ble for the vandalism in custody. Michael W. Brown, 46, of 3216 Baxter Ave., in Sebring; 18-year-old Cody S. Dayfert, of Zolfo Springs; and a 13-year-old Sebring boy, whose name is being withheld by the News-Sun because of his age, were arrested Thursday afternoon and charged with

multiple counts of shooting into a building, grand theft of fire extinguishers and felony criminal mischief. Additional charges — many of them felonies — are expected to be

Hunter's secret to making it to 106? 'Goodlooking women'

feeling Pern Hunter was a bit of a rascal when he was young. Asked the secret of living to celebrate his 106th birthday he said, "Good-looking women."

On the other hand, he was married to one woman for 74 years. They met when he worked on the street where she lived. He whistled at her whenever she walked by and "it just kind of developed," Hunter said, adding they never had children. "I was too ornery to have

His wife is buried in a nearby mausoleum. Hunter says he looks forward to lying beside her again.

In the meantime, he spends time sitting in his wheel chair, basking in the sun. Surrounded by people at the Royal Care assisted living center, he is alert and enjoys reminiscing. Although his sight

age 106 is fading, when he smiles, his eyes twinkle.

Born in 1907, Hunter grew up in Missouri. His first clear memory is delivering newspapers during Word War I while in elementary school. He worked after classes and on the weekends, saving \$500 in three or four years. He put all his money in the bank and learned an early lesson.

"The bank went broke and I lost all my money," he said. His parents relocated the family to Vancouver, Wash., where Hunter worked at a variety of occupations — from a job in a shipyard to making work boots. Economic times were rough; jobs were hard to come by and keep.

SEBRING — It isn't often students get to meet an honest-to-goodness NASA astronaut. Joseph Acaba flew on the STS-119 Discovery mission and in a Soyuz TMA-04M spacecraft to the **International Space Station** where he served as a flight engineer from May 15 to

Born in Puerto Rico and raised in California, Acaba studied geology in college, earning a master of science degree. After working as a hydrologist and middle school science teacher, he was accepted into NASA's astronaut training program in

bathroom, but students wanted to know a lot more. What do astronauts eat? Dehydrated food in packets, to which water is added. It sounds terrible, Acaba said, but "was not that bad."

What was the difference between the American shuttle and the Russian Soyuz? The shuttles landed and rolled down a runway. The Soyuz is a capsule, it just comes down landing on the ground. "Landing was like falling off a 10-story building," Acaba said.

He showed a film of life aboard the space station. The students learned there are no showers. A rinseless special soap is used instead. They learned that astronauts have to exercise everyday in

space, running a treadmill and lifting weights, and that they return to Earth a fraction of seconds younger than when they left.

Acaba taught the students that just because an object is weightless without gravity, it still has substance, or mass.

For example he said, a space suit on Earth weighs 300 pounds. In space it is light, easy to pick up and throw. If it hits another individual, however, the mass of the suit knocks them over.

Astronauts are the NASA employees one sees the most, Acaba said. "But don't forget there are many other great jobs at NASA. You've got to do math and science.

Acaba loves being a NASA astronaut. He told the students, "I'm not a real smart guy, but I went for it. You have to like what you

He told students, "I'd love to go to Mars. That's a trip I'd like to take. The reality is it will be your generation that gets to go."

"The kids loved him," said Debbie Wood, a teacher on special assignment who arranged the visit. "It began as a special program for our migrant students, and then it grew. We hope to excite interest in science, technology, engineering and math."

Speaking of technology, astronauts use a device similar to a camp toilet when they go to the bathroom. A vacuum system takes the place of gravity.

Sebring Council to discuss sidewalks, signs Tuesday

sgholar@newssun.com SEBRING — Council members will revisit a few items Tuesday evening, including a discussion on the reconstruction and replacement of sidewalks the Woodlawn Subdivision.

Building and zoning code officer Lee Tolar presented the proposal to fix some cracked and damaged sidewalks within the area in February. Council members agreed to table the item in order to take some time to look at the proposed areas.

