## TS Debby: One year later

Today marks the one year anniversary of folks waking up to flooding and damage from Tropical Storm Debby, a storm that left many devastated with damaged homes and ruined lives. Residents of Suwannee County have spent the past year picking up the pieces of what remained after historic water levels flooded down-

town Live Oak and areas throughout Suwannee County. Since the storm, heroic efforts have been made to return to a normal life. For many, that has not been easy.

East Howard St.


Even though one year has passed since Debby visited, the recovery continues.

**Florida ERC approves rigorous standards to now protect 91 percent of the state's estuaries**

*Dep. moves forward with water quality protections for 18 additional estuaries*

Tallahassee, Fla. – The Environmental Regulation Commission on Thursday unanimously approved numeric nutrient criteria for an additional 18 estuaries and 448 miles of open coastal waters, building on the extensive standards set beginning in late 2011. The action means the Florida Department of Environmental Protection has set rigorous nutrient criteria for more than 3,900 of the state's estimated 4,290 coastal miles of estuaries, or 91 percent coverage.

The estuaries affected include Loxahatchee River, Lake Worth Lagoon, Halifax River, Guana River/Tolomato River/Matanzas River, Nassau River, Suwannee River, Waccasassa River, Withlacoochee River, and Springs Coast (Crystal River to Anclote River). The Department has developed criteria for total phosphorus, total nitrogen and chlorophyll A for individual segments in each of the estuaries.

This action follows the adoption of numeric nutrient criteria for Panhandle and South Florida estuaries late last year and the previous year, well before the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's deadline for proposing the standards. Previous estuaries covered include Tampa Bay, Charlotte Harbor, Biscayne Bay, Indian River Lagoon, the Florida Keys, Pensacola Bay (including Escambia Bay), Choctawhatchee Bay, St. Andrew Bay and Apalachicola Bay.

Data collection and analysis continues for the remaining nine percent of the estuaries, mostly in the Big Bend area of the state.

"I am very proud of the dedicated scientists at the Department who worked long hours to derive criteria based on the best science available," said Drew Bartlett, Director of the Department's Division of Environmental Assessment and Restoration. "What they have accomplished furthers Florida's position as a national leader in the adoption of these important criteria. We are gratified by the ERC's action."

In March, the Department and the EPA reached agreement for the state to complete the path it started

on, establishing comprehensive numeric nutrient criteria to protect Florida's waterways from excessive levels of nitrogen and phosphorus. High levels of these pollutants promote algal blooms and are Florida's most critical water quality challenge.

That agreement builds on momentum from November 2012, when the EPA approved Florida's numeric nutrient criteria for lakes, rivers, streams and springs, as well as estuaries from Clearwater Harbor to Biscayne Bay and the Florida Keys. State legislation passed this session and additional Department rule-making is ongoing to finish the job of setting numeric nutrient criteria in Florida. The agreement will bring an end to dual federal and state rule-making.

The legislation, recently signed into law by Governor Rick Scott, requires the Department to complete its nutrient criteria rule-making for remaining estuaries and coastal waters by December 1, 2014, and establishes interim nutrient standards for those remaining waters until then. The legislation further provides that state criteria will go into full effect when EPA withdraws all federal nutrient criteria rule-making in Florida.

The Department has also adopted a clear implementation plan for nutrient criteria. Upon fulfillment of the agreement with EPA, coupled with EPA's November 2012 approval of the Department's previously adopted criteria, Florida will have state-established numeric nutrient standards for the vast majority of its waterways.

Florida taxpayers have invested millions of dollars to create the nation's most comprehensive rules controlling nutrients. These rules account for the diversity and complexity of Florida's waters and afford local communities and private interests the tools essential to cleaning up and protecting rivers, lakes, estuaries, and springs. The Department is committed to working with affected stakeholders to finish the job.

## Don't let food safety training take a vacation

UF/IFAS-Suwannee County Extension Office provides up to date food safety training for foodservice workers

Just because summer is here doesn't mean that proper food safety practices can be on a vacation. The University of Florida/IFAS-Suwannee County Extension Office is providing training to enable food managers and staff to offer Florida's consumers the safest food prepared in a clean environment.

