Separate trials for four accused of murder have been continued until pre-trial in August, according to the Suwannee County Clerk of the Circuit Court's Office. They were scheduled for pre-trials last week.

Marcus Cole, 40, of 12803 225th Rd., was hosting a party and cookout at his home with 11 people in attendance. At approximately 10 p.m. on Jan. 26, six of the party goers got into a fight.

Shortly after the fight had broken up, Cole went into his home and retrieved a 30.06 rifle.

Mike Williams, 46, was about six feet away from a truck his brother Abram Williams, 41, was sitting in, when Cole reportedly shot and killed him.

O'Bryan gets 15 years



Pleaded guilty of attempted murder of Shannon Wrench

Shawn Patrick O'Bryan pleaded guilty Thursday for the July 16, 2012, attempted murder of Shannon Wrench, according to court records.

O'Bryan, 39, was sentenced to 15 years in prison and five years of probation following his prison release for attempted first degree murder during a pre-trial Thursday.

Wrench, 35, was found unresponsive

and badly beaten in weeds alongside 153rd Road North in Suwannee County on July 16, 2012. She was discovered wearing cut off blue jean shorts and a grateful dead T-shirt with no shoes.



O'Bryan

"I'm glad it's finally over," Wrench told the Democrat during a phone call on Monday. "I don't think he got what he deserved, but I'm satisfied with the result."

For three weeks and a day, Wrench was in a medically induced coma in a

FLOOD WARNING CONTINUES



A flood warning continues for the Santa Fe River at Three Rivers Estates, according to the National Weather Service. As of Tuesday, the Santa Fe River stage was 18.35 feet. Flood stage is 19 feet. The river is expected to rise to near flood stage by Friday morning. Minor flooding is forecast, according to the NWS. In the meantime, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission has issued an idle-speed, no-wake zone for a 32-mile segment of the river. According to the Suwannee River Water Management District, upper Suwannee River gages have started to fall, but additional rain could cause further increases. Suwannee FFA wraps another successful year

The Suwannee FFA chapters were well represented at the 85th Florida FFA State Convention in Orlando June 10-14. After a successful year, many students were recognized for their hard work and achievements.

Suwannee FFA had 15 proficiency finalists and on Thursday, June 13, four winners were announced: Terrah Henderson – Dairy Production; Austin Long – Forage Production; Jonathan Crain – Specialty Crop Production, and Laura-Kaitlyn Boatright – Veterinary Medicine.

In addition to proficiency finalists and winners, Suwannee FFA members also got stage time during the High School Parade of CDE Champions. Both the third place agricultural communications team and fifth place vegetable judging teams were recognized as some of Florida's finest. During another session, Terrah Henderson was acknowledged as the fifth place winner in the alumni essay contest. As a result,

Terrah received a scholarship to attend the Washington Leadership Conference.

On Friday, Lindsey Brothers, Taylor Henderson, Braxton Hicks, Austin Long, and Wesley Thomas all received their state FFA degree. Of 291 state degree applicants from across the state of Florida, 16 were selected as Star Finalists. Taylor Henderson, Austin Long and Wesley Thomas were all selected as a State Star in Agricultural Placement Finalists and participated in the Stars Over Florida reception and ceremony along with their families.

In addition to five state degrees, it was confirmed that five Suwannee FFA members will receive their American degree in October. Laura-Kaitlyn Boatright, Ben Glass, Drew Land, Dustin Lane and Rachel Morgan will travel to Louisville for the official ceremony during the National FFA Convention.

The chapter was recognized as a premier chapter, making Suwannee FFA one of Florida's 34 finest chap-

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Area high school students team with SRWMD to learn about water resources through the Florida Learns STEM program

The Suwannee River Water Management District (District) teamed up with two local high schools this summer to teach students about techniques to manage and protect water resources as part of the Florida Learns Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Scholars Program.

Five students in the classes of Paige Thomas, of Madison County, and Janice Grant, of Trenton High School, shadowed District staff for eight days. Students practiced using survey equipment to set temporary benchmarks in a

floodplain to learn about the minimum flows and levels (MFLs) process; they observed agricultural best management practices at several local farms; and they took a field trip to various construction sites to understand the importance of the District's environmental resource permitting program.

Other learning experiences included: a demonstration of the capabilities of geographic information system (GIS) software to understand how the software is used as a tool to manage water resources; a

visit to various District lands to experience land management for water resource protection, and to learn about public use and recreation opportunities; a field trip to assist with the installation of technology used in monitoring water levels; and a visit to Poe Springs Park to measure water flow and take water quality samples in the spring run.

"I've learned a lot about how the District manages land and water resources and tries to preserve the environment. I've also learned a lot about job opportunities in STEM fields at the District," said Easton Sapp, of Trenton High School.

Daniel Crane, another Trenton High student said, "I learned a lot about the workings of the District. It

was interesting to see the variety of occupations working together for one goal. The field experiences were interesting, educational, and fun."

The students developed a video detailing their experiences that was presented to the District's Governing Board on July 9.

