## Lack of 'curb appeal' hurting Avon Park?

The City Council is asking for residents to volunteer to see if they have interest in reviving a code enforcement board.

### Council asks for interest in code enforcement board

AVON PARK — The city is looking at bringing back a code enforcement board.

The Avon Park City Council voted at its last meeting to ask city residents who have an interest in serving to contact city hall.

The question came up when Charles Devlin, president of

Devtech Sales Inc., told the city council he believes the city hasn't had enough commercial growth thanks to a lack of "curb appeal."

"Main Street and Lake Avenue look wonderful," Devlin said. "It just hasn't caught on throughout the city."

He said littering is a problem. He's taken a 50-gallon garbage bag along Lake Avenue at Bell Street — near the Avon Park Middle School — and

filled it up within a one-block area.

He also said he has seen blue tarps still used to cover roofs, outside walls in disrepair, and fences — that may not have been permitted — made up of chicken wire, hog wire and tarps. With dropping property values from the recession, he said the city has a whole group of homeowners who shouldn't own

with violence, battery on a law enforcement officer and intentionally placing of food in such a manner that attracts a black bear.

Musselman was let out of the Highlands County Jail March 7 on a pre-trial release program.

## IDA/EDC gets \$97,585 from commission

SEBRING — Highlands County commissioners Tuesday voted unanimously to approve a request to fund the Highlands County Industrial Development Authority to the tune of \$97,585.

The money will come out of the county's reserve for contingency fund, so it will not increase the budget for the

current fiscal year.

During their budget session this past August, commissioners had instructed the IDA/EDC to operate on its savings and go to the private sector to see what kind of support they could find there.

That effort reportedly was able to bring in about \$30,000 to the Economic Development Commission side of the

**Motorcycle passenger killed in collision**

LAKE PLACID — A motorcycle passenger died Sunday and the rider was critically injured after a Ford van crossed their path.

Mary T. Yanka, 49, of Lehigh Acres, died at the scene on U.S. 27 at Lake Mirror Drive in Lake Placid. Stephen P. Yanka, 49, also of Lehigh Acres, is in critical condition at Lee Memorial Hospital in Fort Myers, according to Florida Highway Patrol reports.

Both were wearing helmets, reports said. FHP does not have results on whether or not alcohol was involved.

The other driver — Harold W. Holthaus, 80, of Sidney, Ohio — was charged with failing to yield the right of way.

Reports state that at 11:21 a.m. Sunday, the Yankas were riding a 2011 Kawasaki southbound on U.S. 27 in the inside lane. A 2001 Ford van was stopped on Lake Mirror Drive at the stop sign for U.S. 27.

The van started to cross over the southbound lanes and attempted to stop in the median crossover, but was still in the motorcycle's path. The front of the Kawasaki hit the left side of the van, throwing both Stephen Yanka and Mary Yanka onto the road, south of

the intersection.

The motorcycle stayed at the point of impact while the van continued northeast, crossed the northbound traffic lanes and stopped facing northeast in the east-bound lane of Carver Street, also called Josephine Avenue, in the Highway Park subdivision.

Despite not wearing a seat belt, Holthaus was uninjured. His three passengers, all wearing seat belts, were also uninjured: Patricia A. Holthaus, 67, also of Sidney, Ohio; Maurice R. Boeke, 79, of Minster, Ohio, and Grace A. Boeke, 74, also of Minster, Ohio.

**SAR honors deputies for undercover operation**

**Senate passes bill to ban gun owner discrimination**

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The Senate passed a bill that would make it illegal for insurance companies to deny policies or charge higher rates solely based on gun ownership.

The bill passed Tuesday on a 36-3 vote.

Supporters have said some insurance companies would prefer not to

insure gun owners and others have a different set of rates. They want to make it illegal to discriminate against a citizen who is exercising their constitutional right to own firearms.

Some insurance companies say there is greater risk of claims from gun owners.

# Citrus Labels and Crate Expectations opens at MoTA

# Local unemployment numbers up and down

SEBRING — The January unemployment numbers for the state of Florida have been released and it appears to be a rather mixed bag. For Highlands County, of the estimated 40,546 people in the workforce, there were 2,980 reportedly off the job.

That translated to a 7.3 percent unemployment figure here. It was a few tenths of a percent up from December's even 7 percent, but down from January 2013 when Highlands had 8.9 percent of the labor force said to be out of work.

"Part of that appears to be the impact of holiday hires who were let go after Christmas or after New Year's," said Donna Doubleday, executive director of CareerSource Heartland. "We generally see a bit of a spike in December because of those seasonal hires."

The state of Florida showed an estimated 6.3 percent unemployment rate, which was season-

ally adjusted to 6.1 percent. The state's joblessness rate was projected downward slightly from December's seasonally adjusted 6.3 percent and January 2013 when the number was an even 8 percent.

