

Three-Week-Old Killed In Crash

A three-week-old infant was tragically killed Saturday night, Jan. 21, in a wreck at the 256-mile marker on Interstate 10.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Leroyal L. Stevenson, 26, of Ft. Pierce, was driving a 2004 Ford and headed west in the outside westbound

lane. Her car exited the roadway onto the north shoulder and traveled into the wood line.

The Ford began rotating clockwise and struck several trees before coming to a final facing west on the north shoulder.

Stevenson was critically injured in the wreck. She was taken to Tallahassee Memorial

Hospital.

Victoria Littles, 25, of Ft. Pierce sustained serious injuries in the wreck. She was also taken to TMH.

A minor child was taken to TMH with serious injuries.

The infant was taken to Madison County Memorial Hospital where it was pronounced dead.

Postage Rates Increase

New postage rate increases went into effect on Sunday, Jan. 22.

People using the United States Postal Service saw a one-cent increase to mail a one-ounce letter. It will increase to 45 cents. The cost for additional ounces remain unchanged at 20 cents.

Postcards have gone up from 29 cents to 32 cents.

One-ounce letters to Canada or Mexico saw an increase of five cents to 85 cents.

Letters to other international destinations increased from 98 cents to \$1.05.

The good news for business mailers is that the second ounce for first-class mail presort is free. This move is designed to give companies expanded opportunities to advertise new services and products to their customers as part of bill and statement first-class mail presort mailings weighing between one and two ounces.

Driver Collides With Trees

A 19-year-old sustained minor injuries in a wreck on Sunday evening, Jan. 22.

According to a Florida Highway Patrol report, Ryan M. Barclay, 19, of Madison, was traveling west on US 90, driving a 200 Kia Sephia.

For unknown reasons, he ran off the road onto the north shoulder.

Barclay steered the Kia to the left, overcorrecting the car's path of travel. The car traveled southwest across the eastbound and westbound lanes.

The car continued traveling southwest onto the downward grass sloop located on the south shoulder.

The car's front left wheel impacted the grass shoulder, causing the car to rotate a quarter of a turn in a counterclockwise direction.

The car continued in a southwesterly direction, down the grass slope before colliding with two trees at the base of the slope.

The first point of contact was at the right front side of the car and the second point of contact was at the right rear side of the car.

The Kia then rotated a quarter of a turn in a counterclockwise direction.

The third point of contact was at the left rear where it collided with a tree.

The car came to a final rest, facing north.

THE SAVVY SENIOR

Dear Savvy Senior:

Do airlines still provide discounts to seniors on their airfares? My husband and I are retired and like to travel and are wondering which airlines offer the best discounts to budget conscious seniors.

Frugal Travelers

Dear Travelers,

While senior airfare discounts are not nearly as common as they used to be, there are a handful of carriers that still offer them. Here's a rundown of the different airlines that are currently offering senior airfares, along with some tips to help you find the best deals.

Senior-Friendly Skies

The only U.S. airlines that are currently offering senior airfare discounts are:

- Southwest which has discounts on all domestic routes to passengers 65 and older. For details on fares call 800-435-9792 or you can search online at southwest.com.

- American which offers some senior fares to travelers 65 and older on their American, American Eagle and American Connection domestic flights. Call 800-433-7300 to find out which flights offer these discounts. You cannot search specifically for senior airfares on American's aa.com website.

- United has some discounts on select flights to those 65-plus but they are few and far between. To search for them, visit united.com and select "child or senior" from the dropdown menu. When the site returns your fare quote, the results for your search will indicate the type of discount you are receiving, if one is available. You can also call 800-241-6522 to find out if a senior discount is available for a particular flight.

- Continental which is merging with United in a few months has senior discount fares as well on very few flights to passengers 65 and older. To search, visit continental.com and click on "Advance Search" to access the "seniors" category, or call 800-523-3273.

- Delta has senior discounts that vary by age and apply only to flights from three Latin American nations – Panama, Honduras and Ecuador. Call 800-241-4141 to inquire.

Shopping Tips

When shopping for cheap plane tickets, it's important to know that many of the airlines regular discount fares or online specials are usually cheaper than the senior discount fares. So, to ensure you get the best price available, you need to compare prices and options from all carriers.

To help you do this, your best resources are online travel sites like orbitz.com, travelocity.com and kayak.com. These sites will let you search for the lowest priced flights on all the different airlines at the same time. They will not, however, let you search for senior fares.

