## County seeks \$3M from Columbia for catalyst site

The Suwannee County Board of County Commissioners is seeking \$3 million from neighboring Columbia County to assist with funding the development of the catalyst site, according to a letter from Suwannee County Commissioner

Wesley Wainwright.

On Dec. 16, Wainwright sent a letter to Dale Williams, Columbia County's administrator, asking them to partner with Suwannee County by the means of a \$3 million investment into their site.

"To date we have spent \$6.7 million exhausting our cash reserves," Wainwright wrote. "In an effort to

continue the unobstructed development of the site we are asking Columbia County to consider investing \$3 million against a proportional share of future ad valorem revenue."

As of Dec. 13, Suwannee County had invested a total of \$8,725,457.43 on projects at the catalyst site. Of that amount, more

than \$6 million was county taxpayer money while the rest was grant money (state taxpayer money).

The county is currently advertising for proposals from loaning institutions for approximately \$4 million to cover contracts with JB Coxwell Contracting for work at

## County to retain former Suwannee Landing property

No plans to sell property, says county administrator

Suwannee Landing property will be retained by the county following settlement of a lawsuit and will not be sold at this time, according to County Administrator Randy Harris.

When Third Circuit Judge David Fina rendered his judgment on Aug. 23, he ordered the county to pay \$2.75 million to TSS Development, former owner of Suwannee Landing property, for breaching a development agreement. Fina also ordered the county to pay TSS Development \$68,145 for 19.47 acres that was conveyed to the county by the developer.

In 2006, TSS Development entered into an agreement to develop the county's property into an upscale flying community. In their developing efforts, TSS Development owner Fred Treadway deeded 19.74 acres to the county for the

## PotashCorp to continue as major community partner

A look at the history of the Suwannee River Chemical Plant

With the recent massive layoff at PotashCorp White Springs and the eventual closure of the Suwannee River Chemical Plant this year, the effects on Hamilton and neighboring counties as a whole should be minimal, according to Public

Affairs Manager Mike Williams.

As previously reported, White Springs Agricultural Chemicals, Inc (PotashCorp White Springs) announced Tuesday, Dec. 3, that it will permanently close the Suwannee River Chemical Plant – one of two plants at the White Springs facility – during the second half of this year. Initial closure activities resulted in an immediate reduction of 248 people. Final closure later this year will result in an additional reduction of approximately 100 people; a cumulative reduction of approximately 50

248 personnel were immediately impacted by the layoffs. This reduced PotashCorp's workforce by 18 percent.

## Lake City woman dies in Suwannee crash

A Lake City woman died from injuries sustained in an early Sunday morning crash in Suwannee County, according to the Florida Highway Patrol.

Records show that on Sunday, Jan. 5 at 1:40 a.m., Heather Nicole Raulerson, 33, Lake City, was traveling south on

CR 137 near 192 Street in Suwannee County in a 2000 Ford F250 pickup. Raulerson entered a left hand curve and partially drove onto the southbound shoulder with the right side tires. She over-corrected and steered left crossing both lanes and traveled into the northbound ditch. Raulerson then over-corrected again and steered right. The pickup began rotating clockwise and as it

re-entered the northbound lane it overturned ejecting the driver. Raulerson, who was not wearing a seatbelt, was pronounced deceased at the scene, reports state.

Two passengers, Devin Raulerson, 13, and Shelby Raulerson, 12, both of Lake City, sustained serious injuries in the crash and were transported to Shands UF Gainesville, FHP stated.



# Politics and minimum wage

There's little debate among academic economists about the effect of minimum wages. University of California, Irvine economist David Neumark has examined more than 100 major academic studies on the minimum wage. He reports that 85 percent of the studies "find a negative employment effect on low-skilled workers." A 1976 American Economic Association

survey found that 90 percent of its members agreed that increasing the minimum wage raises unemployment among young and unskilled workers. A 1990 survey reported in the American Economic Review (1992) found that 80 percent of economists agreed with the statement that increases in the minimum wage cause unemployment among the youth and low-skilled. If you're searching for a consensus in a field of study, most of the time you can examine the field's introductory and intermediate college textbooks. Economics textbooks that mention the minimum wage say that it increases unemployment for the least skilled worker. The only significant debate about the minimum wage is the magnitude of its effect. Some studies argue that a 10 percent increase in the minimum wage will cause a 1 percent increase in unemployment, whereas others predict a higher increase.