"The District is thrilled to have an opportunity to expose students the role that

science, technology, engineering, and mathematics play in the protection of water resources, and to help generate interest in careers in these fields," said District Executive Director Ann Shortelle.

Florida Learns STEM program is designed to show gifted and talented students how STEM disciplines are used in the workplace.

What is ‘news’ in today’s world?

Since the first journalist wrote the first news article and published it in the first newspaper, folks have been trying to define “news.”

Yesterday’s definitions have been swallowed up in the 24-hour TV news cycle and the incessant buzz of social media.

As a former journalism professor turned publisher, I find myself struggling to define “news” in the context of today’s world.

Historically, those who taught and practiced print and broadcast journalism generally embraced the premise that news is comprised of one or more of eight elements or characteristics.

But the traditional definitions of those elements have changed, as I will try to describe.

Immediacy – Some journalists like to say their business is news, not history. That means reporting something that just happened or is about to happen or that they want to happen.

Proximity – If it didn’t happen here or close by, is it important to me or my car pool? Technology has brought the world to our living room, tablet computer and smart phone. Where exactly is Maldives?

Prominence – There are as many definitions of this term as there are aspiring and perspiring musicians, drugged starlets, fading movie stars, corrupt politicians, serial killers and others in the public eye who arouse our curiosity. Their lives prove that name recognition can be a mixed blessing.

Oddity – Most of us are too polite to talk or write about freak shows but this category goes from the simply bizarre to the daredevils who look death or crippling trauma in the eye while their cheering spectators hope for the worst.

Conflict – Political, ethnic and religious zealots have been fighting and dying since the dawn of time. Mainly, the only things that change are names, geography, body counts and the number of television sound bites and tweets.

Suspense – This once legitimate news element has been reduced to cheap theatrics and media manipulation as we anxiously await the birth of celebrity babies, the outcome of media circus trials and the introduction of instant millionaires at pro sports drafts.

Emotion – Do we hang ‘em or hug ‘em? Is it a two-hanky piece or just an eye dabber? Can’t every cheating spouse cry on cue in those “tell all” news conferences? Would you trade a Jimmy Swaggart card for a Jim Bakker?

Consequence – History tells us that Chester A. Arthur, 21st president of the U.S., was the last public figure brave enough or foolish enough to utter these famous last words: “I may be president of the United States but my private life is nobody’s damned business.”

What Egyptians need

What Egyptian citizens must recognize is that political liberty thrives best where there’s a large measure of economic liberty. The Egyptian people are not the problem; it’s the environment they’re forced to live in. Why is it that Egyptians do well in the U.S. but not Egypt? We could make the same observation about Nigerians, Cambodians, Jamaicans and many other people who leave their homeland and immigrate to the U.S. For example, Indians in India suffer great poverty. But that’s not true of Indians who immigrate to the U.S. They manage to start more Silicon Valley companies than any other immigrant group, and they do the same in Massachusetts, Texas, Florida, New York and New Jersey.

According to various reports, about 50 percent of Egypt’s 83 million people live on or below the \$2-per-day poverty line set by the World Bank. Overall, unemployment is 13 percent, and among youths, it’s 25 percent. Those are the official numbers. The true rates are estimated to be twice as high.

Much of Egypt’s economic problems are directly related to government intervention and control, which have resulted in weak institutions so vital for prosperity. As Hernando de Soto, president of Peru’s Institute for Liberty and Democracy, wrote in his Wall Street Journal article titled “Egypt’s Economic Apartheid” (Feb. 3, 2011), more than 90 percent of Egyptians hold their property without legal title. De Soto said: “Without clear legal title to their assets and real estate, in short, these entrepreneurs own what I have called ‘dead capital’ -- property that cannot be leveraged as collateral for loans, to obtain investment capital, or as security for long-term contractual deals. And so the majority of these Egyptian enterprises remain small and relatively poor.”

Egypt’s legal private sector employs 6.8 million people, and the public sector has 5.9 million. More than 9 million people work in the extralegal sector, making Egypt’s underground economy the nation’s biggest employer. Why are so many Egyptians in the underground economy? De Soto answered by giving a typical example: “To open a small bakery, our investigators found, would take more than 500 days. To get legal title to a vacant piece of land would take

more than 10 years of dealing with red tape. To do business in Egypt, an aspiring poor entrepreneur would have to deal with 56 government agencies and repetitive government inspections.” According to the World Bank, in terms of the difficulty of doing business, Egypt ranks 109th out of 185 countries.

What needs to be done? Although it shouldn’t be seen as a general strategy, there is at least

one notable case in which a military coup and subsequent rule worked to the great benefit of a nation. A July 5 Investor’s Business Daily editorial (<http://tinyurl.com/klkjrmf>) was about Chile’s 1973 coup, which toppled the democratically elected Salvador Allende government and put Chilean military commander Augusto Pinochet in charge. Pinochet used his military dictatorship to create free market reforms by eliminating thousands of restrictive laws governing labor, mining, fishing, vineyards, startups and banking that were choking Chile’s economy. As a result, Chile became Latin America’s best economy and today has Latin America’s most durable democracy. That’s the upside to Pinochet’s rule. The downside was the regime’s corruption and atrocities.