State officials say getting January's employment figures to the public so late is the result of a process called "benchmarking." That process is done each March by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, which makes a number of revisions to the state's historical data.

"What happens right now is that they recalculate by looking at the actual figures based upon information from employers using the tax-based system," she said. "That gives a truer figure. The January numbers really reflect that."

Because of the process and new information, February's numbers are set to be announced at the end of next week.

## No help for mentally ill

What does a community do to protect itself from individuals who are mentally ill and in need of medical intervention and pose a hazard to themselves or others? Two recent incidents make this an urgent question in Highlands County.

Mary Musselman, 81, was arrested in January when she would not, or could not, stop feeding black bears on her property. It was a difficult situation. Because bears lose their fear of humans when they are fed, they will approach houses in search of food. This creates a risk of harm to people, so "friendly" bears are killed.

Musselman, however, is reported to be struggling with Alzheimer's disease. Many people do not think she should be incarcerated, as they feel she can't be held responsible for her behavior.

Then there is the case of Floyd Gene Hodge, 31, who was shot and killed by sheriff's deputies March 9 when he refused to put his AK-47 down after shooting "dozens" of rounds into his neighbors' homes.

Hodge's wife had been afraid of his behavior and had asked for help. On March 9, Sheriff Susan Benton said, "How do we intervene with people? The family feared it would end up like this."

In fact, the state has attempted to deal with just these sorts of situations. In 1971, the legislature passed the Florida Mental Health Act. This statute, known as the Baker Act, provides legal procedures for mental health examination and treatment. If individuals are a danger to themselves or others, they may be ordered to a Florida Department of Children and Families designated receiving facility for an observation and examination period of 72 hours (three days).

The need for this kind of intervention facility is growing greater. According to DCF statistics, between 2002 and 2011, there was a statewide increase of 50 percent in involuntary exams. In 2011, 150,000 individuals were Baker Acted.

The only designated facility in our area is Peace River in Bartow. It serves Highlands, Hardee and Polk counties with a 30-bed capacity. According to its website, Peace River served 11,234 individuals in 2010. Not all those individuals were at Peace River as the result of a Baker Act, but there isn't always room.

It is also inconvenient to Highlands County and impossible to reach without private transportation.

For years, the sheriff's office has wanted a DCF designated receiving facility with a crisis stabilization unit opened here. We strongly agree.

One reason an elderly, infirm woman ended up in jail is because there was nowhere else safe to put her. One reason a young man, driven by demons, was shot and killed is there had been no place for his family to go for help.

It is time to provide the mentally ill and their families crisis intervention. Everyone is safer.



## Government advice on affording ObamaCare

"Look, if you want ObamaCare, you are just going to have to make some better budgeting decisions."

the government's fault that you probably hoarded inefficient incandescent light bulbs that waste heat and burn more energy. People like you cause your own problems."

"Gasoline prices are out of sight. Federal gasoline taxes aren't helping and the government is not letting refineries expand. With global demand for gas growing, prices will keep going up. We can't afford gas on my salary now."

"You are driving an SUV, aren't you? For your own good, the government bailed out GM and lost \$10 billion in taxpayer money — and promoted environmentally friendly electric and hybrid cars in the process. They get way better mileage than

your SUV."

"We can't afford a Chevy Volt. Are you listening? We can't afford any of the things our expanding federal government is foisting on us — at least of all ObamaCare. You promised to make health insurance less expensive, but costs are soaring!"

"Such ingratitude. Look, smart people in Washington have been making important decisions that you simply are not smart enough to make yourself."

"Really? Then why does Medicare Part D, a successful entitlement program that provides drugs to the elderly poor, work so well? Under Part D, seniors are free to choose among a variety of benefits, costs and plans offered by private insurers. According to the Heartland Institute, Medicare trustees estimated a 2013 average monthly cost of \$61 — the actual costs are HALF that."

"Look, there have been some bumps in the road, but that's partly because people like you aren't getting with the program."

"Getting with the program? You imposed a massive overhaul on a health system that the majority of Americans were happy with.

You forced the policies to cover things many people don't need or want and you imposed all kinds of new taxes. It would have been cheaper and easier to leave the existing system intact and give subsidies to people of modest means to buy their own policies."

"How selfish you are being. We need everyone in the pool for this thing to work. Sure, people who can pay will pay more to subsidize people who can't pay. So quit your whining and embrace your duty. Become a willing participant in our government's collectivist effort to control everyone's health care — or the IRS will track you down and impose a fine!"

"You still aren't listening. I make \$36,000 a year, just like the fellow at the Spanish-speaking town hall. Even if I was willing, I cannot afford to spend 10 percent of my income on ObamaCare!"

property.

"They need a maintenance budget," Devlin said. "A lot of them should still be renting."

Devlin believes getting citizens from the city to serve on a code enforcement board would help streamline the process.

