Suspect Still Sought On Multiple Counts

Attempted Murder, Attempted Armed Robbery and Aggravated Battery

The City of Madison Police Department is still investigating an attempted murder, aggravated battery and attempted armed robbery that occurred on Friday, July 29. The event occurred between 5 and 6 a.m., at the Wells Fargo Bank ATM on Orange Ave.

The suspect has been described as a black male with a short afro-style haircut. He is between 5'9" and 6' tall. At the time, he was wearing a light colored shirt, dark colored shorts with a dark colored bandana over his face.

The suspect was armed with a black semi-automatic pistol,

and is considered armed and dangerous. The suspect reportedly fled from the scene on foot, headed north on Orange Ave.

Investigator Ben Ebberson collected numerous items as evidence and turned it in for forensic analysis but has been unable to identify a suspect.

Labor Day Thunderstorms Move Through Madison

The storms that moved through the county Monday caused minimal hit-or-miss damage with localized rain, said Tom Cisco, Director of Madison Emergency Management Services. It seemed to be mostly general thunderstorms moving through quickly as part of the distant rain bands swirling around Hurricane Lee, moving in a northeasterly direction.

There was word of a power line down in Lee, but no major events, and no injuries. "In Madison, with all the trees we have, there's always a tree down somewhere after every thunderstorm," said Cisco, but he had no reports of multiple trees down in any one location, blocking roads or causing other problems.

The rain, too, seemed to be heavily localized. How much rain people got depended on what part of the county they lived in. Cisco estimated that he got

North Florida Community College's Digital Media and Multimedia Technology program plans to share its talents with the community during the college's fall term and in return provide NFCC students with first-hand experience in the field of digital design and media.

"We will be offering services through our Electronic Imaging and Web Design courses allowing students to work with actual clients and go through the entire process of interviewing, making proposals, giving a demo, making corrections and then finalizing a product," said Marie Guest, Digital Media Instructor and Department Chair of Social Science,

“Reckless Endangerment” is a 2011 best-seller by Gretchen Morgenson and Joshua Rosner. The subtitle – “How outsized ambition, greed, and corruption led to economic Armageddon” – best describes what this important book is about. The authors, a business writer for the New York Times and a mortgage researcher respectively, have tackled a complex subject – explaining how the economic meltdown of late 2008 (which still plagues us today) occurred over time.

Unlike many books on this subject, Morgenson takes us back nearly two decades to the early 1990s to demonstrate how early studies and decisions set us on a path toward economic ruin. Let’s be clear about the cause of this mess – it has everything to do with housing and a mortgage market that went over the cliff, not suddenly but in stages.

Key to the foundation of the economic crash were the government sponsored enterprises (GSE) of the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae) and Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (Freddie Mac). These public-private corporations were designed to buy mortgages from banks to free-up capital so the lenders had money to generate new loans. Frequently, the two GSEs were used as a financial incentive to enrich political appointees. So a Clinton Administration secretary like Frank Raines could leave his cabinet post and take the reigns of Fannie Mae and bank millions in bonuses and stock options in a few short years. As a result, politicians took a particular interest in not only lining their pockets, but

protecting the GSEs when more prudent whistleblowers sounded warning.

My son, who worked at Fannie for several years, told me that the number of politicians of both parties who were courted by the GSE were dozens. Whenever Fannie or Freddie would come under scrutiny, their political cronies were all too eager to run interference.

An important ingredient to a cascading economic demise was the repeal of the Glass-Steagall Act in 1999. Glass-Steagall was an important part of early New Deal legislation by the Roosevelt Administration to address problems which led to so many bank failures in the first years of the Great Depression. The important provision was to separate bank investors from those accepting deposits. Sixty-six years later, a bi-partisan Congress and the Clinton Administration felt comfortable with dissolving these safeguards. Nine years later, we saw and felt the results when too-big-to-fail banks came crashing down, with and without government bailouts.

A general theme for this economic catastrophe is that the natural conservatism that characterizes bankers and mortgage lenders went out the window. Egged on by politicians and community activists and thirsting for more

profits, they threw caution to the wind. The method to capture more homeowners was the “subprime” mortgage, designed to permit homeownership among those who had no savings to afford either a down payment or closing costs. Lenders could now offer mortgages that featured no down payment; no upfront closing costs; teaser interest rates; and exotic, non-traditional mortgages. In many cases, the only way a subprime borrower could hope to pay off the loan was to flip the house. Such a strategy only works in an escalating real estate market. As with all bubbles, sooner or later, the balloon will burst.