Western intellectuals, pundits and politicians are mistakenly calling for democracy in Egypt. But there’s a problem. In most countries in the Arab world, what we know as personal liberty is virtually nonexistent. Freedom House’s 2011 “Freedom in the World” survey and Amnesty International’s annual report for 2011 labeled most North African and Middle Eastern countries as either “repressive” or “not free.” These nations do not share the philosophical foundations that delivered the West from its history of barbarism, such as the Magna Carta (1215) and later the teachings of such philosophers as Francis Bacon, John Locke, Thomas Hobbes, David Hume, Montesquieu and Voltaire.

Personal liberty is important, but the best route to that goal is what Egypt needs most -- reforms that create economic liberty.

TIME TO Renovate

Ten steps to successful renovations

Perhaps you've finally decided to carry out the renovations that you've been dreaming about for years. But where to start? And how to avoid botching the job? It's all a matter of careful planning. These ten steps are a guide to make your task easier; follow them, and you're sure to be proud of your finished



renovation project.

1. Evaluate your needs in a realistic way. If you expect to sell your home in a few years, you won't see things in the same way as if you plan to spend the rest of your life there. If you're there for the long term, try to anticipate the needs of your family down the road; determine if the work you're planning to do now will make sense in a few years' time.

2. Your aesthetic desires are important, but major home maintenance should come first. If your electric wiring is old and the roof is beginning to show its age, this kind of maintenance work should be carried out before you consider any other types of improvements to the house. The golden rule: maintenance before renovations. Ignore this particular guideline at your peril! You won't enjoy your new sun room if rainwater is dripping through your ceiling elsewhere in the house.

3. Read all available information about the type of renovations you're considering. Useful sources include documents published by government organizations, specialized magazines, and websites. Grill friends, neighbors, and material suppliers about their knowledge and experiences with renovation. You'll want to avoid reproducing their horror stories!

4. Draw up several different plans. You might entrust this step to a professional (architect, architectural technician, or interior designer), having first looked through their portfolios and checked their references. They can draw up definitive plans and, if you wish, prepare estimates for the materials required.

5. Don't go any further before having your plans approved by your municipality. Renovation regulations vary considerably from one town to another.

6. In order to prepare as precise a budget as possible, shop around for the different types of materials, comparing their prices as well as their durability. Plan for an extra 10 or 20 percent of your budget to meet unexpected expenses, which have an amazing ability to sneak up and take you by surprise.

7. If you need financing, a consultant at your banking institution will be able to explain the various avenues open to you, taking into account any equity available on the home and your assets. They will be well informed about any financial products intended specifically for home owners to fund renovations.

8. Now comes the critical step: the choice of contractor. Verify that he or she is well-established, has all the required permits, is a member of a professional association, and has worked on similar projects.

Ask them for references, a detailed estimate, and a clear-cut contract with a deadline for completion of the work. Deciding to carry out at least some of the renovation work yourself will translate into substantial savings.

9. Once the work has started, be present at the worksite as much as possible in order to quickly detect any mistakes and rapidly resolve any problems by discussing them with the contractor.

10. When the work is finished, ensure that it has been done as stipulated in the contract — don't sign anything until all is completed to your satisfaction. Finally, wait until the end of the payment time limit stated in the contract to pay the contractor your last installment. This gives you some leverage if any unresolved details arise in the days after the work crew clears out.

Church provides dinner for migrant workers

First Baptist Church of Branford welcomed and fed migrant workers in the area a homemade dinner at the church recently before they moved on. Every year hundreds of migrant workers come to Branford for about three to four weeks to pick the huge watermelon crop to support their families. The hard-working workers were in for a real treat right at the end of watermelon season in Branford as some church members said the Lord had laid it on their hearts to prepare and serve a huge meal and show the love of Christ to them. The meal consisted of smoked pork loin and chicken, corn on the cob, stringed beans, baked potato, rolls and brownies for dessert. Iced tea and an assortment of soft drinks were also available. The church prepared enough to feed about 300 people.

"What we're trying to do is just reach out," said head Pastor Dan Main. "A lot of these men come in every year and have been since 1978, coming in every year to pick the watermelons."

Main said this was the first time their church had ever done this.

"We care that they're here and they're helping our community," said Main. "Many of them are from other countries. Many are away from their family for a long time."

Main said sometimes towns collectively will be less than kind to the workers, but he and his church are trying to lead others from that.

"We've been going out there, handing out water and talking to them, telling them we love them and want to spend time with them," said Main.

Main said there's an interesting mix of people as he's met with some that are from Lake Placid, Lakeland and even some from Haiti.

"It's a neat group so far," said Main. "You know what the cool thing is, that the lay people in the church, God led them to do this. So, this isn't staff. It's just people saying, 'God led me to do this, so let's just do it' and the rest of the church came along side it."