This is a comprehensive training program which provides the most up-to-date information and current regulations. The ServSafe Manager's Exam is given at the end of the training which provides a National Certification that is good for 5 years. Certification is required in Florida for food managers of all establishments licensed by the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, the Department of Agriculture, and Consumer Services and selected licenses of the Department of Health. The sixth edition reflects the 2011 supplement to the 2009 FDA Food Code.

## 'Fiddler on the Roof' to take place at Fla. Gateway College

Florida Gateway College will present four performances of the Tony Award-winning musical "Fiddler on the Roof," beginning on Thursday.

Showtimes for the community musical are at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, and a Saturday matinee at 1 p.m. The show will take place at the FGC Levy Performing Arts Center, and tickets will be available at the door.

The original Broadway production of the show, which opened in 1964, was the first musical theatre production to surpass 3,000 shows, and remains one of the longest-running shows in Broadway's history. It was nominated for 10 Tony Awards – it won nine – and has spawned various revivals and film adaptations.

This is the first community musical at FGC since 2010, and more than 45 community members between the ages of 6-80 are involved.

Cost in recent years has prohibited community musicals at FGC.

"To get a musical off the

ground here, you're looking at somewhere between \$8,000 to \$10,000," said Owen Wingate, FGC choir director.

This year, FGC budgeted some money to support the arts, and the FGC Choir raised funds for the production. Masterpiece Theater recently produced a Junior version of "Fiddler on the Roof," and saved the college money by loaning many of the sets and costume pieces used during its production.

"This allows us to do a musical that would have cost a lot more without their help," Wingate said.

Tickets for the show will go on sale one hour before each performance – cost is \$5 for children under 12, \$7 for children under 17, seniors, and FGC faculty and staff, and \$9 for adults.

Suwannee High School drama instructor Emily Bass and 12 of her students will be performing in the production. Bass said this will be a great experience for her and her students.



The town of Branford held their monthly meeting following the election on June 11. They went down the agenda list to receive, and if necessary, discuss the updated reports.

### Recreation

Hatch Park Recreation Director Craig Timberlake was available for any updates regarding the park's facilities.

"Everything's going good, it's slowed down," said Timberlake. "Ball season is winding down, so our next thing is getting prepared for the Fourth of July. I'm going to be doing some painting up there."

He said he wanted to finish up the building before July 4.

### Fire department

Assistant Fire Chief Terry Burgess said he had no new updates and unless any one had questions, the department was just gearing up for the Fourth of July.

### Heritage House

Councilwoman Shirley Clark said she had nothing new, but Council President Charlie Daniel commented that they've only held one event (Viva Florida 500 celebration) there since it opened, and it was a good one.

### Clerk report

Town Clerk Donna Hardin had no new updates either, but Daniel personally thanked her and Assistant Clerk Tonya Byrd for the great job they did in handling the extra traffic due to voters coming through Town Hall for the

election earlier in the day.

### Skate park update

Bill Procko of Branford Fitness, the main organizer for getting the new skate park built, was unavailable, but spoke to Councilman Ken Saunders earlier about the progress being made toward getting the necessary funds for the construction of the park.

"He called me and said he had submitted a request for the grant from the Tony Hawk Foundation and he is working on another grant," said Saunders.

Procko told him he might not hear anything back from the foundation till around September.

### Oak Grove Cemetery

Councilwomen Alice Childress and Clark said they are still checking into the details about who is to be responsible for some of the areas of the cemetery's upkeep and said they will keep council posted about any new developments.

### Curfew

Saunders being aware of the late start of the meeting because of the election decided to postpone discussing the issue.

"I don't think it's anything urgent at this point," said Saunders. "Possibly, maybe next workshop we can do some talking about it then."

### American Legion

Bill Childress of Branford's American Legion Post #59 addressed council and asked for permission to have a table and tent set up at Hatch Park for July 4 for veterans in the area.

"It's to meet and greet veterans who are in the

neighborhood because we know there are many around here," said Childress.

Childress said also if they wanted to join the other veterans for the American Legion meetings, there would be applications available. They'll be giving handouts, a standard serving-your-community form explaining what the AL does.

Daniels said there should be no objection to the table/tent request.