How about the politics of the minimum wage? In the political arena, one dumps on people who can't dump back on him. Minimum wages have their greatest unemployment impact on the least skilled worker. After all, who's going to pay a worker an hourly wage of \$10 if that worker is so unfortunate as to have skills that enable him to produce only \$5 worth of value per hour? Who are these workers? For the most part, they are low-skilled teens or young adults, most of whom are poorly educated blacks and Latinos. The unemployment statistics in our urban areas confirm this prediction, with teen unemployment rates as high as 50 percent.

The politics of the minimum wage are simple. No congressman or president owes his office to the poorly educated black and Latino youth vote. Moreover, the victims of the minimum wage do not know why they suffer high unemployment, and neither do most of their "benefactors." Minimum wage beneficiaries are highly organized, and they do have the necessary political clout to get Con-

gress to price their low-skilled competition out of the market so they can demand higher wages. Concerned about the devastating unemployment effects of the minimum wage, Republican politicians have long resisted increases in the minimum wage, but that makes no political sense. The reason is the beneficiaries of preventing increases in the minimum wage don't vote Republican no

matter what; where's the political quid pro quo?

Higher-skilled and union workers are not the only beneficiaries of higher minimum wages. Among other beneficiaries are manufacturers who produce substitutes for workers. A recent example of this is Wawa's experiment with customers using touch screens as substitutes for counter clerks. A customer at the convenience store selects his order from a touch screen. He takes a printed slip to the cashier to pay for it while it's being filled. I imagine that soon the customer's interaction with the cashier will be eliminated with a swipe of a credit card. Raising the minimum wage and other employment costs speeds up the automation process. I'm old enough to remember attendants at gasoline stations and theater ushers, who are virtually absent today. It's not because today's Americans like to smell gasoline fumes and stumble down the aisles in the dark to find their seat. The minimum wage law has eliminated such jobs.

Finally, there's a nastier side to support for minimum wage laws, documented in my book "Race and Economics: How Much Can Be Blamed on Discrimination?" During South Africa's apartheid era, racist labor unions were the country's major supporters of minimum wage laws for blacks. Their stated intention was to protect white workers from having to compete with lower-wage black workers. Our nation's first minimum wage law, the Davis-Bacon Act of 1931, had racist motivation. Among the widespread racist sentiment was that of American Federation of Labor President William Green, who complained, "Colored labor is being sought to demoralize wage rates."


From a reader,



of-the-art sawmill and is expected to create up to 350 jobs at full operation.

Williams said the request from Suwannee County has not gone before the Columbia County commissioners.

"Before it goes before the board, I am going to send a letter to Wesley requesting additional information," Williams said. "It will be considered, we just need more information."

The letter stated Columbia County would be entitled to a proportional share of future ad valorem revenue, but is aware of the

tax abatement provided to Klausner that will last a decade. According to Commissioner Jason Bashaw, the abatement is 100 percent for 10 years on improvements only, not land property tax.

County Administrator Randy Harris said the funds requested from Columbia County are not tied to the loan the county is seeking.

"This is something completely separate," Harris said.

Harris said there would be mutual benefits as stated in the letter. Wainwright

cited Suwannee Correctional Institution, which currently employs 237 residents of Columbia County.

"Realizing that we live in a very mobile society, commuting to work is common. With commuting there are economic benefits at both ends of the drive," Wainwright wrote. "We would like to see this relationship grow and correspondingly encourage further economic development between our counties."

Wainwright was not available for any additional comments.

purpose of this project.

In February of 2007, construction began on the project formerly known as Suwannee Landing. The world-class amenities were designed to include an exercise facility, swimming pool, community room and nature trails. At least 114 of the 250 plus homes that


would have been built would have had hangars to accommodate plane owners. Pilots would have easy access so they could taxi onto the Suwannee County Airport runway just west of the airpark, commonly known as a "through-the-fence" agreement.