The result was a witches-brew of toxic mortgages that Fannie and Freddie bundled into mortgage backed securities and collateral debt obligations and sold to investors ... with the guarantee of full faith and credit of the federal government (i.e. taxpayers).

To summarize, like many ideas, this was a project which started with good intentions and gradually went awry. Along the way, politicians put their finger on the scale and money in their pockets. Lenders tried to outdo each other and became trapped in an economic whirlwind. Rating agencies failed to investigate financial soundness, and investors were lulled to sleep with an

eye on quick, unrealistic profits. It was a perfect financial storm.

Unlike many books of this genre, the authors name names. While the list is non-partisan, it is overly stocked with Democrats. This shouldn’t be surprising since the underlying theme for the original initiative was to extend homeownership to the poor and minorities, traditional Democrat constituencies. Unfortunately, these very groups were taken advantage of in the process and are suffering abnormally to this day.

This is not an easy book to digest ... or an easy column to write. While I think the authors have done a masterful job, it is a complex and difficult subject. Economics is neither an easy nor exciting subject – trust me. Still, I believe it is important to read, particularly for anyone in the financial services industry – bankers, lenders, investors, insurers, etc. Collectively, we created the mother-of-all bubbles, and the deflation impacted ... and still impacts – every sector of not only our economy, but the world’s as well. We must take these lessons to heart to insure they are not repeated.

Can this contagion happen again? I’m afraid so. No one has really been held accountable for their part in the meltdown. Supposedly last year’s Dodd-Frank financial regulatory reform was to correct this, but the authors (Senator Chris Dodd and Congressman Barney Frank) were two of the most culpable politicians in this mess and the reform left Fannie and Freddie, now under federal receivership, untouched. The scenario isn’t rosy.

The Green Thing

In the line at the store, the cashier told an older woman that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags weren’t good for the environment.

The woman apologized to him and explained, “We didn’t have the green thing back in my day.”

The clerk responded, “That’s our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment.”

He was right -- our generation didn’t have the green thing in its day.

Back then, we returned milk bottles, soda bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled.

But we didn’t have the green thing back in our day.

We walked up stairs, because we didn’t have an escalator in every store and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn’t climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks.

But she was right. We didn’t have the green thing in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby’s diapers because we didn’t have the throw-away kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy gobbling machine burning up 220 volts -- wind and solar power really did dry the clothes. Kids got hand-me-down clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing. But that old lady is right; we didn’t have the green thing back in our day.

Back then, we had one TV, or radio, in the house -- not a TV in every room.

And the TV had a small screen the size of a handkerchief (remember them?), not a screen the size of the state of Montana.

In the kitchen, we blended and stirred by hand because we didn’t have electric machines to do everything for us.

When we packaged a fragile item to send in the mail, we used a wadded up old newspaper to cushion it, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap.

Back then, we didn’t fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working, so we didn’t need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity.

But she’s right; we didn’t have the green thing back then.

We drank from a fountain when we were thirsty instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time we had a drink of water.

We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn’t have the green thing back then.

Back then, people took the streetcar or a bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their moms into a 24-hour taxi service.

We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances. And we didn’t need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 2,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest pizza joint.

But isn’t it sad the current generation laments how wasteful the old folks were just because they didn’t have the green thing back then?

Red, White & True Mysteries

Who were Archimedes, Ctesibius and Hero and what did they invent? And are their inventions still being used today, more than 2,000 years later?

Born in Syracuse in 287 B.C. and educated in Alexandria, Archimedes is known as the man who jumped up out of his bathtub one day and ran naked through town shouting “Eureka! Eureka!” In case your knowledge of Greek is as limited as mine, “Eureka” means “I have found it.”

Why did Archimedes do this? And what did he find?

While taking a bath, he had solved the dilemma of water displacement; namely, the relationship between the weight and volume of an object in water vs. the weight and volume that was displaced when he got out of the tub.

Other than the term “Eureka,” what did Archimedes invent?

- The hydraulic screw, also known as the Archimedes screw, which was used in pumping water from the Nile River

- The worm gear, which is still used today

- A system of ropes and pulleys, which he used to move a ship while it was docked on land, effectively creating the world’s first winch.

Archimedes is also credited with inventing the world’s first catapult, and legend has it that he showed how to use a mirror to focus the sun’s rays on an enemy ship, causing it to burn. Known more as a mathematician than an inventor, he also calculated the value of pi.

