## Pahokee Agrees on Marina Contract

Pahokee Commissioners came to an agreement on the contract for the city's tiki bar and restaurant portion of the marina at Tuesday night's commission meeting.

The request for proposal (RFP) had been awarded to Cruise America Associates, a locally based business. The contract will run from July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015. The one-year lease is intended to give the new operator an opportunity to prove to the city and residents that they are able to have a successful business in the area while allowing the city to prevent bad business deals that have occurred in the past.

In the contract, Robert Lambert,

the new operator, has agreed to replace the building's roof and purchase necessary equipment for the restaurant. Once the repairs are complete, Mr. Lambert will provide the city with a bill of sale on the equipment in exchange for a 61-percent reduction to the rent. According to the city attorney, this would bring the rent from \$2,600 per month to approximately \$1000 per month; Mr. Lambert would also be required to pay the city a \$10,000 deposit.

Mr. Lambert and the city would share use of the conference room and consult with each other to avoid scheduling conflicts. The city would

## Feeding Kids When School is Out

The Belle Glade Teen Center was one of two locations chosen to receive a delivery of hundreds of boxes of cereal to its location on SW 10th Street in Belle Glade on June 18.

The center received the donation on behalf of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Palm Beach County, who distributed the boxes of cereal to dozens of Glades area children that morning.

The donated cereal boxes were collected by Palm Beach Children's Hospital, who took part for the first time this year in the National Cereal Drive, which collected nearly two million servings of cereal this year for food banks, schools and other organizations across the country, accord-

ing to a press release issued by the Boys and Girls Clubs of Palm Beach County.

The National Cereal drive was started five years ago by the Professional Nurse Council at Children's Hospital of Michigan/Detroit Medical Center and helps provide free breakfasts for children during the summer months.

Palm Beach Children's Hospital, along with other community partners, raised over 1,000 boxes of cereal during the drive, according to the press release, and gave hundreds of boxes to the Boys and Girls Clubs to distribute at two sites in Palm Beach County.

## FCAT 2.0 Results Released for Glades-area Schools

*Editor's note: the results of FCAT 2.0 scores in Glades-area schools will be released in two parts. The first part contains the scores of the FCAT 2.0 Reading, Writing, Mathematics and Science for elementary schools and is reproduced below. The second part, which will run in the July 3 edition of The Sun, will contain the FCAT 2.0 Reading, Writing, Mathematics and Science scores for middle and high schools. The results of the 2014 FCAT 2.0 were released by the Florida Department of Education earlier this month, including the results by individual

schools in each Florida school district.

A score of 3.0 or higher on the FCAT 2.0 Reading, Mathematics and Science is considered a passing score, and a score of 3.5 or higher on the FCAT 2.0 Writing is considered a passing score.

### Pahokee Elementary School

A lower percentage of fifth grade students passed both the reading and math exams in 2014 compared to 2013, with 31 percent of fifth grade students passing the reading exam and 46 percent passing the math exam in 2014, compared to 37 percent passing the reading exam in 2013 and 53 percent passing the math exam.

Fifth grade students' scores on the FCAT 2.0 Science also decreased this year, with 29 percent of students pass-

ing, compared to 42 percent passing in 2013.

A larger percentage of Pahokee's fourth grade students passed the math exam in 2014 compared to 2013, while a smaller percentage of fourth graders passed the reading exam this year compared to last. In 2014, 31 percent earned a passing score on the math exam, compared to 29 percent in 2013, while 22 percent of students



# Inland Birding: Wood Stork

Wood Storks are known locally by many names, including Flinthead or Iron Head, because of the wrought-iron look of their featherless heads. Adult Wood Storks have a black face and a thick, down-curved, dusky, yellow bill. This long-legged, mostly white bird is the only stork that presently breeds in North America. On land, it appears all white, with blackish-gray legs and pink feet. When it flies with its outstretched neck, black can be seen on the trailing edge of the wings. Juvenile Wood Storks have duller feathers and are generally browner on the neck and have a paler bill than the adult. Wood Storks are usually silent, but make nasally, barking calls while in the nesting colony.