Mayor Sharon Schuler said that code enforcement has been a "pet peeve" of the city council.

"Small things don't get fixed," Schuler said. "Every small thing turns out to be a large issue."

The city hasn't had a code enforcement board for more than 15 years, Schuler said. It was disbanded when members didn't or couldn't show up for meetings.

So, for more than 15 years, cases have been heard by a special magistrate. One of the first magistrates for the city was local attorney and now-Councilman Parke Sutherland, who also said he would support bringing back a board.

City Attorney Gerald Buhr said the city charter specifies that the board would need to be seven people, and would require the city to attempt to find architects, engineers, builders and contractors for members. Such professionals are not required, but are preferred, he said.

Councilman Terry Heston said he had a case of a nuisance in his neighborhood prior to getting elected that took nearly nine years to get compliance. He asked if there was any way to speed that up. Buhr said there is still a process to follow, but Sutherland said he believed the process could go faster.

Councilman Garrett Anderson asked if the city could employ inmates from Avon Park Correctional Institution to help clean up garbage, but City Manager Julian Deleon said he didn't want to use inmates for simple trash pickup.

Schuler asked if the city could compel property owners to take down unpermitted fences. Buhr said owners could apply for a permit after the fact if the fences meet code. Otherwise, they would have to take them down, he said.

residents on how they might become involved in the conservation and management of black bears.

"None of those are in Highlands County but we expect to have some there in the future," said FWC spokesman Gary Morse.

The plan is to have seven bear management units throughout the state. That plan has been in the works since the FWC's Florida Black Bear Management Plan was approved in 2012.

In Sebring, a first-grade class at Cracker Trail Elementary School has been working on a plan to map black bear movement.

"I actually suggested that to the teacher, Sheli Gossett," Morse said. "She wrote us an email and I suggested ei-

ther black bears or gopher tortoises."

Apparently, the black bears won the youngsters' attention.

The FWC has been increasing its outreach effort since late last year, after there had been a significant increase in bear complaints. That caused the FWC to ramp up its efforts to let people know about the dangers of feeding bears.

"We knew there was a problem, we saw it coming and we tried to get the information out at that time," he said.

While bears currently are in the hibernation season, Morse said as springtime advances, bears will become progressively more active.

Morse said the FWC is planning yet another outreach program for the public in the near future.

"Hopefully, we will get the message out not to feed bears," he said.

adults riding around.

Tres Stephenson, president and general manager of Sebring International Raceway, said ticket prices haven't gone up, except for general recreational vehicle spots and both car and RV spots in the North Paddock, and he believes 2014's four-day attendance may top last year's crowd of 164,000 people.

Over the decades, the Raceway has worked to attract "family friendly" entertainment, Stephenson said, while also appealing to college students to take spring break at the Race, by providing a party zone with live bands, a bikini contest and the Patrón Club.

It has helped to ensure that most of the revelry stays in one place, he said.

Labelle said he hasn't seen as many teenagers or young adults in the backs of trucks and Jeeps,

especially since NASCAR bought the Raceway in September 2012. Stephenson said that the purchase hasn't affected how staff runs events, but he also said he has extra eyes from civic club volunteers at gates, parking areas and general operations.

"It takes a community to put this event on," Stephenson said.

He also credited Sheriff Susan Benton, her deputies and other law enforcement officers for keeping things orderly.

Labelle said Green Park

has become more gentrified from the years of adult-entertainment parties and people "wanting to have a four-day drinking binge" to today's crowd of serious racing fans.

While some campers talked before the Race about serving mixed drinks to other fans, this year's arrest report was mostly filled with drug charges. Of the 22 arrested, deputies filed 10 marijuana charges, 10 paraphernalia charges, five cocaine charges and five prescription drug charg-

es, according to totals released by Nell Hays, public information officer for the Sheriff's Office.

Underage alcohol charges and disorderly intoxication each only made up three of the total, reports said.

Last year saw only 14 people arrested, for 18 charges. Alcohol offenses still topped the list with six charges for underage possession and another charge of disorderly intoxication.

Last year's Race Week had only two marijuana possession charges and one paraphernalia possession charge, Hays said.

That was a drop from the 2012 race that had 25 people arrested on 27 charges.

Twelve were charged for underage possession of alcohol, one for providing alcohol to an underage person, one for marijuana possession and one for a drug without prescription.

There were also six charges for possession of drug paraphernalia.

multi-purpose venue for curated exhibits, art competitions and receptions; and the Clovelly House, once opened, will serve as a home for up-and-coming artists and local youth art work as well as classes.

Wohl said the purpose of the village was to provide art, in all its forms, to everyone.

"For established artists, it's a place to showcase their work. For emerging artists, it's a place where they can go and get inspired and get their work a little exposure or for those who just admire art it's a place where they can come and see so many different mediums of it," Wohl said.

