GAINESVILLE WINS.

Took First Game From the Ocala Boys Monday Afternoon.

What promised to be the first game of the season turned out to be a very one-sided affair from the looks of the score, but those who witnessed the game say that it was one of the hardest fought battles ever seen on a diamond. From start to finish it was a pitcher's battle. As to base hits the honors were even, two hits being scored against each pitcher. Wheeler was a little more wild than Chappell, but he has made a reputation of being one of the best pitchers in the state, having allowed the strongest team in the state only two base hits.

Gainesville went to bat first. Bryan was the first man up. He waited for four bad ones and went down to first; McCarroll was hit by a pitched ball; Graham got first on balls. Morrow advanced all three by an out at first; Bryan and McCarroll scoring, and Graham crossed the plate a few moments later on a passed ball. Three runs for Gainesville.

For Ocala, Vogt got his base on balls, and was caught off the base shortly after by the pitcher. Ford took first on an error by Bryan; stole second, took third on Jewett's out and was left there when Wills was retired by a throw from the pitcher to first. The other innings were very much the same, except that Gainesville added three runs to their score in the sixth, one in the seventh and one more in the eighth. Ocala failed to score all the way through the game. Luck was against them. They need to play more as a unit in the field, and should endeavor to do so in the game at Gainesville on Friday. We hope to be able to give a better score for the next game.

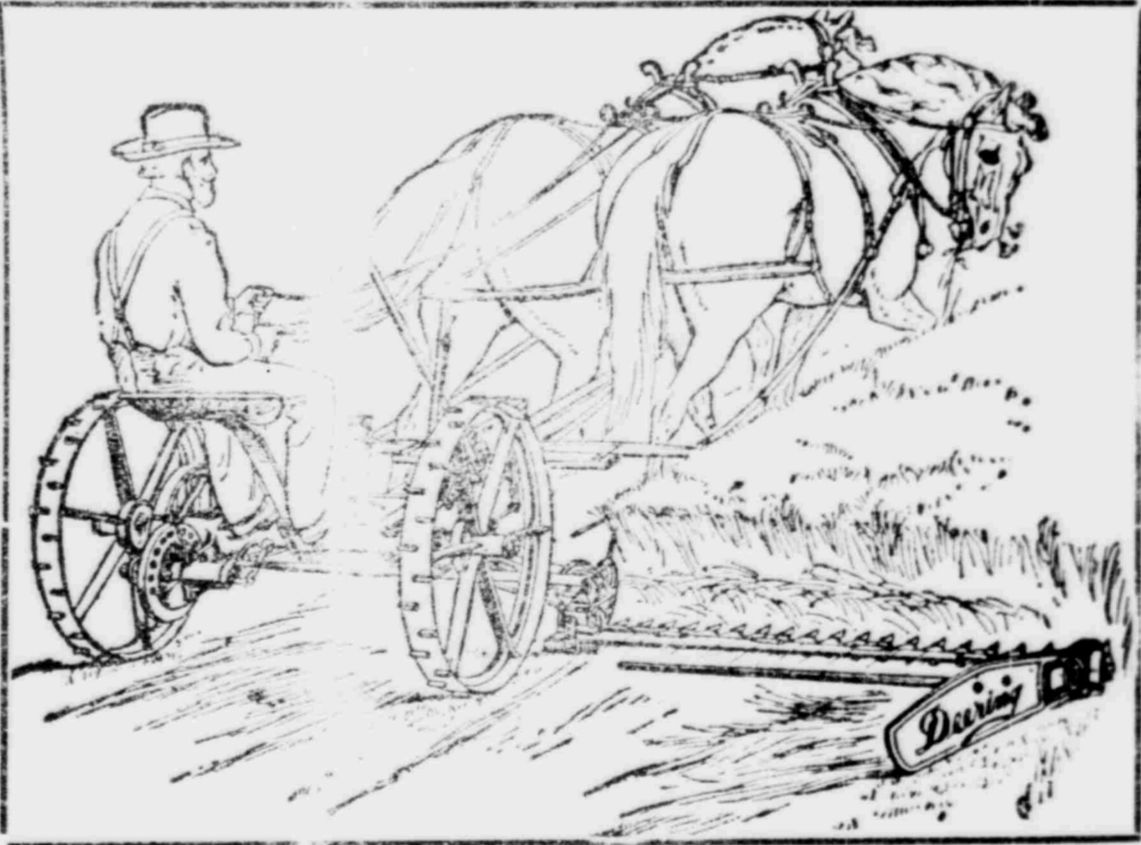