Their diet consists of fish and occasionally crayfish, amphibians, baby alligators or snakes. Wood Storks are tactile feeders who fish by touch. They slosh their bills around in the water or startle prey into their bill by stirring up the

water with their foot. When prey touches the bill, the Wood Stork snaps its mouth shut. This snap reflex is the fastest reflex measured in any vertebrate.

Wood Storks nest in colonies with up to 25 large, stick nests in one tree. Eggs are incubated by both parents in 27 to 32 days.

Chicks weigh about two ounces at birth and are unable to fly. Week-old chicks are fed by adults about 15 times per day. A colony is considered successful if at least 1.5 young fledge per nest.



### The Trinity: Thoughts for the 21st Century

There are certain paradoxes for those who require simple answers to life's questions. What happens inside of my computer to give me all of the material it can generate? How does my body heal itself when I am sick? Why should relationships range from friendship to enemies even if I am the same person to all I meet? Why do people love each other? The list can go on and on. I don't ever expect to know all of the answers; there is no person on the face of the earth that has all of the answers to everything. In faith, there are paradoxes, too. Religion has its mysteries and has had them from the beginning. For Christians, the idea that the Lord is both God and man is a mystery.

How God reveals Himself as a Trinity is another great mystery, too. I try to share it by using familiar examples: "Water, ice, steam" – three manifestations of the same matter, but basically

the same stuff. Saint Patrick used the shamrock to explain to the Irish people about the three-and-one nature of God. All means to explain are useful, none are perfect. But there are others who want things simpler. One scholar felt we don't need a "committee God." Others still deny there is more than one nature to God; monotheism has been around for a long time. Others believe that there was a prophet that lived a long time ago and did good things, but certainly wasn't God. I note from the earliest times our spiritual ancestors understood God as one

paradox, a mystery not to be understood, but to be accepted. More important for me is that I do not have to understand but accept.

When I accept, I can make use of and be thankful for all of the paradoxes in my life. I can use the computer, I can be thankful I am healed when I need to be, I can be thankful for friends and come to terms with those who are not friendly, I can accept that I am loved by others and never understand why. Now, I can also accept the idea that God, too, is a mystery and I can accept it.

This revelation helps me live in the world that God has created. As I read the news and see it on TV, I cannot help but wonder what goes on in the minds of those who do many of the crazy things that I see. Recently, the President

was disturbed about the rash of school shootings. More recently we hear about people going berserk on an aircraft in flight and being dangerous to passengers and crew, as well as to themselves. What is it that makes such people not stand others to a degree that they will endanger them and themselves?

Is it perhaps that they cannot accept some of the paradoxes of life, that others are different

and not to be understood, but to be respected in their right to have life and peace too? Is it perhaps that their world is full of fear of the unknown and it manifests itself by lashing out in destructive ways? People are different, they are not understood, I don't have all of the answers. If somehow I interpret their actions as "bullying" or hostile toward me, does that somehow give me the right to do damage? Rather, I have to come to terms with the things I don't understand. I accept the differences, avoid them if need be, and, yes, they cause me problems, but I know there are mysteries out there and I live accordingly. Maybe God is revealing His nature to us to say we will not fully understand, but we can appreciate, enjoy, tolerate, respect. No need to lose your bearings and go off the deep end. It works for the faithful, it can work for you too.



# Medical Marijuana Legislation Signed by Gov. Rick Scott

What Floridians need to know about senate bill 1030, "The Compassionate Medical Cannabis Act of 2014"

## FLORIDA MARIJUANA INFO

Florida has become the 22nd state in the nation (23rd to legalize, including Washington, D.C.) to pass legislation supporting the use of marijuana for medicinal purposes. Governor Rick Scott signed Senate Bill 1030 -- the "Charlotte's Web" bill -- on June 16, with overwhelming support from Florida citizens and the Florida legislature. The bill passed 111-7 in the House and 30-9 in the Senate.