"With the Clovelly House opening up, this will make it really become an established art village. I am so excited that the village is finally coming together, as well as the board members. It's awesome to see all these things opening up for our community especially it being downtown," Wohl said.

"For the children, I am most excited. Art is a big part of learning and growing. This benefits kids; being that we are in such a

Susan Millam, former board member and current museum curator and director, has been instrumental in helping grow the village over the past 15 years and had plenty to say regarding the long time progression of the Clovelly House.

"That was one of the original buildings on that property that was leased to us by the city. At that time we didn't have any of the funds to make anything, much less a youth house. We knew at the time we needed a building to house the youngsters so that plan never went away," Millam said.

"The original plan never came through because it was uninhabitable and the funds were just unavailable."

After many years of planning and acquiring a grant from the Community Redevelopment Agency, the vision was back.

"Everybody knew the importance of having a place for the youth. The best gift to the community that we could think of was a place for them (youth)," Millam said. "Everyone has worked so great together to have this vision come alive."

organization.

The IDA/EDC is a public-private partnership that is designed to help spur new business investment locally while helping to retain current economic activity in the area.

Highlands County IDA/EDC Executive Director Stephen Weeks made the presentation to the commission, with several members of the IDA/EDC board backing up Weeks' plea for the money to keep Highlands' operation viable.

Commissioner Don Ellwell asked Weeks about IDA/EDC activities during two major recent events at the Sebring Regional Airport including the U.S. Sport Aviation Expo in January as well as the just-completed Mobil 1 12 Hours of Sebring Fueled by Fresh From Florida.

"Those are the two events where major players come to Highlands County — people with a lot of connections," he said. "I didn't see a lot of presence there."

Weeks told commissioners while the organization had no physical presence at the Race, they had purchased advertising on the flag-to-flag coverage of the 12 Hours presented locally on the Cohan Radio Group's AM730 WWTK. He said the IDA/EDC also had visited all the vendors at the Sport Aviation Expo with printed information on relocation.

Commissioner Jack Richie called for additional presentations before the board, something Weeks agreed to. However, while agreeing that public presentations would be fine, IDA/EDC chair Paul McGahee said he previously understood some

commissioners preferred private, one-on-one sessions.

McGahee said the organization had made the adjustments commissioners previously had asked for, including goals with definable action steps. He noted that the EDC office had been reduced from four individuals to one — Weeks.

"Our resources are limited," he told commissioners.

While saying that commissioners are asking the tough questions, Highlands County Commission Chairman Greg Harris told the board the county needs an EDC and needs to invest in it.

"I think we need to give direction and have our expectations out there as guidance for these folks," he said. "I believe it's headed now in a different direction."

Resident Rick Ingler, a longtime attendee at county commission meetings, pointed out that a new budget discussion for the upcoming 2014-15 fiscal year will be coming up soon, asking if the organization was ever going to be self-sufficient.

"We are never going to be self-sufficient," said John Shoop, past chair of the IDA/EDC board. "There's no way the community is going to give us \$200,000 a year to pay for an IDA/EDC. I can't envision that."

Other members of the economic development effort told commissioners that they welcomed the idea of guidance and direction.

No date for another presentation by the IDA/EDC was scheduled.

## Dems say Scott campaign broke law

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The head of the Florida Democratic Party is contending that Republican Gov. Rick Scott's campaign broke the state's campaign finance laws by shifting money between accounts.

Election law complaints can be routine during an election year, but this one could be significant: If confirmed, it could result in a fine of as much as \$82 million.

Allison Tant, who is the chairwoman of the state party, filed the complaint with the Florida Elections Commission late last week, naming both Scott and his po-

litical committee Let's Get to Work.

The complaint maintains that the campaign broke the law when the Scott campaign transferred nearly \$27.4 million from one type of campaign account to another earlier this month.

"They have violated the law and the governor is supposed to uphold the law," Tant told The Associated Press

Republican Party of Florida chairman Lenny Curry defended Scott's campaign.

"Let's Get to Work is confident that they have done everything according to the standards of Florida election law," Curry said in a statement.

## 62nd 12 Hours makes for eventful race

SEBRING – After nearly two decades, an American marque is back atop the leader board for the 12 Hours of Sebring.

It was a late-race yellow flag that bunched the field and allowed the Ford EcoBoost Daytona Prototype piloted by Dario Franchitti to vault to the front and take the win Saturday night.

Franchitti was able to run away from the HPD ARX-03b of Extreme Speed Motorsports that finished second.

In the Prototype Challenge Class, the CORE AutoSport ORECA driven by Colin Braun took the checkers.

In the GT classes, it was a Porsche sweep.

Joerg Bergmeister was able to power the Porsche North America No. 912 to victory the GT LeMans Class while Andy Lally steered the Porsche No. 911 to the win in the GT Daytona division.

