

### PAINT & RICHARD'S FLOORING

ASK THE EXPERT

I have severe squeaks under the linoleum in both the bathroom and kitchen (with wood subfloor beneath). I have an unfinished basement with clear access to the joist and subfloor. I've been told to drill up through the joist to the subfloor, but won't this make a dent in the linoleum above? Should glue be applied between the joist and subflooring before driving the screw? I need step-by-step instructions on how to go about doing this. Can anyone help?

Yes, you have been told correctly, that you can stop the squeak by drilling up through the joist into the subfloor. BUT as you suspected, you need to be VERY careful both with screw length selection and how deep you drive the screw so that you DON'T go too far up and come through the subfloor into the linoleum. So before you start, make sure you know how thick the subfloor and underlayment is. Better to be too short a few times than too long even once.

Another hint: When you are doing this, place the largest heaviest weight on the floor above where you are drilling/screwing. Then you will be fastening the floor down and not trying to pull it down with the screw.

And more... Be sure to predrill the hole in the joist so the screw does not thread into the joist, only the subfloor. That way the screw will pull and hold the floor down tight.





dogs competed in multiple events including a costume contest and a best nose competition.

The best costume went to the "Fluttering Five" which consisted of Butch, Spike, Roo, Emily and Mary Francis. The pack were dressed from bumblebees to butterflies to fairies. The runner-pups were Oscar, Callie and Georgia, in their Wiener Mobile.

When race time came, the dachshunds and dachshund mixes were able to compete in the charity races including Disabled Doxies, Pets for Patriots, race Rescue, Race for PKD Cure and a mixed dachshund race with proceeds supporting NFAR. The National Dachshund Circuit Races started amidst the stormy skies, but that didn't stop the excitement under the pavilion. The 20 foot track hosted events for the puppies and then for the senior dogs ages nine and up. There was a tie for the pups, since both puppies stopped outside the gate. The competition got more exciting with the senior heats.

Ollie, who owns his human Sherri Hingson of Lake City, dominated the competition. Ollie is now eligible to run in the Champion of Champions Race in Findlay, Ohio. That course is 35 feet long.

### HOW IT ALL HAPPENED

NFAR and the Anthea Duron Pet Adoption Center funds were solely provided by Anthea Duron, formerly of Lake City. Duron passed away on Dec. 3, 2011.

Duron was quoted on the NFAR web site that she wants people to get involved in rescuing animals and that it was the one reason she existed.

"We all have a love for the animals. It was just something Anthea and I could relate to, it opened up the way," founder and Director of Operations Jerry

Garrett said. "It's just a dream that has come true for her and for me. Her legacy will live on forever here."

NFAR and Anthea Duron Pet Adoption Center off CR 137 is a "no-kill" shelter, and has an outpatient animal healthcare center, outpatient surgery center, pet grooming center and offers low cost vaccinations. The facility went from two small storage units working as an administrative and adoption office and a medical facility to two full size buildings on 108 acres.

NFAR has been doing animal adoptions since April

2011, and because the facilities were much smaller they relied on the help of volunteers within the area to take care of the animals up for adoption.

"We have been very fortunate ever since inception because our fosters have been very good to us,"

Taylor said.

to house up to 50 cats and 50 dogs.

According to Taylor, NFAR is a limited admission rescue, which means they choose the animals that come into the facility. She said the majority of adoptable animals come from animal controls or other rescues unable to accept animals due to space.

Taylor said they will rescue any age animal from animal control. Once animals arrive they are in quarantine for five to seven days, given a full health check and medical attention if necessary. The animals are not adopted out until they have a clean bill of health. Taylor said that a lot of the animals that arrive at the rescue are heart worm positive.

Garrett said that NFAR has a 70 percent adoption rate, which is about 20 percent higher than other pet adoption facilities. He said that people interested in adopting animals need to bring in photo identification and veterinarian information, if there are already pets living in the home. The potential new owners also get a background check done to verify there have been no past animal issues.

Garrett said the background check is also "to make sure they go to a respectable home."

NFAR is open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. For more information on NFAR and the Anthea Duron Pet Adoption Center and the services they offer, please visit NorthFloridaAnimalRescue.org or call 386-963-1295. NFAR is located between CR 252 and 247, at 16800 CR 137 in Wellborn.

Right now, there isn't enough known about the circumstances surrounding the fatal shooting of 17-year-old Trayvon Martin, a black, by George Zimmerman, a 28-year-old part-Hispanic, during his neighborhood watch tour in an Orlando, Fla., suburb. If evidence emerges that Zimmerman's actions were not justified, he should be prosecuted and punished; however, there's a larger issue that few people understand or have the courage to acknowledge, namely that black and young has become synonymous with crime and, hence, suspicion. To make that connection does not make one a racist. Let's look at it.