The county agreed with this project in the first stages of its development,

but later withdrew their support after being informed that the Federal Aviation Administration ruled that allowing use of the county airport for such use was "in conflict with (FAA statutes)." Although the FAA would not stop the county from allowing Suwannee Landing residents to use the runway, it would, however, withhold federal airport funds from the county should it proceed with the agreement with TSS.

When the county refused to move forward with TSS, it put the project at a standstill and later evolved into a lawsuit from TSS. After several years in the court system, the case was resolved in August 2013.

The 19.47 acres previously deeded to the county will remain in the county's hands for now and as part of the Suwannee County Airport.

## PotashCorp to continue as major community partner

percent from current levels.

Williams stressed that the reduction in force at PotashCorp-White Springs was based upon operational and workforce changes, not only locally, but at all PotashCorp sites. The announcement/rollout of the event was coordinated to be released at all sites simultaneously so that everyone was informed at the same time.

"While this was a difficult decision, it was a business decision, not a personal one, and based upon the continued sustainability of the company during a downturn in the global market," said Williams. "These reductions should keep White Springs as a strong and viable operation, while adding approximately five years to its lifespan. PotashCorp is here to stay for many more years."

PotashCorp, he said, will still be a major employer for the surrounding counties with about 350-400 employees, as well as be a major taxpayer and community contributor.

The 248 personnel impacted by the layoffs so far are as follows: Alachua County-1, Baker County-2, Columbia County-91, Hamilton County-68, Madison County-2, Suwannee County-71, and Echols/Lowndes County, Ga.-13. Of the 248 personnel laid off, 27 percent lived in Hamilton County and 28 percent lived in Suwannee County.

"While this was a significant event for our regional area, it was not focused on any one county," said Williams.

"At this time, we cannot accurately predict how a partial closing of the PotashCorp plant will affect the assessment of its property in 2014 or future years," remarked Hamilton County Property Appraiser David Goolsby. "Real and tangible personal property (TPP) values are determined as of January 1 of each year."

The actual closure date of the Suwannee River Chemical Plant will be sometime

during the second half of this year, according to Williams. Some portion of the plant may operate and be in production, based upon demand until that time.

**History**  
The Suwannee River Chemical Plant (and mine) groundbreaking was Oct. 31, 1964, with a \$35 million investment by Armand Hammer, President and CEO of Occidental Petroleum Corporation (Oxy). By today's standards that investment amount would be somewhere in the range of \$255 million.

PotashCorp purchased all outstanding shares of White Springs Agricultural Chemicals Ltd. from Oxy in 1995. They have not only been a significant part of the local economy, but also very active in the local communities for the past 18 years.

"This investment and membership in our local communities will continue," said Williams.

From 1964 to the present, Suwannee River Chemical Plant was a part of the local economy.

"Our granulation plants, Swift Creek Mine and Mill, and Swift Creek Chemical Plant will continue to be a part of our local economy with hundreds of employees and strong involvement in our communities," Williams said.

PotashCorp will continue to develop its phosphate resources for use in fertilizers that will be necessary globally, due to population growth and increased agricultural demand. PotashCorp is engaged in the global process of helping to feed the world by providing quality plant and animal feed nutrients.

Williams noted that historically things change over time for many reasons, based upon a myriad of contributing factors. Populations of towns such as White Springs ebb and flow, he said, from a high of around 1,500 to a low of 770.

In Hamilton County the local economy was forestry, timber, naval stores, farming and tourism. The

sawmills disappeared, as did the naval stores, and then the interstate highway was completed. Some factors were based upon economy, technology and the marketplace, Williams explained. When the phosphate industry came to Hamilton County in the 1960s it provided a significant boost to the economy, but was not meant to be the sole source of the economy.

"It provides significant tax revenue (approximately 47 percent), which equates to about \$1.2 million, based on tons of phosphate severed for economic development and major expenditures in the millions with local vendors," said Williams. "It has been a source of employment for 50 years ranging from over 2,000 employees at its height to the current hundreds it employs today."

Things change. The industry changed, automation improved and the manufacturing process was streamlined over the years, noted Williams.

"In today's business climate, you have to compete in a global marketplace," Williams explained. "To do so, you must evolve and change with the industry to be successful. PotashCorp is doing that and will continue to be an industry leader because of its ability to evolve over time to meet the challenges of today and the future."