When historians look back at the 2014 Mobil 1 12 Hours of Sebring Fueled by Fresh From Florida they may see two very different races.

Fans may talk about the mild temperatures and gentle winds that made race day one of the best ever.

They may talk about the great exhibits on the midways or the marvelous displays of classic cars shown in the air conditioned Gallery of Legends.

Drivers, on the other hand, may remember the record-tying 11 yellow flags – one of which became a rare red flag thrown at America's Oldest Grand Prix of Endurance.

It has been said that to finish first, you first must finish – and there were cars that did.

Of the 63 cars that took the green flag Saturday morning, 53 reportedly were running when the checkers fell 12 hours later.

The early hours were littered with race-slowng full course yellows.

The first came just 10 minutes into the race when the No. 33 Viper Exchange Dodge Viper V10 of Ben Keating caught fire at the track's Gurney Bend.

That caused a yellow flag that ran for 59 min-

## 10 things for you to know about the NCAA tournament

The posturing and politicking is finished.

The field has been chosen, the bracket has been set and the madness of March has finally arrived in college basketball.

Having trouble making sense of it all?

No problem. Here are 10 things you should know about this year's NCAA tournament:

### FIRST FOUR

for years, but there may be more interest than ever in the four "First Four" games played Tuesday and Wednesday in Dayton, Ohio.

Sure, Albany and Mount St. Mary's are probably playing for a chance to be whipped by overall No. 1 seed Florida, and the winner of Cal Poly-Texas

Southern will have to face unbeaten Wichita State.

But the other two games feature some notable names: Iowa and Tennessee are vying to be the No. 11 seed and North Carolina State and Xavier will

battle to be the No. 12 seed in the South Region.

"It didn't matter what seed or where we were going, I'm just excited for the opportunity," said the Hawkeyes' Aaron White. "We're in. That's all you can ask for."

### LAST FOUR

The drama of Selection Sunday often centers on the teams that were left out, and this year was no different.

SMU didn't have consecutive losses until ending the regular season with defeats to Louis-

ville and Memphis, but a loss to Houston in its AAC tournament opener bumped the Mustangs from the NCAA tournament to the NIT.

Florida State, Green Bay and Georgetown were also left hanging when the final teams were placed in the bracket.

### REGION TO WATCH

Even coaches who landed in other regions pointed to the Midwest as the most brutal road to the Final Four in Arlington, Texas.

Along with the top-

seeded Shockers, you have two of the hottest teams in the country in Louisville and Michigan — who played in last year's national title game — and perennial powerhouses Duke and Kentucky.

"You can analyze it a lot of different ways," said Kansas State coach Bruce Weber, whose team will face Kentucky in the 8-9 matchup on Friday in St. Louis. "We're going to have to play and it doesn't matter who you play. You've got to play good basketball."

### BEWARE THE 12 SEEDS

Just about every year, it seems a No. 12 seed rises up to knock off a No. 5 seed.

Three of them did it last year in Oregon, Mississippi and California.

And each of the 12-5 games in this year's tournament offers reason to be wary.

Stephen F. Austin, which plays VCU, hasn't lost since November.

## NO SECOND THOUGHTS

One streak is over and another continues at Hendrick Motorsports. Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s streak of consecutive top-two finishes came to a thundering halt at Bristol Motor Speedway, where NASCAR's Most Popular Driver finished 24th in the No. 88 Chevrolet. Earnhardt opened the season by winning the Daytona 500, then scored second-place finishes at Phoenix and Las Vegas.

For those first three outings, the 39-year-old driver had an average finish of 1.3. Now add in the 24th at Bristol and Earnhardt's average finish in 2014 is 7.0. Jeff Gordon, who drives the No. 24 Chevy, kept his streak going at Bristol. Gordon has scored four consecutive top-10 finishes since the season opened at Daytona. And just to show how stats can be skewed, Gordon now has a better finishing average than Earnhardt. Gordon's average finish in 2014 is 6.25.

"The whole team did an awesome job," Gordon said after his seventh-place effort at Bristol. "We had a really good race car at different times throughout the night. It's crazy, when we went back racing after the rain delay we just completely wore out the left-front tire in just like 20 or 30 laps. I mean we were going backwards in a hurry. Thankfully for that competition caution, but we fixed that and got the car better, and drove up into the top five, I was pretty happy." Earnhardt? No comment.

### ROOKIE RUNNERS

The NASCAR Sprint Cup Series Rookie of the Year battle was defined at Bristol when Kyle Larson and Austin Dillon raced side by side in the closing laps in a heated battle for 10th-place honors. Larson prevailed in his No. 42 Chevy while Dillon was 11th. "It's crazy to think it's kind of a disappointing finish for the way we ran for most of the race, but all in all it was a good race," Larson said. "It was a lot of fun racing with Austin there at the end. I definitely had to get up on the wheel and get the elbows up and try not to make any mistakes." Now each rookie has one top-10 finish. Dillon was ninth in the Daytona 500.