Twelve years ago, a black Washington, D.C., commissioner warned cabbies, most of whom were black, against picking up dangerous-looking passengers. She described "dangerous-looking" as a "young black guy ... with shirtpants hanging down longer than his coat, baggy pants, unlaced tennis shoes." She also warned cabbies to stay away from low-income black neighborhoods. Did that make the D.C. commissioner a racist?

In some cities, such as St. Louis, black pizza deliverers have complained about having to deliver pizzas to certain black neighborhoods, including neighborhoods in which they live. Are they racists? The Rev. Jesse Jackson once remarked, "There is nothing more painful for me at this stage in my life than to walk down the street and hear footsteps and start thinking about robbery -- (and) then look around and see somebody white and feel relieved." Does that make the reverend a racist?

The former Charleston, S.C., black chief of police, Reuben Greenberg, said the problem facing black America is not racial profiling. He said, "The greatest problem in the black community is the tolerance for high levels of criminality." Former Los Angeles black police Chief Bernard Parks, defending racial profiling, said: "It's not the fault of the police when they stop minority males or put them in jail. It's the fault of the minority males for committing the crime. In my mind, it is not a great revelation that if officers are looking for criminal activity, they're going to look at the kind of people who are listed on crime reports." Are former police Chiefs Greenberg and Parks racist?

According to the Uniform Crime Report for 2009, among people 18 or younger, blacks were charged with 58 percent of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, 67 percent of robberies, 42 percent of aggravated assaults and 43 percent of auto thefts. As for murder, more than 90 percent of the time, their victims were black. These statistics, showing a strong interconnection among race, youth and crime, are a far better explanation for racial profiling and suspicion than simple racism.

Black Americans have spoken out against racial profiling by police. They've been insulted by store personnel who might give them extra scrutiny. There's the insult of the sound of a car door being locked when a black approaches. It's insulting to have taxi drivers pass up a black person and pick up white people down the street. In a similar vein, I'm sure that a law-abiding Muslim is insulted when given extra scrutiny at airports or listening to Fox News reporter Juan Williams, who was fired by National Public Radio in 2010 for publicly saying that he gets nervous when he sees people on a plane with clothing that identifies them as Muslim. Blacks and Muslims who face the insults of being profiled might direct their anger toward those who've made blacks and crime synonymous and terrorism and Muslims synonymous.

God would never racially profile, because he knows everything, including who is a criminal or terrorist. We humans are not gods; therefore, we must often base our decisions on guesses and hunches. It turns out that easily observed physical characteristics, such as race, are highly interconnected with other characteristics less easily observed.

For most blacks to own up to the high crime rate among blacks is a source of considerable discomfort. Beyond that, it creates suspicions and resentment, which are destructive of good race relations, and it's devastating to the black community, which is its primary victim.

## “Project Christmas” workshop scheduled for March 29

only referred to negotiations with a company that

has shown interest in coming to Suwannee County as “Project Christmas.”

“The workshop will be a

great opportunity to inform everyone of the impact that “Project Christmas” should have on the community,

along with numbers and data,” BOCC Chairman Wesley Wainwright stated.

According to Cason, the Suwannee County Economic Alliance Business Recruitment Team, along with the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Enterprise Florida, Inc. and the North Florida Economic Development Partnership has worked with “Project Christmas” for over a year and meetings with company personnel are ongoing.

“This is a large, targeted industry company that is interested in expanding and would employ 350 people at its new location,” Cason explained. “The company pays an average annual wage of \$30,000 plus benefits.”

Cason emphasized that

since being selected, much work has been done in preparation to make our catalyst site marketable to a company in the target industries of logistics and distribution, building component design and manufacturing and biofuels and renewable energy.

According to Cason, both federal and state grants have been used for planning infrastructure at the site.

Many hours have gone into making preliminary decisions on water, wastewater, natural gas, and other utilities as well as rail access for the site, Cason added.

Included in the presentation will be information about financial incentives that can be received from state and federal agencies

as well as local incentives,” Cason said. “This is an important meeting and all who are interested in the local economy are invited to attend.”

According to Cason, further details will be presented on the economic impact that this project could have on Suwannee County and North Florida during the March 29 workshop.

The Suwannee County Catalyst Site was chosen in 2007, as one of four such sites in Florida’s three Rural Areas of Critical Economic Concern (RACEC).

The Rural Economic Development Catalyst Project, led by Enterprise Florida in partnership with numerous state, regional and local organizations, is focused on targeting tomorrow’s most promising industries with the goal of creating high value-added jobs, capital investment and an economic benefit that will ripple throughout each RACEC, Cason explained.

The existing 100 acres of the catalyst site was approved for purchase by the BOCC for \$499,500 in Aug., 2009. Seventy-five percent of what’s been termed the Catalyst Project will be funded through state grants. The rest will come from partnering counties and private investors. Participating counties in our region include Baker, Bradford, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Jefferson, Lafayette, Levy, Madison, Putnam, Taylor and Union.

## Liquor licensing moves forward

According to Poreda, the applicant failed to respond to the deficiencies in the application and was disapproved on March 16. Poreda added that the disapproved applicants will be allowed 21 days to request a hearing. If no such request is received, the DBPR will be able to set an official date for the drawing.