The council discussed the idea of leaving some streets without sidewalks rather than putting in new ones to cut down on the costs of the replacement and refurbishment of existing, damaged

Tolar was given the go ahead to replace damaged areas, but the Council will discuss what to do about the costs of the rest of the project. Tolar has spoken with a representative from the Public Risk Management office to verify what can and can not be done about the missing and partial sidewalk

The council members will also revisit the sign ordinance. Council members requested City Attorney Bob Swaine to amend the city's sign code to accommodate Bountiful Blessings Church of God. The church is seeking a larger sign, comparable to the neighboring church signs in the area, to be placed in front of their building.

The amendment could

allow for free-standing lighted ID signs of not more than 32 square feet at places of assembly (with persons 25

City Administrator will Scott Noethlich is also requesting an executive session to discuss collective bargaining issues. City officials and the firefighter's union will meet to hash out the issues between the two entities following the special magistrate's recommendations, which were received last week.

Council meeting will be held at City Hall at 6 p.m.

(Sebring business owners) getting the windows fixed."

A silver minivan was identified as the suspect vehicle on Tuesday, according to a press release from the HCSO, and other clues pointed to three people being involved.

That evening, the release said, Deputy Jason Mulligan pulled over a van that matched the description and found that the occupants inside matched the description of the suspects.

The three were questioned by investigators, and those interviews led to the arrests.

"This was a great job of collaborating together to come to the successful conclusion of these cases,"

Autopsy: buried baby's death ruled a homicide

HALLANDALE BEACH (AP) — The death of Dontrell Melvin — whose tiny bones were found buried in the backyard of a Hallandale Beach home in January after the boy had not been seen for 18 months — was ruled a homicide by the Broward Medical Examiner's office, according to Hallandale

Beach Police. The report went on to say that cause of death was "vio-

lence of undermined means." With the baby's death now ruled a homicide, the parents could face more serious charges. Britney Sierra, 21, and Calvin Melvin, 27, are both currently in jail. She faces neglect charges and he faces charges of giving police false information.

On March 8, the University of North Texas lab confirmed through DNA that the remains are "approximately 31.2 trillion times more likely" to be the biological child of Sierra and Melvin than any other individuals.

The parents, who were arrested in January, have told different stories as to how the boy disappeared.

On Jan. 9, police officers learned that baby Dontrell was missing after a Department of Children & Families investigator visited the home the couple shares with Sierra's mother Renee Menendez. The agency had received a call that Sierra doing drugs in front of the children.

The agency had been called several times about Sierra and her mother - who has four younger children. But no one notice Dontrell had been missing since July 2011.

On Jan. 11, both parents

were questioned by police. Earlier this month, the Broward state attorney's office released documents that included statements from both

Sierra and Melvin. Sierra told investigators that if the baby died then "Melvin did it." When she was asked how he would have killed the child, she replied Melvin would have used the blue pillow in his stroller to suffocate him.



ANOTHER VIEWPOINT Scott's weaknesses remain just that ... weak

Telcome to Gov. Rick Scott's re-election nightmare: He runs for a second term, and his chief rival's perceived weakness somehow becomes his chief rival's most surprising strength.

That rival would be Charlie Crist, former governor. He hasn't announced he wants his old job back but he has raised his profile, hitting the lecture circuit and turning up on TV news shows. Sure looks like politicking.

After governing as a Republican, Crist became an independent and then switched to the Democratic Party. That earned him the enmity of Republicans statewide, who denounced him as a turncoat and an unprincipled flip-flopper. We've criticized him on this editorial page, too.

But not everyone is a Republican. In a

survey of 1,000 registered Florida voters conducted in mid-March by the Quinnipiac (Conn.) University Polling Institute, Crist won a hypothetical 2014 race against Scott. Fifty percent of the respondents wanted Crist; only 34 percent wanted Scott.

Here's the bombshell: Half of the respondents said Crist's switch to the Democratic Party showed he is a practical fellow. Considerably less, 40 percent, had a problem with it.

"Those numbers," said Peter Brown, assistant director of the institute, "indicate Republicans will have a tough job turning around Crist's lead over Scott by reminding voters of Crist's evolution."

Republicans will have a tough job anyway. Voters have never warmed up to Rick Scott. They elected him over Democrat Alex Sink, but the Quinnipiac poll shows they'd pick Sink today, 45 percent to 34 percent.

