

Glades Central Loses to Dwyer For First Time

GLADES DAY EDGES
MIAMI- PACE FOR
ROAD WIN; PAHOKEE'S
OPENER CANCELLED

There's a first time for every-
thing.

Glades Central received a tough
lesson on that after its road game
against Dwyer was complete.

In the Raiders 30-9 loss to the
Panthers on Aug. 31, it was pretty
clear from the start which team was
the better one.

Aside from a 47-yard touchdown
pass from Glades Central senior
quarterback T.J. Abrams to senior
wide receiver Yvesner Ferdinand (4
catches, 94 yards) in the third quar-
ter, the Raiders couldn't get much
done on offense.

The third quarter touchdown cut
Dwyer's lead to 15-9 at that point.

Lingering Question About Storm of 1928 to be Answered?

*Announcement of
grant from the state
to be made, says
director*

In the immediate wake of the
Storm of 1928, a storm that also killed
thousands of people on its trajec-
tory through the Caribbean Islands
and Puerto Rico, surviving residents
and state officials arrived to the ar-
eas around Belle Glade, South Bay,
Pahokee and Canal Point to a ghastly

scene of decimated towns and bodies
strewn across roads, inside homes,
and around the agriculture fields of
the day.

As the natural effect of decom-
position began to set in, the workers
scrambled to recover the bodies and
bury them. Thousands of people had
perished.

As the director of the Port Mayaca
Memorial Gardens, Art Ivester still
fields questions about the Storm of
1928 that took the lives of mostly mi-
grant Glades workers. One of the big-
ger questions surrounding Port May-
aca and its connection to that fateful
day is exactly how many people who
died from the resulting flooding were

actually buried at that site.

Mr. Ivester latches on to the idea
that about 1,600 people – men, wom-
en and children – were buried at the
site. There is little other information to
justify the number, or even how the
mass burials were conducted.

The number is in question, and a
recently awarded grant may be just
the thing to find out the answer.

"We're going to find out," said Mr.
Ivester.

According to him, an announce-
ment is scheduled to be made at this
year's Remembrance of the Storm

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Inland Birding Fun: Northern Flicker (NOFL)

September 15th marks the 7th year that Hendry Glades Audubon has participated in the Florida Fall North American Migration Count (NAMC).

The area of a count is not a circle, but the boundaries of a County. The idea is to have a contiguous interlocking set of non-overlapping counts across North America.

Volunteers will be using various modes

of travel including cars, bicycles, or be on foot during their search for birds. Join a team or count at other locations. The following teams, who will be meeting at 7 a.m., need additional counters, compilers and photographers: STA5, Okaloacoochee Slough State Forest, or Lakeport Area.

Contact Margaret England for copy of the report form or to volunteer to help a team or survey from your home for an hour or more on Sept. 15. Most of the teams will be surveying wetland areas where they will identify birds by sight or sound.

Reports of migrating and resident birds found in other habitats are needed in order to get a more accurate snapshot of the birds in inland Florida including the Northern Flicker. This common Florida Bird lives in open habitats near trees, including pine and mixed woodlands and residential areas.

Northern Flickers are a fairly large woodpecker that is smaller than Pileated Woodpeckers and larger than other Florida woodpeckers. They have a slim rounded head, slightly downcurved bill, fairly long tail, and broad wings. The feathers located on the undersides of the wing and tail of the eastern birds is bright yellow.

Their brown plumage is patterned with black spots, bars and crescents. The oldest known Northern Flicker lived to be at least nine years and two months old. Northern Flickers' calls can be loud rolling rattles or a loud single-note "kyeer". They also make quiet, rhythmic "wick-a, wick-a" sounds when they are close together or displaying.

They forage mainly on the ground for insects, especially ants and beetles. This Flicker's long tongue can snag prey about two inches beyond the end of its bill. Their diet can also include fruit and seeds, especially in the winter.

Breeding pair will work together to excavate

a nest cavity in dead or diseased tree trunks or large branches in about 12 days between late March and June.

They often reuse cavities that they or other species used in previous years. Their nest cavity is 13 to 16 inches deep with a 3-inch diameter entrance hole. The female lays 5 to 8 eggs in the nest cavity that are incubated for 11 to 12 days with the young fledging in 25 to 28 days.

You are invited to join Hendry-Glades Audubon volunteers for birding trips to Stormwater Treatment Area 5 (STA5) at the new Deer Fence Trailhead located 29 miles south of Clewiston on Sept. 15 during the NAMC or Oct. 13 during an

escorted trip.




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


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SFWMD Continues Moving Historic Magnitude of Water

Since the onslaught of Tropical Storm Isaac five days ago, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) has moved more than 25 billion gallons of water in western Palm Beach County, which was heavily inundated with rainfall during the storm.

The agency's Emergency Operation Center remains fully activated, and emergency operations continue to provide flood relief to communities hit hardest by the 1-in-100-year storm event.

"The District's flood control pumps and infrastructure were operating at maximum capacity to move huge volumes of water through the regional system during and after the event," said Tommy Strowd, SFWMD Director of Operations, Maintenance and Construction.