### Inter-local agreement with Suwannee County

Attorney Kevin Daly said that back in 1977, Branford's Town Council secured 20 percent of the recreation funds of the county as he put it, "to take care of the south end of the county."

He said it was an informal agreement and this past year they stopped the distribution of the funds because state auditors had questioned the Suwannee County Clerk because there was no documentation on the agreement.

Daly, Hardin and Daniel had a conference call with County Attorney Jimmy Prevatt on securing a proposed written agreement between county and municipality on the terms for the funds. He said the 20 percent wasn't set in stone, but was generally what they received.

"We have to provide the county with a copy of what we spend on recreation," said Daly. "The agreement requires us to provide the county with our proposed budget."

There was further discussion and both Childress and Councilman Matt

Burns said they were "rubbed the wrong way" in that the proposed agreement would have them include information about the budget that is already public record.

After further discussion, Hardin brought up a key point.

"They're not required to give us that 20 percent," said Hardin.

It was finally understood by council that it was the state of Florida that wanted the budget information, not the county for an accountability for the funds, so they approved the terms and Daniel signed the agreement Daly had brought to the meeting.

### Booster Club

Branford High School Sports Booster President Kenny Burt made a proposal to council for them to consider donating money towards the purchase of a new banner as a way to say thanks to the teams for helping bring in revenue to the town of Branford. He said the Boosters have also been approaching local businesses to help donate towards the purchase of banners.

Burt said all the different sporting events were bringing money into the local economy.

"People are coming to town, they're eating at our restaurants, shopping at our stores and buying our gasoline," said Burt. "It's tourism that's being created at no cost to the town."

Burt suggested if council was interested that sometime in the fall to have a banner made up saying, "Thank you from the town of Branford" or "Go Bucs from the town of Bran-

ford."

He said when teams come from out of town, they read the banners and it advertises to them.

"I've got businesses in Mayo that come over here and advertise because Branford people may do business with them," said Burt. "I'm just trying to paint a positive picture here for the town of Branford."

Burt said with eight home football games, numerous volleyball and basketball games, three track meets, baseball and softball on varsity, junior varsity and middle school levels, there will always be people coming into Branford.

"When they come to town, it's not just to watch their kid play," said Burt. "If a kid is practicing and they come to pick them up and it's a late practice, a lot of them will stay in town and eat and it generates revenue in town."

Burt concluded the banners costs about \$200 and he hoped council would consider his proposal. Council didn't see a problem with complying, but was concerned that if the Branford Booster Club was a 501(c) organization (non-profit and tax exempt) they could not by law give the club funds for the banner.

Burt wasn't sure and said he would get with their treasurer to confirm how they are established. Council did decide if the club was non-profit, they would personally and individually donate funds toward the banner.

### Public comment

Local resident Jim Ward stepped up to the podium and asked to re-visit one of the items on the agenda re-

garding the inter-local agreement and the recreation fund.

"I know you may be offended that the people are asking for an accounting of the 20 percent money," said Ward. "A lot of people worked hard for this to come about that these monies are supplied to Branford. It wasn't always like this."

Ward reiterated what Hardin had mentioned earlier about the county being under no obligation to provide the 20 percent of the recreation fund and could stop at anytime.

"This year it was \$89,000," said Ward. "What the town of Branford gets is 20 percent of the entire money that Suwannee County puts into the Live Oak-Suwannee County recreation agreement that they have."

He said to his understanding, the 20 percent is funneled through the town of Branford and it's where the money goes.

"There's some people that aren't real happy with that," said Ward. "And if they're asking for an account of the \$89,000, I hope you make a good faith effort to provide it to them or you're just going to provide them with fodder, fuel the fire, if you will."

Ward said it might be offensive to them, but that it should be required.

Childress said they have their records there and that it's public. Daniel agreed with her.

Ward hoped council would provide whatever information to the county and state that was required to continue getting the recreation funds for the town.

# There is no online privacy

(The Mankato, Minn., Free Press)

Much has been made in recent weeks — and rightly so — about the government's monitoring of phone calls and Internet connections.

Largely lost in the discussion of such data mining is this reality: The government's activities pale in comparison to those of the tech giants who provide such services.