It's not that Scott hasn't tried. He's done his share of flip-flopping, most changing positions on Medicaid expansion and teacher pay raises, in an obvious attempt to seem "moderate." His reward? Fellow Republicans call him a RINO and legislators ignore his proposals.

Poor Rick Scott. His weaknesses aren't turning into strengths. They're just ... weaknesses.

TDC proposal will hinder growth

As a Highlands County resident since 2006, I have enjoyed our community and the variety of stimulating activities and events it provides. I am concerned that the new proposal the Tourist Development Council will soon present our county commissioners will hinder the growth of our blossoming talent and profitable art/culture industry.

I express my opinion now, because I have followed the local papers and reports of the TDC's history of art/culture neglect. As a member of the Heartland Cultural Alliance, I also believe in the research done and HCA's advocacy of "Art and Culture" as a TDC percentage funding category, among other recommendations (see http://heartlandculturalalliance.org/TDCordi

nance.html). The TDC is apparently pleasing portions of the county's community. It doesn't have to change anything that's working well – just needs to improve on what has been neglected. "The way I see it is she's 101 years old, she can do whatever it is she wants," Daisy said.

Dennard's short-term memory is fading and a doctor recently diagnosed her with dementia.

"He said that it's going to get worse but it is amazing, she can remember something that happened years and years and years and years ago. She's knows how old she is most of the time, but sometimes she will say that she is 99," said Daisy.

Dennard's family has been holding big celebrations for her birthday since she turned 87. Each year, friends and family join together to celebrate Dennard's impressive life. For her 100th birthday last year, 65 people gathered.

Cleaner gas rule would mean higher price at pump

WASHINGTON — The administration's newest anti-pollution plan would ping American drivers where they wince the most: at the gas pump. That makes arguments weighing the cost against the health benefits politically potent.

The proposal to reduce sulfur in gasoline and tighten auto emission standards, released Friday, would raise gasoline prices by less than a penny per gallon, the Environmental Protection Agency says. But the oil industry points to its own study putting the cost between 6 and 9 cents a gal-

The EPA also said its proposal would add about \$130 to the price of new vehicles, beginning in 2025.

The administration says the costs to consumers are worth the payoff: billions of dollars in health benefits from reductions in smog- and soot-forming pollution.

The agency predicts \$7 in health benefits for every dollar spent to implement the new rules. The agency must hold public hearings before finalizing the rules. It plans for them to take effect in

The proposal was praised by environmentalists and health advocates, as well as automakers who say it will help the U.S. catch up with the cleaner fuels used in other nations. California already uses the sulfur stan-

EPA Acting Administrator Bob Perciasepe said the proposal is designed to "protect the environment and public

prices are stubbornly high already and Americans shouldn't have to pay more. The oil industry, Republicans and some Democrats had urged the EPA to hold off on proposing the tighter regula-

"With \$4 a gallon gas the norm in many parts of the country, we cannot afford policies that knowingly raise gas prices," House Energy and Commerce Chairman Fred Upton said Friday. Instead, the Obama administration should work to increase energy supplies by approving the Keystone XL oil pipeline from Canada and other projects, said Upton (R-

Rep. Ed Whitfield (R-Ky.), who is chairman of the energy and power subcommittee, called the sulfur rule "another example of an overzealous EPA" and said lawmakers would give it a hard look.

Environmentalists hailed the proposal as potentially

the most significant in President Barack Obama's

The so-called Tier 3 standards would reduce sulfur in gasoline by more than 60 percent and reduce nitrogen oxides by 80 percent. It would make it easier for states to comply with healthbased standards for the main ingredient in smog and soot. And the regulation would allow automakers to sell the same vehicles in all 50 states.

The Obama administration already has moved to clean up motor vehicles by adopting rules that will double fuel efficiency and putting in place the first standards to reduce the pollution from cars and trucks blamed for global warming.

"Together, these standards represent the largest step in our nation's history toward reducing harmful emissions from the vehicles we drive every day," said Michelle Robinson, director of the clean vehicles program of the of Concerned Scientists, an environmental

group for scientists.

Robinson said the rules would reduce asthma, respiratory problems and premature death.

"We know of no other air pollution control strategy that can achieve such substantial, cost-effective and immediate emission reductions," said Bill Becker, executive director of the National Association of Clean Air Agencies. Becker said the pollution reduction would be equal to taking 33 million cars off the road.

