The journey through Sumter County courts continues next week for two convicted murderers who were both found guilty of two gruesome and different criminal cases that have lingered for years in the judicial system.

Both Carl Dausch and Bill Paul Marquardt are court on Tuesday, Feb. 28, Esperanza Wells, 42.

Marquardt, 35, is expected to learn whether he will spend the remainder of his life in prison or be put to death for the brutal 2000 murders of Margarita scheduled to appear in Ruiz, 72, and her daughter

The women were in Ruiz's Tarrytown home caring for a toddler-age family member when they were murdered.

During his trial last October, Marquardt, acting as his own attorney, wanted the judge, rather than the jury, to determine his sentence. Marquardt was found guilty of two counts of first-degree murder in the women's stabbing and shooting deaths and one count of burglary. Daush, 53, is in the

process of seeking a motion for a new trial that will considered by Judge Hallman on Feb. 28, according to Assistant State Attorney Peter Magrino.

Launching new landfill

A crowd of about 50 people, including officials from the City of Bushnell and Marion County, gathered in Sumterville earlier this week. The group came together for the ACMS Class I landfill groundbreaking. It was just after 9 a.m. Monday morning, with a backdrop of heavy equipment

and flat land that officials and company executives and employees lined up with shovels and hard hats.

The facility is located just east of Lake Panasoffkee in Sumterville, on a nearly 800acre parcel of land that was annexed into the City of Bushnell in 2009.

The Class 1 landfill will allow a diverse range of waste to be dumped including industrial waste, household and commercial wastes and agricultural wastes from farming operations. The facility will also be accessible for dumping by sources inside and outside of the county and the initial permit is for construction on 58.8 acres

The facility was approved by officials from the City of Bush-

nell and Marion County. Through the agreement, the

county will pay \$20 million for 2.5 million tons of disposal capacity in ACMS's landfill. The facility is expected to open near the close of the 2012 calendar year, after some intense construction including digging and lining cells, laying a leachate system, installing storage tanks, pumps and testing the system.

ACMS President Charlie Dean, Jr. drew several laughs as he related the process of getting the landfill to its current stage. When the process was still just a plan, he contacted then Bushnell council member Dale Barnes and asked to meet with him. Though Barnes didn't have time for an actual meeting with Dean, they literally met "under the oak tree." Dean

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



Presidents' Day thoughts

et's skip the sad fact that Presidents' Day is focused on car sales and mattress discounts and get to the painful truth: Too many Americans – even college seniors – don't know about the individuals who led our nation and shaped our world

Even at our nation's founding, our leaders knew the importance of civic education. President George Washington once said, "A primary object should be the education of our youth in the science of government. In a republic, what species of knowledge can be equally important? And what duty more pressing than communicating it to those who are to be the future guardians of the liberties of the country?"

So how are we doing?
Probably worse than the
British army at the end of the
American Revolution, it turns
out. Only 34 percent of college
seniors from elite institutions
could identify Washington as
the general at the Battle of
Yorktown, according to a survey
by the Center for Survey Research and Analysis. More than
a quarter couldn't name John
Adams as the second president.

And only 23 percent of students

could name James Madison as

the "Father of the Constitution."

It may not be necessary for students to memorize that James K. Polk was No. 11 or that James Buchanan preceded Abraham Lincoln – to be honest, neither are likely to come up in casual conversation. But to graduate from college without a basic grasp of our history leaves us poorly prepared to face America's many challenges, not to mention the fact that it is a tragic slap in the face of the men and women who formed America, and defended her

It's not just the founders who remain strangers to many of today's students. Only 53 percent identified Theodore Roosevelt as president when America acquired the Panama Canal. Worse, just 22 percent could identify the phrase "Government of the people, by the people, for the people" as part of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

What is happening at our colleges?

It's called a serious case of academic irresponsibility. Students and families are paying more and more – tuitions have more than quadrupled in the past 25 years – yet colleges are failing to provide our students with the educational foundation they deserve and our country needs.


A nationwide study of more than 1,000 colleges and universities, "What Will They Learn?" (www.whatwilltheylearn.com) found that 80 percent of our colleges don't require students to take even a single foundational course in American history. About 85 percent don't require students to study foreign language. And despite the state of the global economy, an unbelievable 95 percent of colleges don't require even a basic economics course. Without a strong educational foundation, how can the leaders of tomorrow set the course for our future?

