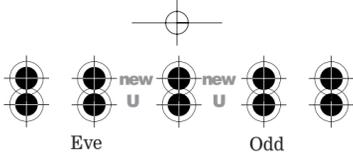



Sheriff's Office Seizes Over A Quarter Million Dollars

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that on Thursday, April 1, at 9:35 p.m., investigators from the Madison County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force stopped a vehicle on Interstate 10 for a traffic infraction that resulted in the seizure of \$273,020.00 that is now pending forfeiture proceedings.

During the traffic stop, investigators detected signs of possible criminal activity. Investigators requested consent to search the vehicle. The driver who was the only occupant in the vehicle denied the request for consent to search. The Task Force K9 Officer deployed canine "Arko" to conduct a free air sniff of the exterior of the vehicle. Canine "Arko" gave two positive alerts on two separate areas of the vehicle.

Investigators conducted a probable cause search of the vehicle and the contents contained within. Investigators located two "man-made" compartments also known as secret compartments or traps constructed within the vehicle. The compartments were located in the exact spots where canine "Arko" indi-



cated. Investigators were able to gain access to both compartments, finding one to be empty and the other to contain 10 large packages. Once the packages were opened, investigators recovered \$273,020.00 in U.S. currency.

The packages were consistent of a fashion indicative of a drug courier's method for transporting currency for drug transactions.

The driver denied having any knowledge of the fabricated compartments in the vehicle or the currency concealed within the compartment. The driver further stated that he did not own the currency or know who the owner was. The vehicle and currency were seized. The driver was given a receipt for the currency and served with a notice of seizure before being released.

Cedrick L. Gee, a registered sex offender, has entered a new address in Madison.

On April 1, Gee registered with a temporary address at 620 SE Boundary Street in Madison. The same day, Gee also entered an address of "transient" and with an address at 823 SW Pinckney Street in Madison (the location of the county jail).

Gee is a black male, who stands 5'10" tall and weighs 176 pounds. He has numerous tattoos.

Gee's qualifying offense was lewd and lascivious battery and sex with a victim from 12-15 years old. He was adjudicated guilty on June 26, 2007 in Madison.

Jail Inmate Dies Of Natural Causes

Madison County Sheriff Ben Stewart reports that on Saturday, April 3, an inmate that was adjudicated guilty, pending sentencing was found deceased at approximately 5:30 p.m.

At the time of the inmate's arrest, she was assigned medical solitaire due to her medical condition and she remained the same status throughout her incarceration. Medical solitaire included hourly physical monitoring and continuous video.

A preliminary examination by the

medical examiner in Tallahassee indicates that the decedent died of natural causes. As standard protocol, the investigation was turned over to the State Attorney, Skip Jarvis and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

The inmate, Linda Louise Williams, 56, was arrested on April 23 at her home located at 165 NW Reedbuck Loop in Greenville as a result of a search warrant that recovered crack and powder cocaine, marijuana, drug paraphernalia, weapons and stolen property.

Rocket City



Thirty-eight years ago, I stood on the tarmac of DaNang Air Base, the northernmost fighter base in South Vietnam.

DaNang had the unenviable reputation of absorbing frequent rocket attacks, hence the nickname "rocket city."

My base of assignment was in South Korea, but the North Vietnamese changed that when they began their Easter 1972 offensive by attacking the South with more than 200,000 troops. Since the American ground presence had been drastically reduced since 1969 and the South Vietnamese Army (ARVN) was quickly overwhelmed, the only way to stop the onslaught was with airpower.

My squadron, the 35th Tactical Fighter Squadron (TFS) "Panthers," was the first (or what turned out to be many) to deploy to augment the fighter units already operating from South Vietnam and Thailand.

Initially, I was assigned to the 421st TFS "Black Widows" to help replace their combat losses. I quickly learned that the "widows" were appropriately named - their losses resulted in frequent funerals. They were poorly led - the squadron commander was a glory-seeker. I vowed to get out of that unit as quickly as I could. Three weeks after I arrived, the Panthers were reunited as an integral unit. I had survived my short stint with the Black Widows.

As opposed to the home-based units, my squadron was very well led. For one thing, we had far more experience - eight of our pilots were graduates of the Air Force Fighter Weapons School, the graduate school for fighter pilots. Our commander Lyle "Sky King" Beckers was one of those graduates and very professional. Our operations officer Bill Mickelson was extremely good with peo-

Together, they made a good team.

The fellow I flew most often with was North Carolina State graduate Charlie Cox. Charlie was my flight commander, had 2000 hours in the Phantom, and a previous war tour. Charlie was a very demanding pilot who pushed me quite hard. I would follow him into a fiery furnace.