"This is definitely a major step in furthering medical marijuana usage in our state," said David Cohn, editor-in-chief of FloridaMarijuanaInfo.org. "But it's important our citizens clearly understand what this bill means to people suffering from debilitating diseases, and the pros and the cons associated with it."

## About SB 1030

In its most simple form, SB1030 decriminalizes medical professionals' recommendations and patients' use of a particular strain of a low-THC cannabis for specific medicinal purposes. It means a doctor can 'order' the usage of a certain strain of cannabis for treatment of specific ailments as outlined in the bill. These ailments include cancer, Parkinson's disease, multiple

sclerosis, other physical medical conditions that chronically produce symptoms of seizures or severe and persistent muscle spasms, and its original intended purpose -- pediatric epilepsy. (The strain was named 'Charlotte's Web' after Charlotte Figi, a five year old who experienced a

reduction of seizures after taking the drug.)

The physicians must be appropriately licensed and patients must be Florida residents. The physician must add the patient to the newly formed "compassionate use registry."

It allows for five companies to be licensed

to cultivate, process and dispense the approved strain in an oil format. These companies would be based in four corners of the state, and one in the center of the state.

It does not allow a smokable form of marijuana; only the oil form is included in the legislation.

"We are following this story intensely," said Cohn, "and we have outlined some items we believe the public should be aware of. As we get closer to the November 2 ballot initiative, we will be commenting on how the legalization of marijuana for medical use will impact the state of Florida, including Florida's economy, health-care system, the travel industry, etc."



## 'Drain and Cover'

**FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH**

The Florida Department of Health in Hendry and Glades Counties would like to remind residents and visitors that it is important to "Drain and Cover" this National Mosquito Control Awareness Week. Please take simple precautions to protect from mosquito-borne illnesses which have received increased attention recently in Florida. "One way folks can help to prevent mosquito-borne illnesses is to follow the "Drain and Cover" method," said Pat Dobbins, Administrator/Health Officer for the Florida Department of Health in Hendry and Glades Counties.

DRAIN standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying. Drain water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flower pots or any other containers where sprinkler or rain water has collected. Discard old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that

aren't being used. Empty and clean birdbaths and pets' water bowls at least once or twice a week. Protect boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water. Maintain swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic swimming pools when not in use. COVER skin with clothing or repellent. Clothing: Wear shoes, socks, and long pants and long-sleeves. This type of protection may be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present. Repellent: Apply mosquito repellent to bare skin and clothing. Always use repellents according to the label. Repellents with DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, and IR3535 are effective. Use mosquito netting to protect children younger than two months old. COVER doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out of your house. Repair broken screening on windows, doors, porches, and patios.

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# Clinics Mark 1st Year of Providing Quality Care

## THE HEALTH CARE DISTRICT OF PBC

This month the C. L. Brumback Primary Care Clinics, which are operated by the Health Care District of Palm Beach County as Federally Qualified Health Centers, are marking their first year of providing quality medical care to adults and children.

Since June of 2013, the four clinics located at the current Florida Health Palm Beach County (formerly Palm Beach County Health Department) health centers in Belle Glade, Lantana, West Palm Beach and Delray Beach have logged more than 52,000 total patient visits.

"It's rewarding to see residents of all ages from across the county make the Brumback Clinics their medical home," said Ronald J. Wiewora, MD, MPH, FACP, FACPM, the Health Care District's Chief Executive Officer and Chief Medical Officer. "Our goal is to provide patients access to primary health care services that keep them healthy."

All four clinics are open Monday through Friday and serve all patients regardless of their ability to pay or whether or not they have insurance. Clinic services for adults and children are provided by highly-trained, qualified and professional medical staff who are Board-certified in the primary care specialties of Family Practice, General Practice, Pediatrics and Mental Health Services. While the four clinics accept patients who walk in, the clinics recommend that patients make an appointment by calling 561-642-1000.