One of his contemporaries, Ctesibius (pronounced ti-sib-e-us) lived in Alexandria around the same time as Archimedes, but the two geniuses probably never met.

Ctesibius invented the water clock, which was known back then as the Clepsydra. The sundial had already been invented but would only work during daylight hours on sunny days. Ctesibius also created three inventions in conjunction with each other:

- The valve, which led him to create his next great invention ...

- The suction-pump, which was used for fighting fires and led to his next great invention ...

- The pump that was used as a source of wind

for the first organ.

The most accomplished of the Greek inventors was Hero who, like Ctesibius, was from Alexandria. Hero learned a lot from Ctesibius, but since most of the records of their time have been destroyed, it’s not known if Hero lived during the same time as Ctesibius or if he came after him and merely learned from his writings.

Like Italy’s da Vinci, Hero is regarded by history as a man whose work was hundreds of years ahead of his time. Hero created the following inventions:

- The world’s first steam engine, which was called an aeolipile. The principle behind the aeolipile was that every action has an “equal and opposite reaction,” which we all learned in school. Sir Isaac Newton discovered this 1,600 years later, and makers of jet engines used this same principle 1,900 years later.

- A machine which would dispense a fixed amount of holy water when a coin was put into it. This was the world’s first automatic vending machine.

- The screw-press, which extracted olive oil from olives and juice from grapes.

- The odometer, which measured the distance that taxis traveled. He did this by making a pointer with gears that counted the number of revolutions of the taxi cart’s wheel. Hero called his invention the hodometer. Ben Franklin would later invent an odometer to measure the distance that mail carriers would travel for each delivery.

Since no story about the ancient Greeks would be complete without some sort of tragedy, we end this story with the account of Archimedes’ death in 212 B.C. When the Romans invaded Syracuse, the Roman ruler ordered that Archimedes be left alone. One of the soldiers didn’t recognize him, though, and killed him with his sword.

about two inches of rain at his house, in Madison.

Progress Energy could not be reached busy Tuesday morning because their circuits were all busy, but Wayne Bass of Tri-County Electric said that while the storms didn't cause any major damage in Madison, it did drop a limb on a power line in Taylor County and knock out a substation, leaving several hundred customers without power until the damage could be repaired and the substation brought back online.

In Madison County, it was a matter of keeping up with the storms that rolled through. As soon as they had tree limbs pulled offline and power restored in one area, another band of storms knocked out power somewhere else.

"We had a lot of limbs on power lines, but probably no more than 300 people were without power at one time," said Bass. Because the storms moved through in bands, the damage was "spotty" but it kept coming. It started after lunch, and Tri-County soon had nine crews out clearing limbs from lines and getting power back to their customers.

Then, another band of thunderstorms would sail through cause more outages. "That was a long day," said Bass. While they had most of their customers back online by midnight, another line of storms came along after that, meaning some of those crews worked all night.

Overall, Bass estimates that about 600-700 people in Madison lost power at some point, although the highest number he saw on his outage machine at any given time was 285.

While there were some trees toppled, it was mostly just limbs, and the most damage seemed to have occurred west of Greenville toward the Jefferson County line.

With the storms coming through pretty fast, the damage and outages were "real spotty," said Bass. "It wasn't a really significant event...there wasn't a system-wide outage."

See It, Hear It, Report It at 973-2762 Crime Stoppers at Rotary Club

Tina DeMotsis, Investigator for the Madison County Sheriff's Office, and Terry Lenz of Crime Stoppers of Madison were the guest speakers at the Rotary Club's Aug. 31 meeting, to give an overview of Crime Stoppers of Madison County, Inc.

Crime Stoppers of Madison is a non-profit 501(c)3, funded entirely through a trust fund governed by the Attorney General. Whenever a criminal is assessed fines and court costs, a portion of the court costs go into the trust fund. The local Crime Stoppers received start-up grant money, with help from Police Chief Gary Calhoun, from this fund; it is also where the reward monies come from.

The good thing about this, said DeMotsis, is that it is funded entirely by criminals, which assists in the capture of other criminals. "Not one penny of tax money goes into this."

The local Crime Stoppers is separate from Crime Stoppers of Big Bend, in order to give residents a direct local number to call, rather than routing calls through an 800 number in a distant location. This has proven beneficial, not only because people feel more comfortable calling a local number, but also because dispatchers know the area and can quickly send law enforcement to the right location.