I turned 24 shortly after arriving at DaNang. With my 65 hours of Phantom experience, I was pretty typical of the young lieutenants in my squadron. We had to grow up fast.

Our squadron was assigned to the 366th Tactical Fighter Wing "Gunfighters" and we lived in Gunfighter Village. It was pretty crowded - my room was built for two, but I had three other roommates, two of whom were subsequently shot down (but fortunately rescued). The food was rotten. Our dining options were limited and none of them were good. I got food poisoning more than once.

I said that DaNang was often called rocket city. There was a North Vietnamese artillery battalion with a dozen miles of the base and they would launch an attack at least weekly and always at night. A minor attack would be five 122mm Katyusha rockets and a heavy attack would be 15, all in the span of five minutes. The Katyusha was an unguided rocket with a five inch warhead - if it ever hit anything, it would cause significant damage. I only recall one ever hitting Gunfighter Village, exploding just outside the building next to

mine. It hurt a couple of fellows pretty bad.

I spent 11 weeks at DaNang before our squadron was sent to another base in Thailand. In that time, DaNang lost 13 Phantoms and many other aircraft as well. We flew a lot - in May, I flew 41 missions. In some cases, we were attacking targets within 15 miles of the base; the enemy was that close. All of my missions were flown against targets in either South or North Vietnam; I never flew a single mission into either Cambodia or Laos.

In mid-June, the 35th packed its bags and headed for Korat Air Base in Thailand. It was a huge change. Korat was a paradise - the food was much better; we didn't have to worry about getting rocketed at night; our living conditions were improved; and the nearby city of the same name was a mecca of exotic sights and sounds. The missions were quite long (some as long as 5+ hours which is a long time to be strapped into an ejection seat) and frequently hazardous, but coming home made it worthwhile.

I spent four more months flying combat until mid-October when the Panthers returned to our home base of Kunsan, South Korea. By that time I had flown 121 combat missions, 43 of which were over North Vietnam. We had helped to blunt the Easter attack and bring the enemy to the negotiating table.

A few months later, an armistice was signed and our POWs began to return home. It was a hard job, well done.

Many residents around Madison County are confused regarding the 2010 Census, thinking because April 1 was Census Day that it was a deadline. It was not a deadline. In fact, residents can still mail their census form and be counted in the 2010 Census for several more months. And census workers will be circulating Madison County over these months to assist anyone desiring help with the Census Questionnaire.

"Census 2010 is not over. In fact, the assistance centers will be here for a few more weeks and census workers will be around for several more months," said Pat Lightcap, co-chair for the Madison County Complete County Committee.

Residents may receive assistance regarding the census form – the ten easy questions – by contacting one of the Authorized Assistance Centers in Madison County listed here.

Organizers and volunteers involved with the Madison County 2010 Census also remind residents that all information provided cannot be released to anyone, in or out of the government, for 72 years, as stated in Federal law. And no one will be asked for a Social Security number.

"YOU COUNT – so mail your census form – and BE COUNTED!" Lightcap added.

Ask The Dentist

Question:
My partial causes my mouth to be sore and I don't know what to do. Should I put something on it?

Answer:
Partial dentures and full dentures can sure make your mouth feel sore. Just the tiniest little change will make them sore. Gain weight, lose weight, get the Flu, if they are old and worn out, if they are old and need a relin, if they are brand new, or if the Gators lose to Alabama, the partial will hurt. There are just so many things that will make them sore. Your mouth can get so painful that you feel like you need to take them out just to eat. Then you can't eat because you took them out. What a classic "Catch 22."

So now you get the not so bright idea to get some numbing gel from the pharmacy. Yep...it will numb the sore gum so you can eat. What you discover the hard way is that by eating with numbing gel under the ill fitting partial you have made the sore 10 times bigger and more painful. OUCH!

Now you are forced to take it out for 10 days to let it heal up. Then you let your dentist look at the fit and he says everything is "fine", and you know it is not fine. So I am going to tell you the secret that every denture wearer needs to know. The way to get a partial to fit comfortably is to have your dentist adjust it when it is the most painful. It may take a couple of visits, and it may seem like an oxymoron. "Why would I want my dentist to mess with my partial when my mouth is so sore? I am afraid it will hurt for him to be messing with it right now." The reason is that when I see the full blown GIANT sore under the partial, I get one of those Bill Engvall signs that I can't miss that tells me where to adjust the fit. If we wait until later when the gum has healed there is always the risk of adjusting the wrong spot and making the fit worse. So before you decide to take your partial out for a week, call your dentist for an adjustment. My patients find that is the quickest way to a comfortable fit.