Adult services include: yearly physicals, medical evaluations and disease management, laboratory services, diabetes and hypertension screenings, mammogram and specialty care referrals, mental health counseling, adult im-

munications, employment, school and housing physicals, financial counseling and social services referrals.

Pediatric services include: well child visits, sick child visits, school and sports physicals, childhood immunizations, hearing and vision testing, mental health counseling and laboratory services.

All patients at the Brumback Clinics have online access to pharmacy services and discounted prescription medication through the Federal 340B program.

During the past year, more than 1,800 uninsured patients had access to discounted prescriptions that they could not otherwise afford.

To improve accessibility for residents in the Glades community, on July 14th, 2014 the Belle Glade clinic is scheduled to relocate from the county building at 38754 State Road 80 to a convenient new location in downtown Belle Glade at 941 SE 1st Street.

This year the Brumback Clinics also launched a new website, [www.BrumbackClinics.org](http://www.BrumbackClinics.org), which allows visitors to easily find information about the clinics, including addresses, hours of operation, maps and directions, and Palm Tran routes. Patients can visit the new website prior to their visit and download a registration form to complete and bring with them to their appointment.

"One of our successes this year was expanding our hours of operation to provide services in the evenings one day a week at three of our clinics," said Christopher F. Irizarry, MPA, FQHC Executive Director. "Looking forward, we are evaluating additional opportunities for enhancing services in the community."

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER PBC System 11

### TESTS SHOWED THE PRESENCE OF COLIFORM BACTERIA

Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this incident was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do and what we did to correct this situation.

System 11 routinely monitors for the presence of drinking water contaminants. During April 2014, we took a total of 70 distribution samples to test for the presence of coliform bacteria. 17.1 percent of these samples tested positive for coliform bacteria. During May 2014, we took a total of 57 distribution samples to test for the presence of coliform bacteria. 10.5 percent of these samples tested positive for coliform bacteria. During June 2014, we took a total of 61 distribution samples to test for the presence of coliform bacteria. 14.8 percent of these samples tested positive for coliform bacteria.

The standard is that no more than 5 percent of our samples may test positive.

#### What should I do?

You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

If you have a severely compromised immune system, have an infant, are pregnant, or are elderly, you may be at increased risk and should seek advice from your health care providers about drinking this water. General guidelines on ways to lessen the risk of infection by microbes are available from EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

#### What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified within 24 hours. Total coliform bacteria are generally not harmful themselves.

**Coliforms are bacteria which are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially-harmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.**

Usually, coliforms are a sign that there could be a problem with our treatment or distribution system (pipes). Whenever we detect coliform bacteria in any sample, we do follow-up testing to see if other bacteria of greater concern, such as fecal coliform or E. coli, are present. We did not find any of these bacteria in our subsequent testing. If we had, we would have notified you immediately.

#### What happened? What was done?

**System lines were flushed, proper sampling taps were installed and samples were collected and tested. Further testing shows that this problem has been resolved.**

earned a passing score on the reading exam, compared to 29 percent in 2013.

Fourth graders also took the FCAT 2.0 Writing, which saw 59 percent of students earning a passing score this year, compared to 64 percent last year.

Third grade students had a higher percentage of students passing both the reading and math exams in 2014 compared to 2013. This year, 39 percent of third grade students passed the reading exam, compared to merely 20 percent last year. The biggest gain, however, was on the math exam: 61 percent of third grade students earned a passing score on the math exam this year, compared to only 20 percent last year.

## Glades Academy Elementary School

Sixth grade students had an amazing 100 percent passing on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics this year and the percentage of fifth grade students passing the math exam this year increased to 82 percent passing in 2014, compared to 59 percent in 2013. Fourth graders also increased their scores, on average, this year, with 94 percent passing the math exam in 2014, compared to 54 percent in 2013. Third graders scored higher this year compared to last, as well, with 31 percent earning a passing score on the math exam, compared to 26 percent passing in 2013.