Too many of today's graduates are far more likely to be familiar with Snooki than Socrates. Lady Macbeth has receded into near oblivion as Lady Gaga takes center stage. And a very disappointing Google search will find over 400 million hits for performer Nicki Minaj – more than 10 times the number of hits for Thomas Jefferson.

Employers are noticing these skewed priorities. Fully 87 percent of employers believe that our colleges must raise the quality of students' educations in order for the United States to remain competitive globally, according to the Association of

Is the Obama administration budget reality or rhetoric?

The Budget and Accounting Act of 1921 and the Congressional Budget and Impoundment Control Act of 1974 require the president to submit to Congress an annual budget outlining proposed revenue and spending allocations for the federal government.

President Obama has just submitted his budget in which he calls for more stimulus spending on infrastructure, raising taxes on those he considers to be "rich" and adds almost one trillion dollars to America's fifteen trillion dollar debt. By most accounts, his plan is really an outline for his reelection campaign and has no

chance of passage. Some Democrats and their allies in the liberal media are already seeking to blame the anticipated Congressional rejection of his budget on Republicans in general and the Tea Party movement in particular. Is it accurate? Let's examine the facts.

In order for the Federal Budget to become law, it must be passed by both the House of Representatives and the Senate and then signed by the president. The last budget to be passed by the U.S. Senate was in April of 2009 more than one thousand days ago. Fifty one votes are needed to pass the budget in the U.S. Senate. Dozens of firefighters fight blaze that destroyed Wildwood home

ers fought a blaze last week the report states. that destroyed a Wildwood mobile home and burned about 10 acres of land before being contained.

Sumter County Fire and EMS units were dispatched to the brush fire at 2:22 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 16, on County Road 141, ac-

cording to a county report. First arriving units found a rapidly spreading brush

The fire burned approximately 10 acres before being contained.

Initial attempts to extinguish the blaze were hampered by explosions from the heavily involved trailer which contained live ammunition and two propane tanks.

If county commissioners agree, the imposition of the current county-wide fire impact fee could end in the next few years.

That is the focus of a workshop meeting that was scheduled for Tuesday evening by county commissioners. The board can only discuss the issue at the workshop and must consider it again during a regular board meeting in order to take any action.

Currently, the cost to **Sumter County residents** in impact fees is \$397 annually per home. The annual rate is \$243 for residents of The Villages.

County Administrator Bradley Arnold said Monday that the board could sunset the impact fee ordinance as early as late this year for Sumter County residents because the county should be able to complete all the projects that the fee was aimed at accomplishing for fire protection.

By 2014, the same should be true for The Villages fire impact fee, he

station (and the earlier mentioned station) financing will require the continuation of the Villages District Fire Impact Fee."

The fee could be rescinded at an estimated date of Sept. 2015 or as early as Jan. 2014 if The Villages provides a partial or full donation for the stations

"Regardless of the estimated times, the fact remains that once the demand is met to accommodate the growth of The Villages Fire District there is no more justification to continue collection of the fee and the ordinance should be rescinded," Arnold states.

The Sumter Fire Impact Fee could be eliminated at the same time as The Villages fee because federal funding has expedited completion various fire stations and the only remaining project is the expansion of the Lake Panasoffkee Fire Station, according to Arnold's report.

He also suggests that a Buena Vista will finalize fire impact fee could be imposed for any large developments that enter the county and require a fire station with only the occupants of that development paying the fee.



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
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Wildwood Rotary Club busy serving

And at the international joins other Rotary Clubs in providing assistance to a South American orphanage and public health care in the Bahamas.

Then there's the national effort of Rotary groups around the world – the organization has been primary in eradicating polio through their Rotary Polio Plus program, according to Thornton.

In the past several years, the Wildwood-based organization has raised between \$40,000 and \$50,000 to serve the community, according to club secretary Randall Thornton.

"Our main fund raising projects include a golf tournament normally held on the first Friday in December," notes Thornton. Money from the golf tournament is earmarked for educational projects.