“If an applicant does request a hearing, we have to wait until a final decision is rendered by the Department’s hearing officer, a Division of Administrative Hearings judge or circuit judge, before setting a date for the drawing,” Poreda added.

Once the drawing is held, the DBPR will notify the winners by certified mail and advise them of

their right to apply for the license, Poreda explained.

An application for the issuance must then be submitted and the person(s) must qualify before the license is issued. If the license is denied, the next person or entity in the line of eligibility is notified that they have been awarded the right to apply for a license. This process will continue until all licenses for the county have been issued.

“Upon application approval, a one-time fee of \$10,750 and the annual license fee are due,” Poreda stated.

According to Poreda, the annual license fee is based on the county in which the license is issued and whether the licensee wishes to sell packaged products only or for consumption on the premises.



# Healthy Living: Gardening for exercise

You expected to be sad in the fall. Part of you dies each year when leaves fell from their branches, were bare against the wind and cold, wintry light. But you knew there would always be the spring, as you knew the river would flow again after it was frozen." I can imagine Ernest Hemingway as he wrote these words, feet propped up in his fishing boat floating along the Florida Keys. He truly captured the spirit of spring. After the death of what was, spring literally and figuratively represents life anew.

Each day I wait in eager anticipation as the green buds of my banana trees peak out from inside their weathered tops whispering a small prayer they'll not be killed by a late freeze. Nothing is more soothing to the soul than getting lost in our flower beds, hands in the earth.

As each of us head to the hardware store for our supplies and seeds we should also give thought to preparing our bodies for our tending and gardening. Gardening provides us

with all types of exercise, strength, endurance and flexibility. With time as the number one perceived reason for not exercising, it only makes sense we kill two birds with one stone. Try looking at your gardening like a structured exercise routine.

Begin by stretching, and making sure your muscles are warm. Your gardening warm up doesn't have to consist of traditional warm-ups.

As you walk around to survey where to begin your projects walk briskly. Complete several stretches and hold around 15 seconds for two sets focusing on each major muscle group. Be creative but keep good form.

While gardening, alternate lighter work with heavier work, and change activity that emphasizes different muscles groups. For example, alternate digging with raking; lifting with watering, and so on. Be sure to practice deep breathing techniques, use exaggerated movements to increase range of motion around each joint: when raking make wide strokes mixed with small ones. Be sure to alternate right side

and left side movements during activities such as raking, digging, and so on. When lifting pay careful attention to posture: your feet are at least shoulder width apart, back is straight, core is tight, and chest is out. Finally, get the kids involved. They can appreciate not only the exercise, but learning to love and cherish the earth as well.

Remember not to over do it. Really 30-60 minutes would cut it; but if you are like me, you'll keep going until you finish. For longer duration "exer-gardening" be sure to take plenty of breaks, go inside cool off, re-hydrate, and support yourself with nutrient dense fresh foods.

Health benefits of gardening are as bountiful as the first harvest. Improvements in memory, concentration, sight, mood, blood pressure, anxiety and stress reduction among others have been experienced. Certainly tend your gardens with purpose, but even more importantly savor every blessed moment. As old Hemingway once said, "It is good to have an end to journey toward; but it is the journey that matters, in the end."

## Four license-free fishing days start April 7

Grab your fishing rods and tackle box. It's almost time – April 7 – to take advantage of the first of four license-free fishing days scheduled for this summer in Florida, according to Gov. Rick Scott, who highlighted the good news at today's Cabinet meeting in Tallahassee.

"Fishing is a great way to enjoy Florida's beautiful outdoors, great weather and a wonderful day with family and friends," Scott said. "License-free fishing days are the perfect opportunity to discover the fun

and excitement of fishing and Florida's great outdoors."

The days are perfect chances for parents, who don't yet have a license, to take youth fishing, or for avid anglers to introduce a friend to the recreational pursuit without having to purchase a license.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) spread out the opportunities this year so more people will be able to head for their favorite lakes and rivers or saltwater destinations on designated

days. Instead of providing one weekend for freshwater fishing and one weekend for saltwater fishing, the Commissioners decided at their meeting in February to break up the days. You won't need a recreational fishing license on the special days listed below.

Florida residents and nonresidents, mark these Saturdays on your calendar for 2012:

April 7 – Freshwater  
June 2 – Saltwater  
June 9 – Freshwater  
Sept. 1 – Saltwater

The April 7 date occurs during a productive freshwater fishing period when the weather is usually comfortable. Plus it is Easter weekend, and many people like to fill the weekend with a variety of activities with family or friends.

The June 2 free saltwater fishing day coincides with the first weekend of Gulf red snapper season and National Fishing and Boating Week, which means there will be lots of other related activities going on too.

The June 9 date for freshwater fishing

All other bag limit, season and size restrictions apply on these dates. The license-free fishing designation applies only to recreational fishing, not commercial.