But the head of American Fuel and Petrochemical Manufacturers, Drevna, questioned the motives behind the agency's regulation, since refining companies already have spent \$10 billion to reduce sulfur by 90 percent. The additional cuts, while smaller, will cost just as much, Drevna said.

"I haven't seen an EPA rule on fuels that has come out since 1995 that hasn't said it would cost only a penny or two more," Drevna

A study commissioned by the American Petroleum Institute estimated that lowering the sulfur in gasoline would add 6 cents to 9 cents a gallon to refiners' manufacturing costs, an increase that likely would be passed on to consumers at the pump. The EPA estimate of less than 1 cent is also an additional manufacturing cost and likely to be passed on.

Unemployment fell in February in 22 U.S. states

WASHINGTON Unemployment rates fell in

22 U.S. states in February from January, a sign that hiring gains are benefiting many parts of the country.

The Labor Department said Friday that unemployment rates rose in 12 states and were unchanged in 16.

Nationally, the unemployment rate slid to a fouryear low of 7.7 percent in February, down from 7.9 percent in January. Since November, employers across the country have added an average of 200,000 jobs a month, nearly double the average from last spring.

States hit hardest during the recession are showing improvement.

In Nevada, unemployment dropped to 9.6 percent last month, down from 11.8 percent a year ago. That's the biggest yearover-year decrease among states.

One reason for the big drop is that people have stopped applying for jobs. Nevada's work force those working or looking for work — fell nearly 1 percent in the year through February. Only those looking for work are counted as unemployed. But hiring accelerated, too: Jobs in Nevada rose 2 percent over the past year.

Unemployment California fell to 9.6 percent last month, down from

California and Nevada are still tied with Mississippi for the nation's highest unemployment rate. North Dakota once again held the nation's lowest unemployment rate.

10.8 percent in February

California and Nevada still tied Mississippi for the nation's highest unemployment rate.

Florida's job market has also rebounded in the past year. The Sunshine State's unemployment rate fell to 7.7 percent in February, down from 9 percent a year

North Dakota once again held the nation's lowest unemployment rate, at 3.3 percent. The state is benefiting from a boom in oil and natural gas production. Nebraska had the secondlowest rate, at 3.8 percent.

Overall, 42 states added jobs in February from January, and just eight lost jobs. The biggest monthly job gains came in Texas (up nearly 81,000) California (up more than 41,000).

In the 12 months up to February, Texas gained nearly 294,000 jobs, and California 128,000. On a percentage basis, North Dakota reported the fastest job growth over the past year, rising 5 percent.

US consumer spending, income jump in February

AP Economics Writer WASHINGTON — U.S. consumers stepped up spending in February after their income jumped, aided by a stronger job market that offset some of the drag from higher taxes. The gains led economists to predict stronger economic growth at

the start of the year. Consumer spending rose 0.7 percent in February from January, the Commerce Department said Friday. It was the biggest gain in five months and followed a revised 0.4 percent rise in January, which was double the initial estimate.

Americans were able to spend more because their income rose 1.1 percent last month. That followed huge swings in the previous two months, which reflected a rush to pay bonuses and dividends in December before taxes increased.

After-tax income also increased 1.1 percent last month, allowing consumers to put a little more away. The saving rate increased to 2.6 percent of after-tax income, up from 2.2 percent in January.

The gains in spending and income follow other signs of an economy gathering momentum. Hiring is up, businesses are spending more, the stock market is hitting record levels and the housing recovery is strengthening.

More spending by consumers should boost economic growth in the January-March quarter after a lull at the end of last year. Consumer spending accounts for 70 percent of economic activity.

seeing Friday's report on consumer spending, Paul Ashworth, chief U.S. Capital at economist Economics, raised his growth forecast for the first quarter by a full percentage point. Ashworth now expects growth in the January-march quarter increase to an annual rate of 3 percent.

Growth at that pace would be a vast improvement from the 0.4 percent rate in the October-December quarter, which was held back by slower company stockpiling and the sharpest defense cuts in 40 years.