Once you find a flight with the lowest fare that fits your schedule, look up similar flights on the different airlines that offer senior fares (Southwest, American, United, Continental and Delta) and compare. You can do this either online at their respective website (with exception of American and Delta), or by calling their reservation department number. This will ensure you're getting the best deal.

Another tip that can help you save is to be flexible when you travel. Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday are typically the three cheapest days of the week to fly, while Friday and Sunday are the most expensive. And the cheapest time to fly is typically the first flight out in the morning.

The day of the week you purchase your tickets can also affect the price. Airlines usually post their lowest domestic fares on Tuesday at 3 p.m., Eastern Standard Time. Sales typically last three days so you stand a decent chance of getting bargains on Wednesday and Thursday too.

55 Plus Club Talks About Local History And The Treasures Museum

When Bill Bunting addressed the 55 Plus Club at their January meeting, everything tried to go wrong, but as an enthusiastic, interesting and capable speaker, even without prepared notes, Bunting made it turn out all right.

Bunting was replacing Maria Greene, who was unable to make it due to illness, and Greene herself was supposed to substitute for Teenie Cave, the original speaker. Cave's son, who is in the military, had come back to the States for a short while, and she had gone to visit him. Greene and Cave are also the ones who put together the "Photographic Treasures of Madison County" books.

Bunting, along with Greene and Cave, are volunteers working with the Treasures Museum committee, a group of people dedicated to preserving local history.

The original plan for the 55 Plus Club was supposed to be the presentation the DVD "Treasures and Folklore of Madison County," a video/narrative presentation featuring several of those historical photographs accompanied by narratives from some local longtime citizens recalling how things used to be in Madison. The big new projector screen at the United Methodist Cooperative Ministries Center was set up and ready.

However, the DVD/computer technology, which had performed flawlessly the day before, refused to cooperate. Bunting, who had prepared only a short introduction for the DVD, ended up ably carrying the entire presentation, speaking about the museum and the local history of the area.

The Museum was started several years ago by Frances Copeland and Dorothy Brown, who wanted a place where the local history could be preserved and displayed, where people could come in and see pieces of Madison's past - things their parents and grandparents, or even they themselves used to see everyday, but that had all but disappeared from public sight. A few remained in private collections, displayed somewhere in dens or living rooms, or packed away in attics, closets, sheds and garages. Copeland and Brown envisioned a safe place where these items could be gathered together and displayed for everyone, a visual representation of local history.

Thus, the Treasures Museum was born.

Most of the items in the Museum are donated by local citizens, and some are on loan.

There are old school desks, textbooks and other

items from local schools that have been closed for decades. There are antique medical instruments once used by local physicians. There are relics from the old drive-in theaters of yesteryear. There is a section dedicated to Greenville native and music legend Ray Charles. There are exhibits honoring local veterans. There are photographs from every era, sepia-toned, black-and-white, and even color images of the way things were once, at a certain point and time in history.

Bunting also talked about the book he was writing, chronicling the Civil War era day-by-day, as seen by the people of Madison County. He went on to describe the special challenges of researching local history prior to 1856, when Madison County once covered what is now Madison, Taylor, Lafayette and Dixie Counties, stretching from the Georgia line in the north to the mouth or the Suwannee River at its southernmost tip, and back up along the Gulf Coast to the mouth of the Aucilla River between Jefferson and Taylor Counties. Then, in 1856, much of what was then southern Madison County became Lafayette and Taylor Counties. In 1912, Dixie County was carved out of Taylor County.

Thus, when looking for historical or genealogical information of someone who lived in Madison County prior to 1856, a researcher may have to look through records in all four counties to find it; if a person is listed as having died in "Madison County" before 1856, the burial site could be anywhere in the four counties, but it is most likely somewhere within the four county region. In an era before embalming was the practice, people were buried within 24 hours of death, usually very close to where they died. Bodies were seldom transported long distances.

Still, when looking for Madison County-related information, the Treasures Museum at 196 SW Range Street, with Ann McLeod in charge of the Genealogy Library in the back, is a good place to start.

The Museum owns both the upstairs and the downstairs of the W.T. Davis Building. Additionally, the upstairs portion of the building once housed the Madison Opera House. "Monticello isn't the only town that has an opera house," said Bunting.

However, currently the museum committee is not allowed to use that upstairs portion for museum displays - not until they install an elevator to make the space ADA compliant, at a cost of \$35,000.

The museum's funding comes from donations. There is no admission charge.

Another thing the museum is short on is volunteers, particularly folks willing to staff the museum while it is open to the public.

"All our museum people are volunteers," Bunting emphasized. "And we need volunteers badly."