**Is it time to do something about bump-drafting in the flag stand?**

Let's assume NASCAR officials will take a wait-and-see approach to this one. If it happens again, expect drastic measures: That's right, a press release announcing immediate changes.

Sunday night at Bristol, with the 500th and (long-awaited) final lap approaching, someone in the flag stand apparently leaned into an override switch that turned on the track's caution lights. Once the error was uncovered, but before NASCAR could gather everyone back together for a return to green, the rains returned and Carl Edwards carried his big smile to Victory Lane. Right now it'll be viewed as a freak accident, but if it happens again, expect NASCAR's Boys in R&D to develop an officially licensed Caution Light Override Switch to go in the tower, where it will take precedence over the Override Switch. Or something like that.

**Can you get me excited about Fontana this week?**

Here's your good news: NASCAR's great "unforeseen" doesn't know geography. It can show its face at any longitude or latitude. The unpredictable wins, tumbles and personality clashes — all part of NASCAR's time-honored recipe — often happen when (and where) you least expect them.

## NASCAR flag man inadvertently delivers a cautionary tale

NASCAR Vice President of Competition Robin Pemberton explained to the media why the caution lights came out for no apparent reason with less than three laps left in Sunday's Food City 500 at Bristol Motor Speedway.

**What happened?**

"After review of the situation post-race ... it appears that, in the flag stand, one of the flag people had leaned on the switch that is the manual override for the caution lights, and so that happened."

"At that time, when the flag stand realized that the caution lights were illuminated, the

flag man threw the flag, and then after that happened we froze the field from the tower.

"Most of the flag stands have a manual override for the caution lights, and due to the weather and due to other things, it wasn't secured properly, and the flag person leaned against the switch and turned the caution lights on."

"We tried to turn them off, and we realized that the override switch was on and they were hung on caution. It was a stupid error."

**Did you have to go to video, or did you just use the scoring line to set the field?**

"Video. We treated it just like the freeze at

the end of the race if there was an accident or something."

**What do you do moving forward to prevent this from happening down the road?**

"We learn a lot of lessons, and when we learn a lesson like this we'll go in and further investigate some things."

"As you know, all the electronics that we have installed in the trailers for 'freeze the field' and all these other things, you still have to integrate into the track facilities."

"So there's probably some things that we needed to do to better secure that area where the manual override is on the lights."

## IF THE SHOE FITS

Sure, the notion of a "Cinderella" has become cliché, but it's also one of the endearing elements of the NCAA tournament.

So is there a team seeded lower than 12 that has a chance to make some noise?

How about Tulsa, led by Danny Manning, in its opener against UCLA?

After all, they called his 1988 championship Kansas team "Danny and the Miracles" for a reason.

And don't forget the Golden Hurricanes upset the Bruins in the first round of the 1994 tournament.

"UCLA is a very talented team," Manning said. "They ended up winning the (Pac-12) tournament title. They played very well in that game and they've got really good players that I've seen and watched for a very long time. We've got our hands full, but I like the matchup."

## POTENTIAL REMATCHES

The NCAA selection does its best to make sure teams that faced each other in the regular season, such as conference rivals, don't meet early in the NCAA tournament.

But that doesn't mean there aren't some tasty

potential rematches. Kansas could face New Mexico, a team it beat in December, if both win their opener in the South Region.

Saint Joseph's could get a chance to avenge a 30-point whipping by No. 2 seed Villanova in the third round, and fifth-seeded Saint Louis could get another crack at Wichita State in the Sweet 16.

## BLUE BLOODS

There are 14 schools that have won multiple NCAA championships.

All but two of them — Indiana and San Francisco — are in this year's field.

The list is topped by UCLA, the fourth seed in the South, with its 11 national titles.

The Bruins are joined there by No. 1 seed Florida and second-seeded Kansas.

Oklahoma State won its titles as Oklahoma A&M, and is the No. 9 seed in the West.

Cincinnati, UConn, North Carolina and Michigan State inhabit the East, and Duke, Kentucky and North Carolina State resides in the Midwest.

## NEWCOMERS

There are two newcomers to this year's party, Cal Poly and North Carolina Central.

Cal Poly got in despite its 13-19 record when reserve guard Ridge Shipley hit a 3-pointer with 13.7 seconds left for a 61-59 victory over Cal State Northridge in the Big West title game, and NC Central punched its ticket in only its seventh season in Division I by beating Morgan State 71-62 in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference title game.

"It's a testament to what these guys do —

emotional stamina and mental toughness," said Cal Poly's Chris Eversley. "It started with the coaching staff and the guys we brought in — guys that were willing to buy into our program both offensively and defensively."