Ashworth called the boost in spending "impressive," noting that consumers spent more while having to adjust to the higher Social Security taxes and a spike in gasoline

"We're now likely to see the fastest quarterly gain in real consumption in two years," he said. Jennifer Lee, senior econo-

mist at BMO Capital Markets, said the increases suggest consumer spending could be growing in the first quarter at an annual rate of would be the fastest gain in more than three years and more than double the 1.3 percent rate in the fourth quarter.

Inflation, as measured by a gauge tied to consumer spending, increased 1.3 percent in February compared with a year ago. That's well below the Federal Reserve's 2 percent target, giving the central bank room to keep stimulating the economy without having to worry about price pressures.

Consumers spent more at the start of the year even after paying higher taxes. An increase in Social Security taxes has reduced take-home pay for nearly all Americans receiving a paycheck. And income taxes have risen on the highest earners. The tax increases both took effect on

One reason the tax increases haven't slowed the economy is companies have accelerated hiring and are slowly steadily increasing wages.

their kids - not to mention often having to cope with drastically lowered income because of reduced work hours or having to pay someone else for childcare. So it's not surprising that many of these parents haven't had time to hatch a long-term financial plan in case their kids need care after they're not around.

Fortunately, many government programs and community resources are available to help relieve the financial burden of parenting special needs children. But eligibility criteria are complicated and the application process time-consuming. Plus, if you're not careful, you or well-meaning relatives could inadvertently disqualify your kids for future benefits by not structuring their inheritances correctly.

Here's a brief overview of key government assistance programs:

The Social Security Administration provides two types of disability coverage: Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Income (SSDI). Rules and eligibility requirements differ between the two programs - and benefits differ for children and

In a nutshell, SSI is a needs-based, cash-assistance program for disabled people of any age in low-income families with limited resources. Children qualify for SSI benefits if they meet certain strict criteria outlined in SSA Publication 05-11000 (www.ssa.gov/pubs/11000.ht

SSDI is a separate program funded by payroll deductions (part of FICA). Although children sometimes receive SSDI payments if their parents are disabled, their eligibility is based on their parents' disability status, not on their own. However, after turning 22, already disabled children may qualify for SSDI on their own if at least one parent qualifies for Social Security benefits.

Eligibility rules and defi-

nitions for SSI and SSDI are complex. To see if your child qualifies, call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213, or search the Disability and SSI tabs at www.ssa.gov. One particularly helpful resource is "Benefits for Children with Disabilities," SSA Publication No. 05-

Many families inadvertently jeopardize their disabled child's eligibility for government-provided benefits by opening accounts in the child's name or designating them as beneficiaries. Unfortunately, federal law dictates that recipients of SSI, Medicaid and many state assistance programs will be disqualified if they have resources worth over \$2,000. So, if Uncle Jerry leaves your daughter \$10,000 in his will, she could lose her benefits.

One good alternative is to create a special needs trust, whose assets can be used by its trustee to manage the finances and personal effects of a disabled person. Trusts are governed by state laws and should only be drafted by an attorney familiar with this area of law.

Some parents name the trust as beneficiary of life insurance policies to ensure a source of funding if they die before their child. (Stay current on your premiums.) Other possible funding sources include cash, stocks and other investments, retirement plan death benefits, home sale proceeds and inheritances from other relatives and friends. Just make sure that the trust - not the child – is named beneficiary.

Preparing a special needs trust can be expensive - possibly several thousand dollars, depending on your situation. But weigh that against the prospect of your child losing out on a lifetime of government-provided benefits because of an accidental inheritance – speaking of which, be sure to let any well-meaning relatives or friends know about the trust.

UPS pays \$40M to end online pharmacies probe

SAN FRANCISCO Shipping company UPS agreed Friday to pay \$40 million to end a federal criminal probe connected to deliveries it made for illicit online phar-

The U.S. Department of Justice announced that the Atlanta-based company would also "take steps" to block illicit online drug dealers from using their delivery service.

The DOJ said the fine amount is the money UPS collected from suspect online pharmacies. UPS won't be charged with any crimes. Its biggest rival, FedEx Corp., has also been a target of the federal investigation.

The investigation of the two companies stems from a global campaign to shutter illicit online pharmacies launched in 2005. Since then, dozens of arrests have been made and thousands of websites closed worldwide as investigators continue to broaden the probe beyond the operators.