They also host a reverse drawing in August of each year. The funds from that drawing are used for the various other projects. "100 percent of all funds that the Wildwood Rotary Club raises," future and past, is spent on projects – none of the money is used for administrative or club costs," according to Thorn-

The organization has "maintained its strength over the years by concentrating efforts on issues that are relevant to communities around the world, such as literacy, peace, education and health."

There are 19 members in the Wildwood Rotary, but worldwide, there are 1.2 million members in 32,000 clubs, based in 200 countries. The Rotary was started in Chicago by Paul Harris and other business-

As for the members, he said they don't see each other much through the week, but when they get together, "It's like a family."

The Wildwood Rotary Club meets at 7:30 a.m. weekly on Wednesdays.

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Granville Beville 2234, Bushnell, visit historic Haile homestead

Thirteen members of the Granville Beville 2234, Bushnell visited the Haile Homestead in Gainesville, Saturday, Feb. 11. What a wonderful old homestead filled with so much history. Thomas Evans and Esther Serena Chesnut Haile moved their family to Alachua County in 1854, it took two years to build this antebellum home on 1,500 acres of which 40 acres remain.

There are 6,200 square feet of home under roof with 10 rooms, two center hallways and 7 closets. There are a few pieces of original furniture that remain, one of which is the baby crib. A schoolroom for the Haile Children and their neighbors, a nursery for the youngest children of which there were 14 in all, as well as a sick room used for family and slaves. Two upstairs rooms served for the boys and girls.

The homestead is well known for the "talking walls." The Hailes had a habit of writing on the walls of their home. There are more than 12,500 words altogether. Here is something Serena wrote on the West Wall of the parlor; 15 drops turpentine, 10 to 15 drops laudanum, 1 teaspoonful paragoric, In one glass of water, Repeat every 3 hours if necessary

Hey ya'll hope all is well, boy it really got cold here last weekend not too many people out last Sunday. Never sat here by myself before, very lonely.

But this week we finally saw a change in the weather, believe it or not the bass are still hitting. Sill waiting on the specks or crappie, whichever you prefer, guess it's where you're from.

We are seeing speck beds, but not quite on the beds yet. We still have a little ways to go before they're here full force. But get ready because you know when they start, we'll be eating good.

Just some information I found: Black Crappie are darker. Has seven or eight dorsal spines, has spotted sides and is typically found more in the northern states. The black prefers larger, deeply impoundments. The White Crappie which are light in color also has six dorsal spines. Has eight or nine vertical bands on its sides and is found primarily in the southern states and prefers quiet black waters. Both grow to more than five pounds while three quarters of a pound are more typical. They're actually a member of the sunfish family and can be found in all the continental states. They have many names based on the geographic location: Paper mouth, Googgleye Bridge perch and Speckled perch, just a few.

wish of our local Humane Society/SPCA **L**of Sumter County is that every animal in their foster care finds a loving home. It is important that the adopting families are matched with a pet that suits their lifestyle. Many people fall in love with an adorable furry face, only to find out that the personality of their new pet is quite the opposite of what they had hoped for.

A new arrival into the Humane Society/SPCA foster program has a minimum of two weeks before he or she is shown to the public. In that two week time, the animal is getting his or her medical exam and vaccinations along with having his or her temperament and personality eval-

What is the Society evaluating? The Society is learning if the pet is shy or has an out going personality. Does he or she require a quiet home or possibly be an only pet in the home. Or does the pet have a high activity level, which would require a home with an active family

Why is evaluating a pet important? Just as people have different personalities, so do animals. Certain breeds are known to be high energy, while others are more docile. Standard breed behavior can become problematic and obsessive if not given proper outlets. Imagine a young Jack Russell Terrier or a Labrador Retreiver being adopted to a senior couple who enjoy watching TV and going for short leisurely walks. This adoption would be doomed from the start. Not only would the dog develop behavior problems, but the adoptive couple would be very unhappy having to live

Imagine a shy cat being adopted to an active family with young children. The cat would be terrified and possibly bite or scratch a family member. This would be another doomed adoption.

The Humane Society/SPCA not only wants their animals to be happy in their new homes, but they want the adopting family to enjoy and love their new pet too. Perfect matches mean a forever home for pets and a loving and loyal companion by your side.