When Evaluating Investments' Performance, Avoid Common Mistakes

As an investor, you might think it's easy to evaluate your investments' performance. After all, the bigger the gain, the better, right? This statement is true enough, but as an investment strategy, it's incomplete - and, if followed rigidly, it could lead you to make some mistakes that could hinder your progress toward your financial goals.

What are some of these potential mistakes? Here are a few to consider:

- **Evaluating performance over a short period of time** - If you measure an investment's performance over a relatively short period of time, you may be more tempted to invest emotionally - that is, you'll buy more shares of an investment when you "feel good" about it because its price has risen, and you'll sell more shares when you "feel bad" because the investment's price has fallen. This behavior is the opposite of the classic piece of investment advice: "Buy low and sell high." Try not to make investment decisions based on short-term performance. Instead, look at an investment's long-term track record. While it's true, as you have no doubt heard, that "past performance can't guarantee future results," it's nonetheless useful to see how an investment has fared in different market environments.
- **Neglecting the impact of contributions and withdrawals** - If you put more money into an investment, it will be worth more - until the price drops - and if you take money out of an investment, it will be worth less - until the price rises. Yet many people mistakenly attribute their investments' performance to these inflows and outflows.
- **Failing to distinguish between "growth" and "income" investments** - To help achieve your long-term goals, you'll need a mix of growth-oriented investments, such as stocks, and income-producing vehicles, such as bonds. However, bonds will typically not add much growth to your overall portfolio, so keep this in mind when you look at the year-to-year change in value on your investment statements.
- **Maintaining unrealistic expectations** - In 2009, the Dow Jones Industrial Average rose nearly 19%, while the S&P 500 jumped more than 23%. But if you anticipate such unusually high returns annually, and you base your investment strategy on them, you'll likely be disappointed and have trouble meeting your goals. For a variety of reasons, most investment experts foresee relatively modest returns in the financial markets over the next few years, so you'll want to plan accordingly.
- **Comparing investments to benchmarks** - Try not to compare the performance of your investments to benchmarks such as the Dow Jones Industrial Average or the S&P 500. If you've chosen an aggressive investment mix, your returns may show wide swings, beating the benchmarks substantially in some years while trailing them significantly in others. On the other hand, if you're a conservative investor, your returns may consistently lag the major benchmarks, but you'll probably experience less volatility.

Once you know what to expect from your investments, you'll be less likely to be disappointed at your returns - and you'll be better prepared to create and follow an investment strategy that works for you.

The state will save \$4 million, but it will lose \$32 million annually in additional funds leveraged by Healthy Start Coalitions.

The Healthy Start Coalition Model is Cost Effective - Overhead costs of county health departments are more than two times the average rate of local coalitions. Coalitions reduce barriers to health care and save taxpayer money through effectively promoting healthy outcomes for babies. As private, non-profit organizations, Healthy Start Coalitions ensure cost-effective oversight of services.

Access to Care will be Affected - Currently, 25 of 67 county health departments do NOT provide prenatal care. Healthy Start Coalitions have established provider networks to ensure access to care.

The System of Care will be Impacted - Under the coalitions, contracted prenatal and infant care ser-

vices take place in both the private and public sector. In 17 of 67 counties, care coordination services are provided by the private sector and no longer by contracted county health departments.

In 33 counties, MomCare services are provided in-house by Coalitions. Health departments are not equipped to take on this responsibility.

Successful Universal Risk Screening for Pregnant Women and Infants will be Jeopardized - Healthy Start Coalitions engage, oversee, and facilitate these critical services through a network of prenatal care providers and delivery hospitals. This is the foundation for determining those moms and babies most at risk for poor outcomes.

The Healthy Start Coalition Model is Successful - Coalitions, and their universal screening program for pregnant women and newborns are credited with reducing infant mortality by 20% since they began. Florida leads the southern states, in successful Maternal Child Health rates, with this best practice model.

TABLES TURNED! EEOC PAYS EMPLOYER FOR MISTAKEN LAWSUIT

When the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission recently sued a company for harassment, the case came to a strange and extraordinary ending.

The case involved an Iowa-based trucking company, CRST Van Expedited, Inc. A female driver with the company filed a complaint about the company's permitting of sexual harassment by male drivers. The EEOC picked up the complaint and filed a suit against CRST in federal district court.

This time, the EEOC

picked the wrong judge.

U.S. District Judge Linda Reade rejected the EEOC's claims; threw out the charges and accused the EEOC lawyers of taking a sue first, ask questions later approach.

Further, the judge decided, the EEOC must pay the employer \$4.5 million to cover legal fees and other costs associated with the case because the agency acted unreasonably and failed to conduct a proper investigation. Cite: EEOC v. CRST Van Expedited, Inc.