Some students at Glades Academy saw a slight decrease in scores on the reading exam, however, with 25 percent of fourth graders earning a passing score this year, compared to 54 percent in 2013 and 25 percent of third graders earned a passing score in 2014, compared to 26 percent in 2013. Zero percent of sixth grade students earned a passing score on the reading exam in 2014. Only the fifth grade students saw an increase in the percentage passing on the reading exam, and that gain was considerable: 76 percent of fifth graders earned a passing score on the reading exam this year, compared to only 35 percent in 2013.

On the FCAT 2.0 Writing, zero percent of fourth grade students at Glades Academy earned a passing score this year, compared to seven percent in 2013; and fifth graders saw the same percent of students passing the FCAT 2.0 Science in 2014 and 2013. Both years, six percent of fifth grade students earned a passing grade of 3.0 or higher on the science exam.

## Lakeside Academy

Lakeside's sixth grade students scored significantly higher on the FCAT 2.0 Reading this year compared to last, with 88 percent earning a passing score in 2014 and 29 percent passing in 2013. Third graders' reading scores were also higher this year, with 36 percent passing in 2014 and only six percent passing in 2013. Only 21 percent of fifth graders passed the reading test in 2014, compared to 53 percent in 2013; and 20 percent of fourth graders passed the reading exam this year, compared to 13 percent in 2013.

Lakeside saw increases in student performance on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics this year: 88 percent of sixth grade students passed in 2014, compared to merely 14 percent in 2013; 79 percent of fifth grade students passed in 2014, compared to 65 percent in 2013; and 14 percent of third grade students passed the math exam in 2014, compared to six percent in 2013. Only the fourth grade saw a drop in math scores this year compared to last, with 10 percent of students passing in 2014, compared to 13 percent in 2013. Those fourth graders, however, increased their scores, on average, this year on the FCAT 2.0 Writing, with 10 percent passing in 2014, compared to seven percent in 2013.

The percentage of fifth graders passing the

FCAT 2.0 Science decreased from 2014 to 2013, with zero percent of students passing in 2014, compared to 18 percent in 2013.

## Gove Elementary School

On the FCAT 2.0 Reading, sixth graders scored lower in 2014 compared to students in 2013, with 48 percent passing this year, compared to 54 percent last year; 36 percent of fifth graders earned a passing score on the reading exam this year, compared to 47 percent in 2013; 34 percent of third graders passed the reading exam this year, compared to 38 percent last year; whereas 44 percent of fourth graders passed the reading exam this year, compared to only 38 percent last year.

On the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics, 66 percent of sixth graders passed this year, compared to 55 percent last year; 60 percent of fourth graders earned a passing score this year, compared to merely 38 percent last year; and 51 percent of third graders earned a passing score in 2014, compared to 38 percent in 2013. However, fifth grade students saw a decrease in the percentage of students passing this year, with only 40 percent of students earning a passing score on the math exam in 2014, compared to 47 percent passing in 2013.

On the FCAT 2.0 Science, only 31 percent of fifth grade students earned a passing score in 2014, compared to 52 percent in 2013. On the FCAT 2.0 Writing, fourth graders saw a slight increase in the percentage passing in 2014, with 61 percent passing this year, compared to 60 percent in 2013.

## K. E. C./Canal Point Elementary School

The percentage of fourth and third grade students passing the FCAT 2.0 Reading increased from 2013 to 2014, with 32 percent of fourth graders and 38 percent of third graders passing the reading exam this year, compared to 20 percent of fourth graders and 19 percent of third graders passing in 2013. Fifth grade students, on the other hand, saw a decrease in the percentage passing in 2014, with 24 percent passing this year compared to 32 percent passing in 2013.

Fourth and third grade students also saw increases in the percentage passing on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics, with 39 percent of fourth graders passing and 56 percent of third graders passing in 2014, compared to 20 percent of fourth graders and 19 percent of third graders passing in 2013.

Fifth grade students scored slightly lower this year on the math exam, with 37 percent passing the math exam in 2014 and 38 percent passing in 2013.