"With areas of western Palm Beach County receiving more than a foot of rain over a three day period, water managers moved water at record rates to reduce the impacts of flooding."

are forecasting below-average rainfall through the Labor Day weekend, further allowing flood waters to drain without additional inflows.

With one day left in the month, August rainfall to-date for the Palm Beach County area was 16.18 inches. This is double, or approximately 8.64 inches more rainfall, than the average for the month.

The C-51 Basin received 27 percent of its average annual rainfall in the four days of rainfall associated with Tropical Storm Isaac. Eastern Broward, Miami-Dade, Martin and St. Lucie counties, the Lower Kissimmee Basin and Lake Okeechobee all received above-average rainfall for the month.

Regional Flood Control

The South Florida Water Management District operates and maintains the regional water management system known as the Central and Southern Florida Project, which was authorized by Congress more than 60 years ago to protect residents and businesses from floods and droughts.

The regional water management system is comprised of more than 1,600 miles of canals, 1,000 miles of levees/berms, 1,300 water control structures and 64 pump stations.

During the past five years, the District has invested approximately \$240 million to maintain the region's flood control infrastructure and ensure it operates at optimal capacity.

Stormwater Volume

Based on radar rainfall estimates, up to 14.85 inches of rain fell over 72 hours in an area of western Palm Beach County known as the C-51 Basin, encompassing communities that include Royal Palm Beach, Loxahatchee Groves and the Acreage.

Since Monday, water managers moved 25 billion gallons of water in the C-51 Basin in response to the storm, enough to fill 38,000 Olympic-size swimming pools.

At the peak of storm response, the C-51 canal was moving 9,600 cubic-feet of water per second, the highest rate ever recorded. The C-51 Basin covers 100,000 acres, one-quarter the size of Lake Okeechobee.

In addition to the regional system's permanent pumps moving water through the primary canal system, the District also deployed nine temporary pumps in western Palm Beach County to help alleviate flood conditions in the Acreage and Deer Run communities.

Rainfall

In a boost for recovery efforts, the most heavily impacted areas received little to no rainfall in the past 24 hours. District meteorologists

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Gas Price Update

Average retail gasoline prices in Florida have not moved in the past week, averaging \$3.77/g on Sunday. This compares with the national average that has increased 1.4 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.80/g.

Including the change in gas prices in Florida during the past week, prices yesterday were 17.2 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 25.1 cents per gallon higher than a month ago.

The national average has increased 20.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 12.9 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"With the conclusion of the summer driving season, we can expect gasoline prices to go on a diet," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan.

"Like all diet programs, you may not see immediate loss in the short term, but we'll likely see some loss in the longer term, say the next several weeks, as factors align in motorists favor-specifically as Isaac has exited without much ado, demand to see seasonal decline, and with cheaper to produce winter-spec higher RVP gasoline coming, there's light at the end of the tunnel," DeHaan said.

But Glades Central would get no closer on the scoreboard, as the Panthers (1-0) reeled off 15 straight points to close the game out.

Glades Central (0-1) did have an early lead on Dwyer, however. That was courtesy of a 22-yard field goal by sophomore Giovanni Lugo to give the Raiders a 3-2 lead heading into the second quarter.

Other than that – and a fourth-quarter interception caught by senior triple-threat Will Likely – there really were no more highlights for Glades Central.

"Overall, our team performance was bad," said Abrams, who went 15-for-29 passing with 218 yards, 1 TD and 1 INT. "We didn't do enough to win this game, plain and simple."

Down 15-9 in the fourth and coming off an end-zone pick caught by Likely, Glades Central's ensuing offensive possession ended rather quickly, as Abrams, who also lost a fumble in the game, threw an interception to Dwyer senior defensive back De'Andre Bozeman with 7:01 left.

Dwyer, up 23-9 at that point, would score once more less than two minutes later, thanks to a 38-yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Rob Nittolo to junior wide receiver Ezra Saffold (4 catches, 90 yards, 2 TD) with 3:59 left.

Glades Central's quest to win its seventh straight game against Dwyer was finished from there.

Game over.

"Hats off to them," Glades Central second year head coach Roosevelt Blackmon said of Dwyer, a team that scored its first ever win over the Raiders.

Glades Central's next game is a road match-up with Plantation, scheduled for Friday, Sept. 7 at 7 p.m.



Record Breaking Wet August

After a mixed-bag of rainfall for much of the summer, the month of August was characterized by periods of widespread heavy rainfall.

Most of the eastern metro region of South Florida received anywhere from 10 to 20 inches of rain, with another area of over 10 inches over western sections of Collier and Hendry counties.

Of the 31 sites that report daily rainfall over mainland South Florida, all but five reported monthly rainfall in excess of 10 inches. Two locations, Palm Beach Gardens and West Palm Beach, exceeded 20 inches for the month.

Tropical Storm Isaac was responsible for much of this rainfall, but heavy rain fell on several other days in August as South Florida was under a predominantly moist southerly wind flow resulting from lower atmospheric pressure over the eastern half of the United States.