Right now, they have enough volunteers to keep the museum open from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Tuesdays through Fridays, and from 10 a.m. until noon on Saturdays.

The lively question-and-answer session that followed evolved into several people sharing their own experiences and memories of Madison's past.

They spoke of the sights and sounds of familiar streets and places from their childhood years. A few places had survived almost intact, some had survived in altered form, while others had disappeared altogether and were now just memories. They

talked about downtown streets that were once dirt lanes. They talked about the long-time tradition of everyone coming into town on Saturday afternoons, hitching their horses or parking their cars downtown and spending all day walking the streets, shopping and socializing around town. They talked about gathering at downtown family-owned drug stores that have since closed. They talked about the tradition of ringing church bells at a funeral whenever someone died, one toll for every year of that person's age at death. They talked about various roads named after Madison families. They talked about Egan Hill, named after the carpetbagger Dennis Egan, who, according to folklore, fled into the swamps in the southern part of the county.


Even in a small town/rural environment like Madison County, a lot has changed fairly rapidly, in the spans of their own lifetimes.

"Children aren't taught about Madison County history in schools," Bunting told the audience. "The museum tries to remedy that."

Some schools have brought groups of children to the museum, he said. Also, there have been some tour groups from the college. Bunting would welcome more tour groups.

The museum committee would also like to be able to cultivate more interest in the past among Madison's children and they would like to have the resources and volunteers to meet that growing interest.

They may be a little short on money and volunteers, but one thing they are not short on is history, along with a passion to preserve it before all traces of it disappear, so that it can be shared with the people of Madison, and with the present and future generations of Madison's children.

Spotlight: Charlie Barfield

Many know him as coach; others know him as pastor. He has spent his life serving the people of this County through the Madison County Education System and as pastor of Pineland Missionary Baptist Church. While he's given of himself sacrificially to this community for many years, it is this writer's privilege to spotlight the life of Coach and Pastor Charlie Barfield.

In 1949, Barfield was born in Madison to his parents, Charlie and Samuel Barfield on December 28. Raised in Madison, Barfield came from a large family consisting of four sisters and two brothers. Growing up in a Christian home, the example was set before him by Godly parents, and he learned which pathway to walk in. At the early age of 12, followed the footsteps of his parents and gave his life to Christ at St. James Missionary Baptist Church.

Barfield began kindergarten at the Madison County Training School, and graduated from there in May of 1967 with a high school diploma. He began playing basketball in Junior High and played until his senior year, and would earn a scholarship to play basketball at Edwards Waters College in Jacksonville.

After taking an extended break and taking selected classes at North Florida Junior College, Barfield graduated from Edwards Waters in 1976 in with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education.

The next thing on the list of things to do was to send a resume to schools in the state of Florida. Of approximately 30 resumes sent, Madison Middle School was the only door that opened. "It was a God thing," Barfield explains.

Barfield accepted the offer and began teaching Physical Education in February of 1977 at MMS, while also coaching the Wildcats in foot-



The year 1977 proved to be life changing for Barfield as he would walk down the isle and marry Shirley, his high school sweet heart.

It was just a few years later that Barfield would accept the call into ministry under the influence of Rev. David De-laughter and Rev. J.C. Miller. In 1984, Barfield began his preaching ministry and preached as an evangelist until receiving his first call to pastor at Friendship Baptist Church in Metcalf, Ga. During the same year, he also accepted the position as senior pastor at Pineland Missionary Baptist Church in Madison. For 10 years, Barfield preached at Friendship on the first and third Sunday of each month and would handle services at Pineland on the second and fourth Sundays.

While at Friendship, the church was able to build brand new facilities under the leadership of Barfield, who ultimately resigned in 1994 to preach at Pineland on a full-time basis.

Looking back, Barfield has enjoyed many years of success in education and ministry. He coached the MMS Wildcats to approximately 12 championships and the Madison County Central School Broncos to three championships. "I had to learn how to love sports," his wife laughed. When Barfield isn't on the sideline coaching, he enjoys going to sporting events and fishing.

"You know, I watch football games and cheer for the Florida State Seminoles and the FAMU Rattlers. But sometimes, I even cheer for the gators," he laughs.

After 35 years of teaching and 33 years of coaching, Barfield will say good-bye to the court



as he coaches his last basketball game at Madison County Central School. "Even with longevity, you have to love what you do. I love teaching and ministry, so they went well together," he said.

Barfield will continue to serve as the president of the Ministers, Deacons and Laymen Training Union and second vice moderator of the Bethlehem Baptist Association.