**Plant closure**  
Williams said when the Dec. 3 announcement of the Suwannee River Chemical Plant closure hit the streets, a shockwave rippled through the communities.

"There were stories everywhere," Williams said. "Understandably so. This event reduced the company's workforce by 18 percent."

PotashCorp, Williams said, is doing everything possible to assist impacted personnel through this challenging period. Those laid off are drawing pay for 60 days and will receive appropriate severance packages. PotashCorp is also working with North Florida Workforce Board to provide a resource fair to assist them.

Colbert Croft passes

Prolific gospel songwriter, evangelist and singer remembered

**He began what is today the Suwannee River Jubilee at The SOS Music Park**

One of America's premier gospel songwriters, the Rev. Colbert Croft, formerly of Jasper, passed away from this life in Valdosta early Jan.1 following a long illness.


Colbert Croft was known throughout America as a prolific gospel songwriter with his lovely and musically talented wife Joyce. Their 5,000 plus gospel songs have become standards in the gospel music industry.

The Crofts were part of the Suwannee River Jubilee held at The Spirit of the Suwannee Music Park (SOSMP) in Live Oak for the past 25 years.

"He was the fellow who made the key contact with the Florida Boys' Les Beazley," said SOSMP co-founder Bob Cornett. "Les Beazley headed up the Florida Boys' gospel group at that time," Cornett said. "The Dixie Echoes were a part of it, and they put it (the Jubilee) on together. But Colbert was the main man that made the deal originally and called the Florida Boys to set it up," Cornett said of the beginning of the Jubilee. Colbert and Joyce hosted the Bean Supper every year on Wednesday night before the three-day gospel sing began. A gospel concert followed the bean supper. Joyce said she and Colbert led the morning worship every morning during the Jubilee each year. Both were involved in the event throughout the first 25 years celebrated in 2013.

The Crofts were married nearly 50 years and were traveling evangelists who spread the gospel through music, song and Colbert's preaching. Colbert's love of the Lord was exemplified by his willingness to help others, share his music and always offer a helping hand to those trying to break into gospel music or in need.

Colbert founded and pastored Faith Chapel in downtown Jasper. It was here he would invite numerous famous gospel groups to stop by and sing. Many of those groups would ask for any new songs available from the couple and of course, Colbert always had a compilation disk ready, according to long-time friend, The Rev. Randy Lamb of Brunswick, Ga. "I would sing the new songs for the compilation disks," he added. Randy also recorded, "Daddy Had A Friend," written by the couple. It went to #88 on gospel charts in 1988, Lamb said. "I never knew if Colbert wrote that song about my granddaddy who was an old-time preacher or how he got the words, but it described my granddaddy, the Rev. Jack Lamb, perfectly." Lamb, a former youth leader and evangelist who is also a gospel singer and pastor, said he saw God use Colbert to heal people several times over the years, but Colbert never told anyone God had used him in that way. "He had

the gift of healing," Lamb stated emphatically.

Gospel's Best Words and Music Song Book lists the names of 525 of the best gospel songs which includes the following songs written by the Crofts: "The Future's Looking Brighter," "I Believe He Died For Me," "I can't Even Walk (Without You Holding My Hand)," "I'm The Reason" and "Is That Footsteps I hear?" The Crofts' names are listed in this book among the best gospel songwriters such as Rogers and Hammerstein, Bill and Gloria Gaither, Rusty Goodman, Mylon LeFevre, Kris Kristofferson, Marion W. Easterling, Cleavant Derricks, Reba Rambo, Aaron Wilburn, Eddie Crook, Dottie Rambo, Wally Fowler, Albert E. Brumley, Adger M. Pace, Squire Parsons, Gov. Jimmie Davis, Ralph Carmichael, Elton John, G.T. Speer, J.D. Sumner, Jack W. Campbell and more.

One of their songs, "Flow Through Me Holy Spirit," was translated into the Navajo language by Guy James and recorded on video for the Navajo nation to hear the word of God in their language. County music great Marty Stuart recorded the Crofts' "I Can't Even Walk" on his 13th album, Souls' Chapel. The album was nominated for a Dove Award for Country Album of the Year in 2006 at the 37th GMA Dove Awards. The song was also included in 16 Great Southern Gospel Classics, Vol. 2.