According to the South Florida Water Management District, it was the 5th wettest August for the district since 1932 (Note: the district includes areas north and northeast of Lake Okeechobee not covered by NWS Miami).

In areas where summer rainfall was copious even before August, particularly over the east coast metro, year-to-date rainfall is on pace to break the all-time record for a calendar year.

These locations include Miami International Airport (68.48 inches as of 8/31), Miami Beach (48.34 inches) and The Redland (63.54 inches). West Palm Beach is on pace for their second-wettest year on record (61.47 inches).

Temperatures

The increased cloud cover and rainfall played a big role in keeping temperatures near to slightly below normal during August.

This is a continuation of the temperature patterns observed since the beginning of the rainy

season in May.

Outlook and Hazards

The long-range outlook by the Climate Prediction Center for the rest of September calls for equal chances of above, below or near normal precipitation and temperatures. Long-range models such as the CFS call for drier-than-normal conditions through September and extending into October.

This reflects the typically-high amount of uncertainty in long-range outlooks. Considering that September ranks as one of the wetter months of the year, this still means we'll see areas of locally heavy rain which is typical of the time of year.

September in South Florida means that tropical cyclones are a possibility. September ranks second behind October as the month in which South Florida has been directly hit by hurricanes, and is the month of greatest MAJOR hurricane strikes.

While South Florida did not experience major wind impacts from Isaac last month, the severe flooding experienced in some areas was a stark reminder that tropical cyclones bring more than one type of threat.

Make sure you are prepared for the peak of hurricane season by ensuring that personal and business hurricane plans are in place. Go to ready.gov for information and preparedness checklists.

September is also a prime month for rip currents. Always swim near a lifeguard and heed the advice of Ocean Rescue personnel. Pay attention to flags posted at lifeguard stands which alert of the potential rip current danger.



event, which will be held on September 14 at Port Mayaca Memorial Gardens just outside of Canal Point. The city of Pahokee, which maintains the site, and the East Stuart Historical Society will be announcing a grant awarded by the state of Florida for ground penetrating radar to be performed at the location.

While the technology certainly cannot pinpoint the number of bodies, it can attest to the magnitude of any burial, mass or minor, at the location. In the fevered rush to bury the bodies, there was little in the way of systematic record-keeping to account for all who perished, or even where they may have been buried.

"This will show if something happened there," said Mr. Ivester. "The state liked the idea, and we will determine once and for all if something happened here. We're excited, no matter what."

In the meantime, the remembrance event will continue. A tradition that celebrated major milestones, including the storm's 60th anniversary, and later it's 75th and 80th, has now become a yearly event. Amateur historians make the trek to the little spot in Port Mayaca each year to recall the events of that September day 84 years ago.

A wall of photos is displayed that shows the various scenes in the wake of the storm. Plans by the city and the historical society are to mount a permanent structure at the location. The public is invited to attend the event, which begins at 10 a.m. on September 14. Port Mayaca Memorial Gardens is located on Highway 76 in Port Mayaca.

by commending the graduates on their commitment and hard work. He said, "I am proud of the men who somehow found the strength to separate themselves from the general population and commit themselves to becoming drug free."

Another Way is a 60-day rehabilitation program that provides education on substance abuse, cravings, triggers, relapse prevention, and criminal and addictive thinking. PBSO introduced the program to the male inmates in September 2011 and made it available to the female population this past May. While the program is offered by PBSO, it is strictly voluntary.

One female graduate was chosen to address the other graduates and audience. She described the program as a gift filled with hope, accountability, and gratitude. Graduates were given the opportunity to convey their thoughts regarding the program; some joked while others spoke somberly.

One graduate who joked about completing the program said that society should be as happy as he is because now their possessions will be safe; another was as shocked that he completed the goal as the jail's SWAT team probably was.

The program was not easy for those who enrolled; many had to learn ways to cope with their emotional state in ways that shunned drug use. "Everybody told me to stop using drugs but I didn't know how," said one graduate.

Still another said, "I was bored, I got high; I

was mad, I got high; I was hurt, I got high. Now I know how to handle my emotions."

One inmate spoke of his journey spanning four states, 49 years, and a previous attempt to live drug free, only to end up in Belle Glade. "They call it 'Another Way' but I call it 'Another Chance' because they have given me another chance to be clean," he said.

Also, present at the graduation were three members who graduated the year before. They came to offer words of encouragement and advice to new graduates.

One man stressed the importance of remaining in contact with his support group; he said, "I have more numbers in my phone for support members than I ever did for drug dealers."

As Ronnie Campbell, program director, came to close the ceremony, it was obvious the love and respect the graduates had for him. They began cheering for him and chanting his name. He spoke to them with words of tough love.

"We want it our way; we can't have it our way. That's how you messed your lives up by doing it your way," he told them, encouraging them to stay on the right track.

Amid the jokes and the thanks came the evening's most poignant moment: One of the youngest graduates that day was a man who stared at his certificate, and wiped tears from his eyes as he spoke: "I am 18 years old. I should be graduating from my senior year not from drug rehab."