At least as described so far, the feds are focused on connections — who is talking to who. The tech firms — Google, Apple, Facebook, Amazon and others — are interested in the content, which they slice and dice and use themselves and sell to others.

They know who you are, where you are, that your daughter wore a red bikini at the lake last weekend and that you're considering buying a new car.

And they intend to use that knowledge to add to their wealth. At least the government's purpose — again, at least as known to date — is the less selfish goal of preserving the public's safety.

Sen. Al Franken, Minnesota Democrat who chairs a subcommittee on privacy issues, has said that the tech giants increasingly view their users less as customers and more as product.

Tech's apologists say that's overblown, that competition will keep them in line: If you don't trust Google with your search results, you can use Bing or Yahoo. But the problem with that argument is that they're all doing the same thing.

The Instagram dustup last December is worth keeping in mind. The photo-sharing site (owned by Facebook) laid claim to ownership of everything posted there, including the right to use photos in ads without compensation or even notification. It quickly retreated under a hail of protest — but its announcement made it clear that Instagram wasn't surrendering for all time.

The tech giants expect our sense of privacy, and our demand that it be respected, to continue to erode. Indeed, they are banking on it.

# Bit by bit strategy

There's a move on to prohibit Washington's football team from calling itself "Redskins," even though a 2009 U.S. Supreme Court decision said that it has that right. Now the name change advocates are turning to the political arena and intimidation. The NCAA has already banned the University of North Dakota from calling its football team the "Fighting Sioux."

This is the classic method of busybodies and tyrants; they start out with something trivial or small and then magnify and extend it. If these people are successful in banning the use of Indian names for football teams, you can bet the rent money that won't end their agenda. Our military has a number of fighting aircraft named with what busybodies and tyrants might consider racial slights, such as the Apache, Iroquois, Kiowa, Lakota and Mescalero. We also have military aircraft named after animals, such as the Eagle, Falcon, Raptor, Cobra and Dolphin. The people fighting against the Redskins name might form a coalition with the PETA animal rights kooks to ban the use of animal names.

Another example of the strategy of starting out small is that of the tobacco zealots. In 1965, in the name of health, tobacco zealots successfully got Congress to enact the Cigarette Labeling and Advertising Act. A few years later, they were successful in getting a complete smoking ban on planes, and that success emboldened them to seek many other bans. The issue here is not smoking but tyrant strategy. Suppose that in 1965, the tobacco tyrants demanded that Congress enact a law banning smoking in bars, in workplaces, in restaurants, in apartments, within 25 feet of entrances, in ballparks, on beaches, on sidewalks and in other places. Had they revealed and demanded their full agenda back in 1965, there would have been so much resistance that they wouldn't have gotten anything. By the way, much of their later success was a result of a bogus Environmental Protection Agency study on secondhand smoke. I'd like to hear whether EPA scientists are willing to declare that people can die from secondhand smoke at a beach, on a sidewalk, in a park or within 25 feet of a building.

During the legislative and subsequent state ratification debates over the 16th Amendment -- which established

the income tax -- the political task of overturning the Constitution's prohibition of such tax was considerably eased by political promises that any income tax levied would fall upon only the wealthiest 3 to 5 percent of the population. Most Americans paid no federal income tax, and those earning \$500,000 or more paid only 7 percent. In 1913, only 358,000 Americans filed 1040

forms, compared with today's 140 million. That's the rope-a-dope strategy. To get the votes of the masses, politicians start out small and exploit the politics of envy by promising that only the rich will be taxed.

In 1898, Congress imposed a temporary federal excise tax on telephones as a revenue measure during the Spanish-American War. At that time, only the rich owned phones. Soon nearly all Americans owned phones. Both the rich and the poor paid the telephone excise tax. Congress repealed this "temporary" Spanish-American War tax in 2006. Nobel laureate Milton Friedman had it right when he said, "Nothing is so permanent as a temporary government program."

The Tax Reform Act of 1969, called the alternative minimum tax, was created to raise revenue from 155 "rich" Americans who legally avoided federal income taxes by buying tax-free municipal bonds. Today more than 4 million Americans are hit by the AMT, and most of them hardly qualify as rich.