Perhaps the most well-known of all, "I Can't Even Walk (Without You Holding My Hand)," a standard in Southern gospel, was recorded and sung by many and included in The Worlds' Greatest Southern Gospel Songs (50 Southern Gospel Classics) edition.

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 7, at Perimeter Road Baptist Church in Valdosta. Viewing and family visitation was Monday, Jan. 6, from 5 - 7 p.m. at Carson-McLane Funeral Home, 2215 N. Patterson Street, Valdosta, Ga. Burial was at Evergreen Cemetery in Jasper, Fla.



# Finding hunting success on small-acreage leases

Many people think you need a large tract of land for hunting to harvest a mature buck. But for a lot of us, leasing a large chunk of property is just not financially feasible. So I'm here to tell you that you don't need a large tract of land if your small hunting lease is in the right spot and you manage your herd correctly and let the young bucks walk.

My wife and I lease a little patch of woods less

than 30 minutes from where we live and work. It's barely 20 acres but has provided us some nice hunting over the past couple seasons.

So we've made our little lease as good as we can make it. We've got corn and soybean feeders and mineral rocks out. We hire a good friend to bring over his tractor, and we plant cool-weather and warm-weather food plots twice a year.

There's a flock of turkeys on the property and

a small deer herd. We're familiar with the deer that use the property because of the game cameras we have out and from what we see with our own eyes.

This season, we decided not to shoot any does during the archery and antlerless deer seasons because we want to increase our herd. There are a few young bucks, including a 6-pointer, which we've seen and passed on because we want to give them the chance to grow another year or two, giving us

something nice to go after in the future. But there were two nice, mature 8-points that we have seen on camera for the past two years, and those were the only two deer that we were going to target this season, unless some other mature bucks showed up.

The dominant buck in the herd, however, was a 4.5-year-old 8 point with a heavy and very symmetrical rack and a white patch of hair between his shoulders. That's the deer I set my sights on. We named

him "Blaze" - a fine Florida buck.

During one short, afternoon sit, there was a steady, northeast wind, perfect for our favorite tree stand. I had only about 45 minutes to hunt before dark. Soon as I settled in, two does stepped out of the woods and into the food plot followed, by a spike. It was the pre-rut period, and we were seeing more deer activity, especially bucks, during daylight hours.

After Olustee Festival 2003, we formed a group called the Historical Sewing Society out of a need to gather and share our research regarding accurate clothing for civilian living historians and reenactors for the Civil War Era. In addition to the desire to present a "period correct" appearance by dressing as authentically as possible, the need to understand the proper etiquette, behaviors and basic issues of daily life, particularly pertaining to women, was also essential. Our goal, as representatives of the Museum and in our roles of living historians continues to be to portray rural, Southern yeoman farmer class women. No frills, no makeup, complete with proper head coverings, aprons and of course the requisite "underpinnings" and a correct handicraft or activity that would have occupied the time of women of the 1800's. Initially it appeared that knowing how to make candles, soap and operate a spinning wheel would have been sufficient ammunition to prepare us for any event that we would participate in, but such was not the case!! There is SO much more to know about Southern women and what they endured particularly during


the years of the Civil War! Research quickly went from learning HOW to look and act like the ancestors we were attempting to commemorate and portray to understanding what they truly endured during their lives. The hardships and deprivations that the women, children and elderly folks who were "left behind" when the able bodied menfolk went off to war are recorded in many diaries. In spite of the poverty and deprivations endured by the South, women in cities and small rural settlements still banded together to form organizations such as "Soldier's Aid Societies" to help meet the needs of the poor Confederate Soldiers by making "comforts" (a primitive quilt), socks, clothing and foodstuffs to be delivered to the frontlines.

Hopefully this little synopsis will make you want to know more about the lives of civilians here in our area during the Civil War.

Things looked promising.

I enjoyed watching the three deer graze on oats, wheat and rye, and I heard the turkeys fly up to roost at sunset. The does were still upwind but started acting strange, and one of them put its tail up and started blowing. They all ended up running off.

I decided to give it a last-ditch effort by doing a multiple-note "tending" grunt call. There were about five minutes left of legal shooting hours, and I started gathering my things together when the flash of my old-school game camera went off.