Main went to greet some workers after they had settled into a seat at one of the tables.

"There's plenty of food here, so get as much as you want. If you go away hungry, it's your fault," laughed Main.

Other members were excited and more than willing to do what they could to serve.

"Soon as we heard about it, we wanted to participate," said church member Sarah Bowman. "You see the turnout we have and the participation from our church. We're set up for quite a few."

"They're here every year and this is their last week here," said church member Billie Owens. "We needed to reach out to those people. The church needs to be the church and show Christian fellowship."

Owens said the meal was a good opportunity to minister to the people with food and the Gospel.

"We've been praying for these migrant workers for days," said fellow church member Shirley Hatch. "I've just been praying for them. The sun is so hot and they're working so hard and we prayed that God would soften their hearts and prepare them for tonight. If there's but one soul saved, it'll be worth it."

Hatch said she knew that since it was toward the end of the season, some of the workers had already left. She said many of the ones showing up that night would be heading down to Lakeland later in the evening. They arrived a little early as the kitchen staff were still preparing the meal.

"We did everything we could to keep them here because they were tired," said Hatch. "Some of them are staying right here in Branford."

She said between 15 and 20 people discussed how to go about making the meal happen and that right away, they were given about \$1,500 toward the purchase of the

food and supplies they needed.

Craig Kurimay of First Baptist, while jogging on the Suwannee River Greenway a few weeks back, saw some of the workers with buses loaded with watermelons. The drop-off point for distribution is directly behind the Branford Post Office and near the path of the trail. Kurimay felt compelled to do something for the workers. This was on a Monday and he didn't think too much about it, but he and another member, Gene Harris, were talking a few days after that and Harris had the same thought as Kurimay about ministering to the migrant workers in some way.

"We saw it as an opportunity to love and to minister to them," smiled Kurimay. "We said, 'The Lord is up to something.'"

They prayed about it and mentioned it to the rest of the church not knowing exactly what the Lord wanted them to do. Several others also felt compelled to minister to the workers in some way and eventually the meal idea came to them. Kurimay said God has a wonderful way of bringing many together for a ministering event and to make it happen.

"What's awesome is when God is at work, then He will bring people together with different gifts, different focus of ministry and this is just a testimony of how God's spirit will unite people to carry out something that He wants to fulfill," said Kurimay.

Kurimay said there were cooks available, people donating money, supplies and time and that it was truly amazing.

Whether it was the hockey time, soccer in the rain, our across-the-state runs, or volleyball in the evenings by the pool, there was never a dull moment."

Dr. Masoodi encourages physical activity. He, himself, especially enjoys running and soccer. His love of running has stimulated many in the Dowling Park community—young and old—to take up running for exercise. He and teams of community residents have taken part in many relays and marathons together over the past nine years.

Because of his love of the outdoors and wiliness to try new things, some residents took it upon themselves to introduce Nasseer to some American outdoor pastimes: hunting and fishing to name two. In honor of his hunting trips, where he shot with a camera instead of with a rifle, one of the mementoes presented

to Dr. Masoodi at his reception was a deer head, mounted and ready for his new office wall.

Chief Program Officer, Sandie Hugg made a presentation from ACV to Dr. Masoodi of a plaque which read, "With Sincere Appreciation to Dr. Nasseer Masoodi for your commitment to fulfilling the mission of Advent Christian Village by providing quality, compassionate medical care to those served through the Copeland Medical Center." Becoming a caregiver

Caregiving is one of the most difficult, yet potentially rewarding roles we can ever play. It is most often done for a parent or spouse, but could be for anyone you care about. You can be a caregiver without living in the same house or even the same state as your loved one. If you help make decisions in your loved one's care, you are a caregiver. The role is filled with responsibility and charged with emotion. I had years of social work and counseling experience, but when it came to my own parents, my education, insight and experience seemed so inadequate in dealing with my closest loved ones. I wish there was a six-month course offered to potential caregivers, but since there is not, here are some things to consider.

Planning ahead makes the process easier for everyone involved. It is vital to get Advance Directives (Durable Power of Attorney, Health-Care Surrogate and Living Will) in place before they are needed. Many people mistakenly believe that in signing these papers they are giving over immediate control of these matters. The documents simply state their wishes in the event of incapacity. Without these documents, crisis situations will be much more difficult. Once your loved one signs these documents, you should not question their choices. At this stage, their choices are becoming limited. Respect their wishes in this vital area.

Never promise not to admit your loved one to a nursing home. You cannot see the future and there are conditions that make it impossible to care for them at home. There are circumstances when the most loving thing you can do is to seek the help of a skilled nursing facility. If you have promised never to do it, you will feel undue guilt if the need does arise. Promise only that you'll find the best care possible.

Conduct your own research on the

subject of caregiving and find a support group. Become familiar with available resources in your area. Websites from trusted agencies (AARP, Florida Council on Aging, etc.) are valuable tools. Begin making relationships with key support professionals now, before there is a need. If you don't know what services are available, ask a physician or social worker in your area.

How do you know when it is time to step in? Here is a list of some common signs that additional help is needed.