This year marks 26 years of ministry at Pineland Missionary Baptist Church. Over the many years of preaching, Barfield has witnessed many changes and experienced many funny moments. "I remember this one time," his wife said. "Charlie was preaching his heart out, and at the climax of his message, his dentures came flying out and fell straight to the floor. But he swooped

down, picked them up and put them back in, and kept on preaching! Thankfully, nobody else noticed what happened, but it made for a good laugh."

To the public he is known as coach and pastor, but at home he is known as a loving dad to three kids: Carneze, Jarrod and Charlene; and grandpa to three grandchildren: J'Myrial, E'Myria, and Ke'niya.

"He's my love, my companion, my pastor and the apple of my eyes," Shirley said. "And he's been my best friend since 1965."

If there's one message that he has left with his students down through the years, it is to learn how to love people. "It doesn't cost you a thing," he explained. "If you love God, you will love people. Be joyful, smile a lot, and be lovable."



How To Get Your Family To Eat More Whole Grain Foods

Most people want to make healthy eating decisions, but there are lots of messages vying for attention in supermarkets. This is especially true when it comes to following the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommendation to choose products with whole grain as the first ingredient.

According to Dr. Travis Stork, emergency room physician and host of "The Doctors," shoppers can find nutritional cues on the front of food boxes, but also should read the Nutrition Fact panels on their sides.

When it comes to whole grain, look for the words "whole grain" as the first ingredient in the ingredient list. Ingredient lists detail ingredients in order of prevalence. "One of the best ways to boost whole grain intake is to examine the products your family already loves, and look for the ones that have a whole grain at the top of the ingredient list," said Stork.

comes to breakfast, more than 50 cereals with the white check, like Cheerios and Kix, now have more whole grain than any other single ingredient - with the same great taste. These cereals also list the grams of whole grain per serving on the side of their boxes.

Whole grain is an important part of a healthy diet. In connection with healthier lifestyles, a diet rich in whole grain has been linked to healthier body weights, and it may help reduce the risk of heart disease and certain cancers. According to the Dietary Guidelines, more than 95 percent of Americans don't get the recommended amount of whole grain.

Dr. Stork recommends these tips for finding whole grain and stocking your pantry with the right food:

- **Start Early!** The Dietary Guidelines recommend people get at least 48 grams of whole grain in their daily diets. Get a jump on the day's nutrition by incorporating whole grain into your morning routine. When choosing cereal make sure whole grain is listed as the first ingredient. One easy choice is cereal with the white check, which has more whole grain than

any other single ingredient.

- **Make Simple Swaps.** Choose whole grain versions of foods you love. Great options include whole wheat pasta and whole wheat bread or whole grain crackers. Also, try different types of whole grain. Use brown rice instead of white rice as a side dish at dinner or popcorn, which is a whole grain, for a snack.

- **Don't Judge a Food by Its Cover.** The front of food packages provide good nutritional cues, but remember to read the ingredients and check nutrition labels and side labels for additional health information. Cereals with the white check even include the amount of whole grain per serving on packaging.

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Ask The Dentist



Question: What do my prescription medicines have to do with my teeth?

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One of the most obvious side effects is sudden rampant or aggressive tooth decay. I have seen this with 3 patients in the last three weeks which is my inspiration for this article. These patients have had routine dental care for years and all of a sudden with new medications come new dental decay problems.

Numerous medications have the effect of drying up your saliva. You can often tell someone with dry mouth because they say they are thirsty all the time and they carry around a bottle of water. They have been checked for diabetes because of the excessive thirst but they are fine. What has happened is they have developed a dry mouth condition called Xerostomia.

Two of my patients started using cough drops to make their mouth feel better. Interestingly cough drops do have antibiotic ingredients to help sore throats. Things like menthol, spearmint, & cetylpyridium chloride will all help fight the bacteria when you have a sore throat, which is wonderful. The problem is most all sore throat lozenges are loaded with sugar. Go ahead and use sugar laden cough drops for three months. They will cause just as many cavities as candy.

Let me describe it this way. You know that fire extinguishers have some form of baking soda to put out fires. Let me ask a question. Would you buy a Fire Extinguisher from the BP Oil Company? (I know you won't buy anything from BP) Does it make sense to have a fire extinguisher which is half baking soda and half GASOLINE? Well that is what you are doing when you get cough drops with sugar (high fructose corn syrup) and a disinfectant. You are killing the bacteria and fueling them at the same time. It also fuels tooth decay.

So if you like cough drops you need to find them that are sugar free. Don't let them put gasoline in your fire extinguisher!