K.E.C.'s fourth graders increased their scores this year on the FCAT 2.0 Writing, with 59 percent of students passing with a 3.5 or higher in 2014, compared to 46 percent in 2013. Fifth graders saw a drop in the percent passing on the FCAT 2.0 Science this year, with 27 percent passing in

2014, compared to 35 percent passing in 2013.

## Belle Glade Elementary School

Belle Glade Elementary School fifth graders saw a decrease in the number of students passing the FCAT 2.0 Reading this year, with only 27 percent passing in 2014, compared to 41 percent passing in 2013; fourth graders saw no change in the number of students passing the reading exam this year compared to last, with 24 percent passing both in 2014 and 2013; third grade students, on the other hand, saw their number increase, with 37 percent of students passing in 2014, compared to only 23 percent in 2013.

As for the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics, fifth, fourth and third grade students saw an increase in the number of students passing this year. In fifth grade, 30 percent of students earned a passing score on the exam, compared to 29 percent in 2013; 32 percent of fourth graders earned a passing score in 2014, compared to 24 percent in 2013; and 38 percent of third graders earned a passing score in 2014, compared to 23 percent in 2013.

Fifth grade students' scores dropped 11 points on the FCAT 2.0 Science this year, falling from a 38 percent passing in 2013 to 27 percent passing in 2014. Fourth grade students gained one percent from 2013 to 2014 on the FCAT 2.0 Writing, climbing from 39 percent passing in 2013 to 40 percent passing in 2014.

## Glade View Elementary School

Fifth grade students' scores decreased from 33 percent of students earning a passing grade of 3.0 or higher on the FCAT 2.0 Reading in 2013 to 28 percent passing in 2014. Fourth grade students' scores also decreased on the reading exam this year, with only 29 percent passing in 2014 compared to 49 percent passing in 2013. Third grade students scored slightly higher this year on the reading exam compared to last, with 14 percent of students earning a passing grade in 2014, compared to eight percent passing in 2013.

Fifth grade students' scores decreased slightly on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics, as well, falling from 31 percent passing in 2013 to only 23 percent in 2014. Fourth grade students scored significantly lower on the mathematics exam this year, with only 12 percent of students passing in 2014, compared to 49 percent in 2013. Third grade students, on the other hand, scored significantly higher this year than last, with 36 percent of students passing in 2014, compared to only eight percent in 2013.

Fourth grade students scored lower on the FCAT 2.0 Writing this year, with 58 percent of students passing in 2014, compared to 71 percent of students passing in 2013, while fifth grade students scored nine points higher on the FCAT 2.0 Science this year compared to last: in 2014, 40 percent earned a passing grade, compared to 31 percent passing in 2013.

On the FCAT 2.0 Reading, fifth, fourth and third grade students scored lower this year compared to last year.

This year, 31 percent of fifth grade students earned a passing score, compared to 40 percent in 2013; 40 percent of fourth grade students earned a passing score this year, compared to 45 percent in 2013; and only 32 percent of third grade students earned a passing score in 2014, compared to 51 percent in 2013.

Fifth and fourth grade students scored higher, on average, on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics in 2014 than in 2013. This year, 47 percent of fifth grade students earned a passing score of 3.0 or higher, compared to 30 percent in 2013; and 67 percent of fourth grade students earned a passing score, compared to 45 percent in 2013. Contrastingly, third grade students' scores were lower this year compared to last, with 39 percent of students passing in 2014 and 51 percent passing in 2013.

Fifth and fourth grade students also scored higher on the FCAT 2.0 Science and Writing exams in 2014 compared to 2013.

This year, 25 percent of fifth grade students earned a passing score on the science exam, compared to 20 percent in 2013, while 62 percent of fourth grade students earned a passing score on the writing exam this year, compared to 56 percent in 2013.

## Pioneer Park Elementary School

Fifth and third grade students scored lower this year on the FCAT 2.0 Reading compared to last, with 19 percent of fifth graders earning a passing score in 2014, compared to 28 percent in 2013, and 10 percent of third graders earning a passing score this year, compared to 22 percent passing in 2013.