Here's another rope-a-dope just beginning. The National Transportation Safety Board recently recommended that states reduce the allowable blood alcohol content by more than a third -- to 0.05 percent, as opposed to today's 0.08 percent. The NTSB is calling it a recommendation just to test the waters. If the board doesn't see resistance, its next move will be to threaten noncomplying states with a cutoff of highway construction funds. Setting the legal limit at 0.05 percent is not these people's end objective. Their end objective is to outlaw any amount of alcohol in the blood while one is driving.

# There's no star power in playing movie critic

All those girls who turned me down when I was single and asked them if they'd like to go to a movie with me don't know how fortunate they were.

I'm a lousy movie date.

No, we're not talking about libertine behavior in a dark theater. The Pollak men are gentlemen.

It's my totally defensible and warranted reaction to the whole movie experience that makes going to a movie with me and — in particular — discussing it afterwards such a drag.

I don't squawk much at the cost of admission, and I can even tolerate having to take out a second mortgage to purchase a small bag of popcorn and some Raisinets. But if I'm going to pay for the experience, I want to enjoy it.

And, you know, it's really hard to do that when the couple sitting behind you thinks they're in their living room and free to comment about everything they're seeing on the screen.

My first reaction is always the old "turn around and stare" technique to let them know that their running commentary is disturbing me, but that rarely works. If they had any sensitivity to something that subtle they wouldn't be yakking in the first place.

A "shush" not only sounds silly, but only tends to make them talk more, as if to say: "Who is this guy who thinks he can 'shush' us when we paid good money just like he did to see this movie?"

Leaping over my row of chairs and grasping a kibitzer's neck in search of an artery is frowned upon in polite society, so I invariably induce my companion (almost always my 35-years-long-suffering bride) to move with me to another row. As this ritual can repeat itself two or three times in the showing of one movie, it's easy to see why she attends so many films by herself.

Another reason is how persnickety I've gotten about what's on the screen. For instance, great amounts of money, time and effort are spent by Hollywood directors to produce the most harrowing car chases imaginable.

Except I don't feel the least bit harrowed.

There must be some rule dictated by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences that requires at least one car chase in every film, which might explain why you don't see a lot of Shakespeare's stuff turned into movies these days.

The thing is, no matter how many collisions eventuate, how many autos fly great distances off improbable makeshift ramps and land safely, how many bridges collapse and how many pedestrians scoot out of the way to miraculously avoid being crushed, you and I know that nothing bad is going to happen to the good guy.

And that's just boring.

The same Motion Picture Academy principle is obviously at work in any movie that involves gunfire: Bad guys can't hit anything when they shoot. Oh, not that they don't try. Hundreds, if not thousands, of rounds are dispersed in the direction of the hero or heroine, but you know that the absolute worst thing that's going to happen is a flesh wound.

Any wound won't, of course, prevent the good guy or

good gal (usually with a mere handgun against the bad guys' automatic weapons) from ever missing what they're aiming at.

Again, I'm sitting in the dark ... bored.

But the thing that seems to annoy my loved ones and rapidly shrinking number of friends most is what they call my refusal to suspend reality when watching a movie.

This is, in my view, a base canard.

As evidence, I see nothing illogical about musicals, whether it's Anne Hathaway's character singing while she's dying in "Les Miz," or Riff and his fellow street-hood Jets doing ballet moves on the playground in "West Side Story."

And I'm perfectly willing to concede that Iron Man can fly because he has little rockets in the soles of his feet. If you go to a movie based on a comic strip character, you've got to go along with that sort of thing.

But it's in the post-movie analysis of a "real" movie where I'll get into trouble. To wit: "Now You See Me," a film that lost whatever flimsy hold it had on reality early on, just got more absurd as it went along. The climax was enabled by a vast amount of sophisticated pyrotechnics and other special effects that were somehow expertly planted in a huge building without anyone noticing.

My bride — who is a far more tolerant member of the species than her husband — enjoyed the film and then made the mistake of asking my opinion.

"I'm just wondering," I said thoughtfully, "if that was the worst movie ever made."

Envy all those girls who had turned me down for movie dates, she shook her head.

"I'm never," she said, "going to the movies with you anymore."

At last reckoning, "Now You See Me" had earned more than \$80 million in this country alone and was still going great at the box office.

And I'm still a lousy movie date.