"Our fastest turn-around time has been about 20 minutes, from getting a tip to making an arrest," said DeMotsis. "That's the benefit of being

local." Several times, she added, the miscreants caught either in the act or shortly thereafter, have asked, "how did you even know we were here?"

The other element Lenz and DeMotsis stressed about the program was the absolute anonymity guaranteed to those who call in with information about criminal activity, or "something that just doesn't look right." Although Crime Stoppers will ask detailed questions about the activity or incident being reported, they will not ask the caller for his or her name. Instead, they will give the caller an ID number for later use in claiming a reward if an arrest is made. The calls made to the Tip Line are not recorded, and there is no Caller ID displaying the caller's phone number. The calls come in on an old-fashioned, low-tech princess telephone.

Tipsters can call back on another number within a few days, using the ID number, to see what has happened with the investigation and learn if they are entitled to a reward.

Crime Stoppers has also recently been approved for "Tips Through Texting" and are waiting on funds to implement that program. Via the "Tips Through Texting" program, schoolchildren will have a comfortable, familiar venue for reporting such things as a gun on campus, or incidents of drug dealing.

Crime Stoppers also works with the Humane Society to investigate animal cruelty cases and the Fire Marshal's Office for cases of suspected arson. They speak to various groups such as se-





nior citizens, teaching self-defense and identity theft prevention, and distribute pamphlets through the school system.

They want to let the community know Crime Stoppers is out there for them, another avenue for community members to take back their communities and feel safe again.



Brittany Bezick will attend the Presidency 5 meeting in Orlando, where a straw poll of the Republican presidential candidates.



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
Making A President

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

The Photographic Treasures of Madison County, on downtown Range Street next to the RATT Pact Theater, houses more than just photographs. For the next few weeks, this series will look briefly at some of the more unusual bits and pieces of history that have found a safe haven in the little museum, open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and 10 a.m. to Noon on Saturdays; it is funded by donations (no admittance charge) and staffed entirely by volunteers.

Has Kudzu Met Its Match?

Kudzu has been around so long, most folks can't imagine the South without it, any more than they can imagine live oaks not dripping with Spanish moss. All their lives, people have seen acres and acres and acres - fields, forests, hillsides - draped in a solid green mass of foliage that envelopes trees and telephone poles alike, until it is hard to tell one from the other.

An iconic part of the Southern landscape, kudzu is actually native to Asia, an import from over a century ago that was once touted as a very useful erosion control measure. In fact, in some places, such as Providence Canyon just south of Columbus, Ga., kudzu embodies the very reason it was once embraced. Providence Canyon did not exist until uncontrolled erosion of the land created it. The kudzu vine now holds the sides of the 1000-foot wide gul-

ly in place and prevents it from growing even wider.

The flip side of the durable, fast-growing vine, is that it also turned out to be the mother of all invasive plant species, growing like a...well, like a weed, one that was wildly out-of-control. While the vine-covered gullies may not have spread any wider, the vine most certainly did.

Currently, kudzu has swallowed up around seven million acres in the Deep South, according to some estimates, defying herbicides as well as other standard eradication procedures, with one exception; laboriously uprooting it vine by vine, only to watch it grow back, sometimes at the rate of a foot a day in summer.

For decades, kudzu seemed destined to forever reign as the supreme cautionary tale against turning an exotic plant species loose in a non-native environment.

Six years ago, sixth-grader Jacob Schindler, son of Eric

and Dr. Julie Schindler, was putting together a science fair project, looking for the ideal plant to possibly terraform Mars or reclaim desert wastelands on earth. The tough, durable, fast-growing kudzu vine seemed one of several ideal candidates for his experiments, which consisted of exposing all the plant species to gases found in the Mars atmosphere. While all of the plants in the experiment eventually died, Schindler discovered something very interesting. One of the gases, helium, had an almost immediate lethal effect on the kudzu.

Now in his senior year of high school, Jacob Schindler has spent half of his school years and one third of his life researching the kudzu-helium connection, looking for better, more efficient ways to utilize his discovery in the possible eradication of a vine that, for decades, seemed indestructible. Moreover, the helium worked on the kudzu without harming the other plants around it.

Schindler's discovery, that the seemingly invincible vine is in fact vulnerable to a gas commonly used to fill party balloons, made for more award-winning science fair projects, recognition and honors from FFA, interest from agricultural departments of universities, and even Congressional recognition for his kudzu eradication work in the Valdosta area. Earlier this summer, he was also interviewed on CNN.

