's renovations and maintenance come from the state, City Attorney Jerri Blair sent a letter to the Division of Library and Information Services requesting approval to either use the building to house the city's water department, as a "community center" or for some other public purpose.

When the county consolidated city libraries, the Wildwood Library moved to Villages Public Library at Pinellas Plaza and the old library building was shuttered.

Super homes for Sumter?

Building 40-acre villages of hurricane proof Global Super Homes capable of sustaining families without need of a traditional infrastructure such as electric, water and sewer connections or grocery stores all over the country may sound like a green pipe dream, but Noah West, founder of Project Noah's Ark, is looking for acreage to develop such a village in Sumter County.

West presented his plans at a recent Sumter County Agriculture Alliance Board meeting.

West's Global SuperHome is built vertically with three stories. The first floor is a 2,500-square-foot Village Square store front for the owner's home business, the second floor is a 2,500-square-foot luxury home, and the third is a 2,500-square-foot greenhouse — for a total of 7,500 square feet. The rooftop features a 3,000-square-foot solar power canopy producing as much as four times the electricity needed by the home and rooftop garden — and the home has a "circle-of-life" kitchen and zero carbon foot print.

During a phone interview with the Times, West said he is looking at various regions around the country including Sumter County to build an initial village of 40 super homes as bed and breakfast attractions where families and individuals interested in learning how to truly live in harmony with the environment can personally experience that lifestyle. The village would attract about a million tourists to Sumter each year, according to West.

The cost of living in a Global SuperHome? "It's less — perhaps far less — than an ordinary wooden home," says West.

"With the revolutionary Green Bank that we are asking President Obama to help us charter, the mortgage payment is reduced from about \$3,200 to only \$1,030 per month, said West. "In addition, there are no utility costs and almost no costs for food or

disaster insurance."

Unlike the Global SuperHomes which West claims he spent 15 years on construction and development. The Green Bank is conceptual, and calls for the president to charter a federal non-profit bank that would borrow money directly from the Federal Reserve (the same as the big banks) — but at rates of 1percent for 60 years and to pass this loan directly through to the homeowners of Global Homes. The cost of a hurricane-proof super home is about \$562,000, according to West.

For about \$12,000 down, and \$1,030 per month with a 60-year mortgage, people all over the country would embrace the green lifestyle and shed the high costs of food and infrastructure, West said.

"Our homes are designed to last from 300 to 400 years and we are ready to start building them when financing is in place," said West, adding the project would generate many jobs for the county.

Recent board meetings of the fledgling Sumter County Agriculture Alliance have produced an array of potential solutions to sagging economic development in the county's agricultural industries. To some who attended the presentation, West's Project Noah's Ark was a splendid concept but short on details.

"I share a lot of his aspirations, but there are a lot of economic assumptions — I don't believe he has financial resources in place," said Andy Cripps,

executive director of the Sumter County Chamber of Commerce.

"I like the concept of a sustainable environmentally sensitive lifestyle, but I wanted to hear more financial details," said Susan Kelly, Sumter County extension office director.

While some alliance board members viewed the project as far fetched, most were intrigued by the presentation.

For his part, County Administrator Bradley Arnold said the project is a "novel idea," but the county would not be offering free acreage to any developers. Arnold said a project of that size would have an impact on fire and traffic agencies which receive funding from impact fees, and a "demonstration" development of that size projected to attract a million visitors per year might not be a good fit in an a rural area.

Producing construction components for such a project would bring much-needed jobs to the county but such manufacturing was not part of the presentation, Arnold said.

West said he is currently setting up interviews with major television networks and cable stations about the project.

Sue Cullen was out fishing with Alan Croft and caught her very first Bass and it was a 5lbs and then caught a 3lb one on a watermelon trick worm.

Phillip Aiso and Kenny Lingus of Tampa were out fishing and caught their limit of 10 Bass, ranging from 5lbs to 2.8lbs at the south end of the lake using a top water lure and a June bug worm. They said that the boys are back in town to catch some fish.

As you can see from the above statistics there are almost an equal amount of anglers pan fishing as there are bass fishing. Bass fishing has been excellent, however this is prime time for pan fishing. From now through July is an excellent time for fishing with family and an excellent

time to start a child right in fishing or who simply wants to spend a relaxing day on the water chasing Bluegill and Shell crackers. If you think about it, there are very few fish where you're allowed to take home 50 per day and there is no size limit or closed season State biologists say the large limit on pan fish doesn't harm the stocks because, as I have reported in past articles, they reproduce so abundantly.