Tarpley, who referred to TS Debby as the "Invisible Disaster", said his group has helped to repair nearly 30 homes that were damaged.

"It's more difficult to see it (flood damage) than like a tornado. It's really hard to see how much damage there is unless you go inside the home or the home owner calls for help. Most of the time, you can't grasp the damage just by riding by, but the damage can be severe," Tarpley said.

Realtor Ronnie Poole, a long-time resident of Suwannee County, said transportation to places was very difficult for him.

"My house didn't flood, but there were several weeks I couldn't get around, so there was nothing I could do business wise," Poole said.

Poole said his business

was impacted for several weeks following the storm, but has since recovered from Debby and the economic downturn.

"We spent hours trying to get from one place to another," said local resident Enola Golightly, whose commute was also dented by the storm.

Golightly escaped the storm without damage to her home, but realizes the tragedy the people faced was great.

"There's a lot of properties that didn't have flood problems and sinkholes before, but now they do," she said. "But everybody was so focused on recovering and helping each other out. We all just pulled together."

Jimmy Pruitt, a local pastor, said his home "barely survived" the flood waters.

"Thankfully, we were high enough and stayed

dry," Pruitt said. "But the water came very close. Others around us got flooded bad. In some places, roof tops was all I could see."

He continued, "Very few roads were open. We really had to pick and choose our way around."

Pruitt serves as a director over several mission projects. When several displaced residents came to him for help, he said he couldn't help but help them.

"We had mattresses in our thrift store that we cut the price down to what we had in it. In fact, we cut the price on everything to help people whose household items were destroyed," Pruitt said. "Still today, a lot of people are hurting. I hear people say all the time their houses are still damaged and it's been a year since the storm. It was truly a remarkable storm."

# Forest Service offers landowners incentives to fight pests

Suwannee county landowners can get paid to practice responsible forest management. The Florida Forest Service (FFS) is running the annual Southern Pine Beetle (SPB) Prevention Program, which offers non-industrial private forest landowners the ability to receive grants from the USDA Forest Service for conducting healthy forest management practices. These practices include a forest's first pulpwood thinning, prescribed burning, planting longleaf pine, and me-

chanical underbrush treatments.

cubic feet of pine timber over thousands of acres in

strengthen pine forests to withstand SPB outbreaks and save landowners from millions of dollars worth of losses.

Payments for these management practices are at per-acre or per-seedling rates. The minimum tract size requirement is 10 acres, or 5 acres for the first pulpwood thinning, and funding requests may not exceed \$10,000. Non-industrial private landowners may apply for up to two approved practices each

year, and may only apply once per landowner per year.

"Suwannee County has a very active land base managed by private landowners that have extensively utilized the SPB program in the past," stated Suwannee County Senior Forester Brian Cobble.


Cobble also stated that the SPB program sign-up period for 2013 is expected to last for a month.

# Big Oak's 'Rack 'n' Roll' pool team heading to Vegas

Local pool team Rack 'n' Roll will soon be flying to the entertainment capital of the world, Las Vegas, for the 2013 American Poolplayers Association (APA) National Team Championships. From Aug. 15 to 24, the six members of Rack 'n' Roll will compete amongst nearly 1,200 other teams from all over America for the chance to win \$25,000.

Team captain Michael Davis and co-captain Glenda Davis will lead four other players at their first ever national competition. This annual event is being held at the Riviera Hotel and Casino, where they will play in the Open 8-Ball championship.

Rack 'n' Roll has been playing together for three years, all starting with a mutual love of pool at the Big Oak Bar in Live Oak. Michael Davis frequently accompanied his

wife, Glenda, as she tended the bar, and wound up playing pool to pass the time.

"These young people would come into the bar and play pool," Davis said. "I'd scout out who showed some real talent, and asked them if they'd like to join a team. Before long, we had a great one put together."

The APA championships will allow for a 23-rule handicap, which helps to even out players of different skill levels. Players anywhere between two and seven on the skill level scale are equalized by raising the number of games a higher level player must win against a lower level player in order to win a match. A player's skill level is determined by an APA judge who considers how many innings or shots a player makes in a match and what kinds of strategies he or she uses, among other considerations. A standard match is given three and a half hours to play out, and if neither team has won by the end of that time limit, the game goes into sudden death. The APA competition

will be thinned out by double elimination, meaning that losing teams still have a chance to regain the win until the very last round.