Fourth grade students, on the other hand, scored higher this year on the reading exam than last, with 36 percent of students earning a passing score in 2014, compared to only 25 percent in 2013.

Fifth grade students also scored lower on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics in 2014 compared to 2013, with only 16 percent of students passing this year, compared to 30 percent passing in 2013.

Fourth and third grade students, however, earned higher scores on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics in 2014 compared to students in 2013. This year, 29 percent of fourth graders earned a passing score, compared to 25 percent in 2013, and 40 percent of third grade students earned a passing score in 2014, compared to only 22 percent passing in 2013.

Fifth grade students earned lower scores, on average, this year on the FCAT 2.0 Science, compared to students in 2013. This year, only 17 percent of fifth grade students earned a passing grade on the science exam, compared to 32 percent passing in 2013. Fourth graders, however, scored higher on the FCAT 2.0 Writing this year compared to last, with 64 percent earning a passing score in 2014, compared to 43 percent passing in 2013.

## Belle Glade Excel Charter School

On the FCAT 2.0 Reading exam, six percent of third grade students at Belle Glade Excel Charter School earned a passing score of 3.0 or higher in 2014, while zero percent of third grade students earned a passing score on the FCAT 2.0 Mathematics. There is not date available for the 2013 FCAT 2.0.

be responsible for the maintenance of the campground and pier bathrooms leaving Mr. Lambert responsible for the bathrooms in the pool area.

According to the contract, all liquor sales would be made through the restaurant. Private events using the conference room would need to first consult with the restaurant to provide food for their event; should the restaurant not be able to accommodate the menu selection, Mr. Lambert may choose to allow food from other sources. The city would be exempt and permitted to use outside food sources as they choose and would be allowed seven, city sponsored events per year.

Commissioner Keith Babb asked Derrek Moore, the city manager, if he felt the contract was fair. "While we're not completely satisfied with the agreement, we are pleased with the outcome," he replied.

Mayor Colin Walkes expressed his excitement for the beginning of the new adventure for the city. "We're looking to make this work," he said.

Vice Mayor Diane Walker offered her sentiments to Mr. Lambert. "I want to welcome you and appreciate that you are choosing to do business with our community," she said.

## Water Report

Robert Nelton, representative for the Palm Beach County Water Utilities (PBCWU), explained the current condition of water samples taken in Pahokee. The presentation was an effort to clear the air of some misinformation that has been circulating via social media and the town.

He explained that water samples taken in Pahokee tested positive for Coliform bacteria, but subsequent samples tested negative; he also stated that none of the samples taken tested positive for e-coli or fecal coliforms.

Mr. Nelton stated that the health department requires that any positive test results over five percent must be reported, but the number that was positive was actually five samples out of a total of 61 samples.

He said that PBCWU is currently looking into finding other testing sites because the current sites inherited from Glades Utility Authority (GUA) are allegedly easily contaminated. Samples tested positive from the same sampling locations in two months.

## Attorney's Report

Gary Brandenburg, the city's attorney, reported that he will file a lawsuit against the owners of the old hospital property. He explained that he and Mr. Moore have made multiple attempts to get the owner to properly maintain the property. He further explained that the owner did not appear at a special magistrate hearing regarding the property's condition. Once the lawsuit is settled, the city plans to take possession of the property and have the building demolished.

## Announcements

In his report, Mayor Walkes reminded residents to limit the number of areas with standing water and keep grass cut in efforts to control the mosquito population.

In the city manager's report, Mr. Moore announced that the July Fourth fireworks will be held and are sponsored by the Howard E. Hill Foundation. He stated that vendors will also be on-site earlier before the event.

Senator Joe Abruzzo rescheduled his visit to the Pahokee commission meeting for July 8, 2014 at 7 p.m.