## ODDS

It was no surprise that Florida was installed as the early favorite to win the national championship by the Las Vegas casinos.

Several that put out lines immediately after the bracket was revealed had the Gators at 4-1.

Michigan State, Arizona and Kansas were in the next tier of favorites, followed by a group that included Wichita State, Virginia, Duke, Syracuse and Louisville.

## HOME COOKING

Several teams are going to feel right at home for their opening games of the tournament.

And several teams are going to feel like it's a road game.

Florida plays the Albany-Mount St. Mary's winner in Orlando, and UCLA takes on Stephen F. Austin in San Diego.

Syracuse heads down the road to Buffalo for its game against Western Michigan.

Baylor will face Nebraska in San Antonio, Wisconsin plays American in Milwaukee, and Duke will open against Mercer in Raleigh, N.C.

"We're just excited to be in the tournament, first of all, and then being a 2 seed in Milwaukee, I mean, it's going to be playing close to home, just means you did something good this year," said the Badgers' Josh Gasser. "You get rewarded for what you've done."

GAINESVILLE — Florida coach Billy Donovan has triggered two more bonuses in his contract.

Donovan gets \$50,000 for the top-ranked Gators finishing in the top 10 in the final Associated Press poll, which was released Monday.

He also earns \$25,000 for being named the AP's

Southeastern Conference coach of the year, also announced Monday.

Those bring his total to \$187,500 — and he could garner more bonuses.

Donovan already has earned \$50,000 for winning the SEC regular-season title, \$25,000 for the SEC tournament and \$37,500 for making the

NCAA tournament.

The NCAA bonus would increase to \$75,000 for advancing to the Sweet 16, \$100,000 for making the Final Four and \$150,000 for winning the national championship.

# Phil Jackson returns to Knicks as team president

Coming home: Phil Jackson returns as team president to a Knicks club long in need of a title

NEW YORK — Phil Jackson has returned to the New York Knicks as their team president.

The Knicks announced Jackson's hiring Tuesday at a news conference in the lobby of Madison Square Garden, where a giant sign reading "Welcome Home Phil" was overhead and shirts with the No. 18 Jackson wore as a player lined the racks in the merchandise store.

Jackson was a member of the Knicks' championship-winning teams in 1970 and 1973, but they haven't won a title since.

Jackson went on to become the league's most successful coach, winning 11 championships with the Los Angeles Lakers and Chicago Bulls.

This will be his first time as an executive and the Knicks say he will be in charge of all basketball decisions.

Steve Mills will remain as general manager.



2. Remove from heat. Skim off any foam that forms on top of jam. Ladle mixture into 16-ounce containers or freezer safe zipper bags.

#### STATE FAIR STRAWBERRY RHUBARB JAM

Yield: 6 half pints

■ 4 cups crushed strawberries

■ 2 cups chopped rhubarb

■ 1/4 cup fresh squeezed lemon juice

■ 1 package Mrs. Wages Fruit Pectin Home Jel

■ 5 1/2 cups sugar

■ 1/2 tablespoon butter

1. Combine strawberries, rhubarb, lemon juice and pectin in large saucepan. Bring to a boil over high heat. Add sugar, stirring until dissolved. Return to rolling boil and add butter. Boil hard for 1 minute, stirring constantly.


2. Remove from heat. Skim off any foam that forms on top of jam. Ladle mixture into hot, clean jars, leaving 1/4-inch headspace. Wipe jar rims and threads. Cover with two-piece lids. Twist lid bands so not loose but not too tight. Process for 10 minutes in boiling water bath canner.





# Zucchini apple slaw

Hope everyone enjoyed the Races and maybe someone made the pulled pork tacos that I wrote about a couple of weeks ago. If so, I would love some feedback on how they turned out.

I love any kind of squash and I cook zucchini at home for Lauren and myself often. We usually cut them into long strips, marinate them in rosemary, garlic and olive oil, then roasted them on the top rack of our grill. I like to put some mesquite chips in the charcoal to give them a touch of smoky flavor.

That's one way of preparing zucchini, but there are countless others and the one I have for you is different, healthy, fun to prepare and it will impress your dinner guests. It's kind of a twist on coleslaw and has bright colors and nice texture.

Zucchini apple slaw would be a great side dish at your next barbecue or any other gathering where there is going to be food. I would also make the traditional coleslaw and potato salad and put your zucchini slaw in the middle. You might be surprised and how many of your guests will like it after taking a bite.

You could also use it as a topping of something like a pulled pork sandwich or a veggie burger. If you don't have the caraway seed, I suggest picking some up at the market. It is a key flavor in this slaw and paired with the apple, it is wonderful.