His discovery was important enough that his mother, Dr. Julie Schindler, recognized the need to have her son's work patented.

However, as with most scientific breakthroughs,

there is the long period of hard work and patient study that follows. Discovering that helium would kill the kudzu was part of the battle. Ever since then, it has been finding better, more efficient ways to deliver helium to the kudzu's root system.

For his very first paid kudzu-eradicating job near Decatur, it seemed that Murphy's Law was in cahoots with the kudzu. First, the irrigation hose he wanted to use to pipe the helium down to the roots turned out to be the wrong size for connecting to the helium tank, meaning a trip to Home Depot for the right size hose. Then the drill kept hitting something solid underground, unable to go deep enough. The valve handle for the helium broke off. The drill batteries ran down.

Finally, on top of everything else, it started raining. "That was a long day," Schindler said, recalling the experience. "A very, very long day."

Afterwards, it seemed at first that the kudzu he had killed off was growing back, but he soon realized it was the adjacent kudzu plants moving in to fill the gap. Like the rest of nature, kudzu abhors a vacuum.

That's one of the problems with kudzu, Schindler explained. It doesn't recognize boundaries. If he performs an eradication procedure for someone whose neighbor also has kudzu, but DOESN'T want his kudzu eradicated as well, there will be problems preventing the neighboring kudzu plants from "filling in" the gap.

Currently, the eradication process, although it kills all the kudzu it is used on, is most ideal for lone patches of kudzu, where there are no adjacent plants waiting to move in after the kill. Also, if the infestation is somehow geographically isolated, for instance, surrounded by a body of water, that works too. So far, kudzu hasn't been able to cross water.

For Schindler, the intervening six years since that first discovery of the helium effect have seen a lot of experimentation for coming up with better, more efficient methods to deliver the helium to the root system. In his third year of research, he developed the three foot steel drill bit he now uses to bore into the ground to get at the roots.

He has also been conducting more experiments to test and retest his theories, looking for insights as to how and why the gas takes out the vine. Just this past summer, he spent several days in June at the University of Auburn, conducting more research on kudzu and helium. After setting up his experiment, he spent the next several weeks attending an honors study program elsewhere, then went back to Auburn to study the effects on the kudzu plants. The entire experiment, although he wasn't there the whole time, covered about a ten-week period.

That's the time-consuming part of the research, waiting patiently for results.

Now that he is old enough to drive, he has a pickup truck for hauling the "H-sized" tanks of helium and his other equipment around to eradication sites. "H-size" tanks are almost as tall as he is; they are far bigger than the party tanks of helium, available at Walmart, which he uses for demonstration purposes.

In the actual fieldwork, he hunts down the individual "mother plants," following the smaller stems and leaves back to the thicker, woody stems and larger leaves, to find the much thicker, tougher, woodier-stemmed plant where they all originate. This is where the helium drill goes into the ground.

Although it is hard to imagine vast tracts of the amorphous green blob as composed of several discrete, individual plants, Schindler has learned that in the typical infestation, there are one, or perhaps two "mother plants" per acre. In a 30-acre eradication job, he knows he will typically be dealing with roughly 30 to 35 mother plants. He just has to find them first.

An acre of land is roughly equal to a football field, minus the end zones, with about ten yards lopped off one end. To find those 30 to 35 mother plants, Schindler will have to search an area the size of about 27 football fields. "It's

still a very labor intensive process," he says of his method.

Still, before his discovery, there was virtually nothing anyone could do about kudzu. Now there is a process that does work, even though it requires a lot of work. It is an environmentally friendly process using an inert gas rather than poisonous herbicides, and it specifically targets the kudzu.

Schindler's work has brought him to the attention of several colleges and universities and he has spent part of his summer working on scholarship applications. So far, he has looked into Auburn University, the University of Georgia, and even Harvard.

His hope for his discovery and for his work of the last six years is that "it really gets used...I hope it doesn't end up as one of those 1001 ideas that sounded good, but just ended up on a shelf." Another hope is that he won't find out down the line that it causes another environmental problem. So far, that doesn't seem likely.

In a year, when Jacob Schindler starts college, he will have another year's experience working with the kudzu, and will have access to even more resources with which to study and refine the kudzu-killing process.

Maybe, just maybe, kudzu has finally met its match.

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
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