Earlier this week, Chris Napoli, the operator of Safescripts Online, was sentenced to four years in prison and ordered to forfeit \$24 million in revenue the illicit pharmacy took in between 2004 and 2006. Two other men were sentenced to prison

along with Napoli. Receipts from UPS and FedEx were used as evidence in the trio's trial last year.

Panel backs health coverage for part-time workers

MIAMI — A Florida House panel approved a measure Thursday to offer health insurance to the 8,737 of the state's part-time employees and their family members instead of paying a hefty fine under the federal health

The panel could have decided to cap part-time employees to working 30 hours per week or chosen not to provide any health coverage, which would result in a \$318 million fine under the Affordable Care Act.

Republican Rep. Carlos Trujillo said during a hearing in Tallahassee that capping state employees' hours would save the state \$55 million the first year.

"But we're making a policy deci-

sions that it's important to offer insurance to those that are working less than 30 hours," he said.

The state's part-time employees work in jobs from janitors and seasonal positions to high-ranking executives in the university systems.

The proposal would offer them coverage under the lowest level bronze health plan, instead of the higher, more benefit rich plan offered to regular state employees. That bronze plan would save about \$2,000 per employee a year, said Trujillo, R-Doral.

Several Democrats pushed to offer all state employees the same coverage. Rep. Perry Thurston (D-Fort Lauderdale) asked the panel to look at cost figures for silver and gold health plans, but Trujillo warned the costs

would be astronomical.

"We do have a fixed budget. We can't run a deficit. If we're going to decide as a chamber to offer a platinum plan, as some of the members have suggested, where do we get the money from. Do we take it from education? Do we take it from corrections," Trujillo said.

Democratic Rep. Dwight Dudley proposed including an option that would allow part-time employees to pay more if they wanted to bump up to a higher benefit plan.

A Senate panel also recently agreed to extend coverage to part-time employees, estimating it will cost about \$137 million a year.



Be on the lookout for barred owls and their young

Right now is an exciting time of year if you're an owl fan. Barred owls are in the process of nesting and have more than likely laid their eggs recently. For some mother owls, the hatchlings have found their way out of the eggs and are in the process of fledging. Mother barred owls lay from two to four eggs per clutch. Hatching takes place about four weeks later and the young owls

fledge between four and five weeks after hatching. The nests are usually in a tree cavity that was created by another bird such as a pileated woodpecker or a previous nest of a hawk or a crow.

Nestlings are brooded by the female, but the male brings home the food. The new owl's eyes will open after about seven days. Once they start to fledge, they will begin to venture out to nearby branches. At about six weeks, they venture out and learn to fly. The parents of the new fledglings will care for them for about six months.

Once they reach adulthood, barred owls are large birds with gray-brown and white coloration that sport bar patterns on their chests. It is fairly easy to identify a barred owl because of its round head and lack of ear tufts. Unlike other owls that have yellow eyes, this owl has brown eyes. Their beaks are a dull yellow color.

Even though this owl looks very large, most of what you see is feathers. Despite its size, these owls only weigh about one pound.

As adults, barred owls are mostly loners. They only live as family groups from the breeding season until the babies are ready to go out on their own. Mating pairs will

Another distinctive feature of the barred owl is its call. They have what is termed "a two-phased hoot," which sounds a bit like they are saying, "Who

cooks for you? Who cooks for you all?" These interesting creatures have other calls including mating calls, hoots and the sounds of the nestlings begging for food.

Like other birds of prey, barred owls are carnivorous and dine on small mammals, other birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish and invertebrates. Since they swallow their food whole, the animal cannot be of too large a size. If they do happen to capture a bigger animal, they rip it apart with their razor sharp talons and beak. They may store some of the prey in their nests or cavities to be devoured later. The owl's talons also serve as skewers to grab prey they have spotted from a perch high above. It is an amazing sight to see the graceful, silent bird swoop down and grab the unsuspecting prey.

Once these amazing animals have had their fill, hours later they will cough up the indigestible parts of the prey. Bones, fur and feathers end up in a one- to two-inch cylindrical pellet, which can be found on the ground near their nest.