"It's all about strategy," Michael Davis said. "It's like playing chess. You have to be able to see where your piece is going and read your opponent."

Team member Josh Thompson has been playing pool for 15 years, and joined Rack 'n' Roll in December of last year. He expressed his excitement about the trip, stating he would also be celebrating his 31st birthday during the event.

"They're like a family," Thompson said of his team. "I've had more fun and made better friends here than anywhere else. I think we have an excellent shot at winning the championship. We wouldn't be nearly as good as we are without our leaders, Mike and Glenda."

Rack 'n' Roll qualified for the national championships earlier this month at the APA Local Team Championships at Bankshot Billiards in Ocala on June 1 and 2. Four teams moved on out of the 38 that competed there. They played for nearly 12 hours in a row and an additional four in order to take the first place title that earned them tickets to Vegas.

"We have some great players and I'm really proud of them," Davis said. "They're starting to beat me; that's how I know they're good."

# Sunscreen Ratings: The Best and Worst for Beach Season 2013

Want to really enjoy your day in the sun? Start by choosing the best sunblock out there so you don't have to worry about getting burned. Luckily, the Environmental Working Group (EWG) has just released its 2013 Guide to Sunscreens, which rates more than 1,400 sunscreens, lip balms, and SPF moisturizers and cosmetics for safety and effectiveness. And some of their findings might surprise you. The EWG report found that only 25 percent of products on the market offer both broad sun protection and low-risk chemical ingredients. "Consumers are understandably confused about sunscreens," Sonya Lunder, lead author of the EWG report, told Yahoo! Shine. "And, unfortunately, they are facing some bad choices."

While sunburns are caused mostly by relatively short but intense ultraviolet B rays, longer UVA rays, which penetrate the body more deeply, inflict more insidious damage and may contribute to or cause cancer. But all sunscreens are not equal in how effectively they protect against both types of rays, says the EWG.

The FDA aimed to make that clearer when it put new sunscreen labeling rules into effect in 2012. One new requirement is for products to test and then label to identify sunscreens as "broad spectrum" if they protect well against both UVB and UVA rays. Those that don't must now carry a "skin cancer/skin aging alert" (although EWG says that the FDA standards on this are too low). Another requirement is that if a product claims to be water-resistant, it must say when, during sweating or swimming, the sunblock should be reapplied (for example, every 80 minutes).

But after analyzing 750 beach and sport sunscreens, EWG noted that the new FDA rules have not yet led to better sunscreens for 2013. "New rules, same old products," Lunder said. Still, learning to look past label claims and look carefully at ingredient lists can be a helpful way around the bad products. Below, the best and worst of what's currently on the market:

So what does the EWG say should be avoided when you make your choice?

**Sunscreen sprays or powders:** Sprays and powders may pose serious inhalation risks — and also make it too easy to apply too little or to miss a spot, leaving tender skin exposed to dangerous rays.

**SPF values above 50+:** SPF refers only to protection against UVB radiation, not the potentially cancer-causing UVA rays. So a high-SPF number may trick you into staying in the sun too long, blocking sunburns but increasing the risk of other kinds of skin damage. The FDA is considering limiting SPF claims to 50+, as is done in other countries.

**Dangerous ingredients:** Avoid products that include oxybenzone (found in 80 percent of chemical sunscreens), which can penetrate the skin, cause allergic reactions, possibly disrupt hormones, and may have a link to a risk of endometriosis and low birth weights. And retinyl palmitate, meanwhile, a form of anti-oxidant vitamin A that has been said to slow skin aging, should be avoided because it's been found to possibly speed the development of skin tumors and lesions when applied to the skin in the presence of sunlight. Safer options block sun with low-risk ingredients such as zinc oxide, avobenzone or Mexoryl SX. Find a complete list of chemicals and their risks here.

Finally, to make sure you're truly protected when the sun's rays are at their strongest, EWG notes, don't completely rely on sun lotions; instead, when possible, wear clothes. Shirts, hats, shorts, and pants provide the best protection from UV rays—chemical-free.