- Decline in grooming or house-keeping, struggling with tasks they used to do often
- Unopened mail, unpaid bills, etc.
- Decline in socialization
- Inability to keep up with medications appropriately
- Safety issues, i.e. fire hazards, frequent falls, wandering, frequent fender benders, etc.

For any of the above issues, it is good to communicate these changes with your loved one's primary care physician. Sharing your observations with the doctor will help him determine the best course of treatment. If you don't live close to your loved one, you may enlist the help of your loved one's neighbors who care enough to inform you when they observe any of these signs.

Overreaction is never a productive part of any caregiver's plan. It causes us to make hasty decisions that could end up harming our loved one and their quality of life. When noticing a decline in your loved one, don't automatically begin making large changes. Sometimes all that is needed is a change in medication or some additional services that can be delivered to their home, while they remain otherwise independent. Replace overreaction with patience, understanding and careful planning. In order to plan wisely, you must educate yourself on the issues you are dealing with. Large

sweeping changes are much more stressful to older people, so whenever safely possible, change should be implemented gradually.

On the opposite end of the spectrum, indecision is not helpful either. Many people are so afraid of making the wrong decision, or of hurting Mom or Dad's feelings that they don't do anything at all. While understandable, this is potentially more harmful than moving too quickly, as your loved one may be at risk if left without intervention. Thoughtful intervention is actually the most loving thing that you can do if your loved one is no longer capable of taking care of themselves or their affairs.

Always prepare your loved one for changes that are coming. Some families admit a parent to a nursing home without telling them ahead of time. This unfair tactic leaves the parent at risk for depression, illness and falls, and ensures that they will have difficulty adjusting. Even if you do not think your parent will understand what you are saying, tell them anyway. Explain it gently and talk about it as often as they need.

Caregiving is never easy, but if you prepare, build a support system for yourself and give your parent the respect and dignity that they desire, it can be a precious time in both of your lives.

Enjoy a healthy, hassle-free breakfast

You're finally ready for the day, but you've only got five minutes before you need to leave. You haven't eaten breakfast. What do you do; pull through the drive-thru for a bacon, egg and cheese biscuit? Another option is to skip breakfast all together. You're trying to keep away from unhealthy foods and stay within your budget anyway, right?

Two words that often contradict healthy eating are time and money. How can you eat well when you

have no time to fix healthy meals and when healthy ingredients cost so much? All it takes is a bit of planning.

Eating a healthy breakfast does not take as long as you might think. There are plenty of readymade options on your supermarket shelves. Low-fat or nonfat yogurt, string cheese, fresh fruits, dried fruits, granola, bagels and muffins are easy to grab in any combination on your way out the door. If these options don't suit, take a slice or two of vegetarian pizza from the box in

the refrigerator or a bowl of tuna casserole or stir fry and rice from last night's dinner. The idea is to keep breakfast portable and convenient so that skipping and fast food aren't the only choices when time is short.

When you find yourself with a few spare minutes in the morning, make a bowl of oatmeal or a few pancakes for less than 25 cents a serving. (Keep a covered bowl of pancake batter in the refrigerator and the only inconvenience is the time it

takes to heat the griddle or frying pan.) For a few cents more, prepare some brands of instant oatmeal in just 90 seconds.

Skipping breakfast has actually been found to cause weight gain and may lead to increased insulin resistance and the development of diabetes. To keep your body's metabolism running smoothly, consume something in the morning, even if it is just a granola bar, a small bunch of grapes or a large glass of water. You'll feel and look better.



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Power Country 102.1 temporarily suspends broadcast

Station will 're-tool its format' to bring 'improved radio product' this fall

Radio station WQLC 102.1 FM in Lake City temporarily suspended its broadcast effective at 7 p.m. Friday with a projected return for this fall in order for the company "to re-tool its country music format into a much more dynamic and improved radio product," General Manager Scott Savage stated in a press release.

The suspension also affects WGRO 960 AM in Lake City and WNFK 92.1 FM in Perry, all under the Power Country Radio Network umbrella. "Long recognized as the leading radio stations in their communities, owner Nick Bolton is orchestrating their first major overhaul in many

years and plans to bring an exciting new offering to the region when operations resume this fall," Savage wrote.

The stations will continue playing country music when they return in the fall, Bolton said.

He said it was a difficult decision to suspend broadcasting.

"This allows us to dedicate all of our time and energy to brining Northern Florida a new and improved radio network," said Bolton.

Savage told the *Democrat* that nine employees were affected; six full- and three part-time.

"All employees are on a temporary layoff, there were no terminations," said Savage.

WGRO began broadcasting in 1958; WQLC and WNFK since 1990.

More information on the the newly-revamped Power Country will be announced later this summer.

truck when Cole reportedly shot him in the head. He passed away the following day.

Cole then took the gun back into his home.

Guests at the party witnessed the shootings and Cole admitted to shooting the victims.

Cole faces two charges of capital first degree murder.

Pre-trial for Cole has been continued until August. No trial date has yet been set.