Barred owls have excellent eyesight. Their big round eyes are designed so they can gather light, which enables them to see in the dark. This is vital to the predator

since they are mostly nocturnal hunters. All owls look forward, so what they see is the same object from two completely different angles, giving them a three dimensional view, similar to the way we see things. Unlike humans, the owl's eyes do not move within the socket, therefore if they want to look around, they have to move their entire head.

Barred owls are also blessed with exceptional hearing. They hear similar to the way they see, in three dimensions. Their ear openings are faced forward so that their face actually works as a mechanism to divert sound waves to their ears. The ear opening on the right is higher than the left opening, which enables each ear to pick up sounds from different angles. Their hearing is so sharp that they can locate prey in the dark even if they can't see it.

Owls are interesting creatures to be sure. One of the important functions they serve is keeping the rodent population in check. So next time you're out walking and you

hear the distinctive call, look around and see if you can spot the barred owls nearby. You can be sure it has spotted you.

Wise owl facts: (The Cornell Lab of **Ornithology**)

The great horned owl is the most serious predatory threat to the barred owl. Although the two species often live in the same areas, a barred owl will move to another part of its territory when a great horned owl is nearby.

Pleistocene fossils of barred owls, at least 11,000 years old, have been dug up in Florida, Tennessee, and Ontario.

Barred owls don't migrate, and they don't even move around very much. Of 158 birds that were banded and then found later, none had moved farther than six miles away.

Young barred owls can climb trees by grasping the bark with their bill and talons, flapping their wings, and walking their way up the trunk.

The oldest barred owl on record was at least 24 years old



Barbara Walters to retire in 2014

NEW YORK — Barbara Walters plans to retire next year, ending a television career that began more than a half century ago and made her a trailblazer in news and daytime

Someone who works closely with Walters said the plan is for her to retire in May 2014 after a series of special programs saluting her career. The person was not authorized to discuss the matter publicly and spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity Thursday.

Walters, 83, was hospitalized earlier this year after falling and cutting her head while leaving a party in Washington and remained out of work after developing the chickenpox. Largely retired from ABC News already, her main work is at "The View," the daytime hit she created in 1997.

Her television career began in 1961 when she was hired as a writer for the "Today" show. She graduated quickly to on-air work and became the show's co-host before leaving in 1976 to become co-anchor of ABC's evening news with Harry Reasoner — the first woman in such a role for a television

The pairing ended quickly and Walters

settled into a role as ABC News' cajoler-inchief, competing ferociously to land newsmaking interviews with heads of state and stars of the day. She regularly did interview specials, including an annual show with the most fascinating people of the year, and was co-host of "20/20" for two decades, much of the time with Hugh Downs.

She described "The View" as the "dessert" of her career, a regular gathering of women chatting about the hot topics of the day and interviewing visiting presidents

'Harry Potter' actor Richard Griffiths dies at 65

LONDON — Richard Griffiths was one of the great British stage actors of his generation, a heavy man with a light touch, whether in Shakespeare or Neil Simon.

But for millions of movie fans, he will always be grumpy Uncle Vernon, the least magical of characters in the fantastical "Harry Potter"

Griffiths died Thursday at University Hospital in Coventry, central England, from complications following heart surgery, his agent, Simon Beresford, said. He was 65.

"Harry Potter" star Daniel Radcliffe paid tribute to the actor Friday, saying that "any room he walked into was made twice as funny and twice as clever just by his presence."

"I am proud to say I knew

him," Radcliffe said.

Griffiths won a Tony Award for "The History Boys" and appeared in dozens of movies and TV

But he will be most widely remembered as a pair of contrasting uncles — Harry Potter's Uncle Vernon Dursley and Uncle Monty in cult film "Withnail and I."

Griffiths was among a huge roster of British acting talent to appear in the "Harry Potter" series of films released between 2001 and

His role, as the grudging, magic-fearing guardian of orphaned wizard Harry, was small but pivotal. Griffiths once said he liked playing Uncle Vernon "because that gives me a license to be horrible to kids."

But Radcliffe recalled Griffiths' kindness to the

"Richard was by my side during two of the most important moments of my career," said Radcliffe, who in 2007 starred with Griffiths in a London and Broadway production of "Equus."

"In August 2000, before official production had even begun on 'Potter,' we filmed a shot outside the Dursleys', which was my first ever shot as Harry.

"I was nervous, and he made me feel at ease.