Something had just walked in front of the camera: a deer, and a pretty good-sized one at that.

I slowly picked up my rifle and looked through the scope. It was a racked buck,

but it was hard to tell if it was one of the younger bucks that we didn't want to shoot. The buck was looking right at me, and I knew I didn't have much time to make a decision. That's when he bent down to feed and I saw the white patch on his back! That's when I knew it was Blaze!

"Buck fever" immediately set in; my heart just went to poundin' and my hands a-shakin'. This was the deer I'd been hunting for two seasons. This was the dominant buck of our little patch of woods, and I needed to pull myself together and make a good shot.

Time was running out, my hands and breathing were all over the place, and Blaze was facing me, not presenting me with the shot I wanted. All of a sudden he turned to his left and gave me his right shoulder. I managed to calm down and

steadied the crosshairs on his right shoulder. I slowly squeezed the trigger.

After the recoil, I could see the buck's white belly, laying on the ground right where he had stood. I immediately climbed down and walked over to my trophy buck. His 172-pound body and perfect rack were just as grand as they looked on all the game cam pictures.

And the shot placement was right on the money and humane. My .270-caliber bullet found its mark, killing the deer instantly.

So it just goes to show you that you don't need a large piece of land to find hunting success. All you have to do is put in a little time providing year-round, quality food sources, and if you want the chance to shoot a mature buck year after year, let the young bucks walk, and manage your deer according to the herd size.

And another thing – some hunters say they don't like the game cams that use flash photography because that scares off big bucks. Well, not only did my old-school cam not scare away Blaze, but if it hadn't flashed, I may not have known he was even there.

I hope you enjoyed a great Christmas holiday, and I wish you a very happy new year. Remember, you can get big things from small packages, and deer season is not over yet in central and north Florida. And I still have that other big 8-point deer running around somewhere on our little piece of hunting paradise too.

# Crappie anglers enjoy a happy new year



By Bob Wattendorf

Welcome to 2014. Black crappie are favorite cool-weather targets for freshwater anglers, so join the fun, check your fishing license (License.MyFWC.com) and the list of top sites and tips below and go fishing. What better way to start off a new year than with some healthy outdoor activity and a mess of fresh fish?

Crappie are among the most popular freshwater fishes in Florida. Their deep body with nearly symmetrical dorsal and anal fins and a speckled pattern on the body make them easy to distinguish. Crappie spend much of their time offshore, feeding on small fish. This time of year they will be preparing to spawn and, as the temperatures reach 62-65 degrees Fahrenheit, they move inshore to build nests in colonies. Nests over gravel or muddy bottoms in depths of 3-8 feet are fanned by males.

Crappie eat crustaceans, insects and small fishes. A bright, 1/16-oz. to 1/8-oz. jig or Hal-flies will produce once they are inshore. If they are schooling offshore, drift Missouri minnows or grass shrimp below a float, with a #4 hook and small split shot. Depth is key, as crappie school at the same level, so experiment until you find the right depth.

Crappie (aka speckled perch or papermouth) longer than 14 inches or heavier than 2 pounds qualify for a Big Catch angler-recognition certificate (www.BigCatchFlorida.com). Youth under 16 can participate with an entry longer than 10 inches or heavier than 1.5 pounds. Easy registration makes people eligible for both Big Catch and TrophyCatch (which rewards anglers for catching-documenting-releasing largemouth bass heavier than 8 pounds), as well as a drawing to take place in October 2014 for a Phoenix bass boat powered by Mercury.

Looking for the best places to go? Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) fisheries biol-

ogists compile annual lists of top fishing sites for bass, crappie, bream, catfish or striped bass. It is available at MyFWC.com/Fishing (select "Freshwater" and "Fishing Sites and Forecasts"). You can also find quarterly updated regional forecasts for other key water bodies, with links for more current information. Here are the selections for your best black crappie fishing in 2014, as compiled by Cheree Steward, FWC fisheries biologist.

## Stay healthy when the sick season of sneezes and sniffles arrives

The cold weather brings with it a season of smiles, the first snowfalls and, unfortunately, cold and flu outbreaks. While everyone else is suffering, there are ways you can make it through the season unscathed.