Morgan Anna Eilts

Morgan Anna Eilts, 20, 7962 SE 125th St., Jasper, was arrested as a result of the events occurring in Suwannee County during 2010, which caused the death of an infant child.

According to the Suwannee County Sheriff's Office, Eilts admitted to sitting the infant down on a coffee table, bumping its head on the table accidentally too rough. The victim told authorities that she was frustrated and irritable during the month of September 2010.

Eilts told authorities that on one occasion she pulled the three-month-old victim up by her legs, leaned them into her chest and jerked them down. Another time, while frustrated with her husband, Eilts admitted to grabbing the crying victim's arm, squeezing it and bending it. Eilts said she heard a cracking noise where she had her hand, reports show.

During the investigation, Eilts also demonstrated how she had shaken the infant back and forth, holding the baby's shoulders close to the throat.

Records show that Eilts also admitted to holding the infant up in the palms of her hand while in the tub, when the baby accidentally slipped from Eilts' hands and hit her head pretty hard on the bottom of the tub.

According to the SCSO, these events occurred between Sept. 1, 2010 and Oct. 15, 2010. The three-month-old infant died on Oct. 20, 2010, authorities say.

After a lengthy investigation that included gathering medical evidence, Eilts was arrested on Thursday, May 31, 2012, according to records from the SCSO.

Eilts faces charges of aggravated manslaughter on a

child and neglect of a child.

Eilts was previously scheduled for trial on Aug. 26-30, however, her case was continued and will go for pre-trial again on Aug. 12.

Kenneth Glenn Hooker

Kenneth Glenn Hooker, 44, 14439 201st Rd., Live Oak, reportedly stabbed his mother, Rose Lawson, to death on March 25. Hooker said that they had been fighting and the reason he stabbed her was because he just wanted her to listen to him.

Following the incident that occurred around 8 p.m. March 25, Hooker did not call 911 for any medical help. Lawson died as a result of the injury to her chest.

Hooker admitted to stabbing his mother and revealed the weapon he used to law enforcement officers.

Hooker faces a charge of second degree murder.

Hooker was awarded a continuance, but will go back for pre-trial next month. No trial date has been set.

Antonio Rosales

Antonio Rosales, 46, was indicted on Aug. 19, 2011, for first degree murder. He will stand accused of strangling and beating his Suwannee Correctional Institution cellmate, 63-year-old Andres Islas, to death in March 2011.

Third Circuit State Attorney Jeff Siegmeister told the *Democrat* that his office will seek the death penalty.

At the time of the killing, Rosales was serving a life sentence for kidnapping, attempted felony murder and sexual battery on a victim under 12, all offenses from Seminole County originating in 2003, according to the DOC.

Islas was sentenced in 1996 and was serving more than 40 years for armed robbery, grand theft, drug possession and aggravated assault, among others.

Rosales faces a first degree murder charge.

Rosales' case was scheduled for trial on Aug. 26-30. The case was continued and the trial date has been tentatively set for Oct. 21-25.

Gainesville hospital, suffering from multiple skull fractures, and major cuts and bruises. Wrench started showing vast signs of improvement. She awoke from the coma on Tuesday, Aug. 7, 2012.

Just three days later on Friday, Aug. 10, 2012, O'Bryan, 646 St. Andrews Circle, Rantoul, Ill., was arrested by the Champaign County Sheriff's Office in Illinois for attempted first degree murder. O'Bryan was transferred and booked into the Suwannee County Jail on Aug. 20, 2012.

Wrench's mother told the story of how she received the dreadful news of her daughter being found in July 2012.

"They called about a quarter after nine and asked if I was Shannon Wrench's mom. I told them I was and they asked me to call the Suwannee County Sheriff's Office, so I did," Kathleen Bateman said. "That's when Sgt. Chris Fry told me my daughter was in a hospital in Gainesville and she had been in a coma since the 16th day of July and they didn't know who she was."

Bateman made her way to Gainesville where Wrench was receiving medical treatment. Wrench was first admitted to Shands Gainesville for treatment. She remained there until Aug. 27, 2012,

and then was transferred to Signature Health Care in Gainesville for physical, occupational and speech therapy. She was discharged on Sept. 15 to go home.

The sentencing comes after the case remained in the court system for nearly a year. O'Bryan was previously scheduled for trial on Jan. 28 to Feb. 1, 2013, however, O'Bryan's attorney was awarded a continuance during his pre-trial. On July 11, O'Bryan was scheduled for another pre-trial, but this time he accepted a plea bargain and was sentenced.

On Thursday, Wrench was told by a secretary at the Third Judicial Circuit State Attorney's Office O'Bryan had accepted the plea bargain.

"The defense attorney originally offered 10 years in prison and 10 years of probation, but we didn't feel that was enough time behind bars," Bateman said. "We counter offered 15 years in prison with five years of probation so he could be monitored after his release, and Shawn accepted that."

Bateman continued, "We had no problem returning to Florida for trial, but we didn't want him to be found guilty on a lesser charge, which would always be a possibility with a jury trial. We did not want that possibility; we wanted

him guilty of attempted first degree murder."