"Seven years later, we embarked on 'Equus' together. It was my first time doing a play, but, terrified as I was, his encouragement, tutelage and humor made it a joy."

Earlier, Griffiths was the louche, lecherous Uncle Monty to Richard E. Grant's character Withnail "Withnail and I," a low-budget British comedy about two out-of-work actors that has become a cult classic. Years

Top publisher speeds up e-book access for libraries

NEW YORK — The publisher of Khaled Hosseini, Harlan Coben and other popular authors has decided that it's comfortable with letting libraries offer ebook editions of brand new releases.

Starting Tuesday, libraries can offer e-books from Penguin Group (USA) at the same time that the hardcover comes out, a switch from the previous policy of delaying downloads for six months, the publisher told The Associated Press. While vastly more e-books are available to libraries compared with a few years ago, Penguin and other publishers have limited digital access for fear of losing sales. American Library Association has been calling for less restrictive terms.

"I am pleased to learn that Penguin's pilot is confirming what research suggests and librarians believe: There is more to be gained than lost when publishers work with libraries," association president Maureen Sullivan said in a statement. "We are encouraged by Penguin's willingness to experiment, make adjustments and move forward with libraries and our millions of readers." Penguin has for months been

tracking e-book usage at libraries through pilot programs around the country. The effect of library downloads on commercial revenues has been acceptable and the publisher was comfortable with making new releases available, the director of online sales and marketing, Tim McCall, said Wednesday. That means libraries can provide eeditions of Hosseini's "And the Mountains Echoed" starting with its official date of publication, May 21.



Americans oppose paying for restoring beaches

WASHINGTON

More than 4 out of 5 Americans want to prepare now for rising seas and stronger storms from climate change, a new national survey says. But most are unwilling to keep spending money to restore and protect stricken beaches.

The poll by Stanford University released Thursday found that only 1 in 3 people favored the government spending millions to construct big sea walls, replenish beaches or pay people to leave the coast.

This was the first time a large national poll looked at how Americans feel about adapting to the changes brought on by global warming, said survey director Jon Krosnick, a professor of political science and psychology at Stanford.

The more indirect options the majority preferred were making sure new buildings stronger and reducing future coastal develop-

New building codes rated the highest with 62 percent of those surveyed favoring it.

Three in 5 people want those who are directly affected by rising seas to pay for protection, rather than all taxpayers.

Krosnick said the low favorability of sea walls and sand replenishment "reflect the public's fatalistic sense that it's more realistic to just give up the beach than to try to save it when other storms in the future will just wash it

away again."

The nationally representative survey of 1,174 conducted Americans online by GfK Custom Research has a margin of error of plus or minus 4.9 percentage points.

Man, 86, gets probation in Ariz. mercy killing

PHOENIX — An 86-yearold man who carried out a mercy killing by shooting his ailing wife and high school sweetheart in the head was sentenced Friday to probation after an emotional hearing where family members tearfully spoke on his behalf.

George Sanders could have faced more than 12 years in prison after pleading guilty to manslaughter. The judge, who complimented the prosecutor for being "courageous" in recommending probation, allowed Sanders to walk out of the courtroom.

Judge John Ditsworth said his sentence of two years' probation was "individualized and tempers justice with

"It is very clear that he will never forget that his actions ended the life of his wife," Ditsworth said as Sanders stood at a podium, his hands clasped and shaking.

"In this set of facts, there was a perfect storm of individual circumstances which placed Mr. Sanders in a position where had to make a decision," Ditsworth said. "This set of facts hits close to home for all of us."

Sanders, wearing khakis and a white sport coat, spoke for only a minute about his love for his 81-year-old wife, Virginia Sanders, who he calls Ginger.

"The family very much loved their mother," prosecutor Blaine Gadow told the judge Friday as he recommended a sentence of probation, noting the "very unique, difficult circumstances of this case."

"I don't know where our society is going to go with cases like this, judge," Gadow said. "At this point in time, what Mr. Sanders did was a crime."

However, he added, "No one in the courtroom has forgotten the victim in this

dant's son, then spoke on behalf of his father, telling the judge the family never wanted him to be prosecuted.

"I want the court to know that I loved my mother dearly," he said. "But I would also like the court to know that I equally love my father."