In fact, on smaller lakes such as Lake Panasoffkee, fishing pressure keeps them from overpopulating and becoming stunted. Donnie Lewis from Perry spent his weekend at Tracy's Point shows off his first catch of the trip Also, need a break from fishing? Check out the Cruce kids cooling off with a break from the heat.

While Blue Gills have been abundant, the Shell crackers have gotten off to slow start. I predict that they will turn on within the next week or so. Look for action on the Southwest side of Lake Panasoffkee - fish the grass lines - Live worms seem to be the bait

of choice. Let me throw in my two cents while we're talking about worms. As many of you pan fishermen know, there are a variety of species to choose from including wigglers, big reds, night crawlers and so on. Trust me on this - If you fish often then you want to go with either big reds or night crawlers.

Why? Because wigglers are very sensitive to temperature and if you don't keep them refrigerated they will die - quickly - especially during the summer.

Even if they are refrigerated, if they get too cold they will die. So...I recommend either big red or night crawlers. Keep them in the refrigerator and feed em a little flour or even some uncooked grits and they will last for a month or longer. Live Crickets are a good bait of choice for Blue Gill, however Shell crackers prefer more meat so live worms are the preferred bait.

They also enjoy grass shrimp which can be netted off of Tracy's Point with a fine mesh net.



Arugula and Mozzarella Spiked Tomatoes with Basil Vinaigrette

Yield: 4 servings

- 4 medium sized Florida tomatoes
- 1 pound fresh mozzarella cheese
- 1 bunch fresh Florida arugula (or basil)

Vinaigrette:

- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- Kosher salt and fresh ground pepper to taste

For vinaigrette: In medium sized bowl, whisk together olive oil, vinegar, honey, basil and garlic until completely emulsified. Taste and adjust seasoning with kosher salt and fresh ground pepper.

Rinse tomatoes under cold running water and pat dry with clean paper towels. With a sharp serrated knife, cut each tomato into an even number of wedges. Then make a horizontal cut near the tip of each wedge, being careful not to cut all the way down. Set aside sliced tomatoes.

Cut mozzarella into slices that will fit into the slices made in the tomatoes. (Try to fit one piece of mozzarella into a tomato to see what size you'll need to cut the rest.) To assemble, insert a slice of mozzarella into each tomato wedge. Arrange wedges on a plate and top with arugula or basil leaves. Garnish with basil vinaigrette. Season with kosher salt and fresh ground pepper to taste. Serve at room temperature.

The Garden Bug

Try mounting the house away from food and on a metal pole, rather than on a tree trunk or hanging it on a branch. Smear the pole with a petroleum jelly/hot pepper mixture and spread sharp gravel around the base to discourage intruders.

Help farm animals cope in hot weather

In this extremely hot and humid weather, it is important to take precautions to help equines and other farm animals cope with the heat.

can become a breeding ground for bacteria and mosquitoes, so change water regularly. An open pasture offers no relief from the scorching sun. Your animals should have access to shade, such as a barn or stall to enter, or large shade trees. A fan in a stall can help to keep animals cooler, and fly free. But take precautions that the animal will not come in contact with the fan or its wiring.

A horse may run around and try to rid himself of biting insects, which can cause the horse to become overheated. The use of fly repellents will alleviate annoying insects, and keep equines comfortable and

sedentary. Your horse will appreciate a cool sponge down to not only help cool him, but rid him of the sweat that attracts flies.

Many light pigmented animals will have skin sensitive to the sun. They must be protected with sunscreen or a fly mask with UV protection.

Leisurely ride your horse only in the early morning or late evening after the sun goes down. You must take the time to cool him down slowly, and offer him small amounts of cool water. Avoid very cold water. Your horse may need electrolytes if he is sweating excessively.

Horses can suffer heat stroke. Recognizing the

signs of heat stroke can save your horses life. Be aware of rapid shallow breathing, signs of weakness and depression, refusal to eat, signs of dehydration, increased pulse rate and a raised temperature for more than 30 minutes. If your horse is displaying any of these signs, bring him into a cool stable and pour cool water over his back and neck. Give him small amounts of water every few minutes and electrolytes. If symptoms persist, call a veterinarian.

Our horses and farm animals need our vigilance to help them through the long hot summer. It is up to us to make it a bit more bearable for them.