"Now that the legal part is over, it's a sigh of relief for us. Most importantly, we're glad society will be protected from him," Bateman said.

Wrench said she is doing well and continues on the road to recovery.

"I'm doing pretty good," Wrench said. "I just started with a program that will help me with school and

job training. I'm just exploring my options."

Regarding Wrench's health concerns, Bateman said her daughter has more good days than bad now, although there are some physical effects from the incident she still battles.

"We can finally move on with life and put this behind us. Shannon can close that portion of her life and move on," Bateman said.

Gluten Free

Many people are adopting gluten-free diets for a variety of reasons. While such a diet means passing on foods that contain wheat protein, such as certain breads, crusts and baked goods, it doesn't mean giving up on grains entirely. Many grains are acceptable for those adhering to a gluten-free diet, and such grains can help fill the void left by avoiding wheat products.

Gluten-free foods are required for people who have Celiac disease, an autoimmune condition of the small intestines that is triggered by the consumption of wheat protein. Celiac disease can cause damage to the lining of the small intestines, which results in a decreased absorption of nutrients. This can cause vitamin deficiencies that deprive the body and brain of necessary nourishment.

While people with Celiac disease have to avoid foods that contain gluten, many more people choose to remove gluten from their diets. This includes people with gluten allergies or sensitivities that are not as severe as Celiac disease but can cause some gastrointestinal discomfort. The relationship between gluten and certain behavioral problems in children and adults also has been studied. In a paper titled "Developmental Disorders and Dairy Products, Grains, Gluten and Other Proteins," researchers at the Bamford-Lahey Children's Foundation found that sensitivity to proteins in both dairy and wheat has been associated with a number of neurological and behavioral disorders in groups of adults and children.

To avoid gluten, a person has to remove wheat products, barley, spelt, rye, and triticale from his or her diet. However, there are many other foods that can be eaten. Plus, flours made from grinding other grains can be used in place of wheat flour in recipes. The finished products may just have less of the doughy or elastic consistency that is a hallmark of gluten. Here are some grains men and women on gluten-free diets can still enjoy.

* Oats: Though they are traditionally gluten-free, oats are often processed on the same equipment that processes other grains. Therefore, there may be some cross-contamination. Oats that are certified gluten-free can be more costly.

* Buckwheat: Despite the name, buckwheat is not related to regular wheat and is not exactly a grain. It is a relation of rhubarb. In its whole form it can take the place of pasta. In its roasted form, buckwheat takes on a nutty flavor.

* Millet: This is a seeded plant used for grain and cereal production. Millet is typically sold in pet stores as a treat for birds. Millet is generally flavorless and can be grainy. It can be mixed with other gluten-free flours.

* Quinoa: This is not a grass plant or cereal grain but is actually related to leafy vegetables. Quinoa is often eaten like you would eat rice or pasta, but it can also be baked into bread and cakes.

* Montina: This is made from Indian rice grass and can be milled into flour or combined with other flours in a baking blend. Montina bakes up into a springy texture, which makes it popular in breads.

* Rice: Many people avoiding gluten turn to rice as an alternative. Rice flour can be substituted for wheat flour in many recipes. Rice can also create a sense of fullness that comes with eating a starchy grain.

* Corn: Cornmeal can be used in baked goods. However, it will offer a grainy texture.

* Amaranth: This is a tiny, ancient grain. It is a complete protein and has more iron than most grains.

People following a reduced or gluten-free diet can enjoy a number of other alternatives in their cooking.



Although wheat flour needs to be avoided when adopting a gluten-free diet, many other grains can still be enjoyed.

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Fresh air and fresh faces:

NBC takes viewers to 'Camp'

There's no doubt about it, starry nights and sweltering days mean summer is in full swing.

For millions, sleepaway camp is the ultimate summer adventure, and TV viewers who don't make it out to the woods can enjoy summer camp hijinks in the comfort of their own living rooms. NBC's "Camp," which airs Wednesday, July 24, takes place at Little Otter Family Camp, where proprietor Mackenzie Granger (Rachel Griffiths) struggles to keep the lakefront establishment afloat.

NBC has billed the show as a "dramedy" (with elements of both comedy and drama), but the trailer the network released on nbc.com/camp really plays up the comedy angle with one character getting snagged by a fishhook in the mouth while another is duped into climbing a tree by some "mean girl" types.

A series set in a summer camp must have seemed like a good idea in the dead of winter, which is when NBC executive Jennifer Salke announced "Camp." She praised the concept, claiming "we developed a scripted dramedy we love with BermanBraun (the company that produces the show) that has rich and dysfunctional characters in that great setting where millions of families and young people go each summer: camp. Most of us have had great experiences at camp, and this show... is sophisticated, funny and emotional, and we think it will be the ideal summer series for us."