## ZUCCHINI APPLE SLAW

Yields 16 four oz. portions

- 3 oz. Vinegar, Cider
- 2 tbs. Sugar, Granulated
- 2-1/4 tsp. Spice, Caraway Seed
- 1 cup Mayonnaise, Light
- 2 lb. Squash, Zucchini, Fresh, Shredded
- 1 lb. Apples, Fresh, Unpeeled, Cored, Diced
- 1/2 cup Onions, Green, Scallion, Bunch, Fresh, Sliced, 1/8-inch
- 1-1/2 tsp. Salt
- 1 tbs. Spice, Pepper, Black, Ground

1. Thoroughly wash all produce. Pre-chill ingredients.
2. In mixing bowl, combine mayonnaise, vinegar, sugar, and caraway seed. Mix well to make dressing. Hold cold for use in step 4.
3. In separate bowl, combine zucchini, green onions and apples. Toss gently.
4. Pour dressing, salt and pepper over salad and toss lightly until well coated. Cover and refrigerate for at least two hours. Internal temperature must reach 41 F or less prior to service. Stir salad just prior to service.

# Hearty, yet fresh soup fit for spring

The warm days and cool nights of spring can make for challenging dinners. During the days, we want to be outside enjoying the sun, but the evenings call for something warm and comforting. Trouble is, warm and comforting dinners require time at the stove.

Our solution? A quick and easy soup that is jammed with fresh vegetables and comes together in about 30 minutes. We combine seasonally perfect asparagus with the sweet taste of frozen corn and

a heap of fresh thyme. The result is light, yet fresh and filling. If you want to bulk it up a bit, shrimp or diced chicken would be a great addition.

## SPRING CORN SOUP WITH ASPARAGUS

Start to finish: 30 minutes  
Servings: 6

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/4 cup chopped shallots
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 large sweet onion, diced
- 2 medium carrots, peeled and diced
- 3 celery stalks, diced
- 6 cups low-sodium chicken broth
- 1 bunch asparagus, cut into 1-inch

pieces

- 3 tablespoons chopped fresh thyme
- 16 ounces frozen baby corn

1. Salt and ground black pepper
2. In a large stockpot over medium, heat the oil. Add the shallots, garlic, onion, carrots and celery. Cook until the onion is tender and translucent, 6 to 7 minutes. Add the chicken broth and bring to a simmer. Add the asparagus, thyme and corn, then cook just until the asparagus is tender, 4 to 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

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# Focus on what you can have, not what you're missing

When people first hear the Dinner Diva's gone Paleo, they almost always say the same thing: Oh I know this Paleo diet is supposed to be healthy, but I could never give up [bread/potatoes/pasta/corn/dairy/etc.].

Why is everyone so focused on what you can't have? I like to twist that negative around and talk about what we can have.

Now, in case you aren't already familiar, a Paleo diet is a diet that's as close as possible to the one our ancestors followed thousands of years ago. Paleo folk eat primarily local grass-fed meats, free range poultry, sustainably caught fish, nuts, seeds

and organic produce — stuff you can hunt or gather (although for us nowadays, that's just eating from the perimeter of the grocery store, LOL).

It might sound limiting (if you want to look at it that way), but I am here to tell you that I am a very happy camper and there is no deprivation or suffering. Quite the contrary, I'm well-fed and feel better than I have in years.

The following principles constitute a Paleo diet:

- We need to fuel our bodies with nutrients. The best source of nutrients is in plants and animals that consume plants (not grain), especially seasonal, organic local produce

and grass fed, pastured meat.

- Free-range organic eggs are packed with protein, amino acids and minerals.

- Stress-reducing activities (massage, yoga, baths, meditation and prayer) are essential to good health and should be done daily.

- Exercise is important, but it should involve doing activities you enjoy.

- Rest is an often overlooked key to good health. We need to give our bodies adequate sleep so our hormones function properly.

- Fruit should be consumed lightly and preferably fruits with the color going all the way through (think raspberry as opposed to an apple)

- Nuts, and seeds contain vital nutrients and should be eaten daily in moderation.

- Refined sugar, grains, legumes, anything with gluten and packaged, processed foods are anti-nutrients and need to be

avoided.

- Healthy fats like olive oil, coconut oil, grass-fed butter and avocado do the body good.

- Vegetable oils (margarine and liquid vegetable oils) are dangerous, human-made fats that should not be consumed by people.

- Greek yogurt, kefir and cheese aged more than 120 days are acceptable forms of dairy if you're a part-time paleoista and are more primal than paleo.

- Wine has probiotic properties and a great nutritional profile and can be enjoyed in moderation.

- Counting calories is meaningless — our bod-

ies are chemistry labs, not bank accounts.

- Probiotics and fermented veggies are beneficial to digestion.

- Bone broth is chock full of gut-healing properties and should become a staple in your diet.

- Be aware of your digestion and elimination and adjust accordingly.

So who doesn't love bacon and butter?! Or how about wine and steak? And there's no counting calories or rationing the avocados!





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