To avoid being scammed when preparing for a storm or dealing with its aftermath, follow these tips: Ask to see Florida Building Commiss-

sion product approval numbers on storm-proof products for your home and visit [www.floridabuilding.com](http://www.floridabuilding.com) to verify products, check permits for installation of products, report any fraudulent claims on unapproved products, and follow-up with your insurance provider on discounts for hurricane or wind mitigation. Watch-out for price gouging. It is unlawful to raise hotel rental rates or housing leasing rates during a state of emergency. Essential commodities such as lumber, ice, water, generators, and shelter are also protected under the Price Gouging Law. If you suspect price gouging, save receipts and call 1-866-9-NO-SCAM. Never pay for services up front.

After the storm, beware of unsolicited workers, have evaluations of damages prepared by your insurance company, obtain multiple estimates and bids on repairs, research companies, check for proof of insurance and verify bonding agencies, and read entire contracts. Ask for references and verify business licenses for anyone who may be performing storm-related work on your property.

# Always Tired? You May Have Sleep Apnea

Snoring may be more than just an annoying habit – you may have obstructive sleep apnea (OSA), a sleep disorder that, left untreated, can take its toll on the body and mind. With sleep apnea, your breathing pauses multiple times during sleep.

The pauses can last from a few seconds to minutes and can occur more than five times per hour, to as high as 100 times per hour. (Fewer than five times per hour is normal). Sometimes, when you start breathing again, you make a loud snort or choking sound. Sleep is momentarily interrupted when this occurs.

Untreated OSA has been linked to high blood pressure, heart attacks, strokes, car accidents, work-related accidents and depression. According to the American Sleep Association, OSA affects more than 12 million Americans.

Sleep apnea is almost twice as common in men as it is in women. Other risk factors include: being overweight, as extra fat tissue around the neck makes it harder to keep the airway open; being over age 40; smoking; having a family history of sleep apnea; and having a nasal obstruction due to a deviated septum, allergies or sinus problem.

Children also get sleep apnea, most commonly between ages three and six. The most common cause is enlarged tonsils and adenoids in the upper airway.

There are no drugs that are approved by the FDA to treat sleep apnea and there are a number of drugs that can actually make sleep apnea worse, including many for insomnia, anxiety or

severe pain.

**Chronic Disease - Insufficient sleep** has been linked to the development and management of a number of chronic diseases and conditions, including diabetes, cardiovascular disease, obesity and depression.

**Diabetes** - Research has found that insufficient sleep is linked to an increased risk for the development of Type 2 diabetes. Recent research suggests that optimizing sleep duration and quality may be an important means of improving blood sugar control in persons with Type 2 diabetes.

**Cardiovascular Disease** - Persons with sleep apnea have been found to be at an increased risk for a number of cardiovascular diseases.

Notably, hypertension, stroke, coronary heart disease and irregular heartbeats (cardiac arrhythmias) have been found to be more common among those with disordered sleep than their peers without sleep abnormalities.

Likewise, sleep apnea and hardening of the arteries (atherosclerosis) appear to share some common physiological characteristics, further suggesting that

sleep apnea may be an important predictor of cardiovascular disease.

**Obesity** - Laboratory research has found that short sleep duration results in metabolic changes that may be linked to obesity.

Epidemiologic studies conducted in the community have also revealed an association between short sleep duration and excess body weight.

This association has been reported in all age groups, but has been particularly pronounced in children. It is believed that sleep in childhood and adolescence is particularly important for brain development and that insufficient sleep in youngsters may adversely affect the function of a region of the brain known as the hypothalamus, which regulates appetite and the expenditure of energy.

**Depression** - The relationship between sleep and depression is complex. While sleep disturbance has long been held to be an important symptom of depression, recent research has indicated that depressive symptoms may decrease once sleep apnea has been effectively treated and sufficient sleep is restored.

The interrelatedness of sleep and depression suggests it is important that the sleep sufficiency of persons with depression be assessed and that symptoms of depression be monitored among persons with a sleep disorder.

As interruption of regular breathing or obstruction of the airway during sleep can pose serious health complications, symptoms of sleep apnea should be taken seriously. Treatment should be sought from a health care provider.