The network initially ordered 13 episodes of the series, but scheduling conflicts had forced the number down to 10 by February, and filming was set to begin in Australia in March. Despite the reduction, NBC has thrown its weight behind the series with promotion, probably in part because of the success the network has had with co-creator Liz Heldens, who worked on the NBC hit "Friday Night Lights." She created "Camp" with Peter Elkoff, who was a co-producer on Heldens' "Deception" for NBC.

Once the series was announced, casting got underway and producers quickly snagged Academy Award nominee Griffiths to headline as recently divorced single mom Granger. Hailing from Australia, the actress burst onto the worldwide film scene while

starring alongside Toni Collette in "Muriel's Wedding" (1994). She earned an Oscar nod for her turn as Hilary in the 1998 British film "Hilary and Jackie." American audiences became familiar with Griffiths when she appeared in "My Best Friend's Wedding" (1997) and "Blow" (2001). She transitioned to U.S. television as Brenda Chenoweth in HBO's "Six Feet Under," a role that earned her a Golden Globe. Her work in ABC's "Brothers & Sisters" later earned her two Emmy nominations.

Griffiths may be the big-name draw, but "Camp" boasts a talented ensemble cast. Fellow Australian Rodger Corser plays Roger Shepard, the attractive owner of the rival upscale camp across the lake who offers to buy Little Otter. His career began as

a singer in such bands as Tender Prey, Stone the Crowes and Side-show Bob before his breakout role in a 1998 Australian production of "Rent." He's best known Down Under for his role as Detective Senior Sergeant Steve Owen in the TV miniseries "Underbelly," but his other TV credits include "Last Man Standing," "Home and Away" and "McLeod's Daughters."

Nikolai Nikolaev, another Australian actor, forms the third point in a potential love triangle involving Granger and Shepard. As Little Otter's charming young handyman Cole, he may have eyes for Granger. Nikolaev is most recognizable due to his role as Leo in the Australian TV series "Sea Patrol." He's also appeared in "Power Rangers Jungle Fury" and "Crash Zone."

The series is truly a family affair with storylines for both parents and their teens. Some of the fresh-faced actors may be virtually unknown now, but they have potential. In a May LA Times.com article, Griffiths praised her young co-stars, boasting "the kids are just unbelievable. I feel the show is going to be a nursery for another generation of stars."

"Camp" marks the television debut for Charles Grounds, who portrays Granger's 15-year-old son, Buzz. Determined to hook up with a member of the opposite sex by the end of the summer, Buzz acts as a counselor-in-training (CIT) at the camp. A graduate of 16th Street, Melbourne's premier acting studio for film and television, Grounds appeared in the short film "Why Ryan Is on Detention" (2013), and on stage in "Helicopter" and "Floyd Collins."

Thom Green (not to be confused with Canada's comedian/actor Tom Green) tackles the role of Buzz's newfound buddy Kip Wampler, another CIT with a secret. The actor is most famous for his turn as Sammy in the Australian series "Dance Academy," and also appeared in the webseries "Halo 4: Forward Unto Dawn."

Kip falls hard for Marina Barker (Lily Sullivan), a CIT who wants to use her experience at Little Otter to re-invent herself. Sullivan made her big-screen debut opposite Griffith's former co-star Collette in "Mental" (2012), for which she was honored with nominations from the Australian Academy of Cinema and Television Arts and the Film Critics Circle of Australia.

Tim Pocock and Dena Kaplan star as senior counselors and lovebirds Robbie and Sarah, who've had an ongoing love affair at the camp since they met three years ago. Apply for disability benefits from the convenience of home

Have you been thinking about applying for Social Security disability benefits, but you are unable to visit a Social Security office to complete the interview? Or perhaps your disabling condition makes it difficult to visit a Social Security office. We have good news: you can complete your application for Social Security disability benefits from the convenience of your home. Get started at www.socialsecurity.gov/disability.

The application process involves determining 1) whether you have sufficient work to be eligible for Social Security; 2) the severity of your medical condition; and 3) your ability to work. Because we carefully review so many cases — more than three million each year — it can take us three to five months to determine whether you are eligible to receive benefits.

The amount of time it takes to make a decision on your application can vary depending on a number of factors, such as:
the nature of your disability;
how quickly we obtain medical evidence from you, your doctors, hospitals, or other medical sources; and
whether we need to send you for a medical examination to obtain evidence to support your claim.

We have several important initiatives to speed up the process. For example, our Compassionate Allowances initiative allows us to fast-track certain cases of individuals with very severe disabilities. Two hundred different types of disabilities qualify for this expedited decision, and the list continues to expand. Since Compassionate

Allowances began in 2008, the agency has fast-tracked more than 250,000 disability applications, getting benefits to people in a matter of days instead of months. Learn more about Compassionate Allowances at www.socialsecurity.gov/compassionateallowances.

Another way we speed up decisions is with our Quick Disability Determinations initiative, which uses technology to identify applicants who have the most severe disabilities and allows us to expedite our decisions on those cases. There are things you can do to help speed up the decision process too. The more information you provide up front, the less time it will take us to obtain the evidence we need — and the faster we can make a decision on your application. The types of information we need include:
